STATE OF MAINE.

IN THE YEAR OF OUR LORD ONE THOUSAND EIGHT HUNDRED AND SIXTY-FIVE.

AN ACT to authorize the trustees of Farmington Academy to obtain a loan of money for the completion of a building erected by them for a normal school, and give security therefor in a mortgage of real estate.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows :

SECTION 1. The trustees of Farmington Academy
2 are hereby authorized to obtain a loan of money suffi-
3 cient to complete the building recently erected by them
4 for a normal school in the town of Farmington, and to
5 give the note or notes, bond or bonds, of the corpora-
6 tion therefor, secured by a mortgage of their real es-
7 tate, executed by them in their corporate capacity.

SECT. 2. This act shall have effect on its approval
2 by the governor.
