Brann, Gover-nor-elect, and that he was pleased to reply that he accepted the office and would attend on the Legislature at such time as may be designated for the purpose of taking and subscribing the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him for the discharge of his official duties.

Ordered, that a message be sent to the House of Representatives proposing a convention of both branches of the Legislature to be held forthwith in the Hall of the House for the purpose of administering to the Honorables George C. Lord, Raymond S. Oakes, Frank W. Carleton, Clyde H. Smith, Forrest H. Bond, Arthur A. Crafts and Ernest A. Woodman, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their efficients. charge of their offici. duties, and for the further purpose of admin-istering to the Honorable Louis J. Brann, Governor-elect, the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify him to enter upon the discharge of his official duties.

Subsequently a message was received from the House, by Mr. Pease, its clerk, concurring in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of administering the oaths to the Executive Councillors and to the Governor-elect,

The Senate retired to the Hall of the House of Representatives, where a joint convention was formed.

Ordered, that the President of the Senate be authorized to appoint a Folder for the Senate.

The Chair appointed Bruce C. Oglivie.

On motion by Mr. Holman of Franklin, it was

Ordered, that the use of the Senate Chamber be granted to the Maine State Bar Association for the afternoon of Wednesday, January 11, 1933.

On motion by Mr. Viles of Kennebec, it was

Ordered, that 2500 copies of the Governor's message be printed.
