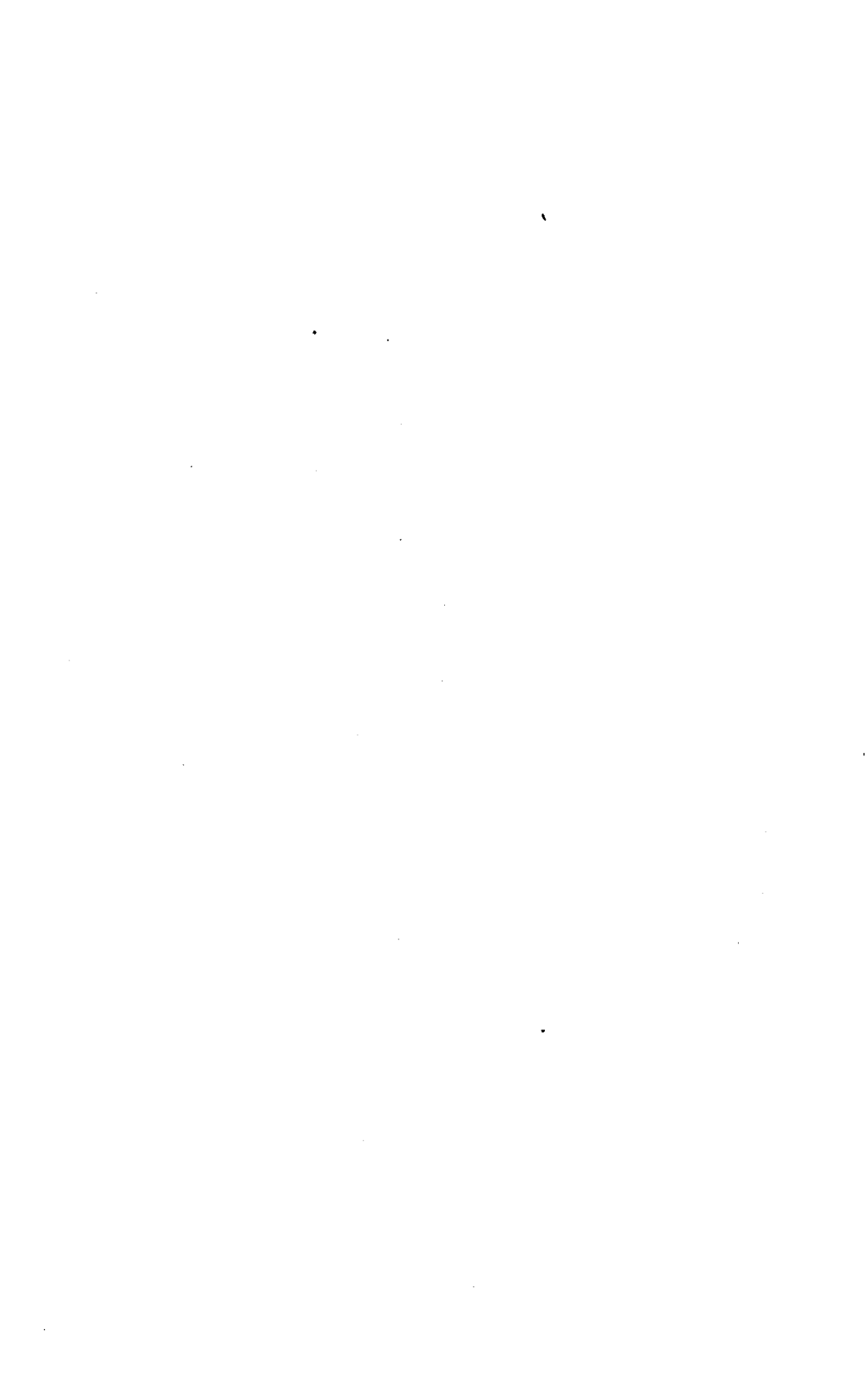

PORTLAND, ME., December 1, 1902.

To the Governor and Council of the State of Maine:

In compliance with public statutes, chapter 77, section 57, I herewith submit my report of the business of the office of attorney-general for the two years ending November 30, 1902.

HOMICIDES.

Indictments for murder have been disposed of as follows :

STATE *vs.* EDWIN H. KNIGHT.

At the January term of the supreme judicial court, 1901, holden at Saco for the county of York, Powers, J., presiding, the grand jury returned an indictment against Edwin H. Knight of South Berwick, charging him with the murder of Fanny E. Sprague.

On the first day of May, 1900, in the forenoon, the barn on the old F. J. Knight place in South Berwick was discovered to be on fire. In suppressing the fire it was shortly discovered that a crime had been committed by someone. The lifeless body of Fanny E. Sprague was found in one of the horse stalls weltering in blood and partly burned. The throat of the deceased was found to have been pierced with some sharp instrument and the jugular vein severed. The skull was bruised, showing that severe blows had been dealt upon the head, in fact, the weapon with which the blows had been given was found on the premises, being an oak stake, apparently a wagon stake which had been broken by the force of the blows. This stake was bloody, show-

ing conclusively the use to which it had been put. There were pools of blood outside of the stall where the assault evidently had been made. After the assault the body had been dragged into the stall, and when the fire was first discovered, a strong scent of kerosene oil was also noticed showing that it had been used to hasten the fire. An autopsy was made and it was found that the deceased had been pregnant for the period of five months, and that her death resulted from the stab in the throat which severed the jugular vein. The victim was a single woman and was employed among the people in Berwick and South Berwick to assist in housework. She was so employed at the place where the crime was committed. No one was living on the premises except one Samuel Locke, who, on the day of the homicide, was employed in the woods chopping wood. A careful examination of the details of the case, concerning Samuel Locke, gave conclusive evidence that he had no hand in the murder.

Steps were taken at once to discover the perpetrator of the deed. It was assumed that the guilty party was not a resident of the place and search was conducted along this line, but it was soon discovered that the road leading past where the deed was committed had been uncommonly policed on that forenoon by many parties who were going back and forth over it. So, also, the railroad back of the house did not offer a way of successful escape, because the railroad hands were at work on the road and saw no stranger or person pass over the road whatever. The conduct of the respondent during the continued examination into the case, and the various pieces of evidence pointing to him, soon led the officials to believe that the respondent was guilty of the crime. All clues pointing in other directions faded out and the parties therewith connected were fully and satisfactorily accounted for.

On the 27th day of the term of said court the respondent was arraigned and a plea of not guilty was entered by him. Hon. George C. Yeaton of Berwick, and Hon. Frank M. Higgins of Limerick appeared as his counsel and successfully defended him. A great mass of evidence, both by the State and by the defence, was adduced during the trial, consuming with the arguments and the charge of the court two weeks when the case was given to the jury and a verdict of not guilty returned.

Although careful and continued search has been made by the county officials, no evidence connecting any other person with the crime has yet been discovered. The motive of the crime was without doubt the destruction of the unborn child.

The county attorney, W. S. Mathews, devoted a great amount of time in the careful examination of the facts in the case and in its preparation for trial. No detail was too small and no effort too great on the part of the county attorney to deter him from a most exhaustive presentation of the case in court, and great credit is due him in this respect.

STATE *vs.* EDWARD GRAFFAM AND WILLIAM HANDS.

On the 13th day of January, 1901, the people of Gorham were shocked to learn that a most brutal murder had been committed in their midst. Clifford Mosher, with his mother, resided in a farmhouse on the main road near Gorham Village. There were neighbors living in the immediate vicinity. Near midnight on the 12th one of the neighbors was called up by Mrs. Mosher, the mother of Clifford Mosher, who had dragged herself, although infirm and suffering from wounds, through the snow to a neighbor's house where she announced that she and her son had been attacked earlier in the evening in their house, and urged that someone should go to the immediate relief of her son. The help which she summoned proceeded to the house of Mrs. Mosher, and there found that a most terrific struggle had occurred between Clifford Mosher and the assailants. A back window was broken in through which the parties made their entrance into the house. The furniture was broken up and the floor and walls of the parlor were spattered and smirched with blood. The weapon used by the assailants, by which the life of Clifford Mosher was taken, was found; being a large hard-wood stake which had been taken from the back of the barn. Clifford Mosher was dead when help reached the house. The assailants had disappeared. There had been a light fall of snow which enabled the officials to follow the track of the assailants to Portland. William Hands, a colored man, was arrested on the morning of January 13th while he was passing along the railroad west of Portland in the town of Scarborough. Various articles

found upon him were identified by Mrs. Mosher as having been taken from her house. Hands finally admitted that another person was concerned in the assault with him, and described the personal appearance of the party, which description proved to be accurate when later suspicion fell upon Edward Graffam, who was traced to Boston and from there to Hopedale, Mass., where he was arrested. As in most murder cases small pieces of evidence began to crop out, which showed conclusively that Edward Graffam and William Hands were the two parties concerned in the deed.

At the May term of the Superior Court for the county of Cumberland, 1901, Bonney, J., presiding, Edward Graffam and William Hands were indicted for the murder of Clifford Mosher and on the 16th day of May the Court assigned as counsel for Graffam, Charles A. True, Esq., of Portland, and as counsel for Hands, George Libby, Esq., of Portland. Each respondent was arraigned and each pleaded not guilty. On the same day Graffam filed a motion for a separate trial, and on the 24th day of May, a hearing was had thereon and the motion was granted. On the 10th day of June the State proceeded to the trial of Graffam, and although the respondent was ably defended by his counsel, yet the evidence was so overwhelming that on the 17th day of June the jury very quickly returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. On the same day counsel for the respondent filed a motion in arrest of judgment, which said motion was withdrawn on the 20th day of June, and the respondent was then sentenced to imprisonment and labor in the States Prison for and during the term of his natural life.

William Hands did not go to trial. He turned States evidence and testified in the trial of Graffam to all the particulars of the case. From his statements it became evident that Graffam started out from Boston on the 12th day of January for the express purpose of visiting the Mosher place with the intent to commit larceny or robbery. It appeared, also, from the evidence, that Hands had no knowledge of Graffam's plans, and that he acted as Graffam's tool. Graffam was thoroughly acquainted with the Mosher premises, since he had lived for a number of years in the immediate vicinity, and had been employed at the Mosher house. After due consideration by the officials of the State, of the assistance which Hands had rendered to the State

in giving it the information which he possessed in relation to the crime, it was deemed advisable to accept from him a plea of manslaughter. He thereupon retracted his plea of not guilty and pleaded guilty of manslaughter, which having been received, he was sentenced to States Prison for the period of ten years.

The details of this case were carefully and ably worked up by the officials. The county attorney, Robert T. Whitehouse, Esq., very ably marshalled the facts and rendered great assistance in the trial of the case. The trial of this case was attended with very great excitement, owing to the atrocity of the deed and the bad reputation of the respondent Graffam.

STATE *vs.* CHARLES A. McCLOUD.

Early on the morning of September 4th, 1901, the dead body of Sarah A. McDonald was found by the roadside at Kittery Point about three-quarters of a mile from her home. A careful examination of the body of the deceased disclosed that she had been choked and otherwise bruised about her head, for blood was oozing from the nostrils. There were teeth-marks in her left ear; the head was bruised to quite an extent but perhaps not sufficient to produce death; the underclothing was saturated with blood and parts of it were found in a pasture near where the body lay. It was discovered at the autopsy that death was caused from hemorrhage; that a severe wound about five inches in depth in the vagina had been inflicted by some instrument, which was the cause of the hemorrhage. It became evident that the woman had been assaulted and that she died from the effects of the assault.

The deceased took in laundry work for a living and on the evening of the assault was returning to her home from Portsmouth, partly by the electric cars and the balance of the distance, about one and three-quarters of a mile, by walking along the highway. Shortly after she left the electric car one Charles A. McCloud, the respondent, who was in the same car with her, and was on his way home, left the car and returned towards the point where the deceased got off.

