On motion by Mr. Murchie of Calais, the House voted to take from the table the twenty-fourth tabled and unassigned matter, Bill "An Act relating to Apportionment to Towns for Teaching Positions" (H. P. 238) (L. D. 186), tabled by that gentleman on March 4th pending second reading.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Calais, Mr. Murchie

Mr. MURCHIE: Mr. Speaker, I hope that at least the members of this Legislature do not feel that I was so struck on myself that I felt I could kill or lick this Teachers' Bill. Neither did I feel that I was quit capable of nicking it \$175,000, if I wanted to. My thought is that no drastic tax legislation will probably be enacted during this session of the Legislature. If it should, it will change the whole picture, to be sure. My feeling is that in this effort 1 have made progress in calling your attention to situations other than just making increases. In other words, if you want to receive attention tackle a popular measure. My hope is that if and when I may later offer an amendment to the State Tax Bill that you will be inclined to go along with me. if and provided I can find the money; and I now move, Sir, that this Legislative Document 186 be given its second reading.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Livermore Falls, Mr. Grua.

Mr. GRUA: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: As this measure was passing through, I had occasion to look it over, and if you will turn to it, you will see that it evidently attempts to legislate for nationally owned lands and not for the State of Maine. The purpose of the bill is wholesome and desirable but it is legislating a law that has to do with the policing of property owned by the United States over which the State of Maine has no police powers, and in which the State of Maine has no rights whatever, as far as I can see.

It would be very similar to legislating laws for the City of Berlin, New Hampshire, or for Boston, Massachusetts, or some province in Canada. It seems to me it is utterly and entirely illegal. I have taken the matter up with

I have taken the matter up with the sponsors of the bill and the members of that Committee, and I have taken the matter up with our Forestry Commissioner, Mr. Rendall, and they are agreed with me that the matter is not a proper matter for our consideration. You can readily see that it would be very dangerous to pass such a law, because the wardens might attempt to arrest somebody up there for this violation. They might take him to a Judge, and then send him to jail.

Not only is this law illegal, but it

has not even the color of legality, Judge would not be protected in any manner by the law. It seems to me that they could be sued for very large damages. I think it is on our books any law that we clearly feel is illegal and unconstitutional; and however much we might like to assist in the purpose of this act, I feel that we ought to go very slowly. The only real pur-pose is to enable the fire wardens up there to bring culprits before the courts of the State of Maine rather than taking them before the Federal court in Portland, because of the inconvenience of taking them that longer distance. I feel that it would be very unwise for us to pass such legislation, and I therefore move, Mr. Speaker, that we indefi-nitely postpone Legislative Docu-ment 181, Bill "An Act Relating to the White Mountain National Jer the White Mountain National For-est."

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Livermore Falls, Mr. Grua, moves that Bill "An Act Relating to the White Mountain National For-est" (S. P. 167) (L. D. 181) be in-definitely postponed. Is this the pleasure of the House?
