# REPORT.

ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE.

AUGUSTA December 31, 1902.

*To His Excellency, John F. Hill, Governor and Commander-in-Chief.*

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith my report as Adjutant General, Quartermaster General, and Paymaster General for the year ending December 31st, 1902.

## ENROLLMENT.

It appears from the biennial enrollment made in April, 1901, by the assessors of the several cities, towns and plantations of the State, that the total number of male citizens of this State of the age of eighteen and under the age of forty-five years, subject to military duty, is one hundred and four thousand, two hundred and ninety-eight, a gain of one hundred and seven over 1899.

## NATIONAL GUARD.

Under the present law the active militia is designated the National Guard of the State of Maine. As now constituted it consists of two Regiments of Infantry of twelve companies each, a Naval Reserve, Signal Corps and Ambulance Corps.

The First Regiment under command of Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, headquarters at Biddeford, is composed of companies as follows, viz: A, B, E, L, and Band, Portland; C, Auburn; D, Norway; F, Augusta; G, Biddeford; H, Rockland; I, Lewiston; K, Brunswick; M, Westbrook.

The Second Regiment under command of Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, headquarters at Eastport, is composed of companies as follows, viz: A, Hallowell; B, D and Band, Lewiston; C,

Bath ; E. Skowhegan ; F. Dover ; G. Bangor ; H. Waterville ; I. Eastport ; K. Farmington ; L. Houlton ; M. Machias.

The Naval Reserve, under command of Lieutenant Harry M. Bigelow, is stationed at Portland. The Signal Corps, under command of Second Lieutenant Wylie D. Floyd, stationed at Portland, and the Ambulance Corps, under command of Second Lieutenant Charles A. Jumper, is stationed at Lewiston.

The total strength of the National Guard is as follows, viz:—

*First Infantry*—Officers, 51 ; enlisted men, 492 ; total, 543.

*Second Infantry*—Officers, 51 ; enlisted men, 521 ; total, 572.

*Naval Reserve*—Officers, 3 ; enlisted men, 46 ; total, 49.

*Signal Corps*—Officers, 1 ; enlisted men, 16 ; total, 17.

*Ambulance Corps*—Officers, 1 ; enlisted men, 18 ; total, 19.

Grand total, 1200.

#### INSPECTIONS.

A thorough inspection of the entire Guard has been made during the year by Brigadier General Frank L. Hoyt, Inspector General. The result shows the Guard to be in good condition, and that great improvement has been made. This is largely owing to renewed interest in military matters and reforms instituted and successfully carried out by my immediate predecessors in office, Generals Selden Connor and John T. Richards, who during their terms of office, labored in season and out of season to advance the interests and promote the well-being of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

#### RIFLE PRACTICE.

Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice, has mastered the duties of his position in an unusual degree, and has stimulated the entire Guard in the acquisition of one of the most important duties of a soldier, the skillful use of the rifle.

Despite the handicap of insufficient range facilities in several important centers during the early part of the year, the season has been one of the most active in the history of the Guard.

I think I am justified in saying that the qualifications for marksmanship stand higher to-day than ever before. There is a growing interest in the Guard in this direction which is most gratifying, and should be fostered and encouraged by the State

in every possible way. The details of this important branch are fully set forth in the report of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

#### ENCAMPMENT.

An annual encampment of the land forces of the National Guard of the State of Maine was held at Camp Hill, Augusta, from August 12th to 22d, inclusive. Owing to lack of sufficient funds it was found necessary to hold an encampment of five days only, with pay for four days, in lieu of a seven days' encampment, with pay for five days as has been customary. With that exception, the result of the encampment was most satisfactory.

The Spanish War has given us many veteran officers, and the result of their service is very noticeable in the improvement of the Guard in everything pertaining to the duties of a soldier. We were fortunate in having with us as instructor and inspecting officer, Captain Sidney A. Cloman of the Twenty-third U. S. Infantry, who was specially detailed by the War Department for that purpose. He entered into the work with great energy, and was untiring in the discharge of his duties during the encampment. His soldierly conduct and thorough knowledge of every detail of his profession, and the agreeable manner in which he imparted information to the officers and members of the National Guard, endeared him to the entire force. The result of his instruction was most noticeable, and the improvement of the Guard from day to day was very marked.

The Signal Corps and Ambulance Corps are worthy of special mention for the interest manifested by officers and men in the discharge of their respective duties.

The Naval Reserve, consisting of three officers and forty-six enlisted men, is most fortunate in being officered by men who have made themselves thoroughly familiar with their duties, and I feel justified in saying that the command would not suffer in comparison with a similar organization from any other state.

I trust that the day is not far distant when the State will feel justified in authorizing the organization of a second division of the Naval Reserve in the city of Bath.

The Naval Reserve with two officers and thirty enlisted men embarked for their annual cruise on the U. S. S. Montgomery, at Portland, Maine, on Saturday, August 9th, at four P. M., and

disembarked at the same place on the following Saturday, August 16th. Captain Patch and the officers and men of his command were untiring in their efforts to instruct the members of the Naval Reserve in everything pertaining to their duties. They were especially instructed in the use of the lead and line, in steering and in all duties performed at sea. The officers and men were assigned to duty on this ship, and were treated in every way as if they had been regularly enlisted in the U. S. Navy. The cruise was in every respect most satisfactory and beneficial to the Naval Reserve.

#### TOURS OF DUTY.

A severe conflagration occurred in Houlton on Saturday and Sunday, May 17 and 18, 1902. Captain Frank A. Peabody, commanding Company L, Second Infantry, was instructed to parade his company in uniform and under arms for the protection of property. The tour of duty continued for three days and the company rendered valuable assistance to the constituted authorities of the town.

The selectmen of the town of Houlton, in their report for 1903, refer to the service rendered as follows, viz:

"The militia company was of great benefit in guarding and protecting property after the fire of May 17th, ult. Considerable furniture, and household goods that otherwise would have been lost, stolen or destroyed, was thus saved for its owners. We think in this one instance the money value of the property saved, exceeded all that the town has ever raised for militia purposes. We recommend the usual appropriation."

On June 11, 1902, Lieutenant Colonel Charles Collins, Major Frank B. W. Welch, Companies A, B, E, L and M, all of the First Infantry, the Signal Corps and Naval Reserve were granted permission to parade in uniform and under arms in the city of Portland for the purpose of taking part in an exhibition drill and review. The Commander-in-chief accompanied by his staff attended. The exhibition was carried out in a highly creditable manner.

On July 28, 1902, authority was granted to Captain George McL. Presson, commanding Company K, Second Infantry, to march his company in uniform and under arms, from Farmington to Augusta, and to pass through Farmington Falls, New



Sharon, Rome Corner, Belgrade Mills, Belgrade and Sidney, on their way to Augusta to attend the annual encampment of the National Guard, August 17th, and to return in the same manner at the close of the encampment. The command reached camp in Augusta on the 18th in excellent condition.

On July 28, 1902, permission was granted to Captain William R. Kimball, commanding Company C, Second Infantry, to march his command in uniform and under arms, from Bath to Augusta and return and to pass through Woolwich, Dresden, Pittston, Randolph and Chelsea, on their way to and from the annual encampment of the National Guard in Augusta, August 17 and August 23, 1902. The command reached camp in fine condition on the 18th instant.

August 26, 1902, authority was granted Companies C and I, First Infantry, and Companies B and D, Second Infantry, to parade in uniform and under arms on the occasion of the visit of the President of the United States at Lewiston, on Tuesday, August 26, 1902.

August 26, 1902, permission was granted to Harry M. Bigelow, Lieutenant commanding First Division Naval Reserve, to parade his command and fire a national salute at Portland, on the occasion of the visit of the President of the United States on that date.

#### ARMORIES.

The Militia Law of Maine, Section 78, is as follows: (Extract) "Municipal officers shall provide for each company of the National Guard located within the limits of their respective towns, subject to the approval of the commander-in-chief or such officer as he may designate, a suitable drill room and armory or place of deposit for the arms, equipments and other property furnished by the State. They shall also provide suitable rooms for the headquarters of each separate battalion, regiment or brigade established within their limits, and a reasonable compensation for the rent thereof, not exceeding one hundred dollars per annum, may be allowed to the town so furnishing, and paid by the State."

The provisions of this law have not been observed in all cases and suitable accommodations have not always been provided. When the attention of the authorities of one of the cities of the State was called to the fact that suitable accommodations had

not been provided for the military company located there, the reply was that no penalty attached provided the requirements of the law were not complied with. Under the laws of the State of Massachusetts, a penalty of \$5,000 is attached in case towns or cities fail to comply with the law providing suitable armories.

