#### Orders of the Day

On motion by Mr. Mace of Augusta, the House voted to reconsider its action of yesterday whereby it adopted a Memorial to the Congress of the United States for the better protection of the news-print and pulpwood industry, and the same gentleman offered House Amendment A, and moved adoption, as follows:

House Amendment A to Memorial to the Congress of the United States relating to the protection of the newsprint and pulpwood industry

Amend said Memorial by insert-"newsprint" ing after the word "newsprint", wherever it appears therein, the

word "pulp"

Mr. MACE: Mr. Speaker, just a word of explanation to the members of this House in regard to that Amendment. As the Memorial stated yesterday, it is one of the most imdocuments ever sent to Washington by the Legislature of Maine. It probably affects the hap-piness and prosperity of more people in Maine than any other Memorial ever sent to Congress. have no fear of importation of pulpwood in cuts of four feet from for-eign countries, but when that is ground into pulp, enhancing the value three times, then the transportation would cease to be an object and it would do untold injury

to the pulp mills of Maine. That is why the Amendment is offered. Thereupon the House adopted House Amendment A, and the Memorial as amended was adopted and sent up for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Cook of Pittsfield, it was voted to take from the table the second unassigned matter, Joint Order relating to tuition

in State-aided schools, H. P. 180, L. D. 39; and on further motion by the same gentleman, the order was referred to the committee on Education and sent up for concurrence
