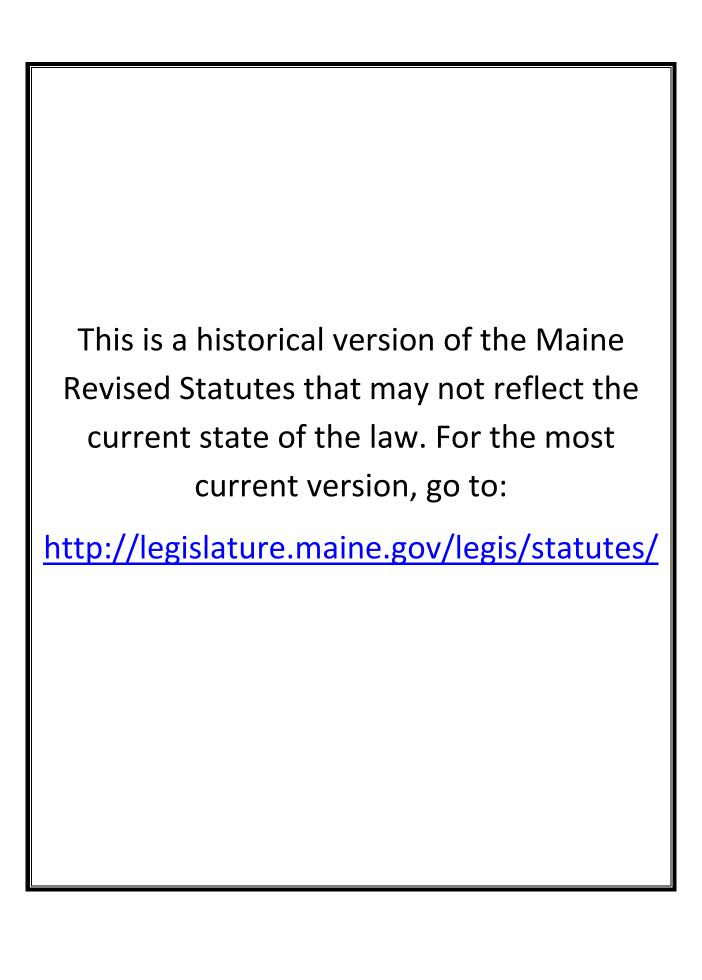

CHAPTER 1

BOWLING, POOL AND SHOOTING GALLERIES

§ 1. Unlicensed alleys and billiard rooms

Whoever keeps a bowling alley, shooting gallery, pool, bagatelle or billiard room without a license forfeits \$10 for each day that such alley, gallery or room is so kept.

§ 2. Licenses

Municipal officers of towns may license suitable persons to keep bowling alleys, shooting galleries, pool, bagatelle and billiard rooms therein, in any place where it will not disturb the peace and quiet of a family, for which the person licensed shall pay \$10 to such town. Such licenses expire on the first day of May after they are granted, unless sooner revoked.

§ 3. Minors on premises

A licensee, maintaining and operating a bowling alley, shooting gallery, pool, bagatelle or billiard room, who permits a minor to remain in or on his premises after having been forbidden to do so in writing by the minor's parent or guardian shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine of not more than \$100 or by imprisonment for not more than 11 months.