I submit that it might be well to amend the Militia Laws of Maine in conformity with the laws of other states.

The Portland armory is the best in the State and the city authorities take a just pride in the several military organizations located there as shown by their armory. Portland has also provided at an expense of over \$1,500 the best rifle range in the State, this action is highly appreciated by the Guard. The city of Lewiston has also provided an armory for the use of the Guard. The city of Westbrook will soon have a first class armory for the use of Company M of the First Infantry, with a drill room 50x100. Brunswick has a new armory nearly completed for the use of Company K of the First Infantry. The armory at Farmington occupied by Company K, Second Infantry, is well adapted to the purpose for which it is used and is regarded as one of the best. Company I of the Second Infantry, located at Eastport, has a fine armory owned by the company. Generally speaking the cities and towns show a commendable interest in the local military organizations, but in one or two instances the lack of interest in this direction is very noticeable.

#### SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION.

Schools of instruction for the officers of the regiments have been held during the year. The school of instruction for the Second Infantry was held at Bangor on March 11th and 12th. The school of instruction for the First Infantry was held in Portland on December 17th and 18th. They were under the charge of the colonels of the respective regiments, and I have no hesitation in saying that they were most admirably managed, and I believe productive of good results.

#### THE AROOSTOOK WAR.

In this report will be found copies of the muster rolls of the different companies called into actual service by the State, for the protection of the north eastern frontier, in the year 1839. They contain the names and rank of all who served in the Aroos-

took War as shown by the records of this office. The general orders relating to the Aroostook War are also given under the dates of issue. A carefully prepared statement giving the principal events which led up to the Aroostook War has been prepared by Miss Annie W. Bean and is published as an introduction.

REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR GENERAL.

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LEWISTON, December 15, 1902.

*Major-General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, Augusta, Maine:*

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my report as Inspector-General for the year 1902.

In compliance with G. O. No. 1, A. G. O., January 10, 1902, I have made a careful inspection of the several companies and corps of the National Guard at their home stations, making a minute inspection of all State and United States property in the custody of the commanding officer of each organization, a detailed report of which was made to you at the time. I found the officers and men very courteous and anxious to improve the condition of their companies. There are a few companies, however, where a change in the personnel would be beneficial to the service.

The very generous act of His Excellency the Commander-in-chief, in giving one hundred dollars in cash to be divided among the three companies attaining the highest score at armory inspections, had a good effect and as a result the inspections were very satisfactory.

The organized military force known as the National Guard of the State of Maine, comprises two regiments of Infantry, one Division of Naval Reserve, an Ambulance Corps, and a signal Corps, consisting of one hundred and nineteen commissioned officers and one thousand one hundred and ninety enlisted men. The state can depend on both officers and men to do their whole duty should it ever be necessary to preserve peace within its borders or to repel a foe from without.



## STRENGTH.

The first Regiment has fifty-one commissioned officers and five hundred and fifty enlisted men including a band of twenty-five musicians. The Second Regiment has fifty commissioned officers, five hundred and thirty-six enlisted men, including a band of twenty-five musicians. The Division Naval Reserve has three commissioned officers and forty-six enlisted men; the Ambulance Corps one commissioned officer and eighteen enlisted men; the Signal Corps one commissioned officer and twenty enlisted men.

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## INSPECTIONS.

Commencing January 28th, I made a careful inspection of each company at its armory, and found all military property either in the armory or accounted for; in many of the companies, it was arranged for inspection. The attendance in some instances was not satisfactory, but, in a majority of the companies, every man was present or accounted for.

## ARMORIES.

The condition of the company armories has improved over that of last year. Company "K" of the First Regiment and Company "M" of the Second Regiment have undesirable quarters.

By reason of the fire in Bangor, May 24, 1901, the armory of Company "G," Second Infantry, was destroyed; since that time the company has been deprived of a proper place for assembling. It would seem that a city like Bangor should be willing to provide for its one military company a suitable armory. Other cities and towns in the state have shown a commendable pride in providing accommodations for their military organizations.

## REGIMENTAL CAMPS.

Regimental camps are no longer an experiment for it has been proven in the last three years that the health of the men, the quiet of the camp, and the good work on the field are all conclusive evidence of the superiority of regimental camps over brigade, until such time as the State can provide a larger camping ground.

## ANNUAL ENCAMPMENT.

CAMP HILL, August 12, 1902.

The First Regiment, Infantry, Colonel L. H. Kendall commanding, arrived at Augusta at 10.30 A. M. It was disembarked, formed and on its way to Camp Hill in twenty minutes. The regiment was joined at the depot by Adjutant-General A. B. Farnham, Inspector-General F. L. Hoyt, and Captain S. A. Colman, 23d Infantry, U. S. A., he having been detailed to attend the annual encampment of the National Guard of this state as inspector and instructor. The troops were looking finely, but the companies were not as large as in former years. The guard marched directly to the guard-house and entered upon its duties, while the companies were getting settled in their tents and quieting down for a week of hard but pleasant duties. The citizen-soldier seems to enjoy his work and takes a personal pride in doing his best.

## DRILL.

The work of the troops on the field was carefully looked after by Captain Cloman who directed and criticised the drill, and a marked improvement was noticed each day. The time was devoted to the School of the Battalion in close and extended order, with two half-days of regimental drill under Colonel Kendall.

## GUARD DUTY.

This very important duty was the most unsatisfactory of any. It is about impossible to have the guard perform its duty properly. The officers and men appear willing to do what is required of them, but when questioned by a superior officer seem to have forgotten many of their instructions.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 15TH.

Governor Hill reviewed the regiment and expressed himself as well pleased with his troops and the work they were doing. The companies and individuals who had won prizes during the year, were then presented to the Governor who, in a happy manner, complimented each one on the excellent service performed and presented the prizes. The Commander-in-Chief is very popular with his troops. Colonel Kendall with his officers made an official call on His Excellency.

Saturday being the last day in camp of the First Regiment, little work was done on the field. The troops broke camp and marched to the State House where they were massed in the rotunda and paid their respects to the returned Maine battle flags—a very impressive and beautiful ceremony and a fine object-lesson in patriotism.

CAMP HILL, August 18, 1902.

The Second Regiment Infantry in command of Colonel E. E. Newcomb, arrived in camp today. Company "C" marched overland from Bath and arrived in camp Sunday evening looking like hardened veterans. Company "K" marched in from Farmington, their camp equipage being transported in a large canvas-covered wagon drawn by four mules. The wagon was marked with the letters of the company and, as the men marched up the hill followed by the mules drawing their transportation wagon, it was typical of the real army life. The field work of the Second was along the same lines as that of the First, with the exception of regimental inspection in the field which had to be omitted by the First on account of the rain. The same rigid rules as regards sanitation were observed as in the First; the same hard work in the field; the same criticisms on guard duty as were made in the First Regiment. The ceremonies of guard mount were very good in both regiments. Some of them were as nearly perfect as is possible. The criticisms only apply to men on guard duty.

THURSDAY, AUGUST 21ST.

Governor Hill reviewed the regiment and expressed himself as well pleased with his troops. The prizes were distributed by His Excellency with the same grace and complimentary remarks

used on a similar occasion with the First Regiment. Colonel Newcomb, with his officers, made an official call on the Commander-in-Chief.

The regiment broke camp Friday, and embarked for home feeling that it had spent a profitable five days. On account of the wet weather, the ceremony of saluting the flags at the State House was omitted. On the days of the Governor's official visits, each regiment escorted His Excellency from the State House to the parade ground, where he was received with a salute of seventeen guns.

#### SANITARY CONDITIONS.

The camp was well policed. The cook and mess houses were inspected each morning by the surgeons, as was all food before and after cooking; the health of the men being carefully looked after.

The few cases of sickness were traceable to some indiscreet action by the parties themselves either in eating, in willful neglect or in not taking proper care of themselves.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

- 1st. That each regiment have a ten days' encampment.
- 2d. That all cities and towns where companies are located, provide the best armories possible and give the home companies all the moral and financial aid in their power.
- 3d. That the company officers give all the time to their commands that is possible, and the necessary instructions, to keep the men interested in the work of the companies.
- 4th. That all men who are anxious for promotion should perfect themselves in the School of the Soldier and the School of the Company.
- 5th. That Non-Commissioned Officers' Schools be compulsory.
- 6th. That the matches in rifle shooting be holden in October of each year, as this work interferes with the duties in camp very materially, by taking officers and men from their commands during the hours for drill. A regimental skirmish match is the only one that can be shot to advantage during the encampment.