The respondent was found at his home the following morning and denied any knowledge of the assault. Various lines of evi-

dence having been followed up immediately by the officials it became evident that McCloud was the guilty party. Thereupon he was taken into custody. It was found, also, that McCloud purchased at Portsmouth in the evening of the assault, a bottle of whiskey which he took along with him and which he evidently left where the body was found, for a bottle answering the description of the one which he purchased was found at that point. It is evident, however, from the statements of McCloud that he was not particularly intoxicated, but that his act resulted from jealousy of certain Italian workmen who were in that vicinity. Before the respondent was arrested he made a confession to Hon. Horace Mitchell and later to the sheriff. At the September term, 1901, of York county, Savage, J., presiding, the respondent was indicted for murder and being arraigned on said indictment, pleaded guilty. Fred J. Allen, Esq., of Sanford was appointed by the Court as his counsel. On October 4th, the evidence of the State was taken out to fix the degree of guilt, and the Court found the respondent guilty of murder in the first degree. On the same day he was sentenced to imprisonment and labor for life in the State's Prison. There is little or no doubt that jealousy of the Italian workmen's relation with Sarah E. McDonald was the cause of the crime.

The evidence fixing the degree of guilt was taken out by W. S. Mathews, Esq., County Attorney, while I was engaged trying the Brainard case in the city of Portland which prevented me from taking part in the hearing. In this case the County Attorney exhibited much tact and energy in discovering the perpetrator of the crime and in bringing the case to a prompt and satisfactory conclusion without the intervention of the Court further than to take out the evidence of degree of guilt. His management of the case was satisfactory in every respect.

STATE *vs.* ELECTUS OAKES.

This is the only case in which an indictment had been found and was pending when I assumed the duties of my office. A full statement of the case was made by Hon. William T. Haines, ex-Attorney-General, in his report of 1899-1900, to which I refer for the details and particulars.

In brief, the respondent was convicted of murder in the first degree at the September term of court, 1900, holden at Houlton, Aroostook county, but on account of the presiding justice having failed to charge the jury on the question of manslaughter, exceptions were taken by the counsel for the defense, Hon. Don A. H. Powers of Houlton, and the case was carried to the Law Court. The exceptions were sustained, the verdict set aside, and the defendant granted a new trial.

When I came to the office in 1901, this case was in order for disposal. At that time the respondent was a man of about eighty-two years of age. He had then been in confinement for nearly three years. The defense offered to retract the former plea of not guilty and to enter a plea of manslaughter, if the State would accept the same. On a careful examination of the details of the case, and having become convinced on examination of the evidence that the offense was due in quite a measure to anger and excited passions, I deemed it advisable to accept the plea of manslaughter rather than put the county to the expense of a trial of the cause, with the probable result that a verdict of manslaughter would be returned by the jury.

The case was assigned for trial at the September term of the Supreme Judicial Court of Aroostook county, 1901, Fogler J., presiding, at which time the facts in the case were presented to the Court, and my position having been sustained by the Court, the defendant retracted his former plea of not guilty and entered a plea of manslaughter, which was accepted, and thereupon the respondent was sentenced to six months in the county jail at Houlton.

The Court said at the time of imposing sentence, "In imposing sentence upon this respondent I take into consideration his extreme age and his apparent infirmities of life. I take into

consideration the fact that he has now been in jail for more than two years. I take into consideration his former life as it has been stated by his counsel and which corresponds as I recollect, for I went over the case carefully when it was in my hands, with the printed record. He is an old, decrepit man. I do not feel in such case like imposing a severe sentence. I think that it is a case where clemency may properly be exercised and I do exercise it."

At this hearing Hon. R. W. Shaw of Houlton, County Attorney, assisted me in disposing of the matter in hand. Hon. Don A. H. Powers appeared for the defendant and ably presented his views of the case to the Court.

STATE vs. GEORGE H. BRAINARD.

On the 24th day of April, 1901, the city of Portland was startled with the announcement that one George H. Brainard had shot at a number of men at the Telephone Exchange and that he had killed two of the parties. The shooting occurred in broad daylight, immediately after the noon hour. The officers were at once called, and, after a struggle, Officer Frith got the respondent under control and arrested him, although before he was able to do so the respondent discharged his pistol at and upon the officer. Of the five men whom the respondent shot, three recovered and two died from the effects of the shooting: to wit, Isaiah H. Farnham and Earl M. Buxton.

It appears from the evidence presented at the trial that George H. Brainard, the respondent, had charge of a crew of men who were employed by the New England Telephone and Telegraph Company at its Exchange rooms in the city of Portland. The particular work which was being done at that time, was the installation of new switch-boards. The work had been progressing satisfactorily in every way. There was no friction among the men of any particular consequence further than frequently occurs between men and their overseers. On said 24th day of April the respondent, shortly after noon, appeared at the Exchange rooms and commenced deliberately to discharge his pistol at the various workmen present, and while doing so

making statements and assertions which, taken in connection with other evidence produced, were quite conclusive of the fact that he was fully aware of what he was doing and of the consequences of his acts.

At the May term of the Superior Court, 1901, of Cumberland county, Bonney, J., presiding, an indictment was found against Brainard for the murder of Farnham. On the 17th day of May the Court assigned Hon. Enoch Foster and Levi Greenleaf, Esq., both of Portland, as counsel for the respondent. Immediately counsel for the defense filed a notice that a plea of insanity would be offered by the respondent, and thereupon the respondent was ordered into the custody of the superintendent of the Maine Insane Hospital, to be detained and observed until further orders from the Court. At the September term of the Superior Court the respondent was arraigned and a plea of not guilty by reason of insanity was entered. On the 30th day of September the case was opened to the jury.

The officials of the State on the first presentation of this case to the jury were not satisfied in their own minds as to the mental condition of the respondent on the 24th day of April when the shooting occurred. That he might or might not at that time have been responsible for his acts was a serious question with the State officials. The respondent had been under observation at the Insane Asylum and able and competent experts had expressed their opinion to the effect that the respondent was not responsible for his acts. This state of doubt on the part of the officials at the trial of the case, continued in a greater or less degree until the evidence for the defense was put in. The testimony of the relatives of the respondent, and of the workmen employed with him, at once aroused suspicion as to the plea of insanity. As the evidence for the defense progressed this suspicion ripened into the firm belief that the respondent was feigning, and that at the time of the shooting, he was entirely responsible for his acts. Besides the relatives who testified, the defense put on as experts Drs. Thayer, Sanborn, Jelly, and Lane. I became so thoroughly convinced of the sanity of the respondent, after hearing the evidence of the defense, supplemented by the evidence in rebuttal on the part of the State, that I sought to present to the jury all of the facts in the case from the standpoint of sanity.

The case was ably defended by the respondent's counsel, Messrs. Foster and Greenleaf, and every phase of the same bearing on the insanity theory was presented with much force.

The case was given to the jury on the 7th day of October and a verdict of murder in the first degree was returned. On the 8th day of October the Court imposed sentence of imprisonment and labor in State's Prison for and during the term of the respondent's natural life.

Jealousy of the workmen whom Brainard thought were being advanced over him in the company's service, was evidently the leading cause of the commission of the crime.

As in the Edward Graffam case, the County Attorney, Robert T. Whitehouse, Esq., rendered the most valuable assistance in the trial of the cause. The case was thoroughly prepared by him and presented to the jury in a careful, logical and lucid manner.

STATE *vs.* ALEXANDER TERRIO.

On April 11, 1901, as a crew of lumbermen were passing over the tote road leading from Asquith Station on the C. P. R. R. towards Brassua pond, at a point about a mile and one-half distant from Asquith Station, they discovered the body of a person lying very close to the road and almost wholly covered by snow, ice and bushes. The weather having been somewhat warm, the snow and ice had partially melted away, exposing to view part of the coat and the extremities of one hand. Notice was at once given to the proper authorities and on examination it was found that the body was that of Matthias Pare.

Pare was a Frenchman about twenty years of age, who had for the past two years been coming to the State of Maine from the Provinces to work in the woods during the winter season. He came, as usual, in the fall of 1900 and engaged work with one Sylvere Gaudet. On the 8th day of March, which was Friday, Pare was paid for his winter's work, to wit: a due-bill for \$106.58 and cash \$1.50. On the 9th, he came out of the woods and on the following day (Sunday) got his due-bill cashed at Kineo and remained through Sunday at Mr. Gaudet's

house at Moose River, starting the next morning (Monday) for Canada.

It appears by the evidence, that Pare and the respondent had some conversation on Sunday. No one was near enough to hear what was said, but it was well known among Pare's friends that he had gotten his due-bill cashed and that he had his money with him, amounting at least to \$102.50. On starting out Monday he made two calls along the road leading from Moose River settlement, and finally got on the team of one Parent and rode to the Piers at Brassua pond. At that point Parent directed him by the shortest way, the cookee's road leading across the pond to the tote road and by the tote road to Asquith Station. Parent, who directed him on his way, was the last man who saw him alive.

It appears that the respondent Terrio had a pair of snow-shoes which were of unequal size. Joe Murray, starting out from his home early Monday morning and passing over his trail leading from Moose river to the westerly side of Brassua pond, noticed snow-shoe tracks and recognized them as being similar to those made by Terrio's snow-shoes with which he was familiar. He noticed that when following along his trail the tracks reaching the easterly shore of Brassua pond, diverged southerly and westerly from the trail, which was in the direction of the place where Pare's body was found.

Terrio claims that on the day of Pare's disappearance, he was chopping wood back of his house in the forenoon, but those passing along the road did not hear any chopping, and that in the afternoon he remained at home and was employed in laying a floor in his house, but it was found that the floor had been laid prior to that date. It was found that Terrio paid out considerable money immediately after the disappearance of Pare, but he claimed that the money which he paid out was a part of a sum of money which he had buried in the cellar of his house and which he brought from Madison when he first came to Moose River settlement some two years prior.

It appears from evidence, including Terrio's own statements, that he was not at home on Monday; also a careful examination of the place where Terrio claimed his money was buried disclosed none, although he claimed after his arrest that a part of

it was still buried in his cellar. His expenditures of money immediately following the disappearance of Pare, taken with the money which was found in his possession, was very near the sum which Pare had when he started for home.

It was found on examination of Pare's body, that he had received three shots, and besides, his skull was fractured and crushed in and his throat pierced by some sharp instrument. A shell was found close by the body. A microscopic photograph of the primer of the shell, made by Dr. Whittier of Brunswick, compared exactly with a microscopic photograph of the end of the firing-pin in Terrio's rifle, showing characteristic and similar markings in both.

The forenoon that Pare started out for Canada, one Simeon Newton, who was at Asquith Station, started north over the tote road, in an opposite direction from that pursued by Pare, and reached the point where Pare's body was found evidently but a few moments after the assault had been made, for the snow was trodden with snow-shoe tracks, and besides, passing along over the road, a few rods northerly from where the body of Pare was found, Newton saw snow-shoe tracks crossing the road and noticed their unequal size, and saw a man moving away in the woods some ten rods from the tote road westerly. This man, although Newton saw only his back, made such an impression on him, from the manner in which he walked, that a very short time afterwards when Terrio appeared in the camp where Newton was employed, he recognized Terrio as the man whom he saw where Pare's body was found.

At the September term of the Supreme Judicial Court, 1901, of Somerset county, Emery, J., presiding, an indictment was found against Alexander Terrio for the murder of Matthias Pare, to which indictment he pleaded not guilty. The Court assigned Messrs. McGillicuddy & Morey of Lewiston, as counsel for the respondent, who defended their client with great skill. On the 5th day of November the case was submitted to the jury. A large mass of evidence having been taken out, both by the State and by the defense, and the case having been presented at length to the jury, on November 12th a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree was returned. On the day following the respondent filed a motion that the verdict be set aside, which

motion was overruled by the Court and the case was continued marked "Law." At the September term of Court, 1902, a new motion was filed, that the verdict be set aside and a new trial granted because since said trial, new, competent, and material evidence had been discovered, which motion, on the 30th day of said term, was overruled and the respondent appealed from the decision of the presiding justice. Thereupon the case was continued marked "Law" to await the action of the Law Court sitting in December, 1902, where said motions will be heard.

