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CENSUSES OF THE UNITED STATES.

The census is taken in the United States in obedience to the Constitution, which commands that an actual enumeration or census shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the Congress, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as Congress shall by law direct. Under our system of government, the census is of more importance in the United States than in most other countries, because representation in Congress and direct taxes are apportioned according to *numbers* in the States.

CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

WE, the people of the United States, in order to form a more perfect union, establish justice, insure domestic tranquillity, provide for the common defence, promote the general welfare, and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America.

ARTICLE I.

SECTION 1. All legislative powers herein granted shall be vested in a congress of the United States, which shall consist of a senate and house of representatives.

SECT. 2. The house of representatives shall be composed of members chosen every second year by the people of the several States, and the electors in each State shall have the qualifications requisite for electors of the most numerous branch of the state legislature.

No person shall be a representative who shall not have attained to the age of twenty-five years, and been seven years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that State in which he shall be chosen.

Representatives and direct taxes shall be apportioned among the several States which may be included within this Union, according to their respective numbers, which shall be determined by adding to the whole number of free persons, including those bound to service for a term of years, and excluding Indians not taxed, three-fifths of all other persons. The actual enumeration shall be made within three years after the first meeting of the congress of the United States, and within every subsequent term of ten years, in such manner as they shall by law direct. The number of representatives shall not exceed one for every thirty thousand, but each State shall have at least one representative; and until such enumeration shall be made, the State of New Hampshire shall be entitled to choose three, Massachusetts eight, Rhode Island and Providence Plantations one, Connecticut five, New York six, New Jersey four, Pennsylvania eight, Delaware one, Maryland six, Virginia ten, North Carolina five, South Carolina five, and Georgia three.

When vacancies happen in the representation from any State, the executive authority thereof shall issue writs of election to fill such vacancies.

The house of representatives shall choose their speaker and other officers, and shall have the sole power of impeachment.

SECT. 3. The senate of the United States shall be composed of two senators from each State, chosen by the legislature thereof, for six years; and each senator shall have one vote.

Immediately after they shall be assembled in consequence of the first election, they shall be divided as equally as may be into three classes. The seats of the senators of the first class shall be vacated at the expiration of the second year; of the second class, at the expiration of the fourth year; and of the third class, at the expiration of the sixth year; so that one-third may be chosen every second year; and if vacancies happen, by resignation or other-

wise, during the recess of the legislature of any State, the executive thereof may make temporary appointments until the next meeting of the legislature, which shall then fill such vacancies.

No person shall be a senator who shall not have attained to the age of thirty years, and been nine years a citizen of the United States, and who shall not, when elected, be an inhabitant of that State for which he shall be chosen.

The vice-president of the United States shall be president of the senate, but shall have no vote, unless they be equally divided.

The senate shall choose their other officers, and also a president pro tempore in the absence of the vice-president, or when he shall exercise the office of president of the United States.

The senate shall have the sole power to try all impeachments. When sitting for that purpose, they shall be on oath or affirmation. When the president of the United States is tried, the chief justice shall preside; and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present.

Judgment in cases of impeachment shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold and enjoy any office of honor, trust, or profit under the United States; but the party convicted shall nevertheless be liable and subject to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment, according to law.

SECT. 4. The times, places, and manner of holding elections for senators and representatives, shall be prescribed in each State by the legislature thereof; but the congress may at any time by law make or alter such regulations, except as to the places of choosing senators.

The congress shall assemble at least once in every year, and such meeting shall be on the first Monday in December, unless they shall by law appoint a different day.

SECT. 5. Each house shall be the judge of the elections, returns, and qualifications of its own members, and a majority of each shall constitute a quorum to do business, but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may be authorized to compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner, and under such penalties as each house may provide.

Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member.

Each house shall keep a journal of its proceedings, and from time to time publish the same, excepting such parts as may, in their judgment, require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journal.

Neither house, during the session of congress, shall, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than three days, nor to any other place than that in which the two houses shall be sitting.

SECT. 6. The senators and representatives shall receive a compensation for their services, to be ascertained by law, and paid out of the treasury of the United States. They shall, in all cases, except treason, felony, and breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at the session of their respective houses, and in going to and returning from the same; and for any speech or debate in either house, they shall not be questioned in any other place,

No senator or representative shall, during the time for which he

was elected, be appointed to any civil office under the authority of the United States, which shall have been created, or the emoluments whereof shall have been increased during such time; and no person holding any office under the United States shall be a member of either house during his continuance in office.

SECT. 7. All bills for raising revenue shall originate in the house of representatives; but the senate may propose or concur with amendments as on other bills.

Every bill which shall have passed the house of representatives and the senate, shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the president of the United States; if he approve he shall sign it, but if not he shall return it with his objections to that house in which it shall have originated, who shall enter the objections at large on their journal, and proceed to reconsider it. If after such reconsideration two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass the bill, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall likewise be reconsidered; and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall become a law. But, in all such cases, the votes of both houses shall be determined by yeas and nays; and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill shall be entered on the journal of each house respectively. If any bill shall not be returned by the president within ten days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, the same shall be a law, in like manner as if he had signed it, unless the congress, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall not be a law.

Every order, resolution, or vote to which the concurrence of the senate and the house of representatives may be necessary (except on a question of adjournment), shall be presented to the president of the United States, and, before the same shall take effect, shall be approved by him, or, being disapproved by him, shall be re-passed by two-thirds of the senate and house of representatives, according to the rules and limitations prescribed in the case of a bill.

SECT. 8. The congress shall have power,—To lay and collect taxes, duties, imposts, and excises, to pay the debts, and provide for the common defence and general welfare, of the United States; but all duties, imposts, and excises shall be uniform throughout the United States;—To borrow money on the credit of the United States;—To regulate commerce with foreign nations, and among the several States, and with the Indian tribes;—To establish a uniform rule of naturalization, and uniform laws on the subject of bankruptcies, throughout the United States;—To coin money, regulate the value thereof and of foreign coin, and fix the standard of weights and measures;—To provide for the punishment of counterfeiting the securities and current coin of the United States;—To establish post-offices and post-roads;—To promote the progress of science and useful arts, by securing for limited times, to authors and inventors the exclusive right to their respective writings and discoveries;—To constitute tribunals inferior to the supreme court;—To define and punish piracies and felonies committed on the high seas, and offenses against the law of nations;—To declare war, grant letters of marque and reprisal, and make rules concerning captures on land and water;—To raise and support armies; but no appropriation of money to that use shall be for a longer term than two years;—To provide and maintain a navy;—To make rules

for the government and regulation of the land and naval forces;—To provide for calling forth the militia to execute the laws of the Union, suppress insurrections and repel invasions;—To provide for organizing, arming, and disciplining the militia, and for governing such part of them as may be employed in the service of the United States, reserving to the States respectively the appointment of the officers, and the authority of training the militia according to the discipline prescribed by congress;—To exercise exclusive legislation in all cases whatsoever over such district (not exceeding ten miles square) as may, by cession of particular States, and the acceptance of congress, become the seat of the government of the United States; and to exercise like authority over all places purchased by the consent of the legislature of the State in which the same shall be, for the erection of forts, magazines, arsenals, dock-yards, and other needful buildings;—And to make all laws which shall be necessary and proper for carrying into execution the foregoing powers, and all other powers vested by this Constitution in the government of the United States, or in any department or officer thereof.

SECT. 9. The migration or importation of such persons as any of the States now existing shall think proper to admit shall not be prohibited by the congress prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight; but a tax or duty may be imposed on such importation, not exceeding ten dollars for each person.

The privilege of the writ of habeas corpus shall not be suspended, unless when, in cases of rebellion or invasion, the public safety may require it.

No bill of attainder, or *ex-post-facto* law, shall be passed.

No capitation or other direct tax shall be laid, unless in proportion to the census or enumeration, hereinbefore directed to be taken.

No tax or duty shall be laid on articles exported from any State.

No preference shall be given by any regulation of commerce or revenue to the ports of one State over those of another; nor shall vessels bound to, or from, one State, be obliged to enter, clear, or pay duties in another.

No money shall be drawn from the treasury, but in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of the receipts and expenditures of all public money shall be published from time to time.

No title of nobility shall be granted by the United States; and no person holding any office of profit or trust under them shall, without the consent of congress, accept of any present, emolument, office, or title, of any kind whatever, from any king, prince, or foreign state.

SECT. 10. No State shall enter into any treaty, alliance, or confederation; grant letters of marque and reprisal; coin money; emit bills of credit; make anything but gold and silver coin a tender in payment of debts; pass any bill of attainder, *ex post facto* law, or law impairing the obligation of contracts; or grant any title of nobility.

No State shall, without the consent of the congress, lay any imposts or duties on imports or exports, except what may be absolutely necessary for executing its inspection laws; and the net produce of all duties and imposts, laid by any State on imports or exports, shall be for the use of the treasury of the United States, and all such laws shall be subject to the revision and control of the congress.

No State shall, without the consent of congress, lay any duty of tonnage, keep troops or ships-of-war in time of peace, enter into any agreement or compact with another State or with a foreign power, or engage in war, unless actually invaded, or in such imminent danger as will not admit of delay.

ARTICLE II.

SECTION 1. The executive power shall be vested in a president of the United States of America. He shall hold his office during the term of four years, and, together with the vice-president chosen for the same term, be elected as follows:

Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of senators and representatives to which the State may be entitled in the congress; but no senator or representative, or person holding an office of trust or profit under the United States shall be appointed an elector.

[*The electors shall meet in their respective States, and vote by ballot for two persons, of whom one, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same State with themselves. And they shall make a list of all the persons voted for, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify, and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted. The person having the greatest number of votes shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and, if there be more than one who have such majority and have an equal number of votes, then the house of representatives shall immediately choose, by ballot, one of them for president; and, if no person have a majority, then from the five highest on the list, the said house shall in like manner choose the president. But, in choosing the president, the vote shall be taken by States, the representation from each State having one vote: a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the States, and a majority of all the States shall be necessary to a choice. In every case, after the choice of the president, the person having the greatest number of votes of the electors shall be vice-president. But, if there should remain two or more who have equal votes, the senate shall choose from them, by ballot, the vice-president.]

The congress may determine the time of choosing the electors, and the day on which they shall give their votes; which day shall be the same throughout the United States.

No person, except a natural-born citizen, or a citizen of the United States at the time of the adoption of this constitution, shall be eligible to the office of president; neither shall any person be eligible to that office who shall not have attained to the age of thirty-five years, and been fourteen years a resident within the United States.

In case of the removal of the president from office, or of his death, resignation, or inability to discharge the powers and duties of the said office, the same shall devolve on the vice-president; and

the congress may by law provide for the case of removal, death, resignation, or inability, both of the president and vice-president, declaring what officer shall then act as president, and such officer shall act accordingly until the disability be removed, or a president shall be elected.

The president shall, at stated times, receive for his services a compensation, which shall neither be increased nor diminished during the period for which he shall have been elected; and he shall not receive within that period any other emolument from the United States, or any of them.

Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation:

"I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States; and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution of the United States."

SECT. 2. The president shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the United States, and of the militia of the several States, when called into the actual service of the United States: he may require the opinion in writing, of the principal officer in each of the executive departments, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices; and he shall have power to grant reprieves and pardons for offences against the United States, except in cases of impeachment.

He shall have power, by and with the advice and consent of the senate, to make treaties, provided two-thirds of the senators present concur; and he shall nominate, and by and with the advice and consent of the senate shall appoint, ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, judges of the supreme court, and all other officers of the United States whose appointments are not herein otherwise provided for, and which shall be established by law: but the congress may by law vest the appointment of such inferior officers as they think proper in the president alone, in the courts of law, or in the heads of departments.

The president shall have power to fill up all vacancies that may happen during the recess of the senate by granting commissions, which shall expire at the end of their next session.

SECT. 3. He shall, from time to time, give to the congress information of the state of the Union, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he shall judge necessary and expedient; he may, on extraordinary occasions, convene both houses, or either of them, and, in case of disagreement between them with respect to the time of adjournment, he may adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper; he shall receive ambassadors and other public ministers; he shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed, and shall commission all the officers of the United States.

SECT. 4. The president, vice-president, and all civil officers of the United States, shall be removed from office on impeachment for, and conviction of, treason, bribery, or other high crimes and misdemeanors.

ARTICLE III.

SECTION I. The judicial power of the United States shall be vested in one supreme court, and such inferior courts as the congress may, from time to time, ordain and establish. The judges,

both of the supreme and inferior courts, shall hold their offices during good behavior; and shall, at stated times, receive for their services a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office.

SECT. 2. The judicial power shall extend to all cases in law and equity arising under this Constitution, the laws of the United States, and treaties made or which shall be made under their authority; to all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls; to all cases of admiralty and maritime jurisdiction; to controversies to which the United States shall be a party; [* to controversies between two or more States,] between a State and citizens of another State, between citizens of different States, between citizens of the same State claiming lands under grants of different States, and between a State, or the citizens thereof, and foreign states, citizens, or subjects.

In all cases affecting ambassadors, other public ministers, and consuls, and those in which a State shall be a party, the supreme court shall have original jurisdiction. In all the other cases before mentioned, the supreme court shall have appellate jurisdiction, both as to law and fact, with such exceptions and under such regulations as the congress may make.

The trial of all crimes, except in cases of impeachment, shall be by jury; and such trials shall be held in the state where the said crimes shall have been committed: but, when not committed within any State, the trial shall be at such place or places as the congress may by law have directed.

SECT. 3. Treason against the United States shall consist only in levying war against them, or in adhering to their enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason, unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or on confession in open court.

The congress shall have power to declare the punishment of treason; but no attainder of treason shall work corruption of blood, or forfeiture, except during the life of the person attainted.

ARTICLE IV.

SECTION 1. Full faith and credit shall be given in each State to the public acts, records, and judicial proceedings, of every other State. And the congress may, by general laws, prescribe the manner in which such acts, records, and proceedings shall be proved, and the effect thereof.

SECT. 2. The citizens of each State shall be entitled to all privileges and immunities of citizens in the several States.

A per on charged in any State with treason, felony, or other crime, who shall flee from justice and be found in another State, shall, on demand of the executive authority of the State from which he fled, be delivered up, to be removed to the State having jurisdiction of the crime.

[† No person held to service or labor in one State under the laws thereof, escaping into another, shall, in consequence of any law or regulation therein, be discharged from such service or labor, but shall be delivered up on claim of the party to whom such service or labor may be due.]

SECT. 3. New States may be admitted by the congress into this Union; but no new State shall be formed or erected within the jurisdiction of any other State, nor any State be formed by the junction of two or more States, or parts of States, without the consent of the legislatures of the States concerned, as well as of the congress.

The congress shall have power to dispose of and make all needful rules and regulations respecting the territory, or other property, belonging to the United States; and nothing in this Constitution shall be so construed as to prejudice any claims of the United States or of any particular State.

SECT. 4. The United States shall guarantee to every State in the Union a republican form of government, and shall protect each of them against invasion, and, on application of the legislature or of the executive (when the legislature cannot be convened), against domestic violence.

ARTICLE V.

The congress, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, shall propose amendments to this Constitution, or, on the application of the legislatures of two-thirds of the several States, shall call a convention for proposing amendments, which, in either case, shall be valid to all intents and purposes as part of this constitution, when ratified by the legislatures of three-fourths of the several States, or by conventions in three-fourths thereof, as the one or the other mode of ratification may be proposed by the congress: provided that no amendment which may be made prior to the year one thousand eight hundred and eight shall in any manner affect the first and fourth clauses in the ninth section of the first article; and that no State, without its consent, shall be deprived of its equal suffrage in the senate.

ARTICLE VI.

All debts contracted, and engagements entered into, before the adoption of this Constitution, shall be as valid against the United States, under this Constitution, as under the Confederation.

This Constitution, and the laws of the United States which shall be made in pursuance thereof, and all treaties made, or which shall be made, under the authority of the United States, shall be the supreme law of the land; and the judges in every State shall be bound thereby, anything in the Constitution or laws of any State to the contrary notwithstanding.

The senators and representatives before mentioned, and the members of the several State legislatures, and all executive and judicial officers both of the United States and of the several States, shall be bound by oath or affirmation to support this Constitution; but no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office of public trust under the United States.

ARTICLE VII.

The ratification of the conventions of nine States shall be sufficient for the establishment of this Constitution between the States so ratifying the same.

AMENDMENTS

TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE UNITED STATES.

ARTICLE 1. Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the government for redress of grievances.

ART. 2. A well-regulated militia being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed.

ART. 3. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner; nor in time of war but in a manner prescribed by law.

ART. 4. The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated; and no warrant shall issue but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

ART. 5. No person shall be held to answer for a capital or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service, in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence, to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled, in any criminal case, to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation.

ART. 6. In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall have been previously ascertained by law; and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; and to have the assistance of counsel for his defence.

ART. 7. In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved; and no fact, tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any court of the United States than according to the rules of the common law.