7th. That the State provide for at least two officers each year to attend the School of Application at Fort Riley, Kansas, or wherever the General Government convenes the same for the instruction of officers. The benefits to be derived would be well worth the necessary expense. This would be a great incentive for the State to get the best instruction at a very small cost. The better the State troops are trained, the more efficient they are if their services are required.

The Division Naval Reserve of Maine is one of the best in the country. The work in the armory is of the best. The sea duty was performed in a very acceptable manner to the naval authorities. The Division should be assisted and encouraged in every possible way.

The Signal Corps was on duty with the First Regiment. The Ambulance Corps was on duty with both regiments. I would recommend that these organizations be quartered within the guard lines at the next encampment.

In conclusion, I desire to thank the officers and men who have rendered me every courtesy and aided in making my duties pleasant and profitable. The State was very fortunate in having Captain S. A. Cioman for duty during the encampment. He is a hard-working and painstaking officer, a fine instructor, and his pleasant, genial ways won the hearts of both officers and men.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSARY GENERAL.

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BANGOR, ME., December 15, 1902.

*Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:*

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith my annual report as commissary general for the year ending December 15, 1902.

Acting under the authority given me by section 7 of General Orders No. 19, I purchased the subsistence supplies for the annual encampment which was held at Camp Hill between August 12 and 22, 1902. I remained at Camp Hill during the entire period of the encampment, arranged for the issue of the rations required by the troops during their tour of duty, and at the close of the encampment verified the bills for the supplies consumed in my department and forwarded them to your office for payment.

Previous to the encampment I prepared estimates of the supplies that would be required, based upon the ration sheet which was furnished for the encampment and the table of quantities given in section 496 of the regulations for the National Guard. Upon these estimates bids were solicited by public advertisements in the Daily Kennebec Journal. Proposals were received and contracts awarded for the necessary supplies. The articles furnished by the various contractors were carefully inspected as received, and in every instance were found to be of the proper quality and amount.

The First Regiment were in camp four and one-third days.

The Second Regiment were in camp four days, the duration of the encampment being about two-thirds as long as in 1901.

The average cost per man per day in 1901 was thirty-eight and one-sixth cents. The average cost per man per day in 1902 was forty-three and one-fifth cents, an increase, as you will observe, of five cents per day per man. I commented at some length in my report for 1901 upon the circumstances which make the per diem cost of short encampments larger than for long encampments. A daily inspection of the various company cook-houses was made, suggestions given in regard to the care and utilization of the rations issued, and opportunity afforded for complaint in regard to the quality and quantity of issue. A record of these inspections is on file in my office for your information. There were no complaints filed with this department in regard to the quality or quantity of issue, and I believe that in every instance rations were found satisfactory and of sufficient quantity.

In order that I might give you in detail full information in regard to the supplies furnished for the encampment, I opened a subsistence account to which was charged all the supplies furnished at their original cost. As the rations were issued they were credited to the subsistence account at the same cost, and charged to the various units of organization receiving them.

At the close of the encampment supplies to the value of three thousand four dollars and thirty-five cents (\$3,004.35) had been purchased and charged to subsistence account. There had been issued supplies to the amount of two thousand nine hundred ninety-three dollars and nineteen cents (\$2,993.19) which is just eleven dollars and sixteen cents (\$11.16) less than the cost of the supplies purchased. This eleven dollars and sixteen cents (\$11.16) represents the wastage in the commissary department—the actual loss in issue, and it grows out of the wastage necessarily incident to the handling of the various articles of issue and the small residue of rations left unissued in the department storehouse at the close of the encampment. This sum, which is about one-third of one per cent, is considerably less than the per cent of wastage allowed the commissary department by the United States Army Regulations. That some loss will always exist is evident, and this amount will not, I trust, be considered by you excessive.

The table which follows exhibits in detail the transactions of my department, shows of whom the various supplies were purchased and to whom they were issued:

The companies come into camp under similar conditions, the circumstances controlling the issue to the different units of organization are the same in every instance so that the relatively larger per diem cost of the First Regiment, occurring as it has in this and the preceding encampment, seems to me worthy of special comment. During the period of service a careful record was kept of the extra issues to the various companies in both regiments, and it became evident to the commissary department that the men in the First Regiment were actually consuming a larger quantity of rations than was required in the Second Regiment. How considerable this difference was will be evident when you observe that while the average daily strength of the First Regiment was less than that of the Second Regiment, the actual value of the rations issued to the First Regiment was considerably greater. The companies in the First Regiment are mainly recruited from the larger centres of population, while those in the Second Regiment come from the towns and smaller cities, and I am of the opinion that this difference in the requirements of the men in the two regiments may be attributed to the location of the companies.

In the table which follows you will find shown in detail the issue to each unit of organization, the average daily strength of each company, the number of days rations were issued for each regiment, the cost per man for the entire period of the encampment, and the cost per man per day:

**REPORT OF SURGEON GENERAL.**

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BANGOR, MAINE, January 1, 1903.

*Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General State of Maine:*

SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report as surgeon general for the year ending December 31, 1902.

I attended the encampment and at its close approved all bills contracted by the medical department, and transmitted them to your office for payment.

There is a fair supply of medicine on hand. The surgical appliances are few, and I recommend that the regulation outfit be purchased from the government. Attached to this report is a complete inventory of all property contained in the hospital at the close of the encampment.

The regulation field bath tubs were used for the first time and proved a great success. Equipments for the ambulance corps pouches were provided, and instructions were given daily in their use by Lieut. Elliott and Lieut. Chandler. At the hospital Capt. O'Neill and Capt. Hill were in charge, performing their duties in a most satisfactory manner. Too much praise cannot be given for the services rendered by Major Bradbury and Major Fuller, surgeons of the First and Second Regiments respectively.

One case of measles developed during the encampment. The patient was immediately isolated and every care taken to prevent the spread of the disease. Careful investigation following the return of the men to their homes proved them to be free from infection, which speaks well for the handling of this case by the regimental surgeons.

One case of appendicitis developed. The patient was removed immediately to the Augusta city hospital. An unusually small number of patients reported for treatment from the field hospital. Indigestion and resulting diarrhoea was a prevailing sickness.

I found the cook houses and mess houses in a first-class condition. The food was perfect and well served. The sanitary arrangement showed improvement over former years.

In my report of last year I called attention to the great need that every man should be vaccinated before enlisting. I again wish to emphasize the fact that too great care cannot be exercised in regard to this matter.

I believe all blankets should be thoroughly disinfected before each encampment, and likewise immediately on breaking camp. Typhoid fever is a very common disease in Maine, and it is particularly liable to spread among soldiers in camp because of the intimate association of the men gathered together in the tents. I wish to recommend that the memorandum prepared by the surgeon general of the army upon the subject of typhoid fever contagion and a means of preventing it, be published and forwarded to the line officers, so that they may instruct their men.

I believe every company should be visited at least once a year by one of the surgeons and given a lecture on military hygiene, and that the ambulance corps should be given proper lectures and instructions at least once a month.

In my opinion the medical department N. G. S. M. should be established on a proper footing. I would suggest that measures be taken to procure the passage of an act amending the military law of the State of Maine, and submit the following draft:

1. The medical department of the National Guard of the State of Maine shall consist of the surgeon general provided for in paragraph 16, chapter 167, acts of 1901, two surgeons with the rank of major, four assistant surgeons with the rank of first lieutenant, and one assistant surgeon with the relative rank of lieutenant, junior grade. These officers shall be appointed and commissioned by the commander-in-chief, upon the recommendation of the commanding officer of the organization with which their duties are to be performed, but they shall be subject to any duty assigned to them by the commander-in-chief.

2. Officers commissioned first lieutenant and assistant surgeon, who have, at the adoption of this act, or who shall here-

after have performed five years' service, shall at the expiration of such service be ordered to appear before a board of examination, and, if found qualified, shall be commissioned captain and assistant surgeon. Vacancies in the grade of major shall be filled by promotion in order of seniority, after a proper examination.

3. No commission issued to an officer of the medical department, except the commission of the surgeon general, shall be vacated except by death, removal for cause, or by resignation.

4. There shall be, as part of the medical department, an ambulance company, which shall consist of one second lieutenant, one first-class sergeant, two sergeants, two corporals, and not less than sixteen nor more than twenty-four privates.

