

#### REPORT OF THE COMMISSARY-GENERAL.

STATE OF MAINE, COMMISSARY GENERAL'S OFFICE, BANGOR, ME., December 15, 1901.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, Augusta, Me.:

Sir:—I have the honor to submit my annual report as commissary-general for the year ending December 15, 1901:

Acting under the authority given me by section 7 of General Orders No. 19, I purchased the subsistence supplies for the annual encampment which was held at Camp Hill between August 10-23, 1901.

I attended the encampment, provided for the proper issue of the rations, and at its close approved the bills therefor and transmitted them to your office for payment. Using the ration sheet furnished by your office which gave in detail the articles of food to be issued for each meal during the encampment and the table of quantities given in section 496 of Regulations for the National Guard, I determined the quantities of the various articles of food that would be required. Upon these estimates bids were received and contracts were awarded. The supplies furnished by the contractors were carefully inspected, and were found to be of proper quality and amount.

The ration sheet as set forth in section 496 of Regulations for the National Guard, although based upon U. S. army ration, provides for a larger issue to our guard than to the regular army, and certain articles of food are given to them that the U. S. troops do not receive. During the encampment it was necessary to issue to the troops a ration larger even than was provided for in our ration sheet, and at its close I found our issue

had exceeded the amount that would have been issued to the same number of men in the U. S. army twenty-seven per cent (27%).

I have prepared a table (Table A) setting forth in detail on some of the principal articles of food, our average issue per man. The amount actually issued to our troops, the U. S. army rations, the amount U. S. troops would receive under same conditions, and exhibiting the ratio that actually existed between the two issues, and for your further information I have included the table in my report:

Under the provisions of the Maine Militia Law, the Regulations of the National Guard and the orders received from your office, it was clearly my duty to provide for the men food of proper quality and of sufficient amount so that during the period of the encampment they might at all times be fit for duty, and at its close return to their homes in good physical condition, and I did not consider myself bound by the exact provisions of the ration table contained in section 496 of Regulations for the National Guard which is prepared for an extended tour of duty, but made the issue at all times sufficient for the wants of the troops.

I believe the circumstances of the annual encampment are in the main responsible for the over-issue which is required. The men come into camp hungry; while there, fellowship, drill and the outdoor life of the camp tend to give to them a temporarily increased appetite, and they require a larger ration issue than would be needed during a long encampment.

In support of this explanation I have the honor to refer you to the report of Capt. C. G. Morton, 6th U. S. Infantry, made October 2, 1897, to the war department at Washington:

"STATEMENT OF THE CONDITION OF THE NATIONAL GUARD OF MAINE IN 1897."

Sect. 23. Subsistence—Rations—Component Parts of. How Furnished. How Prepared.

The ration is calculated from the U. S. army ration, an estimated per cent being added to allow for the hungry condition of men brought into camp for a short tour of duty. On the first day of camp the addition on some articles of the ration was as high as 20%; later in the week this percentage was much reduced. In some articles the government ration was nearly sufficient \* \* \* \*

There is a certain unavoidable waste during the short encampment due to the fact that at its commencement there is nothing on hand—every receptacle for food is empty—while at its close a certain residue is left unused in the company cookhouses.

These reasons, however, did not seem to me sufficient to account for all the excess of rations required, and I arranged to issue the rations to the different units of organizations so that the value of the rations consumed by each could be determined. During the encampment I made a daily inspection of the cookhouses for the purpose of determining how the rations were cared for after issue, what issues were found of the greatest value, how economically the food was cooked, to receive and investigate any complaint about quality, and to observe general conditions. The record of these inspections are on file for your information.

I regret that I am obliged to report to you, that I observed during the progress of the encampment instances where some of the excess of rations required was due to causes directly attributable to the men themselves and to an extent within the control of the company officers. In certain companies; I found that there were hangers-on who ate at the company mess; that the cooks

did not prepare the food with economy; that the rations were not cared for properly after issue; and that little effort was made to preserve surplus of any given ration so as to, by computation of its value, receive in its place some other issue.

As all the companies came into camp under similar conditions, the difference in cost per man between the companies as it appears in Table B which follows, must in a fair measure represent the difference in the efficiency of the commissaries of the different companies. For example, Company D of the First Regiment drew rations to the amount of \$2.47 per man during the six days of the encampment; while Company L of the same regiment drew rations to the amount of only \$2.12—a difference of 35 cents per man for the six days.

How much this amounts to will be apparent when you observe that it makes Company D cost 16 per cent more than Company L, and that the cost to the State of the supplies furnished the number of men actually in camp, for the period of the encampment, on the basis of Company D, would be \$420.70 more than they would be on the basis of Company L.

In Table B which follows, I have given in detail the cost of rations furnished each company, the average daily strength of each company, the cost for the period of encampment, (six days) and the cost per day per man.

Mess at Headquarters and Ambulance Corps continued through the encampment of both regiments so that the total cost to them represents a period for the Ambulance Corps of thirteen days, and for Headquarters mess of fourteen days.

I believe that the existing conditions can be to some extent remedied, and I respectfully recommend to you the issuance of an order calculated to correct these abuses. I also recommend the preparation of a new ration sheet for the next encampment, the elimination of certain rations that experience has shown are not desired by the men or of as much value as other issues which could be substituted would be.

I have prepared a table (Table C) showing in the customary units of measurement the total issue of certain principal articles of food during the encampment.

I purchased for the encampment subsistence to the amount of \$3,712.37. Of this amount \$3,175.68 was paid for food for the troops, \$114.49 for hay and grain for the horses, and \$422.20 for the wood, coal, water and ice used at Camp Hill.

The rations issued to the First Regiment cost \$1,404.85. The rations issued to the Second Regiment cost \$1,354.69.

In the balance sheet of my accounts which follows (Table D) I exhibit you in detail amounts paid to each of the contractors and the value of the subsistence issued to each unit of organiza-In order to obtain these figures I opened a subsistence account to which I charged each article purchased at its cost. As the rations were issued I credited them to subsistence account at cost, and charged them to the organization receiving them, at At the close of the encampment my charges to the several organizations amounted to \$3,684.74, a sum just \$27.63 less than the value of the supplies furnished. This sum (\$27.63) represents, therefore, the wasteage of supplies in my department, the loss in issue—and it arose from waste in handling the supplies and from the small residue of articles that were left in the department storehouse unissued at the close of the encampment. may be possible to reduce this amount, but a certain loss is unavoidable, and as this waste is less than (.003/4) 3/4 of I % of the amount of the supplies handled by the department, it will

Lewiston, December 16, 1901.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year ending December 15, 1901.

In accordance with requirements of the Militia Law, and in compliance with G. O., No. 3, c. s., I have inspected all of the companies in the National Guard of the State of Maine, with the exception of Company G of the Second Regiment, whose armory was burned on the very day I was to hold the inspection.

The Guard is organized for purposes of administration and drill into two regiments of Infantry, one division of Naval Reserve, one Signal Corps and one Ambulance Corps.

Each regiment has a band enlisted, consisting of 25 good men who furnish their own uniforms and instruments.

Each band provides its own armory, but the State pays one hundred dollars to each toward the rent.

## INSPECTIONS.

I have inspected each company and corps of the National Guard of the State of Maine at its home station, and submitted at the time a detailed report of its condition and of all United States and State property in the possession of each organization in the service.

I submit the standing of each as to attendance. First Regiment, table marked "Schedule A." Second Regiment, table marked "Schedule B." Naval Reserves, table marked "Schedule C." Signal Corps, table marked "Schedule D." Ambulance Corps, table marked "Schedule E.'

## STRENGTH.

There are serving in the active militia of the state, known as the National Guard of the State of Maine, 116 officers and 1,094 enlisted men as follows:

I have visited and carefully inspected every company in the State. I have pointed out many mistakes in the drill and ceremonies and have always found the officers and men ready and anxious to benefit by any correction or suggestion which I saw fit to make. I find the best companies where the officers take the most pains and insist on strict military discipline from all enlisted men as soon as they enter the armory.

The men themselves like it much better than to have things on the easy, go-as-you-please plan.

I would suggest to every captain that he should be as strict and have the same military bearing if he has only twenty men present, as he would if he had a full company, and was escorting the colors on Governor's Day. It would make it much easier for him and a great deal better for the men.

A captain must vary his drills, and keep his men interested, have something new for them every drill if possible. He must be very thorough in everything he does, and have his men know it, and know that they know it, before going ahead with anything else.

### MILITARY KNOWLEDGE.

During my inspections I have had a good chance to observe to what extent officers are qualified for the commissions which they hold, and I am glad to report that in most cases I have found the officers well qualified. There are a few cases where officers have a suitable knowledge but lack tact in handling their companies.

During my tour of inspection I have always found the officers and men in the armory, ready for the ceremonies.

The officers of the National Guard of Maine are a fine body of men, as a whole. While there is always a chance to improve, as in other walks of life, the citizen soldier of Maine is a credit to the state.

For a detailed report of the condition of each company in the service, I would respectfully call your attention to my report made at the time of my inspection.

### ARMORIES.

The condition of this very important part of the service is improved a little over one year ago. The city of Lewiston has made quite an improvement in the armory, by putting in four water closets and adding four more rooms to what they already had. Company F, Second Infantry, has improved its armory by the addition of rooms for officers and non-commissioned officers, with a prospect of enlarging the drill hall in the future. Company K of the Second also has moved to better quarters, but the drill hall is too small for any movements but squad drills. The drill hall of the armory of Company M of the First Infantry is not conveniently arranged, as there is a row of posts in the center. The condition of the other armories is the same as last year.

The cities and towns should take pride in seeing that their companies have good, comfortable quarters for officers and men, and make them feel that they are appreciated, for there is nothing that helps a captain to keep up the interest in his company like the moral support of the citizens of the town where it is located.

#### MILITARY COURTESY.

Military courtesy is indispensable to good discipline, and the officers and men of the Guard of Maine attend to that duty very well. Each year sees many new men in the ranks, and they do not always think to properly salute, but after their attention is called to the error, and they have been corrected once, they are very careful not to make the mistake again, which speaks well for the kind of material of which the National Guard of the State of Maine is composed.

There seems to be in the breast of every well developed man a spirit of patriotism and a love for martial order which has only to be cultivated to develop the most valuable adjunct of our civil liberties, the American volunteer soldier.

#### RIFLE SHOOTING.

This branch of the service has always been a credit to the State. The interest taken by the officers and men for so many years has placed the Guard of Maine in the front rank. Colonel Farrington, who for so many years did so much for the Guard in the way of rifle shooting, and who is entitled to a great deal of credit for his careful and painstaking work, is ably seconded by his successor, Colonel Elliott C. Dill, who does not leave any thing undone that will benefit this branch of the service in which he is so much interested.

#### ENLISTMENTS.

The class of young men who are applying for enlistment is of a better quality as a whole than in former years, consequently the personnel is improving each year. There is a disposition on the part of those high in authority to recognize the worth of the men in the service, and to give them the preference, as a rule, when there is a chance for promotion, which is as it should be for if they feel that the State appreciates their efforts, it is an incentive for them to work hard and faithfully when they feel that honest efforts will be rewarded.

#### ENCAMPMENT.

In compliance with G. O. No. 19, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s. the Second Regiment of Infantry, Colonel Everard E. Newcomb commanding, reported for duty at Camp Hill, Augusta, August 10, 1901. Companies B, C, D, and K arrived at the depot at Augusta at 3.15 P. M., followed by Company A on the Dummy from Gardiner. The troop train from the East was late, as usual, and did not arrive until 5.10 P. M. The regiment was quickly formed, and marched to camp by State street and Western avenue. They were received by Major-General John T. Richards, Adjutant-General. The guard details were marched to camp in advance, and were walking their posts when the regiment came in.

The State flag was run up for the first time Saturday, August 10th.

The companies came in with full ranks, with the exception of Company M of Machias. There was a combination of circumstances which accounted for the small company which reported.

Sunday morning the surgeons reported no sickness in camp, and the men took up their duties in earnest. At 2 o'clock P. M. the chaplain conducted divine services in front of State head-quarters, which was well attended by officers and men, who listened to a very instructive sermon.

At 4.30 P. M., first guard mount, there were many things to criticise, as must be expected when the regiment is together only once a year.

Monday morning, August 12th. Battalion drill in forenoon and afternoon. The Companies worked hard to improve themselves, and the results will show later. The company team matches were shot off in the morning and some very good scores were made. The guard mount was an improvement over Sunday, as was also the evening parade. The marching in review was very good.

Tuesday. The Second and Third Battalions were drilled by Captains. The regimental drill under Lieutenant-Colonel York during a part of the forenoon was very good.

Wednesday. The regimental drill by Colonel Newcomb was very good. The guard mount was the best that had been on thus far. The dress parade was fine.

Thursday. The detail for the colors did not report in season. I was obliged to send an orderly for the detail for firing the morning gun. There seemed to be a laxity on the part of the officer whose duty it was to see that this important duty was discharged on time. At one o'clock P. M., Major Cummings marched his battalion to the State House to receive his Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief, and escort him to the camp, where he was officially received with a salute of seventeen guns.

The First and Third Battalions were drawn up in line to receive him.

At 3 P. M., Colonel Newcomb formed his regiment for review. The Governor and Staff, accompanied by Colonel Newcomb and Staff, rode around the regiment, after which his Excellency took his position at the reviewing point and the colonel marched his regiment past. They made a fine appearance, and the colonel was complimented by the Governor, who expressed himself as well pleased with the evolutions of the regiment and the fine appearance of officers and men.

Friday. The regiment broke camp at 9 o'clock A. M., and marched to the State House, and inaugurated the beautiful custom of saluting the old battle flags in the rotunda, which were carried by their fathers in the War of the Rebellion. The regiment then formed and acted as escort to Trinity Commandery Knights Templar, and visiting commanderies from Bath and Montreal. The companies then embarked for their home stations, feeling that they had spent a profitable week in the State's service.

While the weather was more or less rainy, the regiment did not lose a single drill. The health of the men was very good. No sickness in camp of any account. One man from Company I, of Eastport, had typhoid fever when he came to camp. The surgeons sent him home in charge of a detail of men from the Ambulance Corps, and everything possible was done for his comfort.

The policing of the camp was well done. The only duty that was open to criticism was guard duty. The men on post either did not know their duty or were afraid to discharge it.

On the whole, the Second Regiment is a good one, with bright, painstaking officers who try to do the best with what time they have for the service.

On August 17th, the First Regiment, Colonel Lucius H. Kendall commanding, arrived in Augusta, at 4.30 P. M. The regiment was quickly formed and on its way to the camp, a little delay was caused by not being able to get the horses unloaded promptly. As was the case with the Second, the guard details were sent to camp ahead of the Regiment, which arrived in camp at 6 o'clock. The majors dismissed their battalions opposite their company streets, and the men were soon under canvas and happy.

Saturday night the men were a little noisy, and gave the commander of the guard considerable trouble. Several men were put in the guard house.

Sunday morning at the first guard mount of the regiment, the details did not do very well in marching on to the line. The sergeants were not well posted on their duties. At 2.30 P. M., Colonel Kendall marched his command over to the State head-quarters, where Chaplain Cummings preached a very able sermon. Guard duty was very well done.

Monday was devoted to battalion drill. The majors gave good instruction, and kept at a movement until the companies could execute it properly. The parade was very good and snappy.

Guard duty being well done as a whole, the sergeant of the guard failed to make the proper entries in his guard report book.

On Wednesday the regular routine of camp was performed in the forenoon. In the afternoon blank ammunition was issued and a miniature battle was fought, which was enjoyed by the visitors in camp.

On Thursday, Governor's Day, the weather was perfect. At I o'clock P. M. the entire regiment marched to the State House to receive the Commander-in-Chief and escort him to camp. The usual salute was fired. At three P. M. the Commander-in-Chief reviewed his troops and was well pleased with their appearance.

The Governor presented the winning teams and individuals with the trophies they had won at the range and at the armory inspections.

A new feature was introduced in the way of athletic sports which were well enjoyed by all present.

In conclusion, I have only to say that the officers all realize that it is only by hard work and continually keeping at it that we can keep our Guard up to the high standard that every officer feels he would like to see maintained.

I think it would be for the interest of the service to hold two inspections at the armories, each year, and look closer after the wants of the service, as we are anxious to get the very best results for the time and money expended.

## REPORT OF SURGEON GENERAL.

BANGOR, MAINE, January 1, 1902.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General.

Sir: In accordance with the law governing the militia of Maine, I have the honor to present my report as surgeon-general for the past year.

There have been no changes in the personnel of the surgical staff of the First or Second Regiments.

Second Lieutenant Warren E. Riker's, commandant of the Ambulance Corps, resignation was accepted July 17, 1901. On November 6th, 1901, Second Lieutenant C. A. Jumper was commissioned as commandant of the Ambulance Corps.

