

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL.

Major-General John T. Richards, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR: I have the honor to submit my report as inspector general to December 15, 1898, from July 18, the date on which I was appointed to that position.

Owing to the fact that a large proportion of the officers and men of the National Guard of the State of Maine were enrolled in the volunteer service of the United States under the first and second calls of the president for troops for the war with Spain, no active work was undertaken with the few officers and men who were left at home after the quota of the State was filled.

Leaves of absence were given to the officers and furloughs to the men of such organizations as were depleted by such enrollment, and consequently no official work was performed by me except the condemnation of some quartermaster's stores, which was duly reported at the time action was taken.

I was present when the First Maine Volunteer Infantry returned from Chickamauga, but as they were still in the service of the United States it was not within my province to make any report upon their condition.

REPORT OF COMMISSARY GENERAL.

Major General John T. Richards, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR: I have the honor to submit my report as Commissary General for the year 1898.

The Maine National Guard was concentrated at the State camp ground at Augusta on the 2d of May, 1898, by order of the Commander-in-Chief, in obedience to the orders of the President to furnish the quota of the State of Maine, under the first call for troops during the war with Spain.

Owing to the constantly varying number of men in camp during the period of enrollment and in consequence of the hurry of sudden mobilization, the problem of satisfactorily rationing the troops at first seemed difficult, but with the able assistance of the officers detailed to report to me, the problem was met and an ample, healthy and satisfying ration was issued to the various organizations in camp.

After the muster into the United States service, it being the expectation of the commissary department that the troops would be at once ordered to the front, travel rations were at first issued to the troops by the United States commissary. The men being thus suddenly deprived of camp rations naturally were dissatisfied and the Commander-in-Chief authorized the issue to the men, who were then U. S. troops, of fresh meat and bread until they were moved from the State.

Of the fourteen (14) who remained in Biddeford, two are seriously sick but will recover, I think. The others are doing well.

Sir: I have the honor to report that in company with Col. John D. Prindable, I visited the Maine General Hospital and Eye and Ear Infirmary to-day and distributed bouquets to every cot. Many of them were visibly affected by the kindness and thoughtfulness of the Governor and so expressed themselves.

I found that Scribner of Aroostook county, died this morning and three others, viz., W. Carpenter of Lewiston; Ira Heal, Searsmont, and Benj. Nelson of Co. A, were in a dying condition. All others are doing well and those of the first train are rapidly convalescing.

I found a man in Biddeford to-day, a member of a Portland Company, who was on my list for the hospital, but left the train at Biddeford by mistake. I have arranged to have him sent to the Eye and Ear Infirmary to-morrow in company of two attendants. He is quite sick.

SIR: I have visited to-day all the sick soldiers in the Maine General Hospital and Eye and Ear Infirmary in Portland, and wish to report upon their condition. Those in the Maine General are convalescing quite rapidly and are all practically out of danger. Three returned to their homes yesterday and five others were to return home to-day or to-morrow.

At the Eye and Ear Infirmary I find that they are doing nicely and most all are convalescent though they have two or three there that are very low and probably will lose one or two of them. I learned, and probably you have been notified before this, of the death of Private Heaphey of Co. L, I think. His death occurred yesterday.

All the patients, under my care here in Saco and Biddeford, I can say that they are all convalescing with the exception of one, who came home from Augusta Sunday and has just settled down for a solid case of typhoid fever. He is one that was taken sick when the battalion was in Rockland, in attendance upon Maj. Ulmer's funeral.

There is one here, Private Preble of Co. G, though not under my care, I understand he is very low with the chances against him. I sincerely hope that every precaution is being taken and every detail carried out for the preservance of the health of those now in Augusta. If there is anything further that I can do in Augusta or here, just command my services.

Sir: I have the honor to report on my tour at Camp Powers yesterday.

Found all conditions in as good shape as one could wish, both in the camp and field hospital. The number of patients

reduced and no new cases of typhoid for three days. Which, certainly, is encouraging. I later visited the city hospital (my first visit at that institution) and found the condition there equally encouraging.

The ditch in the rear of the camp hospital on the grounds has not yet been filled and am sorry to say that it has been used a very little. Think that should be filled at once both for sanitary and esthetic reasons. In fact I think I heard you give instructions to that effect.

I inspected the bedding somewhat also, and find that the mattresses are of little value and will doubtless have to be destroyed. Everything else can be disinfected satisfactorily.

SIR: I have the honor to report as follows on my tour of duty ending to-day.

I went to your office to see you upon the matters for which I was there and also other affairs about which I wished to confer with you, but found you were away.

I burned some 75 pounds of sulphur and allowed it to fumigate during the afternoon of Tuesday. Wednesday morning I had absolutely every movable article removed outside the building, thoroughly washed with corrosive sublimate solutions, every article also washed with the same solution before being replaced within the building. I put everything in perfect order for its occupation at any time on short notice. There were several articles, particularly several cot beds which will have to be repaired and those I did not put into the hospital. I had enough, however, that were sound for all ordinary occasions.

The hospital now being surgically clean I advised Mr. Dodge, (and I hope it meets your approval) that articles which have not been disinfected and might cause trouble should not be stored with those which have, for in a measure that would undo what we have tried to do so well and safely.

I also found that there were almost no medical or surgical supplies on hand. All the cases are practically empty. I took, however, a memorandum of what there were, and a very few articles on the shelves which are not perishable I left there.

I wanted to visit the patients at the insane city hospital but found my time too limited. Some time I would like to do so, and to consult you about various matters in our line.

Intended to have done so before my return but you were away.

SIR: I have the honor to submit my report as surgeon general of Maine, for the year ending December 15, 1898, which I forward under separate cover.

I have endeavored to make it brief, and at the same time sufficiently voluminous to cover all the work in which I have had a hand.

That work while exacting and at times tiresome, has been a pleasure to me for I shall look back upon this experience as a particularly pleasant duty, and can feel that whenever duty has called me, I have endeavored to do my work in a thorough and painstaking manner.

Early in the campaign I tendered my services to Gen. Geo. M. Sternberg, Surgeon General, U. S. A., if I could be of any use to him in any capacity whatever. He wrote me a letter, thanking me for that patriotism manifest, but suggesting that perhaps I could be of more service to the army within the borders of my own State.

The wisdom of that advice is now plainly apparent and I do feel that my work, while not shining with the same lustre it might at the front, has to some degree been beneficial to my country and a source of comfort and help to many a poor soldier individually.

I must extend to you my sincere thanks for your uniform courtesy and assistance in my work, for you have materially aided me in the same, and for your forbearance for my shortcomings in military matters.

Major General John T. Richards, Adjutant General of Maine:

SIR: I have the honor to present my report as surgeon general, for the year ending December 14, 1898, in accordance with the law governing the militia of Maine.

During the year just passed the conditions which have entered into the affairs of the National Guard, have been of an unusual nature and such requirements have presented themselves, as the present generation in the militia and the service of the State have not hitherto been called upon to fulfill. That these requirements have been met, and cheerfully, it is gratifying to record, and wherever there has been a duty to perform, which would conduce to the health or comfort of our men in service, those called upon have responded with an alacrity and willingness, in harmony with the known loyalty and intelligence of our citizens.

Unusual events call for unusual preparation and while at the opening of the year, a call to arms was a more or less remote contingency, yet the axiom of preparation for war in time of peace was not to be forgotten thus in reviewing the amount of necessary material on hand in my department, early in the year it was found that the supplies possessed would not last longer than four or five weeks at the most, with any probable demand upon them, and in several important respects, in the event of possible war, they were absolutely deficient.

These deficiencies and the condition of the camp grounds at Augusta, resulted in an inspection, in obedience to the orders of the adjutant general as early in the year as practicable; and the conditions for maintaining a normal average of health in camp were carefully investigated.

That no advantage might be neglected, and also at the order of the adjutant general, I made a tour of inspection of the equipment provided for the surgeon general of Massachusetts, in order not to omit in our preparations, any better or more approved appliances, if such existed, than I had already made note of for my requisition.

On my return, and by the first of March, the result of my recommendations was made apparent, by the purchase of many necessary articles, which included one reserve surgical chest for each regiment, made after the manner of the Massachusetts chests, but with improvements, which appeared necessary, and made practicable at my suggestion.

Other appliances were speedily provided, which included a field-operating case, of best quality, for each regiment; and shortly after a number of emergency pouches were added to the equipment, together with one each of Mulford's largest and best medical, and surgical chests, for the First Regiment.

These timely purchases and preparations made the condition of the Maine militia when called into camp at Augusta, one of comfort and health; the demands upon the hospital accommodations being only normal, and from such light and unimportant causes, as are inseparable from every day life under ordinary circumstances; a further natural result of which, being the ability displayed by these men to withstand the tendency to disease, from changed conditions and climate in other states.

The regimental surgeons of the National Guard, were Major B. F. Bradbury, Capt. J. B. O'Neil, and Lieut. C. M. Elliott for the First Maine; and Major E. M. Fuller, Capt. R. B. Martin, and Lieut. Horace V. Jonah for the Second, but unfortunately, Major Fuller, although a superior surgeon, was rejected on the score of overweight, which deprived the service of a most admirably equipped man, whose patriotic impulses made him desirous of serving his country, even at the sacrifice of a large practice and other strong influences which to any ordinary man would have been irresistible.

At the time the militia of Maine was mustered into the United States service, the men were in fine physical condition individually, and were well provided for, until the United States Medical and Surgical Staff should be prepared to take full control of them, and administer to their necessities.

It was under these circumstances, and in the best health and spirits, they left the State the latter part of the month of May.

No events of note transpired in the department of the surgeon general thereafter, until the middle of August, when upon the 16th of the month, under order of the adjutant general, I was called to Portland, for consultation with General Richards and Mayor C. H. Randall of that city, on the subject of the best method of providing hospital accommodations for the returning sick.

It was learned, unofficially, that the hospital train had left Chattanooga, and it was the desire of all at this conference that no effort should be spared to have the men fully provided for on arrival without delay or complication. As a result, the Maine General Hospital, and the Maine Eye and Ear Infirmary, very generously offered to provide whatever vacant space they had, or could make, and the armory was also offered if required, which proved later on, not to be necessary.

Acting on the order of the adjutant general, Lieut. W. E. Riker, commander of the ambulance corps, accompanied by a civilian surgeon, was at once despatched to intercept the hospital train, and lend all possible assistance in their power. They immediately departed on this service, and at Utica, N. Y., boarded the train, which was under the charge of Hospital Steward (afterwards Lieutenant) E. H. Wheeler, and while on the route rendered valuable aid.

Lieut. Wheeler while in charge of this train, showed a firmness and sound judgment in emergency, it is a pleasure to acknowledge; for under the most trying circumstances, during the journey north, and at various times and places, he proved fully equal to the occasion and without doubt saved the lives of many of the men under his charge.

On Thursday, August 18, under orders of the adjutant general, and accompanied by Lieut. Col. John D. Prindable, I started to intercept the same train at Boston or wherever practicable. After considerable confusion, caused by lack of direct or official notification, as to the movement of the train, during which time every possible courtesy was shown by the operating forces of the Boston and Maine Railroad under the most kind and interested direction of Division Superintendent William Merritt, we boarded the train at 5 A. M. on August 19.

It was found on investigation, that there were one hundred and twenty-six men on board chiefly in the various stages of typhoid fever, and I immediately began the classification of the various conditions, which when completed, showed in different divisions, the most serious cases, those of a less serious nature, and the minor or convalescent ones.

At my request the conductor kindly stopped the train at Rockingham Junction, where I purchased necessary sustenance for the men, and at the same time forwarded a message to Portland. notifying the adjutant general of every essential feature for his guidance. The result of this action was, that on the arrival of the hospital train, everything was in readiness, and in perfect order; so that without delay or confusion, every case was speedily disposed of, with no disturbing results. Adjutant General Richards was himself at the depot with the ambulance corps which had previously been ordered to Portland, in anticipation of this need.

On August 25 a similar journey was taken to Boston, by order of the adjutant general, and on practically the same service, to intercept the second hospital train. This train was in charge of Lieut. Gilbert M. Elliott of Brunswick, and the methods pursued in the previous instance, were repeated in this with the same satisfactory results.

