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SENATE

Wednesday, March 31, 1937. Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. E. J. Webber of Hallowell.

Journal of yesterday, read and approved.

At this point the Senator from Somerset, Senator Cook, was escorted to the Chair, the President retiring.

Mr. WILLEY of Cumberland: Mr. President, I might say that my purpose in laying this bill on the table is that as it now reads it seems to give the municipal court, perhaps, sole jurisdiction. It might be considered to prevent an appeal being taken from a local trial justice or municipal court and I feel that adequate appeal clauses should be added to protect anyone accused.

Orders of the Day

Mr. KENNEDY of Hancock: Mr. President, out of order and under suspension of the rules, I ask unanimous consent to present a re-solve. If you desire, I will explain my reason.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator may give his reason at this time.

Mr. KENNEDY: Mr. President, during the early part of this session it became my sad duty to inform you of the death at his home in Lamoine of the Honorable J. Sherman Douglas. Mr. Douglas had long been a highly respected citizen of Lamoine, and as chairman of the board of selectmen had directed the affairs of the town for many years. Mr. Douglas has also served his state and the county of Hancock with distinction, in both branches of the legislature,—in the House during the Eighty-first and in the Senate during the Eightythird and Eighty-fourth legislatures. As many of you know, he was deeply interested in Maine publicity. Indeed, it has been said that he was the father of publicity in this state. The last illness of Mr. Douglas extended over a period of over three years and during that time he often expressed a desire to perpetuate his memory in his home town.

We have a section of state highway in Lamoine seven and one-half miles in length, beginning at Route 1 in the town of Ellsworth and running nearly to Lamoine Beach, or Point, but ending at the Douglas home. His expressed desire was to have this section of the highway named the Douglas Highway. There would be no objection by the town of Lamoine to having this highway so des'gnated, and I cannot see how there could be reasonable objection by the State of Maine. The route marking, Route 184, need not be disturbed. No change, therefore, need be made in road maps covering that section.

It is perhaps true that the late Mr. Douglas cannot now appreciate this proposed act, but the faithful companion who had been his helpmate for over 50 years could and would appreciate this honor to his memory.

The PRESIDENT: Before this resolve can be received, unanimous consent must be granted by the Senate. The Senator from Hancock, Senator Kennedy, asks unanimous consent of the Senate, out of order and under suspension of the rules, for the reception of "Resolve Designating a Certain Road as Douglas Highway."

Thereupon, out of order and under suspension of the rules, unanimous consent was granted for the reception of the resolve, and the resolve was given its two several readings and passed to be engrossed without reference to a committee. Sent down for concurrence.

From the House, out of order and under suspension of the rules:

"Ordered, the Senate concurring, that the House Committee on County Estimates be authorized to report recommendations for legislation regulating the financial affairs of the several counties, based on information secured at the hearings held by that committee, together with bills or resolves to carry into effect such recommendations. Any bill or resolve so reported shall be received and considered notwithstanding existing orders limiting the introduction of new measures."

In the Senate, read and passed in concurrence.

D. 683), tabled by that Senator earlier in today's session pending adoption of House Amendment "B" in concurrence; and on further motion by the same Senator, House Amendment "B" was adopted in concurrence and the bill as amended by House Amendments "A" and "B", was tomorrow assigned for second reading.