This was a hard fought case, both from the standpoint of the government and of the defense. Sheriff Pennell and his deputies examined into the case with the utmost fidelity and unceasing vigor. The details of the case were prepared and presented with much ability by George W. Gower, Esq., County Attorney, who was of great assistance in trying the case. He further suggested the microscopic examination of the firing-pin of Terrio's rifle and of the primer of the shell found near the body of Pare, for the purpose of discovering similar and corresponding markings on each, which examination was successfully conducted by Dr. Whittier, who demonstrated beyond question that the end of the firing-pins of rifles leave their characteristic markings on the primer of exploded shells.

STATE vs. HENRY LAMBERT.

On the evening of May 12, 1901, the farm buildings of J. Wesley Allen of Shirley were destroyed by fire and subsequent events showed conclusively that the remains of Allen with his wife and daughter were largely consumed in the flames. On the morning of the 13th a neighbor passing the premises first learned that the buildings were burned. The neighbors assembled at once and at first assumed that the fire was caused by accident and that the members of the family had accidentally lost their lives in the flames. But a careful examination of the remains of Mr. Allen found on the location of the barn floor, and the later discovery of two large pools of blood in the yard some twenty-five feet from the barn, with various other details, at once showed that a terrible tragedy had taken place. Who could have been the author of the deed was at first a mystery. There seemed to

be no clue to follow and no person to whom the crime could be attributed. It was shortly remembered that the respondent had formerly been employed at the Allen place and that he was familiar with the premises, and had shortly before occupied a camp in the vicinity of the Allen place.

The statements of the respondent as to his whereabouts on the night of the tragedy, and his course from Greenville some nine miles distant from the Allen place to his boarding place on the Lake Road, so-called, some three miles distant from the Allen place, aroused strong suspicion of guilt. The statements made by him in relation to his clothing, umbrella and rubbers on examination were found not to be true, as well as his statements in relation to returning home by the C. P. R. R. and the Lake Road, for evidence was shortly discovered showing conclusively that he started for Shirley over the B. & A. R. R. Tracks were also discovered leading from the B. & A. R. R. over various logging roads to a point just back of the Allen place. Similar tracks were also discovered at the camp located near the Allen place. The camp mentioned had been broken into. It was not discovered that anything had been taken, but there was found a partial box of blazer matches on the table. It was soon learned that the respondent had purchased blazer matches at Greenville on the day of the murder.

It appeared from the evidence, that the respondent reached his boarding place on the night of the tragedy in the neighborhood of 10 o'clock, although this point was persistently fought by the defense. The firing of the buildings, from the evidence presented by the State, must have occurred in the vicinity of 9 o'clock or perhaps a very little after. As testified to by his boarding-master, the respondent when he reached his boarding place on the evening of the fire, was exceedingly sweaty and warm. The condition of his stockings as compared with that of his shoes showed a remarkable contrast. The fibre of his stockings was packed full of mud, while the shoes, which were new ones, did not show any mud or scratches of any kind.

The theory of the State was that the respondent left Greenville in the afternoon, passed down the B. & A. R. R. to what is termed the Bully Opening, and leaving the track there passed by various logging roads to the Allen place. He evidently had on his rubbers during the passage of the logging roads, as

appeared from rubber tracks discovered in several places. The respondent claimed to have left Greenville for his boarding place near the hour of six in the afternoon, and that he passed over the C. P. R. R. tracks as far as the Lake Road at King's crossing, thence up the Lake Road to his boarding house, which would be a distance of about six miles. The time of day in which he would have to pass over the Lake Road was such that had he done so he would have been seen all along the road. For a day or two prior to this time the weather had been lowery, but the sun broke through the clouds and the latter part of the day was warm and pleasant and many of the people along the road were out in their yards during the time which he must have covered in passing over the road if he had done so. The unanimous testimony of these people was that no one passed over the road toward's Smith's, the respondent's boarding place, during the house in which the respondent claimed he passed over the road.

I put the case in the hands of Capt. T. E. Hartnett very shortly after the deed was perpetrated. On examining the clothing of the respondent at his boarding place Capt. Hartnett found there a mutilated white shirt, the only one which Lambert possessed, and which had been soaked with perspiration to the extent that it had become discolored and disfigured by the coloring matter from his supenders and from his outside clothing.

The motive in the case on the part of the respondent was his passion for Carrie Allen. His utterances sometime prior to the deed, which were fully substantiated out of the mouths of two or three witnesses, showed conclusively that he had an overwhelming passion for the girl.

Great credit is due to Capt. Hartnett in the examination of the case and in his success in discovering evidence pointing conclusively to the respondent as the guilty party.

At the September term of the Supreme Judicial Court, 1901, for Piscataquis county, Strout, J., presiding, the case was presented to the grand jury which returned a bill against the respondent for the murder of J. Wesley Allen, and on the 30th day of September he was arraigned and entered a plea of not guilty. The Court appointed Henry Hudson, Esq., of Guilford, as counsel for the respondent. At an adjourned session of the Court: to wit, on November 19, the case was opened to the jury. The evidence of the State was necessarily long and complicated,

but in its progress wove an irresistible web about the respondent which could not be broken by the defense, although the greatest effort was made by the counsel for the respondent to do so. On the 4th day of December after a continuous trial of fourteen days, the jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree. On the following day a motion for a new trial was filed, by the respondent, which motion was over-ruled and the respondent appealed therefrom. The case went forward to the Law Court where it was argued July 10, 1902, at Portland, and is now awaiting the decision of the Court.

Hon. M. L. Durgin, county attorney of Piscataquis county, gave his closest and most careful attention to the case from the time of the perpetration of the crime to the end of the trial. He rendered me great assistance in marshalling the facts and presenting the same to the jury. Although during the progress of the trial of the case he lost his son and only child, nevertheless he returned to the trial of the case and continued his assistance to its close. He is entitled to great credit for his services in the case.

STATE *vs.* WILLIAM T. TREWORGY.

Sarah Ware, a resident of Bucksport, in the county of Hancock, left Mrs. Miles's house, the place where she was living, on the evening of September 17, 1898, to go to one John Buldoc's by Pond street to make a call. After making the call she was seen near Buldoc's and was traced a short distance back towards her home. The night was dark and foggy. The next day Mrs. Miles gave information to the respondent that Sarah Ware had left her home and had not returned, but it does not appear that he made any search for her, although he was familiar at the Miles household. Inquiries were made from time to time until finally the neighbors and friends of Sarah Ware, having had their suspicions of foul play aroused, started out a searching party October 2, 1898.

There is a narrow lane running at right angles with and from the head of Pond street, which street leads from the Miles house to the street leading to the Buldoc house in Bucksport. The lane was nearly its whole length thickly lined with high alders on both sides, and extended up over the hill to a piece of woods

and beyond. On said second day of October the body of Sarah Ware was found a third of a mile up this lane in a small opening surrounded by thick alder bushes some few rods from the lane. Small alders were broken down and marks of a passing vehicle were visible.

A casual observance of the body showed conclusively that there had been foul play. The bones of one side of the face were broken and the skull fractured. The remains were so decomposed that it was difficult to recognize them as those of Sarah Ware, but an examination of the clothing and other details made it conclusive that they were the remains of Sarah Ware.

The officers took the matter in hand and finally the respondent was arrested as the perpetrator of the crime. From the evidence, it was shown that on the evening of the disappearance of Sarah Ware, loud cries as of someone in distress, were heard in the immediate vicinity of the house of Mrs. Hass on Pond street, at about the hour when Sarah Ware would be expected to return.

One Joseph Fogg, Jr., finally divulged the fact that on the evening of September 21 following the disappearance of Sarah Ware, the respondent driving from his shop on Pine street, accosted him and requested his assistance in moving a body. Fogg acquiesced, got on the jigger with the respondent and proceeded on to Pond street easterly to the lane and about forty rods up the lane, where the respondent stopped his team, got over the fence, and moved a bundle or body wrapped in a canvas onto the jigger, then proceeded further up the lane, turned into a pasture on the right and after driving in among some alder bushes, deposited the bundle or body at the place where the body of Sarah Ware was found. After depositing the body the respondent drove out into the lane, back towards the village, and threatened Fogg, as claimed by him, that if he ever made mention of the fact he (Fogg) would go the same way. Fogg gave his testimony on the stand in relation to the removal of the body, but later, having been frightened and threatened, retracted his story and denied his entire statements made under oath on the stand.

It appeared from the evidence, also, that before the body was found Fogg made mention of the fact to his mother and cousin, that he had assisted in removing a body, and on hearing that the

body had been found, at once took a short cut through the woods direct to the point, which he could not have done had he not known the location of the place. There was evidence also, from another source, that the respondent did start out with his jigger and take Fogg on it, as asserted by Fogg.

The fracture of the skull of the victim was circular and exactly the size of the face of a hammer. A hammer was afterwards found in the carriage of Treworgy, as also a piece of canvas which had dark stains on it. That part of the canvas having the stains was removed but later disappeared, as also the hammer, and no trace of them could be found. It appeared, also, from the testimony of Fogg, that the respondent had a large piece of canvas on his jigger at the time of the claimed removal of the body.

The trunk of the victim which she had always used was carefully searched immediately after the body was found and every article therein carefully shaken out, but no money was found. Later when it was discovered that the victim had received nearly sixty dollars a short time prior to her disappearance, and that a search was being made for the same, a further examination of the trunk disclosed a roll of money amounting to \$45. It appeared, also, that Treworgy occupied an adjoining room in the Miles house to that of Sarah Ware for some days between the periods of the two searches made. The rooms connected by a door and no one occupied the Ware room in the meantime.

The victim usually carried a hand-satchel. She had two hand-satchels, one an old one and the other comparatively new which she wore on the evening of her disappearance. When the trunk was first searched the room was searched also and every piece of furniture moved. Later and at about the same time the money was found in the trunk, one of the hand-satchels was found under one of the bureaus, which was not there when the first search was made.

The evidence showed that the respondent had made very many statements of an inculpatory nature. The respondent at the preliminary hearing was bound over for the murder of Sarah Ware. After Joseph Fogg retracted his first statement he was arrested for perjury and cast into the county jail at Ellsworth where he immediately reverted to his first statement and from that time to the time of the final trial of the case remained con-

stant to his first story. On the strength of the complaint for perjury against Joseph Fogg the respondent was released, as also was Joseph Fogg, although nothing appeared to warrant his release if the allegations which were made against him were true. The preliminary hearing was had prior to my coming to the office of attorney general.

The disappearance of Sarah Ware, the discovery of her body, and the disposition of the case, as hereinbefore stated, taken in connection with the first statement of Joseph Fogg, his retraction, and afterwards his assertion of the truth of his first statement, and other evidence appearing in the case, stirred up as great excitement in Bucksport and in the county of Hancock, as perhaps has ever been witnessed in any murder case within the State. The citizens of Hancock county, who desired to see justice done in the matter, persistently demanded, from the time of the release of the respondent and of Joseph Fogg after the preliminary hearing, that the matter should be brought before the courts. To allay this excitement, I deemed it only just and right that the facts in the case should be presented to the grand jury and a careful sifting of them had. This having been done, the grand jury returned an indictment against William T. Treworgy for the murder of Sarah Ware. At the April term of the supreme judicial court, 1902, the respondent was arraigned and pleaded not guilty, and the court assigned Oscar F. Fellows, Esq., of Bucksport, assisted by Charles J. Hutchings, Esq., of Brewer, as counsel for the respondent, who on the trial of the cause presented a successful defense for their client. On the 15th day of July at said adjourned term, the case was presented to the jury. Both the State and the defense put in a large mass of evidence, a considerable portion of which by reason of the lapse of time since the tragedy occurred, and by reason of the intense feeling engendered, was more or less conflicting. On the 24th day of July the case was given to the jury which, after being out for sixteen hours, returned a verdict of not guilty.

I was assisted by Bedford E. Tracy, Esq., county attorney, who, with true instincts of his duty as county attorney, had brought the case before the proper tribunal and there carefully and ably marshalled the evidence for the State, which was no slight task because of the long time that had elapsed since the commission of the deed.

STATE *vs.* HERBERT E. HOLBROOK.

