Thursday, March 5, 1931.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Manning of Augusta.

On motion by Mrs. Morey of Lewiston, it was voted to take from the table the 14th unassigned matter, bill an act relating to the salary of the County Commissioners of Androscoggin County, H. P. 1144, L. D. 721, tabled by that member, March 4, pending second reading. Mrs. MOREY: Mr. Speaker and

members of the House: Having heard from members of my constituency matters in favor of indefinitely postponing, I move to indefinitely postpone this bill.

Mr. JACOBS of Auburn: Mr. Speaker, in the earlier days of this session it was my privilege, by re-quest, to present this bill to the House. It concerns Androscoggin county only, and yet it has to be ratified by this body. It refers to an increase of salary of the county commissioners oners of Androscoggin This matter was brought county. to the attention of the entire delegation of Androscoggin county before it was presented to the committee on Salaries and Fees, and we unanimously, without any opposition, voted to increase the salary of the Chairman of this county commission. We decided not to raise the salary of the other two members. When this went to the Salaries and Fees committee, having had its hearing properly before that Committee, they voted unanimously to increase the salary of the chairman of the county commissioners and not the other two members.

As it now stands before the House, we are voting on the increase of salary of the Chairman of

the county commissioners of Androscoggin county. It was not my purpose, and I did not feel it necessary. to speak before the House on this question after the entire delegation had passed upon it unanimously and the Salaries and Fees committee had unanimously voted that it ought to pass; but certain factors have come into it since that make it necessary to defend this bill which I presented, in fairness to all, and especially to the Chairman of this commission who devotes his entire time to the work of the county commissioners of Androscoggin county. Not only that, but he is custodian and caretaker of the buildings of Androscoggin county, and as you all may know, we have court in those buildings almost every month in the year and it is necessary for someone to look after them. This duty is delegated by the county commissioners to the Chairman.

In all the offices of Androscoggin county-there are five which I can mention-the average salary is \$1,-980.00, including the county attorney, register of probate, county treasurer and the register of deeds. Also these offices carry clerk hire averaging \$1,300 to each office. There is no clerk hire in the of-fice of the county commissioners they do their own work. Thev handle a business of \$17,500,000 yearly in that office, and I believe it is only fair that the chairman of this Board of County Commissioners should have a salary commensurate with his job to which he devotes the entire time. There will be no extra tax upon the citizens and voters of Androscoggin county on account of this five hundred dollar raise. I think this is only fair to him and to those who are sponsoring this bill, and I object, Mr. Speaker, to having this bill indefinitely postponed.

The SPEAKER: The question before the House is on the motion of the member from Lewiston, Mrs. Morey, to indefinitely postpone. Are you ready for the question?

A viva voce vote being taken, the motion to indefinitely postpone failed of passage.

On motion by Mr. Jacobs, the bill had its second reading and tomorrow assigned. On motion by Mr. Blodgett of Bucksport, it was voted to take from the table the third unassigned matter, House report, ought to pass in new draft of the committee on Claims on resolve in favor of Horace Kelley, H. P. 522, new draft, H. P. 1200, tabled by that gentleman, March 3, pending acceptance of the report; and on further motion by the same gentleman the resolve and report were recommitted to the committee on Claims.

On motion by Mr. Drisko of Jonesboro, it was voted to take from the table the fifth unassigned matter, Senate report ought to pass, of the committee on Sea and Shore Fisheries on bill an act to authorize Edward B. Sawyer et al to construct a fish weir in the tidewaters of Chandler Bay in the town of Jonesport, near Moose Ledge, S. P. 153, L. D. 775, which came from the Senate read and accepted and the bill passed to be engrossed and which in the House was tabled March 4 by Mr. Drisko of Jonesboro, pending acceptance of the report in concurrence.

On further motion by the same gentleman the report was accepted in concurrence, and the bill had its two several readings and tomorrow assigned.

On motion by Mr. Drisko of Jonesboro, it was voted to take from the table the sixth unassigned matter, Senate report, ought to pass, of the committee on Sea and Shore Fisheries on bill an act to authorize Edward B. Sawyer et al to construct a fish weir in the tidewaters of Chandler Bay in the town of Jonesport, near Bar Island, S. P. 152, L. D. 774, which came from the Senate report read and accepted and the bill passed to be engrossed and which in the House was tabled March 4 by Mr. Drisko of Jonesboro, pending acceptance of the report in concurrence.

On further motion by the same gentleman the report was accepted in concurrence, and the bill had its two several readings and tomorrow assigned.

On motion by Mr. Sturtevant of Livermore Falls, it was voted to take from the table the seventh unassigned matter, bill an act relating to regulation of loans by

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trust companies S. P. 353, L. D. 376, which was passed to be engrossed in the House February 25th, and which came from the Senate passed to be engrossed as amended by Senate Amendment A, L. D. 776, in non-concurrence, and which in the House was tabled March 4 by Mr. Sturtevant, pending reconsideration.

On motion by Mr. Sturtevant the House voted to reconsider its action whereby this bill was passed to be engrossed. On further motion by the same gentleman Senate Amendment A was adopted in concurrence, and the bill as so amended was passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Scates of Westbrook, it was voted to take from the table the ninth unassigned matter, House report ought to pass in new draft, of the committee on Judiciary on bill an act relating to primary nominations, H. P. 202, L. D. 144, new draft, H. P. 1233, tabled by that gentleman March 4, pending acceptance of the report; and on further motion by the same gentleman the report was accepted and the bill lai. on the table for printing under the Joint Rules.

On motion by Mr. Jack of Lisbon it was voted to take from the table the fourth unassigned matter, Senate report ought to pass, of the committee on Judiciary on bill an act relating to Secretary of State authorized to destroy records more than two years old S. P. 362, L. L. 384, which came from the Senate the report read and accepted and the bill passed to be engrossed, and which in the House was tabled by Mr. Jack, March 4 pending acceptance of the report in concurrence.

On further motion by the same gentleman the report was accepted in concurrence, and the bill had its two several readings and tomorrow assigned.

On motion by Mr. Carleton of Portland, it was voted to take from the table the tenth unassigned matter, bill an act relating to salary of Superintendent of State School for Boys, S. P. 370, L. D. 790, tabled by that gentleman, March 4, pending third reading; and on further motion by the same gentleman the bill had its third reading and was passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Farris of Augusta, it was voted to take from the table House Paper 183, L. D. 133 relating to taking smelts from the tributaries of Three Mile Pond, tabled by that gentleman earlier in the session; and the same gentleman offered House Amendment A and moved its adoption, as follows:

House Amendment A to House Paper 183, L. D. 133 entitled an act relating to the taking of smelts in the tributaries of Three Mile Pond.

Legislative Document 133 is hereby amended by striking out all of said bill and substituting in place thereof the following:

"Section 21 of Chaper 38 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended by adding after the word 'thirtyfour' in the twenty-eighth line on Page 662 of the Revised Statutes, the following words: 'except that it shall be lawful to fish therein for smelts in accordance with the general law of the State,' "

Thereupon Amendment A was adopted and the bill had its third reading, and was passed to be engrossed as amended by House Amendment A.
