Tuesday, January 17, 1939.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Dr. Wood of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

From the Senate: Ordered, the House concurring, that a commit-tee be appointed, two on the part of the Senate, and three on the part of the House, to study the advisability of a contributory retirement system for Maine.

The SPEAKER: The Chair has in its possession a communication from the Governor which does not appear on the calendar. Accompanying this communication is a letter which the Clerk will read:

> "Albion, Maine January 9, 1939.

Gov. Lewis O. Barrows, Augusta, Maine.

Dear Governor:

I am sending you the gavels made from wood on the site of the birthplace of Elijah P. Lovejoy for you to present to the Senate and House with my compliments. I trust that this belated tribute to Albion's illustrious son will be the means of inspiring some one to nobler deeds

for God and humanity.

I hope it will be my privilege to visit the Senate and House during the present session.

Mr. SHESONG of Portland: Mr. Speaker, the name of Elijah Parish Lovejoy stands high among the martyrs of the land. He died in defense of the freedom of the press. He was born in Albion, Maine, November 9, 1802, and graduated from Colby College in the class of 1826. Shortly after graduation he moved to St. Louis, Missouri, where he engaged in newspaper work and soon became an editor on the St. Louis Observer. Slavery was then at its worst, and Mr. Lovejoy saw many of the abuses which Lincoln also witnessed. As a result of those observations he became a strong Abolitionist and his pen was ever active against slavery. His office and printing press in St. Louis were destroyed by mob violence in 1836. He then moved to Alton, Illinois, where he continued his attacks against slavery, and it was there that three of his printing presses were wrecked by mob violence. It was while defending his fourth press from such violence that he was shot and killed on November 7, 1837, a martyr to the cause of the freedom of the press.

It is entirely fitting and proper that at this time, one hundred and thirteen years after his graduation from the college which nurtured him in young manhood—a college which is about to move to a new campus on Mayflower Hill in Waterville, Maine, in the midst of world events which he would not recognize today—that this symbol of his greatness, a gavel, fashioned from a cherry tree grown on the farm where he was reared, in Albion, Maine, should be received by this legislative body as a means of more closely identifying his name with the State of his birth.

This gift comes through the efforts of Rev. Nelson M. Heikes, a Pastor in the town of Albion, who has for many years been a student of the life of Elijah Parish Lovejoy.

I therefore move, Mr. Speaker, that the gavel be accepted and the Clerk requested to extend thanks of the House to the donor, the Rev. Nelson M. Heikes.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. Shesong, moves that the gift of the gavel be accepted and that the Clerk be instructed to communicate the thanks of the House to the donor.