During the entire time the invalid soldiers remained in the hospitals, I made personal inspections two and three times each week until there was no further necessity for such attention. In many of the cases in the hospitals an examination was made of the blood for the plasmodium of malaria, but its universal absence, emphasizes the fact, that malaria was not a prominent factor in the sickness of the First Maine Volunteers.

When later on the regiment returned, with some of its members sick, they were cared for in the Augusta City Hospital, which was offered for their use; also a ward of the Maine Insane Hospital which was volunteered as well. Many cases of typhoid fever were among these arrivals, contracted at Chick-amauga, and in numerous instances developed en route homeward, hence the precautions taken to prevent its spread, were absolutely thorough, and the method employed of burying all excretum outside the city and several feet beneath the surface

from which point no drainage proceeds, was with the full knowledge and approval of the local board of health, which was later on further officially approved, after careful inspection by Dr. A. G. Young, secretary of the State Board of Health.

After the return of the First Regiment, they were encamped with the batteries, and several cases of typhoid developed among the latter organization, but whether from the conditions of camp life, which tend in that direction, or from the fact that the year has been one in which the disease has been unusually prevalent, or possibly from proximity to the men who had returned from the South, it is not possible to state with exactness, but it is probable that all these contributed to this end.

Again, on September 24, under special orders from the adjutant general, I proceeded to Boston to meet the Maine Signal Corps, which was returning from Santiago, after a stop at Montauk Point. This purpose was accomplished, as were the previous ones, and it was found that among their number, were many either ill or convalescent.

Information as to the probable time of arrival was conveyed to Augusta, and in the interim proceeding arrival, the Woman's Relief Corps had with the greatest interest and care, prepared a most excellent supper, and caused the G. A. R. hall to be put in a most comfortable condition, with a good fire, the night being cold and rainy.

During the summer and autumn it has been my custom to visit Augusta and see that all sanitary requirements were strictly enforced, and since the arrival of the returning troops, thirty-eight of them who were conveyed to their homes in Saco and Biddeford have been under my personal care.

Altogether the number of persons placed in the hospitals I mention aside from the camp hospital, has been one hundred and thirty-two, divided as follows:

Maine General Hospital	50
Augusta City Hospital	33
Maine Eye and Ear Infirmary	31
Maine Insane Hospital	
Central Maine General Hospital	

At the present time there are still five patients in the hospital. The total number of deaths while in the service has been:

First Maine Volunteers, 2 officers, 41 privates; batteries, 8 privates; signal corps, 3 privates. Among the latter being one case of yellow fever.

Such have been the duties of my department, occasioned by the late war with Spain, which it has not been called upon to perform before in many years, for even in the Civil War, the militia was not a factor, all the troops concerned coming directly under the authority and control of the United States Government. Nor did the labors terminate with the mustering out from the service, for after that ceremony, a tour of inspection was made in company with Adjutant General Richards, and Major Butler, U. S. A., for the purpose of viewing the State property, and condemning certain unsanitary surroundings and articles, such as the regimental "sinks," emergency blankets, and the like, which were considered dangerous to health, and while their condemnation was fully approved, the report made thereon is at the present time unknown to me.

As a final work of my department for the past year, I have caused the hospital, and all other sources of contagion and disease to be most thoroughly and scientifically disinfected, and put into such a condition that they would be in complete readiness for troops at any moment, should the emergency arise, and free from all contagion.

In connection with this proceeding, it may be well to add, that all mattresses upon which the sick soldiers lay, were burned, and the process of disinfecting, included passing through the steam sterilizer of the Maine Insane Hospital, of all mattress covers, blankets, and similar articles; this being accomplished through the courtesy of Dr. Sanborn.

Following the disinfecting process an account was taken of all medical supplies on hand, and it was found that additional supplies would be needed in the event of another mobilization of troops.

I take the greatest pleasure in extending thanks to the officials connected with the Maine General Hospital, and the Eye and Ear Infirmary of Portland; the Central Maine General Hospital of Lewiston; the city hospital and Dr. B. F. Sanborn of the

Maine Insane Hospital of Augusta; together with the women composing the Woman's Relief Corps and the Volunteer Aid Association, for many articles provided by them for the comfort and relief of the sick, and as preventives of illness.

In concluding this report, it becomes my duty to make certain recommendations which in my opinion are for the best interests of the men comprising our National Guard of the State of Maine.

The regular sinks at the military camp ground at Augusta, located at the extreme westerly end are in my opinion in too close proximity to the cook houses, and thus constantly menace the health of all, and are the source of other disagreeable consequences which result from their location.

To overcome these unsanitary conditions, more land should be acquired adjoining this portion of the grounds and the sinks removed to a greater distance. As at present located, they could scarcely be in a worse location, paralleling as they do, the entire line of cook sheds, and immediately at their rear. In course of time the ground becomes saturated with impurities, which if transferred to a more remote point would lessen materially the chances of disease. Economy of space in a matter of this importance, is to needlessly imperil the lives of those who offer their services to the State. The hospital sinks have already been moved back several feet from their former position, which was all too close to the hospital itself.

In the past the enlistment in the State militia has been too much a mere matter of desire solely, on the part of the applicant, without reference to his physical condition or fitness, with the result that when a call to arms was made, such as we have witnessed during the year, many who were desirous enough of entering the service of the United States, were debarred for one reason or another, which might easily have been known at the time of their entering the State's service. Therefore to expend large sums of money upon the training of men who are to be rejected in the time of need, seems wanton, and should not in my opinion, be countenanced, any more than the United States Government would in the acceptance of a cadet for admission to the military academy at West Point.

I would therefore recommend, that in the re-organization of the National Guards, strict watch be kept upon the enlistments, and that examinations of men who wish to enter that service hereafter, be conducted with more strict conformity to army regulations.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

Augusta Me., July 30, 1898.

General John T. Richards, Adjutant General, State of Maine:

SIR: I have the honor to make the following report of the rifle practice of the battalions, B. C. and D. There has been 300 different enlisted men at the 100 yard range, 302 men at the 150 yard range, and 101 men at the two hundred range, each firing seven shots each.

In addition to this 157 men who have been again at the 100 yard range, taking the same firings, making 457 scores fired at the 100 yard point. The average being 21.10 to a man, from a total score of 9,664 points,—out of a possible 35.

The 302 men at 150 yards, made a total of 5,569 points,—an average of 18.42 out of 35.

The 101 men at the 200 yard point, made a total of 1,956 points, an average of 19.36 out of 35.

I think you will agree with me that this is a high average, taking into account the fact that it is an average of all shooting, and that the larger number of men, never shot a rifle before. Every care was taken by myself and competent coachers to teach the men all desirable knowledge of military rifle shooting.

I would advise that the men now be instructed in skirmish firings at points where the most can be learned.

The officers have commenced practice with the army revolver, and have showed aptness in the work. More practice is needed. Will report in detail later.

I have been greatly assisted by Lieut. L. R. Adams, Lieut. W. B. McPheters, Lieut. Spear, and Corp. Nelson, and other non-commissioned officers and men.

Dear Sir: In accordance with your instructions, and the desire of Maj. E. E. Newcomb, commander of the battalion at Camp Powers, rifle practice was commenced on July 18th and continued until all available men had taken firings at 100, 150 and 200 yards, both off hand and skirmish positions, and such as their efficiency would warrant, were given skirmish firings from 400 to 150 yards. I found at the commencement that with the exception of a few men from the N. G. S. M. who had been some time in the service, the use of any rifle was new to most, and many had never shot any rifle. There were enough of the guard with knowledge of rifle shooting to render valuable aid in assisting in giving instruction to the men both at the firing point and in camp, preparing for practice. This instruction has been of great value in the work, every one trying to help his comrade to learn to shoot correctly.

The prizes offered for best record in battalion and individual firing was a continual incentive to intelligent effort.

Through the courtesy of Maj. Newcomb all the needed facilities for systematic practice were afforded. I found the men desirous of knowing how to shoot and they were at all times ready to do anything suggested for carrying it on with the best of results.

The three battalions as their record shows are well prepared for active service in the field. I would suggest through you to the commander of the battalion that, if time will allow, the men whose individual record gives them a low rank (perhaps fifteen per cent of the force), be kept at practice under their officers until they are qualified as marksmen. I would also suggest

that all whose record is below that of a marksman, be permitted to fire five shots at least at 200 yards, and that all men qualifying, be furnished with marksmans' buttons.

The following is a detailed account of the practice, and when it is considered that the average amount of ammunition expended by each soldier did not exceed forty rounds, the results are satisfactory.

153 men, 100 yards, off hand, seven rounds each, score, 3,107.

100 men, 150 yards, off hand, seven rounds each, score, 1,760.

40 men, 200 yards, off hand, seven rounds each, score, 727.

38 men, 100 yards, prone, seven rounds each, score, 903.

30 men, 200 yards, prone, seven rounds each, score, 620.

49 men, skirmish, 250 to 100 yards, five rounds each, score, 607.

10 men, 400 to 150 yards, skirmish, 20 rounds each, score, 601. 10 men, 200 yards, off hand, silhourette target, 7 rounds, score, 213.

10 men, 400 to 150 yards, skirmish, silhourette target, 20 rounds, 537.

75 men, 300 to 150 yards, 5 rounds, silhourette target, score, 732.

Taking an equal number of men and shots and crediting an average of all taking part in the firings, to each battalion, the result is as follows:

Battalion B, 10,781 points; Battery C, 9,421 points; Battery D, 9,279 points. This makes Battery B the winner of the prize offered.

In the individual scores, the highest made was by Corp. J. D. Nelson of Battery B, with a score as follows:

100 yards, off hand, seven shots, score, 31.

150 yards, off hand, seven shots, score, 34.

200 yards, off hand, seven shots, score, 31.

200 yards, prone, seven rounds, score, 29.

200 yards, off hand at silhourette target, smallest used, score, 27.

400 to 150 yards, skirmish, Gov't target, used by the guard, 20 rounds, score, 85.

400 to 150 yards, skirmish, silhourette target, man kneeling, 20 rounds, score, 82. Total, 319.

The closest competitor was Sergt. McLellan, Battery C, who in the same firings made a total of 301 points. Many other men made creditable scores. All the skirmish practice was advancing and retreating, thirty seconds at a halt.

I desire to inform you, that the men showed commendable zeal in the work.

A careful inspection of the rifles will show at least ten per cent needing repairs. Broken firing pins, broken ejectors, and too light pull for safety being the main cause.

The officers have rendered most valuable assistance upon the range.

To the Adjutant General of the State of Maine:

SIR: As provided by statute, I herewith submit my report of rifle practice by the National Guard of the State of Maine, for the year ending October 31, 1898, with such suggestions as seem proper at this time.

There was every evidence when the year 1897 closed, that the present year would be one of great activity in rifle practice, but before the season was sufficiently advanced to commence practice the war with Spain made demands upon the State which preclude any work in that direction. The furnishing of one full regiment of guard for service, took about every available soldier in the first regiment and very many from the second regiment. This left the companies in a disorganized condition, and it was not deemed advisable to urge range practice. Later a battalion of heavy artillery was furnished the government, which called into service a large number of soldiers from the companies of the second regiment. There was some practice after the year ending October 31, 1897, by companies M of the first and C, M, G and L of the second regiment with good results. In view of the recommendations hereinafter submitted, I have not appended the qualifications made by those practicing. During the latter part of July and August, when the three batteries, B. C and D were in camp at the State grounds, it seemed desirable that the men should be given the benefit of range practice at the State rifle range. Agreeable to the request of Major E. E. Newcomb, commanding, and under your instructions, practice was commenced and carried on until all the men in the three batteries had taken firings in off hand, and skirmish practice.

The result of that practice was highly satisfactory, and showed the wisdom of your urgent desire to have all the men made familiar in the various positions needed in actual warfare. I append herewith the result of the firings.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In view of the fact that the National Guard of the State, did not have an opportunity to qualify during the year 1898, I would respectfully recommend that you provide and issue some *special decoration* to all soldiers of the guard who entered the service of the U. S., who were marksmen of record in any of the classes of marksmanship, applicable to their class of qualification, to be a distinctive recognition of their patriotism. To those members of the guard who did not go into the service, but owing to the conditions which prevented them from qualifying in 1898, I would recommend a decoration for 1898 and 1899; provided they qualify in a class to which they had attained or to a higher class during the season of 1899.