ART. 8. Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

ART. 9. The enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

ART. 10. The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

ART. 11. The judicial power of the United States shall not be construed to extend to any suit in law or equity commenced or prosecuted against one of the United States by citizens of another State, or by citizens or subjects of any foreign state.

ART. 12. The electors shall meet in their respective States, and

vote by ballot for president and vice-president, one of whom, at least, shall not be an inhabitant of the same State with themselves: they shall name in their ballots the person voted for as president, and in distinct ballots the person voted for as vice-president; and they shall make distinct lists of all persons voted for as president, and of all persons voted for as vice-president, and of the number of votes for each; which list they shall sign and certify and transmit sealed to the seat of the government of the United States, directed to the president of the senate. The president of the senate shall, in the presence of the senate and house of representatives, open all the certificates, and the votes shall then be counted: the person having the greatest number of votes for president shall be the president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have such majority, then, from the persons having the highest numbers, not exceeding three, on the list of those voted for as president, the house of representatives shall choose immediately, by ballot, the president. But, in choosing the president, the votes shall be taken by States, the representation from each State having one vote: a quorum for this purpose shall consist of a member or members from two-thirds of the States, and a majority of all the States shall be necessary to a choice. And if the house of representatives shall not choose a president, whenever the right of choice shall devolve upon them, before the fourth day of March next following, then the vice-president shall act as president, as in the case of the death, or other constitutional disability, of the president. The person having the greatest number of votes as vice-president shall be the vice-president, if such number be a majority of the whole number of electors appointed; and if no person have a majority, then, from the two highest numbers on the list, the senate shall choose the vice-president: a quorum for the purpose shall consist of two-thirds of the whole number of senators; and a majority of the whole number shall be necessary to a choice. But no person constitutionally ineligible to the office of president shall be eligible to that of vice-president of the United States.

ART. 13. *Sec. 1.* Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime, whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Sec. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

ART. 14. *Sec. 1.* All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States, and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Sec. 2. Representatives shall be apportioned among the several States according to their respective numbers, counting the whole number of persons in each State, excluding Indians not taxed. But when the right to vote at any election for the choice of electors for president and vice-president of the United States, representatives in congress, the executive and judicial officers of a State, or the members of the legislature thereof, is denied to any of the male inhabitants of such State, being twenty-one years of age and citi-

zens of the United States, or in any way abridged except for participation in rebellion or other crime, the basis of representation therein shall be reduced in the proportion which the number of such male citizens shall bear to the whole number of male citizens twenty-one years of age in such State.

Sect. 3. No person shall be a senator or representative in congress, or an elector of president or vice-president, or hold any office, civil or military, under the United States, or under any State, who, having previously taken an oath as a member of congress, or as an officer of the United States, or as a member of any State Legislature, or as an executive or judicial officer of any State, to support the Constitution of the United States, shall have engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the same, or given aid or comfort to the enemies thereof. But congress may, by a vote of two-thirds of each house, remove such disability.

Sect. 4. The validity of the public debt of the United States authorized by law, including debts incurred for payment of pensions and bounties for services in suppressing insurrection and rebellion, shall not be questioned. But neither the United States nor any State shall assume or pay any debt or obligation incurred in aid of insurrection or rebellion against the United States, or any claim for the loss or emancipation of any slave; but all such debts, obligations, or claims, shall be held illegal and void.

Sect. 5. The congress shall have power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article.

ART. 15. *Sect. 1.* The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States, or by any State, on account of race, color, or previous conditions of servitude.

Sect. 2. The congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

U. S. POSTAGE.

All postage must be PREPAID, by affixing stamps denoting the postage required, upon letters, packages, or other mail matter.

Every Letter, or written communication, weight not over half an ounce, any distance within the United States, 3 cents; for *each* additional half ounce, or fraction, 3 cents in addition.

Manuscripts, for Newspapers and Magazines, letter rates.

Drop Letters, 1 cent for every half ounce or less. At offices where free delivery by carrier is established, 2 cents for each half ounce.

Letters forwarded to another Post-office without charge, on request of person addressed; if not called for returned to the writer free, if endorsed with that request. If postage is not paid the letter is forwarded to the Dead Letter office, and returned to the writer.

Unsealed Circulars, not exceeding three in number, to one address, 2 cents; and at the same rate for a greater number, adding 2 cents for every three circulars.

Books and Photograph Albums, for four ounces or less, 4 cents, for each additional four ounces, 4 cents,—book or package not to weigh more than four pounds, except when sent by order of Congress.

Transient Newspapers, pamphlets, hand-bills, posters, book manuscript, and proof sheets, whether corrected or not, maps, prints, engravings, sheet music, blanks, flexible patterns, sample cards, letter envelopes, cards, paper, seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, scions, and photographs on cards or paper, in one package to one address, not over four ounces in weight, 2 cents; over four ounces and not exceeding eight, 4 cents.

Matter for mailing, as samples, must be confined to samples and sample cards, of dry, flexible material. The various specimens of merchandise, such as tea, coffee, flour, sugar, tobacco, rice, small hardware, &c., &c. and daguerreotypes, are charged at letter rates. Writing on samples or sample cards will subject them to letter postage.

Weekly Newspapers, may be sent free to actual subscribers, in the county where published, but if delivered by carriers, 5 cents per quarter. Beyond said county limits, postage must be paid quarterly, in advance, as follows: Weekly papers, 5 cents; semi-weekly, 10 cents; tri-weekly, 15 cents, and so on, adding 5 cents for each additional issue.

Quarterly Magazines, &c., 1 cent per quarter for every 4 ounces thereof; *monthly*, three times, *semi-monthly*, six times this rate.

Religious, Educational, and Agricultural Newspapers, of small size, issued less frequently than once a week, may be sent in packages to one address at the rate of 1 cent for each package not exceeding four ounces in weight, and an additional charge of 1 cent is made for each additional four ounces or fraction thereof, the postage to be paid quarterly or yearly in advance.

News Dealers may receive and send periodicals to regular subscribers, as publishers, but packages so sent cannot be returned except by pre-payment of transient rates.

Money Orders, from \$1 to \$50, may be obtained at any post-office in the United States authorized to transact this business. Commission charged, for transmitting sums from \$1 to \$20, 10 cents; over \$20 and not exceeding \$30, 15 cents; over \$30 and not exceeding \$40, 20 cents; over \$40 and not exceeding \$50, 25 cents. Not over three orders can be sent at one time.

NEW POSTAL LAW OF 1872,

Provides that the postage on items in paragraph entitled "Transient Newspapers" &c., shall be one cent for each two ounces or fraction thereof, and that the postage on Books, Photographs, &c., shall be double these rates, and that Postal Cards, with suitable accommodation for address and postage stamp impressed on front, with opportunity for a short letter on back, shall be provided and for sale about August 1, at the rate of one cent each, including postage.

FRANKING PRIVILEGE.

Post-masters to other Post-masters, on official business. Newspaper publishers may send bills and receipts, to actual subscribers, enclosed in the newspaper or periodical; to President, Vice-president, and Members of Congress, and (on official business) to the chiefs of the executive departments of the government, and the heads of bureaus, and chief clerks, and others invested with the franking privilege.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA.

Historical Facts connected with the formation of the original Union, and the admission of new States.

On Monday, September 5, 1774, a number of men were assembled at Carpenter's Hall, Philadelphia, who had been chosen by the several Colonies, in what now constitutes the United States, to hold a Congress for the purpose of discussing certain grievances imputed to the mother country. This Congress resolved that each colony should have one vote only. On Tuesday, July 2, 1776, the Congress resolved, "That these United Colonies are, and of right ought to be, Free and Independent States," etc.; and on Thursday, July 4, the whole Declaration of Independence having been agreed upon, was publicly read to the people. On September 9 it was resolved that the words "United Colonies" should no longer be used, and that "United States" should thenceforward be the style and title of the Union. On Saturday, November 15, 1777, "Articles of Confederation and Perpetual Union of the United States of America" were agreed to by the State Delegates, subject to the ratification of the several State Legislatures. Eight of the States ratified these articles July 9, 1778; one July 21; one July 24; one November 26; one February 22, 1779; and the last one March 1, 1781.

The seat of government was established, first at Philadelphia, Penn., commencing September 5, 1774; and May 10, 1775; at Baltimore, Md., Dec. 20, 1776; at Philadelphia, Penn., March 4, 1777; at Lancaster, Penn., September 27, 1777; at York, Penn., September 30, 1777; at Philadelphia, Penn., July 2, 1778; at Princeton, N. J., June 30, 1783; at Annapolis, Md., November 26, 1783; at Trenton, N. J., November 1, 1784; and at New-York City, January 11, 1785.

On the 4th of March, 1789, the present Constitution, which had been adopted by a convention and ratified by the requisite number of States, went into operation. The several State Legislatures ratified this instrument at the following dates:

Delaware, December 7, 1787; Pennsylvania, December 12, 1787; New-Jersey, December 13, 1787; Georgia, January 2, 1788; Connecticut, January 9, 1788; Massachusetts, February 6, 1788; Maryland, April 28, 1788; South Carolina, May 23, 1788; New Hampshire, June 21, 1788; Virginia, June 26, 1788; New-York, July 26, 1788; North Carolina, November 21, 1789; Rhode Island, May 29, 1790.

The privilege of becoming members of the Union by ratifying the Constitution was confined to those States that were parties to the confederation

by which the Constitution had been framed. The Constitution was adopted by the Convention, September 17, 1787. It required that nine States should ratify it before its provisions could go into effect. Congress, on the 13th of September, 1788, determined that as a sufficient number of States had ratified it—eleven having done so—it should become operative on the first Wednesday (the 4th) of March, 1789. North-Carolina and Rhode-Island had not yet sanctioned it; but as soon as they acceded to its provisions, they were admitted to its privileges.

CONGRESS.

All legislative powers are vested in Congress, which consists of a Senate and House of Representatives.

The Senate consists of two members from each State, elected by the Legislatures thereof respectively for six years. The Vice-President of the United States is *ex officio* President of the Senate; but a President *pro tempore* is elected by and from among the Senators, who, in the absence of the President, acts in his stead.

FORTY-SECOND CONGRESS.

The Congress of the United States consists of a Senate and House of Representatives, and must assemble once every year, on the first Monday of December, unless otherwise provided by law.

SENATE.

The Senate is composed of two members from each State. They are chosen by the Legislatures of the several States, for the term of six years, one-third being elected biennially. The Vice-president of the United States is President of the Senate, in which body he has only a casting vote, which is given in case of an equal division of the votes of the Senators. In his absence, a President *pro tempore* is chosen from among the Senators by the Senate.

The full number, if all the States were represented, would be 74.

CONSTITUTION OF MAINE.

WE, the people of Maine, in order to establish justice, insure tranquillity, provide for our mutual defence, promote our common welfare, and secure to ourselves and our posterity the blessings of liberty, acknowledging with grateful hearts the goodness of the Sovereign Ruler of the Universe in affording us an opportunity, so favorable to the design; and, imploring his aid and direction in its accomplishment, do agree to form ourselves into a free and independent State, by the style and title of the STATE OF MAINE, and do ordain and establish the following Constitution for the government of the same.

ARTICLE I.

DECLARATION OF RIGHTS.

SECTION 1. All men are born equally free and independent, and have certain natural, inherent, and unalienable rights, among which are those of enjoying and defending life and liberty, acquiring, possessing, and protecting property, and of pursuing and obtaining safety and happiness.

SECT. 2. All power is inherent in the people; all free governments are founded in their authority and instituted for their benefit; they have therefore an unalienable and indefeasible right to institute government, and to alter, reform, or totally change the same, when their safety and happiness require it.

SECT. 3. All men have a natural and unalienable right to worship Almighty God according to the dictates of their own consciences, and no one shall be hurt, molested, or restrained in his person, liberty, or estate for worshipping God in the manner and season most agreeable to the dictates of his own conscience, nor for his religious professions or sentiments, provided he does not disturb the public peace nor obstruct others in their religious worship; and all persons demeaning themselves peaceably, as good members of the State, shall be equally under the protection of the laws, and no subordination nor preference of any one sect or denomination to another shall ever be established by law, nor shall any religious test be required as a qualification for any office or trust under this State; and all religious societies in this State, whether incorporate or unincorporate, shall at all times have the exclusive right of electing their public teachers and contracting with them for their support and maintenance.

SECT. 4. Every citizen may freely speak, write, and publish his sentiments on any subject, being responsible for the abuse of this liberty; no laws shall be passed regulating or restraining the freedom of the press; and in prosecutions for any publication respecting the official conduct of men in public capacity, or the qualifications of those who are candidates for the suffrages of the people, or where the matter published is proper for public information, the truth thereof may be given in evidence; and in all indictments for libels, the jury, after having received the direction of the court, shall have a right to determine, at their discretion, the law and the fact.

SECT. 5. The people shall be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and possessions from all unreasonable searches and seizures; and no warrant to search any place, or seize any person or thing, shall issue without a special designation of the place to be searched, and the person or thing to be seized, nor without probable cause,—supported by oath or affirmation.

SECT. 6. In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall have a right to be heard by himself and his counsel, or either, at his election;

To demand the nature and cause of the accusation, and have a copy thereof;

To be confronted by the witnesses against him;

To have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor; To have a speedy, public, and impartial trial, and, except in trials by martial law or impeachment, by a jury of the vicinity. He shall not be compelled to furnish or give evidence against himself, nor be deprived of his life, liberty, property, or privileges, but by judgment of his peers or the law of the land.

SECT. 7. No person shall be held to answer for a capital or infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases of impeachment, or in such cases of offences as are usually recognizable by a justice of the peace, or in cases arising in the army or navy, or in the militia when in actual service in time of war or public danger. The legislature shall provide by law a suitable and impartial mode of selecting juries, and their usual number and unanimity, in indictments and convictions, shall be held indispensable.

SECT. 8. No person, for the same offence, shall be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb.

SECT. 9. Sanguinary laws shall not be passed; all penalties and punishments shall be proportioned to the offence; excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel nor unusual punishments inflicted.

SECT. 10. [* All persons, before conviction, shall be bailable, except for capital offences, where the proof is evident or the presumption great.] And the privilege of the writ of *habeas corpus* shall not be suspended, unless when in cases of rebellion or invasion the public safety may require it.

SECT. 11. The legislature shall pass no bill of attainder, *ex-post-facto* law, or law impairing obligation of contracts, and no attainder shall work corruption of blood nor forfeiture of estate.

SECT. 12. Treason against the State shall consist only in levying war against it, adhering to its enemies, giving them aid and comfort. No person shall be convicted of treason unless on the testimony of two witnesses to the same overt act, or confession in open court.

SECT. 13. The laws shall not be suspended but by the legislature or its authority.

SECT. 14. No person shall be subject to corporal punishment under military law, except such as are employed in the army or navy, or in the militia when in actual service in time of war or public danger.

SECT. 15. The people have a right at all times in an orderly and peaceable manner to assemble and consult upon the common good,

to give instructions to their representatives, and to request, of either department of the government by petition or remonstrance, redress of their wrongs and grievances.

SECT. 16. Every citizen has a right to keep and bear arms for the common defence; and this right shall never be questioned.

SECT. 17. No standing army shall be kept up in time of peace without the consent of the legislature, and the military shall, in all cases, and at all times, be in strict subordination to the civil power.

SECT. 18. No soldier shall, in time of peace, be quartered in any house without the consent of the owner or occupant, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

SECT. 19. Every person, for an injury done him in his person, reputation, property, or immunities, shall have remedy by due course of law; and right and justice shall be administered freely and without sale, completely and without denial, promptly and without delay.

SECT. 20. In all civil suits, and in all controversies concerning property, the parties shall have a right to a trial by jury, except in cases where it has heretofore been otherwise practised; the party claiming the right may be heard by himself and his counsel, or either, at his election.

SECT. 21. Private property shall not be taken for public uses without just compensation; nor unless the public exigencies require it.

SECT. 22. No tax or duty shall be imposed without the consent of the people or of their representatives in the legislature.

SECT. 23. No title of nobility or hereditary distinction, privilege, honor, or emolument shall ever be granted or confirmed, nor shall any office be created, the appointment to which shall be for a longer time than good behavior.

SECT. 24. The enumeration of certain rights shall not impair nor deny others retained by the people.

ARTICLE II.

ELECTORS.

SECT. 1. Every male citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, excepting paupers, persons under guardianship, and Indians not taxed, having his residence established in this State for the term of three months next preceding any election, shall be an elector for governor, senators, and representatives, in the town or plantation where his residence is so established; and the election shall be by written ballot. But persons in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States, or this State, shall not be considered as having obtained such established residence by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military place, in any town or plantation; nor shall the residence of a student at any seminary of learning entitle him to the right of suffrage in the town or plantation where such seminary is established.*

SECT. 2. Electors shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest on the days of election, during their attendance at, going to, and returning therefrom.

SECT. 3. No elector shall be obliged to do duty in the militia on any day of election, except in time of war or public danger.

SECT. 4. The election of governor, senators, and representatives shall be on the second Monday of September, annually forever.*

ARTICLE III.

