Mr. Choate from the Committee on Business Legislation on Bill "An Act relating to Unfair Methods of Competition and Trade Practices" (H. P. 602) (L. D. 862) reported "Ought to pass" as amended by Committee Amendment "A" submitted therewith.

Report was read and accepted and the Bill read twice.

Committee Amendment "A" was read by the Clerk as follows:

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H. P. 602, L. D. 862, Bill, "An Act Relating to Unfair Methods of Competition and Trade Practices."

Amend said Bill by adding at the end thereof a new section 5, as follows:

"Sec. 5, R.S., c. 60, s 147, sub-s. III, additional. Section 147 of Chapter 60 of the Revised Statutes is hereby amended by adding a new subsection III, to read as follows:

'III. "Resident" includes a resident individual or organization of any type engaged in the business of insurance.'"

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H. P. 12, L. D. 21, Bill, "An Act Relating to Town Meetings of Sanford."

Amend said Bill by adding at the end thereof the following Referendum:

'Referendum; effective date; certificate to Secretary of State. This act shall take effect 90 days after adjournment of the Legislature, only for the purpose of permitting its submission to the legal voters of the Town of Sanford at any annual or special town meeting called and held for the purpose. Such special meeting shall be called, advertised and conducted according to the

law relating to municipal elections; provided that the selectmen shall not be required to prepare, nor the town clerk to post, a new list of voters, and for the purpose of registration of voters said selectmen shall be in session 2 hours next preceding such special meeting.

The town clerk shall reduce the subject matter of this act to the following question: "Shall the Act Relating to Town Meetings of Sanford, passed by the 99th Legislature, be accepted?" The voters shall indicate by a cross or check mark placed against the words "Yes" or "No" their opinion of the same.

This act shall take effect for all the purposes hereof immediately upon its acceptance by a majority of the legal voters voting at said meeting; provided the total number of votes cast for and against the acceptance of this act at said meeting equaled or exceeded 20% of the total vote cast for all candidates for Governor in said town at the next preceding gubernatorial election.

The result of the vote shall be declared by the municipal officers of the Town of Sanford and due certificate thereof shall be filed by the town clerk with the Secretary of State.

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H. P. 250, L. D. 361, Bill, "An Act Authorizing Forest Commissioner to Convey Interest of the State in Chase Island."

Amend said Bill in the 4th line by adding after the word "in" the words 'Vinalhaven, in'.

Further amend said Bill in the 6th, 7th and 8th lines by striking out the following words and punctuation: "; and said island shall be taxed under the provisions of the Revised Statutes of 1954, chapter 16, sections 78 to 85, and in no other way"

Committee Amendment "A" was read by the Clerk as follows:

COMMITTEE AMENDMENT "A" to H. P. 180, L. D. 251, Bill, "An Act Relating to Exemption from Taxation of Veterans Estates."

Amend said Bill by striking out the 5th, 6th and 7th lines and inserting in place thereof the following underlined words and punctuation:

"The exemption provided in this paragraph shall apply in its entirety to the domicile of such veteran when said property is held in joint tenancy with his wife, notwithstanding the provisions of subsection I."

Committee Amendment "A" was adopted and the Bill assigned for third reading tomorrow.

Mr. CALL: Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Call.

Mr. CALL: Mr. Speaker, I am sorry, I tried to get your attention before. I would like to ask a question through Mr. Williams, the gentleman from Hodgdon, on item sixteen, out of order, if I can, under suspension of the rules.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Call, with respect to item sixteen, Bill "An Act Authorizing Forest Commissioner to Convey Interest of the State in Chase Island, House Paper 250, Legislative Document 361, addresses a question through the Chair to the

gentleman from Hodgdon, Mr. Williams, and would the gentleman state his question?

Mr. CALL: What is the interest of the State in Chase Island, the words "Convey the Interest of the State in Chase Island"?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Hodgdon, Mr. Williams, may answer if he chooses.

Mr. WILLIAMS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: This island was a state-owned island in the beginning of the thing and then it was taken over by the Federal Government and I think there was the sum of a dollar mentioned one way or the other, and then they were through using it and they returned it to the State and the State used it for a recreation area for some of the hospitals. It wasn't too good an island for their business and they returned it back to the town and the town hopes to get some taxation. Actually the State had no interest in this island at all, it was vested in the Federal Government and now what this amendment does is try to return it to the Town of Vinalhaven so that they may be able to get some taxable property out of it.