I would also recommend that any soldier entitled to the special decoration, by entering the service of the U. S., who died before the term of service expired, that the decoration be issued to the nearest relative, as a memento to his memory.

Examinations.

Your attention is called to the fact that when the call was made by the government for one regiment, more than eightyfive per cent of the National Guard of this State were marksmen of record.

These men had been instructed from year to year; many of them being soldiers of experience, well drilled and anxious to enter the service of the government. The physical examination by the U. S. surgeons were of such a nature that nearly one-half of the men were rejected for disability. In many of these cases the only reason for rejection was some slight defect; or immaterial increase or lack in weight from the standard adopted; the rules by which the examinations were made being subject to no discretion on the part of the examining surgeon. These men were educated as soldiers at the expense of the State, and found

when wanted that they were not available. In other words, nearly one-half of the National Guard of this State would fail to meet the requirements of the government when needed for service. In the department of rifle practice this condition of things makes it evident that there is something wrong either in the examinations conducted by the examining surgeons in our State, or the conditions imposed by the government, or both. It takes a long time with no small expense to make a superior marksman, and to see a large per cent of the same thrown out when needed, shows that there is something wrong somewhere in the making of efficient soldiers.

I believe that the government regulations for the examination of recruits is open to criticism and should be changed. It is all well enough in times of peace, and the standard of examination cannot be too high, when soldiers are desired for the army for the purpose of education; the making of soldiers. But in times of war, when men are wanted for immediate service, to be closely exacting as to weight, or to be thrown out because of some trivial disability, which the conditions exact, and over which the surgeons have no control, and not allow the examining surgeons to inquire into the ability of the recruit as a welldrilled soldier, and his qualifications as a marksman, seems unbusinesslike, and wrong. To sav in other words, that a man who never fired a rifle, or saw the inside of an armory, is worth more to the government in times of war, that a soldier, well drilled, and an efficient marksman, lacks the endorsement of good common sense. If this course is to be continued by the government the only way left for the State is to impose as stringent conditions, in the examination of recruits for the National Guard, as is done by the government. surely will have to be done to meet the condition of things, or there will be, in the future as in the past, a useless waste of money in the education of soldiers of the National Guard of Maine.

ARMY RIFLES.

There has been so much criticism of the U. S. Springfield rifle, that I feel compelled to say a word in relation to the three rifles used in the war with Spain by the two nations. It is well known that Spain used what is called the "Mauser" rifle. The

United States used the U. S. "new magazine" and the Spring-field rifle. The Mauser is about 27 and the new magazine rifle is a 30 calibre rifle, each having a five cartridge magazine. While the mechanism is some different operating the loading of the rifle, there is but little advantage of the one over the other. One can be charged and fired as rapidly as the other. Both use smokeless powder and the hard metal bullet; the velocity and range being about the same;—that depending mainly upon the explosive power of the cartridge. If there is a superiority, it is in favor of the arm used by the government.

The Springfield rifle, is a 45 calibre rifle, and at that time using black powder and lead bullet. One would have supposed by the great hue and cry made against it, that it was hardly a serviceable rifle,—worthless and an imposition upon the soldiers to compel them to go into battle with.

When the new magazine rifle was first issued in 1895, a sample was sent to the State, and I was asked by Gen. Selden Connor, then adjutant general, to test the rifle and report my opinion as to whether it should replace the Springfield rifle with which the guard of Maine was armed. In company with Gen. W. S. Choate, a superior marksman, who was then inspector general, the rifle was given trial over several ranges, and the results carefully noted. In my report to the adjutant general, I stated that as present constructed, there would be no advantage gained by supplanting the Springfield rifle. The tests showed a deficient adjustment of the sights,—such as precluded anything like accurate shooting. Since then the rifle has been remedied in this respect, so that no error need be made in its direct fire.

The advantage of the magazine rifles used by Spain and the U. S. lies almost wholly in the ammunition. They are constructed to stand the strain of a very high explosive, getting thereby great velocity, so that for about four hundred and fifty yards the bullet does not rise, if aimed at the head of the enemy, above his head, or fall below his feet. This increases the danger space between armies, and would be of the greatest possible value where one or the other force advances in a charge, as will readily be seen. There might be times when the reserve magazine of five cartridges might be of advantage, but how

much, is a question. Another advantage, the lighter recoil when discharged, and the lighter weight of ammunition,—200 cartridges weighing about the same as forty of the Springfield rifle ammunition. The powder is smokeless, and were it not for the fact that the ammunition now made for the Springfield rifle, is also smokeless, this would be of much moment,—giving the enemy the location of the troops.

The Springfield rifle is a strong weapon, easily manipulated and easily kept in repair. The small calibre of the magazine rifles make it almost impossible to keep the rifles clean. Springfield rifle is the more accurate of the two, and in the hands of a marksman, (and neither has much value in any other hands), better shooting can be done with it any distance to 600 vards and even a greater distance than with the magazine rifle. The advantage of the magazine, to my mind is but little. True, you can discharge five cartridges quicker than with the Springfield rifle, where each cartridge has to be put in separately. But any man can fire fifteen or twenty rounds with the Springfield rifle as quickly and with as great accuracy, as can be done with the magazine rifle. It only takes about three minutes to load and fire twenty rounds with the Springfield rifle, and either rifle will be so hot when that is done that it will be difficult to handle it, much more to do anything like accurate shooting, when the barrel is heated.

The government is now making smokeless powder for the Springfield rifle and the objection of informing the enemy where you are by the smoke of your rifle is obviated. While I believe the magazine rifle is the better one for army use, it is a fact that the Springfield rifle is a most excellent and powerful army rifle.

No little has been written about the effect of the bullets from the two rifles upon those hit. In one of our first engagements at the landing of a small force in Cuba, some of our soldiers were found badly mutilated and the reason was given—the terrible Mauser bullets. All tests prove that the wounds from the 30 calibre rifles are much smaller and less dangerous. The great velocity of the bullet causes it to pass through a person making a small clean cut on entering and leaving the body. Not till it gets beyond 200 yards does it begin to tear and mangle when leaving the body. The wounds from a 45 calibre

bullet at less velocity, will at short distances make a larger wound upon entering and a fearful wound on leaving the body. The mutilation of the soldiers in this first fight might properly be traced to Spanish barbarity.

It was with a good deal of interest I noted the adverse newspaper reports upon the rifles in the battle at Santiago. I doubt very much if we suffered the loss of a single man by use of the Springfield rifle. Nearly all the fighting was what might be called bush fighting and at pretty close range. Certainly the Springfield rifle was at no disadvantage. The difficulty is, only a small per cent of the volunteer force from any state know how to use the rifle with effect. The Spanish army was sadly deficient in this respect, for if they had been as good marksmen as our army there. I do not see how our army could have withstood their fire. It is said that they expended more than 200,-000 rounds of ammunition. Much more might be said regarding the advantage and disadvantage of one rifle over the other. but of this I am thoroughly convinced, that if the soldier is instructed in the use of the rifle as he ought to be, there will be little reason to criticise the rifle used, let it be the magazine or the Springfield rifle.

Conclusion.

I desire to express my appreciation of the constant and untiring efforts of the Governor, Hon. Llewellyn Powers, Commander-in-Chief, and yourself, for the most valuable advice and assistance, in the endeavor to have the National Guard of Maine, in readiness for any emergency which might arise whereby their services were needed. Long before any call was made upon the State for soldiers, everything was done to fit the guard for active service, by having them well drilled and made efficient in marksmanship. Every assistance which could be given me, has been rendered by those officers who were and have been in command of our different organizations, which has resulted in whatever success achieved in the line of my duties, and for which my thanks are extended.

DEAR SIR: Yours enclosing pay rolls received, also yours of July 19th, referring to money placed at my disposal by Rev. C. S. Cummings.

My men have hard time of it but are now in much better condition than they were a week ago, at that time I had thirty-seven men sick and unable to do duty. Private Parks has been sent to Fortress Munroe by orders of surgeon, five are now in hospital (only one case dangerous) eight including myself have had yellow fever. Lieut. Steel who was temporarily attached to my command died of yellow fever three days ago. Rheumatism and fever seem to be the trouble with the most of the men, brought on by exposure, sleeping in wet clothing in the mud and water.

Have had no trouble in getting rations since the first few days that we were here. At that time we were fortunate to get two meals per day and were satisfied with one. All troops were in the same fix except the Cubans, who had three and sometimes four when they could steal it from us, but good American lead proved a good preventative against famine in many cases.

I am very fortunate to have Sergeant Herrick who was an old commissary sergeant of the First Regiment. I made him my quartermaster sergeant and when he cannot get what is due in rations and forage by fair means—well it comes from somewhere.

Have been handicapped for transportation. The depot quartermaster at Tampa would not leave my mule teams and as my men have been scattered all over the country it has been uphill work to feed them. In some cases have been obliged to send rations, wire telephone, buttons, oil, etc., fourteen miles over the mountains. The Q. M. depot seemed to be in a trance, could get no team from them, the only thing to do was to steal mules, make up packs with the help of shelter tents, tent flys or any old thing. You can imagine what the result was at first. The pack was under the mule about as often as it was on his back. Have now on hand thirty-one good mules that I am not responsible for.

About the pay rolls I will have them signed as soon as possible. As the men are scattered from Siboney to Santiago it will take a few days to do it.

About the matter of money for the sick and convalescent, if we ever need it we need it now for the men are weak and seem to have hardly strength enough to walk, instead of sending check here, hold it for me and in the meantime, as I have plenty of cash with me will purchase what is needed and you can reimburse men later as I expect that we shall leave here for the states within two weeks. After thirty days of good fresh air in the states we will take great pleasure in cutting Brother Blanco's barb wire fences around Havana.

General John T. Richards, Adjutant General, Augusta, Me.:

DEAR SIR: I have hardly had time to write you before since landing, however, I will now give you a brief report of condition of men.

Landed here with two officers and thirty men; eight of these men went to the hospital, all of them are improving. Names are: Welch, Johnson (C. F.), Brackley, Locke, McDonough, Emmons, Rand and Harriman (A. G.)

Dill went to Division Hospital at San Juan Hill but was afterwards removed to General Hospital at Santiago city. Before I landed a newspaper reporter told me that a man by the name of Dill came in on the transport Missouri, but on going through the hospital I found it to be another Dill. At last reports he was doing well in the hospital at Santiago.

Geo. Bell and Parks who were sent from Siboney are at their homes, while Lowell, P. J. Bell and Marshall have been returned to the U. S. to some hospital.

I found Colcord here at the hospital but he is hardly expected to live. His mother is with him.

Expect to be sent to Augusta and be mustered out the last of this week.

CAMP WIKOFF, September 16, 1898.

General John T. Richards, Adjutant General:

DEAR SIR: I regret to inform you that Private Ezra Colcord died in the hospital here last night. His father and mother have been with him several days. All other patients here are doing well.

Officially I have twenty-one men for duty but have not one that could run one hundred yards without becoming exhausted. This fact weighs heavily on my mind for God knows that the health of my men have been my first care.

We are encamped here with a detachment of the regular signal corps which was with us in Cuba.

Gen. A. W. Greeley called here yesterday and after a long talk with the officers, said that he wished the men assembled as he had something to say to them. This was done, he then thanked the men in general for the intelligent and efficient manner in which they had performed their duty in Santiago, saying that

it was a source of great pride to him that the signal corps was the only department that had escaped adverse criticism, then turning to the Maine men said: "You of the volunteers that came into the field from your shops and desks, cannot be expected to stand the hardships of this campaign like the regulars who are trained soldiers, neither are you expected to perform the many duties which devolve upon you with the same intelligence as the regulars who have had years of constant practice and study, but the comparison is very flattering to you. You were the first to report for duty in Washington, you were the best equipped of any detachment that has reported here during the war. The State of Maine ought to be proud of you and should be proud of the manner in which she prepared you for the field and in conclusion let me say, that it is my fond hope that in civil life you will meet with the same success which has crowned your efforts in the service of your country."