DISTRIBUTION OF POWERS.

SECT. 1. The powers of this government shall be divided into three distinct departments, the *legislative*, *executive*, and *judicial*.

SECT. 2. No person or persons, belonging to one of these departments, shall exercise any of the powers properly belonging to either of the others, except in the cases herein expressly directed or permitted.

ARTICLE IV.—PART FIRST.

LEGISLATIVE POWER—HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

SECT. 1. The legislative power shall be vested in two distinct branches, a house of representatives, and a senate, each to have a negative on the other, and both to be styled the *Legislature of Maine*, and the style of their acts and laws shall be, "*Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in legislature assembled.*"

SECT. 2. The house of representatives shall consist of [† not less than one hundred nor more than two hundred] members, to be elected by the qualified electors for one year from the day next preceding the annual meeting of the legislature. The legislature which shall first be convened under this Constitution shall, on or before the fifteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, and the legislature, within every subsequent period of at most ten years and at least five, cause the number of the inhabitants of the State to be ascertained, exclusive of foreigners not naturalized, and Indians not taxed. The number of representatives shall, at the several periods of making such enumeration, be fixed and apportioned among the several counties, as near as may be, according to the number of inhabitants, having regard to the relative increase of population. The number of representatives shall, on said first apportionment, be not less than one hundred nor more than one hundred and fifty; [and, whenever the number of representatives shall be two hundred, at the next annual meetings of elections, which shall thereafter be had, and at every subsequent period of ten years, the people shall give in their votes, whether the number of representatives shall be increased or diminished; and, if a majority of votes are in favor thereof, it shall be the duty of the next legislature thereafter to increase or diminish the number by the rule hereinafter prescribed.]

SECT. 3. Each town having fifteen hundred inhabitants may elect one representative; each town having three thousand seven hundred and fifty, may elect two; each town having six thousand seven hundred and fifty, may elect three; each town having ten thousand five hundred, may elect four; each town having fifteen thousand, may elect five; each town having twenty thousand two

hundred and fifty, may elect six; each town having twenty-six thousand two hundred and fifty inhabitants, may elect seven; but no town shall ever be entitled to more than seven representatives; and towns and plantations duly organized, not having fifteen hundred inhabitants, shall be classed, as conveniently as may be, into districts containing that number, and so as not to divide towns; and each such district may elect one representative; and, when on this apportionment the number of representatives shall be two hundred, a different apportionment shall take place upon the above principle; and, in case the fifteen hundred shall be too large or too small to apportion all the representatives to any county, it shall be so increased or diminished as to give the number of representatives according to the above rule and proportion; and, whenever any town or towns, plantation or plantations, not entitled to elect a representative, shall determine against a classification with any other town or plantation, the legislature may, at each apportionment of representatives, on the application of such town or plantation, authorize it to elect a representative for such portion of time and such periods, as shall be equal to its portion of representation; and the right of representation, so established, shall not be altered until the next general apportionment.

SECT. 4. No person shall be a member of the house of representatives, unless he shall, at the commencement of the period for which he is elected, have been five years a citizen of the United States, have arrived at the age of twenty-one years, have been a resident in this State one year, or from the adoption of this Constitution; and for the three months next preceding the time of his election shall have been, and, during the period for which he is elected, shall continue to be a resident in the town or district which he represents.

SECT. 5. *The meetings for the choice of representatives shall be warned, in due course of law, by the selectmen of the several towns, seven days at least before the election; and the selectmen thereof shall preside impartially at such meetings, receive the votes of all qualified electors present, sort, count, and declare them in open town meeting, and in the presence of the town clerk, who shall form a list of the persons voted for, with the number of votes for each person against his name; shall make a fair record thereof in the presence of the selectmen, and in open town meeting; and a fair copy of this list shall be attested by the selectmen and town clerk, and delivered by said selectmen to each representative within ten days next after such election. And the towns and plantations organized by law, belonging to any class herein provided, shall hold their meetings at the same time in the respective towns and plantations; and the town and plantation meetings in such towns and plantations shall be notified, held, and regulated, the votes received, sorted, counted, and declared in the same manner. And the assessors and clerks of plantations shall have all the powers, and be subject to all the duties which selectmen and town clerks have, and are subject to by this Constitution. And the selectmen of such towns, and the assessors of such plantations, so classed, shall, within four days next after such meeting, meet at some place to be prescribed and notified by the selectmen or assessors of the oldest town or plantation, in such class, and the copies of said lists shall

be then examined and compared; and in case any person shall be elected by [* a majority of all the] votes, the selectmen or assessors shall deliver the certified copies of such lists to the persons so elected, within ten days next after such election; and the clerks of towns and plantations respectively, shall seal up copies of all such lists and cause them to be delivered into the secretary's office twenty days, at least, before the first Wednesday in January, annually; but in case no person shall have [* a majority] of votes, the selectmen and assessors shall, as soon as may be, notify another meeting, and the same proceedings shall be had at every future meeting until an election shall have been effected: *provided*, that the legislature may, by law, prescribe a different mode of returning, examining, and ascertaining the election of the representatives in such classes.†

SECT. 6. Whenever the seat of a member shall be vacant by death, resignation, or otherwise, the vacancy may be filled by a new election.

SECT. 7. The house of representatives shall choose their speaker, clerk, and other officers.

SECT. 8. The house of representatives shall have the sole power of impeachment.

ARTICLE IV.—PART SECOND.

SENATE.

SECT. 1. The senate shall consist of not less than twenty, nor more than thirty-one members, elected at the same time, and for the same term, as the representatives, by the qualified electors of the districts into which the State shall, from time to time, be divided.

SECT. 2. The legislature, which shall be first convened under this Constitution, shall, on or before the fifteenth day of August, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one, and the legislature at every subsequent period of ten years, cause the State to be divided into districts for the choice of senators. The districts shall conform, as near as may be, to county lines, and be apportioned according to the number of inhabitants. The number of senators shall not exceed twenty at the first apportionment, and shall, at each apportionment, be increased, until they shall amount to thirty-one, according to the increase in the house of representatives.

SECT. 3. † The meetings for the election of senators shall be notified, held, and regulated, and the votes received, sorted, counted, declared, and recorded, in the same manner as those for representatives. And fair copies of the list of votes shall be attested by the selectmen and town clerks of towns, and the assessors and clerks of plantations, and sealed up in open town and plantation meetings; and the town and plantation clerks, respectively, shall cause the same to be delivered into the secretary's office thirty days at least, before the first Wednesday of January. All other qualified electors, living in places unincorporated, who shall be assessed to the support of the government by the assessors of an adjacent town, shall have the privilege of voting for senators, representatives, and gov-

error in such town; and shall be notified by the selectmen thereof for that purpose accordingly.

§ SECT. 4. The governor and council shall, as soon as may be, examine the returned copies of such lists, and, twenty days before the said first Wednesday of January, issue a summons to such persons, as shall appear to be elected by a majority of the votes in each district, to attend that day and take their seats.

SECT. 5. The senate shall, on the said first Wednesday of January, annually, determine who are elected, by a majority of votes, to be senators in each district; and in case the full number of senators to be elected from each district shall not have been so elected, the members of the house of representatives, and such senators as shall have been elected, shall, from the highest numbers of the persons voted for, on said lists, equal to twice the number of senators deficient, in every district, if there be so many voted for, elect, by joint ballot, the number of senators required; and, in this manner, all vacancies in the senate shall be supplied as soon as may be, after such vacancies happen.

SECT. 6. These senators shall be twenty-five years of age at the commencement of the term for which they are elected, and in all other respects their qualifications shall be the same as those of the representatives.

SECT. 7. The senate shall have full power to try all impeachments, and, when sitting for that purpose, shall be on oath or affirmation, and no person shall be convicted without the concurrence of two-thirds of the members present. Their judgment, however, shall not extend further than to removal from office, and disqualification to hold or enjoy any office of honor, trust, or profit under the State. But the party, whether convicted or acquitted, shall, nevertheless, be liable to indictment, trial, judgment, and punishment according to law.

SECT. 8. The senate shall choose their president, secretary, and other officers.

ARTICLE IV.—PART THIRD.

LEGISLATIVE POWER.

SECTION 1. The legislature shall convene on the first Wednesday of January annually, and shall have full power to make and establish all reasonable laws and regulations for the defence and benefit of the people of this State, not repugnant to this Constitution, nor to that of the United States.

SECT. 2. Every bill or resolution, having the force of law, to which the concurrence of both houses may be necessary, except on a question of adjournment, which shall have passed both houses, shall be presented to the governor, and if he approve, he shall sign it; if not, he shall return it with his objections to the house in which it shall have originated, which shall enter the objections at large on its journals, and proceed to reconsider it. If, after such reconsideration, two-thirds of that house shall agree to pass it, it shall be sent, together with the objections, to the other house, by which it shall be reconsidered, and, if approved by two-thirds of that house, it shall have the same effect as if it had been signed by the governor; but in all such cases, the votes of both houses shall be taken by yeas and nays, and the names of the persons voting for and against the bill or resolution shall be entered on

the journals of both houses respectively. If the bill or resolution shall not be returned by the governor within five days (Sundays excepted) after it shall have been presented to him, it shall have the same force and effect as if he had signed it, unless the legislature, by their adjournment, prevent its return, in which case it shall have such force and effect, unless returned within three days after their next meeting.

SECT. 3. Each house shall be the judge of the elections and qualifications of its own members, and a majority shall constitute a quorum to do business; but a smaller number may adjourn from day to day, and may compel the attendance of absent members, in such manner and under such penalties as each house shall provide.

SECT. 4. Each house may determine the rules of its proceedings, punish its members for disorderly behavior, and, with the concurrence of two-thirds, expel a member, but not a second time for the same cause.

SECT. 5. Each house shall keep a journal, and from time to time publish its proceedings, except such parts as in their judgment may require secrecy; and the yeas and nays of the members of either house on any question shall, at the desire of one-fifth of those present, be entered on the journals.

SECT. 6. Each house, during its session, may punish by imprisonment any person not a member, for disrespectful or disorderly behavior in its presence, for obstructing any of its proceedings, threatening, assaulting, or abusing any of its members for anything said, done, or doing in either house; *provided*, that no imprisonment shall extend beyond the period of the same session.

SECT. 7. The senators and representatives shall receive such compensation as shall be established by law; but no law increasing their compensation shall take effect during the existence of the legislature which enacted it. The expenses of the members of the house of representatives in traveling to the legislature and returning therefrom, once in each session and no more, shall be paid by the State out of the public treasury, to every member who shall seasonably attend, in the judgment of the house, and does not depart therefrom without leave.

SECT. 8. The senators and representatives shall, in all cases except treason, felony, or breach of the peace, be privileged from arrest during their attendance at, going to, and returning from each session of the legislature; and no member shall be liable to answer for anything spoken in debate in either house, in any court or place elsewhere.

SECT. 9. Bills, orders, or resolutions may originate in either house, and may be altered, amended, or rejected in the other; but all bills for raising a revenue shall originate in the house of representatives, but the senate may propose amendments as in other cases; *provided*, that they shall not, under color of amendment, introduce any new matter, which does not relate to raising a revenue.

SECT. 10. No senator or representative shall, during the term for which he shall have been elected, be appointed to any civil office of profit under this State, which shall have been created, or the emoluments of which increased during such term, except such offices as may be filled by elections by the people; *provided*, that this prohibition shall not extend to the members of the first legislature.

SECT. 11. No member of Congress, nor person holding any office under the United States (post-officers excepted) nor office of profit under this State, justices of the peace, notaries public, coroners, and officers of the militia excepted, shall have a seat in either house during his being such member of congress, or his continuing in such office.

SECT. 12. Neither house shall, during the session, without the consent of the other, adjourn for more than two days, nor to any other place than that in which the houses shall be sitting.

ARTICLE V.—PART FIRST.

EXECUTIVE POWER.

SECT. 1. The supreme executive power of this State shall be vested in a governor.

SECT. 2. The governor shall be elected by the qualified electors, and shall hold his office one year from the first Wednesday of January in each year.

SECT. 3. *The meetings for election of governor shall be notified, held, and regulated, and the votes shall be received, sorted, counted, declared, and recorded, in the same manner as those for senators and representatives. They shall be sealed and returned into the Secretary's office in the same manner, and at the same time, as those for senators. And the secretary of state, for the time being, shall, on the first Wednesday of January, then next, lay the lists before the senate and house of representatives to be by them examined, and, in case of a choice by a majority of all the votes returned, they shall declare and publish the same. But if no person shall have a majority of the votes, the house of representatives shall by ballot from the persons having the four highest number of votes on the lists, if so many there be, elect two persons and make return of their names to the senate, of whom the senate shall, by ballot, elect one, who shall be declared governor.

SECT. 4. The governor shall, at the commencement of his term, be not less than thirty years of age; a natural-born citizen of the United States, have been five years, or from the adoption of this Constitution, a resident of the State; and at the time of his election and during the term for which he is elected, be a resident of said State.

SECT. 5. No person holding any office or place under the United States, this State, or any other power, shall exercise the office of governor.

SECT. 6. The governor shall, at stated times, receive for his service a compensation, which shall not be increased or diminished during his continuance in office.

SECT. 7. He shall be commander-in-chief of the army and navy of the State and of the militia, except when called into the actual service of the United States; but he shall not march nor convey any of the citizens out of the State without their consent or that of the legislature, unless it shall become necessary, in order to march or transport them from one part of the State to another for the defence thereof.

SECT. 8. He shall nominate, and, with the advice and consent of the council, appoint all judicial officers, the attorney-general,

the sheriffs, coroners, registers of probate, and notaries public; and he shall also nominate, and with the advice and consent of the council appoint all other civil and military officers, whose appointment is not by this Constitution, or shall not by law be otherwise provided for; and every such nomination shall be made seven days, at least, prior to such appointment.

SECR. 9. He shall from time to time give the legislature information of the condition of the State, and recommend to their consideration such measures as he may judge expedient.

SECR. 10. He may require information from any military officer, or any officer in the executive department, upon any subject relating to the duties of their respective offices.

SECR. 11. He shall have power, with the advice and consent of the council, to remit, after conviction, all forfeitures and penalties, and to grant reprieves and pardons, except in cases of impeachment.

SECR. 12. He shall take care that the laws be faithfully executed.

SECR. 13. He may on extraordinary occasions convene the legislature; and in case of disagreement between the two houses with respect to the time of adjournment, adjourn them to such time as he shall think proper, not beyond the day of the next annual meeting; and if since the last adjournment the place where the legislature were next to convene shall have become dangerous from an enemy or contagious sickness, may direct the session to be held at some other convenient place within the State.

SECR. 14. Whenever the office of governor shall become vacant by death, resignation, removal from office, or otherwise, the president of the senate shall exercise the office of governor until another governor shall be duly qualified; and in case of the death, resignation, removal from office, or disqualification of the president of the senate so exercising the office of governor, the speaker of the house of representatives shall exercise the offices until a president of the senate shall have been chosen; and when the offices of governor, president of the senate, and speaker of the house shall become vacant, in the recess of the senate, the person acting as Secretary of State for the time being, shall by proclamation convene the senate, that a president may be chosen to exercise the office of governor. And whenever either the president of the senate or speaker of the house shall so exercise said office, he shall receive only the compensation of governor, but his duties as president or speaker shall be suspended; and the senate or house shall fill the vacancy until his duties as governor shall cease.

ARTICLE V.—PART SECOND.

COUNCIL.

SECTION 1. There shall be a council, to consist of seven persons, citizens of the United States, and residents of this State, to advise the governor in the executive part of the government, whom the governor shall have full power, at his discretion, to assemble; and he with the councillors, or a majority of them, may from time to time hold and keep a council, for ordering and directing the affairs of State according to law.

SECT. 2. The councillors shall be chosen annually, on the first Wednesday of January, by joint ballot of the senators and rep-

representatives in convention; and vacancies which shall afterwards happen shall be filled in the same manner; but not more than one councillor shall be elected from one district prescribed for the election of senators; and they shall be privileged from arrest in the same manner as senators and representatives.

SECT. 3. The resolutions and advice of the council shall be recorded in a register, and signed by the members agreeing thereto, which may be called for by either house of the legislature, and any councillor may enter his dissent to the resolution of the majority.

SECT. 4. No member of Congress, or of the legislature of this State, nor any person holding an office under the United States (post-officers excepted), nor any civil officers under this State (justices of the peace and notaries public excepted), shall be councillors. And no councillor shall be appointed to any other office during the time for which he shall have been elected.

ARTICLE V.—PART THIRD.

SECRETARY.

SECT. 1. The secretary of State shall be chosen annually at the first session of the legislature, by joint ballot of the senators and representatives in convention.

SECT. 2. The records of the State shall be kept in the office of the secretary, who may appoint his deputies, for whose conduct he shall be accountable.

SECT. 3. He shall attend the governor and council, senate and house of representatives, in person or by his deputies, as they shall respectively require.

