Saturday, April 1, 1939.

The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Rev. Dr. Wood of Augusta.

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

Papers from the Senate disposed of in concurrence.

Senate Bill in First Reading

In the House:

Mr. HINMAN of Skowhegan: Mr. Speaker, I do not know that I have got so much objection to these matters that are reconsidered as ges-tures, if they can really remain there. Frankly, my principal rea-son for rising is in order that the Legislative Record may, two years from now, should it become neces-sary to so appear, show that if we do accept the action of another branch of the Legislature, that it is being done as a gesture, because certainly we do not want to set up an additional department, even though it should develop that at a later date we have the funds. I just want to go on record as not wanting to antagonize the upper branch of this House, but as making it plain that though I have no particular objection to the House going along as a gesture, if they so choose, I hope it will be taken that way two years from now rather than the fact that we laid it over because we were short of funds and with every intention of enacting it two years from now.

The SPEAKER: What is the

pleasure of the House? The ques-tion is on the acceptance of the "Ought not to pass" report of the committee. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Berwick. Mr. Varney.

VARNEY: Mr. Speaker, I Mr. move the House adhere.

The SPEAKER: The Chair will call the attention of the gentleman to the fact that the House has not yet acted on this item. Is it the "Ought not to pass" report of the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs in non-concurrence?

Committee Amendment "A" to H. P. 566, L. D. 199, Bill, "An Act **Relating to Reserved Number Plates** for Motor Vehicles.

Amend said Bill by inserting af-ter the word "year" in the eleventh

line of Section 102 the words, 'plus a fee of \$1.00.'

Further amend said Bill by striking out the last sentence of Section 102 and inserting in place thereof the following sentences:

The secretary of state may reserve additional registration numbers, for pleasure vehicles, for the succeeding year provided, however, that any person desiring such reservation shall make a special request for the same previous to the 1st day of December of the current year and pay the registration of his vehicle for the succeeding year plus a fee of \$1.00 and otherwise comply with the provisions of the motor vehicle law at the time of such request. The secretary of state shall not reserve any registration number other than is provided herein and all other registration plates or numbers shall be issued in rotation.

"The amount received from the fee charged for reserved numbers shall go into the general fund of the state."

Thereupon, Committee Amendment "A" was adopted and the bill was assigned for third reading the next legislative day.

Chair recognizes that gentleman. Mr. GYGER: Mr. Speaker, if it is in order under the pending motion, I would like to present House Amendment "B" and move its adoption.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Gyger, offers House Amendment "B" and moves its adoption. The Clerk will read the amendment.

House Amendment "B" to H. P. 2059, L. D. 1095, Bill, "An Act relating to School Busses". Amend said Bill by striking out

Amend said Bill by striking out paragraph 9 of Section 2, which reads as follows: "Bumpers both front and rear shall be fastened directly to the chassis."

Thereupon, House Amendment "B" was adopted.

Mr. FARRINGTON of Augusta: Mr. Speaker—

Mr. FARRINGTON: Mr. Speaker, I merely wanted to rise now in favor of the motion—

The SPEAKER: Does the gentleman desire to debate the merits of the bill or the question of assignment?

Mr. FARRINGTON: Mr. Speaker, I guess I better sit down.

Mr. SNOW of Dover-Foxcroft: Mr. Speaker—

The SPEAKER: For what purpose does the gentleman rise?

The question is on the motion to table. Is it the pleasure of the House that the motion of the gentleman from Fairfield, Mr. Ellis, that the bill lie on the table, pending the motion of the gentleman from Unity, Mr. Farwell, that the bill be indefinitely postponed, and be specially assigned for next Tuesday, prevail?

The motion prevailed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Dover-Foxcroft, Mr. Snow. Mr. SNOW: Mr. Speaker, out of

Mr. SNOW: Mr. Speaker, out of order and under suspension of the rules, I move to take from the table L. D. 1079, Bill "An Act to Promote the Blueberry Industry of the State," whereby the House voted yesterday to accept the minority report of the committee "Ought not to pass". The SPEAKER: Does the gentle-

The SPEAKER: Does the gentleman wish to make a motion for reconsideration? The motion is in order without suspension of the rules.

Mr. SNOW: I move to reconsider, Mr. Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Dover-Foxcroft, Mr. Snow, moves that the House reconsider its action of yesterday whereby it accepted the minority report "Ought not to pass" on L. D. 827, Bill "An Act Imposing a Tax on Blueberries for Advertising and Stabilizing the Blueberry Industry of the State," being reported in a New Draft, L. D. 1079 under the title of "An Act to Promote the Blueberry Industry of the State." Is this the pleasure of the House?