The General then asked me to go to the hospital as he wished to see every man that could be found. I went with him to the General Hospital taking him through the different wards where the men were scattered (and I am a good guide as I visit them daily.) He took each man by the hand and thanked him personally speaking words of encouragement, more like a father than a stranger.

After leaving here he asked if there were any others. I told him that Private Colcord was in the detention hospital but was unconscious and not expected to live, also that his parents were with him. He said that if I thought he would not be considered as an intrusion he would like to see him and speak to his father and mother; and so we went there. The poor fellow seemed much better than when I saw him in the morning but it was the last rally before death. The General took his hand and told him who he was. He seemed to understand what the General said and tried to answer. I made out distinctly the words—"duty General."

General, these sick men will never forget General Greeley, the chief signal officer of the U. S. Army, they will swear by him through life.

I am waiting here only for the quartermaster to make arrangements for transportation to Augusta, Maine. Will wire you

when I leave New London. You can publish any part of this that you see fit. I am far from well myself and besides have no time to write for the papers.

Have yet received no further news from Private Dill.

General John T. Richards, Adjutant General of Maine:

SIR: I have the honor to make the following brief report of the operations of the Maine Company (8th) U. S. V. Signal Corps during the Santiago campaign, a duplicate of which is furnished to Gen. A. W. Greeley, Chief Signal Officer, U. S. A.

On May 2, 1898, although there was no call for signal men included in first call by President McKinley for volunteers, the signal corps went into camp with the other State troops at Augusta, Maine, and at once went to work to perfect themselves as far as possible in their branch of service before a call should come for signal men.

The organization consisted of one 2nd lieutenant, one 1st class sergeant, three sergeants and sixteen privates.

On May 20th, upon nomination of Governor Powers, I was appointed a captain of Signal Corps U. S. V by the President. Private Charles E. Walker was also appointed a 1st lieutenant at the same time.

The call for signal detachment from this State consisted of two officers and forty first-class privates. Only seventeen of the National Guard organization were able to pass the physical examination, and one man (who displayed the white feather) was sent home without his buttons. Nearly all the other men who were recruited to make up the quota were either telegraph operators, telephone inspectors, linemen or electricians.

June 11th, the enlistment and muster in was completed, the organization was uniformed by the State and thoroughly fitted out with camp and garrison equipage, including forty shelter halves, nine wall tents, one buzzacott oven, large size, picks, shovels, axes, etc., and armed with twenty Springfield B. L. Carbines Cal 45. Signal equipment, however, was very limited, consisting of only twelve flags four feet square, one heliograph, two telegraph instruments and one pair of lineman's spurs.

June 16th I left Augusta with my command and reported to Colonel Dunwoody the following evening at Washington Barracks. Left Washington Barracks June 21st and arrived at Tampa, Florida, June 23rd. I at once reported to Maj. Reber and was ordered by him to go into camp at Tampa Bay Hotel grounds.

On June 29th I received an order to go to Cuba. I immediately drew fifteen days' rations (travel) turned in my carbines and drew thirty-seven revolvers and 2,400 rounds of ammunition; was also able to get from Capt. C. C. Clark thirteen flags, six set torches complete, ten field glasses and two telescopes.

I embarked on transport June 30th but did not sail until the morning of July 3rd. I was not able to get four line teams (which I had drawn at Florida) on board the expedition, so, by advice of Maj. Reber, I detached Coporal Sullivan and Private Fish and left them in charge of teams, with the understanding that they were to be sent to me at the first opportunity. These men were afterwards sent to Puerto Rico, as they were not allowed to land at Santiago, and were mustered out with the 9th Co. Signal Corps, U. S. V.

By order of Gen. Randolph, commanding the expedition, I detailed two men for signal duty on each of the transports, (six in number) as follows: Comanche, Cate City, City of Macon, Unionist, Specialist and Hudson. The fleet arrived in Key West harbor on the morning of July 4th and from there was accompanied to Cuba by gunboats Machias and Wilmington, and tug Leyden. Arrived off Siboney harbor on the night of July 9th, and on the morning of the 10th I went ashore and reported to Lieut. Col. Greene by telephone, and was instructed to go into camp at Siboney and await orders.

Next day I was ordered by Col. Greene to meet him at corps headquarters near Seville as soon as possible, and as my horse had not been landed, I was obliged to walk, and so did not reach headquarters until after the Colonel had left there for the front. A truce was in effect at that time but the Americans were to commence firing at four o'clock.

I could do nothing but wait until after the fight, and so I accompanied a regular officer to San Juan hill as a spectator, returning to headquarters again about dark.

Col. Greene returned about nine o'clock and instructed me to make disposition of my command as follows, viz: Eight telegraph operators at Siboney station, also one telephone man; four operators for Baiquiri; three signal men and one telephone man at Aguadores; two reconstruction parties with eight men each to rebuild line from Siboney to El Poso (this line consisted

of a single cable rubber insulated composed of seven wires and, being built hastily and under difficulties, in many places lay on the ground; this line was often cut by mischievous Cubans and even U. S. soldiers, who happened to want a piece of wire for any purpose, would very often cut a piece out, as they did not seem to be aware of its value or purpose); this was done by securing the wire to trees whenever trees were found tall enough for the purpose; in other places we were obliged to use poles brought from a distance and in many cases held in an upright position by piling stones around the foot when the nature of the ground was such that holes could not be dug.

A few days after I took charge of Siboney Station, which was in a building formerly occupied by the railroad officials. Col. Greene ordered me to pitch a wall tent and move all apparatus in the building into this tent; this being done, the building was burned with others as a sanitary precaution.

July 18th, the station at Aguadores was discontinued and the line run into Santiago.

July 22nd the station at Baiquiri was abandoned and three men sent into Santiago for duty at French cable office.

July 26th I moved my camp to station No. 4, near San Juan hill, leaving eight men under Sergeant Lowell at Siboney, and at the same time recovered the wire from Siboney to Station No. 3 (General Bates' headquarters). July 29th my men relieved the regulars at Stations Nos. 3 and 4, also at General Kent's headquarters. August 28th No. 3 and General Kent's headquarters were abandoned and all wire recovered up to Station No. 4.

September 1st I embarked on transport Saratoga, with one officer and thirty men, and arrived at Montauk Point, Long Island, September 11th; then I went to camp of detention, with the exception of eight men who were sent to the hospital.

Left Montauk Point September 23rd, and arrived in Augusta September 25th, with one officer and sixteen men.

October 3rd, officers and men were furloughed for sixty days, preparatory to muster out of the service.

Whole number of deaths during the campaign, 3, viz: Sergt. Fred E. Stuart, died at Siboney, August 12th, of yellow fever; Private Ezra W. Colcord, died at Montauk Point, September

15th, of malarial fever; Private Frank H. Locke, died at Providence, R. I., of dysentery.

One man was sent to the United States sick July 24th, and four other men were also sent during the month of August.

Two men were left in the hospital in Santiago when the company sailed for Montauk Point.

When the company reached Augusta, Maine, they were all in more or less bad condition, but, on November 1st, only two cases remained in the hospital.

In only one place during the whole campaign did we use flags for signal purposes (except on transport), viz: Between Aguadores Station and Admiral Sampson's fleet during the five or six days preceding the surrender. Sergeant Welch and his men were working continuously from daylight until dark. All messages had to be transmitted, as Colonel Greene did not consider it safe to use torches there, on account of the Spanish being just across the creek and the light of torches would expose our position, which was in the daytime well screened by rocks and bushes.

I was very fortunate in having with me Sergt. Geo. C. Frarey, a telephone man who thoroughly understood the construction and working of telephones, as, previous to enlisting, he was division inspector for the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company.

Upon taking possession of the office at Siboney, we found the spare instruments burned out by lightning but a few hours' work enabled Sergt. Frarey to put them all in good working order.

There was one thing which surprised me very much, and that was the ignorance displayed by the army in general of the workings of the signal corps. Very many of them had no idea that such an organization existed, and many of those who had, thought nothing of its importance. There were many soldiers who cut a piece of wire out of a working line if they happened to want a guy rope for a tent, or any other purpose; this caused much annoyance and trouble, and had it not been for the promptness and intelligence of the men on duty it would have been the means of much delay and confusion.

I call to mind one instance which, had it not been for an accident, would have caused serious trouble; one night a break or

cut occurred in the line between Sibonev and Station No. 2 and in the morning patrol parties from both stations started to find the trouble. At 6.25 A. M. the parties met near Laquisema and not a sign of a break had been found. I immediately started for Station No. 2 to make sure that the instrument there was all right, but before traveling a mile I noticed the wire in one place hanging rather low; dismounting with the object of raising the wire to the top of some bushes, I noticed a splice which seemed to have been made in a very clumsy manner. Upon closer examination I found that some one had spliced the line, where it had been cut, without removing the insulation. Another case occurred a few days later which was reported to me by one of the regulars. Between El Poso and Station No. 4, a piece of wire had been cut out of the line and some person possessed of more good nature than brains and electrical knowledge had spliced in a piece of rope about ten feet long.

During this campaign, there have been many things which we have studied (supposing them to be the principal part of a signal man's duty) which were not used at all, and I find by hard experience that the natural ingenuity of the men must carry them through when all else fails.

When I received the order to remove my camp to San Juan hill and recover the wire to Station No. 3, I directed Sergt. Welch to make a detail of six men for this purpose, and, as there was no recovering reel available. I directed him to build one, and will give here a description of the reel built for the emergency. A wheelbarrow was the base; a piece of plank two inches thick and ten inches wide was spiked to the barrow in front, passing out, and secured to the backboard in such a manner that it projected eighteen inches over the wheel to the rear. A horizontal reel, twenty inches in diameter, was pivoted to the end of this plank; two poles were lashed to the handles of the barrow, making a pair of shafts into which a mule was harnessed. This gave him a vehicle with one wheel which enabled them to take it up over the trail where a two wheeled vehicle could not be used; this was an ungainly contrivance, but it answered perfectly the purpose for which it was built.

Wheeler in charge, he turned the train over to me as he was about sick. Found the men in bad condition but some

improved. The Sergt. said he was short of supplies and he asked me to buy some brandy for the train which I did and turned the same over to him, and it was used following out his instructions on treatment. After removing the men at Portland I settled the hotel bills of the corps and left on the 5.15 P. M. train for Lewiston.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, AUGUSTA, Feb. 12, 1898.

General Orders No. 1.

- I. An inspection of the several companies and corps of the National Guard will be made by the Inspector General during the months of March, April, May and June of the current year.
- II. The new Inspection Report (Form 1) will be used and the inspection made in accordance with its requirements.
- III. Inspections will be held as far as possible on the regular drill nights of the several organizations, when this is impracticable the Inspector General will fix the time of inspection, and in all cases will give due and sufficient notice to the company and corps commanders who will promptly acknowledge the receipt of the notification.
- IV. The Inspector General will advise regimental commanders of the inspections by sending them notices in each case, which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.
- V. Companies will parade in fatigue uniform, armed and equipped in heavy marching order.
- VI. Company commanders, for the use of the Inspector General, will prepare duplicate rolls of their companies, and an Inspection Report (Form 1) by entering upon it a complete list of all State property for which they are accountable, or which they may have taken up on their returns.
- VII. Company commanders will prepare Inventories and Inspection Reports (Form 4) of all property which they consider unserviceable, and present the same with the property to the Inspector General, for his action.
- VIII. Attention is called to General Orders No. 17, series 1897, paragraphs IX_{λ} X, XI.
- IX. Captain C. G. Morton, 6th U. S. Infantry, on duty with N. G. S. M., will at once make a tour of instruction of the several companies and corps of the National Guard. The instruction of each organization will occupy two evenings. One will be devoted to theoretical instruction of the officers, non-commissioned officers, and such privates as may elect to attend, and the other to practical instruction of the whole company. The latter will be given on regular drill nights, whenever practicable, but this rule may be departed from for economy of transportation or other public interest. Captain Morton will give ample notice to the commanding officer of each organization, and will render a report upon each, including a list of abseates. The uniform to be worn will be undress. He will advise the Colonels commanding the 1st and 2d Regiments of Infantry, of the dates on which he will instruct the several companies of their commands.