I wish to commend to you Major Bradbury, Captain O'Neill and First Lieutenant Elliott of the First Regiment, and Major Fuller, Captain Hill and First Lieutenant Chandler of the Second Regiment, for their valuable assistance during encampment, as well as for their obedient, courteous and faithful service. The State may well be congratulated that men of such ability as are its medical officers are willing to devote their time and attention to the needs of the service.

During the encampment of 1901 an unusually small number of patients were reported for treatment from the field hospital. The prevailing sickness consisted of indigestion and resulting diarrhoea; the leading causes were due almost wholly to indiscretion in eating and drinking.

The company commanders appeared to have better control over the indulgency of excesses among their men than previous years.

The cook-houses and mess-houses were kept very clean and the food was well-cooked and well-served throughout the camp. The sanitary arrangements were of the best. Too great care cannot be exercised in regard to vaccination, and I recommend that each surgeon be ordered to pay particular notice to enlisted men, and that they be provided with the necessary appliances to meet all requirements.

I wish to call attention to the need of regulation field bath tubs, equipment for the ambulance corps' pouches, of more improved appliances and instruments, also a well-lighted operating room, so that this department may be able to fulfill the demands made upon it. Want of sufficient appropriation is the ever-ready excuse.

I believe that each year one member of the surgical staff should be ordered to attend the annual meeting of the Association of Military Surgeons, as great benefit may be derived from these gatherings, regarding the proper discharge of the varied duties of the surgeons of the National Guard; the papers and discussions offering instructions of untold value to those present.

I wish here to make emphatic my idea in regard to the examination of surgeons for the service. It appeals to me that a Board composed of retired medical officers be appointed for the purpose of conducting examinations of the surgeons in question.

If the Ambulance Corps is to be continued, one of the regimental surgeons should be ordered to meet the corps at various times during the year so that they may receive special instruction in the method of caring for wounded, their transportation and methods of instruction in the first aid.

There is a fair supply of medicine and surgical appliances on hand, and under separate cover I have forwarded to the Adjutant General a complete inventory of all property contained in the hospital at the close of the encampment.

I wish to thank the medical officers for the uniform and cordial support which they have always given me, and for the readiness with which they have followed my suggestions made for the benefit of the service.

To former Adjutant General Richards my thanks are due for the assistance that he was ever ready to render me.

I wish to thank General Farnham, Adjutant General, for his kindness and courtesy.

And to His Excellency, John F. Hill, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, I am indebted for the interest he has manifested in the details, as well as the general work, of the department.

# REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

Office of the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice.
Augusta, December 15, 1901.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, State of Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of rifle practice in the National Guard, State of Maine, for the year ending October 31, 1901:

The year's work may on the whole be regarded as very satisfactory though I feel assured that another twelve-month will find the standard considerably raised. Like the year preceding, the work was somewhat experimental. The rules of 1900 were modified in many respects and they have been watched throughout the year to see wherein they have failed to meet the require-While not at all times satisfactory, these rules have proven much better adapted to the needs of the Guard than the rules adopted just prior to the Spanish War, and under which practice was conducted last year. The National Guard being made up of men who render gratuitous service to the State for all save five days, during encampment, the State cannot make undue demand on the time of these men for rifle shooting. For this reason, the attempt to get all the men of a company on the range in one day or two days proved a failure. In the Guard men have to take time for range work so that it will not interfere with their daily avocations. Where one man can use the early hours of the day, another must then be at his work and where a third can get away for a couple of hours at noon, the man he covers in his set of fours finds that his busiest time in the day. It was with full appreciation of this that the rules were changed, making it possible for a soldier to qualify at any time during the season, the only stipulation being that a commissioned officer should be present and certify the scores. Whether further changes will be necessary can better be told at the end of another season's trial. The rules have apparently worked well enough to justify the belief that if more thoroughly understood they would secure the desired results. If company commanders will bear in mind that the whole season is open for qualification and not put off till the closing months their final qualification practice, it will be found that the reports to this office will be much Some men have spare time for range work in the spring who find it impossible to get practice in the fall. The spring is, therefore, the time to cultivate these men and a little thought along these lines will add greatly to the strength of any organization.

With few exceptions, the various organizations have shown increasing interest in rifle shooting and have expended much more ammunition than in any year since the routine of the Guard was interrupted by the Spanish War. This augurs well for another year and gives those who are laboring for the upbuilding of a high standard encouragement to use added energy.

The detailed statement will show the weaker places and indicate where there is greatest need of a rifle revival.

## THE YEAR'S WORK IN BRIEF.

# First Infantry.

The First Infantry, with the exception of one or two companies, has done very satisfactory work the past year, and, with the machinery well in motion, should show even better results another season. Col. Lucius H. Kendall, commanding the regiment, has evinced much interest in rifle shooting. In Lieut. John J. Dooley the regiment has an inspector of rifle practice who has spared neither time nor energy and his exceptional executive ability has done much to raise the standard of rifle shooting in the First. The regiment expended 46,064 rounds of ammunition, as against 31,015 the previous year.

Co. A, Portland, expended 2,335 rounds of ammunition and are exhibiting an increased interest which leads me to hope for a very much better showing on the range next year. Capt. Burton E. Kennard, who was commissioned captain March 19, 1901, is an officer who strives to place his company among the first and he has the aid of two energetic lieutenants. I feel sure that another year will see Co. A striving for new laurels. Corp. George B. Sawyer, the company inspector, saw much active service in the engineer corps of the regular army during the Spanish War and is enthusiastic in his company work. Twelve men qualified as marksmen; two as first-class marksmen, and one as distinguished sharpshooter. All three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. B, Portland, expended 5,170 rounds of ammunition and as usual takes rank among the leading companies of the regiment in general range efficiency. Capt. R. C. Parker is a leader among his men in this important part of National Guard duty and has had the added advantage of good company inspectors. April 17, 1901, Sergt. Ralph C. Purinton, having been commissioned battalion adjutant, gave up his work as company inspector, but he left it in good hands. Sergt. W. L. Hatch, who took up the duties of that important detail, has done good service to his company and the State. The company qualified eleven men as marksmen; one as first-class marksman; eight as sharpshooters and one as distinguished sharpshooter. Capt. Parker and Lieut. W. H. Jenks qualified with the revolver.

Co. C, Auburn, expended 3,250 rounds of ammunition and did a fairly good season's preliminary practice, but not so many succeeded in qualifying as the nearness of the range to the armory would seem to justify. There is every reason to expect the best of work from the Auburn company another year. Capt. Watson set his men an excellent example of industry on the range. Eight men qualified as marksmen; one as sharpshooter and two as distinguished sharpshooters. All three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. D, Norway, expended 3,389 rounds of ammunition, and while his work kept Capt. J. W. Nash away from his command much of the season, the company did very good work. Captain Nash himself is a good rifleman and he has excellent assistance

in the person of Sergt. S. S. Maxim, the company inspector. The company qualified eleven men as marksmen; eight as first-class marksmen, four as sharpshooters and two distinguished sharpshooters. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. E, Portland, expended more ammunition than any other Portland company and in this respect was led by only one company in the regiment, Co. M of Westbrook. Co. E expended 7,240 rounds. Sergt. D. A. Kaler, the company inspector, worked faithfully for the upbuilding of his company's record and was on the range early and late. His enthusiasm kept his company interested and his example is one to be emulated by other company inspectors. Twenty-one men qualified as marksmen; five as sharpshooters and five as distinguished sharpshooters.

Co. F, Augusta, expended 4,350 rounds of ammunition. The company made an excellent showing, despite the fact that for nearly the entire season the company inspector, Sergt. F. P. Lovejoy, was absent from the State. Capt. D. W. Lovejoy and Lieutenant C. M. Whitten are both excellent riflemen and their proficiency has stimulated work on the range and largely helped to fill the place of the company inspector. Twenty-seven men qualified as marksmen; one as first-class marksman and three as distinguished sharpshooters. All three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. G, Biddeford, has passed through another season of comparative inactivity on the range, but 810 rounds of ammunition being returned as expended. An early start on the range the coming season would give rifle shooting an impetus which would be felt throughout the year. One man qualified as marksman and five as first-class marksmen.

Co. H, Rockland, has not given the account of itself on the range which was to be expected from an organization with such convenient range facilities. The company possesses many good riflemen and united effort would soon bring the company to the position in the regiment which it should hold. Very few attempted qualification. The company expended but 335 rounds of ammunition.

Co. I, Lewiston, has had a most gratifying revival of interest in rifle shooting and this year expended 1,540 rounds of ammunition as against 250 last season. The company officers, together

with Sergt. T. E. Crane, company inspector, are to be commended for their work on the range, and for their example to the rest of the company. With proper range facilities for the Lewiston companies I think the three organizations would push on to wonderfully better achievements. Three men qualified as marksmen and five as distinguished sharpshooters. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. K, Brunswick, has one of the best ranges in the State and has produced many good riflemen. Capt. William C. Goodwin is a rifleman of long experience and high standing and in the person of Lieut. T. T. Rideout he has had a faithful and efficient company inspector. The company expended 5,755 rounds of ammunition to most excellent advantage, the scores showing an unusually high average for the season. Twenty-six members qualified as marksmen; two as first-class marksmen and four as distinguished sharpshooters.

Co. L, Portland, has shown marked increase in range activity during the year and the cards show 3,840 rounds of ammunition expended as against 930 last year. Capt. M. E. Conley has at all times encouraged his men and with more attention to holding and snapping in armory work and careful instruction on the range, the company will make greater improvement. Nineteen men qualified as marksmen and three as first-class marksmen.

Co. M, Westbrook, under the able leadership of Capt. J. W. Graham, seconded by Sergt. Geo. H. Leighton, company inspector, did work on which the members thereof may look with pride. The company expended 7,465 rounds of ammunition and qualified twenty-one men as marksmen; three as first-class marksmen and four as distinguished sharpshooters. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

# Second Infantry.

While in some companies the regiment has set a fast pace, there are other companies which have been lagging in the procession. To quite an extent I attribute this to the lack of regimental inspection consequent upon the loss of Lieut. Olin M. Smith, who gave up the post of regimental inspector of rifle practice to accept a battalion adjutancy, the office of inspector dying with his vacation thereof. It is my desire to overcome this difficulty by securing the detail of an efficient officer as acting inspector of rifle practice, feeling sure that the various companies would appreciate his support and assistance. Several things have militated against a good season's work in the Second but Col. E. E. Newcomb is too good a rifleman himself to underestimate the value of target work and next year will tell a different story.

Co. A, Gardiner, is at last ready for good work on the range, thanks to the individual work of Capt. F. B. Thompson. Capt. Thompson has been endeavoring to secure proper range facilities ever since he took command of the company and he has finally succeeded. Through the effort of those interested in military affairs in the city, the city government was induced to appropriate a sum not to exceed two hundred dollars for the construc-

tion of a rifle range. Several sites were looked over but found impracticable. The site finally chosen was across the Kennebec in Randolph but within ten minutes' walk from the armory. Even then the project might have fallen through but for the energy of Capt. Thompson. When he found that no one could be secured to build the range, he took charge of the construction and superintended the work. The range was completed late in the fall but in the additional month allowed the company by the commander-in-chief sufficient work was done to give ample notice that in the coming season "A" will be a hard-working organization on the range. In the course of the season the company expended 1,770 rounds of ammunition, qualifying eight men as marksmen; three as first-class marksmen and one as sharp-shooter. Sergt. Horace S. Peacock will do good work as company inspector.

Co. B, Lewiston, is one of the companies which does its full share of work on the range and under the direction of Lieut. Wm. H. Matthews, company inspector, and Capt. Cornelius J. Kelleher, there is never any doubt that the said work will be welldone. Capt. Kelleher is a thorough student of the rifle, always on the alert to gain further knowledge and his example and coaching are most beneficial to his company. The score cards show an expenditure of 5,190 rounds of ammunition exclusive of the special issue for the Sea Girt team. Twenty-nine men qualified as marksmen; one as first-class marksman; five as sharpshooters and four as distinguished sharpshooters. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. C, Bath, was deprived of the use of its range early in the season and it was not till shortly before encampment that it was ready for practice. It is now in the best of condition and there can be no excuse for failure to make a good showing next year. Capt. Wm. R. Kimball informs me that unforeseen circumstances have prevented his men from putting in their usual practice this year but assures me that another season things will be different. Few companies in the Guard have so convenient a range as the Shipping City and it is worthy constant usage. The company expended 2,970 rounds of ammunition, qualifying nine men as marksmen; four as first-class marksmen. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver,

Co. D, Lewiston, like Co. B of the same city, is an organization of range workers. Capt. G. F. Garcelon has an exceptionally good company inspector in the person of Lieut. F. H. Greenan, who is not only a reliable marksman who can be depended upon for a high score but an instructor who enthuses his men and rets the best results from them. The company expended 4,995 rounds of ammunition, qualifying twenty-three men as marksmen; twelve as first-class marksmen; three as sharpshooters and three as distinguished sharpshooters. Lieut. Greenan qualified with the revolver, making the highest score returned for the season, in his regiment and tying that of Lieut. W. H. Jenks of Co. B of the First.

Co. E, Skowhegan, has not shown the interest in rifle shooting which was to be expected from a company so advantageously located. In years past Co. E has given the regiment some of its best marksmen and I feel certain that a well-directed effort along the line of marksmanship would discover a new team that would take up the old standard. The company expended 1,612 rounds of ammunition, qualifying twenty-one men as marksmen and two as distinguished sharpshooters.

Co. F, Dover, is an organization which has had its vicissitudes but is now traveling the right way under the firm and tactful leadership of Capt. Walter J. Mayo. In range work the company has great possibilities for it numbers among its members some of the most promising shots of the Guard. Sergt. S. E. Coburn is a rifleman from whom the company may well be content to learn, and as company inspector he is doing the best of work and trying in every way to increase the average interest. The company expended 2,482 rounds of ammunition with a large percentage of high scores. Thirteen men qualified as marksmen; three as sharpshooters, and three as distinguished sharpshooters.

Co. G, Bangor, it will be borne in mind, had an armory fire early in the season which deprived the men of their practice when it was most essential to secure lively interest. The promise of a new range will give new life to target work in the Queen City. The company this year expended 4,110 rounds of ammunition; thirteen men qualifying as marksmen; four as first-class marksmen. Capt. Howard Brett qualified with the revolver.

Co. H, Waterville, did plenty of preliminary work but a change of company inspectors early in the season and again in the latter part cost the company much on qualification. Co. H has a good record to live up to and I look for good results from Sergt. Wm. I. Sterling, the new inspector.

Co. I, Eastport, has not taken much interest in range work the past year, though it is a company which in other days led the State and the nation. But little ammunition was expended and no return was made of qualification practice.

Co. K, Farmington, merits high praise for the work of the year. It is the first year's shooting that the company has done, the range having been completed late in the previous season. Capt. George McL. Presson took hold of the rifle practice of his company with the same firm grasp which has made his company a success in every other way. Two afternoons of each week were set apart for range work and Capt. Presson was always among the party at the firing line. This regularity of practice has done wonders in the rank and file of a company made up almost wholly of men unaccustomed to the use of the Springfield. In Sergt. F. W. Lawry the company has an efficient and hardworking inspector of rifle practice. The company expended 3,645 rounds of ammunition, but none of the men qualified owing to a misunderstanding of the rules.

Co. L, Houlton, did a good season's preliminary work and has among its members riflemen of high rank, but neglected to make any return of qualification practice. According to the cards the company expended 4,501 rounds of ammunition.

Co. M, Machias, was in a more or less disorganized condition, owing to the untimely death on February 16, 1901, of Capt. Sanford A. Clark, and the later action of the company which resulted in an investigation under S. O., No. 37, State of Maine, A. G. O., Augusta, April 23, 1901. In consequence, rifle shooting reached a low ebb, but the dawn of better days seems to have come and next year's report promises better. The company expended 373 rounds of ammunition, qualifying seven men as marksmen.

# Signal Corps.

The Signal Corps<sup>9</sup> expended 1,320 rounds of ammunition as against 295 rounds for the year preceding. Sergt. W. D. Floyd has done conscientious work with his men, despite the fact that for much of the time the Corps was deprived of the immediate supervision of a commissioned officer. The retirement of Capt. George W. Butler, made necessary by his employment in another state, occasioned sincere regret, but in his successor, Lieut. John R. Lowell, the Corps has an officer who will take pride in keeping up the well-earned reputation of the organization.

## First Division, Naval Reserve.

The First Division, Naval Reserve, expended 748 rounds of ammunition, eight men qualifying as marksmen with scores which indicate that very little practice would give many of them higher rating. The reserves are now in possession of a one-pound, R. F. Hotchkiss gun and a system of qualification more adapted to naval standards will doubtless be established in the near future. Gunner's Mate Charles Baker does the work of company inspector and is much interested in the new piece of ordnance. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver.

## RANGES.

I am glad that it is possible to report some improvement along this line but I regret that the room for improvement still remains so large.

