#### **Gught to Pass in New Draft**

Report of the Committee on Ways and Bridges on Bill "An Act Relieving Towns of Expense of Maintaining State Aid Highways" (S. P. 109) (L. D. 113) reporting same in a new draft (S. P. 454) (L. D. 770) under title of "An Act to Relieve Towns of Maintenance of State and State Aid Highways and to Provide for Construction of State Aid Highways" and that it "Ought to pass".

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Addison, Mr. Lackee.

Mr. Lackee: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: This new draft, L. D. 770, is a combination. Included in that combination are two bills that were introduced into this Legislature for the primary purpose of relief to towns. This first section referred to in this bill which we have a part of, under that plan the towns would be privileged to increase or enlarge their State Aid construction by one-half million. The second section, which includes the so-called Ela bill, and which is entirely a relief measure, provides that the expense of winter and summer maintenance of the towns, except snow removal, shall be taken over by the State. The cost of this plan is \$440,000, and that \$440,000 can be eliminated from your property tax bills.

In order that the towns may participate in this relief during the fiscal year 1949-1950, it is necessary that this new draft be finally passed in time for the State Highway Commission to notify each town before its annual town meeting, because it will affect their budget. Therefore, any delay in the passage of this new draft will automatically delay that notification and thereby defeat the purpose of the bill.

Ever since I have been in the Legislature, there has always been a demand for relief to towns in some public service by way of local taxation, and it is entirely within your province to satisfy that demand. I therefore move the acceptance of the committee report.

The SPEAKER: Is it the pleasure of the House to accept the committee report?

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Waterville, Mr. Muskie.

Mr. MUSKIE: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I am concerned about this bill in only one respect, and that is with respect to the section that undertakes to repeal Section 7 of the Public Laws of 1947, Chapter 349. I read that section just before we convened this morning. If this bill passes, it will repeal the limitation on the gasoline tax which we passed two years ago, the fact that the in-

crease of two cents then enacted should expire on September 1, 1950. So in effect this bill is a gas tax measure. It comes out of the Committee on Ways and Bridges, which I understand did not hold any hearing on the subject.

You remember two years ago that public dissatisfaction was attached to a bill passed by this Legislature without adequate committee hearings and without an opportunity for the public to be heard. It does not seem to me that with that background there is any emergency which requires immediate action this morning on an extension of that increase in gasoline tax. For that reason, I move that this matter lie on the table and be specially assigned for Thursday morning.

The SPEAKER: The question before the House is on the motion of the gentleman from Waterville, Mr. Muskie, that the bill and accompanying papers lie upon the table and be specially assigned for Thursday morning of this week, pending acceptance of the report of the committee.

As many as are in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Waterville, Mr. Muskie, that the matter lie upon the table and be specially assigned for Thursday morning will say aye; those opposed, no. The noes have it unless doubted.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Chase.

Mr. CHASE: Mr. Speaker, there is much about this bill which I like, and, in what I have to say regarding it, I do not want to be understood as being hostile to the bill. It does, however, contain certain defects which should be pointed out. I do not know if the printed copy is an exact copy of the original, but I have just noticed that the printed bill repeals Section 7 of Chapter 347 of the Public Laws of 1947, whereas I believe the correct number is 349. The original bill may be correct.

But the other defect is one which I deem to be fatal to the bill, and while I am in accord with the remarks of Representative Lackee in regard to the need for haste, we do not want to hasten to pass a bill which may contain a fatal defect.

Section 9 of Article IV of Part 3rd of the Constitution provides that all bills for raising of a revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives. This bill, since it repeals the expiration date on the gas tax, is a bill for raising a revenue. It did not originate in the House of Representatives, as it is a new draft of a Senate bill, S. P. 109 For this reason, I move that the bill be recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Bridges.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Chase, now moves that the bill be recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Bridges.

As many as are in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth will say aye; those opposed, no.

A viva voce vote being doubted. A division of the House was had. The SPEAKER: Ninety-seven having voted in the affirmative and none in the negative, the motion to recommit prevails.

#### Orders of the Day

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Houlton, Mr. Robbins.

Mr. ROBBINS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I wish to move that the House reconsider its earlier action by which it returned to the Committee on Ways and Bridges S. P. 454, L. D. 770, "An Act to Relieve Towns of Expense of Maintaining State and State Aid Highways and to Provide for Construction of State Aid Highways."

There were two points made against this measure by the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth (Mr. Chase). The first one was that in Section 5 of the bill there is an erroneous reference to Chapter 347. I have just checked the original bill, and in the original bill it is correctly stated as being Chapter 349. That is a misprint.

The most important point the gentleman made was that this was a revenue measure which, according to the Constitution should have originated in this House. The Committee on Ways and Bridges gave very careful consideration to that point before reporting out this bill. Unfortunately, when the gentleman spoke I did not have with me a copy of the Constitution. I went out to get one, and I would like to read to the members of the House just what Article IV, Part 3, Section 9 says. It says this: "Bills, orders or resolutions may originate in the House and may be altered, amended or rejected in the other. Now here is the point: "but all bills for raising revenue shall originate in the House of Representatives, but the Senate may propose amendments as in other cases." Please get "The Senate may propose that. amendments as in other cases."

