SENATE

Thursday, May 23, 1940.

In compliance with a Proclamation of His Excellency, the Governor, Lewis O. Barrows, the Senators convened in the Senate Chamber at nine o'clock in the morning, Eastern Standard Time.

Senate called to order by the President.

Prayer by the Rev. William R. Wood, of Augusta.

By direction of the President, the Secretary read the Proclamation:

STATE OF MAINE

Proclamation by the Governor

Whereas, it appears advisable that the Legislature of this State should meet in special session for the following purposes:

To consider legislation relative to unemployment compensation made necessary by certain changes in Federal Social Security laws.

To consider legislation concerning present laws relating to guaranty of titles of motor vehicles.

To act upon any legislation to promote the welfare of the State.

I, therefore, by virtue of the power vested in me as Governor, convene the Legislature of this State, hereby requiring the Senators and Representatives to assemble in their respective chambers at the Capitol, at Augusta, on Thursday, the twenty-third day of May, 1940, at nine o'clock in the morning, Eastern Standard Time, in order to receive such communication as may then be made to them and to consider and determine on such measures as in their judgent will best promote the welfare of the State.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, it was ORDERED, that a message be conveved to the House of Represen-

conveyed to the House of Representatives informing that body that a quorum of Senators is present for the consideration of such business as may come before the Senate.

On motion by Miss Laughlin of Cumberland, it was

ORDERED, that a message be sent to His Excellency, the Governor, informing him that in obedience to his Proclamation a quorum of Senators is assembled in the Senate Chamber for the consideration of such business as may come before the Senate.

The President appointed Senators Laughlin of Cumberland, Thatcher of Penobscot, Burns of Aroostook to

convey the message.

The Committee retired, and subsequently reported that they had delivered the message with which

they were charged.

Subsequently a message was received from the House of Representatives, by Mr. Pease, its Clerk, informing the Senate that a quorum of the Representatives is present for the consideration of such business as may come before that body.

On motion by Mr. Friend of Somerset, it was

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate be directed to invite the Augusta, clergymen of and Gardiner to officiate as chaplains of the Senate during the present session.

On motion by Mr. Findlen of Aroostook, it was

ORDERED, that Charles P. Lyford of Augusta be appointed Official Reporter of the Senate for the Special Session.

On motion by Mr. Chase Washington, it was

ORDERED, that the Secretary of the Senate be authorized to procure the services of two stenographers during the Special Session, and for the preparation of the Senate Journal.

On motion by Mr. Marden of Kennebec, it was

ORDERED, the House concurring, that three hundred and fifty copies of the Legislative Record for the Special Session of 1940, convened on May 23rd, be printed and bound, one copy each for the members and officers of the Senate and House of Representatives, and the remainder to be deposited in the State Library for exchange and library purposes; and be it further

ORDERED, that three hundred and fifty copies of the Legislative Record be printed in pamphlet form for distribution from day to day to members of the Legislature and the departments under the direction of (S. P. 704) the Document Clerk.

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the foregoing order came back from the House, read and passed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Sanborn of Cumberland, it was

ORDERED, that the Senate Reporter be authorized to employ an assistant reporter and a typist during the Special Session.

On motion by Mr. Morse of

Waldo, it was Ordered, that a message be sent to the House of Representatives proposing a Joint Convention to be held forthwith in the Hall of the House for the purpose of extending an invitation to the Governor to attend the Convention and present such communication as he may be pleased to make; and for the fur-ther purpose of either confirming the appointment of the present Auditor, or choosing another person to fill the office during the unexpired term.

The Secretary conveyed the message.

Subsequently a message was received from the House, by Mr. Pease, its Clerk, concurring in the foregoing proposition for a Joint Convention.

The Senate then proceeded to the House of Representatives where

a Convention was formed.

In the Senate

The Senate was called to order by the President.

Orders

On motion by Mr. Wentworth of York, it was

ORDERED, the House concurring, tnat five thousand copies of the Governor's message be printed. (S. P. 705)

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the foregoing order was returned from the House, having been read and passed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Beckett of Washington, it was

ORDERED, the House concurring, that the Superintendent of Buildings is hereby given charge of all assignments of rooms for hearings in the Capitol Building, and that all applications for rooms for hearings with hearings made to him in writers. ings must be made to him in writing forty-eight hours previous to the time when said rooms are to be used for that purpose. (S. P. 706)

Sent down for concurrence.

Subsequently the foregoing order was returned from the House, having been read and passed in concurrence.

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland,

On motion by Mr. Spear of Cumberland, it was

the House concur-ORDERED. ring, that no bill or resolve be received by this Legislature unless by unanimous consent in the body in which it is introduced, except such as relate directly to the financial condition of the State, the administration of the State Government and its several departments, military defense, and the matters specifically set forth in the Proclamation of the Governor dated May 16, 1940, convening this special session or referred to in the Governor's message;

AND IT IS FURTHER DERED, that any bill or resolve which shall be received in either branch of this Legislature by unanimous consent shall be referred to the 90th Legislature if unanimous consent for its reception is not given in the other body in concurrence. These Orders shall not apply to such bills or resolves as are intended only to facilitate the business of the 89th Legislature. (S. P. 707)

On motion by Mr. Spear, sent to the House forthwith for concur-

rence.