The city of Portland appropriated \$1,200 for the construction of a range suitable for its six organizations, but an acceptable site could not be found within reasonable distance from the city, hence the Stroudwater range is the only one available to this large number of men.

The range in Auburn, which is used by Companies C and I of the First and B and D of the Second is entirely inadequate to the demand of so many men. The three Lewiston companies are in pressing need of a range of their own and the Spindle City should at once take steps to provide the same. The Auburn range was in need of many repairs early in the season, and after the matter had been properly explained I found Hon. George W. Furbish, mayor of Lewiston, and Hon. J. S. P. H. Wilson, mayor of Auburn, very ready to do all the companies desired.

The range at Bath has, during the season, been permanently repaired and is now in excellent condition.

Temporary repairs were made this past summer on the Augusta range but the bullet stop is not satisfactory and cannot be made so without quite an outlay of money. The range leaves much to be desired for the encampment practice and I most heartily renew the oft-repeated plea of my distinguished predecessor for a State range.

Co. A of the Second has a new range, built the latter part of the fall. The range is in Randolph, across the river Kennebec from Gardiner, and is substantially built.

Co. L of the Second has a new and excellent range within easy access from the business portion of Houlton.

Co. G of the Second has secured a five-years' lease of a piece of land on Essex street about two miles from City Hall, and the city will erect a range thereon early in the spring. The range will permit practice at 600 yards.

## MAINE AT SEA GIRT.

Under the provisions of G. O., No. 17, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s., a rifle team of twelve men and three substitutes was formed and attended the meetings of the National Rifle Association of America and the New Jersey State Rifle Association at Sea Girt, N. J., which was held from August 30th to September 7th. The team was made up as follows: Capt. C. J. Kelleher, Co. B, Second Infantry; Lieut. F. H. Greenan, Co. D, Second Infantry; Lieut. Wm. H. Walter L. Hatch, Co. B, First Infantry; Sergt. D. A. Kaler, Co. E. First Infantry; Sergt. H. W. Warren, Co. F, Second Infantry; Sergt. Martin E. Newburg, Co. H, Second Infantry; Corp. E. W. Judkins, Co. F, Second Infantry; Priv. H. A. Buker, Co. D, Second Infantry. Substitutes, Lieut. Nay S. Varney, Co. E, Second Infantry; Capt. Wm. H. Watson, Co. C. First Infantry: Sergt. Wm. L. Smith, battalion sergeant major, First Infantry.

The team was made up wholly of men who had never been beyond the State to compete in rifle matches but they worked hard, both before and after leaving the State, and in the face of teams composed of seasoned men, armed with the latest model Krags, they made a creditable showing with their Springfields. The team was coached by Capt. C. J. Kelleher and no man could have been more faithful or painstaking in the performance of his duties. Col. Lucius H. Kendall, commanding the First Infantry, accompanied the team and was unremitting in his efforts to assist the riflemen.

Sergt. Walter L. Hatch won fourth prize in the Inspector's Match at 500 and 600 yards, his score being 89 out of a possible hundred.

A company team consisting of Sergt. S. E. Coburn, Sergt. H. W. Warren and Corp. E. W. Judkins, all of Co. F, Second Infantry, won fourth prize in the Company Team Match at 200 and 500 yards, being but four points behind the winners in a field which was the largest in the history of the range.

The team was entered in the Hilton Trophy and the Interstate Matches and the First Regiment team entered in the Interstate Regimental Match.

The sending of a team to Sea Girt is strongly to be recommended and its value lies not in the number of prizes it may bring home but in the education it gives the men and the stimulus it is to rifle shooting in the Guard. It is too much to expect that a Maine team will defeat teams which have unlimited means for target practice and a climate which permits range work nearly all the year, but each year that a team is sent to compete in the national matches, rifle shooting in Maine is so much advanced.

The Maine team left New Jersey with the kindliest of feelings toward the officials of the associations in charge of the meet for every courtesy was shown to the men from the Pine Tree State.

## IN GENERAL AND IN CONCLUSION.

It gives me especial pleasure to announce that his excellency, the Commander-in-Chief has seen fit to evince his interest in rifle shooting by offering valuable prizes to be competed for in each regiment, the details to be announced in orders.

A stand of twenty U. S. Magazine Rifles, Calibre .30, have been secured for the use of the State team which will be selected as early in the summer as practicable. These rifles are fitted with the 1901 sights and are the model which was so extensively used at Sea Girt last summer. The secretary of war having recommended the issue of Krags to the militia of the several states, it is deemed only a question of two or three years when the Maine Guard is armed with the modern rifle and study of its construction and use by the State team will be valuable when the issue to all the State forces is made.

I regard as one of the most encouraging signs, an increase of interest in range work among commissioned officers. Enlisted men are quick to observe which way the attention of their officers is directed and the officer who puts his spare time into rifle shooting will carry a large following of his men with him. On the range the plain blouse is on equal terms with the chevron or the strap, so far as scores go, and the friendly rivalry thus engendered between officers and men goes far to cement the unity of purpose which will raise and maintain the standard of the National Guard. This year's work has shown that men are not laving aside the rifle of enlistment when they buckle on the sword of commission. If men as they come up from the ranks will bear this in mind the standard of rifle shooting among the commissioned officers will be so high that it will be the best possible example to the enlisted men. There is also a gratifying increase in the use of the revolver by the officers and a desire on their part to become proficient marksmen.

In Appendix A will be found the scores of the encampment matches and in Appendix B, the qualification returns from the various organizations.

From all officers and men I have received the most cordial support and for the loyalty of the riflemen in the several commands I wish to express my most hearty appreciation.

Coaching by the captain of the team or coacher selected by him. Best score to win. Commissioned officers will not compete in this match. Prizes: First, large framed photograph of winning team; one for armory and one for regimental headquarters. Second, third and fourth, armory picture.

Officers' Rifle Match—Monday, at such hour as the commanding officer of the regiment may direct. Open to any commissioned officer of the regiment. Conditions as to rifle, distance, rounds, etc., same as in company team match. Best score to win. No coaching. Prize, United States army revolver.

Company Inspectors' Match—Tuesday, 7 A. M. Open to any company inspector whose appointment bears date not later than August 1, 1901. Distances, 200 and 300 yards; target, A; positions, at 200 yards, off hand, at 300 yards, prone; rifle and ammunition same as in company team match; rounds, seven, two sighting shots at each range. No cleaning between ranges. Prize, gold medal.

Revolver Match—Tuesday, at such hour as the commanding officer of the regiment may designate. Open to any commissioned officer of the regiment. Conditions: Target, A; distances, 25, 50 and 75 yards; six rounds at each distance; ammunition furnished by the State. Best aggregate score to win. Prize, United States army revolver.

Regimental Championship Match—Wednesday, 7 A. M. Conditions: Distances, 200, 300 and 500 yards; target A; at 200 and 300, and target B, at 500 yards. Rifle and ammunition same as in company team matches. Any member of the regiment with record of first-class marksman, in the preliminary practice of 1901, allowed to enter. Position at 200 yards, off hand; at other distances, prone. Rounds, seven, two sighting

shots at each distance; no cleaning between ranges. Prize, Governor's gold championship medal.

Gloucester, Mass., July 4, 1901.

General John T. Richards, Adjutant General, Augusta, Me.:

SIR:—I have the honor to report that the U. S. S. Dolphin with two officers and sixteen men of the First Division Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., reached Gloucester, July 3d, at 6 P. M., from Cape Cod bay.

Captain W. H. H. Southerland's idea of training the naval militia has so far proven to be more than successful. Our men have been sandwiched in with the regular crew of the ship, have sailed with them and have settled down on friendly terms with the blue jackets so that now it is difficult to pick out naval militia from regulars. The officers of the ship have done everything in their power to make our cruise pleasant and profitable. I have not one suggestion to make in the way of improvement. The messing arrangements have been superb and the men have not only enjoyed themselves thoroughly, but have learned more on the four days of this cruise than they could have learned in four seasons on the Prairie.

Mr. Stevens and I have been given every facility for practical work, have handled the ship, got her under way, have each a regular ship's division with some of our own men sprinkled in, and take our tour of duty as though we were regular officers.

We expect to be in Portland with this detail Saturday morning. Today being a holiday, our men participated in a boat race.

BAR HARBOR, July 10, 1901.

General John T. Richards, Adjutant General State of Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to report that the U. S. S. Dolphin with the second detachment of sixteen men of the First Division Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., left Portland, Monday P. M., at 5 o'clock. The detachment with two officers boarded the ship Monday morning, and the men at once volunteered to assist in coaling the ship. This work they performed to the entire satisfaction of the commanding officer of the ship, its officers and men. It was a very disagreeable duty but the men were so anxious to show what they can do under proper conditions that they took hold of the work with a will from the start.

The Dolphin was at sea all night Monday, with the naval militia officers alone on the bridge in two of the night watches, handling the ship and taking all bearings. Thus thrown completely on their own responsibility, theoretical knowledge was brought into play by practical work. At 6 A. M. of Tuesday the Dolphin anchored in Frenchman's bay and I went ashore with Congressman Allen, and found Mr. Littlefield. We brought him off to the ship as the guest of Captain Southerland, according to the programme previously arranged.

BATH.

Mr. Allen and Mr. Littlefield are aboard at this time and seem to have been much impressed by what they have seen and learned on board this ship. Tuesday the ship ran up into Eastern bay

where the regular routine of drills was carried out. This morning an attempt was made to start for Rockland, but a thick fog prevented and we ran back into Bar Harbor, where the men were given five hours of liberty.

The work of this detachment has been satisfactory in the extreme, and like the previous detachment they are reflecting credit upon the State of Maine. The extremely enthusiastic work of Captain Southerland and his officers and men deserves, in my opinion, some official recognition by the Commander-in-Chief. They have not only done their duty but have gone to the extreme in making these cruises profitable to officers and men alike.

I expect that we shall sail for Rockland tonight if the weather clears.

General A. B. Farnham, Adjutant General State of Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith the report of the tour of duty of the third detail of the First Division Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., on the U. S. S. Dolphin, July 15 to July 20, inclusive.

1. The detail of three officers, four petty officers and eleven seamen boarded the Dolphin at 9 o'clock on the morning of Monday, July 15th, fully equipped and prepared for duty. Having been stationed at quarters before boarding the Dolphin the detail at once assumed their places among the regular crew and from that time until the tour of duty was completed, no distinction was made between them and the regularly enlisted force. The volunteers performed all the duties of the regulars, while the three officers from the Naval Reserve assumed regular watch and division duty, and were assigned to the regular ship's divisions, composed mostly of the regular seamen.

- II. The Dolphin sailed from Portland about noon on the 15th and proceeded under half speed to lower Casco bay where she came to anchor about 4 o'clock. The ship's crew was drilled in abandoning ship, signals, collision drill and fire quarters during the remainder of the afternoon. At night the volunteers were instructed in night signalling, using the Ardoir system, and other naval signals, including the search light.
- III. At 9.35 on July 16th the Dolphin proceeded to sea and ran to Rockland, part of the way through a thick fog. The Naval Reserve officers were given the deck during the run, got the ship under way without assistance, and likewise brought her to anchor. During all spare moments the officers continued their navigation work, on this week Mr. Bigelow and Mr. Stevens devoting their attention to compass deviation and compensation and the observations necessary to compass correction, while Mr. Scully, who had been prevented from making the cruise of the two former weeks, was rapidly taken over the ground covered by the other two officers, with which he was already familiar. Nights until eleven and twelve o'clock were devoted by the officers to this work, when not on duty. On the run to Rockland, the men were taken on a tour of inspection about the ship from stem to stern, and every thing on board was carefully explained by the volunteer officers. On previous tours this duty had been performed by the regular officers, but the Naval Reserve officers were now able to perform this duty satisfactorily.
- IV. At Rockland the Dolphin was delayed for three days by a thick fog. The time was occupied by such drills as were possible, but the weather was most unpleasant and prevented much being done which had been accomplished on the previous tours of duty. His Excellency, Governor Hill, General John T. Richards, the Adjutant General of the State, and Lieutenant Colonel Hale of the Governor's Staff, joined the Dolphin. On the morning of the 20th of July the ship got under way and stood out for Boothbay Harbor. On the way up the coast, the ship was cleared for action, a target dropped overboard, and great gun practice followed for several hours. The firing by the three and six pounders was far above the average of the regular service. The excellent record made by Charles Baker, gunner's mate, 1st class, was the subject of commendation by Captain Southerland, who personally complimented him for his steadi-

ness, accuracy and rapidity of fire. At Squirrel Island Governor Hill was landed, being accorded the customary salute on leaving the ship. Late in the afternoon the Dolphin proceeded to Portland and at 5.30 P. M. came to anchor in the harbor. |The detail was then landed, as it was deemed inexpedient to remain on board for a longer period.

- V. In conclusion of the three weeks of duty of this division on the Dolphin, it is a pleasure to me to report that the behaviour of the officers of the officers and men throughout was most commendable. From every standpoint the tour of duty was a greater success than was anticipated, and the instruction received in this duty was greater than would have been received in a month of duty under the old conditions. As far as the treatment accorded the division by the officers of the Dolphin, I cannot find words to express our appreciation. To them in a large degree is due the success of this experiment.
- VI. Recommendations.—It is my opinion that in the future all duty by this command should be performed under conditions similar to those which regulated this tour of duty, on a regular man-o'-war, the men and officers performing regular duty with the regular crew of the ship.

It is also my opinion that to make these tours of duty the most beneficial, the men should be allowed at least two hours on shore, at some port, with the regulars, as it serves to strengthen the bands of friendship between the regular service and the naval militia, and tends to beak up the monotony of the ship's routine.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Me.:

SIR:—I have the honor of submitting my report of the recent trip to Washington of the three organizations of the National Guard, who represented the State of Maine at the inauguration of President McKinley.

Acting under Special Orders No. 16, Adjutant-General's Office, the following orders were issued:

Portland, Me., February 27, 1901.

Orders No. 1.

- I. Having been appointed to form a battalion consisting of Company M, First Infantry, Captain James W. Graham commanding, Company C, Second Infantry, Captain William R. Kimball commanding, and the Signal Corps, Lieutenant George W. Butler commanding, for the purpose of proceeding to Washington to take part in the inauguration ceremonies of President-elect William McKinley, I hereby assume command.
- II. The following details are made and they will be respected and obeyed accordingly:

Adjutant, Lieut. Willard C. Lord, Company M, First Infantry. Sergeant Major, Sergt. John W. Gilmore, Company C, Second Infantry.

III. The following uniform will be worn:—Fatigue coat, cap, blue trousers, leggins, black shoes, white gloves, white collar and overcoat with cape.

Haversacks may be carried. The canteen will not be taken.

IV. On arrival in Portland, Thursday, February 28, 1901, company commanders, Captain William R. Kimball and Captain

James W. Graham, with their commands, will immediately report for duty at the wharf of the Maine Steamship Company.

The Signal Corps, Lieutenant George W. Butler commanding, will report for duty at the wharf of the Maine Steamship Company not later than 5.30 P. M.

V. Before leaving their armories, company commanders will see that this order and Special Orders No. 16, Adjutant-General's Office, have been properly promulgated.

Captain James W. Graham, commanding Company M, First Regiment, reported for duty at 5.15 P. M., with a total company of 49, having 3 commissioned officers, 6 sergeants, 6 corporals, 2 musicians and 32 privates.

The Signal Corps, commanded by Lieutenant George W. Butler, reported at 5.30 P. M., with I commissioned officer, 3 sergeants, 3 corporals, I acting hospital steward and II privates. Total 19.

At 5.45, Company C, Second Regiment, Lieutenant George A. Buker commanding, reported, with 2 commissioned officers, 6 sergeants, 4 corporals, 2 musicians and 32 privates. Total 46.

Lieut. Willard C. Lord, Company M, First Regiment, and Sergeant John W. Gilmore, Company C, Second Regiment, reported for duty as Acting Adjutant and Acting Sergeant Major respectively.

Quarters were promptly assigned on board the steamship Horatio Hall. The steamer sailed at 6 P. M., and arrived in New York at 6 P. M. of the following day after an uneventful though pleasant trip.

Captain William R. Kimball joined his command at New York. The battalion at once embarked on the Baltimore & Ohio transfer steamer, were conveyed to Jersey City, and at 6.45 P. M., left on a special train for Washington, arriving there at 12.30 Saturday morning. My battalion was the first military organization to reach the city.

A member of the Committee on Public Comfort escorted the command to the Cutler House, No. 222 3rd St., N. W., the quarters assigned to it during its stay in the city.

Saturday forenoon, Congressman Amos L. Allen of the First District, called at my headquarters and very courteously welcomed the command and offered to do anything in his power to make its visit pleasant.

The Sons and Daughters of Maine tendered the members of the battalion a reception on Saturday evening, and furnished a delightful entertainment.