Mr. BRAGDON: Mr. Speaker?

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Perham, Mr. Bragdon.

Mr. BRAGDON: Mr. Speaker, have we gone far enough on item seventeen so we would have to reconsider it if I asked a question on that one?

The SPEAKER: The motion to be in order should be for reconsideration of our action whereby we gave the bill its first two readings and we assigned it for third reading.

Mr. BRAGDON: If we have time for that, I would so move.

The SPEAKER: Did the gentleman make that motion?

Mr. BRAGDON: I do.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Perham, Mr. Bragdon, moves that the House reconsider its action whereby it assigned for third reading item number seventeen, Bill "An Act relating to Exemption from Taxation of Veterans Estates," House Paper 180, Legislative Document 251. Is there objection? The Chair hears none.

The Chair recognizes the same gentleman.

Mr. BRAGDON: I would like to direct this question through the Chair to Mr. Rollins, the gentleman from Belfast, as to whether or not this exemption, that is — has no regard to the value of the property of veterans. In other words, if it applies to an unlimited amount?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Perham, Mr. Bragdon, addresses a question through the Chair to the gentleman from Belfast, Mr. Rollins, who may answer if he so chooses.

Mr. ROLLINS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: That just clarifies the — the exemption is still \$3500, just the same as it is for all property, but there are so many properties owing to financing that has to be in husband and wife's name, joint tenancy, that's the reason for that. It clears it up so that if it is a domicile of the veteran, in that case it is acceptable as the exemption which is the usual \$3500 which is on all veteran's property.

The SPEAKER: Does the gentleman from Perham consider his question answered?

Mr. BRAGDON: Possibly I may misunderstand it. I assume that the \$3500 exemption applies to local taxation. I understood that this applied to the estates, taxation of the estates of veterans. Am I wrong?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Perham again addresses a question to the gentleman from Belfast who may answer if he chooses.

Mr. ROLLINS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: That applies only to the property, the domicile of the veteran, and has nothing to do with the state, it is local taxation.

Mr. BRAGDON: Mr. Speaker, it says "estates" in the bill. I am not entirely satisfied with that. Perhaps we can catch it later on.

The SPEAKER: The Chair has been advised that if the title of the bill is at all misleading and it may well be, one of the functions of the Committee on Bills in the Third Reading would be to clarify the title so as to eliminate any confusion by its wording.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Belfast, Mr. Rollins.

Mr. ROLLINS: I move the item lie on the table until tomorrow morning.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would inquire of the gentleman from Belfast whether or not he would be willing to allow the bill to have its third reading tomorrow and then if he wishes, table it. We are trying to avoid cluttering the table as much as possible.

Mr. ROLLINS: Mr. Speaker, I am perfectly willing.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Berwick, Mr. Mathews.

Mr. MATHEWS: Mr. Speaker, this is my bill and the original law does refer to estates of veterans, but this does apply to their real estate tax in the town, and has nothing to do with veterans' estates really although that is the way the original law reads.

The SPEAKER: What time does the House assign for the third reading of this Bill?

Thereupon, the Bill was assigned for third reading tomorrow.

Mr. EDWARDS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: The gentleman from Portland, Mr. Miller, wished me to convey a message to the members of the House that he desires that the House accept this committee's report "Ought to pass".

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Raymond, Mr. Edwards, moves that the House accept the "Ought to pass" Committee Report. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed, the Report was accepted and the Bill read twice.

Miss Cormier of Rumford offered House Amendment "A" and moved its adoption.

Mr. HAUGHN: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: You know you now have before you one of the major pieces of legislation for the 99th Legislature, and whereas I have just had reproduced a House Amendment and to give it further thought, I think it would be advisable to lay this on the table

for one more week and specially assign it for Tuesday next.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Bridgton, Mr. Haughn, moves that Bill "An Act Increasing Salary of Members of the Legislature" and the Committee Report be tabled and specially assigned for one week from today, March 17, pending acceptance of the Report. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed on a viva voce vote and the Bill and Report were so tabled.

