REPORT.

STATE OF MAINE.

By section 66, chapter 2 of the revised statutes, it is made the duty of the State Treasurer, at the close of each year, to prepare and submit to the Legislature a printed report of the transactions of the Treasury department. As required by said section, I have the honor to submit herewith statements showing the amount of revenue received, from what sources derived, and the payments made from the Treasury, during the fiscal year ending December 30, 1876, with such other information as may be necessary for a full understanding of the business transactions of this office for the year just closed.

The State enters upon the new year with \$394,422.27 in its Treasury, and with a credit second to that of no State in New England.

The receipts during the year have been ample to meet all demands upon the Treasury, without resorting to any portion of the temporary loan authorized by the last Legislature.

REVENUE.

Amount of revenue collected during the year 1876 on account of direct taxation, \$899,405.51, from the taxation of railroad corporations, \$53,541.76, from tax on insurance companies \$12,972.85, and from tax on deposits in savings banks, \$278,985.33.

There has been received for interest on deposits in Suffolk Bank, Boston, \$3,838.32, and for interest on taxes, \$957.70.

Under the provisions of chapter 267, laws of 1873, and chapter 236, laws of 1874, the State has for several years past collected annually, for the benefit of the Penobscot Tribe of Indians, about \$5,000, from rent of shores of islands in the Penobscot river, now occupied by said tribe. On account of the failure of several parties, holding leases of said shores, to pay the rent due in May last, receipts from that source for 1876 have been only \$1,050. Suits are now pending in court against the delinquent parties.

For the information of the Legislature I annex a table showing the total amount received into the State Treasury the past three years, from taxation of corporations authorized under the revenue laws of 1874. From the figures given, the Legislature cannot fail to see that financially the revenue laws of that year are a success and should be sustained.

In addition to this sum, there is due from delinquent railroads, for taxes assessed upon their respective corporations, \$147,393.11.

The taxation of insurance companies and the increased tax on deposits in savings banks did not take effect under the law until 1875.

Statements Nos. 1 and 2 will show the receipts into and disbursements from the State Treasury for the fiscal year ending this day.

PUBLIC DEBT.

The total amount of the public debt, as shown by the annexed table, at the close of the present year, is \$5,920,400, of which \$1,508,000 are in registered and \$4,412,400 in coupon bonds.

Amount of the bonded debt of the State, after deducting the sinking fund (\$791,293.81) held in payment of the loan due Oct. 1, 1889, will be \$5,129,107.

The bonded debt of the State, at the close of the year 1875, less sinking fund, was \$5,272,788; a reduction of the State debt during the year 1876 of \$143,681.

Twenty-nine thousand dollars of the public debt matured March 1, and has been paid. This debt was represented on the books of the office by \$19,000 in coupon bonds, and \$10,000 registered bond.

A bond of the State for \$1,000 of the loan due July 1, 1875, outstanding at the date of my last report, was presented and paid in January last. There is outstanding, a coupon bond of the State for \$1,000, due in 1873. This bond is not included in the annexed table, but is shown in *Statement No. 6*.

Forty-six thousand five hundred dollars of the public debt matures Feb. 1, 1877, and will be met from the current funds in the Treasury.

Among the large items calling for an appropriation of money, is that for the payment of interest on the public debt. The people of this State would be glad to diminish the amount of interest which they are annually called upon to pay, and would, I believe, applaud the adoption of any well matured measure for the reduction of the debt upon which it rests. The public debt of this State on the first day of January, 1870, reached the large sum of \$8,100,900; deduct the sinking fund held at that date, in payment of the same, and the actual bonded indebtedness of the State was \$7,128,370. At the close of the present year the public debt of the State, less sinking fund, is \$5,129,107; a reduction of the debt since 1870 of nearly \$2,000,000.

The State should adhere to the wise policy it has pursued for several years past, of meeting by taxation its obligations as they mature, whenever it can be done without imposing, in any one year, too heavy burdens upon the tax payers of the State. Fortunately for them, our indebtedness maturing prior to 1889, is not large, and can easily be met with a moderate increase of the State tax, and no doubt that increase, in part, could be avoided by rigid economy in all the public expenditures, and the postponement, for a time, of appropriations in aid of institutions that have no legal claim upon the State.