No military duty being required of the men until Monday noon, they gladly availed themselves of the opportunity given them to visit the public buildings and many notable places in the city.

Monday forenoon was spent in witnessing the arrival of many military and civic organizations, and the parade for the First Grand Division, consisting of the Grand Army, the regulars, including the much renowned Puerto Rico Battalion, the soldiers and marines from the war ships, West Point Cadets, the First District Columbia National Guard, Annapolis Cadets, and Troop A of Ohio, acting as escort to President McKinley from the White House to the Capitol, where the inaugural ceremonies were held.

A light rain commenced to fall at about noon and continued until well into the afternoon, making it necessary for the troops to parade in overcoats. The battalion formed at 1.30 and proceeded to their position on B street, S. E., arriving there at 2 P. M. The various organizations of the National Guard were assigned their place in line in the same order as their respective states were admitted to the Union. Maine being the 23rd state was assigned to the Third Division, commanded by Major General Joseph Wheeler, and Third Brigade, under command of Brigadier General Metcalf.

The parade started at 2.30 P. M. The Maine Battalion moved at 4.25 P. M., passed the Presidential reviewing stand about 5.30 P. M., and the Chief Marshal, ten minutes later, after which the parade was dismissed. The battalion then returned to head-quarters and arrived there at 6 o'clock.

Lieutenant George W. Butler, commanding the Signal Corps, was given permission to take his command to New York on the night train, with instructions to join the battalion on its arrival there the next afternoon.

The battalion was formed at 6.30 A. M., marched to the Baltimore & Ohio station, and took the 7.15 train for New York, arriving there at I P. M. On its arrival, Lieutenant Butler reported with his command.

Owing to an accident, the Portland steamer did not reach New York until 7 P. M. and consequently we did not leave until Wednesday noon. Permission was given the men to see what little they could of New York in the meantime.

Captain Kimball and Lieutenant Pratt were granted permission to leave their command and return to Bath by rail.

Upon arrival in Portland, company commanders were ordered to proceed to their home stations. The Signal Corps immediately marched to the armory.

Through the courtesy of the Portland Railroad Company, special cars were obtained and Company C was conveyed to the Maine Central Railroad station where the 1.20 train was taken for Bath, and Company M was transferred to the armory at Westbrook.

I feel certain that the organizations who represented the State of Maine at Washington, will compare favorably with those of any state in the Union and that it would be difficult to select a better body of men than those I had the honor and pleasure to command.

The total strength of the battalion was 116, and when ordered for duty every man reported.

While en route and in Washington, the soldierly appearance and gentlemanly deportment of the men won for them many words of commendation.

Our accommodations at the Cutler House were entirely inadequate, about the only thing in its favor being the location, which is in the vicinity of a hundred yards from Pennsylvania avenue.

It was a great pleasure to me to note the pride our men took in their personal appearance. Their coats were always buttoned, their shoes blacked, and only military decorations were worn, something that cannot be said of many soldiers from other states.

The First and Second Regiments could not have been better represented than by the companies selected, and great credit is due the officers and men of these organizations and the Signal Corps for their fine appearance and military bearing which can only be acquired by persistent work.

We were accompanied on this trip by Mr. H. A. Nealley, of the Bath Times, who very ably represented the press of Maine.

The total expense of the trip was about \$2,500, a part of which was raised by fairs, exhibition balls, etc., and up to the last moment, it was expected that the State would appropriate \$1,000 to help defray the expenses of the trip, in fact, two of the organizations were already en route when the unpleasant news reached them that the above appropriation would not be granted. Company commanders were forced to raise money to the amount of about \$1,000 to defray the expenses of the trip, and thanks to the many friends of the companies, all but about \$500 has been raised to cancel the debt.

Today we visited what is known as the "Shattuck Farm" in East Deering, and to the surprise of all we found him somewhat willing, and if suitable and no further objection, without a doubt the range will be located there. The City Engineer is to make a survey as to distance, and it looks as though there is the 600 yards needed, but of course we are not sure.

Colonel Farrington will without a doubt remember this place, as the city had a range there about 1880, I think before they went to the Goodrich farm at Morrill's Corner. This place is about three miles from armory, near the electrics. The City Engineer thought if everything went along all right, he might be ready the last of next week for Colonel Dill to come out and

look over the range, and we also think that possibly Colonel Farrington, if he could come, would be of valuable assistance to us.

I will notify you as to the progress of the ranges and of any changes.

To the Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

DEAR SIR:—I beg leave to acknowledge receipt of your letter of November 9th, relative to condition of armory in Portland, and in reply beg leave to state that my attention has not been called to any such conditions by those in charge of the building on the part of the city, but I have heard indirectly that the Mayor was in the building on September 3rd, and that he reported the condition of the armory, as far as dirt was concerned, was very bad. To the best of my knowledge, it was at that time in a very dirty condition, but do not believe, under the circumstances, that the companies should be judged too harshly, when the facts of the case are known.

Monday September 2d, there were in this city the Highland Cadets from Montreal and the companies granted permission to them for the use of their rooms. Besides this, on that day, there was a parade of one of the companies. This, with a large number of visitors that came into the armory to see the Cadets, and also during the evening, they had the entire use of the company rooms for the purpose of getting ready for their entertainment, and a good many also availed themselves of the opportunity to use the same for dressing rooms, a large amount of dirt became tracked into the armory. This with the amount of dirt left by the Cadets and also the hundreds that frequented the rooms on that evening, left our armory in a very dirty condition. The armory was open until one o'clock Tuesday morning for the accommodation of the visitors, and you can see that it was impos-

sible for the local armorers to clean their rooms, as all of them work for a living and cannot afford to lay off for a half a day in order to clean their rooms, as they only receive from their companies pay ranging in the neighborhood of \$20.00 per year. Tuesday night, to the best of my recollection, all the rooms were placed in a presentable condition.

The only other time that I have heard of a complaint was one Sunday last spring, when the agent of the building went through the rooms, and naturally he would find them not in the best of condition as they are used more on Saturday evening than any other time.

You may not be aware that when we first came into the building, an arrangement was made by which the city's janitor took charge of the corridor and the outside entrance, and as to the dirt that may be in the corridors, we are not to blame. Personally, I know that the corridors are in very bad shape, but at the present time, they are looking better than they have for some time, as the new janitor on the part of the city has washed some of the windows, this being the first time this has been done for some years, and I feel positive that as soon as the Knights of Pythias circus, which holds forth all this week, is over so that he can get more time, there will be quite an improvement in the looks of the corridors.

In regard to our men not properly conducting themselves in the corridors, can only say that to my knowledge they do not loaf there. I have found many times, boys, from six to fifteen years of age, playing in the corridors in the evening, and have been obliged to eject them myself a good many times. The only time that there is loafing of grown people in the corridors, and but few of them are members of the Guard, is when the Auditorium is let and our entrance is used, and generally those that hire the hall employ a policeman to look after the entrance, and if he neglects his duty, it is not our fault. The same thing applies to the outside of the building.

If at any time there should be any complaint made by the city authorities, if they will communicate at once with me, I will do all in my power to have the same corrected. I do know that in several cases the companies here have tendered the use of their rooms to organizations hiring the hall, and in every case their armories have been put in the best of condition, some of the

companies even going so far as to employ women to wash their rooms for these special occasions. If there is any way that your office can suggest or if the city wishes to enter into any arrangements whereby the evils, when they do exist, can be corrected, they will find that the officers connected with the building will do everything in their power to do so. I can personally testify that each captain, when his attention has been called to things that were not right, has at once corrected the same. We desire harmonious relations with the city and with that end in view, we only ask that any complaints shall be made to us direct, as it is only through the co-operation of both that the best results can be obtained.

Eastport, Maine, Feb. 7th, 1901.

Maj. Gen. John T. Richards, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

'SIR:—I have the honor to report that in compliance with your letter of instruction, dated A. G. O., Augusta, January 28th, 1901, I proceeded to Machias, on Monday, February 4th. Investigation disclosed the fact that with two exceptions all men in Company M of this command, who have been reported as "Absent without leave" are in the woods "lumbering."

Occasionally some of these men return for a day or two, and report for duty, if in town on drill nights. For this reason Captain Clark has not placed them on furlough, also neglected to tell the company clerk to report them as absent with leave.

My examination of the roll book reveals the fact that the company clerk has not credited the company with all the duty performed, he having failed to carefully read the foot notes on Form No. 47.

The roll book has the following record for December, 1900: "December 3rd, no drill"; "December 10th, 3 officers and 24 ment present for drill"; "December 17th, 3 officers and 15 men present for drill"; "December 24th, 3 officers and 22 men present for drill"; "December 31st, 3 officers and 26 men present for drill."

The officers claim that when the men are in town the attendance is always good. The evidence shows the company to be in a fairly healthy condition.

The Adjutant, who accompanied me, instructed the company clerk in proper method of making up returns, etc., etc.

The men now in the woods will soon return. This, the officers assure me, will insure a greater percentage of attendance.

I am of the opinion that no further action is at present necessary to improve the condition or discipline of this company.

The Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I beg leave to notify you as to the condition of our range and armory. As regards the rifle range, if it is not put in repair very soon, it will be impossible to practice there. The supports for the target frames are in such a condition that it is hard work to keep the frames on them, and on account of the condition of the banking it is positively dangerous for men to stand behind to mark. In case of a new man, firing a wild shot, there is not sufficient banking to stop the bullet from going through the shed and passing very close to the man behind. In two cases the bullet has actually struck the man's hat, and if it is not fixed in some way, men will not go behind the bank to mark.

And as regards the armory, I beg to state the place is not fit for the companies in its present condition. Parts of it being let to private parties, it is impossible to keep the place free from objectionable characters, who cannot tell the difference between this building and a sheep pen, and in consequence, the only convenience we had, in the shape of a dirty, unsanitary water-closet, was kept from being used by having the door nailed up.

These things, together with several others, have a tendency to keep many good men from enlisting in our company, and we all sincerely trust that before very long these defects may be rectified.

In accordance with the provisions of the Militia Law and the Regulations for the National Guard, the Inspector-General will proceed forthwith to inspect the several companies and corps of the National Guard, giving at least ten days' notice of such inspection to the commanding officer of each organization, which notice will be promptly acknowledged to the Inspector-General.

II. So far as practicable, the Inspector-General will so fix the dates of the inspections as to make them correspond with those of the regular

drills of the several organizations. He will advise regimental commanders of the inspections in their respective regiments, by sending themprotices in each case, which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.

- III. The Surgeon-General will accompany the Inspector-General when the Ambulance Corps is inspected and will make a special report.
- IV. All organizations will be paraded in fatigue uniform, armed and equipped. Each company or corps commander will have collected in the armory, and conveniently arranged for inspection, all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession, and all books and papers pertaining to his organization.
- V. Each company and corps commander, for the use of the Inspector-General, will prepare duplicate returns of his company or corps, and will furnish Inspection Report (Form No. 1), on which will be entered a complete list of all State property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession.
- VI. Officers accountable for military property, having any such property which they consider unserviceable, will prepare Inventories (Form No. 4), and will present the same with the property to the Inspector-General for his action. Attention is called to Article XXXVI of the Regulations for the National Guard, the provisions of which govern all inspections.
- VII. While on the inspecting tour enjoined in this order, the Inspector-General will devote to each organization a reasonable time for instruction, both theoretical and practical, during which he will take upguard duty and the necessary administrative work of the company.

General Orders, No. 5.

The following acts of the Legislature are published for the information and government of all concerned:

I. An Act to provide for the retirement of commissioned officers of the Militia or the National Guard of the State of Maine.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section I. Any person who shall have served as a commissioned officer in the Militia or the National Guard of this State, for the continuous period of nine years, may, upon his own application, be placed upon the retired list, with the rank held by him at the time of his discharge from said service or at the time such application is made; provided, however, that an officer so retired who, at the time of such discharge or of making such application, has remained in the same grade for the continuous period of nine years, shall be retired with increased rank. Retired officers on occasions of ceremony may, and when acting under orders as hereinafter provided, shall wear the uniform of their retired rank. Retired officers shall be eligible to perform military duty, and the Commander-in-Chief may, in his discretion, by order require them to serve on the military boards, courts of inquiry and courts-martial, or to perform any other special or temporary military duty, and for such service they shall receive the same pay and allowances as are provided in law for like service by the officers of the National Guard. All retired officers shall be amenable to courts-martial for military offences as if upon the active list of the National Guard. The names of all officers of retired rank shall be borne upon a separate roster, kept under the supervision of the Adjutant-General. Retired officers shall report to the Adjutant-General any change in their residence whenever such change occurs.

Sect. 2. The Commander-in-Chief may, at any time, retire any commissioned officer of the Militia or National Guard who shall have been found by a medical board, convened by his orders and consisting of at least three commissioned medical officers, to be physically unable to properly perform the duties of his office.

Sect. 3. This act shall take effect when approved.

Approved March 1, 1901.

II. An Act to amend chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, as amended by chapter one hundred and twenty-eight of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, relating to the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section I. Section 30 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "Adjutant-General" in the eighth line thereof, the words 'When a soldier re-enlists and is mustered into the service within thirty days from the expiration of his previous term, his service shall be considered as unbroken and continuous, and re-enlistments and musters shall be dated as of the day of such expiration. When the term of service of any enlisted man terminates during a period of furlough and while he is serving in the United States army, should he re-enlist in the National Guard within thirty days of his muster out of the United States army, his service shall be considered as continuous, and shall in like manner commence on the day of such expiration, and re-enlistments and musters shall be so dated,' and by inserting after the word "enlistments" in the same line thereof, the words 'or re-enlistments,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 30. All enlistments in the National Guard shall be for three years, and shall be made by signing such enlistment book as may be prescribed by the Commander-in-Chief. An attested copy of the enlistment book, shall at the organization of each company, be made by the clerk and forwarded, together with duplicates of all enlistment papers, forthwith to the Adjutant-General. When a soldier re-enlists and is mustered into the service within thirty days from the expiration of his previous term, his service shall be considered as unbroken and continuous, and re-enlistments and musters shall be dated as of the day of such expiration. When the term of service of any enlisted man terminates during a period of furlough and while he is serving in the United States army, should he re-enlist in the National Guard within thirty days of his muster out of the United States army, his service shall be considered as continuous, and shall in like manner commence on the day of such expiration, and re-enlistments and musters shall be so dated. When new enlistments or re-enlistments are made in any organization, the commanding officer shall forward duplicate enlistment papers to the Adjutant-General.'

Sect. 2. Section 31 of said act is hereby amended by striking out, after the word "or" in the fifth line thereof, the words "in an adjoining town," and inserting in place thereof the words within a radius of seven miles,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

- 'Sect. 31. No enlistment shall be allowed in the National Guard of other than able bodied citizens of this State, between the ages of sixteen and forty years, residing in the town where the armory of the organization in which they enlist is situated, or within a radius of seven miles. In time of peace, no minor shall be enlisted in the National Guard without the written consent of his parent or guardian, which shall appear on the enlistment paper.'
- Sect. 3. Section 35 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "privates" in the sixth line thereof the words 'one of whom shall be a pharmacist, a nurse, or a person capable in the judgment of the examining surgeon of serving in one or both capacities. He shall be liable to detail for service at hospital when such details are ordered, and shall receive the pay of sergeant,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. 35. Each company of infantry shall consist of one captain, one first lieutenant, one second lieutenant, one first sergeant, one quarter-master sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, two musicians, and not less than thirty-two nor more than ninety-two privates, one of whom shall be a pharmacist, a nurse, or a person capable in the judgment of the examining surgeon of serving in one or both capacities. He shall be liable to detail for service at hospital when such details are ordered, and shall receive the pay of a sergeant.'
- Sect. 4. Section 40 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "surgeon" in the fourth line thereof, the words 'one adjutant and one quartermaster, each;' by striking out after the word "surgeon" in the fifth line, the words "one adjutant, one quartermaster and one inspector of rifle practice" and inserting in place thereof the words 'one commissary of subsistence and three battalion adjutants;' by striking out after the word "and" in the tenth line the words "one color bearer who shall be a sergeant" and inserting in place thereof the words 'two color bearers who shall be sergeants, and three battalion sergeant-majors, who shall be senior to and have the pay of a first sergeant;' by striking out after the word "and" in the same line the words "not less than," by inserting after the word "companies" in the same line the words 'organized into three battalions of four companies each,' and by striking out the last paragraph, beginning with the words "Provided, that," and ending with the words "each battalion," so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:
- 'Sect. 40. To each regiment of infantry there shall be one colonel, one lieutenant-colonel, three majors, and a staff to consist of one surgeon with the rank of major, one assistant surgeon, one adjutant and one quartermaster, each with the rank of captain, one assistant surgeon, one commissary of subsistence and three battalion adjutants, each with the rank of first lieutenant, and one chaplain; a non-commissioned staff to consist of one sergeant-major, one quartermaster sergeant, one commissary sergeant, one hospital steward, one trumpeter, and two color bearers who shall be sergeants, and three battalion sergeant-majors who shall be senior to and have the pay of a first sergeant; and twelve companies, organized into three battalions of four companies each.'

