Ordered, the House concurring, that a joint committee be appointed, three on the part of the Senate to be appointed by the President thereof, and seven on the part of the House, to be appointed by the Speaker thereof, with power to investigate the methods now employed in the State Assessors Department and in apportioning equalizing the state taxes, and to study and report on the statutes and laws of the State appertaining to the above.

#### **Reports of Committees**

Mr. Slocum, from the Special Joint Committee on telephone service for the legislature, to which was referred the order relating to telephone service, reported the fol-lowing order, and that it ought to pass.

Ordered, the House concurring, that free telephone service be provided for each member of the Senate and House to the number of fifty (50) calls, of reasonable duration, from Augusta to points within the limits of the State of Maine, and that each member of the Senate and House be provided with a card to be certified to by the Secretary of State or his deputy; the cost of this service to be paid to the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company at regular tariff rates.

Which report was accepted, and the order read and passed.

Mr. Weeks from the Committee on Judiciary, on Resolve proposing an amendment to the constitution relating to sessions of the legislature. (S. P. 12) reported that legis-lation is inexpedient.
