P. 309) under a new title bill "An Act Relating to the Government Employees' Credit Union of Maine," and that it ought to pass.

Thereupon, Mr. Hill of Cumberland presented Senate Amendment

"Senate Amendment A to S. P. 92, L. D. 56, entitled An Act to Make Uniform the Law on Fresh Pursuit and Authorizing this State to Co-

operate with Other States Therein. "Amend said bill by striking out in the 1st line of section 6 thereof, the following words 'passage and approval by the governor of this, and inserting in place thereof the following words "effective date of this'."

Mr. HILL: Mr. President, I move the adoption of Senate Amendment

The purpose of this amendment is simply to correct a technical error in the bill. The bill provides that copies of the bill should be sent by the Secretary of State to the executives of the other states after its passage and approval by the Governor. It was thought it would be better policy to change that so as to read, "after the effective date of this act." That is the entire purpose of the amendment.

Thereupon, Senate Amendment A was adopted and the bill as so amended was passed to be engrossed.

On motion by Mr. Graves of Hancock, the Senate voted to take from the table An Act Relating to Marking Certain Highways (H. P. 933) (L. D. 366) tabled by that Senator on February 7 pending reference in concurrence; and on further motion by the same Senator the bill was referred to the Committee on Ways and Bridges in non-concurrence.

The **PRESIDENT**: Is there any further business to come before the Senate?

Mr. SPEAR of Cumberland: Mr. President, I wish to present a resolution at this time and move its adoption. After it has been adopted I will make a supplementary motion in regard to its disposition. The Secretary read the resolution:

Resolution

IN MEMORY OF FORMER PRESIDENT OF THE MAINE SENATE HAROLD E. WEEKS

The Senate of Maine pauses in this morning's session to record its appreciation of the life, ability and character of a former President who passed on, February 7, 1939. Former President Weeks was a friendly, genial, able man of determined spirit to whom principle was a duty to be met and discharged but who never allowed prejudice or malice to enter into his social relationships. The passing of former President Weeks brought grief to his associates, his friends and his family. He had a broad viewpoint, he easily grasped situations, he delighted in legislative activities, he believed in Maine, he loved her hills and streams, he hopped for his state to have a richer and happier future and he worked during his lifetime toward that end.

Therefore BE IT RESOLVED BY THIS SENATE that in the death of former President Weeks, the State of Maine lost an exemplary citizen, a distinguished leader and a true gentleman.

RESOLVED that an engrossed copy of this Memorial, signed by the President of the Senate be sent to Mrs. Weeks as a token of our respect and friendship for our former President.

RESOLVED that these resolutions be spread in full upon the records of the Senate.

The PRESIDENT: The resolution will be adopted by the members of the Senate standing in their places until they are seated by the sound of the gavel.

The resolution was unanimously adopted.

Mr. SPEAR: Mr. President, I now move that an engrossed copy of the resolution be signed by the President and be suitably framed and sent to Mrs. Weeks.

The motion prevailed by unanimous vote.

Mr. SPEAR: Mr. President, I move that as a further mark of respect, the Senate stand adjourned.

Mr. BURNS of Aroostook: Mr. President, may I have a minute or two to confer with the Senator from

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Cumberland (Senator Spear) before that motion is put?

The PRESIDENT: If there is no objection the Senator has such permission.

Subsequently that Senator informed the President that he had nothing further to say.

The PRESIDENT: The Senator

from Cumberland, Senator Spear, moves that as a further mark of respect the Senate stand adjourned. Is this the pleasure of the Senate?

The motion prevailed by unanimouse vote.

The **PRESIDENT**: The Senate stands adjourned until tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.