Sect. 5. Section 60 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "filled" in the twenty-third line thereof, the words 'In case said office shall be of the medical staff or Naval Reserves, then, for the former, there shall be added to and become a member of the board, the surgeon-general, and for the latter, an officer of the Naval Reserves, other than the person to be so examined,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 60. The Commander-in-Chief shall appoint a military board of three officers to enquire into the qualifications of all persons elected or appointed to any office below the grade of brigadier-general and claiming a commission under this act, except upon the staff of the Commanderin-Chief, and no commission shall issue until the person so elected or appointed shall have passed a satisfactory examination before such board, as to his moral character, his general knowledge of military affairs proportionate to the office to be held, and his fitness for the service. If he fails to appear before the board when notified or is adjudged unqualified. a new election shall be ordered or appointment made; and no person who has failed to pass such examination shall be eligible to election or appointment to an office of equal or higher grade in the National Guard, for the period of one year thereafter. Such examination shall be made within thirty days after the election or appointment, unless the Commander-in-Chief shall for good cause enlarge the time. At least two members of said board shall be of a grade equal or superior to that of the office to be filled. In case said office shall be of the medical staff or Naval Reserves, then, for the former, there shall be added to and become a member of the board, the surgeon-general, and for the latter, an officer of the Naval Reserves, other than the person to be so examined. In case of the absence of any member of the board, or of disability to sit by reason of rank, or if for other cause the board is not of the required number, the Commander-in-Chief may detail an officer for the time being.'

Sect. 6. Section 73 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "dollars," at the end of said section, the words 'and in case any officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, carried on the payrolls of the organization of which he is a member, at any encampment or other duty, or any special expense account for any duty performed, who has at any time through carelessness or inattention, lost, destroyed or suffered to be lost or destroyed, any State or government property which has been issued for his use, the officer accountable for the property or certifying the pay-roll or expense account, shall record under column of "Remarks" the number and kind of articles so lost or destroyed, and in column headed "Deductions" on pay-roll, or under "deductions" in expense account, the amount of money value of property so lost or destroyed, and the paymaster-general shall retain out of the pay of such officer or enlisted man an amount of money equal to the value of the property so lost or destroyed, and money so retained shall be credited to the account of such officer of the National Guard as may be accountable to the State for said property. Such portion of said money as shall be for State property shall be turned in to the treasurer of the State,

to be credited to the militia fund, and such portion as may be for U. S. property shall be turned in to the U. S. treasury, to be credited to the State on its property returns,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 73. Any officer, enlisted man or other person, who shall wilfully or maliciously destroy, injure or deface any article of military property belonging to the State, or shall use it for other than military purposes, or shall have or retain the same in violation of law or regulations shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars. And in case any officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, carried on the pay-rolls of the organization of which he is a member, at any encampment or other duty, or on any special expense account for any duty performed, who has at any time through carelessness or inattention, lost, destroyed or suffered to be lost or destroyed, any State or government property which has been issued for his use, the officer accountable for the property or certifying the pay-roll or expense account, shall record under column of "Remarks" the number and kind of articles so lost or destroyed, and in column headed "Deductions" on pay-roll, or under "Deductions" in expense account, the amount of money value of property so lost or destroyed, and the paymaster-general shall retain out of the pay of such officer or enlisted man an amount of money equal to the value of the property so lost or destroyed, and money so retained shall be credited to the account of such officer of the National Guard as may be accountable to the State for said property. Such portion of said money as shall be for State property shall be turned in to the treasurer of the State, to be credited to the militia fund, and such portion as may be for United States property shall be turned in to the United States treasury, to be credited to the State on its property returns.'

Sect. 7. Section 78 of said act is hereby amended by inserting after the word "State" in the thirteenth line thereof, the words 'and there may be also allowed and paid by the State for the rent of quarters occupied by each authorized band legally enlisted and mustered into the service, not exceeding one hundred dollars, and said quarters shall always be subject to all provisions of law and regulations which apply to armories,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 78. Municipal officers shall provide for each company of the National Guard located within the limits of their respective towns, subject to the approval of the Commander-in-Chief or such officer as he may designate, a suitable drill room and armory or place of deposit for the arms, equipments and other property furnished by the State. They shall also provide suitable rooms for the headquarters of each separate battalion, regiment or brigade established within their limits, and a reasonable compensation for the rent thereof, not exceeding one hundred dollars per annum, may be allowed to the town so furnishing, and paid by the State. And there may be also allowed and paid by the State for the rent of quarters occupied by each authorized band legally enlisted and mustered into the service, not exceeding one hundred dollars, and said quarters shall always be subject to all provisions of the law and regulations which apply to armories, and such drill rooms, armories,

headquarters or other places provided for in this section shall be held for the exclusive use of the National Guard unless otherwise authorized by the Commander-in-Chief after application in each case by the municipal authorities in writing. If said premises are used contrary to the provisions hereof, there shall be a deduction from the rent of the premises agreed upon, equal to one month's rental for each day of such use.'

Sect. 8. No provision of this act shall be construed as terminating any commission or enlistment in the National Guard, but any such shall continue in force according to the terms thereof, subject to the provisions of this act.

Sect. 9. This act shall take effect when approved.

The State flag is hereby declared to be buff, charged with the emblem of the State, a pine tree proper, in the centre, and the polar star, (a mullet of five points), in blue, in the upper corner; the star to be equidistant from the hoist and the upper border of the flag, the distance from the two borders to the centre of the star being equal to about one fourth of the hoist, this distance and the size of the star being proportionate to the size of the flag.

Sect. 2. This act shall take effect when approved.

Paragraph 435 (Page 114) of the Regulations for the National Guard is amended by striking out the figures "25" in the fifth line thereof, and inserting in place the word "fifty," and by striking out in the sixth line the sentence beginning "When the amounts equal \* \* \* " and by inserting in place thereof the words, 'If the amounts charged for the examination of recruits in any one day equal or exceed a day's pay, one day's pay only will be charged upon the expense account,' so that said, section as amended, shall read as follows:

'435. When a surgeon examines recruits the names of the latter should appear upon the expense account. The source, date and number of the order will also be noted upon the face of the account. When a surgeon resides in a town where troops are stationed he will receive fifty cents for the examination of each recruit for said troops. If the amounts charged for the examination of recruits in any one day equal or exceed a day's pay one day's pay only will be charged upon the expense account. The names of all men examined will be inserted on expense accounts as before specified. Under the conditions mentioned in this paragraph men will be examined whenever presented by the company or corps commander, without waiting for orders from higher authority.'

General Orders, No. o.

I. Paragraphs 258, 259, 261, 262, 263 and 264 of the Regulations for the National Guard, are hereby amended to read as follows:

'258. The Inspector-General of Rifle Practice and the commanding officers of the two regiments of infantry, of the Signal Corps, and of the Naval Reserves, will establish such rules governing small arms practice, not inconsistent with these Regulations, as they may deem just and necessary. The rules established will be submitted to the Adjutant-General for the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, who will also decide any controversy.'

'259. Commanding officers of companies, the commanding officer of the Signal Corps and the commanding officer of the Naval Reserves, will arrange for qualification practice on such days as may be convenient for the men of their several commands. Commanding officers will see that so far as possible each member of their several organizations is given an opportunity to qualify, but all qualifications will be made in the presence of a commissioned officer and the scores made will be certified by him.'

'260. Men who have made, prior to the dates fixed for qualification practice, two scores of 22 each at 200 yards, two scores of 23 each at 500 or 300 yards, and two scores of 22 each at 600 or 300 yards, if firing with a rifle, or two scores of 21 each at 200 yards, two scores of 22 each at 500 or 300 yards, and two scores of 21 each at 600 or 300 yards, if firing with the carbine, may practice for qualification in the sharp-shooter's grade, and will be classed as distinguished sharpshooters if their scores are sufficient. Men who have made, prior to the dates fixed for qualification practice, two scores of 21 each at 200 yards, and two scores of 21 each at 500 or 300 yards, if firing with the rifle, or two

scores of 19 each at 200 yards and two scores at 19 each at 500 or 300 yards, if firing with the carbine, may practice for qualification in the first-class marksman's grade, and will be classed as such if their scores are sufficient. All other men may practice for qualification in the marksman's grade, and will be classed as such if their scores are sufficient. All men who fail to qualify in the grade for which they practice for qualification will be classed in the grade to which they are entitled by their scores.'

'261. Grades of marksmanship are established as follows:

Distinguished Sharpshooter.—Ten shots at each range. A total of 120 out of a possible 150 if firing with the rifle, or 105 out of a possible 150 if firing with the carbine.

Sharpshooter.—Ten shots at each range. A total of 105 out of a possible 150 if firing with the rifle, or 90 out of a possible 150 if firing with the carbine.

First Class Marksman.—Ten shots at 200 yards, and ten shots at 500 yards. A total of 60 out of a possible 100 if firing with the rifle, or 55 out of a possible 100 if firing with the carbine.

Marksman.—Ten shots at 200 yards. A total of 26 out of a possible 50 if firing with the rifle, or 24 out of a possible 50 if firing with the carbine.

Officers of the active militia not belonging to companies and those on the retired list, will be permitted to practice for qualification under the conditions prescribed for members of companies.

Expert Revolver Marksman.—Six shots at each range. A total of 60 out of a possible 90.

Revolver Marksman.—Six shots at each range except 75 yards. A total of 34 out of a possible 60.'

'262. The following insignia will be issued to those qualifying in any of the above mentioned classes. A person once winning any insignia may continue to wear the same, with the limitations made below.

Distinguished Sharpshooter.—A silver badge, consisting of a pin, a bar, and a pendent cross, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a silver bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between the pin and cross. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. A pair of silver buttons, one to be worn on each side and near the end of the collar of the blouse. Should the wearing of badges on the blouse be authorized the buttons will not be worn. A distinguished sharpshooter who requalifies will be allowed to wear under his badge, but not sewed to the coat, a red ribbon, of the length and width of the badge. This ribbon will be worn only during the year following that of requalification.

Sharpshooter.—A silver badge, consisting of a pin and pendent cross, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a silver bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between

the pin and cross. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. A pair of silver maltese crosses will be issued, to be worn upon the collar of the blouse, as prescribed for distinguished sharpshooters. A sharpshooter who requalifies will be allowed to wear a red ribbon, as prescribed for a distinguished sharpshooter.

First Class Marksman.—A silver badge, consisting of a pin and pendent target, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a silver bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between the pin and target. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. A square button will be issued, to be worn upon the collar of the blouse, as prescribed for distinguished sharpshooters. A first-class marksman who requalifies will be allowed to wear a red ribbon, as prescribed for a distinguished sharpshooter.

Marksman.—A bronze badge, consisting of a pin and pendent target, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a bronze bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between the pin and target. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. A square button will be issued, to be worn upon the collar of the blouse, as prescribed for distinguished sharpshooters. A marksman who requalifies will be allowed to wear a red ribbon, as prescribed for a distinguished sharpshooter.

Expert Revolver Marksman.—A silver badge, consisting of a pin and pendent star, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a silver bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between the pin and star. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. An expert revolver marksman who requalifies will be entitled to wear a red ribbon, as prescribed for a distinguished sharpshooter.

Revolver Marksman.—A silver badge, consisting of a pin and pendent disc, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a silver bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between the pin and disc. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. A revolver marksman who requalifies will be entitled to wear a red ribbon, as prescribed for a distinguished sharpshooter.'

'263. The Governor's badge, or a badge won in an inter-state competition, may be worn upon the uniform coat.'

'264. All badges or other insignia which are authorized to be worn upon the uniform coat, may hereafter be worn upon the blouse, when

the uniform coat is not issued. When this is the case, the buttons authorized to be worn upon the collar of the blouse will not be issued or worn.'

- I. That part of paragraph I, General Orders No. 9, A. G. O., c. s., pertaining to par. 258 of the Regulations for the National Guard, is hereby amended to read as follows:
- '258. The Inspector General of Rifle Practice and the commanding officers of the two regiments of infantry, of the Signal Corps, and of the Naval Reserves will, at the commencement of the practice season, establish such rules governing small arms practice, not inconsistent with these Regulations, as they may deem just and necessary. The rules established will be submitted to the Adjutant General for the approval of the Commander-in-Chief, who will also decide any controversy.'
- II. The commanding officers of companies under direction of their Colonels, commanding officers of corps and of the Naval Reserves will cause preliminary practice to be had and will conduct practice for qualification in their own commands in accordance with the annexed rules governing the same.
- III. As provided by the Regulations for the National Guard, the following rules to govern practice for qualification in the several classes of marksmanship in the National Guard of Maine for the season of 1901, having been approved by the Commander-in-Chief, are hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

## RULES GOVERNING QUALIFICATION FOR SMALL ARMS PRACTICE, SEASON OF 1901.

The commanding officer of any company may qualify his men at any time during the season and in such numbers as he may find convenient. Each man shall have one attempt to qualify in the class to which his preliminary scores entitle him. Such attempt at qualification will be made in the presence of a commissioned officer who will observe the scoring carefully and certify that the scores were made as returned.

This officer may be of the company whose men are attempting qualification, or from another organization. He will see that the rules in regard to qualification practice are strictly observed and his ruling in regard to any controversy will be obeyed. At the conclusion of the day's practice the officer will make the required certification on the blank provided for the purpose. This blank will be made in duplicate and one sent at once to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, the other to the Regimental Inspector of Rifle Practice through military channels.

All qualification scores will be made on the elliptical target as in previous years. Scores which determine the class in which the contestant may practice for qualification will also be made on the elliptical target. The classes, for the rifle, will be as follows:

SHARPSHOOTERS—Preliminary practice scores must be two scores of 22 at 200 yards, two scores of 23 at 300 or 500 yards and two scores of 22 at 300 or 600 yards.

FIRST-CLASS MARKSMEN—Preliminary practice scores must be two scores of 21 each at 200 and 500 yards or 200 and 300 yards.

MARKSMEN—Members of the Guard who have had any preliminary practice upon the range during the season may practice for qualification in that class.

Oualification scores will be made as follows:

Those who have sharpshooters' scores in preliminary practice will have ten shots over each range and if they make 105 points in the aggregate they are sharpshooters; making 120, they are distinguished sharpshooters.

Those who have first-class marksmen's scores in preliminary practice, will have ten shots over the two ranges and if they make 60 points in the aggregate they are first-class marksmen.

Members of the Guard whose preliminary scores will not permit them to practice in either of the foregoing classes, but who have had preliminary practice on the range during the season, will have ten shots at 200 yards and if they make 26 points they will be classed as marksmen.

Those practicing for sharpshooters or first-class marksmen and failing to qualify as such will be entered in that class to which their scores entitle them.

Carbine and revolver practice will be governed by the same general rules as rifle shooting, with such necessary preliminary and qualification scores as are prescribed by the Regulations.

The commissioned officer in command of the qualification practice will see that all due precautions against danger are taken.

No sighting shots will be allowed at any of the ranges.

The markers in deciding doubtful hits will give careful attention as to whether the edge of the bull's eye or lines are touched by the bullet, and if so the shot shall be counted as having hit the bull's eye or lines and give it the larger score accordingly. The marker will be careful to give the proper signal showing the value of the shot, being particular that the center of the marking disk is placed as near as it can conveniently be over the bullet hole in the target.

After a shot has been scored there can be no change made in the score, unless the officer in attendance has good reason to know that an error has been made in marking.

If it is evident to the officer in charge that a hit was made from a bullet which had struck the ground before hitting the target it must be scored a "miss."

The scorer shall closely observe the marker's signals; call the score and the name of the competitor making it, and then enter it upon his score card.

No two competitors shall shoot with the same rifle, nor shall a rifle be changed after a score has been commenced, unless the rifle has been disabled by accident.

Cleaning of rifles is not allowed, except between ranges.

If the practice is over more than one range, the shortest will be used first and the longest last.

No coaching will be permitted nor shall the officer in charge allow any person other than himself, the scorer and the competitors, nearer than ten yards of the firing point, nor shall anyone be permitted to interfere in any way with the competitors, give advice as to anything pertaining to the shooting, or disturb the competitors by loud talk while the men are at the firing point.

If from any cause the target is removed just as a competitor fires, he shall be given another shot, but no other claim will be considered for giving another shot when one has been made.

Only one attempt at qualification for each member of a company will be allowed during the season.

The officer in charge may test the pull of any rifle and it shall be his duty so to do if asked or if he has reason to think that it is below six pounds, and he shall not allow any soldier to use any rifle the pull of which is less than six pounds.

The Regulations of the National Guard, or Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations, will govern in any case not herein specified.

The Signal Corps and Naval Reserve will be governed by the same rules as are herein laid down for Company organizations.

General Orders, No. 16.

