The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Mr. Demers of Sanford, presented the following order and moved its passage:

STATE OF MAINE

In House March 5, 1935.

Whereas, there is now pending in the Legislature of the State of Maine a bill providing for a representative town meeting in the town of Sanford; and Whereas, said bill provides for

Whereas, said bill provides for the division of said town by the selectmen into not less than five nor more than ten districts; and

Whereas, said bill further provides that each district shall elect a certain number of representatives known as town meeting members, to wit, one town meeting member for a designated number of registered voters therein or a fractional part thereof, the elective town meeting membership, however, to be in no case less than one hundred fifty members nor more than two hundred members, with the further provision for membership of certain town officials ex officie; and

Whereas said act further provides that the town shall have the capacity to act through and to be bound by its town meeting members who shall, when convened from time to time, constitute representative town meeting; and the representative town meetings shall exercise all powers vested in the municipal corporation. Action in conformity with all provisions of law now or hereafter applicable to the transaction of town affairs in

town meetings shall, when taken by any representative town meeting in accordance with the provisions of this act, have the same force and effect as if such action had been taken in a town meeting open to all of the voters of the town as organized and conducted before the establishment in the town of representative town meeting government; and

Whereas, said act provides that the town officers, other than town meeting members, shall be balloted upon by all of the voters of the town, but that each district shall elect the number of town meeting members to which it is entitled, based upon the number of registered voters therein as above set forth; and

Whereas, said bill further provides that each district shall vote at such voting place as the selectmen in the warrant shall designate; and

Whereas, said bill further provides that such voting place may or may not be within the territory of the district, and the only difference in the ballot of the respective districts being that the names of the town meeting members to be elected from any district appear on the ballot of that district only;

And it appearing to the House of Representatives that important questions of law have arisen in the determination of the constitutionality of said bill and that the occasion is a solemn one:

is a solemn one;
It is Ordered, that the Justices of the Supreme Judicial Court are hereby respectfully requested to give to the House of Representatives of the State of Maine, according to the provisions of the Constitution in this behalf, their opinion

of the following questions, viz:

Question No. 1. Has the Legislature authority under the Constitution to authorize the establishment of a town government wherein authority to vote upon any business transacted at a town meeting is given to a limited number of representatives elected by the voters of the town and to such ex officio members as the town may designate?

Question No. 2. Is it necessary under the Constitution of the State of Maine that the voters of the whole town have an opportunity to vote for each representative or town meeting member, or may the Legislature authorize a division of

the town into districts, each district being entitled to elect one representative or town meeting member for a designated number of registered voters therein or fractional part thereof, with authority in such town meeting members and such ex officio members as the town may designate, to bind the town at any town meeting in the same manner as if the meeting had been open to all of the voters of the town?

The SPEAKER: Under the Rules of the House this order will lie on the table until tomorrow before the

Mr. PHILBRICK of Cape Elizabeth: Mr. Speaker, I offer House Amendment A and move its adop-This is a committee amendment and is offered to correct the omission of one sentence in the printed bill. It is done in this way to avoid the expense of a reprint.

Mr. FINDLEN of Fort Fairfield: Mr. Speaker, I offer House Amendment A and move its adoption, as

follows:

House Amendment A to Legislative Document No. 655, bill an act to assure proper branding of potatoes. Strike out the last sentence of Sec. 1, and substitute "No potatoes shall be offered for

"No potatoes shall be offered for sale, had in possession for sale, prepared for sale, exposed for sale, sold, shipped, delivered for sale, or consigned, unless and until said potatoes shall have been graded or packed in conformity to the provisions of this act."

Mr. FINDLEN: Mr. Speaker, for the information of the members I might say that this is almost exactly the same as the sentence in the bill, except that the railroad companies felt that the burden of grading and branding might be placed upon the railroad companies by the word "transported" so we have changed the word "transported" to the word "shipped" and have added in several places, as you can see, the words "for sale." It is just a matter of wording to satisfy the transportation companies.

Thereupon, House Amendment A was adopted, and the bill as amended was tomorrow assigned for its third reading.