Mr. HINMAN of Skowhegan: Mr. Speaker, I hope that the House will not take this matter from the table at this particular time because—

at this particular time because— The SPEAKER: The Chair will inform the gentleman that the matter is not on the table. The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Dover-Foxcroft. Mr. Snow, that the House reconsider its action of yesterday whereby it accepted the minority report "Ought not to pass".

Mr. HINMAN: Mr. Speaker, I hope that we will not reconsider our action of yesterday at this time because of the fact that so few members are here. Mr. BROWN of Caribou: Mr. Speaker, I would oppose the motion to reconsider not because there are not a great many here, but because I do not think there is any reason for reconsidering the action we took yesterday.

As I explained at the hearing, the people from Washington County were unanimously against any tax or any interference by the State of Maine with the blueberry industry. Mr. Burrows, representing the Maine Blueberry Growers' Association, testified at the hearing as follows: "The blueberry industry in Maine is a private enterprise in which the State should take no part. Why should the State step in when we don't need its help? Why not tax corn, apples and strawberries?"

I might say there is another section in this bill which was not mentioned yesterday which I wish to call to your attention. Section 4 of the proposed bill says that the Department of Agriculture shall establish identification grades for blueberries sold by those cooperating under the provisions of this act in order to assist in the advertis-ing of said blueberries. In other words, this bill simply gives them the right to assess taxes or contribute which they can do under the present law, without any new laws. But it does say that the Commissioner of Agriculture shall establish grades and identifications. That means that those who cooperate may put them in special red, white and blue packages with "State of Maine" on them, and any other blueberry growers will be told that they much contribute before them they must contribute before they can have that trade-mark. I believe this Legislature of the State of Maine at this time does not want to undertake to change this law, and until the blueberry growers in Washington County unite on a program of their own favoring legisla-tion, I do not think we want that kind of legislation. I think the vote of yesterday to accept the minority report "Ought not to pass" was in order and that we ought to stick to it. I hope the motion for reconsideration will not prevail.

The SPEAKER: The pending question is on the motion of the gentleman from Dover-Foxcroft, Mr. Snow, that the House reconsider its action of yesterday whereby the minority report "Ought not to pass" was accepted. Is the House ready for the question?

Mr. HINMAN of Skowhegan: Mr. Speaker, I move that the motion be tabled and specially assigned for next Tuesday.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Skowhegan, Mr. Hinman, moves that the motion to reconsider the action of yesterday, with the accompanying bills and reports, lie on the table, pending the motion of the geltneman from Dover-Foxcroft, Mr. Snow, that the House reconsider its action of yesterday, and that the motion for reconsideration be specially assigned for next Tuesday. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed, and the motion to reconsider the action of yesterday with the accompanying bill and reports, was tabled and specially assigned for next Tuesday.

On motion by Mr. Downs of Rome, the House voted to take from the table the seventh unassigned matter, Bill "An Act Relating to the Taking of Hellgrammites" (S. P. 178) (L. D. 229) tabled on March 28th by Mr. McGlaufin of Portland pending third reading; and on further motion by the same gentleman the bill was given its third reading and passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

The SPEAKER: Is there any further business to come before the House under Orders of the Day?

House under Orders of the Day? The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Augusta, Mr. Farrington.

Mr. FARRINGTON: Mr. Speaker,

cut of order and under suspension of the rules, I would like permission to address the House.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Augusta, Mr. Farrington, asks unanimous consent to address the House. Is there objection? The Chair hears none, and the gentleman may proceed.

Mr. Farrington: Mr. Speaker, I just want to say a word in regard to the school bus matter which has been tabled and specially assigned.

I think I am speaking the mind of the entire Motor Vehicle Committee when I say that that committee reported this bill out "Ought to pass" for the sole reason that they thought they should do something, if possible, to improve the conditions for carrying children to school. I think what opposition there is to the bill is in accord with that general idea.

I merely wanted to suggest that between now and the time this matter comes off the table again, that it might be possible for those who are opposed to the bill to work out something so that we might work out something toward the safety question in the carrying of children to school. I hope something of that sort may be done rather than have the whole bill killed. The SPEAKER: Is there any

The SPEAKER: Is there any further business to come before the House under Orders of the Day?

Mr. VARNEY of Berwick: Mr. Speaker, I move that the House now adjourn until next Monday, April 3, at 4.00 o'clock in the afternoon.
