REPORT OF INSPECTOR-GENERAL.

Lewiston, December 15th, 1899.

Major-General John T. Richards, Adjutant-General, Augusta, Maine.

Sir:—In accordance with Article XX, Militia Law of the State of Maine, I have the honor to submit my annual report for the official year ending December 15th, 1899.

As a result of the Spanish War, Maine was called upon to furnish for the Volunteer Army of the United States one regiment of Infantry and four batteries of Heavy Artillery. The 1st Regiment under the command of Colonel L. H. Kendall was stationed at Camp George H. Thomas, Chickamauga Park, Georgia, where it remained until ordered back to Maine. The four batteries of Heavy Artillery under the command of Major E. E. Newcomb were recruited almost entirely from the 2d Regiment and reported for duty at Savannah, Georgia. They were afterwards ordered to report to Major-General Fitzhugh Lee of Havana. The few officers and men who did not volunteer, were given leaves of absence and furloughs until May 1st, 1899, as was the case with all officers and enlisted men of the National Guard who volunteered to serve in organizations from this State.

The government accepted the services of the Maine Signal Corps under Captain Butler and at Santiago they did themselves and the State great credit and received the personal thanks of General Greeley.

INSPECTION.

In accordance with General Orders No. 5, I commenced my official inspection in July and visited the companies of the Eastern Battalion.

Company L, 2d Inf. of Houlton.

Inspection July 19th, 1899.

Present: Officers 3,

Present: Enlisted men 23.

Equipments in good condition. Campaign hats in fair condition. Blouses and trousers old and badly worn. Overcoats and caps good. Blankets good.

This company was furloughed from May, 1898, until May, 1899. There was no drilling for that period and consequently it was in rather a poor condition. It is now getting into shape and will soon be in its old form, and at the next annual encampment will be in good shape. This company being located at the home of the Commander-in-Chief, the citizens take a natural pride in maintaining it.

Company K, 2d Inf. of Calais.

Inspection July 21st, 1899.

The condition of this company I found very unsatisfactory, there had been no attempt to do anything with the company since its return from Augusta in 1898. The citizens had withdrawn their moral support and I could not find anyone who would take the responsibility to recruit it up to the standard. There seems only one thing to do and that is to place the company elsewhere.

Company I, 2d Inf. of Eastport. Inspection July 24th, 1899.

This company keeps up the reputation it established years ago when known as the Frontier Guards.

Present: Officers 2.

Present: Enlisted men 26.

The ceremony of inspection well performed. Condition of arms good. Equipments good. Blouses and trousers poor. Blankets and overcoats good. Leggins good. Hats fair. This company as formerly is one of the best in the Second Regiment and can be depended on. Military courtesy and good discipline all that could be expected.

Company M, 2d Inf. of Machias.

Inspection July 25th, 1899.

Present: Officers 3,

Present: Enlisted men 17.

Condition of all military property in this company good. Practically new like the other companies which were furloughed.

It had done no drilling and as would be expected had lost its interest somewhat but is recruiting and will be back to its old form in 1900.

Company F, 2d Inf. of Dover.

Inspection August 28th, 1899.

This was my second visit at Dover.

Present: Officers 2,

Present: Enlisted men 15.

This company is in the hands of a man unfit to hold a commission in the National Guard. Captain Brown could not or would not get the company into shape and it may be advisable to place it elsewhere.

Company D, 1st Inf. of Norway. Inspection November 14th, 1899.

Captain Nash has recruited the company, made his requisitions and has his company fully armed and equipped, has a fine looking lot of men, and with a little more drilling will be in fine condition. This is the first company I have visited in the First Regiment, and the only one I can report on before December 1st, 1899.

Owing to the conditions that have existed the past year I shall make no minute criticisms on the companies so far inspected.

The delay of the captains in recruiting the companies and making the necessary requisitions for arms, equipments and uniforms, etc., has delayed any further reports for 1899.

BRIGADE FORMATION.

Like my predecessors I am desirous of seeing our National Guard under Brigade Organization as it implies some knowledge that the citizen soldier is in need of and which could not be obtained in any other way, as well as the practical work which the administration of a brigade implies. This would necessitate a larger appropriation and if the Committee on Military Affairs would call the officers of the National Guard, or as many of them as they think best, before them at the next meeting of the Legislature, I think it could be made plain to the committee that we were not asking for anything unreasonable.

I have visited Companies D, E, L, B and A of the First Regiment and am well pleased with the interest manifest. The captains are securing many of their old men, and the class of

recruits, thanks to the regulations in force, are a good, clean looking lot of young men and will make good soldiers.

The experience of the officers and men who were in the volunteer service will be of great benefit to them personally and to the State in the future development of the Guard.

ARMORIES.

We are in need of better armories in many of the towns and I wish it were possible to have State armories and the cities and towns where companies are located should pay to the State a low rate of interest on the cost of the armories, the towns to do the heating and lighting.

The Lewiston armory is not what it should be for four companies, the drill hall would do very well, but the company's rooms are too small. Two of the companies have only one small room each, which necessitates the officers and men using the same room. This is one of the cases where the commander-in-chief would be justified in withholding the armory rent from the city until it complies with the law.

I feel much encouraged for the future prospects of the National Guard, and think that, at our annual encampment in 1900, we shall have two as fine regiments as could be asked for. The officers and men are well pleased with the quality of the uniforms and equipments which are being furnished them. They realize that the State is spending quite a sum of money and they wish to render the best service in their power in return.

In conclusion I wish to thank you, General, and through you His Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief, for your many courtesies and kindly indulgence. I wish also to thank Colonels Kendall and Newcomb for their many courtesies. I am, Sir,

REPORT OF SURGEON-GENERAL.

SACO, MAINE, Dec. 15th, 1899.

Major-General John T. Richards, Adjutant-General, Augusta, Maine:

Sir: I have the honor to present my report as Surgeon-General of Maine for the year ending December 15th, 1899, in accordance with the law governing the Militia of Maine.

The duties of this department for the year just passed have been fewer than in previous years, though whatever demands have been made we have endeavored to meet with a willingness, and to conduct them in as methodical and systematic a manner as possible.

Captain Robert J. Martin, Assistant Surgeon of the 2nd Infantry, whose term expired November 8th, 1899, declined a re-appointment. This is a source of regret to the medical department who fully appreciate the valuable services rendered by Capt. Martin in the past, and sincerely wish that he might have remained. With this single exception the personnel of the medical staff has not been changed during the year. It is a source of pride that we are able to have in the medical department men who always enter into the work assigned them with an earnestness and alacrity commensurate with the duties involved.

Under orders from the Adjutant-General, and in co-operation with him and the surgeons of the two regiments, whose valuable knowledge and information were of great aid, a new enlistment and examination blank has been provided which will be a valuable addition, and while simple and concise, is yet specific and sufficiently voluminous for all practical purposes.

It is very gratifying to those who have had the matter in charge that there has been no outbreak of typhoid fever in

Augusta and vicinity as a result of the many cases brought there from Chickamauga, and it again proves the efficacy of thorough work and painstaking care in closing all avenues of possible contagion at that time, and the destruction by fire of the sinks at the camp in Augusta, will be the final act in completing all the conditions in as thorough a manner as modern science can devise. Previous to the return of the soldiers from the infected camp at Chickamauga there were no cases at the State Camp Ground. The fact that it was imported cannot be denied, and great care was exercised by the medical officers in charge of the camp in closing every avenue whereby the infection might be spread. This action received the approval of the local as well as the State Board of Health.

It is sincerely hoped by this department that more land may be purchased in the rear of the sinks in order that the new ones may be located as far as possible from the mess. This appears quite essential, not only from an esthetic point of view, but from a sanitary standpoint as well.

There are practically no medical or surgical supplies on hand, but acting under orders from the Adjutant-General, and after consultation with the surgeons of the respective regiments, I am making a list of non-perishable medical supplies to have packed, marked and stored ready for immediate use and shipment in case, for any cause whatever, there should be an unexpected mobilization of the Guard, and another list of perishable goods to be made out and kept in readiness that can be filled at any time. This is certainly a wise move, for in so doing there can be less liability of forgetting important articles than there would be if the list was made out after a sudden call to arms. In addition the medical and surgical chests are to be replenished at once for our use.

TABLE O.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR-GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

To the Adjutant-General of the State of Maine:

Sir: I have the honor to submit my report of rifle practice, in the National Guard of the State of Maine, as is required by the statute, together with such recommendations as is deemed proper at this time.

It will be remembered that the Spanish American War occupied the active attention of your department during the year 1898; the preparing and sending of a large portion of the National Guard into the service of the government, produced such disorganization of the forces remaining, that no practice was done that year excepting instruction upon the State range to several batteries, prior to their departure.

On the return and mustering out of the troops from the service of the government, so much time was required to recruit the companies to their compliments, that there could be but little active range practice in 1898. In anticipation of the return to duty of the Guard, I commenced early in 1899 to ascertain in what condition the company ranges were, and endeavoured to have them put in repair so that as much rifle practice as possible could be had the past season. Many of the efficers most active in this respect, were commissioned in the regular army, and others chosen to fill their places, all of which led to the delay in getting the National Guard ready for work upon the range.

Nearly all the company ranges were repaired and in some cases rebuilt. The companies now without rifle ranges are companies D and H of the First Infantry, and companies A and M of the Second Infantry. Companies A and M will have to have new ranges, the others repaired.

The only companies which made any return of rifle practice during the season were A, B and M of the First Infantry, and A and I, of the Second Infantry. The only companies which applied for qualification practice, under the regulations, were companies B of the First and L of the Second Infantry. These companies had their practice the last days of October, and their scores and qualifications are hereto appended.

AMMUNITION.

Acting under Orders of June 23d from your office, appointing Colonel E. C. Farrington. Major W. O. Peterson and Captain W. A. Faul, a board to test the smokeless powder manufactured for use in the U. S. Springfield rifle, the board convened at the State Rifle Range at Augusta, Saturday, July first, and in the presence of yourself, and General W. S. Choate, tested the smokeless powder manufactured and furnished by the Laflin & Rand Powder Co. of New York. The report of the board was made to you under date of July 6, 1899. As stated in the report, we found the powder satisfactory and well fitted for use in the Springfield rifle. We did not advise its use the past season, for the reason that the State had sufficient ammunition for the Guard on hand, consisting of cartridges and unfixed ammunition. We did anticipate the use of it in 1000, but inasmuch as the expenditure of ammunition on hand the past season was small, I would advise that the Guard continue to use the ammunition which the State is now provided with,

QUALIFICATION OF MARKSMEN.

Under the new regulations now in use by the National Guard of this State, the practice upon the rifle ranges is only a preliminary practice; the qualification practice being under different conditions as to scores made, and under the supervision of some commissioned officer, other than that of the organization practicing for qualification.

As provided by the regulations and under Special Orders, the officers designated met at the armory in Portland, on the first day of August and agreed upon and submitted certain rules and regulations to govern in the qualification of marksmen, which were made authoritative by your orders.

There were two companies who availed themselves of the right of qualification and had their practice in accordance with regulations and under the rules adopted. I think that the practice was satisfactory and that the same rules should govern the qualifications for 1900.

I desire to call your attention to the inconsistency regarding requirements for practice in Paragraphs 256 and 261, and recommend changes therein. Paragraph 256 provides that where 500 or 600 yard ranges cannot be had, a 300 yard range may be used instead. It also provides that where a man has made with the rifle two scores of 23 at 500 (300) yards, he may practice at 600 (300) yards. Paragraph 261 provides that when a man has made two scores of 23 at 500 (300) yards, and two scores of 22 at 600 (300) yards, etc. I would advise that in Paragraph 261 the "23" at 500 yards be changed to 22 and in Paragraph 261 the "23" at 500 yards be changed to 22, and the "22" at 600 yards be changed to 23.

The Guard today is deficient in rifle practice. It is true there are a few good riflemen, but the greater part of the Guard are extremely lacking in the knowledge of rifle shooting. Guard today is mostly new men who have had but little rifle practice, and they need careful training and a good deal of practice. With well directed effort one season will make the Guard as a whole, a very efficient body of marksmen. While rifle shooting with effect is not hard to acquire it has to be acquired by practice, and in no other way can marksmen be made. amount of theoretical instruction is absolutely necessary, and lessons the time required to become good shots, but practice and practice alone is the only method which will make marksmen of any usefulness. Instruction in the armories during the winter months, and an active and energetic season of practice during the spring and summer will change the Guard from a body of soldiers largely without experience in rifle shooting to a body of efficient riflemen.

