

#### REPORT.

LAND OFFICE, December 1, 1862.

To the Governor and Council of Maine:

I have the honor to submit this, my Annual Report, which, with the accompanying accounts and schedules, will exhibit the operations of the Land Department the present year.

I have expended under resolves passed prior to 1862, on the

I appointed as agents to expend these appropriations, Seward Dill of Phillips, W. E. Morse and D. G. Cook, 14 R. 3, Ferdinand Tincker of Calais, Thomas Carle, Princeton, Daniel Randall, 4 R. 4, Robert B. Campbell, Haynesville, and A. S. Richards of Van Buren.

I would respectfully renew the suggestion made in my report of last year, that the bridge at the Forks of the Mattawamkeag river on the Military road is unsafe for transportation of heavy loads, and for passengers by stage. There is considerable travel over this route, and it is feared that the bridge may fall, unless measurements.

ures shall be taken soon to secure it by rebuilding, and thus making it suitable for necessary purposes.

I have reason to believe that the proprietors of lands in the Township in which this bridge is situated, would unite with the State in suitably repairing it, or in building a new one, as may be thought most desirable.

The principal roads in Aroostook county, by reason of the rapid increase of population, have become self-sustaining, with the exception of the Aroostook road, leading through the westerly section of the county, and over which is conveyed the United States Mail to Fort Kent. Sections of this road lead through lands owned by the State where the settlements are sparse, and during the inclement seasons of the year, serious inconvenience is felt by the inhabitants, from the fact that they must rely on transient instead of regular travel for keeping it in a passable condition. This is especially the case during the winter season, unless the lumbering business is prosperous, thereby creating regular travel.

Mr. Joseph Parker, an energetic citizen, has done much to promote the comfort of settlers along this road during the winter season, and by his perseverance has kept the road open while it would have been closed, but for the extensive business done by him in transporting such goods as are necessary to supply the wants of the inhabitants.

The land upon some sections of this road is not of the best quality for settlement, but it is important that communication be kept open, not only for the prompt conveyance of the mails, but also for the purpose of preventing any decrease of population that might be occasioned by the suspension of business along its course.

I would recommend that some appropriation be made with reference to the interests of this part of Aroostook County.

Under resolves of 1859, payments required on securities in the Land Office, have been made in most cases in compliance with the provisions of said resolves, and the amount paid into the Treasury from all sources is \$23,577.27.

The resolve of last year, extending payment of one-half the sum due from certain parties to Sept. 1, 1863, has lessened the receipts anticipated the present year, \$11,649.93. This sum will be paid Sept. 1, 1863.

By resolve of March 11, 1859, payment of all notes due the State for lands sold, was required to be made, one-third annually for the three years, ending on the first day of September, 1860, 1861 and 1862, respectively; and in default of payment, the lands for which the notes were given, were declared forfeited to the State. "Schedule A" contains a list of all such notes now remaining unpaid, together with the lands for which the notes were given. By the terms of the resolve, said lands have become forfeited, but in order to revest the title in the State, it is necessary that further proceedings should be had by information as provided in chapter 93 of the Revised Statutes. It is suggested that the Legislature should direct the Attorney General to take the necessary steps to perfect the title of the State to all such lands, agreeably to the provisions of section 2 of that chapter.

Under resolve of June 23, 1849, the Land Agent was authorized to release certain persons named therein from their notes, upon receiving payment in part, and a release by them of their interest in the lands for which the notes were given in full for the balance. The Land Agent was, however, to retain the notes to uphold the title. The transaction thus authorized was perfected soon after the resolve was passed, but the notes have continued to be reported in the annual reports of the Land Agent as notes on hand. A similar state of facts exists respecting certain other notes authorized to be cancelled by resolve of March 20, 1858, which transaction was also closed soon after the passage of the resolve.

The amount of these notes in all, being \$22,564.73, constituted so much of the \$69,676.89, returned in my last report under item of "notes on hand." As these notes are no longer assets, but are in fact paid, they have been omitted from the list in the annexed schedules.

It may be an appropriate feature of my report, to allude to the location and character of some of our settling lands. The first five ranges embrace the larger portion of lands well adapted to settlement; and within a radius of twenty-five miles from Presque Isle, there are several townships that within a brief period have become the abode of an industrious and thriving population. Twelve R. 3, and 12 R. 4, are favorably located on the leading thoroughfare and mail route between the eastern and western sections of the county. A road leading from the town of Lyndon through townships 14 R. 3, and 14 R. 4, and ultimately to connect with the Fish River Road, will open some valuable lands for settlement, and bring the thriving town of Washburn, with its superior water power, in proximity with the other settlements on the same road.