5. The enlisted men of the medical department shall be known as the hospital corps, and shall consist in addition to the enlisted men of the ambulance company, of six first-class sergeants, six sergeants, six corporals, and not less than twenty-four nor more than forty-eight men. They shall be enlisted, appointed and assigned to duty with organizations in such manner as may be prescribed by the commander-in-chief.

6. No provision of this act shall be construed as terminating any commission or enlistment in the National Guard, but any such shall continue in force according to the terms thereof, subject to the provisions of this act.

7. All acts, parts of acts, or resolves, inconsistent with this act, are hereby repealed: and all acts, or parts of acts, authorizing any officer or enlisted man in the National Guard to have a medical or a quasi-medical position in said National Guard, are also repealed: but nothing in this section shall be construed as repealing any part of section 35, chapter 167, Public Laws of 1901.

8. This act shall take effect when approved.

Maine:*

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of small arms practice in the National Guard, State of Maine, for the year ending October 31, 1902:

In prefacing last year's report, I expressed the assurance that another twelve-month would find the gain of 1901 considerably increased, and it is gratifying to report at this time that the hopes of last year have become the records of the present year. Throughout the Guard there has been great activity in range work and officers and men have given me the most hearty cooperation in raising the standard of marksmanship. Out of the twenty-six organizations which make report to me of small arms practice there are but two or three whose work can be classed as unsatisfactory. This statement speaks volumes for the fidelity of the individual commands, when one bears in mind how widely separated for the most part the several organizations are, and how little they have to do with each other during the year. When companies that are not within a day's journey of each other work faithfully on their home ranges to raise the regimental average, it will be seen that even the volunteer militia possesses that *esprit de corps* which makes the army what it is.

The rules governing small arms qualification have been given another year's trial, with certain changes in regard to revolver qualification, and their careful study leads me to believe that

they should be modified so as to better meet the needs of the Guard. I hesitated to suggest any changes last year, feeling that one year's trial was insufficient to test the efficacy of the system, but I feel now that the rules have had a fair test and should be modified at once. I will not at this time outline the changes which I regard as necessary, but will lay the plan before the board of officers whose duty it is to prepare the rules and regulations governing small arms qualification practice, at such time as you may see fit to convene the board.

The work of the season covered by this report has been a marked advance over the preceding year, the increased activity being forcibly shown by the expenditure of ammunition, which is over fifty thousand rounds in excess of last season.

The detailed statement by companies will show wherein the work has been performed.

## THE YEAR'S WORK IN BRIEF.

### FIRST INFANTRY.

The year which closed the 31st of October was one of remarkable improvement in small arms practice in this regiment. The close of the season finds eleven companies which have done good work. Col. Lucius H. Kendall, of Biddeford, commanding the regiment, has sought in every way to interest his companies and with one exception they have done him honor. Col. Kendall has had an able executive officer in the person of First Lieut. John J. Dooley of Portland, his inspector of rifle practice. Lieut. Dooley has done more than any one member of the Guard to enthuse the several commands. He not only understands how to plan but how to execute and he has succeeded in making his regiment work as it has never worked before. Excellent as has been the year's record, Col. Kendall confidently expects his men to make an even better showing the coming season.

Company A, Portland—The increased activity noted in last year's reference to this company has been continued through the present season and Capt. B. E. Kennard may felicitate himself on bringing his company to such a high point of marksmanship. He deserves great credit for his personal effort and encouragement. The members of the company are willing workers and with proper training and more experience will qualify in the

higher classes. Lieut. F. E. Cummings, who succeeded Corp. George B. Sawyer as inspector of rifle practice, has been detailed for duty with the Signal Corps much of the season, but nevertheless has worked hard with Company A. The qualification returns show that one member of the company qualified as a distinguished sharpshooter; four as firstclass marksmen; and thirty-four as marksmen.

Company B, Portland—This company continues to be one of the best working organizations in the Guard when it comes to small arms practice. Capt. R. C. Parker is an enthusiastic rifleman and Sergt. Walter L. Hatch, his company inspector, is one who can be depended on to do the work and do it in the way it should be done. Between them they set a pace for the rest of the company which cannot fail to produce good results. The company qualified three members as distinguished sharpshooters; three as sharpshooters; three as firstclass marksmen; and fifteen as marksmen.

Company C, Auburn—This company has lost much practice by reason of its company inspector being away from his company the greater part of the season. This has left the work of his office to those temporarily detailed for the duty and in consequence the standing of the company in target practice has suffered. Successful range work demands the close attention of the company inspector and it matters little how good a rifleman he may be if circumstances prevent his being with his company. The company has done a good season's preliminary work and if it had been followed with carefully conducted qualification practice the standing of the company would be among the very best. Nevertheless the company has made a remarkably fine gain over the preceding season and under Priv. J. W. Sleeper, the newly appointed inspector, I am looking for a still higher standing the coming year. The company qualified two men as distinguished sharpshooters; two as sharpshooters; one as firstclass marksman; and twenty-four as marksmen.

Company D, Norway—A very good season's work has been accomplished by this company and its qualifications do credit to the organization. The company has among its members some of the best riflemen in the Guard and if more attention was paid to regularity in practice I am convinced that even higher results

might be obtained. The company returns show that five qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; one as a sharpshooter; six as firstclass marksmen; and twenty-two as marksmen.

Company E, Portland—The work of Company E has been of the same high order this year that has characterized the company's practice for several years. In Second Lieut. D. A. Kaler is to be found one of the best marksmen in the Guard and he devotes a large part of his time to range work. With him are a number of other good shots and rifle shooting is made a feature of the work for all recruits entering the company. Six members of the company qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; five as sharpshooters; one as a firstclass marksman; and twenty-seven as marksmen.

Company F, Augusta—A change in inspectors during the present season has given to this company an inspector who devotes much time to his work, and does that work well, Corp. T. M. J. Enright. He has worked under many disadvantages, but is entitled to a great deal of credit for what he has done. Another year, if given proper co-operation, he will greatly increase the standing of the company. The returns show that four qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; one as a firstclass marksman; and seventeen as marksmen.

Company G, Biddeford—No company in this regiment has shown so effectively what a season's hard work can do for an organization as the Biddeford company. Last year the work of the company on the range was wholly unsatisfactory, but this year is all that could be asked of any organization. To Sergt. Charles G. Scamman, who during the season was appointed inspector of rifle practice, must be accorded a large share of the credit. Capt. E. S. Gowen did all that he could to increase the interest and Sergt. Scamman has been the executive who has worked out the problem. Last year the company made return of 810 rounds of ammunition expended; this year the expenditure was 7,380 rounds. Last year five members of the company qualified as firstclass marksmen and one as a marksman; this year eight men qualified as sharpshooters and thirty-seven as marksmen. Last year the company team was fourth at the encampment matches with a score of 178; this year it was first with a score of 190.

Company H, Rockland—This company, though provided with a range convenient to the armory, has failed to rise from the foot of the list. The season's work is entirely unsatisfactory and shows that proper attention has not been given to small arms practice. A change of inspectors during the season resulted in a slight improvement but the showing at best is extremely discouraging to this department. The company needs close attention to rifle practice. In years past this company has been among the best and hard work and careful training would put it back in its old place. Four men qualified as marksmen.

Company I, Lewiston—This season shows a continuation of work in rifle practice which is extremely gratifying. Company I has expended more ammunition than in any season in its history. Capt. James L. Moriarty, through his company inspector, Sergt. Thomas E. Crane, has kept his men regularly at work. A number of excellent shots have been developed and more will be added another season. Last year's expenditure of ammunition was 1,540 rounds; this year's, 6,720. Last year five members of the company qualified as distinguished sharpshooters and three as marksmen; this year, nine men qualified as distinguished sharpshooters, three as firstclass marksmen and sixteen as marksmen.

Company K, Brunswick—The season's work on the Brunswick range has been a good one, though too much of the work of qualification was put over to the last few weeks of the season. It is true that during the closing weeks Sergt. Lendall M. Cotton worked very hard and accomplished a great deal, yet had the work been done earlier in the season the result of qualification would have been higher. The company did not expend quite so much ammunition as in the preceding year but it was all put out to good advantage. The return of qualification shows that one member of the company qualified as a distinguished sharpshooter; one as a firstclass marksman; and twenty-four as marksmen.