I wish to call your attention, and with pride, to the qualification of the officers taken from the National Guard of Maine, now in the United States Service, as sharpshooters and superior instructors of rifle practice, such officers as Captain W. A. Paul, Captain I. H. Baker, and Captain Henry G. Crockett. Their services must be of great value to the commands to which they belong.

STATE RIFLE TEAM.

I wish to urge the formation of a State team, with a view of competing in the Interstate and State National matches, which annually occur at Sea Girt, New Jersey, early in September, each year. In the year 1804, Maine sent a team there, and although it entered the contests under disadvantages not easily overcome, nevertheless it won individual and team honors the State might well be proud of. The matches were in no sense, or rather in a limited sense, military matches. The attention of the management was sharply called to the fact that if the conditions then existing continued to prevail, the interest in military rifle matches would be injured and the National meetings cease to be patronized by state rifle teams. The result has been as expected. It is with much satisfaction that a decided change has been brought about by General Bird Spencer, the able executive officer of the association, so that the competitions this year were military matches, and will be so in the future. It is strongly urged now, that Maine may commence early the formation of a team to represent the State in the next fall competitions.

CONCLUSION.

While I regret my inability to report any better condition of affairs as regards efficiency in rifle practice in our Guard, the work done this season will greatly aid in securing satisfactory results the coming year. Everything has been done by the Commander-in-Chief, Governor Powers, and Adjutant-General Richards, as well as the Colonels commanding, Colonel L. H. Kendall and Colonel E. E. Newcomb, to give all assistance possible to improve the Guard in marksmanship, and circumstances over which there was no control has prevented any better success. For the assistance rendered by the officers referred to, I wish to express my sincere appreciation.

RULES GOVERNING QUALIFICATION FOR SMALL ARMS PRACTICE.

The following rules are laid down to govern practice for qualification for the different classes of marksmanship in the National Guard of Maine, for the year 1899.

The period for qualification practice is the months of September and October.

The commander of each company shall have charge of all company qualifications, laid down in the "Regulations for Small Arms Practice."

He shall make return to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, and to the Regimental Inspector of Rifle Practice, upon blanks provided for that purpose, and shall certify that the qualifications were made as provided in the regulations and the rules herein laid down.

The qualification practice of any officer of the Guard not enrolled in company organization, having received permission to practice as provided in Paragraph 262 of the Regulations, shall be as may be prescribed by the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

When any company commander selects a day or days within the period determined upon by the officers mentioned in Paragraph 258, of the Regulations for the National Guard, for practice, the Colonel commanding the regiment in which the company is, shall detail a non-commissioned officer from some other company conveniently near, to supervise the marking during the qualification practice.

The officer before commencing such company practice, shall see that the targets, danger flags, marking disks, etc., are in order and that a danger flag is displayed at the target pit and at the firing point.

He shall see that the non-commissioned officer detailed by the Colonel to supervise the marking takes his place in the pit with the markers, and that he is provided with score cards with the names of those who are to practice for qualification, and in the order of their firing, and that he is instructed to observe the hits of all shots and see that the markers give the proper signal showing the value of the shot, being particular that the centre of the marking disk is put as near as it can conveniently be, over the bullet hole in the target.

The supervisor shall enter the value of each and every hit against the name of the one firing, as appears on his score card.

The officer in charge shall detail two of his company to act as markers during the practice, and make such changes from time to time as he thinks proper.

He shall also detail a member of his company to act as scorer, and make such changes in scorers as he deems advisable, provided no change is made which can be avoided, until those whose names are upon the score card have finished their firings.

No sighting shots will be allowed at any of the ranges.

When the commanding officer is ready to commence practice, he shall have the danger flag at the target removed, place at the firing two competitors, who shall fire alternately, the odd number of the pair being on the right and firing first. This order of firing must be adhered to, unless prevented by some accident, and in case any change is made the supervisor of marking must be so informed and his score card changed accordingly.

The supervisor and markers must not expose themselves at the pit, until they turn the target down and expose the danger flag.

The supervisor in deciding doubtful hits will give careful attention as to whether the edge of the bulls eye or lines are touched by the bullet, and if so the shot shall be counted as having hit the bulls eye or lines, and give it the larger score accordingly.

After a shot has been scored, there can be no change made in the score, unless the officer in charge has good reason to know that an error has been made in marking, and if such change is made, the supervisor must be notified and his score changed accordingly.

If it is evident to the officer in charge or to the supervisor that a hit was made from a bullet which had struck the ground before hitting the target, it must be scored a "miss." The scorer shall sit close to and at one side of the firing point and shall closely observe the marker's signals; call the score and the name of the competitor making it, and then enter it upon his score card.

No two competitors shall shoot the same rifle, nor shall a rifle be changed after a score has been commenced, unless the rifle has been disabled by accident.

The cleaning of rifles not allowed, except between ranges, which may then be done if desired.

Officers and men shall wear their prescribed fatigue uniform and belt, and a campaign hat, as permitted by General Orders No. 10, Paragraph III, c. s.

If the practice is over more than one range, the shortest will be used first and the longest last.

No coaching is to be allowed, nor shall the officer in charge allow any person other than himself, the scorer and the two competitors nearer than ten yards of the firing point, nor shall any one be permitted to interfere in any way with the competitors or give advice as to anything pertaining to the shooting, nor disturb the competitors by loud talk, while the men are at the firing point.

Whenever the day is selected, the competition must then take place, unless prevented by rain sufficient to make marking impracticable, but the officer may delay firings until the rain ceases, but for no other reason shall the practice be delayed.

If for any cause the target is removed just as the firer makes a shot, he shall be given another shot, but no claim as to poor cartridges or any other reason be considered for giving another shot when one has been made.

Only one practice for qualification for each member of a company will be allowed during the season, but if all the members of a company who are entitled to such practice in the two days mentioned in the "Regulations," have not had an opportunity to do so, the commander of any company may notify the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice of the fact, and he shall submit the matter of further practice to the Commander-in-Chief, and be governed by his direction.

The score cards of the scorer and supervisor shall be preserved, those of the supervisor to be sent to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice immediately after the completion of the practice, and those of the scorer placed on file by the officer in charge.

The officer in charge may test the pull of any rifle, and it shall be his duty to do so if asked to, or if he has reason to think that it is below six pounds, and he shall not allow any soldier to use any rifle the pull of which is less than six pounds.

Any rule laid down in Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations, governing rifle practice not herein specified, will govern in any case which is not covered by these rules.

The Signal Corps will be governed by the same rules as are herein laid down for company organizations.

SPECIAL REPORTS.

Augusta, July 6, 1899.

To General John T. Richards, Adjutant-General of Maine:

Sir: Agreeable to General Orders No. 6, June 23, 1899, appointing Colonel E. C. Farrington, Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, Major Wm. O. Peterson, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., and Captain Wm. A. Paul, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., as a board to test the smokeless powder referred to in the order "with a view of deciding upon its adaptability to the use of the National Guard in the Springfield rifle, calibre 45, as issued by the United States," the board was convened at Augusta, Saturady, July 1st, and was accompanied to the rifle range by General John T. Richards and General W. S. Choate, former Inspector-General, and who is an expert rifleman, he being invited to be present.

Tests were made at 200 and 500 yards, with the latest pattern of U. S. Springfield rifle.

The day was bright with about a four mile wind from the southwest which increased to a ten mile wind with flaws and changes in direction. The board used twenty cartridges loaded by the Laflin & Rand Powder Co., New York City, with twenty-two grains of powder; also twenty cartridges, loaded by the board with powder made by that company, five each loaded with twenty-two, twenty, eighteen and sixteen grains, respectively, and with the 500 grain bullet. The powder in all the shells was put in loose, seating the bullets in the usual manner.

The first firings were taken at 200 yards, five shots being fired from a rest by each member of the board, and then by General John T. Richards, Adjutant-General, and General W. S. Choate.

The elevation was placed at 200 yards, sighting through the peep sight. The result was very nearly the same in all cases.

The aim was as nearly as could be at the bottom of the bulls eye. The hits were in all tests with the cartridges loaded with twenty-two grains, above the bulls eye, either a close three, but mostly a close four, except three which were in the bulls eye. This was without doubt owing to the difference in holding. There was no apparent difference between those loaded by the company and by the board. Very little difference was observed between those loaded with twenty and twenty-two grains. Those loaded with eighteen grains came nearer the center, and with that elevation appeared best suited for 200 yard shooting. There was no attempt made to make high scores, the object being to see if the shooting was uniform.

At 500 yards the elevation was placed at 450, which was found to be about right. The conditions of light and wind were bad for accurate firing, although there was no difficulty in placing the hits upon the target, and determining that the shooting was uniform. The target used was the elliptical as used by the government.

The rifle was not cleaned until after the firings at 200 yards when it was partially cleaned. An examination of the barrel before cleaning indicated that there was not much fouling, it looked quite bright, much more so than when black powder was used.

The recoil when using the twenty-two grain cartridges, appeared about the same as when using the government carbine cartridges; not enough to prevent a recruit from doing successful work.

After the firings were completed, the rifle was taken to the office and an attempt made to clean it. There was found a fine coating, fouling the grooves, which was with difficulty removed. The barrel was considerably leaded. While this may not greatly affect the accuracy, it will without doubt require more care to keep the rifle clean and the barrel in serviceable condition.

No attempt was made to determine the trajectory, as compared with the black powder ammunition, for there was not time or the conveniences for that purpose. The apparent time of flight of the bullet at each range indicated that there could be but little difference between this and that of black powder.

There was but trifling smoke, not enough to attract attention at any considerable distance; in fact it may be regarded as smokeless. We therefore conclude that the powder is well adapted for use in the U. S. Springfield rifle. The tests gave satisfaction and we have no hesitancy in saying that it is far preferable to black powder for the use of the Guard for active service.

It must be understood that for the recruit to learn to shoot with the rifle, any powder giving uniform results is sufficient. The main hinderance to good work by the new beginner, is the recoil which attends the use of the seventy grain, five hundred grain bullet. The method heretofore adopted in this State, the loading by companies of shells with sixty grains of black powder removes the difficulty in this direction. The further fact that your department has on hand 59,000 rounds of rifle ammunition, 31,000 carbine cartridges and 99,000 bullets compels the board not to advise any change for the present season.

Board of Inquiry.

Sir: I have the honor to report that I proceeded to Calais on Tuesday morning for the purpose of interviewing Mayor Tarbox, as you requested.

Upon my arrival Captain McCullough informed me that in order to see the Mayor, I would have to drive to Red Beach just nine miles down river, which I did, the Captain accompanying me.

After a two hours' talk in which I explained your purpose and intention in National Guard matters, also my own, the Mayor was pleased to say that I might quote him as willing to do anything for Company K that was reasonable and just, provided however, that the company was put in proper shape and took interest enough to use the armory for military purposes.

I talked with a number of citizens prominent in the affairs of the city, a majority of whom are in favor of having the company continue, while a few were indifferent.

Captain McCullough and Lieutenant Trimble desire to retire from the service and will resign. Lieutenant Adams is anxious to take the company and puil it together, it will depend upon whether he can secure permanent employment or not, of which he will advise me the first of next week. All the men who were in the Volunteers from Calais are anxious to take on if Adams recruits the company.

I am hoping for a favorable report from him. I will give you more of the details when I formally report.

Sir: I have visited Dover and Bangor and am sorry to say that I have found things in F and G rather unsatisfactory, or we should consider them so under any other circumstances.

Captain Brown did not get my notice, consequently there was no company present for inspection. They have been drilling a little. I had a talk with the Lieutenants and they informed me that the prospects were good for recruiting the company up to its full quota.

Captain Brown was out of town.

G Company is practically in command of Lieutenant Brett. Captain Boardman is away and takes no interest whatever in the company. He received my notice, but neglected to notify Lieutenant Brett, consequently no men were present.

I would recommend that Captain Boardman's resignation be accepted and an election ordered at once for captain, first Lieutenant, and second Lieutenant. Lieutenant Brett will probably be elected captain, and I think will make a good officer.

