Wednesday, March 4, 1931.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Moulton of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

I have expressed to him such appreciation as was within my power, and I know that you will take the opportunity to perfect that expression by prompt action.

Hon. William Tudor Gardiner. Governor, and the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Maine:-

It long has been my ambition to have the State of Maine own Mt. Katahdin, for to my mind that mountain is the grandest and most beautiful of all the natural attractions of our State.

Beginning as a member of the House of Representatives, continuing through my service as Sena-tor and Governor, later as a private citizen I have consistently maintained my interest in this region and e pect some day to see my ambition realized. It has been necessary to overcome many obstacles and some are yet to be surmounted, but time and patience aid a good cause and I am confi-dent of the outcome.

Some time ago I acquired an undivided three-eighths (%) interest civided three-engines (%) mercs, in an area comprising sixteen (16) square miles in Township three (3), Range nine (9), Piscataquis County, within which lies Mt. Katahdin, having purchased the same from the Great Northern Paper Company, whose officials showed a fine public spirit in their willingness to

aid me in carrying out my plans. It was my hope by this time to have acquired the remaining undivided five-eighths (5%) of this area, but this has not yet been accomplished. I, however, shall con-tinue my efforts to obtain the outstanding interest in order to give it to the State at some future date.

The problem that thus confronted me was whether at once to donate to the State my three-eighths (%) interest, or wait until the re-maining portion is acquired. Owing to the uncertainty of life, and being apprehensive lest something might happen to thwart my plans, I have decided to offer at this time to convey my interest in this mountain area as a gift to the State of Maine, and ask that it be accept-ed by Act of the Eighty-Fifth Legislature in accordance with the terms of the Act of Acceptance submitted herewith.

The only requests that I have to make in connection with this gift are that, in so far as can legally be done with an undivided interest, the donated area forever be used for public park and recreational purposes, forever be left in the natural wild state, forever be kept as a sanctuary for wild beasts and birds, that no roads or ways for motor vehicles shall hereafter be

constructed thereon or therein, and that I be allowed to retain, during my lifetime, the right to determine, and to place whatever markers or inscriptions shall be maintained or erected on or within the donated area herein offered to the State.

In making this gift I desire to show to the people of my native State my appreciation of the honors they conferred upon me in the years gone by.

Mr. BURKETT of Portland: Mr. Speaker, accompanying this com-munication that has been read, which speaks for itself. I understand that there is a bill that has been accepted by the Senate by unanimous consent and had its two several readings and passed to be engrossed. I move that at this time the House, under suspension of the rules and in concurrence with the Senate, grant unanimous consent for the reception of the bill accompanying communication. this It would be an unusual situation that at this time would induce me to make a motion for the reception of a bill, but I believe this is that unusual situation. It is the wish of Mr. Baxter that no long speeches be made on this matter and the communication speaks for itself. I think we can best show our appreciation of his generous act by at this time passing this bill. You will notice the bill on your desks is simply accepting the gift that he is making, authorizizng the Governor and Council to receive on behalf of the State the deed which he has prepared and is ready to give. Т think we can best show our ap-preciation by as speedy a passage of this bill as the Rules of the House will permit. The legal matters have been passed upon by the Attorney-General and the bill seems to be in proper form. I hope my motion will prevail.

The motion prevailed and by unanimous consent the rules were suspended and bill an act accepting from Percival Proctor Baxter a deed of gift of a portion of Mount Katahdin had its three several readings and was passed to be engrossed.

Cognizes the gentlemen from Mount Desert, Mr. Graves. Mr. GRAVES: Mr. Speaker, for the purpose of offering an amendment to this bill, I move that the report ought to pass be accepted, that the rules be suspended and that the rules be suspended and the bill have its first two readings at this time.

The motion prevailed, and the bill had its two several readings at this time.

Mr. GRAVES: I offer House Amendment A and moved its adoption, as follows:

House Amendment A to bill an act to re-establish the town line between the towns of Hancock and Lamoine.

Amend by striking out all of the emergency preamble in said bill, and further amend by striking all of section seven in said bill and by substituting in place of said section seven the following:

"Sec. 7. Such sum as represents the valuation of the portion of the town of Hancock hereby set off to the town of Lamoine as shown by the assessors' books of the town of Hancock for the year 1930 is here-by deducted from the valuation of the town of Hancock, upon which State and county taxes are assessed, and added to the valuation of said town of Lamoine.

"Sec. 8. The said town of La-moine shall be holden to pay to the town of Hancock in twelve equal annual installments, or in such less number of installments and at such earlier date or dates as said town of Lamoine may vote, such proportion of the debts owing on March 1, 1931, by said town of Hancock, including the debt with reference to the Hancock-Sullivan Bridge after deducting therefrom all debts then due said town, as the last annual valuation of the property situated in the portion of Hancock hereby set off to Lamoine shall bear to the last annual val-uation of all of the taxable pro-perty in said town of Hancock". Mr. THOMAS of Harpswell: Mr.

