HOUSE

Wednesday, April 19, 1944. The House met according to adjournment and was called to order by the Speaker.

Prayer by the Heigham of Wiscasset. Rev. Robert

Journal of the previous session read and approved.

House Reports of Committees Ought to Pass as Amended

Mr. Murchie from the Committee on Appropriations and Financial Affairs on Bill "An Act to Appropriate Monies for the Expenditures of State Government for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1944" (H. P. 1376) reported "Ought to pass" as amended by Committee Amendment 'A" submitted therewith.

Report was read and accepted, and the Bill was read twice under suspension of the rules.

Committee Amendment "A" read

by the Clerk as follows:

Committee Amendment "A" to H. P. 1376 Bill "An Act to Appropriate Monies for the Expenditures of State Government for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1944". Amend said Bill by striking out

in the last line thereof the figure \$"12,000" and inserting in place thereof '\$14,000'.

Committee Amendment "A" was adopted, and under suspension of the rules the bill had its third reading and was passed to be engrossed as amended by Committee Amendment "A" and sent up for concurrence.

Ought Not to Pass

Mr. Perkins from the Committees Judiciary and Legal Affairs jointly reported "Ought not to pass" on Bill "An Act to Facilitate Voting by Duly Qualified Registered and Enrolled Voters in the Armed Forces of our Country, the Merchant Marine, and Other Services necessary the Successful Prosecution of Wars against Germany and Japan (H. P. 1377) (L. D. 918)

Report was read and accepted and sent up for concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Falmouth, Mr. Dow.

Senate Committee Report

P. 506) (L. D. 917) reporting same in a new draft under title of "An Act to Facilitate Voting by Members of the Armed Forces of the United States" (S. P. 509) and that it "Ought to pass"

Passed to Be Enacted **Emergency Measure**

An Act to Provide Monies for the Expenditures of State Government for the Fiscal Year Ending June 30, 1944 (H. P. 1376)
The SPEAKER: This bill, having

had its three several readings in the House and having been passed to be engrossed, having had its two several readings in the Senate and having been passed to be engrossed, and having been reported by the Committee on Engrossed Bills as truly and strictly engrossed, is it now the pleasure of the House that

it pass to be enacted?
This being an emergency measure, under the Constitution it requires for its passage the affirmative vote of two-thirds of the entire elected membership of this House. All those in favor of the passage of this bill to be enacted will rise and stand in their places until counted, and the monitors have made and returned

the count.

A division of the House was had. One hundred and twenty-six having voted in the affirmative and none in the negative, 126 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.

Emergency Measure

This being an emergency measure,

A division of the House was had.

One hundred and twenty-seven having voted in the affirmative and none in the negative, 127 being more than two-thirds of the entire elected membership of the House, the bill was passed to be enacted, signed by the Speaker and sent to the Senate.