TREASURERS REPORT.

RENEWAL OF WAR LOANS.

No steps have been taken the past year towards issuing new bonds to renew and extend the war loans of the State due in 1880, 1883 and June 1, 1889, as provided in the act of February 24, 1875.

No application to this department has been made for an exchange of bonds under said act. In my report for 1875, I briefly stated the reasons why I had not, at that date, issued new bonds as contemplated by the act of February 24, 1875. For similar reasons I have delayed for another year the execution of its provisions relating to the public debt.

In reference to the payment of that debt as it matures, especially the portion due in 1880 and 1883, I entertain the same views now as expressed in my report of last year. In relation to this subject I said in that report, on page 36 :

“ It would seem that the small amount of the public debt that matures in 1880 and 1883, might be provided for at maturity without recourse to bonds authorized under this act.

There has been added to the sinking fund of 1868, by the transfer of U. S. bonds and cash, over one hundred thousand dollars. This fund has been further benefited by the cancellation of \$256,900 of the bonds of the State maturing October 1st, 1889. It is a question worthy of consideration, whether or not this transfer of \$100,000 of U. S. bonds should be allowed to remain on deposit in the sinking fund of 1868, until October 1, 1889. There is due in 1880, \$307,000 of the war loan of 1863. The funds transferred were raised in part for the payment of that debt, and it would be but just to the tax payers of the State that it should be so applied. I would therefore suggest that the indebtedness of the State maturing in 1880 be met by appropriating the one hundred thousand dollars deposited with the fund of 1868, and by raising in 1879 by taxation, for the payment of the public debt, the sum of \$100,000, and in 1880 a like sum for the same purpose. In this manner the debt could be cancelled without recourse to new bonds and with but a slight increase of taxation for those years.

By reference to the Tabular Statement, showing the bonded indebtedness of the State, it will be seen that the payment of the loan due March 1, 1878, cancels the indebtedness of the State for bonds issued prior to 1863. After the payment of the war loan due in 1880, the next payment by the State, on account of bonds issued, will be in 1883, and the next following in 1889. During the years that intervene between 1883 and 1889 the State will not have to raise one dollar on account of the public debt, and if so disposed, can pay the loan due in 1883 by raising for that purpose by taxation, the sum of \$100,000 each year, commencing with the year 1882. Anticipating the receipts from taxation for the years 1883, 1884 and 1885 by temporary loans.

The debt due June 1, 1889, can be provided for in the manner set forth in the act of February 24th, 1875. The amount of bonds to be issued would not be large. The sinking fund of 1868 provides for the payment of the war loan due October 1, 1889. If the loans due in 1880 and 1883 are provided for by taxation, there will remain only the loan (\$2,330,000) due June 1, 1889. With so small an indebtedness and the high financial standing of the State, the Treasurer would find no difficulty in disposing of Maine bonds at a premium, or in exchanging them for bonds issued under the act of 1875.”

Should it however be deemed advisable, by those having the financial affairs of the State in charge, to renew and extend the loans named in the act of 1875, an appropriation will be necessary to defray the expense of engraving and printing the bonds, and for advertising the same when ready for exchange, in the leading papers in New England and New York.

TAXATION OF RAILROADS.

The Governor and Council, in April last, assessed a State tax for the year 1876 upon the several railroad corporations in this State, whose stock has a market value, and the tax was committed to the State Treasurer for collection. In consequence of the decline in the market value of shares assessed, the aggregate amount of the tax was \$21,556.10 less than for 1875.

The tax assessed upon railroads for 1875 was \$98,347.88, of which \$46,798.82 has been collected, the balance is against those corporations claiming exemption under their charter. Of the amount collected for the tax of 1875, \$2,872 80 will be credited to cities and towns where shareholders resided at the date of return. The balance (\$43,926.02) will be for the use of the State.

Statement No. 8 will show the roads taxed for 1876, and the amount of tax assessed upon each.

The annexed table will show the roads that have paid the tax assessed for 1875, amount of the tax, the credit to cities and towns and the sum accruing as revenue to the State :

Statement No. 9 will show the sum apportioned to the several cities and towns entitled to credit under the act.

