**STATE OF MAINE
OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR**

Augusta, February 28, 1933.

To the Senate and House of Representatives:

I have the honor and duty to present a certified copy of a Resolution of Congress entitled "Joint Resolution Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the United States," passed during the second session of the 72d Congress of the United States and involving the repeal or retention of the 18th Article of the Amendment to the Constitution of the United States.

I respectfully recommend that legislation providing for a convention in this State for the selection of candidates to said convention, to provide for the method of holding said election, the qualifications of the electors, the holding of the convention and the return and certification of the result be forthwith enacted.

The election of delegates should be fair, representative and expressive of the sentiment of the voters of Maine.

Seasonable and forthwith action by the Legislature will obviate the calling of a special session of the Legislature and the additional expense thereby involved.

Orders of the Day

Mr. HOLMES of Androscoggin: Mr. President, I want to move that the Senate reconsider its vote whereby it referred to the Committee on Federal Relations, Senate Paper 488. An Act to provide for a Constitutional Convention to pass on the proposed twenty-first amendment to the Constitution of the United States and I want to explain why I make this motion to reconsider. If the motion carries I will make another motion.

I borrowed the bill from the Clerk and read it and I cannot see anything in it that can be construed a "federal relation." It seems to me that the first matter—the papers from the Department of State—which the Senate referred to the Committee on Federal Relations were properly referred; but this is a matter the like of which has never been known in the history of the State. I am quite certain that the calling of a convention to accept or reject a proposed amendment to the Constitution of the United States is quite new and there is no precedent.

In reading that bill I came to the conclusion that any committee would recommend changes in the draft, probably, and perhaps the legislature would want to make oth-

er changes and as the matter is in my opinion so important, I think it is worthy of being referred to two joint committees, and out of consideration for the Committee on Federal Relations—I mean as a matter of courtesy to them—I think they should sit and I think either the Judiciary Committee or Committee on Legal Affairs should sit with them.

There is a precedent for that, as the Chair well knows. A few years ago the legislature considered bills in regard to the export of surplus hydro-electricity, and I can remember the legislature referring such bills to three joint committees, thirty members in all, and I think this matter is even more important than that subject which was referred to a joint committee of three standing committees.

Therefore, Mr. President, I move that the Senate reconsider its action whereby it voted to refer this bill to the Committee on Federal Relations.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Weeks of Somerset, the bill was laid upon the table pending motion to reconsider reference to the Committee on Federal Relations.

On motion by Mr. Weatherbee of Penobscot, the Senate voted to take from the table, An Act relative to Nuisances, (S. P. 159) (L. D. 209) tabled by that Senator on February 24th, pending first reading.

Mr. WEATHERBEE of Penobscot: Mr. President, I now move that this bill have its first reading.

Mr. PAGE of Somerset: Mr. President, I move that this bill lie upon the table. I will take it up a little later this morning, if possible.

The motion to table pending first reading prevailed.

On motion by Mr. Weatherbee of Penobscot, the Senate voted to take from the table, House Report from the Committee on Claims, "Ought Not to Pass" on Resolve in favor of Leon W. Alley of Prospect Harbor, (H. P. 365) tabled by that Senator on February 24th pending acceptance of the report.

Mr. WEATHERBEE of Penobscot: Mr. President, I move that the report of the committee be accepted in non-concurrence with the action of the House, and in explanation, I wish the Senate to understand that the Committee on

Claims reported "ought not to pass" on a large number of claims asking for reimbursement for damages to automobiles caused by their collision with deer on the highway. We have felt that all these claims should be rejected until the State has adopted a policy of law recognizing such as legal and just claims which should be paid by the State of Maine. This particular claim, by the action of the House, is referred back to the Committee on Claims. There is nothing that the Committee on Claims could do with this bill other than again report it "ought not to pass" because this claim has no more merit than any of the other claims. They all should be given similar treatment, all passed or all rejected. The Committee on Claims believes they should all be rejected, and all have been so far, save this one. I hope the Senate will accept the report of the Committee, "ought not to pass" on this one.

The motion prevailed and the report of the committee, "ought not to pass" was accepted in non-concurrence.

Sent down for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Page of Som-

erset, the Senate voted to take from the table, An Act relative to nuisances (S. P. 159) (L. D. 209), tabled by that Senator earlier in today's session pending first reading; and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was given its first reading and tomorrow assigned for second reading.

On motion by Mr. Weymouth of Penobscot, the Senate voted to take from the table, Senate Report from the Committee on Inland Fisheries and Game, "Ought to Pass" on "An Act relating to fur farms" (S. P. 176, L. D. 668), tabled by that Senator on February 22nd pending acceptance of the report; and on further motion by the same Senator the report of the committee "Ought to Pass" was accepted, the bill was given its first reading, and tomorrow assigned for second reading.
