HOUSE

Thursday, January 24, 1935.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Gesner of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

At this point a communication received from the Senate, was through its Secretary, proposing a Joint Convention of the two branches of the Legislature to be held forthwith in the hall of the House of Representatives for the purpose of extending an invitation to flis Excellency, the Governor, to attend the Convention and make such communication thereto as he sees fit.

The SPEAKER: The House hears the message.

From the Senate: Ordered, the House concurring, that when the Senate and House adjourn, thev adjourn to meet Tuesday, January 29th, at 4.30 o'clock in the afternoon.

ORDERS OF THE DAY

On motion by Mr. Tupper of Calais, it was voted to take from the table the first unassigned matter. House Order relative to efficiency of Portland Liquor Store, tabled by that gentleman January 9th, the pending motion being that of the gentleman from Kittery, Mr. Burnham, to indefinitely postpone.

At this point the Senate came in and a Joint Convention was formed.

IN CONVENTION

The President of the Senate in the Chair.

On motion of Senator Burkett of Cumberland, it was

Ordered, that a committee be appointed to wait upon His Excellency, Governor Louis J. Brann, and inform him that the two branches of the Legislature are in Convention assembled ready to receive such communication as he may he pleased to make

Chairman thereupon ap-The pointed as members of committee on the part of the Senate: Senators Burkett of Cumberland, Pillsbury of Kennebec and Worcester of Washington, and on the part of the House: Representatives Vaughan of South Berwick, McKay of Drew, Cambridge of Westfield, Miss Stick-Brownfield, Hastings of nev of Bethel, Eveleth of Portland and Drisko of Jonesboro.

Subsequently, Senator Burkett for the committee reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and that the Governor was pleased to say that he would attend forthwith.

The report was accepted and the committee discharged.

Thereupon Louis J. Brann, Governor, attended by his Council, entered the hall, the audience rising and applauding, and the Governor adressed the Convention as follows:

Members of the Eighty-To the seventh Legislature:

In accordance with the Code Act, I respectfully submit herewith the biennial State Budget for the fiscal years:

July 1, 1935—June 30, 1936 July 1, 1936—June 30, 1937

By direction of the Code, it contains:

Part I: The financial policy of

the ensuing biennium. A general budget summary show-ing the relation between total proposed expenditures. and the total revenues, with entropy to revenues, with the means of financing th budget for each fiscal year, showing also con-trasting figures for the last comanticipated the pleted fiscal year, and the fiscal year in progress.

Part ÎI: Detailed budget estimate of expenditures and revenues. Bonded indebtedness of State

Government. The debt redemption requirements.

The debt authorized and unissued. Condition of sinking funds.

Part III. Complete draft of budget bills.

Repeal and suspending acts to make effective proposed budget savings and economies.

The estimates of expenditures of departments and institutions call for the exercise of strict economy.

Consideration has been given to the rise in commodity prices.

large increase rec-The onlv ommeded is the appropriation for welfare where a sum comparable to the estimated expenditures of the present fiscal year is advocated.

In this instance, as in all others, 1 recognize and appreciate the distinction between the function of the Executive and the responsibilities and prerogatives of the legislator.

It is neither my intention nor desire to assume in the slightest degree your constituted right of deliberation and decision.

I do wish, however, to restate my illingness to cooperate at all willingness times with the Legislature in working out the problems of the State.

Among the subjects this Legisla-ture will consider are

- 1.
- Tax Revision. Old Age Relief. 2.
- 3. Equalization of State school funds.
- 4. General relief to municipalities.
- 5 Spanish War claims.
- 6. Special appropriations.

If the tax laws of the State are revised an entirely new estimate of State income would necessarily follow.

The President of the United States has recommended that the Federal Government join with the several states in a program of Old Age Relief based upon a contribution of the Federal Government to the States

Hearings are now being held in Washington to work out the final details of the plan.

Until these provisions are known, we cannot even approach this problem.

A supplementary message will be presented to this Legislature recommending a definite course of action.

The report of the Commission on school finances is before the Legislature.

It proposes:-

1st. To restore towns to the 1930 minimum level, requiring one hundred and sixty-two thousand dollars additional appropriation based on their present local tax rates for education.

This first step affects one hundred and seventeen municipalities.

2nd. To make effective the establishment of a twenty-seven dollar minimum level and a reduction of tax levies in all municipalities to eleven mills for educational requirements.

The above two steps require an appropriation of seven hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars.

Two hundred and ninety-five municipalities are affected, with a reduction in school tax levies in the municipalities ranging from a frac-tion of a mill to 20½ mills. 3rd. The restoration of State aid

the 1930 level for all municito palities would require an additional one hundred and fifty-five thousand dollars.