- I. The annual encampment of the land forces of the National Guard of the State of Maine will be held during the third and fourth weeks of August, 1901.
- II. The tour of each organization will be seven days, on the same condition as to pay as heretofore. Arrangements will be made for concentration at the State Camp Ground, Augusta, as follows:
- III. The Second Infantry will proceed to the place of concentration on Saturday, August 10. It will break camp and its several companies will return to their stations on Friday, August 16.
- IV. The First Infantry will proceed to the place of concentration on Saturday, August 17. It will break camp and its several companies will return to their stations on Friday, August 23.
- V. The Signal Corps will report to the commanding officer of the camp on Saturday, August 10. It will break camp and return to its station on Friday, August 16.
- VI. Second Lieutenant Warren E. Riker, commanding Ambulance Corps, will report to the commanding officer of the camp, on Saturday, August 10, with a detail of twelve men of his command. He will be assigned to duty at the camp hospital and ordered to report to the surgeon in charge. Lieutenant Riker will remain on duty at the camp until August 23, reporting on the 17th to the officer then in command, who will assign him to duty as above. At the expiration of the first week, Lieutenant Riker will order a second detail of twelve men of his Corps to report at camp to relieve the detail on duty, which will at once return to its home station.
- VII. No new enlistments will be made in any organization of the National Guard, except the Naval Reserve, between July 20 and August 24. Company and Corps commanders will, upon completion of enlistments, but not later than July 20th, forward to this office through military channels, lists of recruits awaiting examination and muster. No more than one medical examination for each company will be ordered between July 20 and August 24, but men who re-enlist subsequent to the medical examination may be examined and mustered-in at the encampment.
- VIII. On and after July 1, 1901, all enlistment papers will be made in triplicate, one copy to be forwarded at once direct to the Adjutant-General's office, one sent to the Regimental Adjutant with the monthly return, the other retained. Great care should be taken to have each enlistment paper fully and correctly filled out and that in the case of each recruit the three copies correspond exactly. The first name of recruits must always be given in full. The copy of enlistment paper forwarded to the Adjutant-General's office must be accompanied by the "Examination of Recruit," form 52.

- IX. No men will be paid for duty at the encampment whose enlistment papers are not on file in the office of the Adjutant-General and no non-commissioned officer will be paid as such unless notice of his appointment has been received at that office.
- X. Commanding officers of companies and corps will at once make requisition for any articles of clothing or equipment necessary to fill the allowance of their several organizations.
- XI. Bands of the National Guard will not play "The Star Spangled Banner" as a part of a medley. It will be played only as a selection by itself.

General Orders, No. 17.

- I. The Commander-in-Chief having authorized the formation of a State Rifle Team of twelve men and three substitutes to represent the National Guard of the State of Maine in the military matches at the twenty-ninth annual meeting of the National Rifle Association of America and the tenth annual meeting of the New Jersey State Rifle Association to be held at Sea Girt, N. J., August 30th to September 7th, 1901, inclusive, the Inspector General of Rifle Practice has prepared the following instructions and conditions which are hereby approved:
- 2. Company and corps commanders will at once ascertain how many members of their respective organizations are likely to secure the necessary qualifying scores and how many can arrange to make the trip to Sea Girt, August 30th to September 7th, should they succeed in winning a place on the team. They will at once report such information to the Inspector General of Rifle Practice through channels, sending a copy direct.
- 3. The competitive match for places on the State team will be held on the range of Company K, First Infantry, at Brunswick, Saturday, August 3, 1901, commencing at 7.30 A. M.
- 4. At that time members of the National Guard will be allowed to compete for places on the State team, provided they have, up to the 27th day of July, made scores as follows:

At 200 yards-Two scores, five shots each, of 22.

At 500 yards—Two scores, five shots each, of 24.

At 600 yards—Two scores, five shots each, of 23.

Whenever possible, men who do not have a range permitting practice at 500 and 600 yards will endeavor to secure the use of the nearest available range for their 500 and 600 yard work. Company commanders who

have 500 and 600 yard ranges will endeavor in every way to accommodate members of less favored companies.

If, however, the 500 and 600 yard ranges cannot be secured, scores made on the "A" target at 300 yards will be accepted as follows: Two scores, five shots each, of 23; and two scores, five shots each, of 22.

The above scores must be made in a single day's shooting, the only stipulation being that they be made up of five consecutive shots. A score once begun may be discontinued and another commenced.

All scores in preliminary work for places on the State team will be so indicated on the cards, which will be forwarded to the proper officials at the conclusion of each day's practice.

Conditions for the competitive match at Brunswick will be as follows: Ten shots at each range, 200, 500 and 600 yards; no sighting shots allowed. Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations will govern.

The twelve men making the highest scores on the day of competition will be given places on the team and those making the three next highest scores will be classed as substitutes and accompany the team.

To each member of the State team and to each substitute there will be issued 500 rounds of fixed ammunition for individual practice prior to the departure of the State team for Sea Girt, score cards to be returned as herein provided.

- II. Transportation, quarters and subsistence will be furnished, but no per diem will be allowed. Any competitor whose station is so far distant that he cannot reach Brunswick on an early morning train, Saturday, August 3d, will arrange to arrive on the day preceding.
- III. Officers and men will report at the range in fatigue uniform with campaign hats and leggins.
- IV. Members of the team who go to Sea Girt will be furnished transportation, quarters and subsistence while absent from the State, but no per diem will be allowed.

General Orders, No. 19.

- I. The camp of the National Guard of Maine during the annual encampment at Augusta, August 10 to 23, inclusive, will be designated "Camp Hill."
- II. Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, Second Infantry, will be in command of the camp for the week August 10th to 16th inclusive, and Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, will be in command for the week August 17th to 23d inclusive. Each camp commander will prepare and present to this office for approval, orders embracing the routine of each day during his tour of duty, the hours of calls, duties and ceremonies, and such rules and regulations as he may deem necessary for maintaining order and discipline and promoting the efficiency of his command.
- III. The Colonels of the Second and First Regiments, with their Adjutants and Commissary Sergeants, will assume their duties in camp on the mornings of Saturday, August 10th and 17th respectively. The Quartermasters and Quartermaster Sergeants of each regiment will assume their duties on the mornings of Friday, August 9th and 16th respectively.
- IV. Captain Frank B. Harris, Quartermaster, First Infantry, will report to the Commissary General on Friday, August 9th, for duty, reporting back to his regiment on Friday, August 16th.
- V. Captain Wallace A. Purnell, Quartermaster, Second Infantry, will report to the Commissary General, on Friday, August 16th, after his regiment has broken camp on that day. He will return to his home station on Friday, August 23d.
- VI. Company cooks will be ordered to Augusta in advance of their companies so that those of the Second Infantry may be in camp on the morning of Saturday, August 10th, and those of the First Infantry on the morning of Saturday, August 17th.
- VII. The Inspector General, Commissary General, Surgeon General and Inspector General of Rifle Practice will attend the encampment and discharge the duties devolving upon them under the militia law.
- VIII. Muster and payrolls in triplicate of the field and staff, non-commissioned staff and band, companies and corps, will be prepared before going to camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of muster-in of the enlisted men. Any stoppage, under provisions of Section 73, Militia Law, to be deducted from the pay of any commissioned officer or enlisted man will be entered against his name in the column for remarks. The columns for the pay account will be left blank to be filled in by the Paymaster General. Un-uniformed enlisted men will not be brought to camp and no substitutes will be permitted or paid.

No officer or enlisted man will be paid who does not render at least three full days' service within the periods from the 12th to the 16th and the 19th to the 23d of August, both days in each case inclusive. Attention is called to the assignment of pay upon the payrolls. Each officer or enlisted man must indicate upon the payrolls to whom his pay is to be assigned, by writing in the proper columns upon the payroll the name of his assignee. But one assignee will be named for each organization.

IX. The commanding officer of Camp Hill will cause the several organizations of his command to be mustered for pay during the encampment, August 12th to 16th and 19th to 23d, inclusive, on the proper forms, which at the close of the encampment will be forwarded to the Adjutant-General. Mustering officers will report no officer or enlisted man present who does not answer to his name at the muster, and they will muster no substitute.

X. The Adjutants of the First and Second Infantry will arrange for the employment of one civilian cook for each band. Accounts for payment of such cooks whose names must be entered in the account, will be rendered. They will be paid \$1.50 a day for each day's services from the 10th to the 16th and from the 17th to the 23d of August, the periods during which the bands to which they are respectively attached are in camp.

XI. Each company commander of the Second Infantry, will forward to the Quartermaster of his regiment, in care of the Adjutant-General, Augusta, not later than August 8th, a ration return for supper on Saturday, August 10th, and a full ration for the following day, based on the number of men to report for duty with his company.

XII. Each company commander of the First Infantry will forward to the Quartermaster of his regiment, in care of the Adjutant-General, Augusta, not later than August 15th, a ration return for supper on Saturday, August 17th, and a full ration for the following day based on the number of men to report for duty with his company.

XIII. The commanding officers of the Signal Corps and the Ambulance Corps will forward to the Commissary General, in care of the Adjutant-General, Augusta, not later than August 8th, ration returns for supper on Saturday, August 10th, and the full ration for the following day, based on the number of men to report for duty with their corps.

XIV. The Ambulance Corps will occupy the west half of their mess house, the Signal Corps will occupy the east half of the same. A tent will be pitched near the cook house, for the use of the cook of the Signal Corps.

XV. A separate sink having been assigned to each company, camp commanders will require the commanding officer of companies and corps to see that the sinks provided for their respective organizations are properly used and cared for.

XVI. The commanding officer of Camp Hill will render to this office a consolidated morning report on the morning of each day of the encampment.

XVII. He is authorized to grant leaves of absence and furloughs in cases of necessity, upon application approved by intermediate authority.

In cases of sickness, the certificate of the surgeon in charge of the post hospital, or of the regimental surgeon, must accompany the application. Officers and men absenting themselves without such leave of absence or furlough will be reported by name.

XVIII. By virtue of the power conferred by Section 87 of the Militia Law, the authority of the officer in command of the camp is hereby extended to a distance of one-half mile around the State Camp Ground, and upon the external space within such distance from the camp, with the exception of any road or roads within said distance, no person or persons save those especially authorized by law shall be allowed to enter except under such rules as may be established by the officer commanding the camp and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

XIX. The resignation of Second Lieutenant Warren E. Riker, commanding the Ambulance Corps, having been accepted, paragraph VI, General Orders No. 16, A. G. O., c. s., is hereby amended to read as follows: Sergeant Josiah M. Libby, of the Ambulance Corps, will report to the commanding officer of the camp on Saturday, August 10th, with a detail of twelve men. He will be assigned to duty at the camp hospital, and ordered to report with his detail to the surgeon in charge. A second detail of twelve men under command of Sergeant Charles A. Jumper, will report to the commanding officer of the camp on Saturday, August 17th. He will be assigned to duty with his detail as above, and will relieve the detail then on duty, which will at once return to its home station.

XX. Regimental commanders will detail for Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday of each week, twelve experienced men to act as markers and scorers, who will report to the Inspector General of Rifle Practice at the range at 6.45 A. M. each day.

XXI. The following section of the Militia Law of the State is published for the information of all concerned.

"Section 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract or presume to authorize the contracting of any indebtedness on behalf of the State, without the express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State."

II. A special train will leave Bangor, at 1.45 P. M., on August 10th, taking Companies G, I, L and M. Company L will proceed by the train leaving Houlton at 8.35 A. M.; Company I by the train leaving Eastport at 7.33 A. M., and Company M, by this train leaving Machias at 9.27 A. M. Company F will embark on the train leaving Dover at 1.05 P. M., connecting with special at Newport. Company E will leave Skowhegan on the 12.50 P. M. train, connecting with special at Waterville. Company H will embark on the special train on its arrival at Waterville. Company A will proceed by the train leaving Gardiner at 1.10 P. M. Company K will leave Farmington at 8.20 A. M., connecting at Brunswick with the train leaving Brunswick at 11.12 A. M. Companies B and D, the Band and a detail from the Ambulance Corps will embark on the train leaving Lewiston Lower Station at 12.40 P. M.; Company C, the train leaving Bath at 1.05 P. M., connecting with the train leaving Brunswick at 2.10 P. M. The Signal Corps will leave Portland on the 1.10 P. M. train.

Company H, First Infantry, will leave Rockland by 8.00 A. M. train, connecting at Brunswick with the regular train leaving there at 2.10 P M

Company D, First Infantry, will leave Norway by 9.45 A. M. train, connecting at Yarmouth Junction with special from Portland.

Company K, First Infantry, will embark on the 2.10 P. M. train at Brunswick.

Company F, First Infantry, will report as ordered by the regimental commander.

Train service for the conveyance of the several companies of the First Infantry and a detail of the Ambulance Corps, to their respective stations, Friday, August 23d, will be as follows:

A special train will leave Augusta for Portland at 4 P. M., taking Companies A, B, C, D, E, G, I, K, L and M, First Infantry, the Band and the Ambulance Corps detail, connecting at Brunswick with train leaving at 4.50 P. M. for Lewiston, at Yarmouth Junction with the Grand Trunk Railway train leaving at 9 P. M. for Norway, and at Portland with the 8.00 P. M. train for Biddeford.

Company H, First Infantry, will proceed by the train leaving Augusta at 9.42 A. M., connecting at Brunswick with the 2.05 P. M. train for Rockland.

Company F, First Infantry, will report at its armory, Friday, August 17th, as ordered by the regimental commander.

Coaching by the captain of the team or coacher selected by him. Best score to win. Commissioned officers will not compete in this match. Prizes: First, large framed photograph of winning team; one for armory and one for Regimental Headquarters. Second, third and fourth, armory picture.

# OFFICERS' RIFLE MATCH.

Monday, at such hour as the commanding officer of the regiment may direct. Open to any commissioned officer of the regiment. Conditions as to rifle, distance, ammunition, rounds, etc., same as in company team match. Best score to win. No coaching. Prize, U. S. Army revolver.

### COMPANY INSPECTORS' MATCH.

Tuesday, 7 A. M.—Open to any company inspector whose appointment bears date not later than August 1, 1901. Distances, 200 and 300 yards; target, A; positions, at 200 yards, off hand, at 300 yards, prone; rifle and ammunition same as in company team match; rounds, seven, two sighting shots at each range. No cleaning between ranges. Prize, gold medal.

# REVOLVER MATCH.

Tuesday, at such hour as the commanding officer of the regiment may designate. Open to any commissioned officer of the regiment. Conditions: target, A; distances, 25, 50 and 75 yards; six rounds at each distance; ammunition furnished by the State. Best aggregate score to win. Prize, U. S. Army revolver.

### REGIMENTAL CHAMPIONS'HIP MATCH.

Wednesday, 7 A. M.—Conditions: distances, 200, 300 and 500 yards; target A, at 200 and 300, and target B, at 500 yards. Rifle and ammunition same as in company team matches. Any member of the regiment with record of first-class marksman, in the preliminary practice of 1900, allowed to enter. Position at 200 yards, off hand; at other distances, prone. Rounds, seven, two sighting shots at each distance; no cleaning between ranges. Prize, Governor's gold championship medal.

Company inspectors of rifle practice will, at 8 P. M., on the night preceding the company team match, report to the Inspector General of Rifle Practice the personnel of their respective teams. Any changes will be reported to the same officer on the morning of the match before such team commences firing.

Should circumstances require, changes may be made in the hours of competition by the commander of the regiment.

The range will be open for qualification after the close of the matches, and captains of companies will apply to the Colonel commanding for such privilege, furnishing him with the names, and designating the class in which each is to attempt qualification.

The Colonel commanding will make such arrangements with the Inspector General of Rifle Practice as will permit such qualification practice, under the rules governing the same.

  - II. The Board was convened under the following order:

Special Orders, No. 57.

I. Major William O. Peterson, First Infantry, and First Lieutenant George S. McCarty, Company I, First Infantry, as recording officer, are hereby constituted a Board of Inquiry, under provisions of chapter 266, section 114, Public Laws of 1893, as amended by chapter 128, section 15, Public Laws of 1899, to examine into the propriety of conduct of Corporal Josiah N. Collins, Company K, First Infantry.

- II. The Board will meet in Brunswick, in the armory of Company K, First Infantry, at 2 o'clock in the afternoon of Monday, July 1, 1901.
- III. Captain William C. Goodwin, Company K, First Infantry, in charge of armory, will place a suitable room at the disposal of the Board for its sessions.
- IV. The Board will request the attendance of necessary witnesses and may employ a stenographer. It will sit without regard to hours and report with recommendations.
- V. Transportation will be furnished by the Adjutant-General. The President of the Board of Inquiry will render an account of its necessary expenses, which, with expense accounts of the actual and necessary expenses of the members of the Board, will be forwarded to this office through military channels.

