Wednesday, February 25, 1931 Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. J. N. Besson of Hallowell.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

Orders of the Day

On motion by Mr. Slocum of Cumberland, the Senate voted to take from the table, An act relating to sealers of weights and measures (S. P. 510), tabled by that senator on February 24th pending reference; and on further motion by the same senator the bill was referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Page of Somerset, the Senate voted to take from the table, Resolve providing for payment of certain amounts due exhibitors at Central Maine Fair Ass'n., in 1929 (L. D. 513), tabled by that senator on February 18th pending second reading; and on further motion by the same senator the resolve received its second reading and was passed to be engrossed. Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Southard of Kennebec, the Senate voted to take from the table, House Report. "Ought to Pass" from the Committee on Taxation, on H. P. 711, L. D. 233, An act relating to taxation of shares of stock of Trust and Banking Companies, tabled on February 20th by that senator pending acceptance of report; and on further motion by the same senator the report was accepted.

Thereupon, that senator offered Senate Amendment "A" to L. D.

233:

"Senate Amendment A. Legislative Document No. 233 is hereby amended by striking out 'or by corporations' in the third line and inserting after 'located' in the fifth line 'and if owned by a corporation shall be returned by the treasurer of state as aforesaid to the town in which the last individual owner in this state resided on April first in accordance with the certificate furnished by said trust or banking institution' and striking from the eighth and ninth lines the following 'the tax so assessed upon the shares of stock of such trust company or banking institution owned by corporations' and inserting in place thereof 'those owned by a corporation' so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

read as follows:

"Section 78. The tax so assessed upon the shares of such trust company or banking institution owned by non-residents shall be returned by the treasurer of state, on or before the first day of August, to the municipality in which such trust company or banking institution is located and if owned by a corporation shall be returned by the treasurer of state as aforesaid to the town in which the last individual owner in this state resided on April first in accordance with the certificate furnished by said trust company or banking institution; and the tax so assessed upon the shares of resident stockholders of such trust company or banking institution, except those owned by a corporation, shall be returned by the treasurer of state on or before the first day of August, to the municipality in which such stockholders reside."

Mr. SOUTHARD of Kennebec: Mr. President, I yield to the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Carter.

Thereupon, on motion by Mrs. Carter of Androscoggin, the bill and the amendment were laid upon the the table pending adoption of the amendment and five hundred copies ordered printed.

On motion by Mr. Towle of Kennebec, the Senate voted to take from the table, An act to exempt U. S. government mail carriers from the gasoline tax (S. P. 516), tabled by that Senator on February 24th pending reference; and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was referred to the Committee on Ways and Bridges.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Littlefield of York, the Senate voted to take from the table, An act relative to court jurisdiction of violations; transmission of fines (L. D. 716), tabled by that Senator on February 24th pending second reading; and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was recommitted to the Committee on Judiciary.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, the Senate voted to take from the table. An act increasing the salary of the Governor, and abolishing the Governor's personal contingent fund (L. D. 687), tabled by that Senator on February 20th pending reference; and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Fees in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Kitchen of Aroostook, the Senate voted to take from the table, Joint Order, relative to Old Age Compensation, tabled by that Senator on February 18th pending adoption of Senate Amendment "A."

Mr. KITCHEN of Aroostook: Mr. President, I yield to the Senator from Androscoggin, Senator Carter.

Thereupon, on motion by Mrs. Carter of Androscoggin, that Senator was given unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment; and on further motion by the same Sen-

ator the joint order was referred to the Committee on Pensions in concurrence.

On motion by Mrs. Carter of Androscoggin, the Senate voted to take from the table, Resolve creating an Old Age Pension Recess Committee, (L. D. 357), tabled by that Senator on February 10th pending reference in concurrence; and on further motion by the same Senator the resolve was referred to the Committee on Pensions in concurrence.

Mr. BISSETT of Cumberland: As a point of information, Mr. President, I would like to inquire if these two last matters that came from the House were referred by that body to the Committee on Pensions?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair will state that the first matter, the joint order relative to old age compensation, is an order and was referred in the House to the Committee on Pensions. The second matter, L. D. 357, is a resolve and that was also referred in the House to the Committee on Pensions.

On motion by Mr. Leland of Piscataquis,

Adjourned until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.