There is due from delinquent railroad companies claiming exemption under their charters for taxes assessed by the State for the years 1874, '75 and '76, the sum of \$147,393.11, as will appear by the annexed table :

There has been collected of the tax assessed upon railroads for 1876, the sum of \$20,700.15. The balance (\$14,922.99) of said tax, due from roads that acknowledge the validity of the assessment, is payable January 1, 1877, and no doubt will be promptly met. If so, the State Treasurer can apportion and pay in 1877, to each city and town entitled to credit, its proportion of said tax collected for 1876. The \$3,000, included in the estimated expenditures for 1877, "Railroad tax due towns," is to cover the amount credited to cities and towns on account of railroad tax collected for the year 1875.

No decision has yet been reached in the suit now pending against the "Maine Central Railroad Company" in the United States Court. At the date of my last report, I felt quite certain that a decision would be reached in that case at an early day, and the counsel for the State was equally confident.

Under the advice of the Governor and Attorney General a second suit was commenced against the Maine Central Railroad Company for the tax assessed upon that corporation for the year 1875, and the case was entered at the April Term of court, Cumberland county. At the July Term it was fully and ably argued for the State by Attorney General Emery. The court still holds the case under advisement.

Should the court sustain the legality of the tax, steps should at once be taken for the collection of the tax due from all the delinquent companies. If the decision is adverse to the State, then the law in relation to the taxation of railroads should have the attention of the Legislature. There is no good reason why the roads claiming exemption under their charters from State taxation, should not in some legal manner contribute their proper share towards the support of the government that protects their vast interest and from which they have derived their corporate existence.

INSURANCE TAX.

There has been received into the State Treasury the past year from tax on insurance companies, \$12,972.85. Of this sum, \$11,044.11 was from tax assessed on fire and marine companies, and \$1,928.74 from tax on life and accident companies.

Statement No. 10 will show the gross and net receipts as returned by the companies respectively, and the tax assessed upon each.

The gross amount of premiums received by all foreign fire and marine companies and associations in this State, during the year, was \$1,008,605.73.

The gross amount received by life and accident companies was \$775,972.33.

The tax assessed for 1876 was under the provisions of the act of 1874. The first tax to be assessed under the act relating to the taxation of insurance companies, approved February 23, 1876, will be on first day of April, 1877. Under the provisions of that act the State will realize a larger revenue from tax on life and accident companies than under the act of 1874. I estimate the receipts from tax on insurance companies for 1877, at \$15,000.

SINKING FUND.

The sinking fund of 1865 having been abolished, there remains only the fund established by an act approved March 7, 1868, for the extinguishment of the loan authorized by the equalization of the municipal war debt due October 1, 1889.

For this fund there is raised annually, by taxation, the sum of \$80,479.95. This amount with its yearly accumulations, the law requires to be invested in the bonds of either of the New England States, or those of the General Government.

I have invested the past year on account of the sinking fund of 1868, \$124,095 in Maine bonds, and \$12,390 in Governments. Premium paid on bonds purchased \$11,885.

The present amount of this fund is \$791,293.81, reckoning its securities at their par value. The fund is about \$23,000 less than the Finance Committee of the Legislature of 1868 intended it should be at this date, on account of the premium paid during the past few years on bonds purchased as an investment for the fund. The attention of the Legislature was called to this subject in my report for 1875.

SAVINGS BANKS.

Statement No. 11 will show the returns made to this department by the several savings banks in this State, on the last Saturday preceding the first Monday of May and November, 1876, with the average amount of deposits returned and the tax paid by each.

The average amount of deposits in savings banks, as returned under oath November 4, 1876, to this office, was \$26,476,091.09. The average amount of deposits October 30, 1875, was \$30,414,-993.51, a falling off in deposits for the year of \$3,938,902.42.

Amount of deposits in savings banks, as stated in the Bank Examiner's report for 1876, \$27,818,764.70. The amount of deposits reported by the Bank Examiner exceeds the aggregate deposits returned to this office in the sum of \$1,342,673.61.

This discrepancy between the two reports would in part be avoided by an amendment to the present law, requiring the tax assessed by the State to be based upon the amount of deposits at the date of return.