Captain Boardman has not been in the armory since August '98. Companies F and G both have a lot of dead wood on their

rolls, I have advised them to forward you a list of all men whom they wish to get rid of and have them discharged by general orders.

Lieutenant Brett has not received any general orders and did not know anything about recruiting his company, but seems anxious and willing to do all in his power to build up the company.

I have notified each company that I would inspect them the last of the month, and will base my official report on the conditions as I find them at that time. You can consider this as a matter of information rather than a report. I will forward the numbers of the twenty-six rifles in a few days. I am

My Dear General: I am home from my Eastern trip, found things in very good shape with one exception. Company L of Houlton is prosperous. Captain Smith says he will soon have his company with a full complement of men ready for any emergency.

Company I of Eastport is in the best shape of any one of the Eastern Battalion. Captain Hume is a fine officer and the administration of his company is excellent.

Company M of Machias will be all right after they have an election. Captain Bowker is bound to get out and has noticeably lost his interest. His property is in good shape and all in the armory with the exception of a few pieces which he says he knows where they are and will have them in. He had but a few men out to Inspection but had reasonable excuse for many and has ten men enlisted who have not been examined and mustered. That company will be all right in a short time.

All we have in Calais is State property. Captain McCullough has not the time, so he claims, to look after it, but, from what I could learn the company has got away from him completely. Lieutenant Adams has left the State and there is no one that I

could find to take hold and build up the company. I do not know what Colonel Newcomb has in mind. It would seem to me that some other town should be given the company unless someone knows a remedy which I could not discover.

With the exception of K Company, I found things in as good condition as we could reasonably expect, after the conditions as they have been for the last year.

I expect to see you in a short time as I wish to consult with you in regard to a few matters in connection with the service.

Sir: I respectfully indite to you this semi-official letter, at the request of my commanding officer, 2nd Lieut. Howard Brett, (at present ill of the fever, but rapidly recovering, without doubt, in three or four weeks, he will again be able to take command). Last week if I mistake not, a communication was sent to your office direct, relating to company affairs, of which, neither Lieut. Brett nor myself were cognizant, and fearing that it might perhaps convey to you a state of affairs, which in reality does not exist, to explain matters I send thus. We, of course, unhappily, are at present minus a commissioned officer, but are still holding drills, with more or less success; it is not so easy for non-com's

to get a body of men together, as for a commissioned officer, but wishing to correct, what I feared might be the impression that there was no one to drill us, I so respectfully write.

Special Orders No. 6 (Reg'tl) stated that Capt. & Surg. R. J. Martin would confer with Lieut. Brett as to dates for an examination of recruits, but no word has as yet been received, although request was made to Capt. Martin as late as last month. We are dropping out gradually the non-attendants and of course must fill their places, and above all we are anxious to have an election of officers, and get our company on a business footing, which owing to our present handicapped circumstances it is very hard to do.

We have at present on the rolls 37 men, of whom four recommendations for discharge have been made leaving 33 who are good men, and we are pretty sure of enough or nearly enough to make our complement at the next examination.

Referring to another matter, we have a man who claims to have been enlisted last year under Capt. Boardman, but of whom no record can be found here. If such a man (the name is Ware) is on the register from this company, it would oblige me could I get his personal record for the company's register. I remain, Sir,

A careful reading of this bill is suggested and it is hoped that its provisions, so far as they are approved, by the War Department, may receive its support in Congress.

WAR DEPARTMENT, ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S OFFICE.

The Adjutant-General, State of Maine, Augusta:

Sir: It is the desire of the War Department to obtain all possible information as to the condition of the militia of the several States when hostilities were declared with Spain, and also at the present time. As practically all officers of the Army were relieved from duty with the militia of States on the declaration of war, and as none have been returned to that duty at this date, it is respectfully requested that you furnish this office, as soon as practicable, with the necessary data for compiling as complete a report as possible under the circumstances.

In order to insure uniformity, it is desired that information be given in the order of questions propounded, concisely, but sufficiently full to embrace all data, each heading and subheading to be written out in full before the information required under them.

At the close, it is respectfully requested that you add such recommendations and remarks touching subjects not mentioned as may be deemed advisable by you.

Please enclose copy of code of State laws relative to organization, equipment, etc. If under revision, please enclose copy of proposed law.

STATUS ON APRIL 20, 1898.

- I. Official designation of State troops.
- 2. Strength: (a) Authorized. (b) Organized. (c) Per cent attending camp. (If any encampment since annual report of 1897.) (d) Liable to military duty (latest estimate).

The authorized strength should be the numerical strength that the militia would have if every person authorized by law were commissioned or enlisted. In giving the organized strength, state the numerical strength of each arm of the service; also the numerical strength of staff corps, Hospital Corps, Signal Corps, etc. The following, not properly forming a part of the effective military strength of State forces, should not be included, viz: Naval reserves, aids-de-camp to the Governor, cadet organizations composed of boys; nor will men not enlisted,

such as drivers in light batteries, or such bands as are not regularly enlisted, be included.

3. Number, organization, and stations of divisions, brigades, regiments, battalions, and separate companies.

Under this heading in addition to the stations should be given a full statement of the number of brigades, the number of regiments, troops, and batteries in each, composition of regiments in battalions and companies, with authorized number of officers and enlisted men in each troop, battery, or company.

4. General officers. Number and manner of appointment.

This should include only general officers commanding divisions or brigades, and not heads of staff corps, or generals of unorganized militia.

5. Division, brigade, regimental, and battalion field and staff. Number and manner of appointment.

Give the number and titles of field and staff officers authorized for each organization. Total number for the State not needed. Non-commissioned staff should be included. State in full manner of appointment.

6. Company officers. How selected or appointed? Any examination required?

If company officers are elected, simply so state without giving details.

7. Staff departments. Adjutant general, duties of. Medical department, duties of. Other staff corps, duties of.

Give rank and duties of both Adjutant General and Surgeon General; and list of other authorized heads of departments, with their rank, and a statement as to whether the departments are organized, and what duties are performed by the head of each.

- 8. Ambulance Corps and Hospital Corps. Organization, equipment, and efficiency.
- 9. Signal Corps. Organization, equipment, and efficiency. Under these two headings give details as to the organization, equipment, and efficiency of these two corps.
- 10. Any regular army officer attached to the headquarters? If there is, give name. (Date when relieved.)
- II. Military or advisory board. Organization and duties. Are there in the office of the adjutant general any prearranged plans for the use of troops in case of emergency?

- 12. State appropriations.
- 13. National appropriations.

Under these two heads give amount, if possible, and manner of expending both.

- 14. Armament. Cavalry. Artillery. Infantry. Character and condition of.
- 15. Equipment. Cavalry. Artillery. Infantry. Character and condition of.
 - 16. Clothing. Character and condition of.

Under these three heads, "Armament," "Equipment," and "Clothing," should be given full details as to the character and condition of the arms, equipment, and clothing issued to each branch of the service, and the amount held in reserve, so that the department may be fully informed.

17. Horses owned or hired?

The answer to this should show the method of procuring horses, and state whether or not the horses are owned by the members of the different organizations or hired from other persons.

- 18. Ammunition. (a) Character and quantity of, actually in the hands of troops of all three branches. (b) Amount in reserve.
- 19. Camp and garrison equipage. (a) Tentage. (b) Mess outfits.

Give full statement of all tentage owned by State, including shelter tents. Under subhead (b) give full information as to field mess outfits, especially field cooking utensils.

- 20. Property accountability. Nature of. Are regulations in regard to strictly enforced?
- 21. Subsistence. Rations. Component parts of. How furnished? How prepared?

Under second and third subheads, state fully how rations are furnished, both in camp and in active service, and how they are prepared in both cases.

22. Pay and allowances.

Give pay and allowances of all kinds to officers and enlisted men, on all kinds of duty.

23. Stores. (a) Purchase of. (b) Medical supplies.

Give under (a) information as to how and by whom military stores are purchased. Under (b) give full statement showing the character of medical supplies furnished and by whom they are purchased.

- 24. Personnel and discipline.
- 25. Theoretical instruction.

Give general statement of all theoretical instruction on military subjects given to officers and non-commissioned officers.

- 26. Guard duty. How performed? Officers and non-commissioned officers well instructed? Sentinels well instructed? Any outpost duty?
- 27. Target practice. Cavalry, artillery, and infantry. Range and gallery? Any held at home stations? Quantity of, and system of instruction and classification?
 - 28. Transportation.

Give brief statement of means of transportation by rail and water in State.

- 29. Regulations. Nature and date of.
- 30. Maps. Scale and character.

Give list of maps in office of adjutant general, and, if possible, send copies, with stations of brigades, regiments, companies, etc., marked on one of them.

- 31. Armories. Location and description.
- 32. Arsenals. Location and description.
- 33. Independent commands in State.
- 34. Such remarks as you may deem advisable to make on any subject not mentioned above relative to conditions prior to April 20, 1898.

SUBSEQUENT TO APRIL 20, 1898.

- 35. Number, designation, and date of organizations practically complete mustered into the service of the U. S. Volunteers.
- 36. Number of individuals belonging to State troops enlisted in volunteers.
- 37. Number of officers of State troops who received volunteer commissions with troops from State.
- 38. Number of non-commissioned officers and privates who received commissions.
- 39. Number of officers and enlisted men who received volunteer commissions from the President.

- 40. Number of graduates of institutions of learning in State where an officer of the army was on duty who received commissions in volunteer regiments.

A brief description of method pursued, railroad facilities, rationing, etc., during this period is desired.

It is only through the adjutant generals of states that the desired information can be obtained and their earnest co-operation is requested.

This information when compiled and issued in one volume may serve as useful data by utilizing the best, together with the experiences of the war, in bringing the State militia to a higher degree of efficiency than it has heretofore attained.

- 4. I Brigadier general, authorized. Brigadier generals are elected by the written votes of the field officers of their respective brigades.
- 5. Brigade staff: I assistant adjutant general, I brigade inspector, I surgeon who shall be medical director of the brigade, I inspector of rifle practice, each with the rank of major; I quartermaster, I commissary, I aide-de-camp, each with the rank of captain, I aide-de-camp with the rank of first lieutenant.

Brigadier generals appoint their respective staff officers.

To each infantry regiment there shall be I colonel, I lieutenant colonel, 3 majors, and a staff consisting of I surgeon with

the rank of major, I assistant surgeon with the rank of captain, I assistant surgeon with the rank of first lieutenant, I adjutant, I quartermaster, I inspector of rifle practice, each with the rank of first lieutenant, and I chaplain. The non-commissioned staff shall consist of I sergeant major, I quartermaster sergeant, I commissary sergeant, I hospital steward, I trumpeter, I color bearer, who shall be a sergeant.

The colonel, lieutenant colonel and majors of an Infantry Regiment are elected by the written votes of the captains and subalterns of their respective regiments. The staff of an Infantry Regiment is appointed by the colonel commanding. That of a separate battalion by the officer commanding the battalion. This includes the commissioned and non-commissioned staff.

- 6. Company officers are elected by the written votes of the members of their respective companies. A physical examination by Tripler's Manual, enjoined by G. O. No. 6, April 8, 1898, also a strict examination into their mental and moral qualifications, together with an examination both written and oral, covering the tactical, administrative and general knowledge, including care of health and camp sanitation, required in the respective positions to which they are elected.
- 7. The staff of the commander-in-chief consists of an adjutant-general, who is ex-officio chief-of-staff, quartermaster-general and paymaster-general, with the rank of major-general; an inspector-general with the rank of brigadier-general; a commissary-general, surgeon-general, judge-advocate-general, and an inspector-general of rifle practice, each with the rank of colonel; four aides-de-camp with the rank of lieutenant-colonel; and a military secretary with the rank of major. Power is given in case of war, insurrection or invasion, to appoint additional staff officers if public service so requires. All members of the staff are appointed by the commander-in-chief, are commissioned by him, and hold office during his pleasure and until their successors are appointed and qualified.

The duties of the adjutant general are to distribute all orders, to attend public reviews when the commander-in-chief shall review the troops, to carry out all orders relative to putting into execution and perfecting the system of military discipline established by the State and United States, to prepare and furnish blank forms for the different returns, rolls and vouchers that

may be required, and to explain how such returns, rolls and vouchers should be made, to distribute all books required to be furnished at the public expense, to receive all military reports that are required to be made, and from such reports make proper abstracts and lay them with the reports of the business of the department and a statement of the strength, condition and efficiency of the military forces of the State before the commander-in-chief, to make return in duplicate of the militia of the State according to such directions as he may receive from the secretary of war. Practically he has charge of the military forces, after consultation with the commander-in-chief.