- I. In accordance with the requirements of Section 84 of the Militia Law, a meeting of the officers of the Second Regiment of the National Guard for military instruction, is hereby called to meet at the Council Chamber, City Building, in Bangor, Maine, on Tuesday, March 22, 1898, at 2 o'clock P. M.
 - II. The hours of the several sessions will be fixed by the Colonel Commanding.
- III. The meeting will continue until 6 o'clock P. M. of the day following that on which it is called, and will be divided into sessions as the Colonel may direct.
- IV. The Colonel assisted by such officers as he may designate, will instruct the officers of his regiment in such branches of military art and duty as he may consider for the best interests of his command. He will make report of this duty to the Adjutant-General and account for absentees.
 - V. Officers will appear in undress uniform without side arms.
- VI. Transportation will be furnished by the Quartermaster-General; quarters and subsistence will be arranged for under his direction.
- VII. The Board of Examination will meet at the Bangor House, Bangor, Maine, on Thursday, March 24th at 9 o'clock A. M. to inquire into the qualification for their respective positions of persons who have been elected or appointed to offices in the National Guard of the State of Maine.
- VIII. Persons appointed or elected to positions in the Natioual Guard, are hereby notified to present themselves to the Board of Examination at the time and place above specified for the meeting of the board. Officers elect who are members of the National Guard will appear in undress uniform without side arms.
- IX. Transportation from their respective stations, to Bangor and return, will be issued to those officers elect who are members of the National Guard; quarters and subsistence will be furnished them for the time actually necessary for their appearance before the board, but no per diem will be allowed.

- X. The Regulations for the government of the National Guard, which have been revised by the board convened under Special Orders No. 1, approved by the Commander-in-Chief, and which are now in the hands of the printer, having changed the conditions for rifle practice and qualifications in marksmanship, all small arms practice will be discontinued until further orders.

- I. Immediately upon receipt of this order, Company and Corps Commanders will have all dress coats carefully packed, in tight cases, putting plenty of moth balls among them.
- II. All helmets will be packed in cases by themselves. The spikes will first be removed and placed in small boxes which will be packed in the cases with the helmets; great care will be used to avoid crushing the helmets in the cases, paper or other material will be packed around them to keep them in place, and moth talls will be packed with them in liberal quantity.
- III. All musicians' swords and sliding frogs now in possession of the several organizations of the National Guard will be carefully packed. The belts will be retained.
- IV. The cases containing the dress coats and helmets, and packages containing the musicians' swords and sliding frogs, will be plainly marked with the corps, or the letter of the company, and number of the regiment to which the company is attached, addressed to the Quartermaster General, Augusta, Maine, and forwarded at once by freight to this office.
- V. Invoices and receipts in duplicate will be made of the articles turned in, the receipts will be signed by the Quartermaster General, and returned to the officer accountable for the property, one of these receipts will accompany the next Property Return as voucher.
- VI. Officers accountable for the property now ordered to be turned in, will obtain the necessary cases and moth balls, making an expense account therefor. One private in each organization can be employed for packing, for which a day's pay will be allowed.

- I. All badges or other insignia won in target practice will be the personal property of the person winning them. When issued, receipt will be acknowledged by the company or corps commander, or by the regimental commander in case the winner does not belong to a company or corps. The above mentioned badges and insignia will not be taken up on property returns.
- II. All badges or other insignia heretofore won in target practice, and taken up on property returns, will be dropped from the same as expended, using the new Form 45 (List of Military Property Expended) as a voucher.
- III. The next property return will be rendered May 31st, 1898, in accordance with the requirements of Regulations for the National Guard which have been approved by the Commander-in-Chief and are now being printed. The necessary blank forms will shortly be distributed, without application being made to the Quartermaster General. On future occasions timely applications will be made for the blank forms required.
- IV. All badges or other insignia which have heretofore been authorized to be worn upon the uniform coat, or which may be so authorized in the Regulations for the National Guard which have been approved by the Commander-in-Chief and are now being printed, may hereafter be worn upon the blouse when the uniform coat is not issued. When this is the case the buttons authorized to be worn upon the collar of the blouse will not be worn or issued.
- V. Requisitions will be at once submitted by company commanders for sufficient haversacks, haversack straps, canteens and canteen straps to bring the number of each for which they are accountable up to 47.
- VI. A company clerk will hereafter be paid the amount permitted by law only upon certificate of his company commander that he has properly performed his duties, which certificate must be approved by the regimental commander after consultation with the adjutant.

- I. All Springfield rifles, cal. 45, not included in the accountability of company commanders, will be at once shipped by express to the Quartermaster-General.
- II. All officers who are, from any cause, physical or otherwise, unable to volunteer for service in the Army of the United States, or who have good reason to believe that for physical or other cause they would not be accepted should they volunteer, are hereby requested to forward their resignation to the Adjutant General, through military channels.
- III. Regimental, company and corps commanders are hereby directed to immediately recommend for discharge all enlisted men who from physical disability are unable to perform military duty, or who are, at the present time, over 45 years of age.
- IV. Companies and corps will be, as soon as practicable, recruited to the full strength allowed by the Militia Law. Copies of said law have been forwarded to regimental commanders, who will make the necessary distribution. Examinations of recruits will be conducted in the usual manner, except that they will be in accordance with the rules governing the U. S. Army in time of war, and that application for a surgeon may be made when a smaller number of men than previously necessary has been enlisted.
- V. All companies and corps will, until further orders, hold meetings for theoretical and practical instruction at least semi-weekly; should war be declared these meetings will be held nightly except Sunday. Instructions of companies will be under the direction of regimental commanders.
- VI. Commanding officers of companies and corps will adopt such means as may seem best for calling their men together quickly in case of necessity.
- VII. All State military property will be kept in the armories. Every article will be placed in the best possible condition for service in the field.
- VIII. Officers and enlisted men will make such arrangements as may be necessary to enable them to leave their homes suddenly for service of indefinite duration.

General Orders No. 7.

In the event of the National Guard, or any part of the same, being concentrated preparatory to muster into the service of the United States as volunteers, the following will be observed by all concerned.

1. The following allowance of baggage, including mess outfits, will not be exceeded: Field officer, 500 pounds; captain, 200 pounds; lieutenant, 150 pounds; enlisted man, what he can carry upon his person. A Buzzacott oven, as described in the Regulations, with a complete set of utensils for the same, will be furnished each company when needed. Commanding officers will see that baggage is restricted to the above allowance, and that no unnecessary articles are taken. Should the concentration be made at the State campground in Augusta, all baggage will be hauled from the railroad station to the campground by Mr. C. L. Marston, whose office is on the platform of the station.

- II. All State military property which may be of use in the field, together with forage caps, knapsacks, blanket bags, and straps for same, will be taken by the troops, whether on property returns or not. Special effort will be made to find rifles, equipments, uniforms, etc., which may have been previously taken out of armories and lost. These articles will be used to fit out the additional men recently enlisted. Reserve ammunition, in its boxes, will also be taken. Upon arrival in camp the commanding officers of companies and corps will turn over to the Quartermaster General, upon invoices and receipts previously prepared, the forage caps, knapsacks, blanket bags, and straps for same above mentioned.
- III. Full lists of personal equipment for officers and men, as well as mess outfits, etc., are contained in the Regulations, copies of which have been mailed to the officers of the Guard. The following articles may be added if desired: A small filter, a Yeager flannel bandage, a light grass hammock and shaving material. Officers and men should be careful to bring a full supply of underclothing, sufficient to last until a new supply is issued by the United States. Each officer and man should bring at least one pair of shoes, strong and serviceable, and adapted to marching and other outdoor work. Extra bedding is imperatively needed, to be sent home when the troops leave the State.
- IV. The Regulations contain much information upon the subjects mentioned in the preceding paragraph, as well as upon other subjects connected with field service. They should be diligently studied and followed.
- V. Each officer entitled to be mounted, with the exception of Inspectors of Rifle Practice, will hire a suitable horse, and arrange for his transportation to the point of concentration, unless other arrangements are made by the Quartermaster-General. As soon as arrangements are made for the hire of horses, or when it is found impracticable to hire them, the Quartermaster-General will be informed direct by the officers concerned. Due economy will be exercised by officers in making arrangement for transportation of horses. Two draft horses will, in like manuer, be procured for the ambulance. Arrangements should be made by which horses hired may be purchased if necessary. Horses should be well adapted for the purpose intended, and no horses of a conspicuous color, especially white or gray, should be taken. Mounted officers in the service of the United States are entitled to forage for two horses, provided they are actually owned by the officers concerned. The care of horses must be paid for by their owners, but shoeing, etc., is paid for by the United States. Officers are cautioned not to purchase horses until they are certain that it will be necessary. Horses for enlisted men will not be taken to camp.
- VI. Each company should bring into camp two cooks, as enlisted men of the company and included in its authorized strength. The ambulance corps should bring two, and the signal corps and bands one cook each, under the same conditions. Cooks for officers' messes will be hired by the officers themselves, and may be enlisted men or civilians. It is recommended that company officers make arrangements to have their meals cooked at company kitchens, but served separately from those of enlisted men. This system dispenses with extra mess outfits, employes and trouble, and enables a company to be detached from the regiment with the least possible delay and annoyance. Cooks may be sent to the point of concentration one day in advance of their companies. In addition to cooks, each company should contain among its enlisted men the following: one carpenter, one cobbler, one barber and one tailor, each with such tools and material pertaining to his trade as may be necessary in the field.
- VII. Officers or enlisted men unable or unwilling to volunteer into the service of the United States, as indicated in paragraphs 2 and 3, G. O. No. 6, c. s., from this office, will not come to camp. The action indicated in the order cited will be taken in their cases. Men enlisted but not mustered, and able and willing to volunteer into the service of the United States, may be taken to camp, provided the total number of men enlisted and mustered, and enlisted but not mustered, does not exceed the maximum strength prescribed in the Militia Law.

- VIII. Commanding officers of companies and corps will make such arrangements as are possible with the local authorities, for the care of families of men leaving their home stations in all cases where such care is necessary. The authorities should be furnished with the name, address, place of employment, rate of pay and number in family, of each man leaving his home, with a statement of whether his family will need assistance or not.
- IX. The Commander-in-Chief earnestly desires that all employers whose men leave their situations will hold the same open until their return. By so doing employers will be rendering patriotic service to their country. It is also desired that all educational institutions whose students may leave their classes will make arrangements by which they may return, when the necessity for their absence ceases, and finish their course.
- X. Before leaving his station the senior officer commanding in each armory will turn the same over to the proper authorities. All furniture, etc., left in armories will be carefully secured, windows and doors will be locked, and rooms will be left clean and arranged as neatly as if for inspection.
- XI. Before leaving their respective stations company and corps commanders will telegraph to the Adjutant-General the strength of their commands and their probable time of arrival at the point of concentration.
- XII. The following section of the Militia Law is re-published for the information and guidance of all concerned:
- Sec. 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract, or presume to authorize the contracting of, any indebtedness on behalf of the State without express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State.
- XIII. Hereafter invoices and receipts will go in duplicate to the receiving or invoicing officer respectively. The present custom of allowing the quarter-master to retain one invoice or one receipt will be discontinued, except in cases where he is the actual receiving or invoicing officer, in which case he will retain both copies. Duplicate invoices and receipts will be disposed of as indicated upon the forms themselves.
- XIV. Hereafter all orders or circulars issued from this office which require authentication will be authenticated by a seal, the name of the Adjutant-General being printed upon them. Other orders and circulars will be authenticated as required by the Regulations.

M., connecting at Brunswick with the train leaving that point at 2.25 P. M. Co. D, 1st Infantry, will take the train leaving Norway at 9.17 A. M., connecting with the train leaving Yarmouth Junction at 1.50 P. M. Co. K, 1st Infantry, will take the special train from Portland upon its arrival in Brunswick, at about 3.00 P. M. Co. C, 2nd Infantry, will take the train leaving Bath at 2.00 P. M., connecting at Brunswick with the train leaving that point at 2.25 P. M.

