REPORT.

LAND OFFICE, DEC. 31, 1846.

To the Governor and Executive Council of the State of Maine:

I have the honor herewith to submit this, my annual report, together with the accompanying account and schedules showing the operations of this department during the past year.

I have sold of settling land 732 acres, and received therefor \$183 15 in cash, being one quarter of the amount required, the remaining three quarters being receivable in labor upon the roads. See schedule marked A.

Of lands once sold and reverted to the State, I have sold 16,230 acres for the sum of \$6,098 98. See schedule marked B.

I have also, of the lands held in common with Massachusetts, sold 70,920 acres for the sum of \$49,292 50 one half of which is receivable by Maine. See schedule marked C.

During the two past seasons there have been expended on roads in the County of Aroostook by Maine and Massachusetts, about seven thousand six hundred dollars, and by Maine alone, fifteen hundred dollars.

The legislature at its last session made provision for the repair of the Houlton and Baring road, the Military road, the State road through Baileyville, the Canada road, and the road from Brighton to Moosehead lake. I thought it expedient to make some repairs on the three first mentioned roads last fall, reserving, however, the larger portion of the money to be expended early in the ensuing season. On the two latter roads nothing was done, and it is intended to have the work commenced as soon as the proper season

for road making arrives. The amount unexpended will be sufficient for the repair of the Military road for the coming season, unless some injury should be done by the spring freshet, and but a small appropriation will be needed for the year following.

The Aroostook road has been well repaired by John Rollins, Esq., for the two States, as far as Masardis, at a cost of \$1,321 50.

The road from the Machias on the Aroostook to the Presque Isle, has been improved by an expenditure of \$1000 00 under the superintendence of Nathaniel Blake, Esq., which is also charged to the two States. These two sums are all that have been expended on roads during the past year on the joint account of Maine and Massachusetts.

Maine and Massachusetts own in common within the limits of the County of Aroostook, thirty four townships of surveyed land, and about one million two hundred thousand acres of unsurveyed land.

This State owns in severalty thirty townships north of Monument line, in five of which there are flourishing settlements, and a few inhabitants are to be found in five or six others.

Massachusetts owns about the same quantity as Maine, although much of hers is under contract of sale, yet she retains the fee, and therefore it is not taxable. By reference to the tax act of 1846, it will be seen that there are but three small tracts north of the Aroostook river taxed, and with the exception of the Madawaska settlement it is all that is taxable. South of the river and north of the Monument line there are about forty-five townships, and only one half taxable.

It will be perceived that if good roads add to the value of lands, Maine and Massachusetts may well be expected to improve the roads in that section of the country, and they cannot be made by the inhabitants.

In 1832, an arrangement was entered into by Maine and Massachusetts, authorizing the Agents of the two States to expend ten per cent. of the receipts for land and timber, in making improvements on the public lands.

The difficulties growing out of the British claim to the territory

on and north of the Aroostook river, prevented for a time any expenditure north of the Aroostook, and since the settlement of our border difficulties, Massachusetts has not been disposed to allow of an expenditure such as the resolve of 1832 and sound policy would alike justify.

When we consider the increased value that a good road to the St. John river would give to the immense body of public land in that region, can there be a doubt that it would be for the interest of the State to make a good road from the Aroostook river through to Fort Kent on the St. John?

In making the arrangement in 1832, Massachusetts was undoubtedly actuated by a sense of justice to us, as well as of sound policy in the management of her property in the lands within this State, and it is confidently believed that if proper representations be made to her legislature, she will continue to do justice to herself and to us. I cannot doubt that a liberal appropriation for the improvement of the Fish river road, and the road from letter F, range 2, to the St. John river, may be profitably made if we look only to the increased value of the public lands.

For all the larger expenditures which have been made on the roads in that part of the country, the public treasury has I believe received fourfold return.

There is another view of the matter which must not be forgotten. By the settlement of our boundary line we have withdrawn from foreign jurisdiction two thousand people residing on the banks of the St. John, having no natural channel of communication with the people of this State, more than eighty miles from the shire town of their county, and the intervening space mostly a wilderness owned by Maine and Massachusetts.

No man who has been amongst these people and understands their situation, would hesitate to say that they must have a road to connect them with other parts of the State.

The lumbering operations on the St. John and Aroostook rivers have been very unsuccessful. Permits were obtained early in the summer of 1845, at excessively high rates of stumpage, under a

mistaken idea of the value of timber, owing to a temporary rise before the cutting of that year had reached the market. of that year it was found that there was a large overstock of timber on hand which could not be sold at remunerating prices. ations had been made however, for extensive operations in the winter of 1846, which could not be abandoned without ruinous losses; the lumbermen therefore pursued their business, hoping by increased industry and economy to carry through their operations without suffering so severe a loss as must accompany an abandon-An unexpected rise in those articles of ment of their business. subsistence largely used by lumbermen, and in the price of labor, added to their difficulties, which was followed by unusual storms in the month of March, putting an entire stop to the hauling of timber about one month earlier than usual. A further consequence of those early rains was to carry off the snow before the ice had left the streams and lakes, and when the season of driving timber arrived, the want of water doubled and in some instances quadrupled the expense, and in many cases rendered it impossible to run the timber to market. The troubles of the lumbermen did not stop here; freights rose to an unprecedented hight, which, combined with the low prices of timber in Europe (the only market for this timber) made it impossible for the holders to pay stumpage and ship their The only prudent course seemed to timber to a foreign market. be to let it lay over, and by not making any new timber, wait for an improved market. This course was generally adopted, and the timber was generally supposed to be safe in the "ponds" at St. John city, but an unheard of storm which occurred late last fall, broke up the rafts of timber in the ponds, heretofore considered safe depositories, and scattered much of the timber in the Bay of Fundy, resulting in a loss of timber to an extent not yet known, (but it is hoped not very considerable,) and in serious expenses in securing it.

Under all these circumstances it is apprehended that the amount of stumpage which they have contracted to pay cannot be collected, but it is believed that a fair rate of stumpage may now be obtained without difficulty, if the Agent of this State should be authorized to co-operate with the Agent of Massachusetts in settling with the operators upon fair and equitable terms.

No surveys of the undivided lands have been made during the past season; the last survey was made in 1845, but the plans and field notes were not returned until after the settlement of the accounts of that year, therefore the expenses of that survey appear in the accounts of this year. Arrangements are making to survey a portion of the territory on the Allagash river early in the ensuing season.

I have paid into the treasury during the past year forty-nine thousand six hundred and sixty dollars, being an amount much less than was anticipated, but owing mainly to the total failure to collect the stumpage for timber cut on the St. John waters, this being one of the principal sources from which the revenue of this department is derived.