SECT. 4. He shall carefully keep and preserve the records of all the official acts and proceedings of the governor and council, senate and house of representatives, and, when required, lay the same before either branch of the legislature, and perform such other duties as are enjoined by this Constitution, or shall be required by law.

ARTICLE V.—PART FOURTH.

TREASURER.

SECT. 1. The treasurer shall be chosen annually, at the first session of the legislature, by joint ballot of the senators and representatives in convention, but shall not be eligible more than five years successively.

SECT. 2. The treasurer shall, before entering on the duties of his office, give bond to the State, with sureties, to the satisfaction of the legislature, for the faithful discharge of his trust.

SECT. 3. The treasurer shall not, during his continuance in office, engage in any business of trade or commerce, or as broker, nor as an agent or factor for any merchant or trader.

SECT. 4. No money shall be drawn from the treasury, but by warrant from the governor and council, and in consequence of appropriations made by law; and a regular statement and account of receipts and expenditures of all public money, shall be published at the commencement of the annual session of the legislature.

ARTICLE VI.

JUDICIAL POWER.

SECT. 1. The judicial power of this State shall be vested in a supreme judicial court, and such other courts as the legislature shall, from time to time, establish.

SECT. 2. The justices of the supreme court shall, at stated times, receive a compensation, which shall not be diminished during their continuance in office, but they shall receive no other fee or reward.

SECT. 3. They shall be obliged to give their opinions upon important questions of law, and upon solemn occasions, when required by the governor, council, senate, or house of representatives.

SECT. 4. [*All judicial officers, except justices of the peace, shall hold their offices during good behavior, but not beyond the age of seventy years.]

SECT. 5. Justices of the peace and notaries public shall hold their offices during seven years, if they so long behave themselves well; at the expiration of which term, they may be reappointed, or others appointed, as the public interest may require.

SECT. 6. The justices of the supreme judicial court shall hold no office under the United States, nor any State, nor any other office under this State, except that of justice of the peace.

ARTICLE VII.

MILITARY.

SECT. 1. The captains and subalterns of the militia shall be elected by the written votes of the members of their respective companies; the field officers of regiments, by the written votes of the captains and subalterns of their respective regiments; the brigadier-general, in like manner, by the field officers of their respective brigades.

SECT. 2. The legislature shall, by law, direct the manner of notifying the electors, conducting the elections, and making returns to the governor of the officers elected; and, if the electors shall neglect or refuse to make such elections, after being duly notified according to law, the governor shall appoint suitable persons to fill such offices.

SECT. 3. The major-generals shall be elected by the senate and house of representatives, each having a negative on the other. The adjutant-general and quartermaster-general shall be appointed by the governor and council;† but the adjutant-general shall perform the duties of quartermaster-general until otherwise directed by law. The major-generals, and brigadier-generals, and the commanding officers of regiments and battalions shall appoint their respective staff officers; and all military officers shall be commissioned by the governor.

SECT. 4. The militia, as divided into divisions, brigades, regiments, battalions, and companies pursuant to the laws now in force, shall remain so organized, until the same shall be altered by the legislature.

SECT. 5. Persons of the denominations of quakers and shakers, justices of the supreme judicial court, and ministers of the gospel may be exempted from military duty; but no other person of the age of eighteen, and under the age of forty-five years, excepting officers of the militia, who have been honorably discharged, shall be so exempted, unless he shall pay an equivalent to be fixed by law.

ARTICLE VIII.

LITERATURE.

A general diffusion of the advantages of education being essential to the preservation of the rights and liberties of the people; to promote this important object, the legislature are authorized, and it shall be their duty to require, the several towns to make suitable provisions, at their own expense, for the support and maintenance of public schools; and it shall further be their duty to encourage and suitably endow, from time to time, as the circumstances of the people may authorize, all academies, colleges, and seminaries of learning within the State; *provided*, that no donation, grant, or endowment shall at any time be made by the legislature to any literary institution now established, or which may hereafter be established, unless, at the time of making such endowment, the legislature of the State shall have the right to grant any further powers to, alter, limit, or restrain any of the powers vested in, any such literary institution, as shall be judged necessary to promote the best interests thereof.

ARTICLE IX.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

SECT. 1. Every person elected or appointed to either of the places or offices provided in this Constitution, and every person elected, appointed, or commissioned to any judicial, executive, military, or other office under this State, shall, before he enters on the discharge of the duties of his place or office, take and subscribe the following oath or affirmation: "I — do swear, that I will support the Constitution of the United States, and of this State, so long as I shall continue a citizen thereof. So help me, God."

"I — do swear, that I will faithfully discharge, to the best of my abilities, the duties incumbent on me as — according to the Constitution and the laws of the State. So help me, God." *Provided*, that an affirmation in the above forms may be substituted, when the person shall be conscientiously scrupulous of taking and subscribing an oath.

The oaths or affirmations shall be taken or subscribed by the governor and councillors before the presiding officer of the senate, in the presence of both houses of the legislature, and by the senators and representatives before the governor and council, and by the residue of said officers, before such persons as shall be prescribed by the legislature; and whenever the governor or any councillor shall not be able to attend during the session of the legislature to take and subscribe said oaths or affirmations, such oaths or affirmations may be taken and subscribed in the recess of the legislature before any justice of the supreme judicial court; *provided*, that the senators and representatives, first elected under this Con-

stitution, shall take and subscribe such oaths or affirmations before the president of the convention.

SECT. 2. No person holding the office of justice of the supreme judicial court, or of any inferior court, attorney-general, county attorney, treasurer of the State, adjutant-general, judge of probate, register of probate, register of deeds, sheriffs or their deputies, clerks of the judicial courts, shall be a member of the legislature; and any person holding either of the foregoing offices, elected to, and accepting a seat in the congress of the United States, shall thereby vacate said office; and no person shall be capable of holding or exercising at the same time within this State, more than one of the offices before mentioned.

SECT. 3. All commissions shall be in the name of the State, signed by the governor, attested by the secretary or his deputy, and have the seal of the State thereto affixed.

SECT. 4. And in case the elections, required by this Constitution on the first Wednesday of January annually, by the two houses of the legislature, shall not be completed on that day, the same may be adjourned from day to day, until completed, in the following order: the vacancies in the senate shall first be filled; the governor shall then be elected, if there be no choice by the people; and afterwards, the two houses shall elect the council.

SECT. 5. Every person holding any civil office under this State, may be removed by impeachment, for misdemeanor in office; and every person holding any office may be removed by the governor, with the advice of the council, on the address of both branches of the legislature. But before such address shall pass either house, the causes of removal shall be stated and entered on the journal of the house in which it originated, and a copy thereof served on the person in office, that he may be admitted to a hearing in his defence.

SECT. 6. The tenure of all offices, which are not or shall not be otherwise provided for, shall be during the pleasure of the governor and council.

SECT. 7. While the public expenses shall be assessed on polls and estates, a general valuation shall be taken at least once in ten years.

SECT. 8. All taxes upon real estate, assessed by authority of this State, shall be apportioned and assessed equally, according to the just value thereof.

ARTICLE X.

SCHEDULE.

SECT. 1. The first legislature shall meet on the last Wednesday in May next. The elections on the second Monday in September, annually, shall not commence until the year one thousand eight hundred and twenty-one; and, in the mean time, the election for governor, senators, and representatives shall be on the first Monday in April, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty; and, at this election, the same proceedings shall be had as are required at the elections provided for in this Constitution, on the second Monday in September, annually, and the lists of the votes for the governor and senators shall be transmitted, by the town and plantation clerks respectively, to the secretary of State *pro tempore*, seventeen days at least before the last Wednes-

day in May next; and the president of the convention shall, in the presence of the secretary of State *pro tempore*, open and examine the attested copies of said lists so returned for senators, and shall have all the powers, and be subject to all the duties, in ascertaining, notifying, and summoning the senators, who appear to be elected, as the governor and council have, and are subject to, by this Constitution; *provided*, he shall notify said senators fourteen days, at least, before the last Wednesday in May; and vacancies shall be ascertained and filled in the manner herein provided; and the senators to be elected on the said first Monday of April shall be apportioned as follows:

The county of York shall elect three.
 The county of Cumberland shall elect three.
 The county of Lincoln shall elect three.
 The county of Hancock shall elect two.
 The county of Washington shall elect one.
 The county of Kennebec shall elect three.
 The county of Oxford shall elect two.
 The county of Somerset shall elect two.
 The county of Penobscot shall elect one.

And the members of the house of representatives shall be elected, ascertained, and returned in the same manner as herein provided at elections on the second Monday of September; and the first house of representatives shall consist of the following number, to be elected as follows:

County of York. The towns of York and Wells may each elect two representatives; and each of the remaining towns may elect one.

County of Cumberland. The town of Portland may elect three representatives; North Yarmouth, two; Brunswick, two; Gorham, two; Freeport and Pownal, two; Raymond and Otisfield, one; Bridgton, Baldwin, and Harrison, one; Poland and Danville, one; and each remaining town, one.

County of Lincoln. The towns of Georgetown and Phipsburg may elect one representative; Lewiston and Wales, one; St. George, Cushing, and Friendship, one; Hope and Appleton Ridge, one; Jefferson, Putnam, and Patricktown plantation, one; Alna and Whitefield, one; Montville, Palermo, and Montville plantation, one; Woolwich and Dresden, one; and each remaining town, one.

County of Hancock. The town of Bucksport may elect one representative; Deer Island, one; Castine and Brooksville, one; Orland and Penobscot, one; Mt. Desert and Eden, one; Vinalhaven and Islesborough, one; Sedgwick and Bluehill, one; Gouldsborough, Sullivan, and plantations Nos. 8 and 9 north of Sullivan, one; Surry, Ellsworth, Trenton, and plantation of Mariaville, one; Lincolnville, Searsmont, and Belmont, one; Belfast and Northport, one; Prospect and Swanville, one; Frankfort and Monroe, one; Knox, Brooks, Jackson, and Thorndike, one.

County of Washington. The towns of Steuben, Cherryfield, and Harrington may elect one representative; Addison, Columbia, and Jonesborough, one; Machias, one; Lubec, Dennysville, plantations No. 9, No. 10, No. 11, No. 12, one; Eastport, one; Perry, Robbinston, Calais, plantations No. 3, No. 6, No. 7, No. 15, and No. 16, one.

County of Kennebec. The towns of Belgrade and Dearborn may elect one representative; Chesterville, Vienna, and Rome, one;

Wayne and Fayette, one; Temple and Wilton, one; Winslow and China, one; Fairfax and Freedom, one; Unity, Joy, and twenty-five mile pond plantation, one; Harlem and Malta, one; and each remaining town, one.

County of Oxford. The towns of Dixfield, Mexico, Weld, and plantations Nos. 1 and 4, may elect one representative; Jay and Hartford, one; Livermore, one; Rumford, East Andover, and plantations Nos. 7 and 8, one; Turner, one; Woodstock, Paris, and Greenwood, one; Hebron and Norway, one; Gilead, Bethel, Newry, Albany, and Howard's Gore, one; Porter, Hiram, and Brownfield, one; Waterford, Sweden, and Lovell, one; Denmark, Fryeburg, and Fryeburg addition, one; Buckfield and Sumner, one.

County of Somerset. The town of Fairfield may elect one representative; Norridgewock and Bloomfield, one; Starks and Mercer, one; Industry, Strong, and New Vineyard, one; Avon, Phillips, Freeman, and Kingfield, one; Anson, New Portland, Embden, and plantation No. 1, one; Canaan, Warsaw, Palmyra, St. Albans, and Corinna, one; Madison, Solon, Bingham, Moscow, and Northhill, one; Cornville, Athens, Harmony, Ripley, and Warrenstown, one.

County of Penobscot. The towns of Hampden and Newburg may elect one representative; Orrington, Brewer, and Eddington, and plantations adjacent on the east side of Penobscot river, one; Bangor, Orono, and Sunkhaze plantation, one; Dixmont, Newport, Carmel, Hermon, Stetson, and plantation No. 4, in the 6th range, one; Levant, Corinth, Exeter, New Charleston, Blakeburg plantation No. 1, the 3d range, and plantation No. 1, in 4th range, one; Dexter, Garland, Guilford, Sangerville, and plantation No. 3, in 6th range, one; Atkinson, Sebec, Foxcroft, Brownville, Williamsburg, plantation No. 1, in the 7th range, and plantation No. 3, in the 7th range, one.

And the Secretary of State *pro tempore* shall have the same powers, and be subject to the same duties, in relation to the votes for governor, as the Secretary of State has, and is subject to, by this Constitution; and the election of governor shall, on the said last Wednesday in May, be determined and declared, in the same manner, as other elections of governor are by this Constitution; and in case of vacancy in said office, the president of the senate, and speaker of the house of representatives, shall exercise the office as herein otherwise provided, and the councillors, secretary, and treasurer shall also be elected on said day, and have the same powers, and be subject to the same duties, as is provided in this Constitution; and in case of the death or other disqualification of the president of this Convention, or of the secretary of State *pro tempore*, before the election and qualification of the governor or secretary of State under this Constitution, the persons to be designated by this Convention at their session in January next, shall have all the powers and perform all the duties which the president of this convention, or the secretary *pro tempore*, to be by them appointed, shall have and perform.

SECT. 2. The period for which the governor, senators, and representatives, councillors, secretary, and treasurer, first elected or appointed, are to serve in their respective offices and places, shall commence on the last Wednesday in May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty, and continue until the first Wednesday of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty-two.

SECT. 3. All laws now in force in this State, and not repugnant to this Constitution, shall remain, and be in force, until altered or repealed by the legislature, or shall expire by their own limitation.

SECT. 4. The legislature, whenever two-thirds of both houses shall deem it necessary, may propose amendments to this Constitution; and when any amendment shall be so agreed upon, a resolution shall be passed and sent to the selectmen of the several towns, and the assessors of the several plantations, empowering and directing them to notify the inhabitants of their respective towns and plantations, in the manner prescribed by law, at their next annual meetings in the month of September, to give in their votes on the question, whether such amendments shall be made; and if it shall appear that a majority of the inhabitants voting on the question are in favor of such amendment, it shall become a part of this Constitution.

SECT. 5. All officers provided for in the sixth section of an act of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, passed on the nineteenth day of June, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nineteen, entitled "an act relating to the separation of the district of Maine from Massachusetts proper, and forming the same into a separate and independent State," shall continue in office as therein provided; and the following provisions of said act shall be a part of this Constitution, subject however to be modified or annulled as therein is prescribed, and not otherwise, to wit:

"SECT. 1. Whereas, it has been represented to this legislature that a majority of the people of the district of Maine are desirous of establishing a separate and independent government within said district; therefore,

"Be it enacted by the senate and house of representatives in general court assembled, and by the authority of the same, That the consent of this commonwealth be and the same is hereby given, that the district of Maine may be formed and erected into a separate and independent State if the people of the said district shall, in the manner and by the majority hereinafter mentioned, express their consent and agreement thereto, upon the following terms and conditions; and provided the congress of the United States shall give its consent thereto before the fourth day of March next; which terms and conditions are as follows, viz.:

"First. All the lands and buildings belonging to the commonwealth within Massachusetts proper, shall continue to belong to said commonwealth, and all the lands belonging to the commonwealth, within the district of Maine, shall belong, the one-half thereof to the said commonwealth, and the other half thereof to the State to be formed within the said district, to be divided as is hereinafter mentioned; and the lands within the said district, which shall belong to the said commonwealth, shall be free from taxation while the said lands remains in the commonwealth; and the rights of the commonwealth to their lands within said district, and the remedies for the recovery thereof, shall continue the same within the proposed State, and in the courts thereof, as they now are within the said commonwealth, and in the courts thereof; for which purposes, and for the maintenance of its rights, and recovery of its lands, the said commonwealth shall be entitled to all other proper and legal remedies, and may appear in the courts of the proposed State, and in the courts of the United States, holden therein; and all rights of action for, or entry into lands, and of

actions upon bonds, for the breach of the performance of the condition of settling duties, so called, which have accrued, or may accrue, shall remain in this commonwealth, to be enforced, commuted, released, or otherwise disposed of, in such manner as this commonwealth may hereafter determine; *provided, however,* that whatever this commonwealth may hereafter receive or obtain on account thereof, if anything, shall, after deducting all reasonable charges relating thereto, be divided, one-third part thereof to the new State, and two-third parts thereof to this commonwealth.

Second. All the arms which have been received by this commonwealth from the United States, under the law of congress, entitled 'an act making provisions for arming and equipping the whole body of militia of the United States,' passed April the twenty-third, one thousand eight hundred and eight, shall, as soon as the said district shall become a separate State, be divided between the two States, in proportion to the returns of the militia, according to which the said arms have been received from the United States, as aforesaid.

Third. All money, stock, or other proceeds, hereafter derived from the United States, on account of the claim of this commonwealth, for disbursements made, and expenses incurred, for the defence of the State during the late war with Great Britain, shall be received by this commonwealth, and when received, shall be divided between the two States, in the proportion of two-thirds to this commonwealth and one-third to the new State.