Company L, Portland—This company has again shown a good expenditure of ammunition. Company inspectors were changed during the year and Sergt. L. J. Maguire now has charge of the work. Capt. M. E. Conley urges his men to put in their time faithfully at the targets and does all that he can to make this part of the company's work successful. The returns show that four

men qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; three as first-class marksmen; and twenty as marksmen.

Company M, Westbrook—This year's work has been conducted with excellent regard for regularity, and though there are not a large number qualifying in the higher classes the company as a whole understands the use of the rifle, and that is what the service aims to teach. Sergt. George H. Leighton has remained as inspector of rifle practice, doing hard work for the success of the organization. Capt. J. W. Graham insists that the company shall do good work on the range as well as in the armory. The return of qualification shows that six members of the company qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; one as a sharpshooter; three as firstclass marksmen; and twenty-one as marksmen.

#### SECOND INFANTRY.

There has been some remarkable improvement and some marked lack of improvement in the past season's work of this regiment. Several companies have failed to waken to the necessity of small arms practice and that has decreased the standing of the regiment not a little. On the other hand, several companies have taken wonderful strides to the front and will not be again found among the laggards. The companies which were strong last year will in nearly all cases be found stronger at the close of the season covered by this report. The regiment lacks the assistance of an inspector of small arms practice who has no other military duties. First Lieut. Olin M. Smith of Houlton, adjutant of the first battalion, rendered much assistance during encampment, but the regiment stands in need of some one who can keep sharply after the delinquents throughout the season. Col. E. E. Newcomb of Eastport, commanding the regiment, would like to see all his companies hard at work on the range, for he is an old rifleman and fully appreciates the importance of this branch of the modern soldier's training.

Company A, Gardiner—The preliminary work of this company was well carried out, Sergt. H. S. Peacock, the company inspector, working hard to get a large number of the men onto the range. In this he was very successful, but the failure to commence qualification earlier in the season cost the company quite a little in its target standing. It is very difficult to get out the

men in the latter part of the season when the weather is uncertain and the days short. The company has one of the best small ranges in the State, built last year under the personal direction of Capt. F. B. Thompson. The qualifications show that one member of the company qualified as a distinguished sharpshooter; one as a sharpshooter; one as a firstclass marksman; and eighteen as marksmen.

Company B, Lewiston—To a good season's work in 1901 has been added another year's excellent work under Capt. C. J. Kelleher and First Lieut. Wm. H. Matthews, the latter being the company inspector of rifle practice. There is an increased expenditure in ammunition, the figures being 6,290 for this year, as against 5,190 for 1901. The season's work was conducted with regularity and qualifications were at all times looked after. The list shows that four men qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; eight as first-class marksmen; and twenty-seven as marksmen.

Company C, Bath—This company has well redeemed its promise of better work in 1902. In 1901 the company expended 2,970 rounds of ammunition; in 1902, 4,290. In 1901 four men qualified as first-class marksmen and nine as marksmen; in 1902, one man qualified as a sharpshooter; two men as first-class marksmen; and twenty-nine as marksmen. In 1901 Company C's team was ninth in the encampment match with a score of 151; in 1902, the team took third prize with a score of 185, which was but four points below the winning score. The season's work has been conducted with good judgment and next year should carry a large number of the company into the higher grades of qualification.

Company D, Lewiston—Under the direction of First Lieut. F. H. Greenan, this organization has again put in a worthy season's work at the targets. The company has an increasing number of good marksmen and their example furnishes an incentive to the newer men so that the average is on an ascending scale. Lieut. Greenan succeeded in qualifying all but four members of the company, and those four were discharged, so that Company D may be classed as thoroughly effective. The returns of qualification show that five members of the company qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; two as sharpshooters; eight as first-class marksmen; and twenty-seven as marksmen.

Company E, Skowhegan—The work of this company has been entirely unsatisfactory in respect to small arms practice. According to the cards but few of the company have been on the range and nothing like systematic practice has been carried out. A change was made in company inspectors during the season, but the change appears to have been productive of but little good. The company cannot well drop to a lower level in range work, and this is about all there is to encourage hope for better results another season. But 740 rounds of ammunition were expended this year, as against 1,612 rounds last year.

Company F, Dover—This company has done a fair amount of work on the range this year but furnishes another illustration of the evil of leaving qualification till the close of the season. Had the men been qualified in small numbers during the summer, the showing of the company would have been among the best; but the work was put off till the close of the season and it was then impossible to get any considerable number out on the range. Second Lieut. H. W. Warren, who has been inspector of rifle practice during the year is one of the best riflemen in the Guard, but his work has prevented him from devoting much time to the men of the company. Capt. Walter J. Mayo has given a great deal of personal attention to the range and the coming year will be assisted as inspector by Sergt. S. E. Coburn, a man who is capable and faithful to a degree. A new range has been established during the season, within easy reach of the armory, and the old disadvantage of shooting across a river is obviated. The company made an excellent showing in the encampment matches, three first prizes being won by members of the company and in the championship match, out of the five high scores, four were made by members of Company F. Three men qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; two as sharpshooters; one as a first-class marksman; and five as marksmen.

Company G, Bangor—The Queen City representatives of the National Guard have done credit to themselves and their regiment by the enthusiasm with which they have taken up small arms practice. The company is under new leadership and is working faithfully. The city has provided a new range as convenient as possible to the armory and thanks to the strenuous energy of Capt. H. M. Smith, and Second Lieut. W. E. Sweeney,



the range was completed in time for use the latter part of the season. The first shooting on the range was done September 17th, though the work of construction was not wholly completed till September 28th. The company has expended over 8,000 rounds of ammunition, a large part of it since the completion of the new range. Six men qualified as sharpshooters; four as first-class marksmen; and eight as marksmen. Capt. Smith and Lieut. Sweeney have been unremitting in their efforts and the company should make a brilliant record another year.

Company H, Waterville—The appointment of now Second Lieut. Wm. I. Sterling as inspector of rifle practice has proven a most excellent thing for the company. Few men in the Guard have ever taken more interest in their work than Lieut. Sterling. He has labored early and late and under his leadership an immense amount of powder has been burned. The cards show that over 19,000 rounds of ammunition was expended during the season, and while such an expenditure is not always productive of the highest results it is unquestionable proof of interest and hard work on the part of the company. The returns show that nine members of the company qualified as distinguished sharpshooters; two as sharpshooters; two as first-class marksmen; and thirty-one as marksmen.

Company I, Eastport—There has been much improvement in range work by this company the past season. The expenditure of ammunition shows a large increase over the last year and if qualification was attended to in the earlier part of the season, when a majority of the men have more time for practice, the list of qualifications might be a long one. Nine qualified as marksmen.

Company K, Farmington—But one company in the Guard has expended more ammunition the past season than Company K. Capt. George McL. Presson and Sergt. F. W. Lawry, his inspector of rifle practice, have been at the range early and late, taking the men there for practice in convenient squads. Nearly all the practice of the company was done at the 200-yard range, but another season the long ranges will be in almost constant use. Capt. Presson has worked to make the average man of his company a fair shot, rather than develop a few sharpshooters. The return of qualification is extremely unsatisfactory, but thirteen

men qualifying as marksmen, but Capt. Presson promises that another year the company will redeem itself on qualification—and Capt. Presson is a man who keeps his word.

Company L, Houlton—This company has not expended so much ammunition this year as last, but the matter of qualification has not been neglected. Last year none of the company qualified, but this year two qualified as distinguished sharpshooters and twenty-one as marksmen, a number of them with scores which indicate that but little effort would be required to make them first-class marksmen or sharpshooters.

Company M, Machias—In last year's report I expressed the hope that the new order of things in this company would result in better work on the range. I regret to say that the improvement has been so slight as to be almost imperceptible. In the season of 1901 the company expended 373 rounds of ammunition, qualifying seven men as marksmen. This year the expenditure of ammunition was 425 rounds and one member of the company qualified as a first-class marksman. The cards show that ten members of the company were on the range during the season. Of these ten, three fired ten shots apiece; three fired twenty shots apiece; one fired forty; one, fifty; one, seventy; and one, one hundred eighty. The latter qualified as a first-class marksman. When only ten men out of a company do any range work whatever, and only four out of that ten fire more than twenty shots during the season, an organization cannot be surprised if it finds itself at the foot of the ladder.

