Friday, October 29, 1937.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Mr. Pressey of

Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

CHASE of Baring: Mr. Speaker, I ask unanimous consent, out of order and under suspension of the rules, to introduce a resolve relating to fishing in Grand Lake. in Washington County.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman om Baring, Mr. Chase, asks from unanimous consent to present a re-solve notwithstanding the provisions of the joint closing order. Is there objection?

Mr. THORNE of Madison: Speaker, I feel that I must object, and that the rule be enforced here as to the introduction of any more legislation at this time.

The SPEAKER: Unanimous consent is declined.

H. P. 1981, Resolve on the payroll of the House of Representatives (Presented by Mr. Flanders of Auburn)

This resolve was received out of order, under suspension of the rules, given its two several readings without reference to a committee, passed to be engrossed and sent up for concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Ellis of Rangeley, the House voted to reconsider its action taken in yesterday's session whereby L. D. 1091, bill an act relating to investments for savings banks was passed to be engrossed.

Thereupon, Mr. Ellis offered House

Amendment A and moved its adoption, as follows:

House Amendment A to bill an act relating to investments for savings banks, H. P. 1907, L. D. 1091.

Amend said bill by adding thereto

the following emergency clause: 'Emergency Clause. In view of the emergency set forth in the preamble, this act shall take effect when approved.

Thereupon, House Amendment A adopted, and bill the amended by House Amendment A was passed to be engrossed and sent up for concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Ellsworth, Mr. Higgins, asks unanimous consent to present a bill. Is there objection?

Mr. THORNE: Mr. Speaker, I object.

The SPEAKER: Unanimous consent is declined.

(S. P. 551) (L. D. 1085) An act relating to the general highway fund.

On motion by Mr. Ellis of Rangeley, the House voted to reconsider its action of vesterday whereby this bill was passed to be engrossed

Thereupon, Mr. Ellis offered House Amendment A and moved its

adoption, as follows: House Amendment A to S. P. 551, L. D. 1085, bill an act relating to the

general highway fund.

Amend said bill by striking out from the fourth line thereof the following:

"\$850,000 annually", and inserting in place thereof the following:

\$630,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1938, and \$850,000 for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1939.

Thereupon, House Amendment A was adopted, and the bill as amended by House Amendment A was passed to be engrossed.

Passed to be Enacted (Emergency Measure)

S. P. 544, L. D. 1084: An act to provide for the surrender by town

of Edmunds of its organization.
The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it requires for

its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House. As many as are in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and remain standing until counted and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division being had, One hundred and twenty-seven voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 127 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted.

(Emergency Measure)

S. P. 547, L. D. 1086: An act creating the Port of Northeast Har-

bor Authority.

The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House. As many as are in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and remain standing until counted and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division being had,

One hundred and twenty-eight voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 128 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted.

(Emergency Measure)

S. P. 549, L. D. 1082: An act relating to the sale of alcohol.

The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House. As many as are in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and remain standing until counted and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division being had, One hundred and twenty-four voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 124 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted.

(Emergency Measure)

H. P. 1910, L. D. 1102: An act to provide for the surrender by town

of Albany of its organization.
The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House. As many as are in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and remain standing until counted, and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division being had,

One hundred and seventeen voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 117 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted.

(Emergency Measure)

H. P. 1924, L. D. 1109: An act relating to the purity of the drinking water supplied to North Wind-

ham.

The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House. As many as are in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and remain standing until counted, and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division being had,

One hundred and twenty-five voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 125 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted.

(Emergency Measure)

H. P. 1932: An act to appropriate money for the expenses of State government and other purposes for the fiscal years ending June 30, 1938,

and June 30, 1939.

The SPEAKER: This being an emergency measure, it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House. As many as are in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and remain standing until counted and the monitors will make and return the count.

A division being had,

One hundred and twenty-six voting in the affirmative and none in the negative, 126 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted.

P. 556.

Comes from the Senate, in that body read and passed, with the following members appointed upon its part: Senators Marden of Kennebec, Graves of Hancock and Maliar of

Androscoggin.

In the House, the order was pas-

sed in concurrence, out of order and under suspension of the rules, and the Chair appointed to that committee, on the part of the House, Messers. Sleeper of Rockland, Parsons of Hartford, Mrs. Latno of Old Town, Paul of Portland, Maheu of Waterville, Everett of Norridgewock and Haskell of Lee.

Mr. Dow of Kennebunkport. moved that the rules be suspended to permit the introduction of an order out of order.

The motion prevailed.

Ordered, that the uniforms pro-cured for the House Employees become their property at the end of their terms of office.

At this point Mr. Sleeper, for the committee to wait upon the Gover-nor, reported that he would present to this body a message forthwith.

The Governor and Council then entered the Hall of the House of Representatives, amid cheers and prolonged applause, the audience rising.

The SPEAKER: His Excellency. the Governor. (Applause)

Governor LEWIS O. BARROWS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I appreciate the fact that this is perhaps not in accordance with time-approved precedent. However, I have such a deep feeling that I desire to come here in person for this very brief final statement, which is as follows:

To the Speaker of the House: I herewith transmit a list of acts and resolves passed by the Special Session of the Eighty-eighth Legis-

I have approved twelve acts and four resolves.

I cannot refrain from expressing my belief that you have earned the approbation of the press and the citizens of Maine. Your election to membership in this Legislature indicated the confidence of your constituents. No better evidence is needed that this confidence was not misplaced than your prompt and sensible action during this session. It is a good job well done, and you can return to your homes with the knowledge that the Governor and Council will continue to do their utmost to carry out your program.

Furthermore, I am glad to inform you that I have been advised

by telephone from Washington to-day that the Old-Age Pension Law which you have enacted is wholly acceptable to the Social Security Board. Very respectfully submitted. (Applause)

Mr. Mosher of Farmington, at 3.24 P. M., moved that the House do now adjourn without day.

The motion prevailed and the Speaker declared the House adjourned without day.