Herbert E. Holbrook and his wife resided with his parents in Wilton. Quite early on the morning of Sept. 9, 1902, Mrs. Holbrook, the mother, was startled by two pistol shots in the chamber occupied by her son and his wife, Josephine E. Holbrook. For a day or two prior there had been considerable friction between Herbert E. Holbrook and his wife occasioned by his accusation of her infidelity to him. The mother on hearing the shots immediately went into the room of her son and found his wife lying on the floor unconscious. In a few moments Dr. Adams was called in and on examination found that Josephine E. Holbrook had been fatally wounded. She had been shot through the upper portion of her forehead by her husband Herbert E. Holbrook. The victim did not regain consciousness and died some seven or eight hours after the shooting.

The respondent when confronted with the charge of shooting his wife, claimed that she had discharged the pistol at him first and then turned it on herself; that he was on the bed when she fired it at him. From the evidence it appeared that no indications of a pistol ball were to be found in that part of the room where Holbrook was lying on the bed. The testimony further disclosed that there were two shots fired both of which shots were accounted for, one having passed through the partition of the room on that side where the victim was found lying and evidently did not touch her, the other shot was that which the victim received and which caused her death.

The evidence also disclosed that the victim at the time of the shooting was replacing her outside garments with a bicycle suit, evidently for the purpose of going out on her wheel. The revolver which was used was found by her side and in an unnatural position, assuming that she shot herself. The powder stains in the face of the victim were very slight showing that the revolver was held at a distance of at least three feet from her face when the fatal shot was fired. The evidence also disclosed that she could not have held the revolver in her own hand, otherwise her face would have been burned and filled with powder to a much greater extent than appeared. Besides the wound

was not located in that part of the head which would be natural in case she discharged the pistol upon herself.

The respondent had used and carried fire-arms for many years and was quite regardless of the safety of others in the use of them.

The evidence further disclosed that the motive for the deed was jealousy of his wife, coupled with a reckless and criminal disposition.

The respondent was taken into custody immediately after the shooting and the evidence was presented to the grand jury at the September term of the supreme judicial court of Franklin county, Whitehouse, J., presiding. The grand jury returned an indictment against the respondent for the murder of his wife. On the 6th day of October, 1902, the case was opened to the jury, the court having appointed Hon. Cyrus N. Blanchard, of Wilton, as counsel for the respondent, who faithfully and ably defended his client.

The main defense was a plea of not guilty by reason of insanity. The shooting by the respondent was not strenuously denied. A mass of evidence was introduced by the defense to show that the respondent had exhibited strange and peculiar conduct for many years, indicative of insanity; that he had suffered from early life from epilepsy; that he was very much addicted to the use of alcoholic drinks; that he indulged in morphine, and that he was subject to syphilis.

The State did not controvert any of these claims, but met them by presenting a large number of witnesses who had been acquainted with the respondent for years and who denied that he had shown any peculiarities other than those exhibited by other men, further than his rash and careless conduct in the use of fire-arms, and in his bad conduct generally. It further developed that he had been engaged in the liquor business for some years prior to this event.

On the tenth day of October, all the evidence having been taken out and the case having been presented to the jury, a verdict was returned of guilty of murder in the second degree and on the same day the court sentenced the respondent to imprisonment and labor in the States Prison for the period of his natural life.

H. S. Wing, Esq., county attorney, marshalled the facts in the case and rendered valuable assistance at the trial.

The following additional homicides have been committed concerning which, at the present time, no definite action has been taken by this office, since they have not yet reached that point where I have been called to act thereon, viz.:

MARTIN STANTON.

Martin Stanton, in the county of Piscataquis, with one Edward Ballard started out on the 10th day of October from Marsh's Camp at Eagle lake. Stanton's body was afterwards found, showing that there had been foul play. He had been shot. Edward Ballard was followed up and proof developed so strong against him that he was arrested for the murder of Martin Stanton.

JOHN MCELWEE.

In the case of John McElwee, who left his home in Aroostook county in July last and whose body was found in Range 7, Township 5, October 16th, it has been conclusively shown that he came to his death by unlawful means. This case has been examined into and while no person has been arrested, yet there is some evidence pointing towards the guilty party.

WILLIAM THOMPSON, ALIAS WILLIAM RILEY, OF CHELSEA, MASS.

In this case a break was made in a store at Coal Kiln Corner, Scarborough, county of Cumberland, on the morning of October 28, 1902, and property taken therefrom. The first knowledge that was had of the matter was early in the morning of said October 28th, when William Thompson, alias William Riley, appeared at a farmhouse some distance from Coal Kiln Corner and asked for help. He had been shot and died from the effects of it. Enough evidence developed to show that Thompson, with two pals, made the break and it is supposed from the little evidence gathered, that the fatal shot was the result of a dispute between the parties. The two parties with Thompson have not been located as yet. The officers have been on the lookout for them since the commission of the deed.

OLIVE H. BROAD.

In the case of Olive H. Broad, whose dead body was found on the 21st day of August, 1902, a short distance from the main traveled road in Cornish, county of York, it appears that she was returning home from a neighboring town in the latter part of the afternoon. On examination it was found that she had come to her death by a pistol shot.

Great care has been taken in this case, as also in the former cases, to discover the perpetrator of the crime. As yet there has not been evidence enough developed to warrant an arrest.

The evident motive in these cases was robbery.

DETECTIVE WORK.

Acting on the recommendation of my predecessor, Hon. William T. Haines, in his report of 1899-1900, the legislature of 1901 made an annual appropriation of \$1,500, to be placed at the disposal of the Attorney-General for the apprehension and arrest of criminals. The recommendation was a most excellent one and it is surprising that some such provision had not been made before for the suppression of crime. As suggested in Mr. Haines' recommendation, public sentiment seems quick to criticize the expense of prosecuting crime. I anticipate from the information which I have been able to gather during the past two years, that criminals from other states have been aware of the laxness that has pertained in this State on the part of officials who should be most alert in ferreting out crime. Murders, bank robberies, and burglaries have been frequent and startling within this State. The fact that our lines of communication are almost wholly along the southern line of the State, gives larger opportunities for the criminal to secrete himself and escape the officers before communication can be had, sufficient to surround him.

In many of the counties there has been great laxness on the part of the officials, to move swiftly in criminal cases. In many instances where officials have faithfully and promptly acted in such matters and have spent days and expended money in ferreting out crime, their bills have frequently been cut down to a minimum. Hence, on the occurrence of serious crime officials

have not felt like taking hold of the matter promptly and devoting considerable time thereto.

I have informed the various sheriffs in the State that in case of serious crime in their counties, to take prompt action and to leave no stone unturned to secure the guilty party, and that in such cases I would see that the officials were reimbursed for their time and expenses, according to the provisions of chapter 162, Public Laws of 1901, but not, however, releasing the county where such crimes might occur from bearing the proper expenses incurred.

During the past years the appropriation hereinbefore stated has been of great assistance to me. In the case of the murder of the Allen family in Piscataquis county herein reported, the guilty party would now be at large had it not been for this fund. I was enabled to employ a detective and put him on the case at once. Had I not done so the most valuable and convincing evidence of the State would have been lost and the respondent would have gone clear. In two or three murder cases where detective work has not accomplished so much as in the Allen case, nevertheless it has been of great assistance to me in bringing the guilty party to justice. I question if the State has appropriated a like sum in any other direction which has been of so much general value as the appropriation for the detection of criminals.

Of the appropriation for the year 1901 I have approved the expenditure of \$585.08, for 1902 \$872.58.

CORONERS' INQUESTS.

In my predecessor's last report he called the attention of the legislature to the unsatisfactory work of coroners' inquests. I have had very much the same experience as my predecessor. However, I am disposed to believe that the difficulty does not lie so much with the laws governing coroners' inquests as with the officials whose duty it is to exercise them. It is true that many inquests are worse than useless and frequently are very expensive to the county wherein they are held, but such unsatisfactory results arise from the inefficiency or inertness of the officials to make the most and best use of the powers given them.

In some cases which have occurred during the past two years the coroners' inquests have accomplished good results and have brought out the facts of the case under examination with a great deal of clearness. In other cases the inquests had better never been held, because no effort was made to get at the evidence carefully, and the results were a jumble of evidence which amounted to little or nothing. Hence, my conclusion is, as above stated, that the inefficiency of coroners' inquests arises almost solely from the lack of attention, care and alertness which should be exercised by the officials in charge of them. If provisions could be made which would result in holding coroners' inquests up to the full measure of their authority in performing their duties, then I believe all criticism of them would disappear.

FRANCHISE TAXES.

Under the provisions of chapter 229, section 7 of the Public Laws of 1901, the State Treasurer in March of this year transmitted to this office the names of 546 corporations that had not paid their franchise taxes for the year 1901. I immediately made demand on these delinquent corporations, so far as they could be found, to pay the tax then overdue. The result has been that 149 corporations have paid their taxes, amounting to \$2,835, all of which sum has been covered into the State treasury, and 152 have been excused from making further returns, as provided under section 36 of chapter 46 of the Revised Statutes. Doubtless the balance are dead and the tax against them cannot be collected.

The situation in relation to franchise taxes in the year 1901 was somewhat phenomenal. For a period of nearly forty years corporations had been formed under the general law and while a method was provided by which they might have been relieved from making returns to the State, by filing applications to be excused, or might have been dissolved under adjudication of the courts, nevertheless there was nothing which required corporations to pursue either of these courses. The result was that 2,281 corporations had ceased to do business and that nearly the whole of them, at the time of the passage of the franchise tax law in 1901, were virtually dead, but they still remained on the

State books as going corporations. In most cases no officials had been elected for years, hence it was impossible to get the exact status of such corporations and to collect taxes therefrom.

While the law of 1901 provided that in case of the non-payment of the franchise tax for a period of six months after the same became due, this office should at once bring suit for the forfeiture of the charter of such corporation, it did not provide for the expense of carrying on the suits. I deemed it advisable, therefore, to pursue such delinquent corporations in another direction; that is, to collect the franchise tax from all such corporations as had property or were doing business, and to recommend to the legislature that a law be passed at this session forfeiting the charters of such delinquent corporations which had failed to pay their franchise tax for 1901, where such corporations have not been seasonably excused or dissolved. Suits could not have been brought against such corporations without incurring an expense to the State of at least ten thousand dollars, had there been an appropriation for that purpose.

Of the large number of dead corporations on the State books at the time of assuming the duties of my office I have excused 1,520. During the two years 69 have been dissolved by decree of court. There have been, also, 48 corporations whose charters have expired by limitation by reason of their not having commenced business. There remain on the State books at the present time 644 corporations concerning which I recommend that the legislature shall pass a law forfeiting their charters.

By this method all corporations which have not paid their franchise tax for the year 1901 will be disposed of without expense to the State, and the books of the State will for the first time be comparatively cleaned up and be put in the best shape possible for future work. An immense amount of work has been required to accomplish the foregoing results. But if the franchise tax is to prove successful, it is most important that corporations should understand that they cannot remain going corporations without paying the franchise tax promptly. Such a course, systematically followed, will be the means of turning into the State treasury many thousands of dollars which otherwise would be lost to the State.

For further information and data relating to corporations and the franchise tax, I refer to the office of the Secretary of State.

SUIT ON BOND. STATE *vs.* FRANK A. CREAMER.

Suit has been commenced by the State treasurer against Frank A. Creamer, formerly clerk of courts for Lincoln county, and his bond, for non-feasance in office during the years 1890-1900. The non-feasance complained of was the failure on the part of said Frank A. Creamer during the years 1890-1900 to transcribe the records of the Supreme Judicial Court and the Court of County Commissioners for said years. The penal sum of the bond is \$8,000, and the probable expense of completing the records will be, approximately, \$1500. The bondsmen have expressed their willingness to pay the expense of transcribing the records when the amount can be definitely ascertained.

Printed herewith may be found, also the tables usually accompanying the attorney-general's report, relating to crime in the various counties and the expense of prosecuting the same.

I have submitted many written and oral opinions during the two years of my official term, concerning matters relating to the departments of the State and other matters, the most important of which are the following.

OPINIONS.

TENURE OF OFFICE OF THE MEMBERS OF THE BOARD OF STATE ASSESSORS.

