# HOUSE AT EASE

# 10:50 A. M.

House was called to order by the Speaker.

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The SPEAKER: The Chair appoints on the Committee to wait upon Mrs. Sewall the following members of the House: The gentlewoman from Brunswick, Miss Bangs; the gentlewoman from Bangor, Miss Clough; the gentlewoman from Bath, Miss Deering; the gentlewoman from Westbrook, Mrs. Roberts; the gentlewoman from Crystal, Miss Longstaff; and the gentlewoman from Fort Kent, Mrs. Leidy.

The Committee retired, and then re-entered the hall, escorted by the Sergeant-at-Arms, carrying the One Hundred Percent Minute Man Flag, conducting Mrs. Sumner Sewall, accompanied by Mrs. Lida H. Berry, Deputy Administrator for Women, Maine War Savings Staff. (Applause, the members rising)

Mrs. Sumner Sewall then ascended the rostrum, where she presented the Minute Man Flag, with the following words:

MRS. SEWALL: Mr. Speaker and Members of the 91st Legislature: It gives me a great deal of pleasure to present to you at this time this One Hundred Per Cent Minute Man Flag, for your participation in the purchase of bonds for the United States government for our victory and I know that with all of us working together, that we will have a victory. (Prolonged applause, the members rising)

Thereupon, Mrs. Sewall presented the flag to Speaker Richardson, who received it with the following remarks:

The SPEAKER: Mrs. Sewall and Members of the Legislature: I am sure that it is a privilege for the House to participate in this rather unique ceremony, understanding, as we do, that this may be the first time that any legislative body in the United States has ever given its cooperation in this manner on this particular project. We appreciate the gracious presentation made by Mrs. Sewall, and I am satisfied that this ceremony represents something more to the members of this House than the mere fact that it indicates our participation in this drive.

I am satisfied that serious thoughts must be going through our minds this morning, as we recognize what this investment in posterity really means. We are not only making an investment from the financial angle, but also, as we purchase these bonds, we are showing our faith in this country and in its institutions. Briefly there flashed through my mind this morning a realization of the fact that our Colonial forefathers really laid the foundations of what is functioning here today. Later on, when the nation was torn by dissension and strife, it was once more an exhibition of loyalty and team-work on the part of the American people that preserved this as a united nation.

Twenty-five years ago, we found our course diverted and the nation entering upon a course which eventually led to our becoming a world power, with all its responsibilities, and so by succeeding generations this heritage of citizenship, this heriitage of good government, this heritage of opportunity, has been preserved and passed on through sacrifice and toil and hard work.

Today another generation assumes this responsibility and I maintain that it accepts that task cheerfully and that it moves forward with absolute confidence in the ultimate result.

We are bound to maintain a solemn and sacred heritage that has come from the past. The heritage to which I refer was a Constitutional government based upon a representative democracy. That heritage was sanctified in my judgment by the sacrifices of the Civil War. It was definitely perpetuated by the blood that was shed by American boys—American youth—on the battlefields of France and Belgium.

I admit that we may be totally unmindful of the spoken pleas that are made during these stirring days, regardless of whether they come from great leaders or from humble citizens like myself, but we cannot ignore the supplication, yea, the command, which issues from the spirit of that marching host now sleeping beneath the colors at Gettysburg, at Arlington, or on foreign fields.

I contend that we are bound by a sacred covenant to one of our own. I refer to the Unknown Soldier who came back from over there to sleep forever in the soil of America. To that great national shrine where he sleeps hundreds of thousands of Americans annually wend their way, to re-dedicate themselves to the principles for which he stood and for which he died.

It is well to remember, this morning, in the face of this common effort that no man knows whether the Unknown Soldier was black, white or perhaps an Indian. No one can tell whether he was a Protestant or a Catholic—and that matters not, because he measured up to every test of American citizenship. As a people we are bound by that covenant, and our responsibilities are definite and continuous. No American citizen, now or at any time, can avoid the challenge. We are bound under the terms of that covenant to do everything within our power to preserve the government of the United States, and the institutions which have been developed under it.

We here in America are definitely pledged and obligated to oppose Communism or any other form of government that can be achieved only by tearing down our institutions. We are pledged to oppose any centralization of authority in America which can be achieved only through the destruction of human rights — and, speaking of human rights, do not forget that in the one hundred and sixty-five years that this nation has stood and prospered under a Constitution, human rights have been extended more than they were from the time of the writing of that Constitution back to the Cross of Calvary.

We are pledged to uphold the ideals of justice, freedom and democracy, which, under a government of law and order, represent now, and they will for all time, the guide-posts that must take this nation forward. I say we are going to meet our obligations under the terms of that covenant, in order to prove our right to be called American citizens. We are going to meet our obligations under the terms of that covenant, not for ourselves alone but for those around us and for posterity.

By our investment in war bonds and stamps, we are showing our confidence in America and our faith in its triumph in a just cause. (Applause) Mrs. Sewall was then escorted by the Committee from the Hall, amid the applause of the members, the audience rising.

The SPEAKER: The Clerk has in his possession an additional message or paper. The Chair will ask him to read it at this time.
