The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Port-

The SPEAKER: The Chair will state that the Senate and House have acted on all matters before them; all papers have been exchanged.

From this point on it seems obvious that the House must await such time as the committees have had time to hold public hearings. That being true, it seems wise that the House adjourn until tomorrow morning at 9:30 o'clock.

The Chair will also state that

there will be no business to transact at the morning session, but in view of the fact that the House might possibly be faced with some emergency whereby it became necessary to have the Legislature in session, the Chair believes 9:30 is the proper hour and that all committees should make plans to hold committee hearings at ten o'clock, in order that the House may be ready late tomorrow afternoon to act upon these matters as the committees refer them back to the two branch-

The Chair recognizes the gentle-woman from Bangor, Miss Clough. Miss CLOUGH: Mr. Speaker, may I inquire before we adjourn, if any committee hearings have been advertised for today.

The SPEAKER: The Clerk has one notice that he will read at this time.

The CLERK: (Reading) There will be a joint meeting of the Committees on Appropriations and Financial Affairs and Inland Fisheries and Game this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock in the hall of the House.

The SPEAKER: The Chair presumes this is for a hearing. The The Chair would inquire of the gentleman from Calais, Mr. Murchie, if this is right.

Mr. MURCHIE: Mr. Speaker, I would say that I have not been able to contact the Senate chairman, but I presume a hearing will be held this afternoon. I feel the need of getting the committees to-gether and getting things started. I think that will answer the guestion.