The tenure of office of a member of the Board of State Assessors is for the legislative term or period, or multiple thereof. It is not controlled by the date of qualification but by the legislative term, or a multiple thereof, and the qualification of a successor in office.

March, 1901.

To the Board of State Assessors:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit to you my opinion relating to the tenure of office of the members of the Board of State Assessors, which question had been raised by reason of the election and qualification of Hon. F. M. Simpson as a member of the State Board, to succeed Hon. William C. Marshall who claims that his term of office expires in accordance with the date of the first qualification in his term; to wit, April 2, 1901. William C. Marshall was elected to succeed himself January 7, 1897, and qualified July 7, 1897, for the period of four years.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

The following parties were elected by the Legislature April 1, 1891 and qualified as such officials on April 2, 1891, under the State assessors act establishing a Board of State Assessors, Chapter 103, Public Laws of 1891:

Otis Hayford, for six years,

Frank Gilman, for four years,

B. F. Chadbourne, for two years.

Frank Gilman deceased and Hall C. Burleigh was appointed by the Governor, March 8, 1892, and qualified the same date, to fill out that portion of Gilman's period of office until the next Legislature, when his successor should be elected and qualified.

Hall C. Burleigh was elected to succeed himself January 19, 1893, for two years, to fill out the balance of Gilman's unexpired term of office. He qualified Feb. 7, 1893.

Hall C. Burleigh was re-elected to succeed himself, for six years, January 3, 1895, and qualified April 3, 1895.

Hall C. Burleigh deceased during his term of office and William C. Marshall was appointed by the Governor June 5, 1895, and qualified June 6, 1895, to fill out the unexpired term of Hall C. Burleigh until the next Legislature when his successor should be elected and qualified.

William C. Marshall was elected to succeed himself January 7, 1897 and qualified July 7, 1897, for four years, to wit: for the remaining unexpired term of Hall C. Burleigh, which term of William C. Marshall expires this winter, to wit: 1901, when his successor should be elected and qualified.

Frank M. Simpson was elected January 3, 1901, for the period of six years, and qualified Feb. 1, 1901, to succeed in office William C. Marshall.

Otis Hayford was elected April 1, 1891, for six years, and qualified April 2, 1891.

Otis Hayford was re-elected to succeed himself January 7, 1897, and qualified April 23, 1897, for six years, and is now serving his second term which will expire in the legislative year of 1903.

B. F. Chadbourne was elected April 1, 1891 and qualified April 2, 1891, for two years.

At the expiration of Chadbourne's term of office George Pottle was elected January 19, 1893, to succeed said Chadbourne, and qualified January 20, 1893, for six years.

George Pottle was re-elected to succeed himself in 1899 and qualified March 31, 1899, for the further period of six years.

The Public Laws of 1891, Chapter 103, establishing the Board of State Assessors, among other things provides as follows:

Section 1. A board of state assessors shall be chosen biennially by the legislature by joint ballot of the senators and representatives in convention, consisting of three members, not more than two of whom shall be taken from the same political party, who shall take and subscribe the oath provided by the constitution of this State, and hold their offices as provided in the following section.

Section 2. The term of office of said assessors under said first section shall be, one for two years, one for four years, and the other for six years, and until their several successors are elected and qualified; and the member having the shortest time to serve shall be chairman of the board. Said State assessors shall be elected after the approval of this act by the legislature now in session, and shall hold their first meeting at the State capitol within thirty days thereafter. The assessors thereafter elected shall hold office for the term of six years each, excepting elections made to fill unexpired terms.

Section 4. Any two of said board shall have authority to transact all business appertaining to their office, but all three must be duly notified of each and every meeting for the transaction of business. In case of the death, resignation, refusal or inability to serve of any one or more of said board, the Governor, with advice and consent of the council, shall, as soon as may be, fill such vacancy by appointment, and the assessor so appointed shall hold said office until his successor is elected by the next legislature and qualified. Said board shall hold a meeting at the State capitol on the first Tuesday of each month.

The contention in this case on the part of William C. Marshall is, that since the original State assessors act which was enacted by the Legislature, in March, 1891, provided that one of the board of assessors should be elected for two years, one for four years and one for six years, and thereafterwards a member should be elected annually for the period of six years, except as provided, to fill out unexpired terms, that said Hayford, Gilman and Chadbourne having been elected on April 1, 1891, and qualified on April 2, 1891, fixes the absolute date from which everafterwards the official period of the several members of the board of assessors should be computed, and that from said date, to wit: April 2, 1891, full and complete years of twelve months each should be reckoned in computing the term of office; in other words, that the term of office of each and every assessor on said board, when it did expire, would fall on April 2d; and since the term of office to which Mr. Marshall was elected January 7, 1897, for a period of four years, and qualified July 7, 1897, expires this year, that it expires on April 2d, and that he is entitled to hold the office and receive the salary therefor to said April 2, 1901.

OPINION.

The real questions which confront us, relate to the limitation of the tenure of office of Mr. Marshall, to wit: is Mr. Marshall's term of office controlled by the exact date of his election, by the exact period of four years of 12 months each, commencing on the second day of April, 1897, or by the election and qualification of his successor, Mr. Simpson in 1901, during which year and at some definite point, the official term of Mr. Marshall expires beyond a doubt.

First: Does the date of election alone have any bearing as to the exact day and date when Mr. Marshall's official term as State assessor expired? I think not. His election marked a period of time, to wit: a legislative period of time or multiple thereof during which he was to serve as such official when he qualified to act in that position. Hence the precise date of Mr. Marshall's election can have no bearing on the question before us further than to fix the legislative unit or multiple thereof of his official term.

Second: Does the date of qualification of the first board of State assessors, to wit: April 2, 1891, taken in connection with the provisions of the act establishing the board which provides that "the term of office of said assessors under said first section shall be one for two years, one for four years, and the other for six years and until their several successors are elected and qualified," and "the assessors thereafter elected shall hold office for the term of six years each, excepting elections made to fill unexpired terms," measure the exact period in months and days of the time of Marshall's official tenure as State assessor to which he was elected January 7, 1897, for the period of four years? I think not and for the following reasons: As a matter of legislative history the act providing for a board of State assessors was placed before the legislature in the very early part of the session of 1891. For various reasons it was delayed and refused passage until the very last of the session, and was finally enacted approved, and became a law March 26, 1891.

It is apparent, therefore, from the provisions of the act for electing one assessor for two years, one for four years and one for six years and thereafterwards the election of a member at each Legislature for the period of six years, except as provided in case of vacancies, that the Legislature, as well as the authors

of the act, had in mind the legislative unit of two years or a multiple thereof, and not a specific date at which time the member of the board should enter upon his duties and from which date said member or his successor should reckon his official period in years of twelve months each; otherwise the Legislature would have specified the exact date from and to which each member should serve.

Again, how can the date of qualification of the first board, to wit: April 2, 1891, be taken as an arbitrary point from which to measure the official period in preference to any other date of qualification occurring thereafterwards? The absurdity of this proposition is apparent on inspection of the dates of qualification of the various members of the board since April 2, 1891. It appears that after the qualification of the members of the first board, to wit: after April 2, 1891, there were no two members who ever qualified on the same date. The earliest date of qualification in any year is that of George Pottle who qualified January 20, 1893, and the latest is that of William C. Marshall who qualified July 7, 1897; all the other dates of qualification fall between these two dates in the several years, showing conclusively that the members of the board never for a moment considered that April 2d, cut any more figure as a marking date of the commencement or expiration of the term of office than any other date of qualification.

To illustrate; suppose that Frank Gilman, who was elected on the first board, had been on account of sickness or other cause delayed in some way from qualifying as assessor until the second day of July, 1891, and the other two assessors had qualified as they did on April 2, 1891. Could it be claimed that following down the line of Frank Gilman every official term of office in that line would commence and terminate on July 2, and that in the lines of Hayford and Chadbourne the official term of office would commence and terminate on April 2d?

Such a construction placed on the act of the Legislature would be absurd, and yet the claim made by Mr. Marshall leads straight to this conclusion.

We have provisions in our laws that fix the exact commencement and ending of official periods such as that of the Governor of the State, and other provisions that provide for officials to be elected biennially by the joint vote of the Senate and House of

Representatives. In the case of the Governor, his term of office absolutely expires by the hands of the clock. In the case of officers elected biennially as provided in the State assessors act, Section 1, which is equivalent to electing for the period of two, four or six years, as provided, the official holds until his successor is elected and qualified, as in the case of the Secretary of State, Attorney-General, Adjutant-General, State Treasurer, etc. Opinion of Justices, 70 Me. pages 590 and 591.

In the latter cases should a contest occur by reason of which the election of such officials should be delayed until the very last of the session of the Legislature, the incumbent would hold over until such officials were elected and qualified. But how about the official tenure of the newly elected official if at the next Legislature an election and qualification should be had at the opening of the legislative session? Beyond any question of doubt or cavil the incumbent would be cut short about three months in his term of office. In other words, it is apparent that the members of the Board of State Assessors are elected on the same basis as the Secretary of State, Attorney-General, Adjutant-General, Treasurer, etc., and that they severally hold their office until the successor of each of them is elected and qualified, and no longer. Hence a prior fixed date of qualification of the officials of this class can have nothing to do with the exact period of service of such official.

We must, then, look elsewhere than under the first and second heads presented, for the controlling principle, as to the tenure of officials elected as provided in the case of State Assessors.

Third: Does the election and qualification of Frank M. Simpson for State Assessor, as successor in office to William C. Marshall, have any bearing on the matter in contention; that is, on the tenure of William C. Marshall's term of office? Unquestionably from the process of elimination thus far pursued, taken in connection with the provisions of the act establishing the Board of State Assessors, the election and qualification of Mr. Simpson is conclusive in the premises. What law, provision or custom of qualification of State officials even if we may go so far, was there to prevent Mr. Simpson being qualified for the position of State Assessor after he was duly elected? Surely none, and since the act creating the Board of State Assessors

does not give exact dates of limitation of the official tenure of office, why could not Mr. Simpson take his seat, as soon as he qualified for the position to which he was elected? Unquestionably he could, but does the act contemplate that the self-same position of assessor may be held by two incumbents at the same time? In no respect whatever. As set forth under the second head, the apparent intention of the Legislature in designating two, four, and six years as the period of official service of State Assessors, was to make the legislative term of two years, or a multiple thereof, the unit of service, but not meaning thereby, exact years of three hundred and sixty-five days each.

The act itself so indicates in section two, wherein it provides for the official period of service "and until their several successors are elected and qualified."

Also in section three, which provides in case of appointment to fill vacancies on the Board, that "the assessors so appointed shall hold said office until his successor is elected by the next Legislature and qualified," showing conclusively that it is the election and qualification of the successor that terminates the incumbent's term of office and not some arbitrary date of qualification of prior assessors, nor yet the lapse of two, four or six years of three hundred and sixty-five days each, as the case may be. Hence my conclusion is that Frank M. Simpson on being qualified therefor, after having been elected State Assessor as successor in office to William C. Marshall, became on the day of his qualification the legal State assessor in succession to Mr. Marshall, and on the same day the official term of Mr. Marshall as State Assessor expired.

I may state further that in my judgment Mr. Marshall is entitled to his full four years' salary, and no more, he having been elected for two legislative terms. And the fact that his period of office may be cut short or lengthened a few days by reason of the election and qualification of his successor, does not affect the right of Mr. Marshall to his salary for his full four years.

“TIME DEPOSITS” IN TRUST COMPANIES AND BANKS.

The scope and meaning of the term “time deposits” which appears in chapter 286, Public Laws of 1901, relating to interest bearing deposits in trust and banking companies, are clear and definite.

The following opinion was rendered to answer the general query of trust companies as to the kind of deposits then held by them which would be liable to taxation under the provisions of chapter 286 of the Public Laws of 1901, the Auburn Trust Company being taken as a basis.

May, 1901.

First. I understand that the terms “time deposits” and “demand deposits,” as employed by banks generally, have come to have a definite meaning, which is generally understood and accepted both by depositors and by bank officials. “Time deposits,” as generally understood, are deposits drawing some rate of interest, but not necessarily for a definite and absolute time, subject, however, to be drawn out as the depositor desires if not otherwise agreed, but not subject to be checked out in the ordinary course of business.

