REPORT.

The Joint Special Committee to which was referred an order relating to the State Government observing by appropriate public exercises, the 23d day of February, (Sunday being the 22d,) instant, report the following :

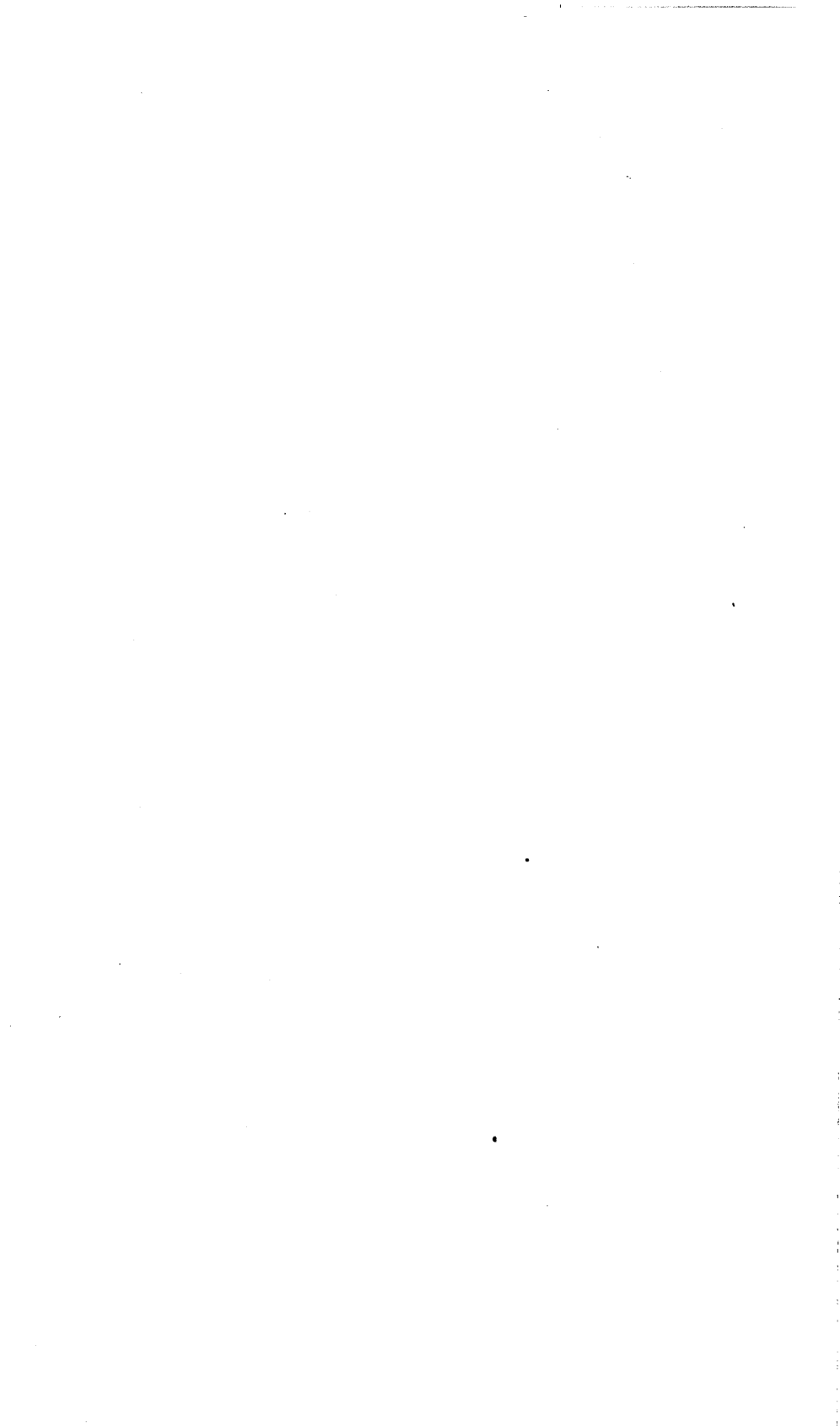
That the two branches of the Legislature meet at their usual hour on that day, and at half past eleven o'clock the Senate repair to the Hall of the House of Representatives ; that the Governor, Council and Heads of Departments, and all other good citizens, be requested to repair also to the Hall of the House at the above named time ; that the Governor be requested to take the Chair, and that Parson J. H. Ingraham be requested to open the meeting by prayer ; that the Governor submit such remarks as he may deem proper and suitable ; that the Farewell Address of Washington be read by the Clerk of the House of Representatives ; that the Adjutant General be requested to fire a National Salute at sunrise, noon and sunset, in front of the Capitol ; that the bells of the city of Augusta be rung a half hour at sunrise, noon and sunset ; that the Governor call upon such gentlemen as he may think proper to address the assembly.