The above three steps require an appropriation of eight hundred and eighty thousand dollars.

4th. The granting of one fourth of the ultimate aid as recommended by the Commission would require an additional three hundred and twenty-six thousand dollars.

The four steps would entail а total appropriation of substantially one million, two hundred thousand dollars.

The Legislature is to be highly commended for its prompt and humanitarian action yesterday in appropriating fifty thousand dollars to relieve suffering in certain Maine communities unable, through no fault of theirs, to fulfill their legal obligation to the needy and the distressed.

I recommend a continuance of

this humane policy. In respect to the payment of the Spanish-American War claims, I refer you to the recommendation in the inaugural address.

No estimate of the amount re-guired for special appropriation has been made by the Budget Committee

The total amount depends upon the action of the Legislature and can not be determined until later in the session.

The Highway estimates are based upon the department being financed from its own income and on a "pay as you go" basis. The Chief Executive recommend-

ed to the Legislature that the in-come from the State Liquor Com-mission be utilized to repay the State for money advanced, to build up a working capital, and that the balance be used for Old Age Relief

The estimated income of the State Liquor Commission has, however, been included in the esti-mate of the income of the State for the next two fiscal years.

The Budget Committee thought it wise to list the estimated income of the State Liquoi Commission as an income of the State, realizing that this entailed an amendment of the existing law.

After we know the amount re-quired for old age relief within the State, I shall, in a special message, recommend the final disposition of the income from the State Liquor Commission.

Recommendations, suggesting the suspension of mandatory provisions of law curtailing State expenditures and in force during the past two years are incorporated in the budget report.

This report represents a balanced budget based upon the existing laws, and the existing system of Government in the State, except from the State Liquor Commission which anticipates an amendment to an existing law. The Budget Committee felt that

it was beyond their province to anticipate changes by the Legislature in the present financial set up, even though changes were urged and recommended.

We must at all times, bear in mind our responsibility to the citizens of the State that either directly or indirectly support government.

The State must confine its expenditures in the next two fiscal years to the economical level of the past two years.

In plain words, we can follow no other course than that of not in-creasing the tax rate and compelling the costs of government to correspond with its income. I thank you. (Applause.)

At the conclusion of the address the Governor and Council withdrew, amid the applause of the Convention.

The purpose for which the Convention was assembled having been accomplished, the Convention was dissolved and the Senate retired to the Senate Chamber, amid the applause of the House.

IN THE HOUSE

The SPEAKER: The SPEAKER: The pending motion before the House is the motion of the gentleman from Kitefficiency of Portland Liquor Store, and the Chair recognizes that gentleman.

Mr. BURNHAM: Mr. Speaker, as I understand this order, it is an attempt to interfere with the execution of the law passed at a previous session of the Legislature. You members here know all that has passed. We have on the Liquor Commission gentlemen whom we all respect, and it seems to be that the matter of hiring a Clerk in the Portland Store is no matter for us here to attempt to dictate, either to the manager of that store, or to the Governor and Council, therefore, I renew my motion that this order be indefinitely postponed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Portland, Mr. Desmond.

Mr. DESMOND: Mr. Speaker, relative to this order that I presented, I would say that I have consulted with Controller Runnells relative to the set-up and the service, also with Chairman Woodman of the Commission. Everything possible is being done that can be done with the limited personnel they have to work with. I was shown about the warehouse and everything there is as nearly perfect as possible. One great fault is there inability to get supplies from distributors when ordered and without delay. Every bit of encouragement and assistance should be given these gentlemen and no obstacles thrown in their way. If the citizens of Maine will get behind their liquor stores and mail order department, which is soon to be set up, the treasury of the State of Maine will benefit in income by several hundred thousand dollars. It is a shame for the citizens of Maine, after this mail order set up is in operation, to order their liquors from Massachusetts; it is unpatriotic, I think, considering the financial condition of he State of Maine at this time. I think that all the revenue that can be derived from this source should go into the treasury of the State of Maine, not into the treasury of the State of New Hampshire, Massachusetts, or other states. I believe that this liquor set-up is ideal. I have every confidence in Mr. Runnells and in the Commission, headed by Mr. Woodman. I feel that my service has been fully covered and I am satisfied with those gentlemen handling it. I second the motion to have the order indefinitely postponed.

The SPEAKER: The pending question before the House is the indefinite postponement of the first unassigned matter on the calendar of today. Is it the pleasure of the House that it be indefinitely postponed?

A viva voce vote being taken, the order was indefinitely postponed.