The surgeon-general, under direction of the commander-inchief, purchases and issues all medical, surgical and hospital supplies, and approves the bills for the same, before transmission to the adjutant general. He has supervision of all matters pertaining to the medical department of the military forces and makes detailed reports of the same.

The inspector general attends all encampments of the national guard, critically observes the amount and kind of duty performed each day and manner of its performance and the condition of each organization, the degree of order maintained, and the general police of camp. He makes an annual inspection of each company, troop, platoon and corps, and of any other organization belonging to the national guard. He also makes an annual inspection of all armories, books and military property belonging to each organization and of its financial condition and makes a detailed report upon the encampment and the condition of all property and organizations inspected by him, with such suggestions as he shall deem important in regard to the work and the efficiency of the system of instruction, drill and discipline prescribed, and of the necessity of further legislation to perfect the same.

The commissary-general, under direction of the commanderin-chief, purchases all subsistence supplies, approves all bills therefor and transmits them to the adjutant general.

The judge-advocate-general, under direction, is charged with the supervision, care and management of all things relating to the administration of justice in the military forces of the State; he shall diligently examine the proceedings of all courts martial, and reports thereon. When directed he acts as judge advocate at any court martial. He is the advisor of the military department upon all legal questions and all contracts, agreements or other instruments to be drawn or executed in the course of the business thereof.

The inspector general of rifle practice, under direction, has supervision of the rifle practice of the military forces of the State. He sees that the laws, orders and regulations relative thereto are complied with, and that rifle ranges are furnished by the cities and towns, and reports any failures.

8. The ambulance corps consists of I second lieutenant, I first sergeant, and 17 privates.

It is an efficient organization. At present it has several raw recruits, as a number of men from its ranks have enlisted in the United States service.

9. The signal corps consists of I second lieutenant, 2 first class sergeants, I quartermaster sergeant, I acting hospital steward with rank of sergeant, 2 sergeants, 4 corporals, and 10 privates.

This signal corps was most highly commended during the Spanish War in the Santiago compaign, by General Greeley, Chief Signal Officer, and by General Shafter, General Greeley stating that its service was historic.

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In addition to which there is much small equipment for use at the State Camp Ground, such as cooking utensils, kitchen ware, table ware, refrigerators, scales and furniture for kitchen and mess houses, also for hospital equipment.

20. Property accountability.

Commanding officers of companies draw all company clothing and equipment, except tentage and mess outfits, they having an allowance for care and responsibility of property. All property lost through their inattention or carelessness is charged against their allowance.

21. Subsistence.

Rations have same component parts as in the regular service, with an addition in case of a five days' mobilization for annual encampment, of 10%, to offset the inexperience of men but a short time in camp and for the increased appetite incident to a short term of service. The components vary somewhat

with the season but follow regulations as nearly as possible. They are contracted for by the commissary-general under direction and supervision of the adjutant-general, by authority of the commander-in-chief. They are issued on regular ration returns, copy of blank form herewith. In camp they are cooked in the company kitchens by the company cooks, the cooks being enlisted men and members of the company for which they cook. In active service the Buzzacott oven is used.

22. Pay and allowances.

For tours of duty of more than ten days' duration, they pay and allowances are as in the United States service. For less than ten days' service the following sum each per day for every day actually on duty:

No pay is allowed for armory drills, for attendance at regimental schools or for officers-elect before boards of examination.

Assistant adjutants-general and adjutants of regiment receive \$100 per year. Adjutants of separate battalions \$10 annually in addition to the per diem pay herein provided. Commissioned officers required to be mounted are allowed \$3.00 per day and forage for each horse actually employed by them. Non-commissioned officers and orderlies, \$2.00 per day and forage, and the same for each draft horse employed in batteries of light artillery and with the ambulances, also for cavalry. Commanding officers of companies receive \$50.00 per year for care and responsibility of property in addition to the per diem pay fixed. Company clerks receive \$20.00 per year. For a tour of duty less than ten days, officers are allowed subsistence which is paid by the State.

23. Stores.

- (a). Purchase of: All supplies of every kind except commissary stores are purchased by the quartermaster-general under direction of the commander-in-chief. They are selected by sample and are purchased after obtaining bids, with samples, from many supply houses. Commissary supplies are purchased by the commissary-general under instructions from the adjutant-general by authority of the commander-in-chief. They are selected carefully by sample after obtaining prices from various supply houses.
- (b) Medical supplies: Medical supplies are purchased by the surgeon-general under instruction from the adjutant general by authority of the commander-in-chief. The surgeon-general keeps a careful inventory of the supplies on hand and purchases from time to time in the public market such as may be needed, in his judgment, to keep an ample stock on hand. The supplies consist of medical and surgical chests, surgical instruments, absorbant cottons and medical utensils, and a full supply of all necessary medicines.

24. Personnel and discipline.

The personnel of the national guard of this State is excellent. The discipline in some companies is good in some fair. It depends largely upon the officers and is being much improved. The liquor habit has been much reduced of late with a marked improvement in discipline. This is owing to greater vigilance of commanding officers, and greater care being exercised by examining boards.

25. Theoretical instruction.

I have instituted this year a regular course of instruction by the United States officer on duty with the national guard, covering administrative work including all papers necessary to be understood by troops in active service, both company and regimental, also instruction in guard duty, outpost duty, patrols, reconnaisances, and information. They are instructed in care of the person and camp hygiene and simple instruction is given in the use of mess outfits and camping in the field, in bivouac, etc. These subjects as far as possible also form the basis of instruction and discussion at the regimental officers' schools held in each regiment once or twice a year. At these schools medical officers are present and give instruction on first service to the wounded and care of health in camp and field. The regimental

inspector of rifle practice is present and gives instruction in the use of the rifle on the range and in the field.

26. Guard duty.

At the close of the encampment guard duty was well performed. At its opening it was somewhat faulty. At the last encampment, under my instruction, one of the regular officers in attendance devoted a large portion of his time to instructing the officers and non-commissioned officers in guard duty and in seeing that the sentinels were well instructed. No outpost duty was performed.

27. Target practice.

There being no organization of cavalry or artillery, rifle practice is confined to the infantry and signal corps. There are no rifle galleries connected with the armories, but each town where a company is stationed furnishes a rifle range. In most cases the ranges have 200, 300, 500 and 600 yards. A few of the companies have not the latter distance.

28. The system of instruction and classification in this State is quite good. A great deal of interest is taken in rifle practice. The system is being constantly improved and by the stimulation of prizes and badges of excellence the average marksmanship is becoming excellent. It is my intention to propose a change in the militia law, authorizing three extra lieutenants to a regiment, who besides being battalion adjutants, shall be inspectors of rifle practice, and thus obtain an even closer supervision of range work, and have all qualifications made in the presence of this officer.

29. Regulations.

Full regulations for the national guard of the State of Maine have been drawn up by me this year, with the assistance of Captain C. G. Morton, 6th U. S. Infantry, on duty with the National Guard. They were submitted to a board of officers convened by me and also to the commander-in-chief, and were promulgated on the 20th of April, 1898. On my appointment as adjutant-general I found that regulations had never been prepared or established for the government of the National Guard of this State and I at once took the matter up.

30. Maps.

The maps in the adjutant-general's office consist of a railroad map giving all the railroads of the State of Maine with a general outline of the waterways and indicating the principal towns, also a map of the State giving all waterways, towns and most of the highways, and an atlas of the counties, giving in detail the highways, together with the villages, towns, and waterways. All these maps give an outline of the coast and adjacent islands. The atlas referred to, while not kept in the adjutant-general's office, is always available for use. A railway map with the stations of the companies and corps of the National Guard of the State of Maine marked upon it in red is herewith enclosed. On the margin of the map will be found a table indicating the organizations and the places where stationed.

31. Armories.

The armories occupied by the organizations of the National Guard, except in Portland, were built for other purposes. They are mostly halls in buildings, the halls and rooms for storage of clothing and equipment, officers' quarters and company rooms being leased for the use of the organizations occupying them. The sum of \$100.00 a year for each company, corps and regimental headquarters, is allowed by the State. The balance is made up by the city or town where the company is stationed. In some cases a portion of the rent is paid by the company itself. In Portland the city has built a building purposely for an armory and in it is a large drill shed. In the armory there are separate rooms for the officers and enlisted men of each company. Four companies and the Signal Corps occupy quarters in the building and use the drill shed for drill purposes. In Lewiston a large hall is leased, with officers' and company quarters attached, for three infantry companies and the ambulance corps. In the other towns where companies are stationed, there is but one company in a place and therefore the armory is used exclusively for the company stationed there. The regimental headquarters of the First Infantry are situated at Biddeford, those of the Second Infantry at Lewiston. The armories are at the stations of the several companies.

32. Arsenals.

There is one arsenal, located at Bangor. The ground contains about an acre and a half of land. It is surrounded by a high picket fence. The buildings consist of a large store house built of brick, of two stories, and a powder house on the corner of the ground, also of brick.

33. Independent commands.

There are no independent commands in the State, the law not authorizing such. There are several associations who have been licensed to drill and parade, under a provision of the law permitting such licenses.

34. A regular officer should always be on duty with the National Guard of the State, who should report to the commander-in-chief and whose chief function should be, under direction of the adjutant-general, the instruction of the various organizations of the National Guard of the State, especially in guard duty, outpost duty, camp sanitation, care of troops in the field and administrative work, in so far as it relates to making reports, drawing rations, making requisitions and drawing supplies on the same. The allotment of the government should be materially increased and in return therefor more thorough oversight of the National Guard should be granted to the Secretary of War.

SUBSEQUENT TO APRIL 20, 1898.

35. One regiment of infantry, one battalion of heavy artillery and one signal corps from this State mustered into the service of the United States Volunteers. The infantry regiment was designated "First Maine Volunteer Infantry." First muster in to the service occurred May 5, 1898. The several companies were mustered between the 10th and 13th of May, and the final muster of the field and staff took place on the 14th of Mav. The Maine Detachment United States Volunteer Signal Corps, designated "8th Company, U. S. Volunteer Signal Corps," was mustered in to the service June 11, 1808. Of the First Battalion Maine Volunteer Artillery, Battery A was mustered in June 1, Battery B, July 16, Battery C, July 18, and Battery D, July 20, 1898. The First Infantry Maine Volunteers and Battery A were organized under the first call of the President. Batteries B. C and D under the second call, the First Infantry and Battery A being recruited to the maximum also under this call. The signal corps was recruited under a law authorizing the organization of the volunteer signal corps.

A dispatch giving organizations, dated April 25, reached this office the 29th of April. The organizations of the National Guard reported at camp rendezvous, Augusta, Maine, on the 2d of May. Their muster in to the U. S. service commenced May 5. Concentration could have been made April 30, but a very severe storm rendered it unwise in bring unseasoned men to camp on that day. All companies came to Augusta direct by rail except three companies situated at Calais, Eastport and Machias, in the eastern part of the State, who came by steamer, the Washington County Railroad now running, not having been completed at that time. Commutation of travel rations at 25 cents a meal per man was authorized to those companies who were en route over one or more meals, also for the three eastern companies, two of which, Eastport and Calais, came by the International Steamship from Eastport to Portland. The Machias company proceeded from Machiasport to Mount Desert Ferry by the steamer "Frank Jones." At the ports of arrival these companies boarded trains of the Maine Central Railroad and proceeded to Augusta direct. peace permission has been obtained from the Canadian authorities to bring the Eastport and Calais companies through British territory from St. Stephens to Vanceboro, over the Canadian Pacific Railroad, thence on the Maine Central Railroad. having been declared this was impossible and therefore they were brought by steamer. All other companies came direct by the Maine Central Railroad from their several stations except the Houlton, Norway and Biddeford companies. The Norway com-

pany proceeded from Norway to Yarmouth Junction over the Grand Trunk Railway. At Yarmouth Junction they boarded the special train bringing the Portland companies. The Biddeford company came into Portland via the Boston and Maine Railroad in season to take this same train. The Houlton company took the special train at Bangor which brought the Bangor, Machias, Dover, Skowhegan and Waterville companies.