#### SIGNAL CORPS.

The work of the year in the Signal Corps has been of an encouraging nature and I am assured that the start made this year will be followed by more and better work the coming season. Under the lead of Second Lieut. W. D. Floyd small arms practice will be kept up. Lieut. Floyd has had charge of the corps' carbine practice for some time and will see to it that his inspector keeps the men at work. The expenditure of ammunition is much in excess of last season and has been used to good advantage. The return of qualification practice shows one distinguished sharpshooter; five first-class marksmen; and four marksmen.

FIRST DIVISION, NAVAL RESERVE.

During the season this division has had a change of inspectors of small arms practice and Lieut. (J. G.) George R. Stevens now has charge of work at the range. He is an officer who carries enthusiasm into his work and will bring the Reserve to a standard in marksmanship which will not be below the high standard the division has attained in other branches of military work. The division has expended 2,535 rounds of rifle ammunition, as against 748 for last year. One member qualified as a first-class marksman and fifteen as marksmen.

## AT THE DIFFERENT RANGES.

The subjoined tabulation shows the expenditure of ammunition at each range and fully demonstrates the necessity which I have so often urged for more practice at the longer ranges. In these days of high power rifles no organization can expect to be classed as effective which cannot be counted upon for accurate work beyond two hundred yards. I regret to say that in the light of the expenditure of ammunition beyond two hundred yards, the qualification in some organizations of so many sharpshooters and distinguished sharpshooters savors almost of the miraculous. That men have been able to make the necessary preliminary and qualification scores with so little ammunition at the longer ranges is almost beyond credence. And yet, each qualification score has borne the certification on a commissioned officer's honor, that the scores were made as returned to this office. But the figures will tell their own story to those who are interested in the question:

REVOLVER QUALIFICATION.

I have done all that I could to foster revolver shooting among the commissioned officers of the Guard and it is pleasing to find when the returns are all in that the season's work is by far the best in the history of the National Guard of Maine. Early in the season the rules governing revolver qualification were changed and the year's work shows the change to have been beneficial. In the First Infantry thirty-two officers qualified with the revolver; in the Second Infantry, twenty officers qualified. This makes fifty-two officers in the two regiments to which may be added three from the staff of the Commander-in-Chief and one from the First Division, Naval Reserve, making a total of fifty-six for the whole Guard. In 1901 thirty-six officers qualified with the revolver; in 1900, eleven; in 1899, two; in 1897, fifteen. These figures, running back to the palmy days of small arms practice before the Spanish war, show the growth of interest in revolver marksmanship. Of the fifty-six who qualified this season, twelve are marksmen, twenty-eight are experts and sixteen are distinguished marksmen. This indicates good progress and gives promise that one year from now there will be a still greater percentage of officers in the National Guard of Maine who know how to use the military service revolver with precision.

## NEW RIFLE RANGES.

There is a great gain for the year in the matter of rifle ranges. Most notable of all is the city of Portland range, completed shortly before encampment. In 1901 the city appropriated \$1,200 for the construction of a range, but an available site was not secured and the appropriation lapsed. In 1902 efforts were again put forward and an appropriation of \$1,500 was secured, this amount to be expended under the direction of a committee consisting of Alderman Edward A. Shaw, Councilman Percy H. Richardson and Councilman Walter H. Lyseth. First Lieut. John J. Dooley, inspector of rifle practice for the First Infantry, together with other Portland officers, co-operated with this committee and at length secured a site on the Shattuck farm in East Deering. After the site was secured, Councilman Richardson for the city and Lieut. Dooley for the Guard went to work on the details of the range construction. They did their work thoroughly and since Mr. Richardson is a skilled civil engineer and Mr. Dooley an experienced rifleman they were eminently fitted for the task. The range was constructed under the personal direction of Mr. George N. Fernald, commissioner of public works for the city of Portland, who was painstaking in his work and accomplished good results. The range furnishes four targets at two hundred yards and two targets at five hundred and six hundred yards. The range is so constructed that simultaneous practice may be had at two hundred and five hundred or six hundred yards, though but one of the latter ranges can be used at a time. The range is but ten-minutes' ride on the electric from city hall, being inside the five-cent fare limit. The range is constructed in such a manner that it should cost the city little in the way of repairs, after a few more necessary details are looked after the coming year.

The city of Bangor has constructed a new range for Company G, and the members of that organization are now afforded an excellent opportunity for practice at two hundred, five hundred and six hundred yards. Capt. H. M. Smith and Lieut. W. E. Sweeney labored hard to get the range completed in time for practice this fall and in this they were successful. The range is not far from the company armory, as ranges go, and has been in almost constant use since its completion.

The town of Dover has provided a new range for Company F, permitting practice at two hundred, three hundred and five hundred yards. The range is equipped with the most approved target frames, built on the Sea Girt model, and is within a very short distance of the armory.

The range maintained by the cities of Lewiston and Auburn, in the latter city, is not equal to the pressure of four companies, and the city of Lewiston should at once provide a range for Company I of the First Infantry and Companies B and D of the Second Infantry. I am informed that a suitable site has been found upon which a range could be constructed with a comparatively small outlay of money.

#### COMPANY INSPECTORS OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

The company inspectors of rifle practice deserve honorable mention in a report of this character, though the position which they hold is wholly unofficial. Their duties are assigned by detail, but so much depends upon the faithful discharge of that detail that company commanders should exercise particular care in their selection. In most cases the company commanders realize the importance of this, but there are instances where a company commander makes the detail for the purpose of rewarding some member of his company, and without due consideration as to the fitness of that man for the place. There are some company inspectors to-day who are good riflemen and desirous of bringing up the standard of their companies, yet they have not the time to devote to range work and the companies are retrograding in consequence. Company commanders should at once make a new detail when it becomes apparent that the company inspector is not giving the time which the work demands. The successful company inspectors are those who are willing to do a large amount of hard work and find their reward in the standing which the company takes in small arms practice. The company inspectors now serving in the National Guard of Maine are :

In compliance with General Orders No. 21, State of Maine, A. G. O., c. s., competitive rifle, carbine and revolver matches were held during the encampment of the Guard at Camp Hill, Augusta, Me., August 12th to August 22d. Several changes were made from the program of the last few years, the Inter-Regimental Rifle Match being revived and a Carbine Match, open to members of the Signal Corps, added. These changes resulted in increased interest and the average shooting was in most cases above that of recent years. The generous interest in small arms practice which the Commander-in-Chief, the Hon. John Fremont Hill of Augusta, made manifest by offering handsome loving cups as prizes in the company team matches greatly stimulated the effort put forth in the preliminary training of the teams. It gives me especial pleasure at this time to officially announce that the Commander-in-Chief has renewed his generous offer, so that another series of trophies will be offered as prizes in the coming year's company team matches. The encampment prizes were awarded as follows:

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

There are several matters which I wish at this time to bring to your attention, believing that changes along the lines suggested will prove beneficial to the Guard.

#### A STATE RIFLE ENCAMPMENT.

I am convinced that there should be a change made in the time of holding small arms competitions so that they will not interfere with the work of encampment. The brevity of the 1902 encampment served to bring out with unusual emphasis the point I have just made, range work being almost incessant. Regimental commanders have been quietly protesting, year after year, against the policy of holding rifle matches at encampment, alleging that the presence of so many officers and men at the range leaves hardly troops enough in camp for company and battalion drill. While this loss of men for drill was serious in a

seven-day's encampment, it became acute when the encampment was shortened to five days. In order to hold the usual number of matches it became necessary to have details at the range nearly all the time, and the regiments found themselves sadly crippled when drill call sounded. That no friction ensued, I have to thank the forbearance of the colonels commanding who appreciated the situation and allowed the men the time necessary for the competitions, regardless of decimated ranks at drill. Company commanders are inclined to favor men who are to shoot for the honor of the company, making things easy for them in the way of detail and duty, and thus the efficiency of the regiment is impaired. Officers of long service in the Guard know to what extremes this coddling of riflemen is carried and how subversive of discipline it sometimes proves at encampment. If the attendance at the range was confined wholly to those competing the loss of men for drill would not be so great, but each competition finds a large number of men in uniform watching the match—officers and men who are not competing but who have been excused on one plea or another in order to visit the range. In this year's matches, as in previous years, every effort was made to see that the men were kept on the range no longer than was absolutely necessary. Yet the loss of time for encampment work was great and regimental officers had excellent grounds for protest.