Fourth. All other property, of every description, belonging to the commonwealth, shall be holden and receivable by the same as a fund and security for all debts, annuities, and Indian subsidies, or claims due by said commonwealth; and within two years after the said district shall have become a separate State, the commissioners to be appointed, as hereinafter provided, if the said States cannot otherwise agree, shall assign a just portion of the productive property so held by said commonwealth, as an equivalent indemnification to said commonwealth for all such debts, annuities, or subsidies or claims which may then remain due or unsatisfied; and all the surplus of the said property, so holden as aforesaid, shall be divided between the said commonwealth and the said district of Maine in the proportion of two-thirds to the said commonwealth and one-third to the said district; and if, in the judgment of the said commissioners, the whole of said property so held as a fund and security shall not be sufficient indemnification for the purpose, the said district shall be liable for and shall pay to said commonwealth one-third of the deficiency.

Fifth. The new State shall, as soon as the necessary arrangements can be made for that purpose, assume and perform all the duties and obligations of this commonwealth toward the Indians within said district of Maine, whether the same arise from treaties or otherwise; and for this purpose shall obtain the assent of said Indians, and their release to this commonwealth of claims and stipulations arising under the treaty at present existing between the said commonwealth and said Indians; and as an indemnification to such new State therefor, this commonwealth, when such arrangement shall be completed, and the said duties and obligations assumed, shall pay to said new State the value of thirty thousand dollars, in manner following, *viz.*: the said commissioners shall set off, by metes and bounds, so much of any part of the land

within the said district, falling to this commonwealth, in the division of the public lands, hereinafter provided for, as in their estimation shall be of the value of thirty thousand dollars; and this commonwealth shall, thereupon, assign the same to the said new State, or in lieu thereof, may pay the sum of thirty thousand dollars at its election: which election of the said commonwealth, shall be made within one year from the time that notice of the doings of the commissioners on this subject shall be made known to the governor and council; and if not made within that time, the election shall be with the new State.

"*Sixth.* Commissioners, with the powers and for the purposes mentioned in this act, shall be appointed in manner following: the executive authority of each State shall appoint two; and the four so appointed, or the major part of them, shall appoint two more: but if they cannot agree in the appointment, the executive of each State shall appoint one in addition, not, however, in that case, to be a citizen of its own State. And any vacancy happening with respect to the commissioners shall be supplied in the manner provided for their original appointment; and, in addition to the powers herein before given to said commissioners, they shall have full power and authority to divide all the public lands within the district between the respective States, in equal shares, or moieties, in severalty, having regard to quantity, situation, and quality; they shall determine what lands shall be surveyed and divided, from time to time, the expense of which surveys, and of the commissioners, shall be borne equally by the two States. They shall keep fair records of their doings, and of the surveys made by their direction, copies of which records, authenticated by them, shall be deposited from time to time in the archives of the respective States; transcripts of which, properly certified, may be admitted in evidence, in all questions touching the subject to which they relate. The executive authority of each State may revoke the power of either or both its commissioners; having, however, first appointed a substitute, or substitutes, and may fill any vacancy happening with respect to its own commissioners; four of said commissioners shall constitute a quorum, for the transaction of business; their decision shall be final upon all subjects within their cognizance. In case said commission shall expire, the same not having been completed, and either State shall request the removal or filling up of the same, it shall be renewed or filled up in the same manner, as is herein provided for filling the same, in the first instance, and with the like powers; and if either State shall, after six months' notice, neglect or refuse to appoint its commissioners, the other may fill up the whole commission.

"*Seventh.* All grants of land, franchises, immunities, corporate or other rights, and all contracts for, or grants of land not yet located, which have been or may be made by the said commonwealth, before the separation of said district shall take place, and having or to have effect within the said district, shall continue in full force, after the said district shall become a separate State. But the grant which has been made to the president and trustees of Bowdoin College, out of the tax laid upon the banks within this Commonwealth, shall be charged upon the tax upon the banks within the said district of Maine, and paid according to the terms of said grant; and the president and trustees, and the overseers of said college, shall have, hold, and enjoy their powers and privi-

leges in all respects; so that the same shall not be subject to be altered, limited, annulled, or restrained except by judicial process, according to the principles of law; and in all grants hereafter to be made, by either State, of unlocated land within the said district, the same reservations shall be made for the benefit of schools and of the ministry as have heretofore been usual, in grants made by this commonwealth. And all lands heretofore granted by this commonwealth to any religious, literary, or eleemosynary corporation or society, shall be free from taxation, while the same continues to be owned by such corporation or society.

“Eighth. No laws shall be passed in the proposed State, with regard to taxes, actions, or remedies at law, or bars or limitations thereof, or otherwise making any distinction between the lands and rights of property of proprietors not resident in, or not citizens of said proposed State, and the lands and rights of property of the citizens of the proposed State resident therein; and the rights and liabilities of all persons shall, after the said separation, continue the same as if the said district was still a part of this commonwealth, in all suits pending, or judgments remaining unsatisfied on the fifteenth day of March next, where the suits have been commenced in Massachusetts proper, and process has been served within the district of Maine; or commenced in the district of Maine, and process has been served in Massachusetts proper, either by taking bail, making attachments, arresting and detaining persons, or otherwise, where execution remains to be done; and in such suits the courts within Massachusetts proper, and within the proposed State, shall continue to have the same jurisdiction as if the said district had still remained a part of the commonwealth. And this commonwealth shall have the same remedies within the proposed State, as it now has, for the collection of all taxes, bonds, or debts, which may be assessed, due, made, or contracted, by, to, or with the commonwealth, on, or before the said fifteenth day of March, within the said district of Maine; and all officers within Massachusetts proper and the district of Maine, shall conduct themselves accordingly.

“Ninth. These terms and conditions, as here set forth, when the said district shall become a separate and independent State, shall, *ipso facto*, be incorporated into and become and be a part of any Constitution, provisional or other, under which the government of the said proposed State shall at any time hereafter be administered, subject, however, to be modified or annulled by the agreement of the legislature of both the said States, but by no other power or body whatever.”

SECT. 6. This Constitution shall be enrolled on parchment, deposited in the secretary's office, and be the supreme law of the State, and printed copies thereof shall be prefixed to the books containing the laws of this State.

AMENDMENTS.

ARTICLE I.

*The electors resident in any city may, at any meeting duly notified for the choice of representatives, vote for such representatives

in their respective ward meetings, and the wardens in said wards shall preside impartially at such meetings, receive the vote of all qualified electors present, sort, count, and declare them in open ward meetings, and in the presence of the ward clerk, who shall form a list of the persons voted for, with the number of votes for each person against his name, shall make a fair record thereof in the presence of the warden, and in open ward meetings; and a fair copy of this list shall be attested by the warden and ward clerk, sealed up in open ward meeting, and delivered to the city clerk within twenty-four hours after the close of the polls. And the aldermen of any city shall be in session at their usual place of meeting within twenty-four hours after any election, and in the presence of the city clerk shall examine and compare the copies of said lists, and in case any person shall have received a majority of all the votes, he shall be declared elected by the aldermen; and the city clerk of any city shall make a record thereof, and the aldermen and city clerk shall deliver certified copies of such list to the person or persons so elected within ten days after the election. And the electors resident in any city may at any meetings duly notified and holden for the choice of any other civil officers for whom they have been required heretofore to vote in town meeting, vote for such officers in their respective wards, and the same proceedings shall be had by the warden and ward clerk in each ward as in the case of votes for representatives. And the aldermen of any city shall be in session within twenty-four hours after the close of the polls in such meetings, and in the presence of the city clerk shall open, examine, and compare the copies from the lists of votes given in the several wards, of which the city clerk shall make a record, and return thereof shall be made into the Secretary of State's office in the same manner as selectmen of towns are required to do.

ARTICLE II.

No person before conviction shall be bailable for any of the crimes which now are, or have been denominated capital offences since the adoption of the Constitution, where the proof is evident or the presumption great, whatever the punishment of the crimes may be.

ARTICLE III.

All judicial officers now in office or who may be hereafter appointed, shall, from and after the first day of March, in the year eighteen hundred and forty, hold their offices for the term of seven years from the time of their respective appointments (unless sooner removed by impeachment or by address of both branches of the legislature to the executive) and no longer, unless re-appointed thereto.

ARTICLE IV.

The second section, article fourth, part first, of the Constitution is amended by substituting the words *one hundred and fifty-one* for "not less than one hundred nor more than two hundred," before the word "members" in said section, so as to establish the number of representatives for the State at the number of one hundred and fifty-one; and the latter part of said section, being the words and sentences following; "and, whenever the number of representatives shall be two hundred, at the next annual meetings of election which shall thereafter be had, and at every subsequent period of

ten years, the people shall give in their votes, whether the number of representatives shall be increased or diminished, and if a majority of votes are in favor thereof, it shall be the duty of the next legislature thereafter to increase or diminish the number by the rule hereinafter prescribed," shall not be a part of the Constitution; but one hundred and fifty-one representatives shall be apportioned according to the rule in this Constitution.

ARTICLE V.

[*The annual meeting of the legislature shall be on the second Wednesday of May, in each year; and the governor and other State officers elected for the political year commencing on the first Wednesday of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-five, shall hold their offices till the second Wednesday of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and forty-six.]

ARTICLE VI.

The credit of the State shall not be directly or indirectly loaned in any case. The legislature shall not create any debt or debts, liability or liabilities, on behalf of the State, which shall singly, or in the aggregate, with previous debts and liabilities hereafter incurred at any one time, exceed three hundred thousand dollars, except to suppress insurrection, to repel invasion, or for purposes of war; but this amendment shall not be construed to refer to any money that has been, or may be deposited with this State by the government of the United States, or to any fund which the State shall hold in trust for any Indian tribe.

ARTICLE VII.

The Constitution of this State is amended in the fifth section of the first part of the fourth article, by striking out the words, "a majority of all the" and inserting instead thereof, the words, "the highest number of," and by striking out the words "a majority" where they again occur in the same section, and inserting instead thereof, the words "the highest number;" also in the first amendment to the Constitution of this State, by striking out the words "a majority of all the," and inserting instead thereof the words "the highest number of."

ARTICLE VIII.

The annual meeting of the legislature shall be on the first Wednesday of January, in each year; and the governor and other State officers elected for the political year commencing on the second Wednesday of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-one, shall hold their offices till the first Wednesday of January, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two.

ARTICLE IX.

The Constitution of this State is amended as follows:—In the sixth article it is amended by adding the following sections at the end of said article.

*Annulled. See 8th Amendment.

"SECT. 7. Judges and registers of probate shall be elected by the people of their respective counties, by a plurality of the votes given in at the annual election, on the second Monday of September, shall hold their offices for four years, commencing on the first day of January next after their election. Vacancies occurring in said offices by death, resignation or otherwise, shall be filled by election in manner aforesaid, at the September election, next after their occurrence; and in the mean time, the governor, with the advice and consent of the council, may fill said vacancies by appointment, and the persons so appointed shall hold their offices until the first day of January thereafter.

"SECT. 8. Judges of municipal and police courts shall be elected by the people of their respective cities and towns, by a plurality of the votes given in at the annual meeting in March or April, and shall hold their offices for four years from the Monday following the day of their election. Vacancies in said office shall be filled by election at the next annual meeting in March or April; and in the mean time, the governor, with the advice and consent of the council, may fill said vacancies by appointment, until the Monday following said annual meeting."*

ARTICLE X.

In the third section of the seventh article, it is amended so that said section shall read:

"SECT. 3. The major-generals shall be elected by the senate and house of representatives, each having a negative on the other. The adjutant-general and the quartermaster-generals shall be chosen annually by a joint ballot of the senators and representatives in convention. But the adjutant-general shall perform the duties of quartermaster-general until otherwise directed by law. The major-generals and brigadier-generals, and the commanding officers of regiments and battalions, shall appoint their respective staff officers; and all military officers shall be commissioned by the governor."

ARTICLE XI.

The ninth article is amended by inserting at the end thereof the following sections:

"SECT. 9. Sheriffs shall be elected by the people of their respective counties, by a plurality of the votes given in on the second Monday of September, and shall hold their offices for two years, from the first day of January next after their election. Vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as is provided in the case of judges and registers of probate.

"SECT. 10. The land agent and attorney-general shall be chosen annually by joint ballot of the senators and representatives in convention. Vacancies in said offices occurring when the legislature is not in session, may be filled by appointment by the governor, with the advice and consent of the council."

ARTICLE XII.

Section one of article two shall be amended by adding thereto the following words: "No person, however, shall be deemed to have lost his residence by reason of his absence from the State in the military service of the United States, or of this State."

*See article 12 of Amendments.

Section four of article two shall be amended by adding thereto the following provisions: " But citizens of the State absent therefrom in the military service of the United States or of this State, and not in the regular army of the United States, being otherwise qualified electors, shall be allowed to vote on Tuesday next after the first Monday of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, for governor and senators, and their votes shall be counted and allowed in the same manner, and with the same effect, as if given on the second Monday of September in that year. And they shall be allowed to vote for governor, senators, and representatives on the second Monday of September annually thereafter forever, in the manner herein provided. On the day of election a poll shall be opened at every place without this State where a regiment, battalion, battery, company, or detachment of not less than twenty soldiers from the State of Maine may be found or stationed, and every citizen of said State of the age of twenty-one years, in such military service, shall be entitled to vote as aforesaid; and he shall be considered as voting in the city, town, plantation, and county in this State where he resided when he entered the service. The vote shall be taken by regiments when it can conveniently be done; when not so convenient, any detachment or part of a regiment, not less than twenty in number, and any battery or part thereof numbering twenty or more, shall be entitled to vote wherever they may be. The three ranking officers of such regiment, battalion, battery, company, or part of either, as the case may be, acting as such on the day of election, shall be supervisors of elections. If no officers, then three non-commissioned officers, according to their seniority, shall be such supervisors. If any officer or non-commissioned officer shall neglect or refuse to act, the next in rank shall take his place. In case there are no officers or non-commissioned officers present, or if they or either of them refuse to act, the electors present, not less than twenty, may choose, by written ballot, enough of their own number, not exceeding three, to fill the vacancies, and the persons so chosen shall be supervisors of elections. All supervisors shall be first sworn to support the constitution of the United States and of this State, and faithfully and impartially to perform the duties of supervisors of elections. Each is authorized to administer the necessary oath to the others; and certificates thereof shall be annexed to the list of votes by them to be made and returned into the office of the secretary of State of this State as hereinafter provided. The polls shall be opened and closed at such hours as the supervisors, or a majority of them, shall direct; *provided however*, that due notice and sufficient time shall be given for all voters in the regiment, battalion, battery, detachment, company, or part of either, as the case may be, to vote. Regimental and field officers shall be entitled to vote with their respective commands. When not in actual command, such officers, and also all general and staff officers, and all surgeons, assistant surgeons, and chaplains, shall be entitled to vote at any place where polls are opened. The supervisors of elections shall prepare a ballot-box or other suitable receptacle for the ballots. Upon one side of every ballot shall be printed or written the name of the county, and also of the city, town, or plantation in this State in which is the residence of the person proposing to vote. Upon the other side shall be the name or names of the persons to be voted for, and

the office or offices which he or they are intended to fill. And before receiving any vote, the supervisors, or a majority of them, must be satisfied of the age and citizenship of the person claiming to vote, and that he has in fact a residence in the county, city, town, or plantation which is printed or written on the vote offered by him. If his right to vote is challenged, they may require him to make true answers, upon oath, to all interrogatories touching his age, citizenship, residence, and right to vote, and shall hear any other evidence offered by him, or by those who challenge his right. They shall keep correct poll-lists of the names of all persons allowed to vote, and of their respective places of residence in this State, and also the number of the regiment and company or battery to which they belong; which lists shall be certified by them, or by a majority of them, to be correct, and that such residence is in accordance with the indorsement of the residence of each voter on his vote. They shall check the name of every person before he is allowed to vote, and the check-mark shall be plainly made against his name on the poll-lists. They shall sort, count, and publicly declare the votes at the head of their respective commands on the day of election, unless prevented by the public enemy, and in that case as soon thereafter as may be; and on the same day of said declaration they shall form a list of the persons voted for, with the number of votes for each person against his name, and the office which he was intended to fill, and shall sign and seal up such list and cause the same, together with the poll-lists aforesaid, to be delivered into the office of the secretary of State aforesaid, on or before the first day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and on or before the fifteenth day of November annually thereafter forever. The legislature of this State may pass any law additional to the foregoing provisions, if any shall, in practice, be found necessary in order more fully to carry into effect the purpose thereof."

