### Orders of the Day

Mr. NORWOOD of Southwest Harbor: Mr. Speaker, I ask unani-mous consent to address the House. The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Southward Harbor Mr. Nor-

from Southwest Harbor, Mr. Nor-wood, asks unanimous consent to address the House. Is there objec-tion? The Chair hears none, and the gentleman may proceed.

Mr. NORWOOD: Mr. Speaker, and Members of the House: I have great respect for the dead-line set for presentation of bills. I was asked a few days ago to present a bill entering a deer claim, and I flatly refused, because I did not think it of enough importance to

bother this body of lawmakers with. In one of the towns that I represent school conditions are quite serious. The building is inadequate to accommodate the increase and those who are privileged to attend school and are required by law to attend; and for this town to re-ceive a grant from the Federal government of forty-five per cent of the actual cost of a new building is contingent on the town incorporating a school district.

This is not a matter that has come up within a few days; it is something which was being worked on by our superintendent in the early part of this session, and no doubt I would have presented this bill before February 11th had the superintendent lived. Unfortunately, we lost him, and everything stopped until a new superintendent was elected in his place. A bill has been handed to me, asking for incorporation of a school district in Southwest Harbor.

The passage of a bill like this does not involve any expenditure on the part of the State, and it does not bind the citizens of the town in any way until it is voted in a special town meeting. As I have stated, if I did not consider this an emergency I would not be bringing it up at this time.

Mr. ELLIS of Rangeley: Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent to address the House.

(Permission was granted) Mr. ELLIS: Mr. Speak

(Permission was gramed) Mr. ELLIS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I hope there will be no objection to the introduction of this bill. It does seem to be more or less of an emergency. But I do hope no member will ask the consent of the House to introduce any more bills. We have long passed the dead-line, and I think the House has been very patient up to the present time in allowing members to introduce bills; so I hope in the future no one will ask consent to introduce a bill.

I also at this time call your attention to the bills that are tabled. If we all get to work and get those bills off the table and get them along we will get out a week or so earlier than if we dilly-dally and keep them on the table as long as ve can.

Mr. NORWOOD: Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent of the House to present a bill.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Southwest Harbor, Mr. Norwood, asks unanimous consent to present a bill. Is there objection? The Chair hears no objection, and the gentleman now presents a bill. The Chair rules that it is received. The Clerk will read the title of the bill.

Bill an act to incorporate the Southwest Harbor School District.

On motion by Mr. Norwood, the bill was referred to the committee on Legal Affairs, 500 copies ordered printed, and sent up for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Varney of Berwick, it was voted to take from the table the sixth unassigned matter, House report ought not to pass of the committee on Inland Fisheries and Game on bill an act relating to trapping in certain sections of York County, H. P. 1160, L. D. 428, tabled by that gentleman on March 17th, pending acceptance of report. Mr. BATCHELDER of Parsons-field: Mr. Speaker, — The SPEAKER: For what pur-pose does the gentleman rise? The

Thereupon, House Amendment A as adopted and the bill as was adopted and the bill as amended by House Amendment A was passed to be engrossed in nonconcurrence and sent up for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Goss of Po-land, it was voted to take from the table H. P. 1213, report of the committee on Ways and Bridges on resolve in favor of the town of Alton, that the resolve be referred to the committee on Inland Fisheries and Game, which was tabled by that gentleman earlier in today's session pending acceptance of the report of the committee; and on further motion by the same gentleman the report of the committee was accepted and the resolve re-ferred to the committee on Inland Fisheries and Game and sent up for concurrence.

Mr. MURCHIE of Calais: Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent under suspension of the rules to make a one-minute suggestion.

The SPEAKER: The Chair hears no objection and consent is granted.

Mr. MURCHIE: Mr. Speaker, it appears this morning that a certain measure, being Item 3 under bills to be enacted, S. P. 305, L. D. 516, an act for the protection of Rhododendron, and so forth, was tabled, and I want to make a suggestion to the House, which I hope will have unanimous approval, that when the gentleman from Skowhegan, Mr.

Hinman, takes that measure from the table—and I gather it is cus-tomary for the man who tables a measure to remove it—I would sug-rest that he give project today rethat the public may hear and that it be insisted that he read the full title of the bill. (Laughter and applause.)

The SPEAKER: The House hears the suggestion of the gentleman from Calais, Mr. Murchie.

Mr. HINMAN of Skowhegan: Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent to address the House.

The SPEAKER: The Chair hears no objection and the gentleman may address the House.

Mr. HINMAN: Mr. Speaker, I am very glad that the gentleman from Calais, Mr. Murchie, realizes that, if the gentleman who tabled the matter is to give the title, he needs time to pronounce it properly. (Laughter)