The claim of the State against the Winthrop Savings Bank, for the tax assessed upon the average amount of its deposits for the six months preceding the first Monday of November, 1875, has been decided by the law court, not a valid one. Prior to the assessment of the tax, upon the complaint of the Trustees of that institution, a decree of sequestration was passed and a receiver appointed, who on the 2d day of October, 1875, took possession of all the assets of the bank.

The opinion of the full bench, in this case, was delivered at the June Term of court at Bangor. The court held that "no debt can accrue against the bank after the decree of sequestration. This is the end of its existence. No debt can be paid except such as the Commissioners allow, and they can allow none except such as are outstanding at the date of the decree. After the payment of such debts the balance is to be ratably distributed among the depositors."

The question is now settled, that a tax against a suspended savings bank cannot be enforced out of its assets after a decree of sequestration is passed.

In the revision of the laws in relation to savings banks, which will undoubtedly take place at the coming session of the Legislature, provision should be made for the payment of all taxes due

the State from a suspended savings bank, before its assets can be distributed to depositors.

Under this decision of the court the Solon Savings Bank is relieved from the tax assessed April 29, 1876. The Bucksport Savings Bank, although in the hands of a receiver prior to the assessment in April last, paid the amount of said tax a few days before the opinion of the court in the Winthrop Savings Bank case was delivered. The receiver of the Bucksport bank, in view of that decision, has requested that the tax paid by him be refunded. Under the law the State Treasurer can only pay out money from the Treasury upon warrant of the Governor and Council. If the receiver of said bank is to be reimbursed for the amount of the tax paid into the State Treasury, it must be by resolve of the Legislature.

The State tax assessed April 29, 1876, upon the deposits in the Lewiston Institution for Savings, was paid into the State Treasury December 20th. The delay was on account of the affairs of the bank being in the hands of a receiver. The claim of the State was allowed by the Commissioners December 5th. The tax received is credited upon the books of this office, in Savings Bank account No. 10.

The Trustees of the Waterville Savings Bank decline to pay the tax on the deposits, as certified to this office by the treasurer of said bank, for the six months ending Nov. 4, 1876, on the ground "that they were closed up and suspended during that period." In my opinion the tax is a legal and just one, and if not adjusted at an early day its payment should be enforced.

The printed bill in relation to savings banks, reported by the Committee appointed under resolve approved February 19, 1876, reduces the State tax upon deposits to one-half of one per cent., and allows the banks to deduct from their deposits the amount of United States Bonds they own. The bill retains the section in the present law, exempting deposits from municipal taxation, also the section authorizing the banks to return the average amount of their deposits for the preceding six months.

It seems to me that the bill is wholly in the interest of the banks, and should receive, as I have no doubt it will, the careful attention of the Legislature before it becomes a law.

SCHOOLS.

Statement No. 12 will show the amount apportioned to cities, towns and plantations, the past year for school purposes, and the amount of State tax assessed upon each.

The sum expended by the State, under the "Free High School" act is not included in the table. The sum apportioned for schools for 1876, was derived from the following sources, to wit:

From this sum thirteen thousand dollars was deducted for the support of the two "normal schools" established by the State, and the balance apportioned as provided by law.

In my opinion further deductions from the school funds should be authorized, and I would respectfully suggest that the Legislature amend the act approved Feb. 9, 1876, relating to normal schools, and include in the deductions from school funds the sum annually appropriated by the State for "Free High Schools," and the Agricultural College. Should these deductions be authorized, there would then remain for distribution annually to the several cities, towns and plantations, about \$325,000. A large sum in comparison with the sum apportioned for school purposes in 1871, the amount for that year being less than \$19,000.

Statement No. 13 contains a list of towns whose school funds, apportioned for 1876, are suspended by order of the Governor and Council until a satisfactory explanation as to the non-expenditure of school moneys, received of the State, is made to the Superintendent of Common Schools. It would seem from the long list of delinquent towns, reported in *statement No. 13*, that further legislation is necessary to insure the full and faithful expenditure of all moneys raised for school purposes.

SALARIES.

Statement No. 14 will show the annual salaries of various officers and employees of the State Government.

