(Constitutional Amendment)

H. P. 365, L. D. 109: Resolve pro-posing an amendment to the Constitution to provide for longer resi-

dence to qualify as a voter. The SPEAKER: This is a resolve proposing an amendment to the Constitution, and as such it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present. As many as are in favor of the final passage of this resolve will rise and remain standing until counted and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division beng had, One hundred and forty-one voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 141 being more than two-thirds of the members present, the resolve was finally passed.

Orders of the Day

Mr. McGLAUFLIN of Portland: Mr. Speaker, I wish to move recon-sideration of Item 6 on yesterday's calendar, being House Paper 447, Legislative Document 151, bill re-lating to possession of firearms or fishing tackle. I would like to say regarding this matter that my attention has been called by a gentle-man from Alna (Mr. Carleton) to the effect that if this bill goes through, a farmer would not be able to shoot a crow on his own land without being liable to a penalty. I also find it conflicts with another passage in the statute. Therefore ask for a reconsideration.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. McGlauflin, moves that the House reconsider its action of yesterday whereby House Paper 447, Legislative Document 151, bill an act relative to possession of firearms or fishing tackle, was passed to be engrossed. Is the House ready for the question? Those in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Portland, Mr. McGlauflin, that the House recon-sider the passage of this bill to be engrossed will say aye; those opposed no.