Thereupon the bill with amendment A was tabled, pending adop-tion of the amendment, and was specially assigned for Wednesday, March 11th. Mr. THOMAS: Mr. Speaker,

т would like to say that it will very likely be agreeable to me to have the bill taken off the table earlier. I just wanted to find out whether that amendment was agreeable to all parties.

On motion by Mr. Burkett of Portland 500 copies of the amendment were ordered printed.

The Chair lays before the House

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the second unassigned matter, bill an act relating to the payment for support of inmates of the Pownal State School, S. P. 322, L. D. 298, tabled by that gentleman February 24, pending passage to be engrossed; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Madawaska, Mr. Daigle.

On motion by Mr. Daigle the bill was retabled, pending passage to be engrossed.

The Chair lays before the House the third unassigned matter, bill an act relating to the salary of the County Commissioners of Androscoggin county, H. P. 1144, L. D. 721, tabled by the member from Lewiston, Mrs. Morey, February 24, pending second reading; and the Chair recognizes the member from Lewiston, Mrs. Morey.

On motion by Mrs. Morey, the bill was retabled pending second reading.

The Chair lays before the House the fourth unassigned matter, Senate report, ought to pass in new draft, of the committee on Judiciary on bill an act to incorporate Madawaska Water Company, S. P. 312, L. D. 288, new draft, S. P. 496, L. D. 717, under title of "An act extending charter of Madawaska Water Company." This came from the Senate report read and accepted and the new draft passed to be engrossed, and was tabled by Mr. Daigle of Madawaska, February 25, pending acceptance in concurrence. The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Madawaska, Mr. Daigle.

On motion by Mr. Daigle, the report was accepted in concurrence, the bill had its two several readings, under suspension of the rules, and tomorrow assigned.

The Chair lays before the House the fifth unassigned matter, House report, ought to pass in new draft, committee on Judiciary on bill an act relating to County Law Libraries, H. P. 588, new draft, H. P. 1069, tabled by Mr. Snow of Bluehill, February 25, pending acceptance of the report; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Bluehill, Mr. Snow.

Mr. SNOW: Mr. Speaker, for the reason given one week ago, I move that the matter again be laid on the table. The motion prevailed, and the bill and report were retabled, pending acceptance of the report.

The Chair lays before the House the sixth unassigned matter, an act relating to payments to County Law Libraries, S. P. 40, L. D. 237, tabled by Mr. McCart of Eastport, February 25, pending passage to be enacted.

Mr. BREWSTER of Wells: Mr. Speaker, in the absence of Mr. Mc-C .t, I move that this be retabled.

The motion prevailed, and the bill was retabled pending passage to be enacted.

The Chair lays before the House the seventh unassigned matter, bill an act relating to public health nursing in the schools, S. P. 443, L. D. 602, which came from the Senate referred to the committee on Education and which on February 25 in the House was tabled by Mr. Williams of Falmouth, pending reference in concurrence; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Falmouth, Mr. Williams. Mr. WILLIAMS: Mr. Speaker,

Mr. WILLIAMS: Mr. Speaker, this matter and the two following matters I yield the floor to the gentleman from Augusta, Mr. Farris.

Mr. FARRIS: Mr. Speaker, the seventh, eighth and ninth unassigned matters were tabled by the gentleman from Portland, Mr. Rounds, on February 19. Last Wednesday they came off the table automatically under the rules and were retabled by the gentleman from Falmouth, Mr. Williams. Now Mr. Rounds is ill and unable to be about and it is a question whether or not he will be able to return to the Legislature at this session. In order, however, that there may be sufficient time to ascertain what he wants to do with these matters I move that they be retabled.

The motion prevailed and the seventh, eighth and ninth unassigned matters were retabled, the seventh pending reference in concurrence; the eighth, being House report, ought not to pass of the committee on Judiciary, on bill an act relating to patients in insane hospitals, H. P. 705, pending acceptance of report; and the ninth, being Joint order relative to investigating insane hospitals, which in the House January 29th was referred to the committee on Insane Hospitals, and came from the Senate indefinitely postponed in nonconcurrence, pending reconsideration

The Chair lays before the House the tenth unassigned matter, bill an act to exempt United States Govgasoline tax, S. P. 516, L. D. This came from the Senate the 761. referred to the committee on Ways and Bridges, and, on February 27, was tabled by Mr. Lowell of Lincoln, pending reference in concurrence; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Lincoln, Mr. Lowēll

On motion by Mr. Lowell, the bill was referred to the committee on Ways and Bridges in concurrence.

The Chair lays before the House the 11th unassigned matter, Senate report ought to pass of the committee on Judiciary on bill an act to provide for continuous revision of the Statutes and legislative as-sistance, S. P. 278, L. D. 249. This came from the Senate report read and accepted and the bill passed to be engrossed, and was tabled on February 27 by Mr. Burkett Portland, pending acceptance of of the report in concurrence; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Portland, Mr. Burkett. On motion by Mr. Burkett, the

bill and report were retabled pending acceptance of the report in concurrence.