The foregoing is one reason for a change, the reason which appeals to those officers who believe that encampment is intended as a season of tactical instruction and field manoeuvring, rather than a State general rifle competition. The argument which I have just outlined is the argument of this class, but there is another equally strong argument and this comes from the riflemen themselves. Riflemen cannot do themselves justice during encampment. Many whose duty detains them up to the hour of starting a match, arrive at the range tired and nervous and in no condition to do their best shooting. Incidental to camp, there are so many opportunities for men to get out of condition that the average is apt to be perceptibly lowered. Most riflemen learn early in the work that they must turn down their glasses if they are to do good shooting, and the majority of them observe this caution prior to the matches at encampment, but in the nov-

elty and excitement of coming into camp men are almost certain to smoke more, eat more, or keep later hours—even if they do not drink. And so the careful training of many weeks at home is lost.

For the reasons given, I respectfully recommend that the coming season the company team rifle matches and the inter-regimental match be held on the Augusta range during the week preceding the beginning of encampment, and that the individual championship of the National Guard be settled by the highest score made in the inter-regimental match.

It will require a two-days' encampment and the number of officers and men in attendance will approximate 200. The first day would be devoted to the company team matches, the teams being made up of seven men, commissioned officers being allowed to compete; each man to fire seven shots at 200 yards; with two sighting shots if desired; each team to be allowed one substitute. The following day would be devoted to the inter-regimental match open to a team of fifteen men from each regiment, two substitutes being allowed; each man to fire ten shots at 200, 300 and 500 yards, with two sighting shots at each range if desired, teams to be made up not later than 8 P. M. on the evening preceding the match, the competitor making the highest aggregate score to be awarded the medal for the individual championship of the National Guard.

The men who are to compete in the company team matches should reach Augusta the evening preceding the match, so as to be present at the drawing for targets at the opening of the match. The match will be concluded so that a majority of the teams can start for home on the afternoon trains of that day, thus leaving less than fifty officers and men in camp on the second day of the meet.

I recommend that officers and men be allowed transportation, quarters and subsistence and pay for two days' service, and that the colonel and the inspector of rifle practice or acting inspector of rifle practice, of each regiment be detailed to attend the encampment. I would further recommend the detail of a medical officer to attend the encampment, together with such other officers and men as seem warranted.

Below I submit estimates of the cost of such an encampment as I have outlined.

In the event of a brigade encampment of the troops, the rifle encampment might be held on the two days immediately preceding the arrival of the troops, thereby eliminating the entire cost of transportation, as an extra item of draft on the militia fund.

By holding the company team and inter-regimental matches at a special encampment, there will be left for the general encampment of the troops but three matches, the company inspectors' match, the officers' rifle match and the revolver match, and these can be so arranged that they will not interfere with the routine of camp. The company inspectors' match takes but one member from each company, and that but for a few hours. One day would be designated for the officers' rifle match, the range being kept open continuously between certain hours, so that the officers might choose such time during the day as would cause the least interference with their camp duties. The revolver match would be conducted in the same manner. At other times during the encampment the range would be at the disposal of company commanders who desired to qualify certain men of their companies during the off hours between drill, thus affording an opportunity for instructing men who have not found time for range work prior to entering camp.

I think the plan for a special encampment for rifle shooting on these lines will meet the approval of the Guard and I earnestly recommend that it be put into effect the coming season.

#### INCREASED ISSUE OF AMMUNITION.

Under the present system, much labor falls on the inspectors of rifle practice in the companies that do a large amount of target practice, for it is necessary to reload all ammunition beyond the 2,000 rounds of fixed ammunition which is issued to each company. The State furnishes 3,000 bullets and primers and

reimburses the companies for reloading that number of shells at the rate of \$2.50 per thousand, a sum which leaves a very small margin beyond the price of the powder used.

Much practice is lost because there does not happen to be any ammunition ready for use. A squad of men will inform the company inspector that they can go to the range on the following day but it will be found that there is no ammunition reloaded, so that day's practice is lost. It may be weeks before those men will have another opportunity to go to the range, and it is quite within the possibilities that they will again find the ammunition exhausted. Company commanders and company inspectors will unite in saying that a great deal of practice is lost in the run of a season from this cause.

There are two ways to obviate this difficulty. One is the payment to company inspectors of a sum sufficient to warrant company commanders in requiring them to put in the time necessary to keep a sufficient amount of reloaded ammunition on hand. This has been repeatedly urged in the past but the adjutants-general have held that the State cannot afford to do this, and that it would open the doors to claims for payment for all kinds of special duty. The other way is the issue of a larger amount of fixed ammunition to each company. An increased issue of ammunition will entail no drain on the military fund of the State, since ammunition is drawn on the allotment to the State from the national government, provided in Section sixteen hundred sixty-one, R. S., U. S., as amended.

If the Dick bill to re-organize the militia becomes law the State will be obliged to issue fixed ammunition for the .30 caliber U. S. magazine rifles which will be provided, and the plan to issue a larger amount of fixed ammunition for the .45 caliber Springfield rifle is but a step in that direction.

I respectfully recommend the issue to each company of infantry and each division of Naval Reserve of five thousand rounds of fixed rifle ammunition, to which shall be added two thousand bullets and primers, on requisition, when it shall be shown by the score cards returned to the inspector general of rifle practice that the company or division making the requisition has expended four thousand rounds, but that no reimbursement for powder be allowed. The added issue of bullets and primers will accommodate the companies which wish to do more than the average

amount of practice. and by making it available after the expenditure of four thousand rounds gives that company a thousand rounds of fixed ammunition for completing its qualification practice at the conclusion of the season. Under the plan proposed the State should require an exact accounting for all ammunition and from each season's issue should be deducted the amount unaccounted for the previous season.

There are comparatively few companies which will avail themselves of the extra issue of bullets and primers and not all companies will use the entire issue of fixed ammunition, so that figures showing the maximum cost under the plan suggested will prove far in excess of the actual cost if the plan be adopted. I submit below estimates of the maximum cost of ammunition under the present plan and under the proposed plan, so far as it effects the allotment from the national government. Under the present plan the maximum cash reimbursement for powder for twenty-four companies of infantry and one division of Naval Reserve, or twenty-five companies, would be \$187.50. This would be saved under the proposed plan, though there would be in offset an increased express charge in sending out the ammunition. The following estimates are based on the prices as given in G. O. No. 11, A. G. O., State of Maine, series of 1901, and show the maximum expense under both the present and the proposed systems :

In view of the recent increase in the allotment to the several states from the national government, it does not seem too much to ask that this increase for the encouragement of small arms practice be allowed.

**REPORT OF CAPT. S. A. CLOMAN, 23d INF.. U. S. A.,  
INSPECTOR.**

PLATTSBURG BARRACKS, N. Y., December 23, 1902.

*To the Officer in charge of Military Information Division, Adjutant-General's Office, Washington, D. C.:*

SIR—I have the honor to state that I attended the camp of the National Guard of the State of Maine, from August 12th to August 22d, 1902, as required by par. 8, S. O. 173, c. s., Headquarters Department of the East, and submit the following report embodying my observations and recommendations.

1. Official designation of State Troops: National Guard of the State of Maine.
2. Strength: (a) Authorized; (b) Organized; (c) Per cent attending camp; (d) Liable to military duty.

(a) The authorized strength of the land forces is as follows:

Non-commissioned Staff to consist of: 1 Sergeant Major, 1 Quartermaster Sergeant, 1 Commissary Sergeant, 1 Hospital Steward, 1 Trumpeter and 2 Color-bearers who shall be Sergeants, and 3 Battalion Sergeant Majors, who shall be senior to and have the pay of First Sergeants.

Field Officers are elected by the written votes of the company officers, subject to examination and approval, while regimental staff and non-commissioned staff are appointed by the regimental commanders.

6. Company Officers: How selected and appointed. Any examination required.

Elected by the written votes of the members of the company, subject to examination and approval.

7. Staff Departments: Adjutant General, duties of. Medical department, duties of. Other Staff Corps, duties of.

The duties of each corps are indicated by its name. They are described at length in the Maine Militia Law of 1901.

8. Ambulance Corps and Hospital Corps: Organization, equipment and efficiency.

Organization of Ambulance Corps given above. No Hospital Corps but regimental surgeons and stewards, who during the camp worked in conjunction with the Ambulance Corps. The hospital is a permanent frame building on the camp ground, large enough for a dispensary, operating room and about a dozen beds. The equipment consisted of one ambulance, five litters and the usual first-aid appliances.

The Ambulance Corps was well instructed in litter bearer drill, first-aid and nursing.

9. Signal Corps: Organization, equipment and efficiency.

Organized as above.