As a matter of fact, this bill is an amendment to an already existing revenue measure; it is not a new revenue bill. It simply amends a revenue measure which originated properly in the House of Representatives two years ago, and it was for that reason that the committee felt entitled to report out this bill. It is not a new revenue bill; it simply amends an existing one, which the Senate, under the terms of the Constitution, is empowered to do.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Houlton, Mr. Robbins, moves that the House do now reconsider its action taken earlier this morning whereby it recommitted Item 38, Bill "An Act to Relieve Towns of Expense of Maintaining State Aid Highways" (S. P. 109) (L. D. 113) reporting same in a new draft (S. P. 454) (L. D. 770) under title of "An Act to Relieve Towns of Maintenance of State and State Aid Highways and to Provide for Construction of State Aid Highways."

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Chase.

Mr. CHASE: Mr. Speaker, I repeat that I have nothing against this bill, but the gentleman's argument does not satisfy me as to the constitutionality of this measure if we should proceed to pass it in its present form, and I do not want this Legislature to pass such an important revenue act as this if there is any doubt as to its constitutionality which can be corrected in a very short space of time by appropriate procedure.

The gentleman's reference to the earlier act which this bill would amend seems to me inappropriate, because I understand the word "bill" to refer to procedure in the Legislature and not to a law which has already been passed. I still believe that there is sufficient doubt regarding the constitutional point involved so that we cannot afford not to take time enough to turn it back now to correct what I believe to be a fatal error.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Limestone, Mr. Burgess.

Mr. BURGESS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: It appears that confusion has come into our minds in regard to the measure now in question. We have in our State House, for the purpose of clearing the way on matters with reference to their legal status and constitutionality, the office of the Attorney General. I hope at this time that the measure can remain in the House and the matter be

cleared with the legal authorities of our State and their opinions returned to you without the necessity of returning the measure to the committee.

The SPEAKER: The question before the House is on the motion of the gentleman from Houlton, Mr. Robbins, that the House reconsider its action taken earlier this morning whereby the bill was recommitted to the Committee on Ways and Bridges.

As many as are in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Houlton will say aye; those opposed, no.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cape Elizabeth, Mr. Chase.

Mr. CHASE: Mr. Speaker, I have no objection to reconsideration if the understanding is that the bill thereupon will go on the table until this point has been cleared.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Limestone, Mr. Burgess.

Mr. BURGESS: Mr. Speaker, it is my purpose, if reconsideration prevails, to then move to table the bill and assign it for tomorrow morning.

The SPEAKER: Is the House ready for the question?

As many as are in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Houlton, Mr. Robbins, that the House reconsider its action whereby this bill was referred to the Committee on Ways and Bridges will please say aye; those opposed, no.

A viva voce vote being doubted, A division of the House was had.

The SPEAKER: Eighty-four having voted in the affirmative and ten having voted in the negative, the motion to reconsider prevails.

On motion by Mr. Burgess of Limestone, the bill was tabled and specially assigned for Wednesday, February 23rd.

The SPEAKER: The House is proceeding under Orders of the Day.

On motion by Mr. Faas, of Benton, the House voted to take from the table the thirteenth tabled and unassigned matter, Senate Report "Ought not to pass" of the Com-

mittee on Inland Fisheries and Game on Bill "An Act relating to Fishing and Hunting Licenses," tabled by that gentleman on February 16th, pending acceptance in concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Benton, Mr. Faas.

Mr. FAAS: Speaker Mr. Members of the House: I think that this measure was greatly misunderstood and it would mean considerable revenue to the State if it should pass because if there were a cruising outfit in the Big Woods up in our larger lake regions and they didn't have fishing licenses with them, they would be able to procure licenses at that time. Instead of the three day license, they would procure the regular license, and those who are interested in this particular item feel that the State would receive more revenue by having this become a law than to pass it by.

The SPEAKER: The question before the House is on the acceptance of the "Ought not to pass" report of the committee. The Chair understands that the gentleman from Benton, Mr. Faas, moves to substitute the bill for the report. As many as are in favor of the motion of the gentleman from Benton, Mr. Faas, to substitute the bill for the report of the committee will say aye; those opposed, no.

A viva voce vote being taken, the motion did not prevail and the "Ought not to pass" report of the committee was accepted in concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Nobleboro, Mr. Palmer.

Mr. PALMER: Mr. Speaker, I simply want to make the announcement to those of the members who have bills in the Revisor's office which have not yet been signed that they kindly check there each day to see if the bills are in form to be returned that they might sign their names on them so they can go on the calendar. If you do that, it will

expedite matters greatly and we can progress more rapidly.

On motion by Mr. Wight of Bangor, the House voted to take from the table the eighteenth tabled and unassigned matter Bill "An Act Relative to Prosecutions of Inland Pisheries and Game Laws to be Published" (S. P. 404) (L. D. 743), tabled by that gentleman on February 18, pending reference in concurrence. (In Senate referred to Committee on Judiciary.)