“Demand deposits” are deposits which are subject to be drawn out by check in the ordinary course of business without notice to the bank. Such deposits I conceive may also carry interest.

If these two definitions are in the main correct as to the two kinds of deposits, then the question simplifies itself to the extent of deciding the nature of the deposits as appears in the Auburn Trust Company's Bank.

Second. As to demand deposits subject to check, I assume that no question can arise whatever, it being simply a naked deposit without deposit receipts or certificates being issued, the same being subject to being checked out in the ordinary course of business by the depositor.

As to the other class of deposits in said bank, the question is more difficult. Section 5 of the Auburn Trust Company's rules and regulations provides that the company will also issue deposit receipts or certificates, payable on demand, with interest, at such

rates as may be agreed upon. This would give every appearance of a time deposit similar to deposits in a savings bank, not being subject to check in the ordinary course of business.

Section 11 provides that deposits may be withdrawn on demand, etc., provided, that whenever the trustees deem it for the interest of the bank, and shall so order, no money shall be withdrawn except after thirty days notice. This is virtually a savings bank provision, providing against any harmful results from a run on the bank, and taken in connection with the first provision under the words "Rules and Regulations," which provides that "this company will receive deposits in its interest department upon the following terms," would indicate to my mind that deposits so made would be almost identical with those made in the regular savings bank.

I do not understand from the provisions of these rules and regulations that such deposits would be subject to check in the ordinary course of business as deposits in national banks. Such being the case I have no doubt that this class of deposits would be subject to the tax provided in chapter 286, section 1 of the Public Laws of 1901 as time deposits.

SCHOOL LANDS—TITLE—THE OWNER OF THE PROCEEDS THEREOF.

The proceeds of school lands held by towns go to the school fund. When school lands become vested in a town by reason of incorporation, the title thereof is not divested but remains in the town although that portion of the towns in which said lands are located may be set off and erected into a plantation or other municipality, unless in the division of the town special provision is made to convey the title thereof to the plantation or new municipality.

PORTLAND, ME., August 24, 1901.

To His Excellency the Governor of the State of Maine, and the Members of His Executive Council:

Gentlemen:—I herewith have the honor to submit to you my opinion relating to the disbursement of the sum of forty dollars received by Hon. Charles E. Oak, ex-Land Agent, for certain timber sold by him from Perkins plantation, concerning which, in his judgment, some question has arisen as to the proper parties to whom said sum of money should be paid.

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

It appears that Mr. Oak, in his said capacity as Land Agent, made a sale of a small quantity of birch timber growing on school lands located in Perkins plantation, in the year 1893, to one C. F. Blanchard, for the sum of forty dollars; that having some doubt as to the rightful claimant of said sum of forty dollars, whether he should pay it to the State, to the town of Carthage, or to Perkins plantation, he has held the same to the present time.

It appears from the statement of said Oak that said reserved school lands were and are located in Perkins plantation; that these reserved lands come under that class of reserved lands in our own State known as school lands, and it appears, further, from the statement of said Oak, that said school lands originally belonged to the town of Carthage. For these last facts I take the statement of said Oak, since I find nothing in the early laws of the State setting out specifically that said lands were reserved to the town of Carthage. I presume that the records of the land agent's office show conclusively that these reserved lands were located in the original town of Carthage, and that after Perkins plantation was set off from the town of Carthage, said lands fell within the territory of Perkins plantation. My opinion is based upon these facts.

OPINION.

It appears by examination of the Special Laws of 1826 that the town of Carthage was incorporated in that year, although the act of incorporation makes no mention of the school lands; that afterwards, to wit, in the year 1849, Plantation No. 4 was

set off from the town of Carthage and is now known as Perkins plantation. It further appears from the statement of said Oak, that neither the town of Carthage nor Perkins plantation has waived its right to said sum of forty dollars in question.

Such being the case, the decision of this matter rests upon the determination of one point, to wit: the legal title of the reserved lands located in Perkins plantation. If the legal title rested in the old town of Carthage before said plantation was incorporated, then said sum of money should be paid over to the proper officer of the town of Carthage. If, however, the reserved lands from which the timber in question was cut, was, at the time of such cutting, the property of Perkins plantation, then said sum of money should be paid over to the proper officers of said Perkins plantation.

It appears by chapter 254 of the Special Laws of 1824, in the latter part of section 1, as follows:

“And in all cases where lands have been granted or reserved for the use of schools in any town within this State, the fee in which lands is not already otherwise vested, the same shall be and is hereby declared to be vested in the inhabitants of such town, for the use and support of schools therein forever.”

It appears, also, in the Special Laws of 1824, chapter 280, section 8, as follows:

“And there shall be reserved in every township suitable for settlement one thousand acres of land, to average in quality and situation with the other land in such township, to be appropriated to such public use, for the exclusive benefit of such town, as the Legislature may hereafter direct.”

In these two sections cited we find the foundation for the setting aside of reserved lands in various townships, and these sections were re-enacted from time to time in the Public Laws and Revised Statutes, and in fact our present statutes follow out the same idea.

It will be seen from the first citation made, and from the fact that this section was re-enacted afterward, that the title to the reserved lands absolutely vested in the town of Carthage; or in other words, the title vested when the town became incorporated. And in section 8 we find the authority for setting aside such reserved lands. These two sections were enacted just prior

to the incorporation of the town of Carthage and I have no doubt that they were in full force when the town was incorporated.

In the division of towns by the legislative act of our own State, which principle also comes down to us from the mother state of Massachusetts, it is the rule in such legislative divisions that if the town property is not divided, but remains unmentioned, then the title to all such property continues in the old or original town. On the other hand, the Legislature from the earliest times in Massachusetts and Maine, has usually made equitable division of the town property between the old corporation and the new. Such being the case, if the legislative act of division makes no division of the town property, then all of the town property remains the property of the old corporation as well as its obligations to pay its debts.

It appears, from an examination of the Special Laws of 1849, that when Perkins plantation was set off from the town of Carthage no division of the town property was made. The bare boundaries of the plantation were outlined and the further requirement made that the residents of said plantation should pay the taxes then assessed upon them, and nothing more. Hence it will be seen that there was no division of the town property of Carthage when Perkins plantation was set off.

In Connecticut it is declared to be a well settled question of law that when part of the inhabitants of a territory of an old town are erected into a new corporation, the old town retains all of the property, rights and privileges formerly belonging to it, and is subject to all of its former duties and liabilities. *Hartford Bridge vs. East Hartford*, 16 Conn. 149-171.

So in Massachusetts it has been held that if a new corporation is created out of the territory of an old corporation, or if part of its inhabitants or territory is annexed to another corporation, unless some provision is made in the act respecting the property and existing liabilities of the old corporation, the latter, to wit, the old corporation, shall be entitled to all the property and be solely answerable for all the liabilities.

Windham v. Portland, 4 Mass. 338.

Hampshire v. Franklin, 16 Mass. 86.

Harrison v. Bridgton, 16 Mass. 16.

Dillon on Municipal Corporations, Vol. 1, 128.

The same doctrine holds in this State, following that of Massachusetts.

North Yarmouth v. Skillins, 45 Me. 133-142.

It is conclusive, then, that the reserved lands located in Perkins plantation are the property of the town of Carthage and that in any sales of timber therefrom the proceeds thereof belong to the town of Carthage.

By provision of chapter 510 of the Special Laws of 1831, approved March 28, section 9, it is set out that "the Land Agent be and hereby is authorized and directed to take care of public lands which have been and shall hereafter be reserved for public use in the several townships in this State until the fee shall vest in the town or otherwise, according to the force and effect of the grant, and reserve the same from pillage and trespass."

It appears from this section, taken in connection with the former section 1 of chapter 254 cited, that when Carthage was erected into a town the fee to the reserved lands absolutely vested in the town of Carthage and thereafter the Land Agent had no authority whatever in relation to the sale of said lands or the timber thereon. Such being the case it would appear that said sum of forty dollars does not belong to the State and that the ex-Land Agent has no authority whatever for paying the same over to the State.

The sale has been made and the money received for this timber. Beyond question the ex-Land Agent should pay the same to the proper officers of the town of Carthage, who should receipt to him for the same as trustees of the school fund for the town of Carthage.

PETITION FOR ABATEMENT OF EXCESSIVE TAXES.

The statute provisions relating to the taxation of railroads must be strictly followed in assessing taxes thereon. The word "system" when employed to denote the extent of the road in levying taxes, means the entire line of railroad controlled, managed, and covered in by the company. In case of excessive taxation the Board of State Assessors have authority under the statutes to abate such excess.

To the Board of State Assessors:

Gentlemen:—

STATEMENT OF FACTS.

It appears from the statement of the solicitors at Portland of the Grand Trunk Railway System, and also from information gathered from the Board of Assessors, that in past years said company, in making its returns, has not included its entire system in the returns as required by statute, and that the tax assessed was assessed on the basis of the return of only part of the system. This error arose in the office of the company and was not discovered until this year. The first return made this year to the Railroad Commissioners continued the error as in years past. The Railroad Commissioners reported said road to the Board of State Assessors without rectifying the error. Later said railway system, through its proper officers, made an amended and corrected return complying with the statute and rectifying the error hereinbefore set forth. In the meantime the tax had been levied upon said railway system under the first return and had been committed to the Treasurer of the State for collection. By the amended return it appears that the tax of said railway system, due to the State, should be considerably less than the amount committed to the State Treasurer. I do not understand that there is any question whatever that said error was made, and that by the first assessment committed to the State Treasurer the Grand Trunk Railway system was taxed a sum in excess of what it should be taxed.

The question now arises: Can the State Board of Assessors abate so much of the tax committed to the State Treasurer as is in excess of the amount due from said railway system under the corrected return?

These facts are set out from oral statements made to me both by the Board of State Assessors and also by the solicitor of said railway system, and I base my opinion upon these facts as stated.

OPINION.

A tax has none of the elements of a contract. It is a levy on property within the boundaries of the State either upon inhabitants, corporations or firms, for the purpose of meeting the expenses of state and municipal government. All taxes are levied by reason of the authority of some statute and can only be levied when the Legislature has given authority by some statute so to do. The Legislature lays down methods whereby such taxes may be levied and the exact course which shall be followed in ascertaining how much tax certain property shall pay. Such is the case in relation to the levy of an excise tax on railroads.

Such being the case the law providing for the levy of taxes must be followed closely, otherwise the tax cannot be collected.

Assuming that the Board of Railway Commissioners report to the Board of State Assessors the facts in relation to any given railroad, for the purpose of levying a tax thereon, and such report ignores the direction of the statute, then such tax cannot be collected unless such error is simply technical. But where some vital point of the law is ignored, then such error will vitiate the act of the Board of State Assessors in levying such tax.

Prior to the creation of the Board of State Assessors, as appears by Chapter 103 of the Public Laws of 1891, the authority to assess taxes on railroads, and all the details of such assessment, rested in the Governor and Council. Chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, Section 45, provides that in case of error or a mistake in calculating the taxes, the person so aggrieved may apply for the abatement of any excessive tax within the year for which such tax is assessed, and that the Governor and Council, on a re-hearing and re-examination, finding such error or mistake existing, may thereupon abate such excess, and the amount so abated shall be deducted from any tax due and unpaid from the railroad company on which the excise tax was assessed. * * *

By the Public Laws of 1891, Chapter 103, a Board of State Assessors was created for the express purpose of assessing the State tax on various classes of property within the State, including railroads. By Section 6 of said Chapter 103, it was pro-

vided that said State Assessors shall do and perform all the acts and duties now required by law to be done by the Governor and Council relating to the assessing and taxing of railroad corporations, and associations. * * *

Chapter 103 of the Public Laws of 1891 does not specifically repeal any prior provision in relation to the assessment of taxes. In its entire makeup and wording, it indicates that the Board of State Assessors was created for the express purpose of performing those duties and functions, which had prior thereto, devolved upon the Governor and Council, as appears in Chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes. This public law of 1891 does not incorporate all of the provisions in so many words as appears in chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, but for the purpose of saving the incorporation of all the provisions of that chapter, it did provide in one simple clause that the State Board of Assessors should "do and perform all the acts and duties now required by law to be done by the Governor and Council relating to the assessing and taxing of railroad corporations." * * *

If we assume that this sweeping clause of chapter 103 of the Public Laws of 1891 did not include section 45 of chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, wherein authority was given to the Governor and Council to abate excessive taxes, then of course the authority to abate excessive taxes still rests in the Governor and Council. If we assume, on the other hand, that section 6 of chapter 103 of the Public Laws of 1891 did include within its sweeping clause section 45 of chapter 6; that is, the right to abate excessive taxes, then the power was transferred to the Board of State Assessors.