For the year 1876 the receipts into the State Treasury from the Land Office have been \$44,291.05, to wit :

The business of the Land Office will undoubtedly be closed at an early day, and all uncollected demands due that department transferred to the State Treasurer for collection and credit.

There are in the hands of the Land Agent securities amounting to over \$51,000, a portion of which bears date prior to 1850. Such old securities should either be placed in the hands of the

Attorney General for collection, or if worthless, charged off on the books of the office.

Under the existing laws all notes taken by the Land Agent on account of the State shall be safely kept by him, and he is to collect all moneys accruing to the State from the sale of lands, timber, grass, &c., and pay over the proceeds to the State Treasurer.

Before the securities in the hands of the Land Agent can be legally transferred to the State Treasurer for collection additional legislation will be necessary.

The receipts from the Land Office into the State Treasury for 1877 will be considerably less than they were during the past year.

On account of the general depression in the lumber business, several parties indebted to the State, and whose notes mature in 1877, will ask for an extension.

Relying upon receipts from notes overdue and from those maturing in 1877, that will surely be paid, I feel justified in placing the estimated receipts for 1877 from the land department at \$18,000.

ESTIMATES FOR 1877.

Statement No. 3 will exhibit estimates of the probable ordinary expenditures for the State Government for the year 1877.

I am aware of but few calls that will be made upon the Legislature for the appropriation of money for extraordinary purposes.

The estimated receipts from various sources which appear in *Statement No. 4* are carefully made up, and I think can be relied upon. They are based upon the laws now in force for the raising of revenue, other than by direct taxation. The estimated receipts from tax on savings banks is a large item in the table, and it is to be hoped that the revenue to the State from that source will not be reduced by legislation.

By reference to *Statements Nos. 3 and 4* it will be seen that the estimated receipts for 1877 exceed the estimated expenditures \$310,065.33. From this sum must be deducted the aggregate amount of extraordinary expenditures authorized by the present Legislature. The balance will represent the probable surplus in the Treasury at the close of the year.

Should the present revenue laws remain in force, and upon the presumption that only wise, prudent and economical legislation will be enacted at the coming session, I think a tax of three and one-fourth mills on the dollar of the State valuation, will, with

receipts from other sources, be ample to meet all the requirements of the State Treasury for the ensuing year. This will be a reduction of one-half mill from the tax assessed for 1876, and will in the aggregate reduce the State tax for 1877 about \$112,000.

The annexed table will show the rate of State taxation on each dollar of the valuation, from 1865 to 1876, inclusive :

Statements Nos. 5, 6, and 7 will show the resources of the State, its liabilities, and the amount paid for claims prior to January 1, 1876.

METRIC STANDARDS.

In July last the State received from the General Government a full set of Standard Metric Weights and Measures. The use of the metric system has been legalized by an act of Congress dated July 28, 1866.

The standard weights and measures now used by the State for regulating other weights and measures, are kept in a very exposed and unsuitable place. Some provision should be made for the care and preservation of all weights and measures in charge of the State Treasurer.

TREASURER'S ACCOUNTS.

The Joint Standing Committee of the Legislature on Finance, to whom was referred the State Treasurer's accounts for 1875, after a full and careful examination of the same, reported under date of January 20, 1876, that they were properly vouched and correctly cast, and that the Committee had destroyed, by burning, all bonds and coupons redeemed during the year 1875, amounting to the sum of \$307,710, viz: in bonds \$24,000, in coupons \$283,710, being the amount of interest paid in 1875, exclusive of the amount paid on registered bonds.

The same Committee also destroyed in like manner, all bonds and coupons thereto attached, that had been converted into

registered bonds by the State Treasurer during the year 1875, amounting to the sum of \$215,000, together with registered bonds received by the Treasurer for re-issue, amounting to \$33,000. The report of said Committee is on file in this office.

BONDS CANCELLED IN 1876.

During the year \$195,000 in coupon bonds have been received and cancelled, and a like amount of registered bonds issued therefor.

Ninety-two thousand dollars in registered bonds have been assigned and surrendered by the holders, and new bonds for the same amount re-issued to other parties.

SAFE.