Maysville, Eaton Grant, Plymouth Grant, C R. 1, and E R. 1, called Limestone Plantation, have an excellent soil and have been largely settled. Presque Isle, Lyndon, Fort Fairfield, Masardis and Ashland have a history in Aroostook enterprise so familiar to all as to need only a passing notice.

In the southern section of the county, 3 R. 5, now Sherman, and 4 R. 4, (Island Falls,) compare favorably with those already mentioned. In 4 R. 4, bridges have been erected over several branches of the Mattawamkeag, and mills are in process of construction for the convenience of the inhabitants. A road is nearly completed, leading from Patten and Sherman through the Island Falls settlement to Houlton, and passing through 5 R. 3, another State township which has also received valuable accessions of settlers. This route will shorten the distance to Houlton, (the shire town of the county,) several miles, save the tedious journey over the Military road as now travelled, and stimulate the settlement of the towns through which it passes.

In thus alluding to the more prominent towns and settlements in Aroostook, it has not been my purpose to institute invidious comparisons, but rather to call attention to a few facts indicating the progress of the county, and to commend the energy and enterprise as a whole of the people who are doing so much to develop its resources and give it the character that belongs to the older sections of the State.

The interests of Aroostook have been unfavorably affected by the war, which has drawn largely upon the stalwart men of that county and suspended to a very considerable extent the lumber business, from which many of the people residing there have derived their chief support. But instead of being discouraged by this temporary drawback, the people thus affected have mastered their position by directing their energies for the time being in other channels, and devoting their surplus produce, formerly used in their lumber operations, to a more extensive raising of stock for the western markets. I am assured that considerable business has been done in this direction during the season just closing, and I see no reason why it may not be so increased as to become at no distant day, a source of large revenue to the people of that county.

In my last Annual Report I had occasion to speak approvingly of the system of permits to cut timber on the public lands. seen nothing since in the workings of the department to modify my views as then expressed, but a great deal to strengthen and confirm them. As a means of increasing the revenue to the State Treasury, I can see no policy so simple and so effectual. act of March, 1860, should therefore, in my judgment, be continued in full force and vigor, and if need be, its terms made more liberal to those responsible parties who may be disposed to engage in extensive operations on the public lands. Under this act permits have been granted in a few cases, and application made for others to be closed, upon compliance by the parties with the conditions of the resolve. If the season shall prove favorable for lumbering operations, something may be looked for from this source, but so long as the depressed condition of the timber market at St. John shall continue, the State will not realize to the extent anticipated under the provisions of the act. It is only necessary to allude to the almost total prostration, during the last two years, of the general lumber trade, to suggest the cause of the small receipts which have accrued to the Treasury from this source. On the return of peace to our country, and the consequent revival of business, I cannot doubt that a handsome sum will be realized annually from the system of judiciously permitting the public timber.

Some well digested and enlarged system of this kind is made the more necessary in view of the fact that no portion of the public lands stands any longer pledged to the construction of the Aroostook Railroad. The grant of lands to that enterprise by the act of March 8, 1861, was made contingent upon the city of Bangor loaning its credit in aid of the same object, and the city having refused to do so by special vote on the 19th day of March last,

the act became, by that very fact, null and void. The lands therefore, have returned to the unrestricted ownership of the State, and it is of course desirable that a policy shall be adopted in regard to them which will yield the largest revenue to the Treasury, and at the same time contribute most substantially to the weal of that interesting and important section, where the most valuable portions of these lands are located.

While the failure or postponement of the railroad enterprise has disappointed many, it is gratifying to observe that the inhabitants of the Aroostook section have seldom had a more prosperous year than that which has just closed. Labor has been in demand at highly remunerative prices; the crops have been most abundant and varied, and the whole community give evidence of contentment and prosperity. It can hardly be expected that there will be any considerable increase of population in that region during the continuance of the war, but when our unhappy civil contest shall have closed and peace once more reigns throughout all our borders, we may confidently anticipate a large accession of enterprising settlers. The salubrious climate and fertile soil of Aroostook present a field of rare attraction to the emigrant in search of a home; and with each year's added proof of the rich resources of that region, we may reasonably expect it to secure an enhanced share of popular attention.

A continuance of the same liberal treatment towards the settlers that has thus far so uniformly distinguished our public policy, will insure to our State in due season, a very rich return—in the growth of a wealthy, intelligent and enterprising community on our north eastern border.