- III. The Board finds: 1. That the said Corporal Josiah N. Collins has been most flagrantly guilty of conduct unbecoming a citizen and soldier, as charged by his commanding officer.
- 2. That the said Corporal Josiah N. Collins has been guilty of absenting himself from his company from April 26, 1901, to the present time without the leave of his commanding officer.

The Board recommends: 1. That Corporal Josiah N. Collins, Company K, First Infantry, be reduced to the ranks.

- 2. That the said Corporal Josiah N. Collins be dishonorably discharged from the service of the National Guard of Maine.
- 3. That the said Corporal Josiah N. Collins be forever barred from re-enlisting in the National Guard of the State of Maine.
- IV. The proceedings, findings and recommendations of the Board are approved and Corporal Josiah N. Collins, Company K, First Infantry, N. G. S. I. Lieutenant-Colonel Alonzo York, Major Frank M. Hume, and Lieutenant Bernard W. Sawyer, as recording officer, all of the Second Infantry, are hereby constituted a Board of Inquiry to inquire into the efficiency, discipline and morale of Company M, Second Infantry.

- II. The Board will especially consider the action of the members of this company at an election ordered for the position of Captain in accordance with S. O. No. 37, State of Maine, A. G. O., Augusta, April 23, 1901; their failure to be governed in their actions by the provisions of the Militia Law, and the course of Sergeant Guy D. Getchell in presenting himself as a candidate for election in direct defiance of that law, after having been rejected by the examining board.
- III. The board will further consider the position held by Company M in Machias, whether the inhabitants of that place are interested in its welfare, conform to the requirements of the Militia Law, and are disposed to assist the company as is done in other places.
- IV. The Board will meet at the armory in Machias on Tuesday, June 11, 1901, at 10.30 A. M.
- V. The Board will sit without regard to hours and report with recommendations. Its president is authorized to employ a stenographer if necessary, and will request the presence of necessary witnesses.
- VI. Transportation will be furnished and an expense account of the actual and necessary expenses of the members of the board will be forwarded to this office as soon as possible after adjournment.

III. The Board finds that there is a great lack of discipline in the company, and an utter disregard for the laws of the State and the orders of their superiors among a certain element of the company. That the enlisted personnel of the company is very poor. That Sergeant Guy D. Getchell is guilty of gross misconduct and insurbordination as shown by the facts brought out in the evidence. The Board find further that the citizens of Machias are unanimously in favor of keeping the company here, and would do all in their power to assist it.

The Board recommends: First, that Company M, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., be retained in the town of Machias. Second, that Second Lieutenant George K. Campbell be appointed captain of said company. Third, that the commanding officer of said Company M be instructed to recommend for discharge, for the good of the service, all the disturbing element of the company. Fourth, that Sergeant Guy D. Getchell be reduced to the ranks and be dishonorably discharged for the good of the service.

IV. The proceedings, findings and recommendations of the Board are approved, except in case of the appointment of Second Lieutenant George K. Campbell, as captain. The commanding officer of Company M will at once recommend for discharge all the disturbing element of the company, and Sergeant Guy D. Getchell of said company is hereby reduced to the ranks and dishonorably discharged from the military service of the State of Maine.

In recognition of the efficient manner in which the affairs of the company have been conducted while under his direction and owing to the earnest and faithful work performed by him at the recent encampment, First Lieutenant Alfred K. Ames is hereby appointed Captain, to rank from this date.

V. The Board of Inquiry convened under S. O. No. 49, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s., is hereby dissolved.

### REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR-GENERAL.

LEWISTON, December 16, 1901.

Major-General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, Augusta, Me.:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report for the year ending December 15, 1901.

In accordance with requirements of the Militia Law, and in compliance with G. O., No. 3, c. s., I have inspected all of the companies in the National Guard of the State of Maine, with the exception of Company G of the Second Regiment, whose armory was burned on the very day I was to hold the inspection.

The Guard is organized for purposes of administration and drill into two regiments of Infantry, one division of Naval Reserve, one Signal Corps and one Ambulance Corps.

Each regiment has a band enlisted, consisting of 25 good men who furnish their own uniforms and instruments.

Each band provides its own armory, but the State pays one hundred dollars to each towards the rent.

### INSPECTIONS.

I have inspected each company and corps of the National Guard of the State of Maine at its home station, and submitted at the time a detailed report of its condition and of all United States and State property in the possession of each organization in the service.

I submit the standing of each as to attendance:

First Regiment, table marked "Schedule A." Second Regiment, table marked "Schedule B." Naval Reserve, table marked "Schedule C." Signal Corps, table marked "Schedule D." Ambulance Corps, table marked "Schedule E."

#### STRENGTH.

I have visited and carefully inspected every company in the State. I have pointed out many mistakes in the drill and ceremonies and have always found the officers and men ready and anxious to benefit by any correction or suggestion which I saw fit to make. I find the best companies where the officers take the most pains and insist on strict military discipline from all enlisted men as soon as they enter the armory.

The men themselves like it much better than to have things on the easy, go-as-you-please plan.

I would suggest to every captain that he should be as strict and have the same military bearing if he has only twenty men present, as he would if he had a full company, and was escorting the colors on Governor's Day. It would make it much easier for him and a great deal better for the men.

A captain must vary his drills, and keep his men interested, have something new for them every drill if possible. He must be very thorough in everything he does, and have his men know it, and know that they know it, before going ahead with anything else.

### MILITARY KNOWLEDGE.

During my inspections I have had a good chance to observe to what extent officers are qualified for the commissions which they hold, and I am glad to report that in most cases I have found the officers well qualified. There are a few cases where officers have a suitable knowledge but lack tact in handling their companies.

During my tour of inspection I have always found the officers and men in the armory, ready for the ceremonies.

The officers of the National Guard of Maine are a fine body of men, as a whole. While there is always a chance to improve, as in other walks of life, the citizen soldier of Maine is a credit to the State.

For a detailed report of the condition of each company in the service, I would respectfully call your attention to my report made at the time of my inspection.

### ARMORIES.

The condition of this very important part of the service is improved a little over one year ago. The City of Lewiston has made quite an improvement in the armory, by putting in four water closets and adding four more rooms to what they already had. Company F, Second Infantry, has improved its armory by the addition of rooms for officers and non-commissioned officers, with a prospect of enlarging the drill hall in the future. Company K of the Second also has moved to better quarters, but the drill hall is too small for any movements but squad drills. The drill hall of the armory of Company M of the First Infantry is not conveniently arranged, as there is a row of posts in the center. The condition of the other armories is the same as last year.

The cities and towns should take pride in seeing that their companies have good, comfortable quarters for officers and men, and make them feel that they are appreciated, for there is nothing that helps a captain to keep up the interest in his company like the moral support of the citizens of the town where located.

### MILITARY COURTESY.

Military courtesy is indispensable to good discipline, and the officers and men of the Guard of Maine attend to that duty very well. Each year sees many new men in the ranks, and they do not always think to properly salute, but after their attention is called to the error, and they have been corrected once, they are very careful not to make the mistake again, which speaks well for the kind of material of which the National Guard of the State of Maine is composed.

There seems to be in the breast of every well developed man a spirit of patriotism and a love for martial order which has only to be cultivated to develop the most valuable adjunct of our civil liberties, the American volunteer soldier.

# RIFLE SHOOTING.

This branch of the service has always been a credit to the State. The interest taken by the officers and men for so many years has placed the Guard of Maine in the front rank. Colonel Farrington, who for so many years did so much for the Guard in the way of rifle shooting, and who is entitled to a great deal of credit for his careful and painstaking work, is ably seconded by his successor, Colonel Elliott C. Dill, who does not leave any thing undone that will benefit this branch of the service in which he is so much interested.

### ENLISTMENTS.

The class of young men who are applying for enlistment is of a better quality as a whole than in former years, consequently the personnel is improving each year. There is a disposition on the part of those high in authority to recognize the worth of the men in the service, and to give them the preference, as a rule, when there is a chance for promotion, which is as it should be for if they feel that the State appreciates their efforts, it is an incentive for them to work hard and faithfully when they feel that honest efforts will be rewarded.

#### ENCAMPMENT.

In compliance with G. O. No. 19, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s. the Second Regiment of Infantry, Colonel Everard E. Newcomb commanding, reported for duty at Camp Hill, Augusta, August 10th, 1901. Companies B, C, D, and K arrived at the depot at Augusta at 3.15 P. M., followed by Company A on the *Dummy* from Gardiner. The troop train from the East was late, as usual, and did not arrive until 5.10 P. M. The regiment was quickly formed, and marched to Camp by State Street and Western Avenue. They were received by Major-General John T. Richards, Adjutant-General. The guard details were marched to Camp in advance, and were walking their posts when the regiment came in.

The State Flag was run up for the first time Saturday, August 10th. The companies came in with full ranks, with the exception of Company

M of Machias. There was a combination of circumstances which accounted for the small company which reported.

Sunday morning the surgeons reported no sickness in Camp, and the men took up their duties in earnest. At 2 o'clock P. M. the Chaplain conducted divine services in front of State Headquarters, which was well attended by officers and men, who listened to a very instructive sermon.

At 4.30 P. M., first guard mount, there were many things to criticise, as must be expected when the regiment is together only once a year.

Monday morning, August 12th. Battalion drill in forenoon and afternoon. The Companies worked hard to improve themselves, and the results will show later. The company team matches were shot off in the morning and some very good scores were made. The guard mount was an improvement over Sunday as was also the evening parade. The marching in review was very good.

Tuesday. The Second and Third Battalions were drilled by Captains. The regimental drill under Lieuteant-Colonel York during a part of the forenoon was very good.

Wednesday. The regimental drill by Colonel Newcomb was very good. The guard mount was the best that had been put on thus far. The dress parade was fine.

Thursday. The detail for the colors did not report in season. I was obliged to send an orderly for the detail for firing the morning gun. There seemed to be a laxity on the part of the officer whose duty it was to see that this important duty was discharged on time. At one o'clock P. M., Major Cummings marched his battalion to the State House to receive his Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief, and escort him to the Camp, where he was officially received with a salute of seventeen guns.

The First and Third Battalions were drawn up in line to receive him.

At 3 P. M., Colonel Newcomb formed his regiment for review. The Governor and Staff, accompanied by Colonel Newcomb and Staff, rode around the regiment, after which his Excellency took his position at the reviewing point and the Colonel marched his regiment past. They made a fine appearance, and the Colonel was complimented by the Governor, who expressed himself as well pleased with the evolutions of the regiment and the fine appearance of officers and men.

Friday. The regiment broke camp at 9 o'clock A. M., and marched to the State House, and inaugurated the beautiful custom of saluting the old battle flags in the rotunda, which were carried by their fathers in the War of the Rebellion. The regiment then formed and acted as escort to Trinity Commandery Knights Templar and visiting Commanderies from Bath and Montreal. The companies then embarked for their home stations, feeling that they had spent a profitable week in the State's service.

While the weather was more or less rainy, the regiment did not lose a single drill. The health of the men was very good. No sickness in camp of any account. One man from Company I, of Eastport, had typhoid fever when he came to Camp. The surgeons sent him home in charge of a detail of men from the Ambulance Corps, and everything possible was done for his comfort.

The policing of the Camp was well done. The only duty that was open to criticism was guard duty. The men on post either did not know their duty or were afraid to discharge it.

On the whole, the Second Regiment is a good one, with bright, painstaking officers who try to do the best with what time they have for the service.

On August 17th, the First Regiment, Colonel Lucius H. Kendall commanding, arrived in Augusta, at 4.30 P. M. The regiment was quickly formed and on its way to the Camp, a little delay was caused by not being able to get the horses unloaded promptly. As was the case with the Second, the guard details were sent to Camp ahead of the Regiment, which arrived in Camp at 6 o'clock. The Majors dismissed their battalions opposite their company streets, and the men were soon under canvas and happy.

Saturday night the men were a little noisy, and gave the commander of the guard considerable trouble. Several men were put in the guard house

Sunday morning at the first guard mount of the regiment, the details did not do very well in marching on to the line. The sergeants were not well posted on their duties. At 2.30 P. M., Colonel Kendall marched his command over to the State Headquarters, where Chaplain Cummings preached a very able sermon. Guard duty was very well done.

Monday was devoted to battalion drill. The Majors gave good instruction, and kept at a movement until the companies could execute it properly. The parade was very good and snappy.

Guard duty being well done as a whole, the sergeant of the guard failed to make the proper entries in his guard report book.

On Wednesday the regular routine of Camp was performed in the forenoon. In the afternoon blank ammunition was issued and a miniature battle was fought, which was enjoyed by the visitors in camp.

On Thursday, Governor's Day, the weather was perfect. At I o'clock P. M. the entire regiment marched to the State House to receive the Commander-in-Chief and escort him to Camp. The usual salute was fired. At three P. M. the Commander-in-Chief reviewed his troops and was well pleased with their appearance.

The Governor presented the winning teams and individuals with the trophies they had won at the range and at the armory inspections.

A new feature was introduced in the way of athletic sports which were well enjoyed by all present.

In conclusion, I have only to say that the officers all realize that it is only by hard work and continually keeping at it that we can keep our Guard up to the high standard that every officer feels he would like to see maintained.

I think it would be for the interest of the service to hold two inspections at the armories, each year, and look closer after the wants of the service, as we are anxious to get the very best results for the time and money expended.

# STATE OF MAINE.

Office of the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice.

Augusta, December 15, 1901.

Maj. Gen. Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, State of Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of rifle practice in the National Guard, State of Maine, for the year ending October 31, 1001:

The year's work may on the whole be regarded as very satisfactory, though I feel assured that another twelve-month will find the standard considerably raised. Like the year preceding, the work was somewhat experimental. The rules of 1900 were modified in many respects and they have been watched throughout the year to see wherein they have failed to meet the requirements. While not at all times satisfactory, these rules have proven much better adapted to the needs of the Guard than the rules adopted just prior to the Spanish War, and under which practice was conducted last year. The National Guard being made up of men who render gratuitous service to the State for all save five days, during encampment, the State cannot make undue demand on the time of these men for rifle shooting. For this reason, the attempt to get all the men of a company on the range in one day or two days proved a failure. In the Guard men have to take time for range work so that it will not interfere with their daily avocations. Where one man can use the early hours of the day, another must then be at his work and where a third can get away for a couple of hours at noon, the man he covers in his set of fours finds that his busiest time in the day. It was with full appreciation of this that the rules were changed, making it possible for a soldier to qualify at any time during the season, the only stipulation being that a commissioned officer should be present and certify the scores. Whether further changes will be necessary can better be told at the end of another season's trial. The rules have apparently worked well enough to justify the belief that if more thoroughly understood they would secure the desired results. If company commanders will bear in mind that the whole season is open for qualification and not put off till the closing months their final qualification practice it will be found that the reports to this office will be much longer. Some men have spare time for range work in the spring who find it impossible to get practice in the fall. The spring is, therefore, the time to cultivate these men and a little thought along these lines will add greatly to the strength of any organization.

With few exceptions, the various organizations have shown increasing interest in rifle shooting and have expended much more ammunition than in any year since the routine of the Guard was interrupted by the Spanish War. This augers well for another year and gives those who are laboring for the upbuilding of a high standard encouragement to use added energy.

The detailed statement will show the weaker places and indicate where there is greatest need of a rifle revival.

# THE YEAR'S WORK IN BRIEF.

### FIRST INFANTRY.

The First Infantry, with the exception of one or two companies, has done very satisfactory work the past year, and, with the machinery well in motion, should show even better results another season. Col. Lucius H. Kendall, commanding the regiment, has evinced much interest in rifle shooting. In Lieut. John J. Dooley the regiment has an inspector of rifle practice who has spared neither time nor energy and his exceptional executive ability has done much to raise the standard of rifle shooting in the First. The regiment expended 46,064 rounds of ammunition, as against 31,915 the previous year.

- Co. A, Portland, expended 2.335 rounds of ammunition and are exhibiting an increased interest which leads me to hope for a very much better showing on the range next year. Capt. Burton E. Kennard, who was commissioned captain March 19, 1901, is an officer who strives to place his company among the first and he has the aid of two energetic lieutenants. I feel sure that another year will see Co. A striving for new laurels. Corp. George B. Sawyer, the company inspector, saw much active service in the Engineer Corps of the regular army during the Spanish War and is enthusiastic in his company work. Twelve men qualified as marksmen; two as first-class marksmen, and one as distinguished sharpshooter. All three officers qualified with the revolver.
- Co. B, Portland, expended 5,170 rounds of ammunition and as usual takes rank among the leading companies of the regiment in general range efficiency. Capt. R. C. Parker is a leader among his men in this important part of National Guard duty and has had the added advantage of good company inspectors. April 17, 1901, Sergt. Ralph C. Purinton, having been commissioned battalion adjutant, gave up his work as company inspector, but he left it in good hands. Sergt. W. L. Hatch, who took up the duties of that important detail, has done good service to his company and the State. The company qualified eleven men as marksmen; one as first-class marksmen; eight as sharpshooters and one as distinguished sharpshooter. Capt. Parker and Lieut. W. H. Jenks qualified with the revolver.
- Co. C, Auburn, expended 3,250 rounds of ammunition and did a fairly good season's preliminary practice, but not so many succeeded in qualifying as the nearness of the range to the armory would seem to justify. There is every reason to expect the best work from the Auburn company

another year. Capt. Watson set his men an excellent example of industry on the range. Eight men qualified as marksmen; one as sharpshooter and two as distinguished sharpshooters. All three officers qualified with the revolver.

