In compliance with Section 1 of Chapter 10 of the Revised Statutes,

I herewith report that Emile J. Pelletier of Van Buren, having been regularly nominated as a candidate for Representative to the Legislature from the class towns of Grand Isle and Van Buren at the Primaries of June 18, 1956 and having been elected at the regular biennial election held September 10, 1956 as a Representative to the Ninety-eighth Legislature from said legislative class, died on October 11, 1956, which death would create a vacancy is lative class.

I further report that a Special Election was held in the class towns of Grand Isle and Van Buren on December 3, 1956 to fill said vacancy in accordance with the provisions of Section 73 of Chapter 5 of the Revised Statutes and that Vital E. Violette of Van Buren, having received a plurality of votes cast in said election in the said class towns according to a canvass of the returns made by the Governor and Council under date of December 5, 1956, appears to have been elected a Representative to the Ninetyeighth Legislature.

For the purpose of ascertaining the presence of a quorum, a certified roll of the Representatives-elect was then called by the Clerk of the Ninety-seventh Legislature.

The elected membership of the House being 151, 145 members-elect having answered to their names, a quorum was found to be present.

Miss CORMIER of Rumford were appointed a committee to wait upon the Governor and inform him that a guarum of the members of

that a quorum of the members of the House of Representatives-elect had assembled in the Representatives' Hall and request his attendance to administer to them the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to enter upon the discharge of their official duties.

Mr. Rollins subsequently reported that the committee had discharged the duty assigned it, and the Governor was pleased to say that he would forthwith attend upon the Representatives-elect for the purpose of administering to them the oaths required by the Constitution.

Thereupon, His Excellency, Governor Edmund S. Muskie, attended by his Council, entered the Hall where he assumed the Chair, amid the applause of the House, the members-elect rising.

GOVERNOR MUSKIE: Mr. Clerk, Ladies and Gentlemen: It is a pleasure to be with you this morning, and on behalf of Mrs. Muskie and myself as well as Stephen, Ellen and Melinda, to welcome you to Augusta. We have, as you see, expanded the reception committee. Matter of fact I am tempted to suggest the newest arrival be at the Inaugural as she has the voice for it.

It is our pleasure to extend to you on behalf of all of us our sincere wishes for a satisfying and prosperous New Year.

We are here on serious business, business of the State and of our fellow citizens, and I am sure it will receive our concentrated attention and long hours of work on the part of all of us. At the same time, there is a social part of all of these Legislative Sessions to which Mrs. Muskie and I always look forward to as an opportunity to develop close associations and friendships which we will hold dear down through the years. Inasmuch as I am going to have your attention tomorrow, I am going to limit my remarks this morning and exercise that privilege which I have of administering the oath of office to you. Will you rise please?

The Governor then administered to the members-elect and they subscribed the oaths required by the Constitution to qualify them to discharge their official duties.

The Governor and his suite then retired amid the applause of the House, the members rising.

On motion of Mr. Bragdon of Perham,

Messrs. BRAGDON of Perham BEAN of Winterport BROWNE of Bangor CASWELL of New Sharon CURTIS of Bowdoinham ELWELL of Brooks JALBERT of Lewiston

were appointed a committee to receive, sort and count votes for the Speaker of the House.

On motion of Mr. Walsh of Brunswick, it was voted that the Committee cast one ballot for Honorable Joseph T. Edgar as Speaker of the House of Representatives of the Ninety-eighth Legislature.

Mr. Bragdon subsequently reported:

and thereupon Honorable Joseph T. Edgar was declared duly elected as Speaker of the House of the Ninetyeighth Legislature. (Applause)

On motion of Mr. Walsh of Brunswick, the vote was made unanimous.

Thereupon, Speaker Edgar was escorted to the rostrum by the gentleman from Brunswick, Mr. Walsh, where he assumed the Chair amid the applause of the House, the members rising.

The SPEAKER: Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: The circumstances under which I find myself bring to mind a story that my father often told me that I enjoyed very much, about a young actor making his first appearance on the Broadway Stage. He had a small part that consisted entirely of one line, but it was a very important part and in the course of the

play he was supposed to rush out on the stage and very dramatically announce that the Queen had swooned. The time came for the man to make his appearance on the stage all full of fire and zest and he rushed out, threw up his arms and announced that the Sween had Quooned. He realized that he wasn't right, and he tried again and he threw up his arms and announced that the Quoon had Sweened, and a long hook reached out and he was taken from the stage. I will do my best not to emulate that performance, but in the course of things if you hear me refer to the gentleman from Totman, Mr. Bangor, don't be surprised.

