Communication

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

March 1, 1939.

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives:

I feel it my duty to transmit to the members of the Eighty-ninth Legislature reports and information filed with me by the State Controller.

Definite figures available to me as of this date on the current fiscal year ending June 30, 1939 show present appropriations in the Welfare Department are insufficient.

For state pauper support the sum of \$700,000 was appropriated. That amount is exhausted at the present time and departmental estimates indicate that \$488,000 will be required to complete the present fiscal vear.

For emergency aid the sum of \$200,000 was provided. The unexpended balance at this date is \$60,-000. It is estimated that an additional amount of \$31,000 will be necessary to complete the present fiscal year.

For board and care of neglected children the sum of \$365,000 was provided. The balance at this date is \$103,000 and for the balance of the present fiscal year it is estimated that an additional \$30,000 is needed. The estimated total amount required to complete these three state activities for the balance of the current fiscal year is \$549,000.

It should be understood that "bills payable" are received from cities and towns on a quarterly basis on account of state paupers. In other words, the state paupers are cared for and supplies are furnished by the local overseers of poor and the bills are forwarded to the State for payment every three months. The amounts paid in January and February were very substantially in excess of any possible estimates by the Eighty - eighth Legislature. The Eighty - eighth Legislature. The money that is being expended in cities and towns during the present weeks will not be submitted to the State for reimbursement until the last of the present fiscal year.

In the case of expenditures for both emergency aid and board and care of neglected children, our present appropriations are not exhausted but it is plainly apparent that they are insufficient for the balance of the year.

It is well to emphasize that the requested amounts represent only available estimates the best carry through the balance of the present year ending June 30, 1939.

The financial report of the state, published on August 18, 1938, showed that for the fiscal year of 1938 the budget was balanced with a surplus of \$386,744.17. This was further reflected in the sinking fund reserve of that year which showed a balance of \$722,379.16. That result seems to me most fortunate for the reason that it now affords us our only apparent relief without new taxation.

By your authorization it is possible to transfer the necessary amount from this account although the remaining balance of \$173,379.16

the remaining balance of \$173,379.16 is an extremely small margin of safety, generally speaking.

I call your attention to the fact that for the second year in succession the temporary borrowing capacity of the state in anticipation of taxes remains intact and I shall continue in my endeavor to show continue in my endeavor to show a balanced budget for the entire year. To accomplish this, however, your continued splendid cooperation is essential in resisting every possible expenditure that you do not regard as absolutely necessary.

It seems to me that the necessity for this communication is rather conclusive evidence of the difficulty encountered of accurate budget estimates covering a two-year period in advance to meet a constantly growing demand for all welfare relief under existing statute. You may find it desirable to analyze many of our present laws in this respect.