A special train will leave Bangor at 1.45 P. M., on May 2nd. Cos. G, L and M, 2nd Infantry, will take this train. Co. M will connect by train leaving Mt. Desert Ferry at 10.30 A. M., and will reach Mt. Desert Ferry on the steamer Frank Jones, leaving Machiasport at 4.00 A. M.

Co. K, 2nd Infantry, will proceed to Eastport in time to take the International Line steamer for Portland on Tuesday, May 3rd, taking the train leaving Portland at 7 A. M. on the 4th. Co. I, 2nd Infantry, will join Co. K at Eastport, and proceed with it. Should these companies fail to connect with the 7 A. M. train, they will take the next regular train to their destination.

Co. L, 2d Infantry, will connect by train on the Bangor & Aroostook Railroad, leaving Houlton at 7.55 A. M., with the special train from Bangor. Co. F, 2nd Infantry, will connect at Newport with the special train from Bangor by special train leaving Dover at 1 P. M. Co. E, 2nd Infantry, will connect at Waterville with the special train from Bangor by train leaving Skowhegan at 1.10 P. M. Co. H, 2nd Infantry, will take the special train from Bangor upon its arrival at Waterville. Co. F, 1st Infantry, will proceed to camp as directed by the regimental commander.

The commanding officer of the Ambulance Corps will procure horses in Lewiston for the ambulance to drive to Augusta, with as many members of his corps as the ambulance will accommodate. He will start in time to reach the campground not later than 4 P. M., May 2nd. The remaining members of the Ambulance Corps will take the train with the other troops from Lewiston at 1 P. M.

III. Commanding officers of organizations will be furnished, if practicable, with tickets. Should they not be received, or prove insufficient in number, the commanding officer on each train or other conveyance will give a receipt to the proper official, showing date of travel, place from and to which transportation is furnished, name of company furnishing the same, and actual number of men transported. He will sign this receipt with his name, rank, company and regiment. No men will be brought to camp unless specially authorized in orders.

IV. Company commanders are expected to take the means of transportation specified, with companies as near the legal complement as possible. In no case will this complement be exceeded. Officers and men allowed by their commanding officers to take a later train will see to it that they arrive in camp not later than 6 P. M., on the day after the arrival of their own organizations. They will be arranged in squads as far as practicable, each squad being under the command of the senior officer or non-commissioned officer. Should none be present the commanding officer will detail an experienced private before starting. Regimental commanders will see to it that their men debark from trains, form ranks, and march to camp in an orderly and soldierly manner.

V. Company baggage not requiring transfer on the way may be sent in advance on Monday, May 2nd, by regular passenger trains, as follows:

Cos. A, B, E, L, M and K, 1st Infantry, and the Signal Corps, by the train leaving Portland at 7.00 A. M.; Cos. G and H, 2nd Infantry, by the train leaving Bangor at

- 7.15 A. M. Baggage will be cared for upon its arrival by regimental quartermasters. The quartermaster of the 1st Infantry will look after the baggage of his own regiment and that of the Signal Corps. The quartermaster of the 2nd Infantry will look after the baggage of his own regiment and that of the Ambulance Corps
- VI. Troops will concentrate in heavy marching order, which is fully described in the Regulations.
- VII. Col. Lucius H. Kendall, 1st Infantry, will command the camp, which will be named Camp Powers, in honor of the Governor of the State. He will, as soon as practicable, prepare and forward to this office for approval, orders embracing the routine of each day, the hours of roll calls, ceremonies and other duties, and such regulations as he may deem necessary, not inconsistent with the Regulations for the National Guard, for maintaining order and discipline and promoting the efficiency of the command.
- VIII. The Inspector-General and Commissary-General will attend the encampment and discharge the duties devolving upon them by law.
- IX. The surgeon of the camp, under the direction of the commanding officer, will establish a hospital. The surgeons, regimental hospital stewards and members of the Ambulance Corps will be under his immediate control.
- X. Muster and pay rolls, in duplicate, will be prepared before going to camp, by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of enlistment and date of muster of the enlisted men. The several organizations will be mustered for pay each day of the encampment, or until they are mustered into the service of the United States. Mustering officers will report no officer or enlisted man present who does not answer to his name at muster, and they will muster no substitute.
- XI. Each officer and enlisted man must indicate upon the pay rolls the person to whom his pay is to be assigned, by writing the name of the assignee. But one assignee will be allowed for each organization.
- XII. By virtue of the power conferred by section 87 of the Militia Law, the authority of the commanding officer of the camp is hereby extended to a distance of one-half mile around the State campground, and upon the external space within such distance from the camp, with the exception of any road or roads within said distance, no person or persons save those specially authorized by law shall be allowed to enter, except under such rules as may be established by the commanding officer of the camp and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.
- XIII. Commanding officers of regiments, with their adjutants, quartermasters, sergeant-majors and commissary sergeants, will assume their duties in camp on the morning of April 30th.
- XIV. Leaves of absence and furloughs will not be granted except by authority of the Commander-in-Chief. In case leave of absence or furlough is desired on account of sickness, the certificate of the surgeon will accompany the application.
- XV. The commanding officer of the camp will render to the Adjutant-General's office a consolidated morning report each morning.
- XVI. Requisitions for clothing, arms, ammunition, equipments, etc., for the purpose of fully preparing the troops for field service, will be submitted as hereafter directed.
- XVII. Commutation of rations, at the rate of twenty-five cents per meal, will be allowed for the number of meals actually necessary while in transit, for each of the following companies: Companies D and H, 1st Infantry; and Companies I, K, L and M, 2nd Infantry.

Officers of the National Guard who may be mustered into the service of the United States are hereby granted leaves of absence, and enlisted men who may be so mustered, are granted furloughs, until such time they may be mustered out, or until they cease to belong to the National Guard by virtue of laws, regulations and orders in force in this State. Officers and enlisted men who may have volunteered and been rejected, do not from that cause cease to belong to the National Guard.

- III. Commanding officers of organizations will be furnished with tickets if practicable. Should they not be received, or prove insufficient in number, the commanding officer on each train or other conveyance will give a receipt to the proper official, showing date of travel, place from and to which transportation is furnished, name of company furnishing same, and actual number of men transported. He will sign this receipt with his name, rank, company and regiment. No transportation will be furnished for men who have been illegally mustered in excess of authorized strength. Men brought into camp to volunteer into the service of the United States who have been rejected by the surgeons and are not members of the organizations returning home, will be furnished with transportation in the manner heretofore announced.
- IV. Baggage will be hauled from the camp to the railroad station by Mr. C. L. Marston, whose office is on the platform of the Maine Central Depot at Augusta.
- V. Commutation of rations, at the rate of twenty-five cents per meal for three meals a day, will be allowed for the actual number of meals actually necessary while in transit, for members of Companies I, K, L and M.
- VI. Troops will leave camp in heavy marching order, wearing the blanket roll as prescribed in Regulations. Before leaving camp all emergency blankets will be turned in to the Quartermaster-General, as well as the knapsacks and straps for same, mentioned in paragraph II of General Orders No. 7, current series.

- VII. Mess and cook houses will be left clean, neat and locked up, the keys being turned over to Mr. Dodge of the Quartermaster's Department. I. Recruiting stations are about to be established in this State under the provisions of General Orders No. 61, c. s., Headquarters of the Army, A. G. O., to recruit the companies of the First Maine Volunteer Infantry to 106 enlisted men per company, and the battery of heavy artillery to 200 enlisted men.

- II. Company commanders of the National Guard will not transfer any ordnance, ordnance stores, clothing or equipage should men enlist from their companies in the U.S. Volunteers, nor permit their men so enlisting to take any military property with them.
- III. As men so enlisting join another organization recruited from the National Guard, they will be discharged from their original organizations, and commanding officers will promptly forward applications for such discharges with discharge papers duly filled up to this office for execution.

- I. Permission is hereby granted the officers and enlisted men of the 2nd Infantry, N. G. S. M., to form from the several battalions of the regiment, three batteries of heavy artillery to enter the service of the United States as a part of the quota assigned to this State under the second call of the President for volunteer troops.
- II. The organization of a battery of heavy artillery under this call is fixed by orders from the War Department as follows:
 - I Captain. 9 Corporals.
 I First Lieutenant. 2 Musicians.
 I Second Lieutenant. 2 Artificers.
 I First Sergeant. 1 Wagoner.
 - 6 Sergeants. 1 Wagoner. 6 Sergeants. 85 Privates.

Any change that may be made by the War Department in the above mentioned organizations before muster will be duly announced.

- III. One battery will be formed from each battalion of the 2d Infantry. The officers will be appointed and commissioned by the Governor, officers being selected from the battalions according to rank as far as practicable. All officers will be subjected to the physical examination required by the Mustering Regulations of the United States, now in force, before being commissioned.
- IV. The enlisted men of the batteries will be made up of volunteers taken in the following order:

First: Present members of the 2nd Infantry according to battalions. Second: Members of other organizations of the National Guard. Third: Men from localities where organizations of the National Guard are stationed, preferably men who have served one or more terms of enlistment and have honorable discharges. Fourth: Men taken at large.

- V. Troops will be examined physically at their home stations and transported by the Government to the State Camp Ground at Augusta, Maine.
- VI. Officers of the National Guard who may be mustered into the service of the United States are hereby granted leaves of absence, and enlisted men who may be so mustered are granted furloughs to extend until thirty days after they may be mustered out, or until they cease to belong to the National Guard by virtue of laws, regulations, and orders in force in this State.
- VII. As organizations when mustered into the service of the United States come at once under the laws, regulations, and orders governing the Army thereof, they, at the same time cease to be under the laws, regulations, and orders governing the National Guard.
- VIII. Commanding officers of companies will see that enlisted men belonging to the National Guard, who volunteer and are accepted for the batteries, bring their uniforms, arms and equipments with them to the camp at Augusta.
- IX. Officers accountable for the military property in the hands of men accepted and mustered into the batteries, will at once transfer it to the Quartermaster General by regular invoices and receipts; when receipted for it will be dropped from their property returns, the receipts being vouchers therefor.
- X. Camp and garrison equipage, also uniforms, arms, and equipments will be issued to the three batteries upon receipt of proper requisitions.

- I. The conditions rendering it necessary to husband the ammunition on hand having changed, paragraph X, General Orders No. 3, c. s., is hereby revoked.

Owing to the heavy drafts upon the strength of the National Guard, for active service in the United States Volunteers, it will be impossible, until the men return to their stations, to conduct rifle practice on the system enjoined in the Regulations; practice, however, should at once be resumed and until further orders will be governed by the rules established in General Orders No. 1, series

III. In order to enable the men composing the three batteries now being organized, under orders from the War Department, to become proficient as rifle shots, practice will be permitted on the rifle range connected with the State Camp Grounds in Augusta, under the following rules with such modifications as may be found necessary.

The target practice upon the range will be at such distances as the Inspector General of Rifle Practice may determine from day to day.

In all off-hand firings the rear sight will be used with the leaf turned down. Members of each squad will fire alternately, each shot being counted and recorded.

Squads will, so far as possible, practice in their original formation whenever sent to the range.

Members of a battery will not be allowed to practice in the squads of another battery.

A prize of an army revolver will be given to the Captain of the battery of which the aggregate score is greatest, reckoning an equal number of men and an equal number of shots.

To the enlisted man making the highest aggregate score during the time of practice, there will be given a Champion Gold Medal, presented by Major-General John T. Richards and Col. E. C. Farrington.

Sir-Under the act of Congress "to provide for temporarily increasing the military establishment of the United States in the time of war, and for other purposes," approved April 22, 1898, and call for 125,000 volunteers, by direction of the President, I have the honor to request you to provide from your State the quota of volunteers, as follows: One (1) Regiment of Infantry and one (1) Heavy Battery Artillery, to serve in the arms of service designated, for the period of two years, unless sooner discharged. Attached will be found a statement showing the organization for Artillery, Cavalry and Infantry.

Please cause the Adjutant General of the Army to be informed of the time your quota will be at its rendezvous, as it will be met as soon as practicable thereafter by an officer to muster it into the service and pay of the United States. The

mustering officer will be instructed to receive no man, under the rank of commissioned officer, who is in years over forty-five or under eighteen, or who is not in physical strength and vigor. As soon as mustered into the United States' service, it is the intention that troops from your State shall be assembled with others for instruction and service under the directions of the Major General Commanding the Army, at some point or points to be designated hereafter. It is desired, for reasons stated in telegrams of this date that, as far as practicable, the National Guard be given preference.