The Legislature of 1876, at my suggestion, passed a resolve authorizing the State Treasurer to procure a first-class safe to be placed inside of the vault in this office, and appropriated therefor the sum \$1,500. Soon after the approval of said resolve I contracted with Messrs. Morris & Ireland of Boston, for a first-class burglar-proof safe, which was delivered to the State in May last. The cost of the safe, including Time Lock, was \$1,200.

The securities and valuable papers belonging to the State are now well protected against fire and burglary.

BOUNTY ON BEARS.

There were presented to the Legislature of last winter and allowed, under chapter 30, section 7, of the revised statutes, claims for bear bounty amounting to \$2,745.00. This is nearly double the sum the State ever paid in any previous year for that purpose. The claims allowed by the Legislature, upon certificate of towns, indicate that 549 bears were killed during the year 1875. From these figures it appears that the year 1875 was an excellent one for bears.

The law relating to bounty on wild animals was amended by the Legislature of 1876. Section 7 of said law, as amended, reads as follows:

"SECT. 7. Said certificates and receipts shall annually, in the month of December, be transmitted to the treasurer of state, and by him laid before the governor and council as early as convenient; and when allowed by the governor and council shall be paid by the treasurer of state to such towns."

Statement No. 15 will show the sum allowed towns and the amount credited to each.

SOLDIERS' ALLOTMENTS.

The sum of \$530.99 remains in the State Treasury to the credit of Soldiers' Allotments, deposited with the Treasurer by authority of "an act relating to the receipts and disbursement of funds of the Maine Volunteers," approved March 18, 1862. This sum is due to the persons mentioned in the following schedule, in which is given the sum credited to each, the company and regiment to which they belong, and the place of residence as far as known :

EQUALIZATION BONDS.

There is on deposit in this office, in bonds of this State, \$2,500, awarded in 1869 "under the act for the equalization of municipal war debts" to the towns and plantations named in the annexed table. These bonds are to be delivered to said towns upon their compliance with sections 3 and 6 of chapter 225, laws of 1868.

The act provides that the fractional excess less than one hundred dollars be paid in currency.

DELINQUENT TOWNS.

As required by chapter 215, resolves of 1874, I annex *Statement No. 16*, showing the indebtedness of each town and plantation for the State tax imposed thereon from the year 1869 to 1876.

The indebtedness of towns and plantations for the State tax assessed prior to 1869 is not large, and is mostly due from Mayfield and Mattamiscontis. The credits to those towns on the books of this office are, in the aggregate, nearly sufficient to balance their indebtedness to the State. The State tax due from towns and plantations, named in *Statement No. 16*, is nearly covered by the amount of school funds credited to each on the Treasurer's books.

WILD LANDS.

I append to this report *Statement No. 17*, showing the location, number of acres, valuation, and amount of State tax assessed upon each unincorporated township of land in this State, for the year 1876. The tax is based upon the valuation of 1870. Lands sold by the State since 1870 are not included in *Statement No. 17*, and are not taxed.

TRUST FUNDS.

For a brief history of the several trust funds in charge of the State Treasurer, I refer to my report for 1874. A few changes in said funds were made during the past year, viz :

The "Granger Turnpike Fund" was cancelled upon the books of this office, as provided in resolve approved February 23, 1876, and upon report of Council under date of August 17th.

The "Normal School Fund," under resolve passed February 15, 1876, has been drawn from the State Treasury and the account with that fund closed.

The "Passamaquoddy Indian Fund" has been reduced by the payment of \$2,486.17 to Joseph Granger, Esq., as provided in resolve February 21, 1876.

"Permanent School Fund" has been increased and now amounts to the sum of \$423,803.68.

"Lands reserved for public use." This fund has been reduced by payments from the State Treasury under chapter 5, section 16, of the revised statutes.

The sinking fund has been increased in the manner provided by law.

Except these changes and those reported in 1875, trust funds held by the State are the same as described in the Treasurer's report for 1874.

In declining a re-election to the office of State Treasurer, I desire to tender my profound thanks to the representatives of the people for their confidence in thrice electing me to the honorable and responsible position I now hold.

During the three years I have occupied the office, I have sought to perform its duties with diligence and fidelity, and with a purpose solely devoted to the best interest of the State. I trust my efforts have been successful and that my administration of the affairs of this department will be satisfactory to the people.