The Chair lays before the House the 12th unassigned matter, Senate report, ought not to pass, of the committee on Judiciary on bill an act to incorporate the Knox Water District, S. P. 195, L. D. 158. This report came from the Senate read and accepted and in the House on February 27 was tabled by Mr. Hobbs of Hope, pending acceptance of the report in concurrence; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman

from Hope, Mr. Hobbs. Mr. HOBBS: Mr. Speaker, I now move that this bill be recommitted to the committee on Judiciary in non-concurrence.

Mr. BURKETT of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I have no objection to the recommitment of this bill provided there are good and sufficient reasons for it. We had an extended hearing on it with people present who were interested on both sides of the measure from Rockland and

Knox county generally. The matter was thoroughly gone into. If proper, I would like to ask the gentleman from Hope, Mr. Hobbs, through the Chair, his reason for asking for recommitment at this time.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. Burkett, asks the gentleman from Hope, Mr. Hobbs, through the Chair, if he will give a reason for his motion.

Mr. HOBBS: Mr Speaker, the reason for recommitment is for two minor amendments, and I have here several petitions, with 465 signers, from Rockland, Thomaston and Camden in favor of this bill.

The SPEAKER: Does that answer the question of the gentleman from Portland, Mr. Burkett?

Mr. BURKETT: I would like to ask the gentleman through the Chair, if his purpose in recommit-ment is to have another hearing on the bill?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman may reply, if he wishes. Mr. HOBBS: Mr. S

Speaker. т think that is the purpose.

Thereupon the motion prevailed and the bill and report were recommitted to the committee on Judiciary in non-concurrence.

The Chair lays before the House the 13th unassigned matter, House report, ought not to pass, of the committee on Ways and Bridges on bill an act relating to the bridge between Richmond and Dresden, H. P. 882, tabled by Mr. Bowers of Portland, February 27, pending acceptance of the report, and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Portland, Mr. Bowers. Mr. BOWERS: Mr. Speaker, I

Mr. BOWERS: Mr. Speaker, I yield the floor to the gentleman from Bath, Mr. Jackson.

On motion by Mr. Jackson, the bill and report were retabled pending acceptance of the report.

The Chair lays before the House the 14th unassigned matter, majority report ought to pass in new draft and minority report ought not to pass of the committee on Legal Affairs on bill an act providing for probation on jail sentences where a fine is paid, H. P. 606, L. D. 207, the new draft being numbered, H. P. 1192, L. D. 777, and en-titled "An act providing for sen-

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tences and the imposition thereof" tabled by Mr. Sargent of Brewer February 27, pending acceptance of either report; and the Chair recognizes the gentleman from Brewer, Mr. Sargent.

On motion by Mr. Sargent, the bill and reports were retabled pending acceptance of either report.

The SPEAKER: Are there any other matters to be considered under orders of the day?

On motion by Mr. \mathbf{B} urkett of Portland, it was voted to take from the table the 20th unassigned matter, bill an act to provide a penalty for circulating false reports concerning banks and loan and building associations, H. P. 1194, L. D. 781, tabled by that gentleman 781, tabled by that gentleman March 3. pending second reading. On motion by Mr. Burkett, the

bill had its second reading.

Mr. BURKETT: Mr. Speaker, I now offer House Amendment A and move its adoption. I will state that it simply corrects some errors in the wording of the bill without changing its form or purpose.

House Amendment A to House Paper 1194, L. D. 781.

"House Paper 1194 is hereby amended by striking out all of said bill after the word 'conviction' in the fourth line of said bill and substituting in place thereof the following words: 'be punished by a fine of not more than one thousand dollars or by imprisonment for not more than eleven months, or by both such fine and imprisonment'."

Thereupon amendment A was adopted and under suspension of the rules the bill as amended by House Amendment A had its third reading and was passed to be engrossed.

Mr. ELLIS of Rangeley: Mr. Speaker, I would like to have the House reconsider its action of yesterday on House Paper 490, report of the committee on Claims, ought not to pass, on resolve in favor of

Guy B. Durrell, whereby the report was accepted, and sent up for concurrence. I might say that there are other matters pending relative to this same claim and that is the only reason I have for reconsideration. The testimony given before the committee on these other matters might have some bearing on the case of Mr. Durrell.

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The SPEAKER: The Chair would inquire if the gentleman knows where the papers are?

Mr. ELLIS: No, I do not.

The SPEAKER: The Chair is informed that they are not before the House. Consequently the gentle-

man's motion would not be in order. Mr. ELLIS: Is there any way, Mr. Speaker, by which we can get the motion in order? I understand that after today we cannot take this matter up.

The SPEAKER: The Chair is informed that the House has no knowledge of the status of the matter and the present place in which the papers are. If in the Senate, they cannot be reached. If on file, they may be reached by a Joint Order of the House and Senate to have them recalled.

Mr. ELLIS: Is a motion to recall in order?

The SPEAKER: Not as yet. The Chair would suggest that the gentleman defer action until he knows where the papers are. If he wishes to give notice at this time for re-consideration that would protect his rights.

Mr. ELLIS: Mr. Speaker, I will do that. The physician who attended this hearing has a claim here and his testimony might have some bearing on the case.

The SPEAKER: Are there any other matters that can come under orders of the day? If not, the Clerk will read the notices.