General Orders No. 31.

By direction of the Secretary of War, the following instructions governing the arming and equipping of volunteer troops called into service under the President's Proclamation of April 23, 1898, and providing for the proper accountability for the arms and equipments, are published for the information and government of all concerned:

- 1. As soon as a regiment has been mustered into the United States service, the commanding officer of the regiment shall detail a lieutenant to perform the duties of acting ordnance officer for the regiment.
- 2. As soon as a regiment or other organization has been mustered into the United States service, the governor of the State is to invoice to the ordnance officer of a regiment, or the commanding officer of an organization, all the ordnance and ordnance stores which are furnished to the regiment or organization by the State.
- 3. The acting ordnance officer of a regiment, or the commanding officer of other organizations will, immediately on receipt of this invoice, forward to the Chief of Ordnance a requisition, on blank form 22 to be furnished by the Chief of Ordnance, U.S. Army, for the ordnance and ordnance stores required to complete the armament and equipment of the regiment or organization. This requisition shall state:
 - (a) The number of men mustered into the regiment or organization.
- (b) The total of ordnance and ordnance stores required for the full armament and equipment of the regiment or organization.
 - (c) The ordnance and ordnance stores received from the governor of the State.
- (d) The difference, or the stores to be furnished to the regiment or organization by the Chief of Ordnance.
- (e) On receipt of stores from the Ordnance Department, the ordnance officer of a regiment or the commanding officer of an organization will send receipts therefor to the issuing officer.
- 4. On receipt of the ordnance and ordnance stores, both from the State and from the Chief of Ordnance, U. S. Army, the acting ordnance officer will, under the direction of the commanding officer of the regiment, turn over to each company or troop commander the stores required by each company or troop, taking receipts therefor, which receipts will be filed as vouchers with the next return to the Chief of Ordnance. Company or troop commanders are then held accountable for property turned over to them, and must make returns for such property to the Chief of Ordnance, U.S. Army, in accordance with existing law and Army Regulations. The acting ordnance officer will account to the Chief of Ordnance for the surplus stores left in his hands and for the armament and equipment of the non-commissioned staff and band.
- 5. On receipt of the stores invoiced to the ordnance officer of a regiment or to the commanding officer of an organization from the governor of the State, said officer will furnish the usual receipts to the governor of the State for property received, which receipts will be used as vouchers with the State's next property return to the Chief of Ordnance.
- 6. The Chief of Ordnance will keep an exact account of all the stores turned over to each regiment or organization by each State, as provided for herein, with a view to making provision for future settlement with the State therefor.
- 7. All necessary blanks will be furnished by the Chief of Ordnance upon application, and such application should be made at once. The forms at first needed will be sent by the Chief of Ordnance to the different regiments and organizations as soon as it is ascertained where they are located.

The organization of a volunteer battalion or regiment must conform to that of battalion of the regular army, except in the case of militia battalion or regiment entering United States volunteers as a body. Such a battalion or regiment may be mustered in under the organization prescribed for it by the State law. If State law is silent as to any particular point United States law applicable to regular army organization governs. Above in reply to your letter of May first. By order of the Secretary of War.

General Orders No. 33.

By direction of the Secretary of War, the following instructions governing the arming and equipping of volunteer troops called into service under the President's Proclamation of April 23, 1898, and providing for the proper accountability for the arms and equipments, are published in addition to those contained in General Orders No. 31, Headquarters of the Army, Adjutant General's Office, April 30, 1898, for the information and government of all concerned:

- 1. As soon as a regiment has been mustered into the United States service, the commanding officer of the regiment shall appoint a regimental quartermaster for the regiment.
- 2. As soon as a regiment or other organization has been mustered into the service of the United States, the governor of the State is requested to invoice to the quartermaster of the regiment, or of the organization, all clothing, equipage, and quartermaster's supplies which were supplied and furnished the State by the Government of the United States. Should the clothing, equipage, and quartermaster's supplies furnished to the States by the Government of the United States be insufficient for the complete equipment of the regiments or organizations, then the clothing, equipage, and quartermaster's supplies which have been supplied and furnished by the State should be utilized, as far as possible, in the equipment of the several regiments or organizations, and a separate invoice of such clothing, equipage, and quartermaster's supplies should be made by the governor to the quartermaster of the regiment or organization stating its condition.
- 3. The quartermaster of a regiment, or of other organizations, will, immediately on receipt of this invoice, forward to the Quartermaster General requisitions, on blank forms 53 and 60 to be furnished by the Quartermaster General, U. S. Army, for the clothing, equipage, and other quartermaster's supplies, required to complete the equipment of the regiment or organization. This requisition shall state:
 - (a) The number of men mustered into the regiment or organization.
- (b) The total of clothing, equipage, and other quartermaster's supplies required for the full equipment of the regiment or organization.
- (c) The clothing, equipage, and other quartermaster's supplies received from the governor of the State.
- (d) The difference, to be furnished to the regiment or organization by the Ouartermaster General.
- (e) On receipt of stores from the Quartermaster's Department, the quartermaster of a regiment or other organization will send receipts therefor to the issuing officer.
- 4. On receipt of the clothing, equipage, and other quartermaster's supplies, both from the State and from the Quartermaster General, U. S. Army, the quartermaster will, under the direction of the commanding officer of the regiment, turn over to each company or troop commander the stores required by each company or troop, taking memorandum receipts therefor as provided in A. R. 1053, but the quartermaster will continue to carry said supplies on his returns until they have been transferred or expended and duly accounted for as required by army regulations.
- 5. On receipt of the stores invoiced to the quartermaster of a regiment or of an organization from the governor of the State, said officer will furnish the usual receipts to the governor of the State for property received, which receipts will be used as vouchers with the State's next annual property return to the Quartermaster General.
- 6. The Quartermaster General will keep an account of all the stores turned over to each regiment or organization by each State, as provided for herein, with a view to making provision for future settlement with the State therefor.

7. All necessary blanks will be furnished by the Quartermaster General upon application, and such application should be made at once. The forms at first needed will be sent by the Quartermaster General to the different regiments and organizations as soon as it is ascertained where they are located.

Sir—In reply to your telegram of today, I desire to state that, as this department is limited by regulations in regard to making collections on the pay rolls and accounting for the same, it will be impossible to take the responsibility of collecting and accounting for the advance payment to soldiers by the State of Ohio. Every possible assistance, however, will be rendered to collect the amount for the State, and to this end it is suggested that when the advance payment is made, have it understood that the amount is to be deducted from the first regular payment.

The amount advance should be entered on the rolls, and can be deducted by the paymaster.

The amount thus collected must be receipted for on the rolls by some authorized person, and the purpose for which the collection was made must be stated

The Adjutant or some other officer of the regiment or command could be authorized to act for the State.

Under first call for one hundred and twenty-five thousand men it was contemplated that the number of original organizations called for should have the maximum strength stated below, but on account of additional organizations having to be accepted, this maximum had to be reduced to eighty-one enlisted men per company. The maximum above contemplated is one hundred and six enlisted men per company of infantry. One hundred per troop of cavalry, one hundred and seventy-three per light battery, two hundred per heavy battery, one thousand three hundred and twenty-six of all grades per regiment infantry, consisting of three battalions of four companies each.

Secretary of War bids me say that it is now the wish of the President to apply in accordance with the law. Under and in pursuance of the President's proclamation of May 25, 1898, calling forth volunteers to the aggregate number of 75,000 and of section 7 of an act of Congress approved April 22, 1898, which provides that no new organizations shall be accepted into the service from any State unless the organizations already in service from such State are as near to their maximum strength as the President may deem necessary, the following general rules for accomplishing the objects of said proclamation are announced by the Secretary of War for the information and guidance of all concerned.

- 1. Organizations already accepted and mustered into the United States service under the President's proclamation of April 23, 1898, will be expended: first, by recruiting such companies thereof as have been mustered in to the maximum enlisted strength prescribed in the act of Congress approved April 26, 1898, and published in General Orders No. 29, April 29, 1898, from this office; second, except for cavalry, by the organization of additional companies necessary for the completion of regiments to twelve companies, and battalions to four companies, of the maximum enlisted strength above indicated. The number of recruits required for each organization already in service will be determined by the Adjutant General of the Army, under whose direction and supervision the recruitment herein ordered will be conducted.
- 2. The following states and territories having received under the President's first call an apportionment in excess of their combined quotas under first and second calls, will not be included in this order, viz: Delaware, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, North Dakota, South Dakota, Vermont, Wyoming, District of Columbia, Arizona, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Indian Territories.
- 3. With the exceptions indicated in Paragraph 2, recruiting party consisting of one officer and four enlisted men, one of whom shall be qualified to do clerical work, will be detailed from each battalion of a regiment and from each independent battalion already in the service, by the commanding officer thereof. In like manner a recruiting party of one officer and one enlisted man will be detailed from each company now in service and not otherwise provided for herein. Each party will be ordered to proceed to the locality where the organization for which it is to recruit was raised. Instructions for recruiting officers and blank forms will be sent to the Adjutant General of the State, to whom officers in charge of recruiting parties should apply for the same, notifying him of the number of men he is to recruit. The names of the officers, their respective organizations and the points to which sent will be reported to the Adjutant General of the Army, who will give further orders and instructions that may be necessary. Each recruiting officer thus detailed will also be an acting quartermaster.
- 4. Arrangements will be made through the chief quartermaster of the department within the geographical limits of which the recruiting is being done for renting, when necessary, under emergency agreements, suitable quarters for temporary recruiting stations and the furnishing of supplies therefor. Arrangements will be made with the chief commissary of the department, as above, for the subsistence of recruiting parties and recruits. Recruits will be sent, under charge of the most reliable one of their number, to their several regiments in small squads without uniform, arms or equipment. Each commander detailing a recruiting officer under these instructions will promptly mail to the chief commissary and chief quartermaster, respectively, of the department into which the recruiting officer is sent, a copy of the order of detail with the signature of the recruiting officer inscribed upon the same.
- 5. Additional companies necessary for the completion of regiments and battalions, as herein provided for, will be organized and mustered into the United States service under the same rules that govern the organization and muster-in of the troops raised under the President's proclamation of April 23, 1898, and the necessary instructions will be promulgated later.

6. Department, corps, and regimental commanders are intrusted with the prompt and careful execution of this order. The necessary orders for transportation and subsistence will be given by department and corps commanders, the travel enjoined being necessary for the public service.

The following proclamation of the President of the United States is published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

BY THE PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES.

A PROCLAMATION.

Whereas an act of Congress was approved on the twenty-fifth day of April, 1898, entitled "An act declaring that war exists between the United States of America and the Kingdom of Spain," and

Whereas, by an act of Congress entitled "An act to provide for temporarily increasing the military establishment of the United States in time of war and for other purposes," approved April 22, 1898, the President is authorized, in order to raise a volunteer army, to issue his proclamation calling for volunteers to serve in the Army of the United States:

Now, therefore, I, William McKinley, President of the United States, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution and the laws, and deeming sufficient occasion to exist, have thought fit to call forth and hereby do call forth, volunteers to the aggregate number of 75,000 in addition to the volunteers called forth by my proclamation of the twenty-third of April, in the present year; the same to be apportioned, as far as practicable, among the several States and Terri-

tories and the District of Columbia, according to population, and to serve for two years, unless sooner discharged. The proportion of each arm and the details of enlistment and organization will be made known through the War Department.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the seal of the United States to be affixed.

Done at the City of Washington, this twenty-fifth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-eight, and of the independence of the United States the one hundred and twenty-second.

General Orders No. 97.