Points of concentration in case of mobilization of volunteers. For a concentration of not exceeding two regiments of infantry, the State Camp Ground, with certain added land which I hope will very soon be obtained, in consideration of the buildings there standing and other conveniences, would seem to be the best place for a sudden concentration of the National Guard of the State, as all ordnance, ordance stores, clothing and equipments, together with tentage, held in reserve, are stored on or near the camp ground and are, together with the mess houses, cook houses, and hospital buildings, immediately available. Should a larger number of troops be required, the vicinity of Portland or Bangor furnish good points of concentration, as they are both railroad centers and are available for water communication as well, and are therefore strategic points.

SUGGESTIONS FOR INCREASING THE MOBILITY, EFFICIENCY,
AND IMMEDIATE AVAILABILITY OF THE ACTIVE
MILITIA OF THE SEVERAL STATES.

2.—What are your views relative to mobilization and concentration of State troops in case of war in the future?

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, WASHINGTON, D. C., February 28, 1899.

The Honorable, The Secretary of War:

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge receipt of yours of the 23d of January ultimo, requesting my legal opinion upon the following statement of facts as given in your letter:

"At the commencement of the war with Spain certain of the States turned over to the United States a part of the quarter-master and ordnance stores which were at that time in use by the militia organizations of said States. A part of the stores thus turned over had been more or less used and were consequently of somewhat less value than when new. The commanding officer of each volunteer organization was directed to convene a board of officers of his command to determine the value of said stores at the time they were turned over to the United States.

"Certain of these states having requested the return of these stores in kind, I have the honor to request your opinion, first, whether this Department can legally issue to said States new stores for those turned over by them to the United States, and, second, whether this Department can legally allow said States credits for the stores turned over at the value determined by said board of officers, and issue new stores to said States to the extent of said credits."

Upon investigation of the matters involved in your request, I find that there are two questions which arise upon the facts presented by you.

The first is as to arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster's stores, and other equipments which belonged to the several States and which were turned over by the states for use by the troops in the volunteer army of the United States in the war with Spain,—the inquiry being whether such stores, etc., should be returned in kind or paid for by the government.

The second is as to what course shall be pursued by the government in regard to arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster's stores, and camp equipage, the property of the United States, in use by the militia in the states when the war with Spain commenced, and which were carried into the service and used by the troops of the states when accepted as a part of the volunteer army of the United States.

first question is readily answered. The ordance and other stores belonging to the several states, which were taken or accepted by the United States for use in the war, should be treated in like manner as such stores procured from any other source. When the Government accepted them, it incurred the obligation to pay the price agreed upon, or, in the absence of an agreement as to price, to pay whatever they were worth. In either case there appears to be no great difficulty in arriving at the amount for which the Government is liable. As stated, the value of the stores were, in some instances, made by boards of appraisers. If the valuations made by these boards were acceptable to both parties, the Government ought to pay the amounts thus ascertained; but if, on the other hand, the boards and their work were the mere ex parte action of the Government, to which the states did not assent, then the Government assumed the liability of paying whatever the stores furnished were worth, to be arrived at in some feasible manner.

It is impossible to see how stores of the character described, belonging to the states, furnished to the Government, can be returned in kind, for, as stated, these stores had been more or less used, and it would be exceedingly difficult to arrive at any satisfactory basis for returning property of like character and quality.

As to the other question; As I understand it, the question concerns stores which were in the possession of the states and which had been furnished by the United States to the militia of the states under the provisions of the Act of February 12, 1887, (24 Stat. L., 401), which is in these words:

"Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That section sixteen hundred and sixty-one of the Revised Statutes be, and the same is hereby, amended and re-enacted so as to read as follows:

- "Section I. That the sum of four hundred thousand dollars is hereby annually appropriated, to be paid out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the purpose of providing arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster's stores, and camp equipage for issue to the militia.
- "Sec. 2. That said appropriation bill shall be apportioned among the several states and territories under the direction of the Secretary of War, according to the number of senators and representatives to which each state respectively is entitled in the Congress of the United States, and to the territories and District of Columbia such proportion and under such regulations as the President may prescribe; *Provided*, *however*, That no state shall be entitled to the benefits of the appropriation apportioned to it unless, the number of its regularly enlisted, organized, and uniformed active militia shall be at least one hundred men for each senator and representative to which such state is entitled in the Congress of the United States. And the amount of said appropriation which is thus determined not to be available shall be covered back into the treasury.
- "Sec. 3. That the purchase or manufacture of arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster's stores, and camp equipage for the militia under the provisions of this act shall be made under the direction of the Secretary of War, as such arms, ordance and guartermaster's stores and camp equipage are now manufactured or otherwise provided for the use of the regular army, and they shall be receipted for and shall remain the property of the United States, and be annually accounted for by the governors of the states and territories for which purpose the Secretary of War shall prescribe and supply the necessary blanks and make such regulations as he may deem necessary to protect the interest of the United States.
- "Sec. 4. That all arms, equipments, ordance stores, or tents which may become unserviceable or unsuitable shall be examined by a board of officers of the militia, and its report shall be forwarded to (by) the governor of the state or territory direct to the Secretary of War, who shall direct what disposition, by sale or otherwise, shall be made of them; and, if sold, the proceeds of such sale shall be covered into the treasury of the United States."

The states did not own these stores, but, by the express terms of the act, they remained and were the property of the United States. It was undoubtedly the purpose of Congress in enacting the above legislation to authorize the general government to provide arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster's stores, and camp equipage for the militia of the several states, with a view of having an organized force, with equipments, ready in case of emerg-An emergency arose when the war with Spain was declared, and, although the militia as such was not called into active service, the several states furnished quotas of troops which were mustered in as a part of what was called the volunteer army of the United States, and the arms, ordinance stores, etc., which were already in possession of the states under the provisions of the above act, were used in equipping and providing for the said troops. There is most certainly no law under which the United States can pay the states for arms, ordnance stores, etc., furnished by virtue of the foregoing law, because, as before stated, these stores were the property of the United States and did not belong to the states at all; and when the soldiers in the army of the United States were useing those stores, they were using property of which Government was the sole owner.

The only question, then, is as to whether the Government is either empowered or required to issue to the several states, stores in kind to replace such of these arms, ordance stores, etc., as were exhausted, consumed, or impaired by use in the war with Spain, or, in case the Government cannot return such stores in kind, are the states entitled to credit by the Government for the value of such stores?

I do not hesitate to advise that the Government has no authority to supply stores of this character to be issued to the militia of the states from the general appropriations for the war department, the power being derived from the act above quoted. If any part of the appropriation made by the said act remains, or if there are arms, ordnance stores, quartermaster's stores, and equipage on hand, purchased under authority of the same, and the appropriation made thereby, I do not doubt the right of the Government to re-furnish the several states from this source. But in the absence of this appropriation, or of arms, ordnance stores, etc., purchased with it, I do not find any lawful authority

by which such stores can be again supplied to the militia of the several states.

STATE OF MAINE.

Adjutant-General's Office, Augusta, April 29, 1899.

General Orders, No. 1.

I. The organizations and members of the National Guard of Maine, that entered the Volunteer Army under the two calls of the President for troops during the war with Spain, have all been mustered-out of the United States service and have returned to their homes. They have proven themselves worthy sons of Maine and have again written on the pages of history, the loyalty of her people and their readiness to respond to the call of duty.

The Commander-in-Chief appreciates the promptness with which they rallied to the colors and enabled him quickly to turn over to the government the magnificent organizations which so well represented our State, he desires to heartily thank every officer and enlisted man who contributed to this result.

It was through no fault of theirs, that many of the organizations from this State, failed to see service at the front; their patriotism and fidelity during the long months of comparative inactivity incident to the routine of army camp life showed to the country the sterling material of which they were composed. In common with organizations fortunate in seeing active service, they have earned from a grateful Commonwealth, commendation and honor for their loyalty, while the honored dead receive tender recognition as having died in the performance of duty.

General Orders, No. 2.

- I. Attention is called to article six, paragraph 65, Regulations for the National Guard. Immediate compliance with its provisions is required.
- II. Company commanders will at once recommend for discharge all enlisted men who failed to pass the physical examination required when they presented themselves for acceptance in the organizations that were mustered-in to the U. S. Volunteer Army for the war with Spain, also all men who for any reason are unable to attend promptly and efficiently to their duties.
- III. Companies and corps will be, as soon as practicable, recruited to the minimum strength fixed by the militia law, as amended by sections one, two and three of chapter 128, Public Laws of 1899, care being taken to enlist only men of good moral character, such as will be a credit to the National Guard and who can pass the physical examination required for the regular army.

All orders or parts of orders inconsistent with this paragraph are hereby revoked.

IV. All company and corps commanders will make requisition for field desks and such blank forms and stationery as they may require, and those whose companies or corps entered the U. S. Volunteer Army will in addition make requisition for all books and other property that were turned in to the Quartermaster-General.

General Orders, No. 3.

The following acts of the Legislature are published for the information and government of all concerned:

I. An Act to establish a Naval Reserve as a part of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section I. There may be allowed, in addition to the National Guard of the State of Maine as provided in section twenty-six, chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the laws of 1893, a Naval Reserve, to consist in time of peace of not more than one battalion, and in time of war, insurrection, invasion, or imminent danger thereof, of a brigade of not more than two battalions.

- Sect. 2. The Naval Reserve shall be a part of the National Guard of the State of Maine and shall be raised and organized in the same manner as the land forces, but it shall not be attached to any organization of land troops unless specially ordered by the Commander-in-Chief.
- Sect. 3. In time of peace the authorized battalion may consist of not more than four divisions and an engineer division.
- Sect. 4. To a battalion there shall be one lieutenant-commander, who shall be chief of battalion, one lieutenant, who shall be chief of staff, executive officer and equipment officer, one lieutenant, junior grade, who shall be battalion adjutant, ordnance and navigating officer, one paymaster and an assistant surgeon, each with the relative rank of lieutenant, junior grade.
- Sect. 5. To each line division there shall be one lieutenant, who shall be chief of division, one lieutenant, junior grade, one ensign, and not more than fifty-six petty officers and men. To each engineer division there shall be one lieutenant, junior grade, one ensign, and not more than twenty-five petty officers and men. To each division and corps there shall be such petty officers as the Commander-in-Chief may prescribe.
- Sect. 6. The system of administration and instruction of the Naval Reserve shall conform, as nearly as possible, to that of the Navy of the United States. Duty shall be performed affoat when possible. When not otherwise provided for, the government of the Naval Reserve shall be according to the laws and regulations now or hereafter governing the National Guard of the State. The divisions of the Naval Reserve shall be considered the equivalent of companies of infantry.
- Sect. 7. The pay of officers and petty officers mentioned in the preceding sections shall be the same as that of officers and non-commissioned officers of the same relative grade in the land forces of the state. Seamen shall receive the same pay as privates of infantry.
- Sect. 8. The rank of officers given in the preceding sections is naval rank, and has the same relation to rank in the land forces of the state as rank in the navy of the United States has to that in the army. The relative rank of petty officers in the Naval Reserve and non-commissioned officers in the land forces of the state will be as fixed by the Commander-in-Chief. Seamen correspond to privates of infantry.
 - Sect. 9. This act shall take effect when approved.

Approved March 8, 1800.

II. An Act to amend chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the Public Laws of 1893, relating to the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Section 35 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "sergeant" in the third line thereof, the words 'one quarter-master sergeant;' by striking out the words "forty-two" and "fifty-six" in the fourth line thereof, and inserting in the places thereof, respectively, the words 'thirty-two' and 'ninety-two,' and by adding at the end of said section the words 'and the commander-in-chief shall have authority to

authorize the appointment from the privates of an infantry company such non-commissioned officers, artificers and wagoners as will make its organization correspond with that established for the United States Army, should the company be recruited to its maximum.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 35. Each company of infantry shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quarter-master sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, two musicians, and not less than thirty-two nor more than ninety-two privates, and the commander-in-chief shall have authority to authorize the appointment from the privates of an infantry company, such non-commissioned officers, artificers and wagoners as will make its organization correspond with that established for the United States Army, should the company be recruited to its maximum.'