Hence this question arises, was this power transferred to the Board of State Assessors? We cannot assume for a moment that the Legislature intended to do away absolutely with section 45 of chapter 6 and leave no opportunity to correct errors and for the adjustment of unfair assessments, for this assumption would be simply unreasonable and untenable. So we come back to the point that either the Governor and Council or the Board of State Assessors has the right to adjust the excessive taxes and to abate the same.

Had the Legislature of 1891 intended to give the Board of State Assessors certain powers which the Governor and Council formerly possessed, and to continue in the Governor and Council

other powers relating to the matter of taxation, then the Public Laws of 1891, chapter 103, would have specifically set out what sections and provisions of chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes should devolve upon the State Board of Assessors, and, on the other hand, it would have set out what sections and provisions and the duties thereunder as set out in said chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes still remained and should remain with the Governor and Council. This, however, we do not find to be the case. The Public Laws of 1891 do not specify that any provision in relation to the taxation of railroads, as set out in chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, shall remain in the Governor and Council, and, on general grounds, the placing in one board the authority to collect data, assess taxes, make reports, etc., and the placing in another board the right to abate such excessive taxes and to correct the errors of a prior board, would be a piece of folly of which we can hardly believe the Legislature to be guilty.

Hence there is but one conclusion which we can reach in the matter and that is that all of the provisions in relation to the abatement of taxes, as set out in section 45 of chapter 6 of the Revised Statutes, were transferred to the Board of State Assessors under the sixth section of chapter 103, and that the Board of State Assessors has legal authority, not only to correct such errors as may appear in the returns of any railroad, but that it is their duty so to do when they shall discover that any error has been made, and, further, that if an excessive tax has been levied by reason of such error, then that said Board has all the requisite authority to abate such tax to the amount of the excess shown by the true facts of the case.

My opinion, in brief, then, is that the Board of State Assessors after a hearing thereon should file with the State Treasurer proper amendments to its commitment of taxes to the State Treasurer against the Grand Trunk Railway system and order an abatement of the excessive tax, if any, according to the true facts found to exist.

NOTE.—A similar opinion to the foregoing, relating to the Canadian Pacific Railway Company, was drawn and submitted

to said Honorable Board of State Assessors, differing only in this respect: that the main question therein was whether or not the water transportation of said Canadian Pacific Railway Company should be included as a part of the system of the railroad, and that in assessing the taxes against said railroad the entire mileage should include not only the railroad lines proper but also its transportation lines across the Pacific ocean as a part of its system.

My opinion as rendered thereon was that that portion of its business which related to transportation by water across the Pacific ocean was not included within the meaning and intention of the statute providing for the taxation of railroads.

TENURE OF OFFICE OF APPOINTIVE OFFICERS OF MAINE INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL FOR GIRLS.

The tenure of office of appointive officers in the Maine Industrial School for Girls is controlled wholly by the rules and regulations of the institution.

To the Trustees of the Maine Industrial School for Girls:

GENTLEMEN:—I herewith submit to you my opinion in relation to the tenure of office of the steward of the Maine Industrial School for Girls, concerning which you have made inquiry.

By examination of chapter 127 of the Public Laws of 1899 it appears that prior to March 17, 1899, a school known as the Maine Industrial School for Girls had been established in the city of Hallowell; that on said 17th day of March, 1899, said school, by legislation, was taken over and vested in the State and became a State institution to be cared for, managed and controlled by the State as all State institutions are, varying only in the kind of work to be done. Among other things which appear in said chapter 127 is the following:

“Sect. 4. The trustees shall have charge of the general interests of the school and see that its affairs are conducted in accordance with law and such by-laws as they may adopt. They may adopt by-laws which shall be valid when sanctioned by the governor and council.”

It will appear, then, from this that to make any by-law of the Maine Industrial School valid, the governor and council must sanction the same, or, in better words, approve the same. When the governor and council have so done then the by-law becomes valid and a part of the machinery under which the institution is to be run as much as the statute itself which took over the Maine Industrial School to the State. Hence any question which arises as to the tenure of office of any appointee or official in the institution, if such office of appointee or official appears by name in the by-laws, must be decided absolutely by the by-laws. In other words, the by-laws of this institution are not of an elastic nature which can be stretched or curtailed according to the views and desires of a board of trustees or any individual.

It appears that on June 3, 1899, John W. Church was elected treasurer and steward of the Maine Industrial School. It appears, also that on May 15, 1900, John W. Church was elected treasurer and steward of said school.

It appears that on February 19, 1901, John W. Church was elected steward, not combining the office of treasurer, and that on May 21, 1901, he was elected treasurer, combining, then, both offices of steward and treasurer.

The question really is as to his tenure of office as steward under the last election.

It appears, further, that on December 13, 1900, it was voted to amend chapter 2, section 1 of the by-laws, and that on February 19, 1901, it was *reported* that the proposed amendment had been approved by the governor and council, so that, as amended, the section reads as follows: "The board of trustees may appoint a steward and a principal, a matron, an assistant matron, and a teacher for each home, and such other officers as the trustees may at any time deem essential or desirable, and the appointment of all officers shall be for a term not exceeding one year. The term of office may be less than one year. The term of office of each appointee shall terminate on the last day of the *calendar year* for which the appointment is made."

As a matter of fact the by-law, as amended, could attach only to those officials who received appointment under the same after the approval of the same by the governor and council. The exact date of the approval of the amended by-law does not appear. The data before me simply shows that on *February 19,*

1901, the amendment was reported to have been approved. However, this matter has little or no bearing in the case since the question with which we have to deal arises subsequent to the date of the approval of the by-law. It must have been approved as early as February 19.

The office of steward falls within the by-law and is subject to it. The last clause of the by-law is conclusive in its force wherein it sets out that "the term of office of each appointee shall terminate with the last day of the *calendar year* for which the appointment is made." There can be no question as to the meaning of these words. They are specific, definite and plain. There might possibly have been some little room for a question to have arisen in the matter, if only the word "year" had been employed, but in this case the by-law sets out "calendar year." Now, the expression "calendar year" means but one thing, to wit, the period of time from and including the first day of January to and including the last day of December. It matters little when the appointment of an official is made. His term of office must expire on the last day of the calendar year; to wit, December 31st of the year for which he is appointed. It makes no difference whatever whether or not any official had notice of any change in the by-laws or the expiration of his period of office. This by-law is in the nature of a statute and must be as explicitly followed as the statute itself upon which the by-law rests. Hence the term of office of John W. Church as steward to which he was elected February 19, 1901, and also his office as treasurer to which he was elected May 21, 1901, expire on the last day of this year; to wit, December 31st, and the trustees, if they had so desired, could not extend the term otherwise than by re-appointment.

To be sure this construction cuts off part of the official year of John W. Church as steward and treasurer, but the legislature never takes into account the fact that a man has been appointed to an office for a period of time.

The by-law adopted December 13, 1900, which did not become effective until approved by the governor and council, was quite as effective in limiting the term of office in the case of John W. Church as though the matter had been taken directly before the legislature and the legislature had passed a limiting act, because the by-law is based on the provisions of chapter 127 of the Public Laws of 1899.

If the question of salary is raised then I feel quite as sure that the treasurer and steward would be entitled only to pro rata part of the annual salary. This view of the matter is fully sustained by the vote passed on May 21, 1901, which reads as follows:

“Voted that from June 6, 1901, the salary of the steward shall be at the rate of \$350 per year and that of the treasurer at the rate of \$250.”

In both these instances the expression “at the rate of” would clearly indicate that the treasurer and steward were to be paid pro rata as to time and that in serving in such capacities, if a less period of time were covered than a full year, then payment should be made for such part of the year as the official served.

My conclusions are, then, that the term of office of steward terminates December 31, 1901, and that the compensation for the period of time since the last appointment should be pro rated on the basis of full pay for one year.

SCOPE OF AUTHORITY OF THE WARDEN OF THE STATES PRISON, IN RELATION TO THE DISBURSEMENT OF THE STATES PRISON FUNDS.

The warden of the States Prison has no authority to apply any portion of the States Prison funds to any other purpose than that of the States Prison, not even for the payment of his own salary.

March 6, 1902.

To the State Board of Inspectors of Prisons and Jails:

Gentlemen: Your communication under date of February 19th, in which you ask my opinion in relation to the question whether or not if the warden of the States Prison, should make loans from the States Prison money, on memorandum or on book accounts, that is from money belonging to the State and accumulated among the States Prison funds, it would be a breach of his bond and whether or not the bondsmen would become liable by reason of any funds so appropriated particularly in the event of the death of the warden.

This is a purely statute matter and the answer thereto, in my judgment, is clear and beyond question.

Section 5 of chapter 140 of the Revised Statutes provides that "the warden of the States Prison shall give bond to the State in the sum of ten thousand dollars, with sufficient sureties, approved by the governor and council, conditioned that he will account for all moneys that come to his hands as treasurer of the States Prison; that he will not be concerned in trade or commerce during his continuance in office, and that he will faithfully perform all the duties incumbent upon him as warden of said prison."

This provision covers the obligation of the bond.

The question which next arises is, what are the duties of warden in respect to the States Prison moneys collected or held by him?

Section 13 of chapter 140 of the Revised Statutes provides, among other things, that he shall have the care "of the lands, buildings, machines, tools, stock, provisions and every other kind of property belonging to or within its precincts; he shall be the treasurer of the prison, receive, pay out, and be accountable for all moneys granted for its maintenance or derived from the manufactures or the concerns thereof; make in the books of the prison regular entries of all its pecuniary and other concerns, and on the first days of March, June, September and December of each year he shall render to the inspectors a fair account of all the expenses and disbursements, receipts and profits of the prison, with sufficient vouches therefor, and a statement of its general affairs for the quarter past * * * and he shall also on the same days render under oath a similar account and statement, examined and approved by the inspectors, to the governor and council with whom he shall settle all his accounts whenever required."

This provision gives the full latitude of the warden's right to deal with the funds of the States Prison. It provides for the receipt and disbursement of all moneys; for his official account to be rendered at stated times to the inspectors. This account must contain the expenses and disbursements, receipts and profits of the prison, with vouchers therefor. The balance of cash remaining on hand must appear as cash in the hands of the treasurer of the States Prison and not as personal obligations on

his part for moneys which he may have used from the States Prison funds.

The care which the legislature took to provide against the expenditure of the States Prison money for any other purposes than to carry on the affairs of the States Prison, appears very distinctly in said section 5, which provides that he; to wit, the warden of the States Prison, will not be "concerned in trade or commerce during his continuance in office," which is made a part of his bond, and also in said section 13, that "the warden shall not carry on or be concerned in trade or commerce during his continuance in office." In other words, the warden is hedged around by these strong provisions for the express purpose of protecting the States Prison funds which he holds as treasurer of the States Prison.

Section 8 of said chapter 140 provides, substantially, that the inspectors shall audit, correct and settle the accounts of the warden with the States Prison, and at a stated period make report thereof to the governor and council, which provision requires the inspectors to see to it that the warden performs his duties faithfully in all financial matters.

Surely, then, should the warden make personal use or loans from the States Prison funds, and the inspectors on examination of the accounts should find such to be the case and this use or loans or money made by the warden were outstanding, the inspectors could not properly audit and settle the accounts of the warden. They would have no right to do so under their oath of office, and should at once report the situation to the governor and council.

