Orders of the Day

Mr. BOOTHBY of York: Mr. President, may I inquire if Legislative Document 1051, An Act Relating to Election of Commissioners of Police in Sanford, is in the hands of the Secretary?

The PRESIDENT: The Chair would inform the Senator that the document is in the possession of the Senate.

Thereupon, on motion by Mr. Boothby of York, the rules were suspended and the Senate voted to reconsider its action taken on March 24th whereby the bill was passed to be engrossed in concurrence; and on further motion by the same Senator, the bill was laid upon the table pending passage to be engrossed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Dorr of Oxford, the Senate voted to take from the table House Report from the Committee on Banks and Banking "Ought Not to Pass" on bill, An Act to Authorize the Incorporation of Credit Unions (H. P. 1310) (L. D. 549) tabled by that Senator on March 15th pending acceptance of the report in concurrence; and on further motion by the same Senator the report was accepted in concurrence.

Additional Senate Committee Report, out of order and under suspension of the rules:

Mr. Chase of Washington from the Committee on Legal Affairs, on bill "An Act Creating the Passamaquoddy District Authority," (S. P. 263) (L. D. 453) reported the same in a new draft, (S. P. 573) under the same title and that it ought to pass.

Which report was read and accepted, and the bill laid upon the table for printing under the joint rules.

On motion by Mr. Marden of Kennebec, the Senate voted to take from the table, House Report from the Committee on Indian Affairs "Ought to Pass" on bill, An Act Relating to Selling or Giving Liquor to the Indians (H. P. 1150) (L. D. 467), tabled by that Senator on March 24th pending acceptance of the report in concurrence; and that Senator yielded to the Senator from Penobscot, Senator Chamberlain.

Mr. CHAMBERLAIN of Penob-scot: Mr. President, this bill allow-ing the sale of liquor to Indians seems to me not only unnecessary but will result in a great deal of difficulty. Years ago when the lumber industry was in its prime these Indians found much employment in the woods along the rivers. Now, that industry having been entirely done away with, it is difficult for them to compete with white labor, consequently they are very much out of employment and are idle. To be sure, they can obtain in various ways all the liquor they want, but if we pass this bill it seems to me that being idle and unemployed, they will frequent the beer parlors much to the detriment of themselves and to the detriment of the people in the community adjacent to where they live. It seems to me it is unnecessary and a very great mistake to pass this bill.

I have been told that an informer, finding that liquor had been solt to an Indian, made complaint. I was also told that half the fee that was administered by the court went to him and half to the saloon keeper. I am not disturbed with that. If any saloon keeper is willing to pay half the fine to the state or county, I say continue if you want to, but I say it is very unwise to pass this bill. Therefore, Mr. President, I move the bill and report be indefinitely postponed, in non-concurrence.

Mr. KENNEDY of Hancock: Mr. President, the law which this bill would repeal is section 294 of Chapter 1 of the laws of 1933 and reads as follows: "Whoever sells or gives to an Indian intoxicating liquor, forfeits not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$20.00; half to the state and half to the complainant." I submit that a law such as this has no place in the statutes of this state.

Mr. CHAMBERLAIN: May I say a word more? I consulted with quite a few people in Old Town which is adjacent to the Old Town Indians and they do not want this bill. They take care of the situation well enough now without granting further rights to the Indians to purchase liquor and they can ob-tain it quietly and go their way but if this bill is passed they will fre-

if this bill is passed they will fre-quent those places and the people of Old Town that I have talked with do not want the bill at all. Mr. FINDLEN of Aroostook: Mr. President, I employ Indians to pick my potatoes and do my seed cut-ting. One of our real problems is to keep beer and liquor away from them. They can get plenty now but if this bill passes I am afraid it would be a detriment to the Indians would be a detriment to the Indians and to the people who employ them, so I hope that this bill will not be

passed. The PRESIDENT: The question before the Senate is on the motion of the Senator from Penobscot,

Senator Chamberlain that bill. An Act Relating to Selling or Giving Liquor to the Indians, (L. D. 467) be indefinitely postponed in non-concurrence. Is this the pleasure of the Senate? Thereupon, the bill was indefi-

nitely postponed in non-concurrence.

Sent down for concurrence.