Sect. 2. Section 39 of said act is hereby amended by striking out all of said section after the word "lieutenant" in the second line, and inserting in place thereof the following: 'two first class sergeants, one quartermaster sergeant, one acting hospital steward, with rank of sergeant, two sergeants, four corporals, and not less than ten nor more than fifteen privates;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 39. The signal corps shall consist of one second lieutenant, two first class sergeants, one quartermaster sergeant, one acting hospital steward, with rank of sergeant, two sergeants, four corporals, and not less than ten nor more than fifteen privates.'

Sect. 3. Section 45 of said act is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following: 'and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be enlisted in each company, battery, troop or corps of the National Guard, as a part of the authorized enlisted strength thereof, under rules and regulations to be prescribed by him, a competent person as cook, who shall take rank as, and be allowed the pay of a corporal of the arm of the service to which he belongs, and whose duties in connection with the preparation and serving of the food of the enlisted men of the company, battery, troop or corps and with the supervision and instruction of enlisted men hereby authorized to be detailed to assist him, shall be prescribed in the regulations for the government of the National Guard. Each cook will be required to attend such drills and exercises as will qualify him for the performance of the duty of a soldier under arms when necessity requires.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 45. The commander-in-chief may authorize the appointment of additional non-commissioned officers in the several organizations of the National Guard, and upon the staffs of commanding officers whenever the service shall require, and he is hereby authorized and directed to cause to be enlisted in each company, battery, troop or corps of the National Guard, as a part of the authorized enlisted strength thereof, under rules and regulations to be prescribed by him, a competent person as cook, who shall take rank as, and be allowed the pay of a corporal of the arm of the service to which he belongs, and whose duties in connection with the preparation and serving of the food of the enlisted men

of the company, battery, troops or corps and with the supervision and instruction of enlisted men hereby authorized to be detailed to assist him, shall be prescribed in the regulations for the government of the National Guard. Each cook will be required to attend such drills and exercises as will qualify him for the performance of the duty of a soldier under arms when necessity requires.'

Sect. 4. Section 66 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "be" in the first line, the words 'dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, or;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 66. Any officer may be dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, or discharged by order of the commander-in-chief, upon the report of a military board of inquiry, or the sentence of a court martial; or when it shall appear to him that such officer has been convicted of any crime, or has been dishonorably discharged or dismissed from the service of the United States, or from the militia of this or any other State.'

Sect. 5. Section 78 of said act is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof, the following: 'and such drill room, armories, headquarters or other places provided for in this section shall be held for the exclusive use of the National Guard unless otherwise authorized by the commander-in-chief after application in each case by the municipal authorities in writing. If said premises are used contrary to the provisions hereof, there shall be a deduction from the rent of the premises agreed upon, equal to one month's rental for each day of such use.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 78. Municipal officers shall provide for each company of the National Guard located within the limits of their respective towns, subject to the approval of the commander-in-chief or such officer as he may designate, a suitable drill room and armory or place of deposit for the arms, equipments and other property furnished by the State. They shall also provide suitable rooms for the headquarters of each separate battalion, regiment or brigade established within their limits, and a reasonable compensation for the rent thereof, not exceeding one hundred dollars per annum, may be allowed to the towns so furnishing, and paid by the State, and such drill room, armories, headquarters or other places provided for in this section shall be held for the exclusive use of the National Guard unless otherwise authorized by the commander-in-chief after application in each case by the municipal authorities in writing. If said premises are used contrary to the provisions hereof, there shall be a deduction from the rent of the premises agreed upon, equal to one month's rental for each day of such use.'

Sect. 6. Section 84 of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "twice" in the second line and inserting in the place thereof the word 'once;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 84. The commander-in-chief shall call meetings of the commissioned officers of each regiment at least once each year for military instruction.'

Sect. 7. Section 89 of said act is hereby amended by striking out that part of the section beginning with the word "or" following the word

"commander-in-chief" in the seventh line, to and including the word "thereof" in the tenth line, and inserting in the place of these words 'or any justice of the supreme judicial court in term time or vacation;' by striking out the words in the eleventh and twelfth lines from "mayor" to "sheriff," inclusive, and inserting in the place thereof the word 'justice;' by striking out in lines seventeen and eighteen, the words "a court" and inserting in place thereof 'such justice;' by striking out the words "our justices" in the twenty-third line and inserting in place thereof the words 'a justice;' by striking out the entire twenty-fourth line thereof and the first word of the twenty-fifth line and inserting in place thereof the words 'supreme judicial court;' by striking out the abbreviated word "Esq.," in the thirty-sixth line and inserting in place thereof the following: 'Justice of the supreme judicial court;' by striking out the last paragraph of this section beginning with the word "and" and ending with the word "case;" so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 89. When there is, in any county, a tumult, riot, mob, or a body of men acting together by force with intent to commit a felony, or to offer violence to persons or property, or by force and violence to break and resist the laws of the State, or of the United States, or when such tumult, riot or mob is threatened, and the fact is made to appear to the commander-in-chief, or any justice of the supreme judicial court in term time or vacation, the commander-in-chief may issue his order, or such justice may issue a precept, directed to any commander of a brigade, regiment or company, directing him to order his command, or a part thereof, describing the kind and number of troops, to appear at the time and place therein specified, to aid the civil authorities in suppressing such violence and supporting the laws; which precept, if issued by such justice, shall be in substance as follows:

STATE OF MAINE.

(L. S.) To (insert the officer's title) A. B., commanding (insert his command.)

Whereas, it has been made to apear to a justice of our supreme judicial court, that (here state one or more of the causes above mentioned,) in our county of......, and military force is necessary to aid the civil authority in suppressing the same; now, therefore, we command you that you cause (here state the number and kind of troops required,) armed, equipped, and with ammunition, as the law directs, and with proper officers, either attached to the troops, or detailed by you, to parade at....., on.............then and there to obey such orders as may be given them, according to law. Hereof fail not at your peril; and have you there this writ, with your doings returned thereon.

- Sect. 8. Section 91 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "Guard" in the second line thereof, the following words: 'or licensed company;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. 91. No parade or voluntary service shall be performed by any organization of the National Guard or licensed company under arms or with State uniform without the approval of the commander-in-chief.'
- Sect. 9. Section 98 of said act is hereby amended by striking out the words "twenty-five dollars," being the fourteenth and fifteenth words in said section, and inserting in place thereof the words 'one hundred dollars;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. o8. Assistant adjutants general and adjutants of regiments of the National Guard shall receive one hundred dollars and adjutants of separate battalions, ten dollars annually in addition to the per diem pay herein provided.'
- Sect. 10. Section 99 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "cavalry" in the third line thereof, the words 'the signal corps and the ambulance corps;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. 99. There shall be allowed for each horse actually employed by officers required to be mounted, three dollars per day and forage; for horses used in the cavalry, the signal corps and the ambulance corps and by non-commissioned officers and orderlies when required, two dollars per day and forage; and for each draft horse employed in batteries of light artillery, not exceeding sixteen to each platoon, the sum of two dollars per day, which shall be in full for use.'
- Sect. II. Section 100 of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "thirty" in the fifth line, and inserting in place thereof the word 'fifty,' and in the fifth line inserting after the word "care" the words 'and responsibility;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. 100. The commander-in-chief, under such regulations as he may prescribe, may authorize the payment to commanding officers and clerks of organizations of the National Guard, such sum annually as he shall determine not exceeding fifty dollars to captains for care and responsibility of property and twenty dollars to clerks for keeping records.'
- Sect. 12. Section 104 of said act is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof the following: 'but if, when ordered, the length of service should not be specified, it shall receive for the first ten days the pay and rations provided by other sections in this chapter for the State troops and after ten days shall receive the same pay and rations as the regular troops of the United States.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. 104. The militia, when called into actual service for more than ten days, shall receive the same pay and rations as the regular troops of the United States; and the rations, when commuted, shall be valued at the rate fixed by the regulations of the United States in force at the time, but if, when ordered, the length of service should not be specified,

it shall receive for the first ten days the pay and rations provided by other sections in this chapter for the State troops and after ten days shall receive the same pay and rations as the regular troops of the United States.'

Sect. 13. Section 110 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "who" in the first line thereof, the following words: 'is guilty of any conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline or;' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 110. Any officer or enlisted man who is guilty of any conduct to the prejudice of good order and military discipline or neglects or refuses to perform the duties of his office, or to obey the orders of his superiors, or is guilty of any breach of the laws or regulations governing the military forces of the State, or is guilty of conduct unbecoming an officer, soldier or gentleman, may be put under arrest by his superior officer and tried by court martial.'

Sect. 14. Section 112 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "discharged" in the ninth line thereof, the following: 'discharged without honor, discharged;' by striking out the word "offences" in the twelfth line, and inserting in the place thereof the word 'offence,' and by adding at the end of said section the following: 'And they may also in addition to the foregoing, or any other punishment fixed by law, sentence any enlisted man convicted by them to be dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, or discharged, or may adjudge him disqualified for life or for any term of years according to the aggravation of the offence, for re-enlistment or for holding any military office.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 112. Courts martial may, when no other punishment is fixed by law, sentence an officer or enlisted man convicted by them, to pay a fine of not exceeding two hundred dollars and costs of witnesses; and all fines and costs imposed by them may be recovered by the adjutant general in an action of debt in the name of the State. They may in addition to the foregoing or any other punishment fixed by law, sentence an officer convicted by them to be cashiered, dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, discharged, or reprimanded in orders, and if sentenced to be cashiered or dishonorably discharged the court shall adjudge him disqualified for life or for any term of years according to the aggravation of the offence, for holding any military office. And they may also in addition to the foregoing, or any other punishment fixed by law, sentence any enlisted man convicted by them to be dishonorably discharged, discharged without honor, or discharged, or may adjudge him disqualified for life or for any term of years according to the aggravation of the offence, for re-enlistment or for holding any military office.'

Sect. 15. Section 114 of said act is hereby amended by striking out the words "not less than three nor more than five officers" in the second and third lines, and inserting in the place thereof 'one or more officers not exceeding five and a recording officer to reduce the proceedings and evidence in writing;' by striking out that part of the section beginning with the word "imputation" in the fourth line, to and including the

word "general" in the seventh line, and inserting in the place thereof the following: 'into the qualification, efficiency and propriety of conduct of any officer or soldier;' by striking out in the eleventh and twelfth lines thereof the following: "proceed as described in regulations and shall:" by inserting after the word "commander-in-chief" in the twelfth line, 'who may take such action by order or otherwise as he may deem advisable, but;' by striking out the word "such" in the thirteenth line and inserting in the place thereof the word 'any;' by inserting after the word "officer" in the thirteenth line thereof the words 'or soldier: by striking out the words "the commission of such officer shall" in the fourteenth line, and the words "be vacated" in the fifteenth line, and inserting in the place thereof the following: 'he may in his discretion, dishonorably discharge discharge without honor or vacate the commission of such officer, or dishonorably discharge, discharge without honor or discharge such soldier, but the commander-in-chief shall have power to remit or reduce after conviction, all forfeitures and penalties and to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, or order a re-hearing or new trial in any case tried or heard under the provisions of this act.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 114. The commander-in-chief may, from time to time, appoint military boards of inquiry to consist of one or more officers not exceeding five and a recording officer to reduce the proceedings and evidence in writing, whose duty it shall be to examine into any military transaction, or into the qualification, efficiency and propriety of conduct of any officer or soldier, who may be ordered before them for such examination; or for the purpose of settling any military question, or for establishing good order and discipline; the members thereof and witnesses examined by them shall be sworn, the board shall report to the commander-in-chief, who may take such action by order or otherwise as he may deem advisable, but if the report is adverse to any officer or soldier, and is approved by the commander-in-chief, he may in his discretion dishonorably discharge discharge without honor or vacate the commission of such officer, or dishonorably discharge, discharge without honor or discharge such soldier, but the commander-in-chief shall have power to remit or reduce after conviction, all forfeitures and penalties and to grant reprieves, commutations and pardons, or order a rehearing or new trial in any case tried or heard under the provisions of this act.'