- Co. D, Norway, expended 3,389 rounds of ammunition, and while his work kept Capt. J. W. Nash away from his command much of the season, the company did very good work. Captain Nash himself is a good rifleman and he has excellent assistance in the person of Sergt. S. S. Maxim, the company inspector. The company qualified eleven men as marksmen; eight as first-class marksmen, four as sharpshooters and two distinguished sharpshooters. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver.
- Co. E, Portland, expended more ammunition than any other Portland company and in this respect was led by only one company in the regiment, Co. M of Westbrook. Co. E expended 7,240 rounds. Sergt. D. A. Kaler, the company inspector, worked faithfully for the upbuilding of his company's record and was on the range early and late. His enthusiasm kept his company interested and his example is one to be emulated by other company inspectors. Twenty-one men qualified as marksmen; five as sharpshooters and five as distinguished sharpshooters.
- Co. F, Augusta, expended 4,350 rounds of ammunition. The company made an excellent showing, despite the fact that for nearly the entire season the company inspector, Sergt. F. P. Lovejoy, was absent from the State. Capt. D. W. Lovejoy and Lieut. C. M. Whitten are both excellent riflemen and their proficiency has stimulated work on the range and largely helped to fill the place of the company inspector. Twenty-seven men qualified as marksmen; one as first-class marksman and three as distinguished sharpshooters. All three officers qualified with the revolver.
- Co. G, Biddeford, has passed through another season of comparative inactivity on the range, but 810 rounds of ammunition being returned as expended. An early start on the range the coming season would give rifle shooting an impetus which would be felt throughout the year. One man qualified as marksman and five as first-class marksmen.
- Co. H, Rockland, has not given the account of itself on the range which was to be expected from an organization with such convenient range facilities. The company possesses many good riflemen and united effort would soon bring the company to the position in the regiment which it should hold. Very few attempted qualification. The company expended but 335 rounds of ammunition.
- Co. I, Lewiston, has had a most gratifying revival of interest in rifle shooting and this year expended 1.540 rounds of ammunition as against 250 last season. The company officers, together with Sergt. T. E. Crane, company inspector, are to be commended for their work on the range, and for their example to the rest of the company. With proper range facilities for the Lewiston companies, I think the three organizations would push on to wonderfully better achievements. Three men qualified as marksmen and five as distinguished sharpshooters. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

- Co. K, Brunswick, has one of the best ranges in the State and has produced many good riflemen. Capt. William C. Goodwin is a rifleman of long experience and high standing and in the person of Lieut. T. T. Rideout he has had a faithful and efficient company inspector. The company expended 5,755 rounds of ammunition to most excellent advantage, the scores showing an unusual high average for the season. Twenty-six members qualified as marksmen; two as first-class marksmen and four as distinguished sharpshooters.
- Co. L, Portland, has shown marked increase in range activity during the year and the cards show 3,840 rounds of ammunition expended as against 930 last year. Capt. M. E. Conley has at all times encouraged his men and with more attention to holding and snapping in armory work and careful instruction on the range, the company will make greater improvement. Nineteen men qualified as marksmen and three as first-class marksmen.
- Co. M, Westbrook, under the able leadership of Capt. J. W. Graham, seconded by Sergt. Geo. H. Leighton company inspector, did work on which the members thereof may look with pride. The company expended 7,465 rounds of ammunition and qualified twenty-one men as marksmen; three as first-class marksmen and four as distinguished sharpshooters. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

### SECOND INFANTRY.

While in some companies the regiment has set a fast pace, there are other companies which have been lagging in the procession. To quite an extent I attribute this to the lack of regimental inspection consequent upon the loss of Lieut. Olin M. Smith, who gave up the post of regimental inspector of rifle practice to accept a battalion adjutancy, the office of inspector dying with his vacation thereof. It is my desire to overcome this difficulty by securing the detail of an efficient officer as acting inspector of rifle practice feeling sure that the various companies would appre-

ciate his support and assistance. Several things have militated against a good season's work in the Second but Col. E. E. Newcomb is too good a rifleman himself to underestimate the value of target work and next year will tell a different story.

Co. A, Gardiner, is at last ready for good work on the range, thanks to the individual work of Capt. F. B. Thompson. Capt. Thompson has been endeavoring to secure proper range facilities ever since he took command of the company and he has finally succeeded. Through the effort of those interested in military affairs in the city, the city government was induced to appropriate a sum not to exceed two hundred dollars for the construction of a rifle range. Several sites were looked over but found impracticable. The site finally chosen was across the Kennebec in Randolph but within ten minutes' walk from the armory. Even then the project might have fallen through but for the energy of Capt. Thompson. When he found that no one could be secured to build the range, he took charge of the construction and superintended the work. The range was completed late in the fall but in the additional month allowed the company by the Commander-in-Chief sufficient work was done to give ample notice that in the coming season "A" will be a hard-working organization on the range. In the course of the season the company expended 1,770 rounds of ammunition, qualifying eight men as marksmen; three as firstclass marksmen and one as sharpshooter. Sergt. Horace S. Peacock will do good work as company inspector.

Co. B, Lewiston, is one of the companies which does its full share of work on the range and under the direction of Lieut. Wm. H. Matthews, company inspector, and Capt. Cornelius J. Kelleher, there is never any doubt that the said work will be well-done. Capt. Kelleher is a thorough student of the rifle, always on the alert to gain further knowledge and his example and coaching are most beneficial to his company. The score cards show an expenditure of 5,190 rounds of ammunition exclusive of the special issue for the Sea Girt team. Twenty-nine men qualified as marksmen; one as first-class marksman; five as sharpshooters and four as distinguished sharpshooters. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. C, Bath, was deprived of the use of its range early in the season and it was not till shortly before encampment that it was ready for practice. It is now in the best of condition and there can be no excuse for failure to make a good showing next year. Capt. Wm. R. Kimball informs me that unforseen circumstances have prevented his men from putting in their usual practice this year but assures me that another season things will be different. Few companies in the Guard have so convenient a range as the Shipping City and it is worthy constant usage. The company expended 2,970 rounds of ammunition, qualifying nine men as marksmen; four as first-class marksmen. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. D, Lewiston, like Co. B of the same city, is an organization of range workers. Capt. G. F. Garcelon has an exceptionally good company inspector in the person of Lieut. F. H. Greenan, who is not only a reliable

marksman who can be depended upon for a high score but an instructor who enthuses his men and gets the best results from them. The company expended 4,995 rounds of ammunition, qualifying twenty-three men as marksmen; twelve as first-class marksmen; three as sharpshooters and three as distinguished sharpshooters. Lieut. Greenan qualified with the revolver, making the highest score returned for the season, in his regiment and tying that of Lieut. W. H. Jenks of Co. B of the First.

Co. E, Skowhegan, has not shown the interest in rifle shooting which was to be expected from a company so advantageously located. In years past Co. E has given the regiment some of its best marksmen and I feel certain that a well-directed effort along the line of marksmanship would discover a new team that would take up the old standard. The company expended 1,612 rounds of ammunition, qualifying twenty-one men as marksmen and two as distinguished sharpshooters.

Co. F, Dover, is an organization which has had its vicissitudes but is now traveling the right way under the firm and tactful leadership of Capt. Walter J. Mayo. In range work the company has great possibilities for it numbers among its members some of the most promising shots of the Guard. Sergt. S. E. Coburn is a rifleman from whom the company may well be content to learn, and as company inspector he is doing the best of work and trying in every way to increase the average interest. The company expended 2,482 rounds of ammunition with a large percentage of high scores. Thirteen men qualified as marksmen; three as sharpshooters, and three as distinguished sharpshooters.

Co. G, Bangor, it will be borne in mind, had an armory fire early in the season which deprived the men of their practice when it was most essential to secure lively interest. The promise of a new range will give new life to target work in the Queen City. The company this year expended 4,110 rounds of ammunition; thirteen men qualifying as marksmen; four as first-class marksmen. Capt. Howard Brett qualified with the revolver.

Co. H, Waterville, did plenty of preliminary work but a change of company inspectors early in the season and again in the latter part cost the company much on qualification. Co. H has a good record to live up to and I look for good results from Sergt. Wm. I. Sterling, the new inspector.

Co. I, Eastport, has not taken much interest in range work the past year, though it is a company which in other days led the State and the nation. But little ammunition was expended and no return was made of qualification practice.

Co. K, Farmington, merits high praise for the work of the year. It is the first year's shooting that the company has done, the range having been completed late in the previous season. Capt. George McL. Presson took hold of the rifle practice of his company with the same firm grasp which has made his company a success in every other way. Two afternoons of each week were set apart for range work and Capt. Presson was always among the party at the firing line. This regularity of practice has done wonders in the rank and file of a company made up almost wholly of men unaccustomed to the use of the Springfield. In Sergt. F. W. Lawry the

company has an efficient and hardworking inspector of rifle practice. The company expended 3,645 rounds of ammunition, but none of the men qualified owing to a misunderstanding of the rules.

Co. L, Houlton, did a good season's preliminary work and has among its members riflemen of high rank, but neglected to make any return of qualification practice. According to the cards the company expended 4,501 rounds of ammunition.

Co. M, Machias, was in a more or less disorganized condition, owing to the untimely death on February 16, 1901, of Capt. Sanford A. Clark, and the later action of the company which resulted in an investigation under S. O., No. 37, State of Maine, A. G. O., Augusta, April 23, 1901. In consequence, rifle shooting reached a low ebb, but the dawn of better days seems to have come and next year's report promises better. The company expended 373 rounds of ammunition, qualifying seven men as marksmen.

#### SIGNAL CORPS.

The Signal Corps expended 1,320 rounds of ammunition as against 295 rounds for the year preceding. Sergt. W. D. Floyd has done conscientious work with his men, despite the fact that for much of the time the Corps was deprived of the immediate supervision of a commissioned officer. The retirement of Capt. George W. Butler, made necessary by his employment in another state, occasioned sincere regret, but in his successor, Lieut. John R. Lowell, the Corps has an officer who will take pride in keeping up the well-earned reputation of the organization.

### FIRST DIVISION, NAVAL RESERVE.

The First Division, Naval Reserve, expended 748 rounds of ammunition, eight men qualifying as marksmen with scores which indicate that very little practice would give many of them higher rating. The Reserves are now in possession of a one-pound, R. F. Hotchkiss gun and a system of qualification more adapted to naval standards will doubtless be established in the near future. Gunner's Mate Charles Baker does the work of company inspector and is much interested in the new piece of ordnance. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver.

#### RANGES.

I am glad that it is possible to report some improvement along this line but I regret that the room for improvement still remains so large.

The city of Portland appropriated \$1,200 for the construction of a range suitable for its six organizations, but an acceptable site could not be found within reasonable distance from the city, hence the Stroudwater range is the only one available to this large number of men.

The range in Auburn, which is used by Companies C and I of the First and B and D of the Second is entirely inadequate to the demand of so many men. The three Lewiston companies are in pressing need of a range of their own and the Spindle City should at once take steps to provide the same. The Auburn range was in need of many repairs, early in the season, and after the matter had been properly explained I found Hon. George W. Furbish, mayor of Lewiston, and Hon. J. S. P. H. Wilson, mayor of Auburn, very ready to do all the companies desired.

The range at Bath has, during the season, been permanently repaired and is now in excellent condition.

Temporary repairs were made this past summer on the Augusta range but the bullet stop is not satisfactory and cannot be made so without quite an outlay of money. The range leaves much to be desired for the encampment practice and I most heartily renew the oft-repeated plea of my distinguished predecessor for a State range.

Co. A of the Second has a new range, built the latter part of the fall. The range is in Randolph, across the river Kennebec from Gardiner, and is substantially built.

Co. L of the Second has a new and excellent range within easy access from the business portion of Houlton.

Co. G of the Second has secured a five-years' lease of a piece of land on Essex street about two miles from City Hall and the city will erect a range thereon early in the spring. The range will permit practice at 600 yards.

Eastport and Machias stand in need of improved range facilities.

#### MAINE AT SEA CIRT.

Under the provisions of G. O., No. 17, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s., a rifle team of twelve men and three substitutes was formed and attended the meetings of the National Rifle Association of America and the New Jersey State Rifle Association at Sea Girt, N. J., which was held from August 30th to September 7th. The team was made up as follows: Capt. C. J. Kelleher, Co. B, Second Infantry; Lieut. F. H. Greenan, Co. D, Second Infantry; Lieut. Wm. H. Matthews, Co. B, Second Infantry; Lieut. Ralph C. Purinton, battalion adjutant, First Infantry; Sergt. G. P. Clark, Co. L, Second Infantry; Sergt. S. E. Coburn, Co. F, Second Infantry; Sergt. Walter L. Hatch, Co. B, First Infantry; Sergt. D. A. Kaler, Co. E, First Infantry; Sergt. H. W. Warren, Co. F, Second Infantry; Sergt. Martin E. Newburg, Co. H. Second Infantry; Corp. E. W. Judkins, Co. F, Second Infantry; Priv. H. A. Buker, Co. D, Second Infantry. Substitutes, Lieut. Nay S. Varney, Co. E, Second Infantry; Capt. Wm. H. Watson, Co. C, First Infantry; Sergt. Wm. L. Smith, battalion sergeant major, First Infantry.

The team was made up wholly of men who had never been beyond the State to compete in rifle matches, but they worked hard, both before and after leaving the State, and in the face of teams composed of seasoned men, armed with the latest model Krags, they made a creditable showing with their Springfields. The team was coached by Capt. C. J. Kelleher and no man could have been more faithful or painstaking in the performance of his duties. Col. Lucius H. Kendall, commanding the First Infantry, accompanied the team and was unremitting in his efforts to assist the riflemen.

Sergt. Walter L. Hatch won fourth prize in the Inspector's Match at 500 and 600 yards, his score being 89 out of a possible hundred.

A company team consisting of Sergt. S. E. Coburn, Sergt. H. W. Warren and Corp. E. W. Judkins, all of Co. F. Second Infantry, won fourth prize in the Company Team Match at 200 and 500 yards, being but four points behind the winners in a field which was the largest in the history of the range.

The team was entered in the Hilton Trophy and the Interstate Matches and the First Regiment team entered in the Interstate Regimental Match.

The sending of a team to Sea Girt is strongly to be recommended and its value lies not in the number of prizes it may bring home but in the education it gives the men and the stimulus it is to rifle shooting in the Guard. It is too much to expect that a Maine team will defeat teams which have unlimited means for target practice and a climate which permits range work nearly all the year, but each year that a team is sent to compete in the national matches rifle shooting in Maine is so much advanced.

The Maine team left New Jersey with the kindliest of feelings toward the officials of the associations in charge of the meet, for every courtesy was shown to the men from the Pine Tree State.

### IN GENERAL AND IN CONCLUSION.

It gives me especial pleasure to announce that His Excellency, the Commander-in-Chief, has seen fit to evince his interest in rifle shooting by offering valuable prizes to be competed for in each regiment, the details to be announced in orders.

A stand of twenty U. S. Magazine Rifles, Calibre .30, have been secured for the use of the State Team which will be selected as early in the summer as practicable. These rifles are fitted with the 1901 sights and are the model which was so extensively used at Sea Girt last summer. The Secretary of War having recommended the issue of Krags to the

militia of the several states, it is deemed only a question of two or three years when the Maine Guard is armed with the modern rifle and study of its construction and use by the State team will be valuable when the issue to all the State forces is made.

I regard as one of the most encouraging signs, an increase of interest in range work among commissioned officers. Enlisted men are quick to observe which way the attention of their officers is directed and the officer who puts his spare time into the rifle shooting will carry a large following of his men with him. On the range the plain blouse is on equal terms with the chevron or the strap, so far as scores go, and the friendly rivalry thus engendered between officers and men goes far to cement the unity of purpose which will raise and maintain the standard of the National Guard. This year's work has shown that men are not laying aside the rifle of enlistment when they buckle on the sword of commission. If men as they come up from the ranks will bear this in mind the standard of rifle shooting among the commissioned officers will be so high that it will be the best possible example to the enlisted men. There is also a gratifying increase in the use of the revolver by the officers and a desire on their part to become proficient marksmen.

In Appendix A will be found the scores of the encampment matches and in Appendix B, the qualification returns from the various organizations.

From all officers and men I have received the most cordial support and for the loyalty of the riflemen in the several commands I wish to express my most hearty appreciation.