The SPEAKER: The Chair now lays before the House item number two under tabled and today assigned matters, Bill "An Act Regulating Live Bait for Fishing", House Paper 109, Legislative Document 164, tabled on March 3 by the gentleman from Greenville, Mr. Harris, pending adoption of House Amendment "A"; and the Chair recognizes that gentleman.

Thereupon, on motion of Mr. Harris of Greenville, the Bill and House Amendment "A" were recommitted to the Committee on Inland Fisheries and Game and sent up for concurrence.

The SPEAKER: The Chair now lays before the House item number three under tabled and today assigned matters, Bill "An Act Enlarging Territorial Limits of West Paris Village Corporation," House Paper 619, Legislative Document 887, tabled on March 4 by the gentleman from Woodstock, Mr. Whitman, pending further consideration. In the House this Bill was referred to the Committee on Legal Affairs and in the Senate referred to the Committee on Towns and Counties in non-concurrence.

The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Woodstock, Mr. Whitman.

Mr. WHITMAN: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I have been informed that the reason for non-concurrence in this matter was strictly a matter of misunderstanding the content of the bill. For that reason I now move that the House insist.

The SPEAKER: With respect the Bill "An Act Enlarging Territorial Limits of West Paris Village Corporation" the gentleman from Woodstock, Mr. Whitman, now moves that the House insist on its former

action whereby it referred this bill to the Committee on Legal Affairs. Is this the pleasure of the House? The motion prevailed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair now lays before the House item number four under tabled and today assigned matters, An Act relating to Motor Vehicle Operator's Licenses, Senate Paper 184, Legislative Document 427, tabled on March 4 by the gentleman from Ellsworth, Mr. Brown, pending passage to be enacted.

On motion of Mr. Wade of Auburn, the Bill was retabled pending passage to be enacted and specially assigned for Thursday, March 12.

The SPEAKER: The Chair now lays before the House item number five under tabled and today assigned matters, House Report "Ought not to pass" of the Committee on Legal Affairs on Bill "An Act relating to Management and Powers of the Farmington Village Corporation", House Paper 357, Legislative Document 516, tabled on March 6 by the gentleman from New Sharon, Mr. Caswell, pending acceptance of the Report; and the Chair recognizes that gentleman.

Mr. CASWELL: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I now move that this Bill be recommitted to the Committee on Legal Affairs and I might add that they have expressed their willingness in the light of further information to have it returned.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from New Sharon, Mr. Caswell, now moves that Bill "An Act relating to the Management and Powers of the Farmington Village Corporation" and the Committee Report be recommitted to the Committee on Legal Affairs. Is this the pleasure of the House?

The motion prevailed, the Bill and Report were recommitted and sent up for concurrence.

Mr. Jacques of Lewiston presented the following Order out of order and moved its passage:

WHEREAS, St. Dominique's High School of Lewiston was the winner of the Maine State Championship Hockey Tournament and thereby will participate in the New England

Championship Tournament to be held March 19, 20 and 21;

BE IT ORDERED, that the members of the House of Representatives extend their congratulations to this team for its victory in the Maine State Championship;

AND BE IT FURTHER ORDERED, that the Clerk of the House be directed to send an attested copy of this Order to the St. Dominique's High School.

The Order was received out of order and under suspension of the rules, read and passed.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Freeport, Mr. Crockett.

Mr. CROCKETT: Mr. Speaker and Ladies and Gentleman of the House: I ask if Legislative Document 433 is still in possession of the House?

The SPEAKER: The Chair would advise the gentleman from Freeport, Mr. Crockett, that the "Ought not to pass" Report of the Committee on Fish and Game on Bill, "An Act relating to Sale of Fishing and Hunting Licenses", is in possession of the House.

Mr. CROCKETT: Thank you. Last Friday when this was entered into the record on the calender I happened not to be present at our Hall here. However, I believe this bill is worthy of reconsideration. I, therefore, ask that Legislative Document 433 be given reconsideration of the action taken last Friday.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Freeport, Mr. Crockett, moves that the House reconsider its action whereby it accepted the "Ought not to pass" Report on Bill "An Act relating to Sale of Fishing and Hunting Licenses".