Again, it might be supposed that the warden of the States Prison, being treasurer thereof, might from time to time, as his salary accrued, draw from the States Prison fund against his salary and account for the same, as such, to the inspectors. But this situation is provided for by statute, as appears by chapter 115, page 864, under section 8, which reads as follows: "The salaries of all public officers and the pay of all clerks in public offices, not otherwise provided for, shall be from the state treasury in quarterly payments."

So that the warden of the States Prison has no right even to make use of the funds in his hands to pay himself, but must go to the State treasurer for his quarterly payments, since I do not

find any provision whereby he may pay himself from the funds of the States Prison.

To sum up in brief, all the provisions of the statutes go to this one point, that the warden of the States Prison, while he is treasurer of the States Prison, can employ the funds of the States Prison only and solely for the expenses, disbursements and affairs of the States Prison and nothing else, and, that when he makes application of the funds of the States Prison to any other purpose than to the affairs of the States Prison, to wit, to himself, or to other parties not connected with the States Prison, on loans or otherwise, his bond becomes liable for such funds so illegally disbursed.

HEALTH INSURANCE—NOTICE.

The notice required in chapter 46 of the Public Laws of 1895 relating to insurance is not applicable to companies doing what is known as health insurance.

August 15, 1902.

To Hon. Stephen W. Carr, Insurance Commissioner, Augusta, Me.:

My Dear Sir: I herewith submit to you my opinion in relation to the question whether or not health insurance companies so called, are controlled in the matter of giving notice of sickness by chapter 46 of the Public Laws of 1895.

The opinion which I have reached by a careful examination of chapter 46, Public Laws of 1895 and of other sections of the insurance law, is that said chapter 46 does not apply to health insurance companies in name, and since it does not then the time specified in the policy of a health insurance company as to notice, must be taken as binding upon the party insuring, and for the following reasons:

First. The question raised might turn on the meaning of the words "casualty and accident." What is meant in said chapter 46 by "casualty and accident insurance companies?" It might appear on first reading that these words could be enlarged in their meaning so as to cover health insurance companies and

thereby cover in health insurance policies. The words "casualty and accident," as used in the insurance laws, have a definite and distinct meaning. I will not endeavor to define the two terms because it is unnecessary. In brief, they refer to some adverse effect upon an individual unlooked for, unexpected ordinarily, but which, nevertheless, sometimes does not come wholly unexpected. In the legal dictionary the two words are used nearly synonymously and I have no doubt that they are so used in our insurance laws. And still sickness is unexpected and unlooked for and the effect is harmful, so that in case of sickness the definition would almost lap over into the domain of casualty or accident. However, this point I conceive is fully taken care of by referring to section 87, chapter 109, Public Laws of 1887 which provides in the seventh line as follows: "And no foreign life, casualty, health or livestock insurance company," etc. I mean to say that this section recognizes health insurance companies in a class by themselves and indicates that a health insurance company is not a casualty company. Therefore I have no question in saying that when the words "casualty and accident" are used in said chapter 46 they do not mean health insurance companies as such.

Second: The reasons given by Mr. LeGrand L. Atwood, secretary of the Union Casualty and Surety Company, in his letter under cover of July 2, why the law should not apply to health insurance companies, I do not consider as having any particular weight. The very reasons which he gives why the law should not apply to health insurance companies may also be given why such a law should not apply to casualty or accident insurance companies. I do not see why section 104 should not be enlarged to include health insurance companies.

Third. There is a view, however, in relation to said chapter 46 which may be taken and which should be considered. The company which Mr. LeGrand L. Atwood represents by his letter of July 2d, seems to be a casualty and surety company. The reading of said chapter 46 is somewhat peculiar in this respect. If said company issued policies for health insurance under the head of the Union Casualty and Surety Company, then I query whether such policy so issued would not be swept under and controlled by said chapter 46 for said section reads: "No con-

ditions, stipulations or agreements contained in any application for insurance in any foreign or domestic casualty or accident insurance company, or contained in any policy insured by such company, or in any way made by any such company." etc.

Hence, if this company carries on a health insurance under the name of the Casualty and Surety Company, then I am disposed to think that the section would apply to such health policy, because the section does not set out that no conditions, stipulations or agreements in the policies for casualty or accident insurance, or contained in any policy issued by any such company for casualty or accident insurance, or in any way made by such company for casualty or accident insurance, etc., but does provide that such conditions, stipulations or agreements contained in any application for insurance in any foreign or domestic casualty or accident insurance company shall be subject to said section.

The distinction which I wish to draw is, that under this section the law would seem to apply to all conditions, stipulations or agreements in all policies of insurance whether for casualty, accident or health, in case they were issued by a casualty or accident insurance company, and that such company because it is a casualty or accident company in name cannot insure health under the name of casualty or accident and thereby escape the provisions of the section.

On the other hand, as I have said, if the company is a health insurance company pure and simple, then my opinion is that said chapter 46 does not apply to such company.

LOAN AND BUILDING ASSOCIATIONS. KINDRED ASSOCIATIONS DOING BUSINESS SIMILAR IN MANNER TO THAT OF LOAN AND BUILDING ASSOCIATIONS.

Foreign associations, whether incorporated or not, doing business in a like manner to that employed by loan and building associations, are subject to the provisions of the laws of this State before they can do business here.

PORTLAND, ME., December 6, 1902.

Hon. F. E. Timberlake, Bank Examiner, Augusta, Me.:

Dear Sir: In answer to your official inquiry whether or not the New England Home Buyers Association of Boston, Mass., being an association for the accumulation of funds from its members for the purpose of buying and improving real estate or building homes for its members, and similar associations whether incorporated or not, can operate within this State without complying with the provisions set out in chapter 79, section 2, of the Public Laws of 1891, I submit the following opinion.

Said New England Home Buyers Association is based on a trust agreement between certain individuals, residents of Massachusetts. The property of the association, however acquired, is held and controlled by a board of trustees. The beneficiary interests in said association are held and controlled by a board of stockholders, for it is provided under said trust agreement, that the trustees therein named thereby declare that all moneys and other property, rights and interests of whatever description, conveyed or transferred to them or acquired by them as aforesaid, are and are to be held by them for account of said shareholders, their assigns and legal representatives, in the proportions shown by the number of shares set against their respective names, and are to be managed and administered upon the trusts, in the manner following, etc. The shareholders herein named are parties to the trust deed and reap the profits of the business.

From a further inspection of the trust agreement herein referred to, it appears that this association is no more nor less than a co-partnership. It has never been incorporated, hence we

will treat it on the ground of its legal status, to wit, that of a co-partnership.

Section 6, which section relates to the powers conferred upon the trustees, provides, among other things, that the trustees shall have no power to bind the shareholders personally by any contract express or implied, or by any act, neglect or default; that neither trustees nor shareholders shall be personally liable on any such contract or for any such act, neglect or default, shall have re-course for satisfaction or payment or for indemnity solely to the trust estate.

It appears, therefore, that although this association is a co-partnership in every sense of the word, yet an effort has been made to relieve the parties thereto of any personal liability by reason of their neglect or default in the management of the affairs of the association, whether stockholders or trustees.

It would seem, therefore, that this attempted provision of the trust agreement would bring the matter directly under that clause of section 2 of chapter 79 of the Public Laws of 1891, if this association falls within said chapter 79, which provides as follows: "Whenever upon examination or otherwise, it is the opinion of the bank examiner that any such association or corporation is transacting business in such manner as to be hazardous to the public," etc., for there seems to be no protection further than the fund of the association to which parties who have paid in money to the association can resort, if the provision of the trust agreement herein referred to, relating to the negligence or default of either stockholders or trustees in the management of the business, can be sustained in law.

Section 1 of said chapter 79 of the Public Laws of 1891, provides as follows: "Except as hereinafter provided, no person, association or corporation shall carry on the business of accumulating the savings of its members and loaning to them such accumulations in the manner of loan and building associations, within this State, unless incorporated under the laws thereof for such purpose.

Section 2 of the same chapter provides, in general, that such association or corporation established under the laws of another state, may be authorized by the bank examiner to do business in this State after complying with certain provisions therein set out.

The question then arises, is the business of the New England Home Buyers Association in the nature of that of a loan and building association business? If it is shown from the methods and manner in which the New England Home Buyers Association does business, that it is similar in manner and kind to that of loan and building associations, then it must become subject to section 2 of said chapter 79, and must comply with the provisions thereof before it can do business in this State. It is important, therefore, to inquire the meaning of the term "building and loan associations" and the kind of business done thereunder.

One authority says, "a building and loan association may be defined as an organization created for the purpose of accumulating a fund by means, primarily, of the gradual payment of the stock subscriptions of its members, in installments, due periodically, from which fund sums are to be advanced to the members to assist them in acquiring land and erecting buildings thereon."

This definition, as the author admits, is a limited definition and is descriptive of the typical building and loan association and is not inclusive of all forms of organization which may be denominated building and loan associations.

The author further says, "the term has no exact legal significance which is adhered to in all jurisdictions. It is rather a popular name or a class of associations whose rights, powers and duties depend upon the particular statutes under which they are organized."

He further says, "The terms 'building and loan associations,' 'building associations,' and 'building societies' * * * are synonymous. Besides these names various others are used by virtue of custom or legislation, to denote either the same class of organizations or associations having much in common with them and governed largely by the same principles."

The particular name, therefore, of an association or corporation has little or nothing to do in designating the exact kind of business which is carried on by it, but its methods and manner of doing business are the important questions to be considered in this connection.

Is, then, the modus operandi of the New England Home Buyers Association similar in manner, kind and results to that of the loan and building association as generally understood? A

Careful examination of all the papers covering the entire method by which said association does business has fully convinced me that its plan is nothing more nor less than that of the loan and building association plan, except that it is disguised by the use of certain terms and methods which, nevertheless, result the same as those of the loan and building association, although differently named.

A loan and building association provides for stock, for the payment of stated payments or dues; for the accumulation of its capital and the loan of the same to its members or others on real estate or otherwise; to wit, the purchase or repair of real estate; the building of houses; and the final payment of such loans by said monthly installments; to take deeds and mortgages and such other conveyances as are necessary to carry out the purposes of the company.

The gist of said section 1, to which any association or corporation may be compared to judge as to the kind of business it is doing, is as follows: "the business of accumulating the savings of its members and loaning to them such accumulations," in the manner of loan and building associations. Does the New England Home Buyers Association do this?

Said association first provides an agreement which is made a part of the trust deed to be executed by the trustees and by the party called the party of the second part but who really is the party that desires to accumulate moneys in the association for the purposes ostensibly of purchasing real estate or a home, or making improvements on real estate. This agreement sets out the various conditions under which he may make payments, accumulate funds, purchase real estate or any interest therein, and the method by which the association assists such purchaser. There are very many provisions in this agreement, but the following are those which particularly call for our attention.

The agreement itself takes the place of the stock issued by loan and building associations to parties who pay monthly sums to such associations.

It provides specifically:

1st. To provide the purchaser with a fund of \$1,000, or more, to purchase a home, farm, or other real estate, or to discharge existing encumbrances thereon, or to pay for improvements thereon.

2nd. It provides for the payment of monthly installments at stated times and the accumulation of funds thereby.

3rd. It provides that after paying in a certain amount, the purchaser, or second party as he is called, may then have a loan of a certain amount of money per month for the purpose of purchasing a home or making improvements on real estate, etc.

4th. It provides that the association shall be protected for such money advanced, by giving the necessary lien claims on the property purchased, which are finally discharged by the accumulation of the monthly payments.

5th. It provides for the surrender of the agreement before and after it becomes "vested;" that is, it provides for the disposal before it becomes vested through the association.

It will readily be seen that the foregoing provisions of the agreement completely cover the method and manner employed by loan and building associations.

While the New England Home Buyers Association makes use of the methods employed by loan and building associations, it possesses scarcely any of the protective features of loan and building associations, as provided by our laws.

My opinion then is, from the foregoing discussion, that if the New England Home Buyers Association or other associations from out of the State similar thereto desire to do business in this State, then they must comply with the requirements of said chapter 79 of the Public Laws of 1891; otherwise they will be subject to the fine therein set out.
