Orders of the Day

Mr. Brewer of Aroostook was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate:

Mr. BREWER of Aroostook: Mr. President and members of the Senate, at the inception of this legislative session, I stated publicly, and it was the thought of the Appropriations Committee, that from time to time we would attempt to keep the members informed of the financial problems confronting them as well as to keep them informed of the work of the Appropriations Committee.

At this time I would like to give you a brief summary. I think with two days next week we will have heard all of the department heads and at the present time we are taking the budget as presented by the Governor and budget members as something to shoot at. There is nothing final in it but it is a starting point anyway.

We have got to make a starting point so let's go back to June 30, 1949. At the end of the last biennium our bills were paid, our taxes were collected and we had a sur-plus balance of a little over \$7,-100,000 for the year ending June 30th, and during the twelve months we used just under \$37,000,000 in the general fund and that included the \$2,000,000 we set aside for working capital. This year no one knows exactly just what our total expenditures will be but we have the Appropriation figures for the first six months and we believe that that figure will be not far from \$36,-000,000. So the 1949-1950 expenditures of \$37,000,000 and the current expenditures of \$36,000,000 add up to \$73,000,000 as a two year expenditure from general fund sources.

Actual income for the year 1949-50 was about \$32,350,000 and that

has all been audited and is a final figure. This year as we see it now the general fund income will add up to about \$33,300,000. That makes about \$65,650,000 as the total income for the two years. With the two year expense of \$73,000,000 and a two year income of \$65,650,000 there is a difference of \$7,350,000 so if we started with a surplus of \$7,100,000 it is perfectly evident that the surplus is gone and has been used to finance a spending level that is around three and a half million in excess of revenues from current income sources.

There is nothing very profound or very startling about these statements because it represents only another way of stating what is printed in the budget document. The Governor's budget adds up to a deficit of \$3,578,198 in the first year and \$4,127,365 the second year, or a two year deficit of about \$7.-700,000 to finance existing spending

laws.

In Appropriations Committee as of yesterday we have heard bills that total about \$30,000,000 per year and I can honestly tell the Senate that as long as existing spending statutes remain without substantial change, the committee cannot in good conscience even approach a balance between existing income and required expense. I cannot tell you whether the Governor's figure is a few hundred thousand dollars too high or a few hundred thousand too low but it cannot be too far from the \$7,700,000 deficit in the budget message. On top of this are the costs of such new expenditure bills as may have legislative approval. There are many of them and I note only a few, such as the Educational subsidy plan, supplemental appropriations for the University of Maine, any new Welfare or any of the other many new expenditure measures which have been or will be introduced before this legislature.

I know this isn't a cheerful picture to present at this time but as time goes on I will appreciate the opportunity to try to keep you as well informed as the Appropriations Committee is on this financial picture.

On motion by Mr. Leavitt of Cumberland, the Senate voted to take from the table bill, An Act Relating to Exemptions from Taxation (H. P. 336) (L. D. 194) tabled by that Senator on January 31 pending reference to a committee; and on further motion by the same Senator, the bill was referred to the Committee on Taxation in concurrence.

Crosby of Franklin Mr. was granted unanimous consent to address the Senate.

Mr. CROSBY of Franklin: Mr. President and members of the Senate, you have on your desks this morning a book put out by the Maine State Highway Commission giving a very comprehensive report of the accelerated highway program. This book contains maps of each county, the needs for highways in those counties and the priority of trucking on those highways. I would suggest that you give this very good book some thoughtful consideration to see how it affects the counties and your state as a whole.