Section five, of article four, part first, shall be amended, by inserting after the word "meetings" in the first line, the words, "within this State." The same section shall also be amended, by striking out all after the words "town meeting" in the tenth line, as printed in the revised statutes of eighteen hundred and fifty-seven, to and including the word "election" in the thirteenth line. The same section shall also be amended, by striking out all after the word "constitution" in the twenty-first line, and inserting in the place thereof the following provisions: "And fair copies of the lists of votes shall be attested by the selectmen and town clerks of towns, and the assessors of plantations, and sealed up in open town and plantation meetings; and the town and plantation clerks respectively shall cause the same to be delivered into the secretary's office thirty days at least before the first Wednesday of January annually. And the governor and council shall examine the returned copies of such lists, and also all lists of votes of citizens in the military service, returned to the secretary's office, as provided in the amendment to article second, section four of this constitution; and twenty days before the said first Wednesday of January annually, shall issue a summons to such persons as shall appear to be elected by a plurality of all the votes returned, to attend and take their seats. But all such lists shall be laid before the house of representatives on the first Wednesday of January annually, and they shall finally determine who are elected."

Section three, of article four, part second, shall be amended, by inserting after the word "meetings" in the first line, the words, "within this State."

Section four, of article four, part second, shall be amended, by adding after the word "lists" in the second line, the words, "and also the lists of votes of citizens in the military service, returned into the secretary's office." The same section shall also be amended in the last line, by striking out the word "in," and inserting in place thereof the word "for."

Section three, of article five, part first, shall be amended, by adding after the words "senate and house of representatives," the words, "and also the lists of votes of citizens in the military service, returned into the secretary's office."

Article first, of the amendments to the Constitution of this State, heretofore adopted, shall be amended, by striking out all after the word "polls" in the thirteenth line, to and including the word "election" in the twenty-first line.

Article ninth, of said amendments, shall be amended by adding at the end thereof the following provisions:

SECT. 11. But citizens of this State, absent therefrom in the military service of the United States or of this State, and not in the regular army of the United States, being otherwise qualified electors, shall be allowed to vote for judges and registers of probate, sheriffs, and all other county officers, on the Tuesday next after the first Monday of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and sixty-four, and their votes shall be counted and allowed in the same manner and with the same effect as if given on the second Monday of September in that year. And they shall be allowed to vote for all such officers on the second Monday in September annually thereafter forever. And the votes shall be given at the same time and in the same manner, and the names of the several candidates shall be printed or written on the same ballots with those for governor, senators, and representatives, as provided in the amendment to section four of article second of this Constitution."

ARTICLE XIII.

The State is authorized to issue bonds payable within twenty-one years, at a rate of interest not exceeding six per cent a year, payable semi-annually, which bonds or their proceeds shall be devoted solely towards the reimbursement of the expenditures incurred by the cities, towns and plantations of the State for war purposes during the rebellion, upon the following basis: Each city, town, and plantation shall receive from the State one hundred dollars for every man furnished for the military service of the United States under and after the call of July second, eighteen hundred and sixty-two, and accepted by the United States towards its quota for the term of three years, and in the same proportion for every man so furnished and accepted for any shorter period; and the same shall be in full payment for any claim upon the State on account of its war debts by any such municipality. A commission appointed by the governor and council shall determine the amount to which each city, town, and plantation is entitled; to be devoted to such reimbursement, the surplus, if any, to be appropriated to the soldiers who enlisted or were drafted and went at any time during the war, or if deceased, to their legal representatives. The issue of bonds hereby authorized shall not exceed in the aggregate three million five hundred thousand dollars, and this amendment shall not be construed to permit the credit of the State to be directly or indirectly loaned in any other case or for any other purpose.

ARTICLE XIV. The legislature may by law authorize the dividing of towns having not less than four thousand inhabitants, or having voters residing on any island within the limits thereof, into voting districts for the election of representatives to the legislature, and prescribe the manner in which the votes shall be received, counted, and the result of the election declared.

SUMMARY HISTORY OF MAINE.

BY HON. WILLIAM WILLIS.

The first discovery of the coast of Maine was made by the Northmen, as early as the year 990. They made occasional visits to it until the middle of the fourteenth century, but made no attempt to settle upon it. From that time to the second voyage of Cabot, in 1498, we have no evidence that the coast was seen by any European until the French expedition under Verrazano, in 1524, of Gomez, the Spaniard, in 1525, and of Rut, under the English, in 1527, which were mere cursory visits without any results. In 1556, André Thevet, a Catholic priest, sailed in a French ship along the entire coast, entered Penobscot Bay, where he spent five days, and had numerous conferences with the natives. This is the last notice we have of Maine to the close of the sixteenth century.

The first attempt to settle upon the territory was made by the French, under du Mont, who, having received a grant from the king of France, planted a large colony on Neutral Island, in the River St. Croix, to which he gave that name in 1604; but the location being unfavorable, it was abandoned the next year. In 1605, the coast in the neighborhood of the River St. George was visited by Capt. Weymouth and explored to a small extent, which led to the well-appointed expedition to the mouth of the Kennebec River, in 1607, under command of Captain George Popham as president, and Captain Raleigh Gilbert as admiral, set forth by the noble gentlemen, Sir John Popham and Sir Ferdinando Gorges, with a view to colonize this portion of the coast, for which, and the whole country from north latitude 34 to 44, a charter had been obtained from King James, in 1606. But from various unfortunate circumstances the colony became discouraged and returned to England the next year.

In 1613, French Jesuits established a mission on Mount Desert Island, which was driven off by the English the next year. In 1616, Sir F. Gorges, a leading adventurer and promoter of colonization in Maine, sent his agent, Richard Vines, with a small company to Saco, to remain through the winter, explore the country, and test the climate. A company of fishermen was also established at Monhegan Island at this time, under Captain John Smith, who took possession of it in 1614, and thence ranged the whole coast to Cape Cod, and prepared a map upon which he affixed the name of New England.

In 1620, James I. made a division of the grand charter of 1606, and granted to the Plymouth Company, in England, the whole country lying between the 40th and 48th degrees of north latitude, and to the Virginia Company the southern portion of the original patent. This gave a new impulse to commercial operations in America, and numerous vessels were fitted out for the fish and fur trade. In 1622, Gorges and Captain John Mason obtained of the Plymouth Company a grant of the territory lying between the Merrimac and Kennebec Rivers, and the next year planted a colony at the mouth of the Piscataqua, which was the first permanent occupation of the main-land in Maine. Gorges and Mason divided their possessions, Gorges taking all east of the Piscataqua, Mason all west. In 1624, Gorges established a colony at York. In 1625, Femaquid was occupied under grants from the Plymouth Company. From 1630 to

1632 settlements were commenced in Saco, Biddeford, Scarborough, Cape Elizabeth, and Portland, all which continued to grow prosperously until the Indian war of 1675, when they were all overthrown, as well as those between the Kennebec and Penobscot Rivers. East of Penobscot River the French had possession, and very little improvement was made there until after the Revolution of 1775, although Sir William Alexander, Earl of Sterling, had a grant of the whole country to Pemaquid, including Nova Scotia. On the division by the Plymouth Company of their patent among the proprietors, the portion lying between Piscataqua and Kennebec Rivers, was awarded to Gorges, in 1635, confirmed by the king in 1639, and he forthwith established a regular government over it, under his deputy, assisted by an assembly of delegates chosen by the people; and by the king's patent of confirmation it received the name which is now extended over the whole territory. His government continued under himself and heirs, with occasional interruption, during the period of the commonwealth in England, and the usurpation of Massachusetts, until 1677, when the heirs, wearied by the conflicts with Massachusetts for jurisdiction, sold their interest to that persistent colony for £1250. Gorges died in 1647.

The Province between the Kennebec and Penobscot Rivers was granted by Charles II, in 1664, to his brother, the Duke of York, who had the year before purchased the territory awarded to the Earl of Sterling in the division of the country, of his heirs, and immediately established a government there whose seat was at the city of Pemaquid, where an expensive and strong fort was built. This country was surrendered to Massachusetts in 1686, who took possession, exercised government over it as far east as Penobscot, which, with all the territory east to the St. Croix and Nova Scotia was confirmed to her by the Provincial charter of 1691. She afterwards relinquished Nova Scotia, but all the remainder was secured to her by the treaty of 1783, which established the independence of the United States, and she retained possession and jurisdiction until the separation of 1820 took place, which constituted Maine a separate and independent member of the confederacy.

SITUATION AND AREA.

The State lies between $42^{\circ} 57'$ and $47^{\circ} 30'$ of north latitude, and $5^{\circ} 45'$ and $10^{\circ} 10'$ east longitude from Washington. It is the most eastern State of the Union, embraces an area of 32,000 square miles, or 20,000,000 acres, and is larger than all the other New England States. Its greatest length on a diagonal line from the mouth of Piscataqua River to the northern angle is 320 miles; its greatest width from the sea to the Canada line is 160 miles; on a straight line from the mouth of Piscataqua River to Quoddy Head is 250 miles.

The surface of the State is diversified; the central and north-western portions rising in lofty summits, the highest of which is Katahdin, 5300 feet above the level of the sea; Mt. Abraham, in Franklin county, is 3400 feet; Mt. Blue, in the same county, 2800 feet. Mar's Hill in Washington county, 2000 feet. The Highlands, at the Monument on the Canada line, is 2000 feet above the sea level. On the coast are some prominent eminences which attract the mariner as he approaches the coast, as Mt. Desert, the Camden Hills, on the Penobscot, 1500 feet in height, and Agamenticus, in York, 670 feet.

Among these mountains and hills are rich and wide-spread valleys watered by large and never-failing rivers, furnished with numerous and valuable falls, and water-power capable of moving an indefinite amount of machinery, and already largely employed.

CLIMATIC STATISTICS OF MAINE.

By tables kept at the Observatory on Munjoy's Hill, Portland, 160 feet above the level of high-water, for 32 years, 1825 to 1857, the *annual average* temperature was 43° 29' Far. The highest point attained was 100° 5', the lowest Jan. 24, 1857, 25° below zero. The highest *mean* temperature in any month was 71°, July, 1825; the lowest, 13° above zero, January, 1844.

The following deductions are made from the Meteorological record kept by Prof. Cleaveland, of Bowdoin College, at Brunswick, from 1807 to 1859. Average annual temperature, April 20°, October 24°. Mean temperature, 44° 40' Far. The hottest day falls on July 22, 31 days after summer solstice; the coldest day, Jan. 13, 28 days after winter solstice. Lowest temperature for the 52 years was 30° below zero at Brunswick; the highest 102°.

Average number of rainy days in the year is 64, varying between 39 and 95; average number of snowy days 30, varying between 19 and 50. The greatest number of rainy or snowy days occur with north-east wind, the least with west wind. July is the only month in which no frost occurred.

In Portland, the amount of rain and snow reduced to water, which fell in 1857, was 47.66 inches; 1858, 43.42 inches; 1859, 48.55 inches. Mean barometric pressure at a station 85½ feet above the sea, 29.9 inches.

By tables kept in Salem, Mass., for 43 years, by Dr. Holyoke, the mean annual temperature there was found to be 47° 9'.

Public Officers---Qualifications---How Chosen.

The *Governor* is chosen annually by a majority of votes; in case of no election by the people, the House of Representatives sends to the Senate the names of two from the four candidates receiving the highest number of votes, and the Senate chooses one of those two Governor. He must be thirty years old, a natural born citizen of the United States, and five years a resident of the State, and continue to reside in it while in office; no person holding an office under the United States can exercise the office of Governor.

In case of vacancy, the President of the Senate succeeds to the office.

The *Council* consists of seven persons, having the same qualifications as Representatives, elected annually, in joint convention of both branches of the Legislature; it is assembled by the Governor in his discretion, and their resolutions are to be recorded in a register, and signed by those agreeing thereto. The Governor and Council appoint all judicial officers, except Judges of Probate and of Municipal and Police Courts; and Coroners, the Governor nominates, subject to the confirmation of the Council. The Heads of Departments are, Secretary of State, Treasurer, Attorney-general, Land Agent, and Adjutant-general, chosen annually in the same manner as the Councilors. County Treasurers, Registers of Deeds, Registers of Probate, Sheriffs, County Commissioners, and Clerks of Court, are chosen by the voters of the several counties.

The *Legislature* consists of a Senate and House of Representatives, members chosen annually. Senators, thirty-one in number, must be twenty-five years old, must have been citizens of the United States five years, and inhabitants of the State one year, and during their term and for the three months next preceding their election, must be residents of their district. The districts are based upon population. A majority of ballots is necessary for an election. In case of non-election, or vacancy, choice is made by joint convention of both branches. They must be chosen from the candidates having the highest number of votes; twice as many candidates as there are vacancies in the district are eligible. Representatives, one hundred and fifty-one in number, must have the same qualifications as Senators, save they may be only twenty-one years old, and are elected from districts fixed by law by a plurality of votes.

The *Judiciary* consists of—1. A Supreme Court of eight judges, appointed by the Governor and Council for a term of seven years; 2. Superior Court of Cumberland county one judge, appointed in the same way and for the same term; 3. Probate Courts in each county, the judge elected by the people of the county for a term of four years; 4. Municipal and Police Courts in the larger cities, with a judge elected by the city for a term of four years; 5. Trial Justices appointed by Governor and Council for seven years, with jurisdiction not exceeding twenty dollars.

Rights and Qualifications of Voters in Maine.

Constitution, Art. II., Sec. 1, provides that every male citizen of the United States, of the age of twenty-one years and upwards, excepting paupers, persons under guardianship, and Indians not taxed, having his residence established in this State for the term of three months next preceding any election, shall be an elector for governor, senators, and representatives, in the town or plantation where his residence is so established. But persons in the military, naval, or marine service of the United States, or of this State, shall not be considered as having obtained such established residence by being stationed in any garrison, barrack, or military place, in any town or plantation; nor shall the residence of a student at any seminary of learning entitle him to the right of suffrage in the town or plantation where such seminary is established.

Revised Statutes of 1871, Chap. 3, Sect. 9, provides,—Every person, who is qualified by the Constitution of this State to vote for governor, senators, and representatives, in the town in which he resides, is entitled to vote in the election of all town officers, and in all the business affairs thereof.

By the opinions of the Justices, 7th Maine Repts., 492-497, persons under the care of the overseers of the poor of a town, who have been disposed of by them for any term of time for their support, are to be considered paupers, though by their labor they defray their own expenses; and such persons, as well as those who have received assistance from towns as paupers, are deprived of the privilege of voting for State officers until the expiration of three months after they shall have ceased to receive support.

A person supporting his family in one town and residing to transact business in another, can vote for State officers only in the town where his family has resided for three months next preceding the election.

History of Parties.

The two great political parties in the United States grew out of the different views entertained by the leading men in regard to the Constitution which was proposed for adoption. The conflict of opinion on that subject was very severe, and a distressing doubt existed as to the adoption of the Constitution, which was submitted to the people by the convention. These parties took the names of Federalists and Anti-federalists. The latter were afterwards known by the names, Republican and Democrat. These two grand divisions maintained their distinct organizations until the close of the war of 1812, dividing upon many questions of internal administration and foreign policy; as well as on men to represent them in the government; as, after Washington, between Adams and Jefferson, Madison, Clinton, etc. But the war of 1812 absorbed the old political issues, many of the leading politicians deeming it of paramount importance to sustain the government in that crisis. Mr. Monroe, a former Republican, was consequently elected with great unanimity in 1816. On his second election in 1820, he received every electoral vote but Gov. Plummer's, in New Hampshire. Thus it will be seen that the old political parties ceased to exist as separate organizations under Mr. Monroe's administration. Timothy Pickering, a member of Congress, and an ultra of the Republican school, declared on the floor of the House, that the government having pursued a policy mainly conforming to the doctrines of his party, he had no desire to oppose the administration of Mr. Monroe: New questions arose as to the tariff, internal improvements, slavery, etc., so entirely different from the old issues, that new combinations were formed, and old thorough-bred Federalists were found associating in close alliance with their former radical opponents over the Democratic side. And Henry Clay, John Holmes, Peleg Sprague, Levi Lincoln, John Q. Adams, now united with Gore and King, and Otis and Pickering, old federal leaders, and formed the great *National Republican* party in opposition to the election of General Jackson in 1820. This name in turn gave place in the exciting presidential campaign of 1832, to the more popular term of Whig, under whose banner the opponents of Gen Jackson for his second term rallied in support of Henry Clay; but all in vain, even though they had the aid of Maryland, and the sympathy of Calhoun. But this great party became hopelessly divided on the slavery question in 1843 and subsequent years, and ceased to exist in 1854; a portion joining the American party, or "Know Nothings." Some of the Democrats and others united with refugees from all other national organizations to constitute the great Republican party of the present day.

In Maine, the question of separation from Massachusetts absorbed the former party issues, many of the old Federalists having joined the Republican party in support of a separate government. And it being understood, if not actually pledged, that the offices of the new State should be filled by the best men without regard to their former political opinions, General

King, who had been a leading and most active agent in the cause of separation, and a prominent Democrat, was designated by general consent as chief magistrate, and elected without opposition. But before his term of office expired he was appointed a Commissioner under the Spanish treaty, and his unexpired term was filled by William D. Williamson, President of the Senate.

But at the second election a very exciting controversy arose between two prominent men of the same Democratic party, Mr. Parris and General Wingate, for this chief prize, and their personal friends pursued the game with exceeding bitterness. Mr. Parris won by superior tactics and having the chief party leaders. The Federalists made no nomination, but continued for several years to throw their votes for their favorite candidate, Judge Whitman.