Sect. 16. Section 129 of said act is hereby amended by striking out the words "discipline and" in the first line thereof; by inserting after the word "for" in the fourth line thereof, the words 'said army or' and by adding to said section the following: "The methods of preparing charges and of procedure for courts martial, boards of inquiry, and other courts or boards shall in general follow those established for the armies of the United States, except where it may be otherwise provided in this act, and in time of war, insurrection or invasion courts martial may in addition to the provisions of the laws of this State, sentence an officer or an elisted man convicted by them, to penalties and punishments similar to those then provided for substantially like offences, by the laws, regulations and articles of war then governing the armies of the United States,

or to such penalties and punishments, not exceeding those then provided for substantially like offences, by the laws, regulations and articles of war then governing the armies of the United States, as may be prescribed by the commander-in-chief.' So that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 129. The system of field exercise ordered to be observed, in the different corps, by the army of the United States, or such system as may hereafter be directed for said army or the militia by the laws of the United States, shall be observed by the National Guard of the State of Maine. The methods of preparing charges and for procedure for courts martial, boards of inquiry, and other courts or boards shall in general follow those established for the armies of the United States, except where it may be otherwise provided in this act, and in time of war, insurrection or invasion, courts martial may in addition to the provisions of the laws of this State, sentence an officer or an enlisted man convicted by them, to penalties and punishments similar to those then provided for substantially like offences, by the laws, regulations and articles of war then governing the armies of the United States, or to such penalties and punishments, not exceeding those then provided for substantially like offences, by the laws, regulations and articles of war then governing the armies of the United States, as may be prescribed by the commander-in-chief.'

- I. All boards of examination heretofore established by orders are dissolved
- II. Brigadier-General Frank L. Hoyt, Inspector-General, Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, and Colonel E. E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, are hereby appointed a board of examination, in compliance with section 60 of the militia law.
- III. All examinations will be conducted as enjoined in said section of the militia law and in conformity with the regulations for the National Guard, Article V, paragraphs 40 to 54 inclusive.
- IV. As soon as companies and corps are recruited to the complement fixed by G. O. No. 2, A. G. O. c. s., paragraph III, company and corps commanders will report the fact and make application for surgeons to examine the recruits as provided in Article XXXV, paragraph 434, Regulations for the National Guard. At subsequent examinations the number recruited before applying for a surgeon will be governed by the provisions of said paragraph.

V. Examinations of recruits will be conducted in the usual manner except that they will be in accordance with the rules governing like examinations in the United States Army, as provided in paragraph 433, Regulations for the National Guard.

General Orders, No. 5.

- I. The inspections of the several companies and corps of the National Guard will be held by the Inspector-General commencing in July. The first companies inspected will be companies F, G, I, K, L and M, Second Infantry.
- II. The new inspection report, Form No. 1, will be used and the inspections made in accordance with its requirements.
- III. Inspections will be held as far as possible on the regular drill nights of the several organizations. When this is impracticable, the Inspector-General will fix the time of inspection and in each case will give due and sufficient notice to the company and corps commanders, who will promptly acknowledge the receipt of the notification.
- IV. The Inspector-General will advise regimental commanders of the inspections in their respective regiments by sending them notices in each case which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.
- V. The Surgeon-General will accompany the Inspector-General when the Ambulance Corps is inspected.
- VI. Companies and corps will parade in fatigue uniform, armed and equipped in heavy marching order.
- VII. Company commanders, for the use of the Inspector-General, will prepare duplicate returns of their companies, and the inspection return blank No. I will have entered upon it a complete list of all State property for which they are accountable or which they may have taken up on their returns.
- VIII. Company commanders will prepare inventories and inspection reports, Form 4, of all property which they consider unserviceable, and present the same with the property to the Inspector-General for his action. Attention is called to Article XXXVI of the Regulations for the National Guard, the provisions of which govern all inspections.

- I. Col. E. C. Farrington, Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, Major William O. Peterson, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., and Captain William A. Paul, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., are hereby appointed a board of inquiry to test the smokeless powder which has been received by the Adjutant-General, with a view of deciding upon its adaptability to the use of the National Guard in the Springfield rifle, calibre 45, as issued by the United States. The board will make as thorough an investigation as possible, testing the accuracy of the rifles with this powder, its cleanliness and its effect upon the trajectory.
- II. Col. E. C. Farrington will convene the board at as early a date as possible. After the test, a full report will be made to the Adjutant-General.
- III. Transportation will be furnished by the Adjutant-General to enable the officers of the board to report at Augusta, where the test will be made on the rifle range at the camp ground.

- I. As soon as companies and corps are enlisted to their complement, the regular monthly returns, form No. 47, will be made up and forwarded so as to reach their destination by the fifth of each month.
- II. All commissioned officers and enlisted men relieved from duty until further orders by G. O. No. 23, A. G. O., July 22, 1898, are hereby returned to duty.
- III. The commanding officers of Companies F, G, I, K, L and M of the Second Infantry will at once make requisition for the annual allowance of ammunition and take up small arms practice as enjoined in Article XX, paragraphs 247 to 269, inclusive, Regulations for the National Guard. The other companies of the National Guard, after being recruited to the complement fixed by G. O. No. 2, A. G. O., c. s., paragraph 3, will as soon as rifles and equipments are received by the Quartermaster-General from the Ordnance Department of the United States, make requisition for the same, together with the annual allowance of ammunition. When received they will also at once take up rifle practice as enjoined.

- V. Hereafter all accounts authorized, will be made in duplicate and receipted before being forwarded to this office for payment.

To expedite the examination of recruits and their muster-in to the service, General Orders No. 10, paragraph II, is so far modified as to authorize the examination of recruits for companies located in towns where surgeons of the National Guard are stationed, as fast as they are enlisted. Welch, Company A, First Infantry, as recording officer, has been presented and reviewed.
- II. The board was convened under the following orders: Special Orders No. 12.
- I. Lieutenant-Colonel Eugene F. Smith, First Infantry, Captain John Bird, Company H, First Infantry, Captain Calvin W. Brown, Company F, Second Infantry, and Lieutenant Frank B. W. Welch, Company A, First Infantry, who will act as recording officer, are hereby appointed a board of inquiry to examine into the propriety of conduct of Captain Lincoln H. Barney, Company C, First Infantry, and certain enlisted men of his company, under the provisions of Chapter 266, Section 114 of the

Public Laws of 1893, as amended by Chapter 128, Section 15, Public Laws of 1899.

- 2. The board will meet at the armory of Company C, First Infantry, in Auburn, Maine, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of Wednesday, July 12, 1899.
- 3. Captain Lincoln H. Barney, Company C, First Infantry, Sergeant E. Linn Sprague, Corporals Fairfield A. Collins, Morris Read and Fred Sanderson also of Company C, will report to the board at the hour and place named for the inquiry.
 - 4. The board will report promptly with recommendations.
- 5. Transportation will be furnished by the Adjutant-General. An expense account of the actual and necessary expenses of the members of the board will be forwarded to this office through military channels.
 - 6. The board will sit without regard to hours.

The board finds Captain Lincoln H. Barney of C Company, First Regiment Infantry, N. G. S. M., guilty of a laxity in discipline and good order by indirectly countenancing the introduction of intoxicating liquor into the armory of his said company, and it recommends that he be reprimanded in orders, with due consideration of his services in the National Guard and United States Volunteers during the war with Spain. It finds Sergeant E. Linn Sprague, Corporal Fairfield A. Collins, Corporal Morris Read and Corporal Fred Sanderson all of said C Company, First Infantry, guilty of a violation of Section 144 of Article 15 of the Regulations of the National Guard of the State of Maine, by the introduction of intoxicating liquors into the armory of said company. It finds in evidence that the terms of enlistment of Sergeant E. Linn Sprague, Corporal Fairfield A. Collins and Corporal Fred Sanderson had expired prior to the commission of the offense for which they were found guilty. It recommends that if they are still amendable to military law, that they be reduced to the rank of privates and discharged from the service, and they do recommend that Corporal Morris Read be reduced to the rank of a private and discharged from the service.

IV. The proceedings, findings, and the foregoing recommendations of the board are hereby approved.

V. The Commander-in-Chief fully concurs in the opinion of the board as to the great laxity in discipline and good order manifested by Captain Lincoln H. Barney of Company C. First Infantry. The regulations for the National Guard provide explicitly that the commander of troops occupying an armory is responsible for its safety and defenses; for the discipline and efficiency of the troops; that it is his duty to see that laws and regulations are strictly enforced; that the quarters are in proper condition; that they are kept clean and in repair and that nothing but authorized articles are to be kept in the lockers; that armories are to be used only by troops unless special permission is obtained from the Commander-in-Chief, and that gambling or the introduction of intoxicating liquor into the armory is strictly prohibited. By his own evidence Captain Barney

admits permitting this gross violation of the regulations, and thus sets an example of disregard of orders and regulations to the men of his company and the officers and men of the National Guard which is most reprehensible. The Commander-in-Chief therefore severely reprimands Captain Barney of Company C, First Infantry, but as recommended by the board, in consideration of his long service in the National Guard and his patriotism in volunteering on the call of the President, and faithful service done as an officer of the First Maine Volunteer Infantry, he takes no further action in his case.

VI. Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, commanding First Infantry, will relieve Captain Barney from arrest and restore him to duty with his company.

VII. The records of this office show that the terms of enlistment of Sergeant E. Linn Sprague, Corporal Fairfield A. Collins, and Corporal Fred Sanderson expired respectively, June 29, 1899; June 20, 1899; March 30, 1899. These men are therefore not amendable to military law.

VIII. Corporal Morris Read, Company C, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., for gross violation of the regulations of the National Guard and disregard of his responsibility as a non-commissioned officer, in assisting in the introduction of intoxicating liquor into the armory of Campany C, and countenancing its use there, in accordance with the recommendations of the board, is hereby reduced to the rank of a private and discharged from the military service of the State.

I. The report of the proceedings of the Board of Inquiry convened at Portland pusuant to General Orders No. 9, series of 1899, these head-quarters, as modified by Special Orders No. 28, A. G. O., c. s., to examine into the qualifications, efficiency and propriety of conduct of First Lieutenant Clement M. Giveen, Company K, First Infantry; First Lieutenant Stephen L. Foley, Company L. First Infantry; First Lieutenant William D. Whitney, Company A, Second Infantry; Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee, Company L, First Infantry; and Second Lieutenant Harry H. Sawyer, Company A, First Infantry; also to inquire into the propriety of conduct of Privates Alton W. Cliff, Edward C. Bickley and Albert H. Hamilton, all of Company A, First Infantry, and Private Fred H. Coughlin, Company B, Second Infantry, has been presented and reviewed.

II. In the case of Private Fred H. Coughlin, Company B, Second Infantry, who was called and failed to appear, the evidence produced shows that Private Coughlin entered the service April 19, 1898. On May 17, 1898, he was mustered into the United States Volunteers as a private in Battery A, First Battalion Maine Volunteer Artillery, thereby

being on a furlough under General Orders No. 10, A. G. O., c. s. That while the battery was in camp at Augusta, Maine, during September and October, 1898, Private Coughlin after ten days' absence without leave was dropped from the company rolls as a deserter, in accordance with Paragraph 133, U. S. Army Regulations, and failing to join his battery again was entered on the muster out roll as a deserter. Since the muster out of his battery he has not reported for duty with his company. The board recommends that Private Fred H. Coughlin, Company B, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., be dishonorably discharged.

III. In the case of First Lieutenant William D. Whitney, Company A, Second Infantry, who was called and tailed to appear, the evidence shows that Lieutenant Whitney failed to report for duty at the expiration of his leave of absence, May 30, 1899, and up to the present date has failed so to report. The board recommends that First Lieutenant William D. Whitney, Company A, Second Infantry, be discharged without honor.

IV. In the case of First Lieutenant Clement M. Giveen, Company K, First Infantry, the evidence shows that Lieutenant Giveen failed to report for duty at the expiration of the term of leaves of absence and furloughs granted to members of his company by General Orders No. 10, A. G. O., series of 1898, also that he has moved from Brunswick to Lewiston and thus removed himself from the locality in which his company is stationed; the evidence also shows that Lieutenant Giveen, though having been ten years in the service, exhibited great want of knowledge of military law, the rules of service, and the duties of an officer. The board recommends that the commission of First Lieutenant Clement M. Giveen, Company K, First Infantry, be vacated and that in consideration of his past services he be given an honorable discharge.