The Chair recognizes the same gentleman.

Mr. CROCKETT: Mr. Speaker, may I speak on the question?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman may proceed.

Mr. CROCKETT: Ladies and Gentlemen of the House: This bill was introduced by me, by nobody else but me, I want that distinctly understood. It was a bill that came out of my own knowledge, working in this line of business, of catering to out of state hunters and fishermen.

The bill is designed to bring business into the State of Maine, and every dollar that a fisherman or a hunter spends in the State of Maine, the State receives three cents on that purchase. It has been estimated by good authority that it would bring in around sixty thousand dollars. Now, where can you pick up sixty thousand dollars any easier, and the good Lord knows we are here trying to pick it up without hurting anybody, particularly our own people that reside in the State of Maine.

I have seen — this is not going to work a hardship on any sportsman that comes to Maine to fish or hunt. The bill only calls for one thing, that he purchase his license in the State of Maine or through the State Agencies, which is D.E.D. The Department of Economic Development maintains a place in Rockefeller Center in New York where they can go in and purchase their hunting and fishing license from a State Agency, or they can mail in, or wait until they get to Maine. I assure you that nobody will keep away from the State of Maine that come here to hunt and fish simply because they have to purchase their license in the State of Maine.

Now, by purchasing their license in the State of Maine, they call upon a businessman, whether he is a large businessman or a small businessman, they come in there and buy their license from him. He receives twenty-five cents for issuing the license to him, but of every dollar they spend while they are in this establishment buying their license, the State will receive three cents in return on that purchase.

It is a bill that is designed, as I said before, to help the State of Maine. You and I know that not a sportsman in the country will keep away, their minds are made up to come to Maine to fish and hunt, and simply because they have got to buy their license here in Maine, it will help out the little fellow, the small sporting goods house, the clothing man and so on. I have seen myself, five and six hunters and fishermen come into store after store to buy their license. While they are there, two of them have got their license, the other two or three haven't got their license. The man that had his license buys nothing.

The man that didn't have his license will buy his equipment such as clothing or fishing tackle, flies, or what have you, that a sportsman uses.

I say it is a bill that should be considered by us people here. We are sent here for a purpose. If we can get a little easy money, let's do it. The good Lord knows that is what we need. I ask you to support this bill, reconsider it, and see what happens in the other end of the House. I ask you to report this bill here and go along with me, and I can assure you that it will be greatly appreciated. It is a bill designed to better the small businessman in the State of Maine. When the vote is taken, Mr. Speaker, I ask for a section vote.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Greenville, Mr. Harris.

Mr. HARRIS: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: This bill came out of the Committee unanimous "Ought not to pass". The reason we felt that way is that there are 121 outside the State Agency selling these non-resident licenses, such as Macy's, Abercrombie & Fitch, Wanamakers. They sold last year approximately twenty thousand non-resident hunting and fishing licenses. We figured that they were good publicity agents for the State of Maine. For example, a man goes into a store and doesn't know just where he wants to go hunting, and he decides he might want to come to Maine, if the clerk told him that they couldn't sell him a license, after that he might change his mind. Possibly the clerk might recommend his going to New Hampshire. So we felt that this bill should not receive passage, and I hope the move to reconsider does not prevail.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Freeport, Mr. Crockett.

Mr. CROCKETT: Mr. Speaker, in rebuttal to that, there is a little discrepancy in the amount of licenses sold by the 121 out of state non-resident sellers of licenses. I have here a letter in my hand from the Department of Inland Fisheries and Game. It is not twenty thousand licenses that are sold by the 121 so-called agents, it is 13,970. The total amount of out-of-state licenses sold for fishing and hunting in the State

is 103,071. Do you think it is going to keep away any part of those 13,000? Because they love Maine and they know we have the best hunting and fishing in New England, and they are coming to Maine.

Don't let anybody sell you a bill of goods like that. I have had the experience, I know what I am talking about.

The SPEAKER: Is the House ready for the question?

The question before the House is the motion of the gentleman from Freeport, Mr. Crockett, that the House reconsider its action whereby it accepted the "Ought not to pass" Report on Bill, "An Act relating to Sale of Fishing and Hunting Licenses", House Paper 286, Legislative Document 433. The gentleman from Freeport has requested a division.