This being the 98th session of the Maine Legislature, it is probably safe to assume that on ninety-seven occasions someone has stood here under circumstances similar to those under which I am standing and has told a group such as you as to how grateful he felt for the honor conferred upon him, how humble he felt in the face of the responsibility which faced him, and he probably assured the group he would bend every effort to carry out the office of Speaker of the House to the very best of his ability.

In casting about in my own mind for words to express how I feel, I can find nothing better than the same words used ninety-seven times prior to today. I can assure you from the bottom of a very grateful heart I do thank you. I can also assure you with even more sincerity as I look ahead to this session and the responsibility which falls upon this House and the Speaker, I feel humbled indeed, and of course I don't think I have to say this, but I shall, that I will do everything in my power to conduct the office of the Speakership as it should be conducted, and in such a way to justify your confidence in me.

In assuming the Speakership of this House I have many ambitions for the House, but I have in particular two major ones. The first one is of course the production of the best possible legislation. I am not one of those who may be a bit unhappy over the increased bipartisan character of this House. I think it is a very happy situation. Those of you who know anything about the manufacture of fine steel know that fine steel and common ordinary iron consist of basically the same ingredients, but in the manufacture of fine steel those ingredients are subjected to terrific stresses and strains and pressures and treatments that are not given to the common iron, but because of those stresses and strains and pressures, the net product is fine quality steel that far surpasses the old iron, and it is with most things, including legislation.

There will be many issues come before this House because of the bipartisan character of this House. Those issues will be and should be subjected to many stresses and strains. They will be minutely dissected and hotly debated, but after all is said and done, I firmly believe we will have for all of our efforts and our troubles finer quality and a finer grade of legislation than we might otherwise have had.

My second major ambition for this House is for this House to acquire a reputation fully as good as, if not better than, the reputation acquired by this same House in the 97th Legislature. Those of you who were here two years ago, and some who were not, will recall the House two years ago was recognized as being one of the most orderly, most dignified and most integrious Houses in the history of the Maine Legislature. It was a pleasure to work with the group two years ago because the dignity of the position of being a Representative in the Legislature was appreciated by one and all, and one and all acted accordingly. To achieve this goal, the answer is relsimple. It is a matter atively of complete cooperation between the House and myself. We all know the House has established rules of conduct and order. Part of my job is to see they are strictly adhered to. I cannot do this unless you of your own volition cooperate with me in that respect. The rules are not burdensome, but by adhering to them, by the time this Legislature adjourns, this House I hope and trust will stand out as one of the finest the State of Maine has ever known.

Again let me thank you very, very

much for electing me Speaker, and we have a long agenda for today and we had better get on with the business. The Chair awaits the pleasure of the House.

The Chair recognizes the gentlewoman from Kittery, Mrs. Burnham.

Mrs. BURNHAM: Mr. Speaker, it is my privilege as the member from Kittery to present you this gavel made by Mr. Seegar, a former member of the House of Representatives. With it go sincere wishes for a harmonious House and Legislature.

The SPEAKER: Mrs. Burnham and Members of the House: It gives me of course a great deal of pleasure to accept this gavel, and I sincerely trust I shall be able to use it as well and as wisely as it has been made, and please extend the Chair's gratitude to the maker of the gavel. Thank you.

Thereupon, the Chairman of the Committee cast one ballot for Honorable Harvey R. Pease of Wiscasset as Clerk of the House and that gentleman was declared duly elected as Clerk of the House of the Ninety-eighth Legislature. (Applause)

At this time, a message was received from the Senate borne by Senator Woodcock that the Senate had been duly organized by the election of Honorable Robert N. Haskell as President, Chester T. Winslow as Secretary and Waldo Clark as Assistant Secretary, and that the Senate was ready to transact such business as might come before it.

In view of the decision of the Supreme Court to allow absentee ballots to be counted in spite of their illegality, I see no alternative but to concede to Mr. Morrill.

In taking this step I am taking into consideration the fact that, although certain irregularities have been brought to light in my district, the overwhelmingly republican house membership would not consider them. I hope legislation will be passed to remedy the conditions that exist today and that town officials will be instructed in the proper discharge of their duties to the end that we may have an honest election.
