SENATE

Thursday, January 26, 1933.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. Kimber Moulton of Augusta.

Journal of yesterday read and approved.

Papers from the House disposed of in concurrence.

From the House:

Bill "An Act relating to Hatcase Pond, Mountain Pond, Burnt Pond, and tributaries, in the counties of Hancock and Penobscot." (S. P. 57).

(In the Senate on January 19th was referred to the Committee on Inland Fisheries and game.)

Comes from the House indefinitely postponed in non-concurrence.

In the Senate, on motion by Mr. Blaisdell of Hancock laid upon the table pending consideration.

The following bills, resolves, etc. were received and on recommendation by the committee on reference of bills were referred to the following committees:

Appropriations and Financial Affairs

Mr. Bissett of Cumberland: Resolve appropriating money for the maintenance of department headquarters of the Department of Maine, United Spanish War Veterans. (S. P. 79).

Claims

Mr. McLoon of Knox: Resolve in favor of Lawrence Hahn. (S. P. 80).

Sent down for concurrence.

Inland Fisheries and Game

Mr. Hathaway of Piscataquis: Resolve opening Jaquith Pond in Brownville to ice fishing. (S. P. 81).

Mr. Schnurle of Cumberland: An Act relative to the use of pole traps, so-called. (S. P. 82).

Sent down for concurrence.

Judiciary

Mr. Holmes of Androscoggin: An Act to define and limit the jurisdiction of courts sitting in equity and for other purposes." (S. P. 83).

The same Senator: An Act to amend Section 39 of Chapter 96 of the Revised Statutes relating to hearings in vacation. (S. P. 93).

Mr. Angell of York: An Act relating to political caucuses. (S. P. 84).

Mr. Holman of Franklin: Resolve providing for a state pension for Katherine L. Prescott of Wilton. (S. P. 88).

Public Utilities

Mr. Weatherbee of Penobscot: An Act relating to abandonment of property or discontinuance of service by public utilities. (S. P. 91).

Mr. Towle of Kennebec: An Act relating to motor vehicles carrying passengers for hire over regular routes. (S. P. 92).

State Lands and Forest Preservations

Mr. Viles of Kennebec: An act relating to fire wardens. (S. P. 89).

Mr. Viles of Kennebec: An Act relating to the pay of those drafted to fight fires. (S. P. 90).

Sent down for concurrence.

At this point the Hon. H. C. Buzzell was escorted to a seat at the right of the President amid the applause of the Senate, the members rising.

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would like to recall once again to the attention of the Senate the closing orders and to advise the Senate that arrangements have been

made this morning so that the Revisor of Statutes will have all the help he needs from now until next Tuesday in order that every bill or resolve that he is requested to draw up may be ready for introduction in the House or Senate, as the case may be, next Tuesday afternoon. The Chair does not wish to keep harping upon the prompt introduction of legislation, but the sooner it is presented the sooner will we have our hearings, our final action and our final adjournment. The Chair hopes that everyone will take advantage of the opportunity and have everything ready for next Tuesday.

Mr. HATHAWAY of Piscataquis: Mr. President, do I understand that if these are deposited in the hopper Tuesday that that is sufficient?

The PRESIDENT: That is correct.

Orders

On motion by Mrs. Gay of Lincoln, it was

Ordered, the House concurring, that when the Senate and House adjourn, they adjourn to meet Tuesday, January 31, at four-thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the foregoing order came back from the House read and passed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Pillsbury of Kennebec,

Ordered, that a message be sent to the House of Representatives

proposing a Convention of both branches of the Legislature to be held forthwith in the hall of the House for the purpose of inviting the Governor to attend to transmit the budget and to make such communications in connection therewith as pleases him.

Which was read and passed

The Secretary delivered the message and subsequently reported that he had performed the duty assigned to him.

Subsequently a message was received from the House through Mr. Pease, its Clerk, concurring in the proposition for a joint convention for the purpose of inviting the Governor to attend to transmit the budget and make such communication in connection therewith as pleases him.

Thereupon the Senate retired to the Hall of the House of Representatives where a joint convention was formed.
