Orders

Mr. Cook of Pittsfield presented the following order and moved its passage:

Ordered, the Senate concurring, that the Commissioner of Educa-tion be instructed to develop, in cooperation with the representa-tives of the state-aided academies in the state, a plan whereby total aids granted academies shall be fully reflected in reduced tuition rates granted by such academies to public school authorities for Maine pupils. Such a plan shall provide for a gradual decrease of tuition rates until the total aids now grant-ed annually, or which shall hereafter be granted, shall be fully reflected in reduced tuition rates after July 1, 1945. The Commis-sioner of Education shall report such plan to a subsequent session of the Legislature. (H. P. 180)

Mr. COOK: Mr. Speaker, this order carries out a part of the recom-mendations of the Maine Public School Finance Commission, and I move that the order be tabled pending its passage and that 1,000

copies be printed.

Orders of the Day

On motion by Mr. Hammond of Strong the rules were suspended for the purpose of presenting out of order the following Memorial:

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress Assembled:

We, your memoralists, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Maine in Legislature as-sembled, respectfully petition your honorable bodies as follows:

WHEREAS, the newsprint and pulp wood industry constitutes one of the basic industrial activities of

the State of Maine, and

WHEREAS, many other industries and occupations are closely allied with and dependent upon the production of newsprint and pulp wood, depending for their existence upon the successful continuance of this industry, and WHEREAS, the number of people

directly and indirectly employed in the production of newsprint and pulp wood constitute the largest single group of workers in any one industry in the State of Maine, and

WHEREAS, the newsprint and alp wood industry is seriously pulp threatened and menaced by the importation of foreign newsprint and pulp wood in direct competition with the industry of this state.

NOW THEREFORE, be it resolved that we, your memoralists, the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of Maine in Legislature assembled, realizing the importance and value of the newsprint and pulp wood industry to this state, do hereby respectfully petition, urge and recommend the prompt enactment of such legislation as may be necessary and proper to limit and restrict the importation of foreign newsprint and pulp wood,

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that this memorial be immediately transmitted by the Secretary of State to the proper officers and committees of the United States Senate and House of Representatives, and a copy hereof transmitted to each of the Representatives and Senators representing the State of Maine in the United States Con-