Will all those who favor the motion to reconsider, please rise and remain standing until the monitors have made and returned the count.

A division of the House was had.

Thirty-eight having voted in the affirmative and seventy-two having voted in the negative, the motion did not prevail.

The SPEAKER: The House is proceeding under Orders of the Day.

On motion of the gentleman from Milo, Mr. Brockway, the House voted to take from the table the fifth tabled and unassigned matter, Bill "An Act Repealing the Bounty on Porcupine", House Paper 309, Legislative Document 1164, tabled on March 6 by that gentleman pending reference to a Committee.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Milo, Mr. Brockway.

Mr. BROCKWAY: Mr. Speaker, I more this item be referred to the Committee on Agriculture.

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Milo, Mr. Brockway, moves that this matter be referred to the Committee on Agriculture. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I feel as though this bill has been very properly committed to the right Committee, this being a fish and game matter, and it should be heard by the Fish and Game Committee, and

therefore I hope the motion does not prevail.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Call.

Mr. CALL: Mr. Speaker, who pays the bounty, which department?

The SPEAKER: The gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Call, addresses a question through the Chair to the gentleman from Milo, Mr. Brockway, who may answer if he chooses.

Mr. BROCKWAY: I am not able to answer that, sir.

The SPEAKER: The Chair would request of any member of the House who can answer the question to advise the gentleman. The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker, it is paid out of the dog tax fee, but it comes under sportsmen's regulations a good deal I would think. It is mostly sportsmen that kill them and it is quite a nuisance to the town treasurer who has to count the porcupine feet, and when the ground is frozen as hard as it was this winter it is quite a job to bury them.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Cumberland, Mr. Call.

Mr. CALL: Mr. Speaker, two or three of these gentleman are reluctant to get up, but they tell me that it is paid by the Agricultural Department, from the dog tax money and through the Agricultural Department.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Guilford, Mr. Dodge.

Mr. DODGE: Mr. Speaker, I can't recognize porcupines as being a game animal. I think the Agricultural Department could tell us more about the damage they do than anyone else.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Hope, Mr. Hardy.

Mr. HARDY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: I feel that rather than assign this where it was, the Agricultural Department is the place for it in that it definitely was an agricultural thing to begin with, they were getting corn or squashes or blueberries and what have you to a great extent, and I

feel this is one of the great reasons that the bounty was put on originally.

The SPEAKER: Is the House ready for the question? The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Milo, Mr. Brockway.

Mr. BROCKWAY: Mr. Speaker and Members of the House: My reason for asking to have this referred to the Committee on Agriculture is that the porcupines do a lot of damage to agricultural products, and not only crops growing but we have a lot of trouble with porcupines with cattle. Cattle being curious, if a porcupine comes into the pasture they very likely will go along and stick their nose on him and then we are in trouble. And in view of that fact and in view of the fact that it is handled by the Department of Agriculture, the bounties, I think it should be Agriculture.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the gentleman from Enfield, Mr. Dudley. The House will please remain in order.

Mr. DUDLEY: Mr. Speaker and Members: I hate to annoy you with such a small piece of legislation but an awful lot of sportsmen, at least two that I know, feel that this poor little animal that anybody can catch saved their life. One fellow stayed in the woods three days and he says if it hadn't been for the porcupine

he wouldn't be alive. He feels as though this porcupine so-called is the means of his being still alive, and he feels very strongly that we are destroying an animal that we shouldn't. People are annoyed, I think, to think that they have to pay a tax on their dog, which in some families is a member of the family, to take care of this bounty. It doesn't make too much difference where it goes, but when it finally comes up I think it should be defeated, we shouldn't pay it.

The SPEAKER: Is the House ready for question? The question before the House is the motion of the gentleman from Milo, Mr. Brockway, that Bill "An Act Repealing the Bounty on Porcupine" House Paper 809, Legislative Document 1164, be referred to the Committee on Agriculture. Will those who favor the motion to refer the Bill to the Committee on Agriculture please say aye; those opposed, no.

Thereupon, on a viva voce vote the Bill was referred to the Committee on Agriculture and sent up for concurrence.