V. In the case of Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee, Company L, First Infantry, who was called and failed to appear, the evidence shows that the records of the physical examination of officers for the First Maine Volunteer Infantry contains among the records of rejections the following: "Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee, Company L, varicocele, left, disqualifying; under weight; rejected." It also shows that Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee has failed to report for duty with his company since its return from its service in the U. S. Volunteers. The board recommends that Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee, Company L, First Infantry, be discharged from the military service of the State without honor.

VI. In the case of Second Lieutenant Harry H. Sawyer, Company A, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., who was called and failed to appear, the evidence shows that Lieutenant Sawyer's conduct when serving in the First Maine Volunteer Infantry was such that he was asked to resign. It also shows that he has failed to report for duty with his company at the expiration of his leave of absence, May 30, 1899, and that he is still absent without leave. The board recommends that Second Lieutenant Harry H. Sawyer, Company A, First Infantry, be dishonorably discharged.

VII. The cases of Privates Alton W. Cliff, Edward C. Bickley and Albert L. Hamilton, all of Company A, First Infantry, were taken up and considered together. All three of said privates were absent. The evidence shows that these men deserted from the company while in the

United States Volunteer Army and have not since reported for duty. The board recommends that Privates Alton W. Cliff, Edward C. Bickley and Albert L. Hamilton, all of Company A, First Infantry, be dishonorably discharged from the National Guard of the State of Maine.

VIII. In the case of First Lieutenant Stephen L. Foley, Company L, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., who was called and appeared before the board, the evidence shows that Lieutenant Foley was rejected by the board of examining surgeons when appointed to the position of first lieutenant in the volunteer army upon the call of the President for troops during the war with Spain; that his disqualifications were of such a nature that he could not readily recover from them. The proceedings further indicate that as an officer of the National Guard his service had not been prompt. In the face of this evidence and of the fact that the Regulations for the National Guard provide that an officer must be physically qualified for military service, acceptance or non-acceptance into the United States service being supposed good evidence, the board recommends that First Lieutenant Stephen L. Foley, Company L, First Infantry. N. G. S. M., be retained in the service, from which opinion Major Collins dissents. He recommends that the commission of First Lieutenant Stephen L. Foley, Company L, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., be vacated and that in consideration of his past services he be granted an honorable discharge.

IX. The proceedings, findings and recommendations of the board in the cases of Private Fred B. Coughlin, Company B, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M.; First Lieutenant William D. Whitney, Company A, Second Infantry; First Lieutenant Clement M. Giveen, Company K, First Infantry; Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee, Company L, First Infantry; Second Lieutenant Harry H. Sawyer, Company A, First Infantry; Privates Alton W. Cliff, Edward C. Bickley and Albert L. Hamilton, all of Company A, First Infantry, are hereby approved.

X. The proceedings and findings in the case of First Lieutenant Stephen L. Foley, Company L. First Infantry, being contrary to the evidence produced, are, together with the recommendations of the board in this case, disapproved, and Lieutenant Foley is held to appear before a board later.

XI. In accordance with the recommendations of the board, First Lieutenant Clement M. Giveen, Company K, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., is hereby honorably discharged from the service of the National Guard of the State of Maine. First Lieutenant William D. Whitney, Company A, Second Infantry, is hereby discharged from the National Guard of the State of Maine, without honor. Second Lieutenant Martin J. Lee, Company L., First Infantry, is hereby discharged from the service of the National Guard of the State of Maine, without honor. Second Lieutenant Harry H. Sawyer is hereby dishonorably discharged from the National Guard of the State of Maine. Privates Fred H. Coughlin, Company B, Second Infantry; Alton W. Cliff, Edward C. Bickley and Albert L. Hamilton, all of Company A, First Infantry, are hereby dishonorably discharged from the National Guard of the State of Maine.

XII. The Board of Inquiry convened under G. O. No. 9, A. G. O., c. s., is hereby dissolved.

Circular, No. 1.

Regimental commanders will impress upon company commanders the necessity of calling the attention of the members of their companies to the provisions of all orders issued.

From information received through the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice it is feared that during the confusion of filling the companies to their complement this may not in all cases have been done. Special attention should be given at this time to the regulations and requirements of orders in relation to rifle practice. The season is now far advanced and no time should be lost in getting all practice possible, having in view the qualifying of men as soon as they are considered sufficiently instructed to attempt making qualifying scores.

This department is anxious to have as good a record made this season as circumstances will permit and will afford all the aid it can to secure a creditable result.

The shells from fixed ammunition must be saved and used for reloading. Not more than sixty grains of powder ought to be used in reloading. If the commanders would so arrange for the preservation of shells that a shell might always be used in the same rifle, there would be less difficulty in having reloaded ammunition fit the chambers of the rifles. The chambers of the rifles are not all alike, and for this reason shells are sometimes so enlarged when fired from one rifle that they will not fit another.

Newcomb, Second Infantry, and Second Lieutenant Howard Brett, Company G, Second Infantry, as recording officer, are hereby constituted a board of inquiry, under provisions of Chapter 266, Section 114, Public Laws of 1893, as amended by Chapter 128, Section 15, Public Laws of 1899, to examine into the efficiency of Harold S. Boardman, Company G, Second Infantry, in regard to the loss of certain military property transferred to him, it appearing from his reports that certain of the military property for which he was accountable has been lost from the armory of Company G.
- 2. That Board will meet at the armory in Bangor at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of July 26, 1899.
- 3. The board will sit without regard to hours and report with recommendations.
- 4. Transportation will be furnished by the Adjutant-General. Expense accounts of the actual and necessary expenses of the members of the board and Captain Boardman will be forwarded to this office through military channels.

The board finds that while Captain Boardman employed the usual precaution taken by company commanders for the care of their property up to the time when he had reason to believe uniforms were being removed from the armory without his consent, his failure to take a full account of all property for which he was responsible upon his return from camp, and later when members of his command were enlisting in the regular army and volunteers, his neglect to verify the property account, together with his continued absence from the drill meetings of Company G from August 28, 1898, to May I, 1899, except on the evening of September 22, indicate an indifference to the affairs and success of his company, gross carelessness and disregard for the safety of much valuable property of the State that had been entrusted to his care, incompatible with a deep sense of the responsibility devolving upon him as a company commander and that he failed to perform the full measure of duty that was due from him as such. The board would recommend that Captain Boardman's resignation be accepted and that he be discharged.

- IV. The proceedings, findings and recommendations of the board are hereby approved.
- V. The Commander-in-Chief fully concurs in the opinion of the board as to the indifference and carelessness of Captain Boardman and his disregard for the safety of much valuable property that had been entrusted to his care.
- VI. The Paymaster-General in making settlement with Captain Boardman for the sum due him for care and responsibility of property, as authorized by Chapter 266, Public Laws of 1893, as amended by Chapter 128, Public Laws of 1899, will deduct from any sum which may be due him, the value of the property lost through carelessness or inattention.

VII. The resignation of Captain Harold S. Boardman, Company G, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., is hereby accepted and he is discharged from the military service of the State of Maine.

VIII. The board of inquiry convened under S. O. No. 23, A. G. O., c. s., is hereby dissolved.

General Orders, No. 15.

I. During the season of 1899, commanding officers of companies will, under orders of their Colonels, conduct practice for qualification in their own commands.

II. On recommendation of Col. E. C. Farrington, Inspector General of Rifle Practice; Col. Lucius H. Kendall, Com'd'g 1st Infantry; Col. Everard E. Newcomb, Com'd'g 2nd Infantry and Capt. G. W. Butler, Com'd'g Signal Corps, as provided by the Regulations for the National Guard, the following rules to govern practice for qualification for the different classes of marksmanship in the National Guard of Maine, for the year 1899, having been approved by the Commander-in-Chief, are published for the information and guidance of the National Guard.

The period for qualification practice is the months of September and October.

The commander of each company shall have charge of all company qualifications laid down in the "Regulations for Small Arms Practice."

He shall make return to the Inspector General of Rifle Practice and to the regimental inspector of rifle practice upon blanks provided for that purpose, and shall certify that the qualifications were made as provided in the Regulations and rules herein laid down.

The qualification practice of any officer of the Guard not enrolled in company organizations, having received permission to practice, as provided in paragraph 262 of the Regulations, shall be as may be prescribed by the Inspector General of Rifle Practice and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

When any company commander selects a day or days within the period determined upon by the officers mentioned in paragraph 258 of the Regulations for the National Guard for practice, the colonel commanding the regiment in which the company is, shall detail a non-commissioned officer from some other company conveniently near, to supervise the marking during the qualification practice.

The officer, before commencing such company practice, shall see that the targets, danger flags, marking disks, etc., are in order and that a danger flag is displayed at the target pit and at the firing point.

He shall see that the non-commissioned officer detailed by the Colonel to supervise the marking takes his place in the pit with the markers, and that he is provided with score cards with the names of those who are to practice for qualification, and in the order of their firing, and that he is instructed to observe the hits of all shots and see that the markers give the proper signal showing the value of the shot, being particular that the center of the marking disk is put as near as it can conveniently be over the bullet hole in the target.

The supervisor shall enter the value of each and every hit against the name of the one firing, as appears on his score card.

The officer in charge shall detail two of his company to act as markers during the practice, and make such changes from time to time as he thinks proper.

He shall also detail a member of his company to act as scorer, and make such changes in scores as he deems advisable, provided no change is made which can be avoided until those whose names are upon the score card have finished their firings.

No sighting shots will be allowed at any of the ranges.

When the commanding officer is ready to commence practice, he shall have the danger flag at the target removed, place at the firing point two competitors who shall fire alternately, the odd number of the pair being on the right and firing first. This order of firing must be adhered to, unless prevented by some accident, and in case any change is made the supervisor of marking must be so informed and his score card changed accordingly.

The supervisor and markers must not expose themselves at the pit, until they turn the target down and expose the danger flag.

The supervisor in deciding doubtful hits will give careful attention as to whether the edge of the bull's eye or lines are touched by the bullet, and if so the shot shall be counted as having hit the bull's eye or lines and give it the larger score accordingly.

After a shot has been scored there can be no change made in the score, unless the officer in charge has good reason to *know* that an error has been made in marking, and if such change is made the supervisor must be notified and his score changed accordingly.

If it is evident to the officer in charge or the supervisor that a hit was made from a bullet which had struck the ground before hitting the target, it must be scored a "miss."

The scorer shall sit close to and at one side of the firing point and shall closely observe the marker's signals; call the score and the name of the competitor making it, and then enter it upon his score card.

No two competitors shall shoot with the same rifle, nor shall a rifle be changed after a score has been commenced, unless the rifle has been disabled by accident.

The cleaning of rifles not allowed, except between ranges, which may then be done if desired.

Officers and men shall wear their prescribed fatigue uniform and belt, and a campaign hat as permitted by General Orders, No. 10, paragraph III, c. s.

If the practice is over more than one range, the shortest will be used first and the longest last.

No coaching is to be allowed nor shall the officer in charge allow any person other than himself, the scorer and the two competitors nearer than ten yards of the firing point, nor shall any one be permitted to interfere in any way with the competitors or give advice as to anything pertaining to the shooting, nor disturb the competitors by loud talk while the men are at the firing point.

Whenever the day is selected the competition must then take place, unless prevented by rain sufficient to make marking impracticable, but the officer may delay firing until after the rain ceases, but for no other reason shall the practice be delayed.

If from any cause the target is removed just as the competitor makes a shot, he shall be given another shot, but no claim as to poor cartridges or any other reason be considered for giving another shot when one has been made.

Only one practice for qualification for each member of a company will be allowed during the season, but if all the members of a company who are entitled to such practice in the two days mentioned in the Regulations have not had an opportunity to do so, the commanding officer of any company may notify the Inspector General of Rifle Practice of the fact and he shall submit the matter of further practice to the Commander-in-Chief and be governed by his decision.

The score cards of the scorer and supervisor shall be preserved, those of the supervisor to be sent to the Inspector General of Rifle Practice immediately after the completion of the practice, and those of the scorer placed on file by the officer in charge.

The officer in charge may test the pull of any rifle and it shall be his duty to do so if asked or if he has reason to think that it is below six pounds, and he shall not allow any soldier to use any rifle the pull of which is less than six pounds.

Any rule laid down in Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations, governing rifle practice not herein specified will govern in any case which is not covered by these rules.

The Signal Corps will be governed by the same rules as are herein laid down for company organizations.
