#### SENATE

Wednesday, January 14, 1931. Senate called to order by President.

Prayer by the Rev. Fr. Jos. O. Casavant of Augusta.

#### Committee Report

Communication from the Committee on Budget.

Transmitting their Report.
The report was read and accepted and ordered placed on file.

The following bills and resolve were received and, upon recom-mendation of the committee on reference of bills were referred to the following committees:

#### Appropriations and Financial **Affairs**

Mr. Spear of Cumberland: An Act to appropriate moneys for the necessary expenses of State Gov-ernment. (S. P. 36)

Mr. SPEAR of Cumberland: Mr. President and members of the Senate, I think that an explanation of the introduction of the Appro-priation Act at this time might be

in order.

In order to assist in the reduction in the number and duplication of Bills and Resolves there is presented at this time an Appropriation Act covering the so-called Housekeeping expenses of State Government, which includes the requests of the several State De-partments and Institutions. This act is requested to be referred to Appropriations the committee on Ap and Financial Affairs. and Financial Affairs. There are several reasons for this procedure: First, the early introduction of these requests to the legislature; Second, the elimination of the introduction of separate resolves for each Department and Institution, thereby reducing the number of documents to be handled; Third, by this method it is hoped to report out from committee a final appropriation act in time for proper legislative study and consideration rather than in the last hours of the session.

This is a new departure, which is worthy of your consideration. Hearings will be held on this act, including each separate department, institution and special act or

resolve, and earlier opportunity will be provided for everyone interested to be heard. The amounts carried in this act correspond to the recommendations of the Budget Committee, which is on your desks, and it therefore does not need to be printed at this time as a document. It is hoped by this method, not only in the better presentation but by the structure of the act it-self, to save one-half of the usual expense of printing. I trust that this may receive a passage.

No act or resolve involving an appropriation of money shall be engrossed without having endorsed thereon, in addition to the usual endorsements of the officers of the Senate and House, the following, viz;

On motion by Mr. Littlefield of York. it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that the Secretary of State be directed to furnish for the use of the several legislative committees the same kind and class of binders as heretofore used.

#### Orders of the Day

On motion by Mr. Page Somerset, the Senate voted to re-consider its former action of Jan-uary 13th whereby it referred to the Committee on Public Utilities, Bill, an act to amend the charter of the Skowhegan Water District (S. P. 1); and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was referred to the Committee on Interior Waters.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, the Senate voted to take from the table an order relative to certain supplies for the use of the Senate, tabled by that Senator on January 7th, pending passage; and on further motion by the same Senator the order received a passage.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, the Senate voted to take from the table a joint order from the House with reference to a committee on legislative expenses tabled by that Senator on January 8th pending indefinite postponement in concurrence; and on further motion by the same Senator

the order was indefinitely postponed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Littlefield of York, the Senate voted to take from the table a Senate order with reference to acts and resolves of the Eighty-fourth Legislature, tabled by that Senator on January 8th

pending passage.
Mr. LITTLEFIELD of York: Mr. President, since that order was tabled the Revised Statutes have been furnished to each member of the Legislature. I do not know what Senator Farnsworth may have in mind in regard to this order and I therefore do not feel like

asking to have that indefinitely postponed while he is absent.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator from York, Senator Littlefield, as a matter of courtesy to the absent Senator (Senator from Aroostook, Senator Farnsworth) moves that the order be retabled. Is this the

pleasure of the Senate.

The motion to retable prevailed.

Mr. WEEKS of Somerset: Mr. President, I would like to inquire whether there is any Senate rule against smoking in the Senate Chamber.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that he understands that there is, and the Chair would be very glad to entertain a motion from the Senator from Androscog-

gin, Senator Carter.
Mr. MURCHIE of Washington:
Mr. President, I do not wish to interrupt the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Carter, but I would be glad to be advised what rule of the Senate prohibits smoking.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair offhand would like to consult the

rules.

Mrs. CARTER of Androscoggin:

Mr. President, do I understand that there is a rule against smoking?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair so

understands.

Mrs. CARTER: And that it is permissible if the rules are asked to be suspended by a member.
The PRESIDENT: The Senator is correct.

Mrs. CARTER: Mav I make a

motion at this time?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would be glad to entertain a motion.

Mrs. CARTER: Mr. President, I move that the rules be suspended and the members be allowed to

smoke.

Mr. MURCHIE: Mr. President, it is the furtherest from my purpose to interfere with any motion of the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Carter, but I believe that I must do so at this time as it is my understanding that we have no such rule in the Senate and never have had.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair is inclined to believe that there is such a rule.

Mr. MURCHIE: Has the Chair available a copy of the Senate rules?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair understands that we have not yet been furnished with a copy of Reed's Rules and the Chair will entertain the motion of the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Carter, that the rules be suspended and the members be allowed to smoke.

The motion prevailed.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that any member of the Senate may now smoke.
