Ordered, the Senate concurring. that a commission of 15 representative citizens of Maine be appointed by the governor to make a survey

of public school finances in the state of Maine. The scope of the state of Maine. The scope of the survey shall include all expenditures of funds within the jurisdiction of the department of education and shall particularly relate to a study of more equitable sources of revenue for the state school fund, a study of equalization of valuations and the distribution of all funds on an equalized and of all funds on an equalized and mathematical basis.

Said commission shall have authority to employ such expert counsel as its judgment may deter-

mine.

The department of education is directed to cooperate with the commission by furnishing it with all the data and information at its

disposal.

The commission shall commence working as early after the present session of the legislature as possible and shall report to the next session of the legislature not later than the 2nd week in January.

Said commission shall have authority to embody in proposed legislative bills such legislation as it may consider advisable to bring the findings before the legislature

for action.

All necessary expenses of the commission shall be paid from the state school fund upon vouchers first approved by the commission and then certified by the commissioner of education and finally approved by the governor and council. Any donation from any individual organization or foundation may be credited to the department of education for the purposes indicated.

Mr. VALLELY of Sanford: Mr. Speaker, I move you that the report be indefinitely postponed, and I yield to the gentleman from Lebanon, Mr. Lord.

Mr. LORD: Mr. Speaker, this matter was introduced by the people of Ogunquit, representing that Corporation, to straighten out and give some definite understanding in regard to some misunderstanding created by certain articles in the charter a number of years ago. It has always been a matter of contention. A committee representing both sides of the town met and came to a definite understanding and laid it before the town meeting, and the town meeting voted in fa-vor, by a large majority, of allow-ing this thing to come before the Legislature. It was presented here, and by mutual agreement both sides agreed to let the matter be taken before the committee, and that committee, unanimously voted in favor of this matter, ought to pass, and I certainly hope this matter will receive your favorable consideration and that the ought to pass report be accepted.

Mr. WENTWORTH of Kennebunk: Mr. Speaker, I want to assure the members of the House that the motion made by my brother, Mr. Vallely was made by request. In every town, as well as in every Legislature, there is one man who never knows when he is licked and that is what is behind this motion.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on motion of the gentleman from Sanford, Mr. Vallely, that this bill be indefinitely postponed. All those in favor of the motion will say ave: contrary minded, no.
