Mr. SPEAR of Cumberland: Mr. President, I present an order and move its passage and I would like to make a statement after it is read:

Order

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Bank Commissioner hereby ordered and authorized to investigate the system used by persons, firms, partnerships and corporations permitted by law to operate under the provisions of Section 150 of Chapter 57 of the Revised Statutes, relating to loans not vised Statutes, relating to loans not exceeding the amount of Three Hundred Dollars and receiving thereon interest at a rate of not more than thirty-six percent per year. Said Commissioner may employ counsel and auditors, compel the attendance of witnesses and the production of books, papers, documents, records and other evidence, and may administer oaths to witnesses and punish for contempt in the same manner as provided by law in re proceedings before the Public Utilities Commission. Said Commissioner shall report his findings to the 89th Legislature.

All expenses incurred by said Commissioner in the discharge of his duties shall be paid from the general funds upon approval by the

Governor and Council. (S. P. 506) Mr. SPEAR of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move that this matter

The Secretary read the amend-

ment:

"Senate Amendment 'A' to Senate Paper 393, Legislative Document 763, bill, 'An Act to Provide for the Repeal of the Charter of the Fort Kent Village Corporation,' Amend said bill by striking out the words, 'are excluded from' in the second line of section 4 and inserting in place thereof the following words: 'shall not apply to.' Further amend said bill by adding at the end of the Emergency Clause the follow-ing: '; as above provided.'" Senate Amendment A was

adopted.

Mr. BURNS: Mr. President, this bill was reported out of the Legal Affairs Committee with the suggested Senate Amendment A. Since that time I have examined the bill further and I feel there should be an additional amendment offered and I have prepared Senate Amendment B. I presented this to the Chairman of the Committee on Legal Affairs, Senator Marden, and he offers no objection. I also had Mr. Holley, the State Tax Assessor, examine it and he approves of this amendment. I therefore present Senate Amendment B and move its adoption:

"Senate Amendment B to Legislative Document No. 763. An Act to Provide for the Repeal of the Charter of the Fort Kent Village

Corporation.

"Amend said bill by adding the following words after the first paragraph of Section 1: 'The corporate existence of said Fort Kent Village Corporation shall further survive for the purpose of protecting and preserving the public health, welfare, and safety of the inhabitants and the property of said Fort Kent Village Corporation as heretofore provided.'

"Further amend said bill by adding the following words after the second sentence of Section 2 of said bill: 'and during said period said state tax assessor shall have the power and authority to assess taxes for the purpose of protecting the public health, welfare, and safety of the inhabitants of said Fort Kent

Village Corporation.

"Further amend said Section 2 by striking out the word 'outstanding' in the fourteenth line thereof and inserting in place thereof the words

present and future'.

"Further amend said bill by adding the following words to the end of Section 3 of said bill; 'and notice of the final dissolution of said Fort Kent Village Corporation shall likewise be filed on completion thereof by said state tax assessor."

"Further amend said bill by adding to the end of Section 4 thereof the following words: 'as heretofore

provided.

Senate Amendment B was adopted, and the bill as amended by Senate Amendment A and Senate Amendment B was next Tuesday assigned for second reading.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, the Senate voted to take from the table, bill, An Act Relat-ing to Removal of Paupers (H. P. 246) (L. D. 62), tabled by that Senator on March 10th pending con-

sideration

Mr. SPEAR of Cumberland: Mr. President, as this matter has been taken care of by other legislation, I move that the bill be indefinitely postponed in concurrence with the House.

The motion prevailed, and the bill was indefinitely postponed in con-

currence.

On motion by Mr. Cony of Kennebec, the Senate voted to reconsider its action taken on March 16th whereby a Committee of Conference was appointed on bill, An Act Relating to Taxation of Radios (H. P. 1835) (L. D. 1001); and on further motion by the same Senator, under suspension of the rules, the Senate voted to reconsider its action taken on March 9th whereby the bill was passed to be engrossed in concurrence.

Thereupon, on further motion by the same Senator the bill was laid upon the table pending passage to be engrossed in concurrence.

Mr. SPEAR of Cumberland: Mr. President, I move that we recess for five minutes in order that I may confer with members of the Senate regarding the order tabled by me earlier in today's session. The motion to recess prevailed.

On motion by Mr. Cony of Kennebec, the Senate voted to take from the table, An Act Relating to Medical Examiners and Their Duties (H. P. 29) (L. D. 22), tabled by that Senator on March 16th pending consideration; and that Senator yielded to the Senator from Kennebec, Senator Marden.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Marden of Kennebec, the Senate voted to insist and join with the House in a Committee of Conference and the President appointed as members of such committee on the part of the Senate, Senators Marden of Kennebec, Chase of Washington and Elliot of Knox.
