Mr. CLARKE of Cooper: Mr. Speaker, I rise to a question of personal privilege.

The SPEAKER: You may state your question

Mr. CLARKE: It is simply to correct some remarks that were carried by the different papers under the Associated Press headlines un-der date of January 17th. The re-marks I refer to are these: "It seems to me that it is not in keeping with the proprieties for any member of the Legislature to anticipate the action of any commit-tee and then broadcast it." That is a general criticism of all the members of this Legislature and was not so intended. will the words I actually said: will read "It seems to me that it is against the proprieties and against the ethics of their position for any member of any committee to anticipate in advance and broadcast in public speeches the action of their committees on any bill especially when that bill has not been given a hear-ing by their committee." Those are the words and I wish a proper correction made. It was not my intention to criticize the Legislature

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in general. We all anticipate in advance more or less what the action of a committee may be. It was intended to criticize a certain member only under conditions ex-isting at the time. I thank you.

Mr. HILL of South Portland: Mr. Speaker, in view of the request of His Excellency, the Governor, that we should act today on the pro-posed legislation for the relief of the poor, I move that the House now recess until 4:30 this afternoon.

(House at Ease)

Paper from the Senate, out of or-der, under suspension of the rules.

Report of the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs on Communication from Governor Louis J. Brann suggesting and recommending the immediate passage of emergency relief legislation, reporting a bill (S. P. No. 177) under title of "An act permitting the State to render aid to persons in organized and unorganized ter-ritory" and that it "Ought to pass"

Comes from the Senate the re-port read and accepted and the bill given its several readings under suspension of the rules and passed to be engrossed.

Report read and accepted in con-

currence, and the bill given its first two readings.

Mr. TUPPER of Calais: Mr. Speaker, I would like to say that the committee has considered this matter carefully. They think that an emer-gency does exist and they voted unanimously to pass it. It seems that the E. R. A. have changed their methods of relief and are not start-ing any new projects at this time. Instead of that they are distributing direct relief to employables, that is, people able to work but who have no employment. Now our Health and Welfare Department, under Mr. Leadbetter, has authority at present to take care of State paupers only, and this leaves the class of people called unemployables with no relief available. That class consists of cripples, widows, children, old people and people who cannot work, and there is no arrangement under our relief system to take care of Each town will be audited them. or a statement given that can be looked over by Mr. Leadbetter and compared with the statements of Mr. McDonough of the E. R. A.

Perhaps some other member of the committee would like to say something besides myself.

Mr. THOMPSON of Belfast: Mr. Speaker, this would apply only to those towns which are financially unable to take care of their own

poor. I do not think the gentleman from Calais (Mr. Tupper) brought that point out.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Tupper of Calais, the rules were suspended, the bill given its third reading and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

(House at ease)

The SPEAKER: Is it the pleasure of the House to take up out of order a bill on its passage to be enacted?

Passed to Be Enacted

(Emergency Measure)

(S. P. 177). An act permitting the State to render aid to persons in organized and unorganized territory.

The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it is necessary that it have the affirmative vote of two-thirds the entire membership of the House. All those in favor of the passage of this bill to be en-acted will rise and stand in their places until counted, and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division was had, One hundred and fifty voting in the affirmative, and none in the negative, the bill was passed to be enacted.