Gov. Parris's administration was successful and popular; there were no exciting political topics to agitate the public mind, and all opposition to his reelection ceased. He was continued in office until 1826, when he peremptorily declined a further nomination. The following year he was chosen a Senator in Congress.

LAW TERMS.

The State of Maine is divided into three Judicial Districts, as follows:

Eastern District—Aroostook, Hancock, Penobscot, Piscataquis, Waldo, and Washington counties.

Middle District—Kennebec, Knox, Lincoln, Sagadahoc, and Somerset counties.

Western District—Androscoggin, Cumberland, Franklin, Oxford, and York counties.

There are annual sessions of the Supreme Judicial Court as a court of law, holden as follows:

At Bangor, on the third Tuesday of June, for the eastern district; at Augusta, on the fourth Tuesday of May, for the middle district; and at Portland, on the third Tuesday of July, for the western district.

NISI PRIUS TERMS.

Trial terms of the court are held annually as follows:

Androscoggin—At Auburn, on the third Tuesday of January, April, and September, civil and criminal.

Aroostook—At Houlton, on the last Tuesday of February, and third Tuesday of September, civil and criminal.

Cumberland—At Portland, on the second Tuesday of January, April, and October, civil. [The Superior Court for said county has exclusive criminal jurisdiction.]

NORTH YARMOUTH.

Fourteen miles N. of Portland. On G. T. R. and M. C. R. R. Granted to Joseph Phippon and others in 1680, and extended from the sea, five miles on each bank of Westecustigo (Royall's river), seven and one half miles. Waste land between this grant and Falmouth, also New Damariscove Island added, and the whole territory named North Yarmouth, Sept. 22, 1680. Settlement broken up by Indians in 1688, and renewed, 1721-22. Rev. Ammi R. Cutter settled first pastor, 1730. Freeport set off and incorporated, 1789; Pownal, 1808; Cumberland, 1821; Yarmouth, 1849. OTISFIELD.

Thirty-six miles N. N. W. of Portland. On Davis's stage-line to Bolster's Mills, also on stage-line from Oxford, on G. T. Railroad to Naples. June 14, 1777, granted to Hon. James Otis, Nathaniel Gorham, and the rest of the heirs and assigns of Capt. John Gorham, for services against Canada in 1770. First plantation meeting held in house of Stephen Phinney, May 15, 1787. David Ray, moderator, Joseph Wight, jr., clerk, David Ray, Benj. Patch, and Noah Reed, assessors, and Jonathan Moors, collector. March 26, 1794, first voted for representative to congress. May 10, 1797, raised \$400 for highways, which were accepted, the three first roads in town, Sept. 13, 1797. Aug. 23, 1797, voted to settle Thomas Roby, first plantation minister. Incorporated and named for Harrison Gray Otis, one of the original proprietors, Feb. 19, 1798, and included all of Otisfield, nearly all of Harrison, and a large part of Naples. First town meeting, Sept. 1, 1797. First saw-mill built by David Ray. William G. Cobb, first male child, born Oct. 14, 1779. Incorporated the 115th town, Feb. 19, 1798. Population—1790, 197; 1850, 117; 1860, 1201; 1870, 1100. Valuation, 1860—Polls, 285; Estates, \$255,904; 1870—Polls, 269; Estates, \$298,582.

CITY OF PORTLAND.

Originally a part of ancient Falmouth. First settled by George Cleaves and Richard Tucker in 1632. Ancient Indian name, Machigone. Settlement entirely destroyed in 1676, during the first Indian war, and resettled 1680, under Pres. Danforth. The town was again destroyed by the French and Indians in 1690. After the conclusion of peace, some of the inhabitants began to return, and, about 1713, the settlement had regained something of its early prosperity, and a gradual and steady progress was made from this time. In 1727, March 7, a church was organized, the first on the east of Saco river, over which Rev. Thomas Smith was then ordained the pastor. In 1733, Robert Bayley was employed as schoolmaster. In 1735, it was made half shire town with York. Early in the war of the Revolution, the town suffered a third time from the ravages of war, being bombarded by the British fleet under Capt. Mowatt, Oct. 18, 1775, and almost completely destroyed. Portland was incorporated as a town July 4, 1786, and adopted a city charter March 26, 1832. Suffered from a terrible fire July 4th and 5th, 1866, in which nearly one third of the city was destroyed. Population—1790, 2246; 1850, 12,815; 1860, 26,341; 1870, 31,408. Valuation, 1860—Polls, 4244; Estates, \$17,865,000; 1870—Polls, 7814; Estates, \$29,439,257.

Jones of Portsmouth, N. H., who effected a permanent settlement in May of same year. In 1765, the colony was largely increased. Military company formed in 1769. Granted as a township April 26, 1770, and first proprietors' meeting Sept. 11, 1770. Rev. James Lyon employed first minister, 1771. First church built, 1774. The Margaretta captured June 12, 1775. The English schooner Diligence and her tender Tatmagouch, captured July 14, 1775. English fleet, under Sir Robert Collier, repulsed Aug. 14, 1777. Incorporated the 42d town, and the first between the Penobscot and St. Croix, June 23, 1784, and embraced East Machias, Whitneyville, Machiasport, and Marshfield. 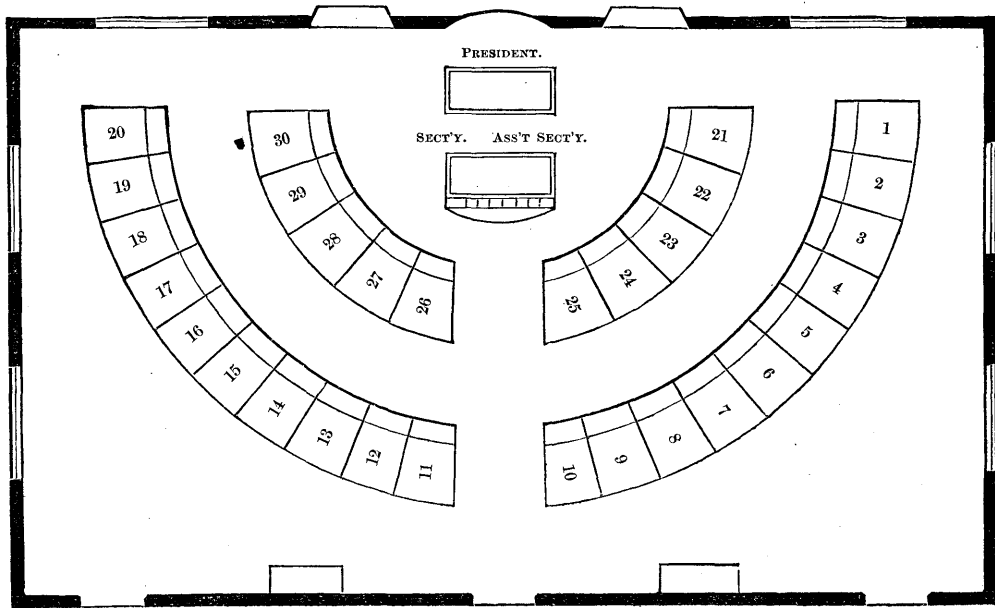

RULES OF COUNCIL.

1.

At the time appointed for the meeting of the board, it shall be the duty of the members to be in their places.

2.

When the board shall have been called to order by the governor, the journal of the preceding day shall be read by the secretary of State.

3.

The following standing committees shall be appointed, viz. :—on accounts ; on warrants ; on military affairs ; on State pensions ; on prison affairs ; on reform school ; on Indian affairs ; on public buildings ; on the insane hospital ; on deaf, dumb, and blind ; on public instruction ; on the library ; on public lands ; and on pay-roll.

4.

All committees shall be appointed by the governor, and shall consist of three members, unless otherwise ordered.

5.

In case the governor shall be absent at the time appointed for the meeting of the board, the members shall be called to order by the senior councillor present, who shall act as chairman.

6.

In debate upon any question, or in the presentation of any business, the members shall address the governor, standing in their places.

7.

A majority of the board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

8.

All communications to the two branches of the legislature shall be transmitted by the secretary of State.

9.

Every member who shall present a petition, shall place his name thereon, and a brief statement of its contents.

10.

The yeas and nays shall be called upon the nomination of all officers of important grade. Upon the nomination of State officers, the call shall begin with the senior councillor; upon county nominations, with the councillor representing said county, and then according to seniority.

11.

Persons having business with the governor, any member of the council, or the secretary of State, shall be required to make their wishes known through the messenger.

12.

No person shall be admitted into the council cham-

ber except by permission of the governor, one of the councillors, or the secretary of State.

13.

No member shall absent himself without leave; nor shall leave be asked or granted unless a quorum be still left at the board; and no member absenting himself without leave shall be entitled to pay for the time of his absence.

14.

No member shall act as council for any party before a committee of the legislature.

15.

No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of a majority of all the members.

RULES.

1. The president shall take the chair at the time to which the senate stands adjourned; but in case the president shall be absent, the secretary shall preside until a president *pro tempore* be chosen.

2. At the first session of each day, on the appearance of a quorum, the journal of the preceding day shall be read.

3. When the president speaks, he shall address the senate. When a senator speaks, he shall stand in his place and address the president, and when done speaking shall take his seat.

4. The president, when he speaks to any member of the senate, and the members when referring to each other in debate, shall use in their addresses the title of *senator*, and by way of distinction name the county in which he resides.

5. The president shall have the right to name a senator to perform the duties of the chair during his absence; but the substitution shall not extend beyond an adjournment.

6. The president may read sitting, but he shall rise to put a question. He shall declare all votes; but if any senator doubt the vote, all those voting in the affirmative, when called upon by the president, shall rise and stand until they are counted, and also those in the negative, in like manner, to make the vote certain.

7. The president shall consider a motion to adjourn as always first in order, and it shall be decided without debate.

8. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received but to adjourn, to lay on the table, to postpone to a day certain, to commit, to amend, or to postpone indefinitely; which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they stand arranged.

9. A motion shall be reduced to writing, if desired by the president or any senator, and shall then be deemed to be in possession of the senate, to be disposed of by the senate; but the mover may withdraw

it at any time before a decision or amendment be made to it.

10. The senator who shall first rise and address the chair, on any question, shall be entitled to the floor; and the president shall determine all questions of priority under this rule.

11. No senator shall speak more than once to the same question, to the prevention of any other who desire to speak and has not spoken, nor more than twice without first obtaining leave of the board, if any senator objects, unless he be the mover of the matter under debate, and then not more than three times without leave as aforesaid.

12. No senator shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order.

13. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

14. An amendment proposed may be amended before it is adopted, but not afterwards, except the vote adopting it be first reconsidered.

15. When a motion has been made and carried, it shall be in order for any member of the majority to move for a reconsideration thereof, on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider any vote shall not be laid on the table unless a time shall be specially assigned for its consideration.

16. Questions of order shall be decided by the president without debate; but if an appeal is taken, the

same may be debated like other questions, and the decision thereon shall be entered upon the journal.

17. A question containing two or more propositions capable of division, shall be divided whenever desired by any member.

18. In filling up blanks, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

19. Every paper shall be once read at the table, before any senator shall be obliged to vote on it, but when the reading of a paper is called for, that has been before read to the senate, if any senator object, the question shall be determined by the senate.

20. All bills and resolves in the second reading shall be committed to the committee on bills in the second reading, to be by them examined, corrected, and so reported to the senate.

21. Upon the second reading of a bill or resolve, after the same shall be read through, and before the question is put on its passage, it shall be read and considered by paragraphs, at the request of any member of the senate; and no bill or resolve shall have a second reading, unless a time, not less than one hour after the first reading, be assigned therefor.

22. No bill or resolve shall pass to be engrossed, without being twice read; and all bills and resolves, immediately after the same shall have been engrossed, shall be committed to the committee on engrossed bills; whose duty shall be to examine the same, and to see that the same have been truly engrossed; and

before any bill shall pass to be enacted, or any resolve be finally passed, it shall be reported by the committee for the examination of engrossed bills, to be truly and strictly engrossed, and the title thereof be read by the president.

23. No resolve of any kind, or order making any grant of money, lands, or other public property, shall be passed without being read on two several days; the time for the second reading shall be assigned by the senate.

24. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st, House papers not acted on; and if accompanied by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve.

2d, Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments.

3d, The reception and reference of petitions and such other papers, except bills and resolves, as require action by a committee.

4th, Reports of committees, and if accomplished by a bill or resolve, the first reading of such bill or resolve. Bills, resolves, etc., offered by senators, and their reference or first reading.

5th, Bills and resolves reported by the committee on bills in the second reading.

6th, Bills on their passage to be enacted, and resolves on their final passage.

It shall be the duty of the secretary to number bills

and resolves in the order in which they shall be reported by said committee, and enter them upon the calendar in such order. They shall be taken up for their second reading and passage to be engrossed, or other disposition, in the order in which they stand upon the calendar. When a bill or resolve, after it is put on the calendar, is laid on the table, and no time assigned for its further consideration, it shall go to the foot of the calendar as it then stands. Papers from the house, concerning which there has been a disagreeing vote of the two houses, shall be disposed of before commencing with the calendar. This rule shall not apply to or interfere with motions to reconsider, or special assignments or other privileged questions.

25. When the yeas and nays are taken, the names of the senators shall be called alphabetically.

26. After a question is put to vote, no senator shall speak on it. Every senator who may be present shall vote unless excused by the senate, or excluded by interest.

27. The unfinished business, in which the senate was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day.

28. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the house without notice thereof being given to the senate by the president.

29. Every member who shall present a petition, shall place his name thereon and a brief statement of its subject.

30. All confidential communications made by the governor to the senate, shall be by the members thereof kept inviolably sacred until the senate shall by their resolution take off the injunction of secrecy.

31. No rule shall be dispensed with, except by the consent of two-thirds of the members present.

32. Any member of the senate may exchange seats on consulting the president and obtaining his permission.

33. No member shall absent himself from the senate without leave, unless there be a quorum left present.

34. All committees shall be nominated by the president (unless when it may be determined that the election shall be by ballot), and appointed by the senate.

35. The following standing committee shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz.:

STANDING COMMITTEES OF THE SENATE.

On bills in the second reading.

On engrossed bills.

To consist of twelve members each. Any one of the first, and any two of the second shall constitute a quorum.

36. No member of the senate shall act as counsel for any party before any committee of the legislature.

37. All messages from the senate to the house, and to the governor, or governor and council, shall be carried by the secretary, unless the senate shall direct some other mode of transmission, and all papers shall

be transmitted to the governor and council, and to the house, by the secretary or his assistant.

38. No bill or resolve, the subject-matter of which has been acted upon by a committee, shall be laid upon the table by leave.

39. The senate may, at any time, upon motion, by vote of a majority of the members present, resolve itself into a committee of the whole for the purpose of considering any subject named in the motion; and a chairman shall be appointed by the president. If a message is announced while the senate is in such committee, the president shall resume the chair for the purpose of receiving it; immediately after which, the committee shall proceed, until dissolved in the usual manner.

40. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, and Cushing's Law and Practice of Legislative Assemblies, shall govern the senate in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules of the senate, or the joint rules of the two houses.

RULES OF THE HOUSE.

RULES.

DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE SPEAKER.

1. It shall be the duty of the speaker to take the chair at the hour to which the house shall have adjourned, call the members to order, and, after the appearance of a quorum, cause the journal of the preceding day to be read;

To announce the business before the house in the order in which it is to be acted upon;

To receive and submit to vote all motions and propositions regularly moved or that necessarily arise in the course of proceedings, and announce the result;

To restrain the members, when engaged in debate, within the rules of order; and to enforce, on all occasions, the observance of order and decorum among the members;

To decide all questions of order, subject to an appeal to the house;

To receive all messages and other communications and announce them to the house;

To authenticate by his signature bills that have passed to be enacted, and resolves finally passed;

To name the members who are to serve on committees, unless the house otherwise direct;

To appoint the member who shall take the chair, when the house has determined to go into committee of the whole;

And to name a member to perform his duties during

his absence for a time not exceeding the remainder of the day.

2. The speaker may address the house on points of order, in preference to other members; and may vote in all cases.

DUTIES OF THE CLERK.

3. The clerk shall keep a journal of what is done by the house; read papers when required by the house or speaker; call the roll alphabetically, and note the answers of members, when the house orders, or when a question is taken by yeas and nays; notify committees of their appointment and of the business referred to them; authenticate by his signature all the orders and proceedings of the house not authenticated by the speaker; have charge of all the documents and papers of every kind confided to the care of the house; bear all messages and transmit all papers from the house to the governor or to the senate, unless the house shall otherwise order; and in the absence of the speaker at the hour for meeting, shall preside until a speaker *pro tem.* be chosen; and at the close of the session shall file in an orderly manner all papers and documents, in possession of the house, passed upon or received during the session; and at the commencement of the next legislature, shall preside until the election of speaker, and record the doings of the house until a new clerk shall be chosen and qualified; and in the absence of the clerk, the assistant clerk shall be clerk *pro tempore* with power to appoint an assistant.