The following Act, approved July 8, 1898, "To reimburse the governors of states and territories for expenses incurred by them in aiding the United States to raise and organize, and supply and equip the Volunteer Army of the United States in the existing war with Spain," is published for the information and guidance of all concerned:

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, directed, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay to the governor of any state or territory, or to his duly authorized agents, the reasonable costs, charges, and expenses that have been incurred by him in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer Army in the existing war with Spain, by subsisting, clothing, supplying, equipping, paying, and transporting men of his state or territory who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States: Provided, That the transportation paid for shall be only the transportation of such men from the place of their enrollment for service in the Volunteer Army of the United States to the place of their acceptance into the same by the United States mustering officer, and that the names of the men transported shall appear on the muster rolls of the Volunteer Army of the United States: And provided further, That such claims shall be settled upon proper youchers to be filed and passed upon by the proper accounting officers of the treasury; And provided further, That, in cases where the money to pay said costs, charges, and expenses has been, or may hereafter, be borrowed by the governors of their respective states or territories and interest is paid, or may hereafter be paid, on the same, by the governors of their states or territories, from the time it was or may be so borrowed to the time of its refundment by the United States, or hereafter, such interest shall not be refunded by the United States; nor shall any interest be paid the governors of their states or territories on the amounts paid out by them, nor any other amount refunded or paid than is in this act expressly mentioned.

All claims for expenses incurred by any state or territory in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer Army in the existing war with Spain by subsisting, clothing, supplying, equipping, paying, and transporting men of such state or territory who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States, should be forwarded to the Secretary of the Treasury for audit and settlement by the accounting officers of the treasury, in accordance with the terms of the above-quoted act.

Rules for the preparation and settlement of claims under the act of July 8, 1898, for the reimbursement of Governors of States and Territories for certain war expenses.

Department Circular No. 154.

AN ACT To reimburse the governors of States and Territories for expenses incurred by them in aiding the United States to raise and organize, and supply and equip the Volunteer Army of the United States in the existing war with Spain.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby directed, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay to the governor of any State or Territory, or to his duly authorized agents, the reasonable costs, charges, and expenses that have been incurred by him in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer Army in the existing war with Spain, by subsisting, clothing, supplying, equipping, paying, and transporting men of his State or Territory who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States: Provided, That the transportation paid for shall be only the transportation of such men from the place of their enrollment for service in the Volunteer Army of the United States to the place of their acceptance into the same by the United States mustering officer, and that the names of the men transported shall appear on the muster rolls of the Volunteer Army of the United States: And provided further, That such claims shall be settled upon proper vouchers to be filed and passed upon by the proper accounting officers of the Treasury: And provided further, That in cases where the money to pay said costs, charges, and expenses has been, or may hereafter, be borrowed by the governors of their respective States or Territories, and interest is paid, or may hereafter be paid, on the same, by the governors or their States or territories, from the time it was or may be so borrowed to the time of its refundment by the United States, or thereafter, such interest shall not be refunded by the United States; nor shall any interest be paid the governors or their States or Territories on the amounts paid out by them, nor any other amount refunded or paid than is in this Act expressly mentioned.

Approved, July 8, 1898.

Rules for the preparation and settlement at the Treasury Department of all claims arising under the act of Congress approved July 8, 1898, entitled "An Act to reimburse the governors of States and Territories for expenses incurred by them in aiding the United States to raise and organize, and supply and equip the Volunteer Army of the United States in the existing war with Spain.

- 1. Accounts or claims for reimbursement, with vouchers for all expenditures made, must be forwarded or referred to the Auditor for the War Department for investigation and settlement.
- 2. Accounts or claims for reimbursement are to be settled upon proper vouchers, which are to be filed and passed upon by the proper accounting officers of the Treasury, that is to say, by the Auditor for the War Department and the Comptroller of the Treasury.
- 3. Original itemized bills must be furnished in all cases where it is practicable to do so. In cases where they are omitted, satisfactory reasons must be given for their omission. All accounts or claims for reimbursement must be properly stated and certified to on vouchers. The vouchers given by the creditors of the States and Territories, with their receipts for the amounts actually paid them, must accompany the claims for reimbursement as evidence of the payment of said creditors and in support of said accounts or claims. No payment will be made directly to a creditor of a State or Territory.
- 4. The certificate in support of every account, voucher, or claim for reimbursement must be made in the following form, prescribed by the Comptroller of the Treasury, as required by law, and must be signed by the Governor who incurred and paid the costs, charges, and expenses for which reimbursement is sought:

I hereby certify that the above account is correct and just; that the services were rendered and the articles furnished as stated; that the costs, charges, and expenses therefor are reasonable and have been incurred and paid by me in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer Army in the war with Spain, either by subsisting, clothing, supplying, equipping, paying, or transporting men of this State or Territory who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States; that in all cases where reimbursement or payment is sought from the United States for the transportation of men, such reimbursement or payment is only for their transportation from the place of their enrollment for service in said Army to the place of their acceptance into the same by the United States mustering officer, and that no part of the above-mentioned costs, charges, and expenses is for interest on the same or any part thereof or on any money borrowed or used to pay the same or any part thereof.

- 5. The amount and quality of the evidence required in support of all claims arising under the act must depend upon the circumstances of each particular case.
- 6. The transportation to be reimbursed as reasonable costs, charges, and expenses that have been incurred and paid by the governor of any State or Territory in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer Army in the war with Spain, is only the transportation of men of his State or Territory who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States, from the place of their enrollment for service in said Army to the place of their acceptance into the same by the United States mustering officer. The names of the men transported must appear on the muster rolls of the Volunteer Army of the United States.
- 7. No reimbursements can be made for any costs, charges, or expenses that have been incurred and paid by the governor of any State or Territory on account of men who were not afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States.
- s. No reimbursements can be made for the cost of any transportation of men who were afterwards accepted into the Volunteer Army of the United States, that has been incurred and paid by the governor of any State of Territory, unless

such transportation was from the place of their enrollment for service in said Army to the place of their acceptance into the same by the United States mustering officer.

- 9. No interest can be refunded by the United States in cases where the money to pay the reasonable costs, charges, and expenses that have been incurred and paid by the governor of any State or Territory in aiding the United States to raise the Volunteer Army in the war with Spain, in any of the ways mentioned in the act, has been or may hereafter be borrowed by the governor or his State or Territory from the time it was or may be so borrowed to the time of its refundment by the United States, or thereafter. Nor can any interest be paid any governor or his State or Territory on any amount paid out by him.
- 10. The rules and regulations prepared by the Secretary of the Treasury for the settlement of claims under the act of July 27, 1861, may be taken as a guide so far as the same shall appear to be applicable in the settlement of claims under the act of July 8, 1898.
- 11. All payments are to be made out of the special indefinite appropriation entitled "Reimbursement to States and Territories for expenses in raising troops for war with Spain."

AN ACT To indemnify the States for expenses incurred by them in defense of the United States.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That the Secretary of the Treasury be, and he is hereby, directed, out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay to the Governor of any State, or to his duly authorized agents, the costs, charges, and expenses properly incurred by such State for enrolling, subsisting, clothing, supplying, arming, equipping, paying, and transporting its troops employed in aiding to suppress the present insurrection against the United States, to be settled upon proper vouchers, to be filed and passed upon by the proper accounting officers of the Treasury.

Approved July 27, 1861.

Rules for the preparation and settlement at the Treasury Department, under acts of Congress approved July 17, 1861, and July 27, 1861, of claims for reimbursement of expenses properly incurred by the States, respectively, on account of their troops employed in aiding to suppress the present insurrection against the United States.

- I. Accounts with vouchers for all expenditures made, must be presented to the Secretary of the Treasury, by whom they will be referred to the proper accounting officers for investigation and settlement.
- II. It is only for expenditures on account of troops, officers, or men that have been or may be mustered and received into, or actually employed in, the service of the United States, that reimbursements will be made. Organizations raised, or attempted to be raised, but not mustered and received into, nor actually employed in, the service, will not be recognized. Nor will any reimbursement be made by the United States of expenses incurred in organizing, equipping, and maintaining troops for State purposes, or home guard, whether called out by State or other local authority, unless such troops were called out and such expenditures incurred at the request or under the authority of the President or the Secretary of War.
- III. Personal expenses of commissioned officers in recruiting their companies prior to their being mustered into service will not be allowed; but commissioned officers may be allowed the same rates for subsistence and quarters (board and lodging) as privates, from the date of enrollment until mustered into service.

The necessary and actual traveling expenses of recognized military agents of the State, when accompanied by bills of particulars and receipts for payments, will be refunded.

IV. Bills of particulars with dates, and rate of charge, and the receipt of the party to whom payment was made, must, in all cases, be furnished. It is not sufficient to show that a gross amount was expended; still less that sums were turned over to individuals to expend, without evidence showing that they were expended by them, and how they were expended. In short, original vouchers for expenditures of every description must be furnished. The expenditures should be classified, and separate abstracts, with the vouchers presented for pay, subsistence, clothing, transportation, arms, and equipments, and other expenses; and they should also designate, as far as practicable, the particular regiment or corps on account of which the expenditure was incurred. Claims for pay of troops must be accompanied with complete pay rolls for each corps, properly certified and receipted, the same as are required in the regular service.

V. Where subsistence in kind could not be furnished, and expenses were incurred for "board," or "board and lodging," the rates will depend on the section of country where furnished, and the price paid for complete rations at the nearest recruiting station or military post; and in no case will a higher rate be allowed than the amount actually paid. The bills must specify the regiment or company to which the troops so subsisted or quartered belonged, and that rations could not be procured. Bills for lodging will be restricted to cases where there were no tents, and quarters could not be otherwise obtained. Purchases of subsistence in bulk will be paid for at not exceeding the current prices at the place of purchase, provided that the quantities are in proper proportions, or reasonably so, to the number of men according to the rates of allowance in the Subsistence Department. The articles of subsistence must be such only as are recognized in the regular service, or, if other articles are substituted, the cost of the whole must not exceed the regular supplies. Bills for spirituous liquors, treating, expenses of holding elections for officers, will not be recognized or paid.

VI. Transportation and quarters for troops at reasonable rates will be paid for. Transportation is restricted to the usual routes and modes of conveyance, and excessive quantities will not be recognized. Wagon hire for the transportation of the men themselves will not be sanctioned. Charges for transportation by railroad or other public conveyance must be accompanied by bills of lading in cases of property or supplies; and for troops, the number of men, with the regiment or corps, must be distinctly set forth; and where the same has been done in pursuance of a contract, the contract must accompany the vouchers. The same provisions apply to transportation by vessel.

VII. Claims growing out of impressment of property or services, and for damages done to individuals or their property, are not authorized to be paid. Provision for such claims must be made by special act of Congress, when not already provided for by general laws.

VIII. Bounties or donations to men or their families to induce men to volunteer will not be recognized. Such bounties as may be authorized by law will be paid by the United States directly to the men authorized to receive them. Voluntary contributions, either by States or local corporations, or by individuals, in aid of families of volunteers, etc., constitute no charge against the United States, and will not be refunded.

IX. Each State must present its full and final accounts for reimbursement, under the acts providing therefor, up to the date of the passage of said acts. The proper authorities of the State should certify, over their official seals, that the respective amounts claimed to be refunded have been actually paid by said State, and that no part thereof has been paid by any disbursing officer of the United States.

Sir: The troops from your state, coming into the service of the United States, brought with them certain tentage, a part of which is believed to have been property of the State, and a part to have been property of the United States,

drawn by the State from the United States under an Act of Congress, entitled "An Act to amend Section 1661 of the Revised Statutes, making annual appropriation to provide arms and equipment for the militia," received by the President February 1, 1887, and acts amendatory thereof.

It is suggested that there be restored to your State by the United States a quantity of tentage equal to that furnished by the State, whether from the property of the State drawn by the State from the United States as hereinbefore mentioned, when the troops were mustered into the United States service.

This would conclude at once a settlement between your State and the United States on this account; your State withdrawing all claims for tentage receipted for on behalf of the United States.

It is further suggested that should the State desire an additional quantity of tentage in order to properly equip its militia, that the general government sell to the State such additional tentage, at an appraised value, payment for the same to be made in cash or charged against the allotment to the State for the equipment of its militia.

Your views upon this matter are respectfully requested at an early date.

As to the ordnance issued to the State by the Government prior to the date of the act reserving the ownership of property by the Government, as no money was paid out by the State, no original receipts will be required, but evidence should be furnished to show the value of the property at the time of its being turned over to the United States. The best evidence in such case would be the report of the Regimental Board of Survey, if such a board were appointed to appraise the value of the State property turned over.
