HOUSE

Saturday, March 23, 1935. The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Pressey of Augusta.

(Mr. Carswell of Gorham sumed the Chair as Speaker tem, amid the applause of aspro the House)

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

From the Senate: Report of the committee on Legal Affairs reporting ought not to pass on resolve of Portland, S. P. 321, L. D. 354. Comes from the Senate read and

accepted.

In the House, on motion by Mr. Desmond of Portland, tabled pending acceptance of report in concurrence, and specially assigned for Wednesday, March 27th.

Amend said bill by striking out beginning in the fifth line thereof the following words:

"Public records may be made by photographic process when the in-strument is required by law to be recorded and". Report read and accepted, and