CHAPLAINS.

4. Every morning, the house, on assembling, shall join with the chaplain in religious service.

5. The chaplains may exchange duties with each other or with the chaplains of the senate.

MONITORS.

6. One monitor shall be appointed by the speaker for each division of the house, whose duty shall be, to see to the observance of the rules of the house, and on demand of the speaker, to return the number of votes and members in his division.

7. If any member shall transgress any of the rules of the house, and persist therein, after being notified thereof by any monitor, it shall be the duty of such monitor to give information thereof to the house.

COMMITTEES.

8. The following standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, whose duty shall be to consider all subjects referred to them and report thereon :

On elections,

On engrossed bills,

On finance,

On bills in the third reading,

On leave of absence,

On the pay-roll,

-
- On change of names,
To consist of seven members each.
 - On county estimates,
To consist of one member from each county.
 - On the business of the House,
To consist of three members.

9. In all elections by ballot, of committees of the house, the person having the highest number of votes shall act as chairman. In case two or more persons receive the same number of votes, the committee, by a majority of their number, shall elect a chairman.

RIGHTS AND DUTIES OF MEMBERS.

10. The seat which a member draws at the commencement of the session, shall be his during the session, unless he shall have leave of the speaker to change it.

11. No member shall sit at the desk of the speaker or clerk, except by the permission of the speaker.

12. When two or more members rise at the same time, the speaker shall name the person to speak; but in all cases the member who shall rise first and address the chair, shall speak first.

13. No member shall interrupt another while speaking, except to call to order, or to correct a mistake.

14. No member shall speak more than twice to the same question, without first asking leave of the house.

15. No member shall speak out of his place without leave from the chair, nor without first rising and addressing the speaker; and he shall sit down as soon as he has done speaking.

16. No member shall act as counsel for any party, before a joint committee of the legislature, or a committee of this house.

17. No member shall be permitted to stand up to the interruption of another, while any member is speaking, or pass unnecessarily between the speaker of the house and the person speaking; or stand in an alley, or sit or stand covered, during the session of the house.

18. Every member shall make out and deliver to the clerk or to the committee on pay-roll, a statement of the number of miles usually travelled in going from his residence to the seat of government.

19. Every member who shall neglect to give his attendance in the house for more than six days after the session commences, shall, on making his appearance therein, be held to render the reason for such neglect; and in case the reason assigned shall be deemed by the house sufficient, such member shall be entitled to receive pay for his travel, and not otherwise; and no member shall be absent more than two days without leave of the house; and no member shall have such leave, unless it be reported by the committee on leave of absence; and no leave of absence shall avail any member who retains his seat more than five days from the time the same was obtained.

20. Any member having obtained leave of absence, and having in his possession any papers relating to the business before the house, shall leave the same to the clerk.

21. When any member shall be guilty of a breach of any of the rules and orders of the house, and the house has determined he has so transgressed, he shall not be allowed to vote, or speak, unless by way of excuse for the same, until he has made satisfaction.

22. Every member who shall be in the house when a question is put, where he is not excluded by interest, shall give his vote, unless the house, for special reason, shall excuse him, and when the yeas and nays are ordered, no member shall leave his seat until the vote is declared. In all elections by the house, or in joint ballot of the two houses, no member shall leave his seat, after voting, before a return of the house is had.

23. When the galleries shall be ordered to be cleared or shut, the matter which may occasion such order, shall be kept secret by each member, until the house shall order such injunction of secrecy to be taken off.

24. No person not a member or officer of the house, except members of the senate, its secretary and assistants, the governor and council, state treasurer, secretary of State, land-agent, adjutant-general, judges of the supreme judicial court, chaplains of the senate, and reporters of the proceedings and debates of the house, shall be admitted within the representatives' hall unless invited by some member of the house.

PROCEEDINGS AND DEBATES.

25. After the reading of the journal, the following shall be the order of business:

1st, Senate papers, and first reading of accompanying bills and resolves;

2d, Messages and documents from the executive and heads of departments;

3d, Receptions of petitions, bills, and resolves, requiring reference to any committee;

4th, Orders;

5th, Reports of committees and first reading of bills or resolves;

6th, Bills and resolves reported by committee on bills in the third reading, and on their passage to be engrossed;

7th, Bills on their passage to be enacted;

8th, Orders of the day.

The speaker shall announce each item of business in its turn, and no paper shall be taken up out of its regular order, except by the unanimous consent of the house. The orders of the day shall take precedence of all other business at the expiration of the morning hour.

26. It shall be the duty of the clerk to make up daily a calendar of bills, resolves, and other papers, assigned for that day's consideration, and also a calendar of bills and resolves which have had their first reading, and showing the disposition that has been made of each.

27. The unfinished business in which the house was engaged at the time of the last adjournment, shall have preference in the orders of the day, and shall

continue to be among the orders of the day for each succeeding day until disposed of, and no motion or other business shall be received, without special leave of the house until the former is disposed of.

28. When a question is under debate, no motion shall be received, but

- 1st, To adjourn;
- 2d, To lay on the table;
- 3d, For the previous question;
- 4th, To commit;
- 5th, To postpone to a day certain;
- 6th, To amend;
- 7th, To postpone indefinitely;

Which several motions shall have precedence in the order in which they are arranged.

Questions of concurrence or otherwise with the senate shall have precedence of each other in the following order:

- 1st, To recede,
- 2d, To concur;
- 3d, To insist;
- 4th, To adhere.

29. A motion to adjourn shall always be first in order, and shall be decided without debate.

30. A vote to lay a proposition on the table shall not preclude the further consideration of it on the same day.

31. When motion for the previous question is made, the consent of one-third of the members present shall

be necessary to authorize the speaker to entertain it. No debate shall be allowed until the matter of consent is determined. The previous question shall be submitted in the following words: *Shall the main question be put now?* No member shall speak more than five minutes on the motion for the previous question, and while that question is pending, a motion to lay on the table shall be decided without debate. A call for the yeas and nays, or for division of a question, shall be in order after the main question has been ordered to be put. After the adoption of the previous question, the vote shall be taken forthwith upon amendments, and then upon the main question.

32. Propositions to amend by striking out and inserting dates, numbers and sums, are not divisible; but all propositions, otherwise divisible, shall be divided at the request of any ten members. A motion to strike out being lost, shall neither preclude amendments, nor a motion to strike out and insert.

33. In filling blanks, and in assigning times for the consideration of business, the largest sum and longest time shall be put first.

34. When a proposition consists of several paragraphs or sections, amendment of one of them shall not preclude amendment of a prior paragraph or section.

35. No motion or proposition on a subject different from that under consideration shall be admitted under color of amendment.

36. After a motion or order is stated or read by the speaker, and seconded, it shall be regarded as in the possession of the house, and shall be disposed of by vote of the house. But any motion or order may be withdrawn by the mover at any time before a decision or amendment, except a motion to reconsider, which shall not be withdrawn except by consent of the house.

37. Every motion shall be reduced to writing, if required by the speaker or by any member.

38. No member shall be permitted to lay a motion in writing on the table, until he shall have read the same in his place.

39. When a vote having been declared by the speaker, is doubted, the members for and against the question, when called on by the speaker, shall rise and stand till they are counted, and the vote made certain without further debate. But a call for the yeas and nays shall be in order at any time before such a vote is made certain and declared.

40. When a motion has been once made and carried in the affirmative, or negative, it shall not be in order for any member who voted in the minority, to move for a reconsideration thereof; but any member who voted with the majority, or in the negative on a tie vote, may move to reconsider on the same or succeeding day. A motion to reconsider shall not be postponed nor laid on the table without a time certain assigned for its further consideration. When a motion for reconsideration has been decided, the vote shall

not be reconsidered. A motion to reconsider shall not be in order, more than once on the same question.

41. When a member shall move, or give notice of his intention to move, a reconsideration of any vote, the papers to which the motion relates shall remain in possession of the clerk until the question of reconsideration shall have been decided, or the right to move such question is lost.

42. In all elections by ballot of the house a time shall be assigned for such election, at least one day previous thereto.

43. When a reading of a paper is called for, which has been before read to the house, and the same is objected to by any member, the question of reading shall be determined by a vote of the house.

44. Every question of order, which shall be decided on appeal, shall be entered on the journal of the house, with the decision thereon.

45. A proposition to require the opinion of the judges of the supreme court, as provided by the constitution, shall not be acted upon until the next day after such proposition is made.

46. All petitions, memorials, and other papers addressed to the house, shall be presented by the speaker, or by a member in his place, and shall be indorsed with the name of the person presenting it, and the subject-matter of the same. They shall be read by the speaker, clerk, or such other person as the speaker may request, and shall be taken up in the order they

were first presented, unless the house shall otherwise direct.

47. All bills in their third reading, and resolves in their second reading, shall be committed to the standing committee on bills in the third reading, to be by them examined and corrected.

48. All resolves appropriating money or land shall have their second reading on Wednesday of the week following that of their first reading.

49. All engrossed bills and resolves shall be committed to the standing committee on engrossed bills, to be strictly examined; and if found by them to be truly and strictly engrossed, they shall so report to the house, and the question shall be taken without any further reading, unless on motion of any member, a majority of the house shall be in favor of reading the same as engrossed.

50. Every bill, or resolve, providing for the grant of money, land, or other public property, which may be laid on the table by leave, and any report of a committee upon any bill or resolve providing for such grant, shall be accompanied by a written statement of facts in each case; and no such bill or resolve shall be considered before such statement is made, or pass without being read on two several days.

51. No new bill or resolve of a public nature, shall be received, except it be reported by a committee, unless the house otherwise order; and all bills and resolves

not reported by a committee, shall be laid upon the table for one day, before further action thereon.

52. No act or resolve shall be passed affecting the rights of individuals or corporations, without previous notice to such individuals or corporations.

53. No bill shall pass to be engrossed until it shall have had three several readings; the times for the second and third readings shall be assigned by the house; but if no objection is made, the second reading may be by title, and at the time of the first. Every resolve which shall require the approval of the governor, shall have two several readings; the second reading shall be subject to the provisions of the third reading of bills.

54. No engrossed bill or resolve shall be sent to the senate, without notice thereof being given to the house by the speaker.

55. When a bill or resolve shall be returned by the governor with his objections, the question shall be stated by the chair, *Shall this bill become a law notwithstanding the objections of the governor?* and the same in substance in case of a resolve; which question may be postponed to a day within the session, not exceeding one week, or may be committed. But no other question shall apply to bills and resolves originating in either branch.

56. The rules of parliamentary practice comprised in Cushing's Manual, excepting section 51, relating to reception of petitions, shall govern the house in all

cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistent with the standing rules and orders of the house, and the joint rules of the senate and house of representatives.

57. No rule or order of the house shall be dispensed with, unless two-thirds of the members present shall consent thereto.

58. No rule or order of the house shall be altered or repealed, nor shall any new standing rule or order be adopted, unless one day's previous notice thereof be given in each case; and such notice shall be entered on the journal.

JOINT RULES OF THE TWO HOUSES.

8. Notice to be given by one branch to the other, of disagreeing action; bills and resolves to be presented to the governor for approval.
9. Indorsement of papers to be by secretary; final passage to be indorsed by presiding officers.
10. Bills or resolves of public nature to be printed.
11. Number of copies of printed documents; proportion to each house.
12. Business which may be done in convention.
13. Committees of conference; reports thereof.
14. Measures finally acted on not to be revived; except on three days' notice.
15. Messages, how announced.
16. Suspension of rules.
17. Not to vote where their private rights, distinct from their public interests, are concerned.

JOINT RULES.

1. The following joint standing committees shall be appointed at the commencement of the session, viz.:

On the judiciary,

On federal relations,

On military affairs,

On coast and frontier defences,

On railroads, ways, and bridges,

On mercantile affairs and insurance,

On legal reform,

On education,

On banks and banking,

On agriculture and State college of agriculture,
and the mechanic arts,

On manufactures,

On interior waters,

On State lands and State roads

On division of towns,

On division of counties,

On incorporation of towns,

On fisheries,

On Indian affairs,

On claims,

On pensions,

On insane hospital,

On reform school,

On State prison,
On public buildings,
On the library,

And each of said committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, with leave to report by bill or otherwise.

2. Joint select committees shall consist of three on the part of the senate, and seven on the part of the house, unless the order creating the same shall provide a different number.

3. Whenever a select committee shall be appointed by either house, and be joined by the other, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the senate, or the clerk of the house, as the case may be, to transmit, one to the other, the names of the members so joined, in order that they may be entered upon the journal of each house.

4. In presenting a report upon any matter referred to a committee, such report shall set forth the subject referred, and the substance shall also be briefly indorsed on the back of the same.

5. Orders directing inquiry in relation to an existing statute, shall state the subject-matter of such statute; also the chapter and section to which the inquiry is directed.

6. The titles of all bills and resolves shall state, briefly, the subject-matter of the same.

7. The enacting clause of every bill shall follow its title, in these words, viz.:

“Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:”

All bills and resolves reported by any joint committee shall be written in a fair, legible hand, on not less than a sheet of paper. And in all bills having more than one section, the sections shall be consecutively numbered, beginning with “Section 1.”

Mistakes in bills and resolves, merely clerical, may be corrected upon suggestion, without a motion to amend.

8. When a bill, resolve, or order, which shall have passed one house, is rejected in the other, notice thereof shall be given to the house in which the same shall have passed, by the secretary or clerk, as the case may be. And every bill that shall have passed both houses to be enacted, and all resolutions having the force of law, that shall have finally passed both houses, shall be presented by the secretary of the senate to the governor, for his approval; and the secretary of the senate shall enter on the journal of the senate the day on which such bills or resolutions are so presented to the governor.

9. All indorsements on papers, while on their passage between the two houses, shall be under the signature of the secretary of the senate, or the clerk of the house, respectively; but after the final passage of bills and resolves, they shall be signed by the presiding officer of each house.

10. Every bill or resolve of a public nature, reported

in either house by a committee, or laid upon the table by leave, shall be printed and distributed in both houses before having its first reading. The printed copies shall show by what committee the bill or resolve was reported, or by what member laid upon the table.

11. Whenever any document shall be printed for the use of the legislature, the number of copies shall be three hundred and fifty, unless otherwise ordered. The copies printed shall be delivered to the messengers of the two houses in the proportion of one-fourth for the use of the senate, and three-fourths for the use of the house, after reserving seventy-five copies for the departments and for binding.

12. No business shall be transacted in convention of the two houses, unless by unanimous consent, except such as may be agreed upon before the convention is formed.

13. Committees of conference shall consist of three members on the part of each house representing its vote, and their report, if agreed to by a majority of each committee, shall be made to the branch asking the conference, and may be either accepted or rejected; but no other action shall be had, except through another committee of conference.

14. When any measure shall be finally rejected, it shall not be revived except by reconsideration; and no measure containing the same subject-matter shall be introduced during the session, unless three days' notice is given to the house of which the mover is a member.

15. Whenever a message shall be sent from the senate to the house, it shall be announced at the door by the messenger of the senate, and shall be communicated respectfully to the chair by the bearer of it. In like manner messages from the house shall be communicated to the senate,—the messenger of the house announcing them at the door of the senate.

16. No joint rule or order shall be suspended without the consent of two-thirds of the members present in each house.

17. No member shall be permitted to vote on any question in either branch of the legislature, nor in committee, whose private right, distinct from public interest, is immediately involved.

MEMORANDA.

1. Orders, motions in writing, and reports of committees, should never be presented on less than half a sheet of paper.
2. When a *report* of a committee is made to either house, it should be accompanied by the *order* appointing said committee.
3. Petitions, memorials, and remonstrances from towns in their *corporate capacity*, should be indorsed thus, "*Petition of town of —,*" [stating concisely the subject-matter thereof].

4. Petitions, memorials, and remonstrances from individuals, should be indorsed thus, "*Petition of —, and others of the town of —;*" [stating concisely the subject-matter thereof].
5. Petitions, memorials, and remonstrances from corporations, should be indorsed thus, "*Petition of —;*" [naming the corporation and stating concisely the subject-matter thereof].
6. The name of the member presenting petitions, memorials, and remonstrances, should be indorsed on the back thereof, *near the bottom*, with the place of his residence.
7. The member presenting an *order*, should put his name thereto on the inside, at the bottom of the page, on the left, with the place of his residence.
8. Petitions, memorials, and remonstrances on which *leave to withdraw* was ordered by a former legislature, cannot be recalled from the files with a view of being again referred. The *original*, however, may be taken from the files, and the subject presented *de novo*.
9. Bills and resolves *refused a passage, rejected or postponed indefinitely* by a former legislature, cannot be called from the files with a view of being considered by the present legislature.

10. The heading or caption of **BILLS**, should be as follows :

13. All bills amending a statute, by striking out words from any section or independent clause thereof, or by adding or inserting other words and provisions, should recite the section or clause as it would read after being amended as proposed.