Equipment: Signal flags, lanterns, 1 heliograph, and 1 cable cart, with 600 yards of insulated wire with 2 telegraph and 2 telephone instruments.

The members of the Corps seemed much interested in their work and sixteen men were able to send messages in all the different methods with speed and accuracy.

Both the Morse and the Myers Code were used in visual signalling and there were six expert telegraph operators in the corps. Four recent recruits were still quite ignorant of their duties. Work is kept up throughout the year in the Portland Armory, including telegraphy. The discipline of this corps was notably good. Several of the members, including the commanding officers, were at Santiago or Manila. The arms are Springfield carbines.

10. Regular Army Officer attached to Headquarters:

None.

11. Military or Advisory Board:

None.

12. Encampment, etc.;

Regimental; on ground owned by the State.

First Regiment from August 12th to August 16th; Second Regiment from August 18th to 22d; Signal Corps with the First Regiment, and the Ambulance Corps, 12 men with the First Regiment and 12 men with the Second Regiment. There were no regular troops present at the encampment.

The State is to be congratulated on its camp ground. Some years ago a rolling plateau on the outskirts of the State Capital was wisely purchased for this purpose. It is about one mile from the railroad station, is passed by the electric cars, the soil is hard and gravelly and the ground just diversified enough to make a proper exercise ground. A healthier location cannot be imagined, and an artesian well or extension of the city water system is all that is needed to make a model camp ground. There is located a large storehouse, a target range, permanent kitchens, mess houses and latrines for each organization in the Guard; and also a hospital, and a building for quarters for the commander-in-chief and his staff. These buildings are frame and while inexpensive are most clev-

erly designed for their different uses. The impression given by these arrangements is that the National Guard of Maine has had the best thought and care of good men for years.

13. Mobilization, etc.:

(a) and (b) A glance at the railroad map on which is marked the stations of the different organizations will show that the railroad centers are also the centers of density of the Guard, and would be the natural points of concentration.

(c) I should judge that 90% of the strength of the Guard could be mobilized at any point in the State within forty-eight hours of the first notice.

(d) No plans for emergency except the usual telephone and messenger service and signals agreed upon.

(e) I judge that 90% of the Guard would turn out for 60 days' service.

14. State Appropriation:

\$33,669 for last year.

15. National Appropriation:

\$12,743.08 last year.

16. Armament: Cavalry, Artillery and Infantry; Character and Condition of.

Cavalry: 15 Springfield carbines, cal. .45, in hands of Signal Corps.

Artillery: 100 sabres and 2 Gatling guns, one being kept at the permanent camp ground and one in the Portland Armory.

Infantry: 1246 Springfield rifles, cal. .45, rod bayonets, model 1894; 200 model 1873; 100 new Springfield rifles are kept stored at Springfield Arsenal.

17. Equipment, etc.:

Six hundred thirty-four blanket bags in store, also sufficient tentage, (Sibleys for enlisted men and wall tents for officers), meat cans, woven cartridge belts, axes, shovels, canteens and shelter halves.

18. Uniform, clothing, etc.:

Khaki clothing and campaign hats and leggins are now used for camps and marches, the khaki having the U. S. button instead of the State. The uniform is

in general well made and serviceable. Blankets are similar to those used by the regular army.

19. Horses owned or hired :

None owned by the State.

20. Ammunition :

- (a) Character and amount of actually in the hands of the troops.
- (b) Amount that could be supplied on arrival at point of concentration.
- (a) 1000 rounds of cal. .45 in hands of each company and each company has a reloading outfit.
- (b) 135,580 rounds of rifle ammunition; 37,000 rounds of carbine ammunition; 50,000 rounds of revolver ammunition.

21. Camp and Garrison Equipage :

- (a) Tentage, etc.
- (b) Mess outfits.
- (a) A full supply of comparatively new tentage.
- (b) Each organization has a permanent cook-house supplied with range and utensils, on the camp ground. Besides these there are enough buzzacott ovens to supply one regiment.

22. Property Accountability, etc. :

The system in use is very simple and well adapted to the National Guard. Receipts are taken for all property from a commissioned officer, who thereafter renders a semi-annual return for it, but one return for all kinds of property. Condemned property is turned in to the Quartermaster General and not destroyed.

23. Rations, etc. :

The ration was ample and well cooked. The U. S. Army ration is taken as a basis for calculation, but owing to the fact that the men arrive hungry and many are not accustomed to open air life, these amounts are exceeded slightly. Supplies are contracted for, inspected and issued to organizations by the Commissary General, assisted by the regimental commissaries, and this department was notably efficient. Two cooks are hired for each company and although I made frequent inspections during meal hours, I never found anything to criticize nor

did I hear a single complaint about the food. As the Maine Guard contains many men in the ranks from upper walks of life who are accustomed to excellent food, this was a deserved recognition of the hard work and efficiency of the Commissary General and his assistants and of the excellence of the system throughout.

24. Pay and Allowances:

See Maine Militia Law, 1901.

25. (a) Stores, purchase of.

(b) Amount required in addition to those on hand to enable the command to take the field for sixty days.

(c) Medical supplies.

(a) Purchased in open market by heads of departments.

(b) and (c) See report of Adjutant General, State of Maine, for 1897.

26. Drills and Ceremonies.

(a) Number and nature of.

(b) Proficiency in.

(c) Field exercises.

(a) The law requires at least one drill per month, but nearly all the organizations meet and drill weekly. Most of the drills are by company as but one complete battalion in the State is located in any one place (Portland). Very little extended order is had.

The encampment this year was too short for any extended scheme of instruction. Each organization had but five days and the first and last days were spent en route. However, it was a matter of a little being better than nothing at all, and every moment possible was utilized to advantage. I enclose list of calls with this report, showing the long working hours, and when one remembers the continuous instruction in guard duty, the office work, and the camp fatigue and police, he cannot withhold his admiration that men will spend their one yearly vacation at this encampment for the purpose of perfecting themselves in their duties. Most of the drills were by companies and battalions, and the ceremonies were regimental.

(b) Further comments will be made on these under the head of "Remarks."

(c) No field exercises were held.

27. Personnel and Discipline:

In physique the Maine Guard is about on par with the regular service. It is composed for the greater part of bright young Americans, but in a few cases I noted men of French extraction whose knowledge of the English language was so limited that they were unable to receive or transmit orders intelligently. These men should never have been mustered into the service. The discipline was remarkably good. During the entire encampment, I noted but two drunken men and there was but one man confined in the guard house. When the number of men is considered, with the fact that they were on their vacation and free from all the usual home ties, this is a remarkable showing. The most striking thing about the Guard, is the eagerness of all ranks to acquire military knowledge. All the ceremonies and courtesies of military life were practiced. There were many faults noted of a minor nature among both officers and men, such as missing drill without authority, incomplete or mixed uniforms, etc., but the general tone was excellent and faults were corrected with the greatest alacrity and good nature when attention was called to them.

28. Theoretical Instruction:

The law requires two hours theoretical instruction per month for all company officers and non-commissioned officers, and also that the officers of each regiment shall be assembled twice a year for this purpose. This law is not obeyed to the letter, and the instruction given is generally indefinite in quantity and quality. Hence instead of officers and men coming to camp knowing the theory of guard duty and battalion drill, much time had to be spent in instruction on the subject that should have been given in the armories.

In camp, instruction was given as opportunity offered, in guard duty, drill regulations and the customs of the service, but time was so limited that nothing extensive could be attempted.

## 29. Guard Duty, etc. :

I cannot say that guard duty was well performed, but as in other matters, the desire to learn was so strong that it was a pleasure to give instruction and do what was possible in such limited time to direct the efforts into proper channels. There was no interfering with sentries, and their dignity was upheld and orders obeyed by both officers and men; but being mostly recruits, they were as a rule ignorant of their duties and were inclined to become easily confused.

Instruction should be given at the armories so that officers and men may come to the camp letter perfect in their orders. The practice will then mean something to them and it will be a pleasure to apply the principle they have learned.

## 30. Target Practice, etc. :

Great interest is taken in this and the Guard contains a high percentage of fine shots. Little instruction is given in aiming and pointing drills and in gallery practice, but there is much known distance firing all the year round by all organizations, and individual and team matches keep up the interest. Each company draws 2000 rounds of fixed ammunition and 3000 bullets and primers, with funds to purchase the necessary powder for reloading, but much more ammunition is bought from private and company funds. The Signal Corps receives 1000 rounds of carbine ammunition per year. There is but little practice in skirmish or volley work.

During the encampment there were regular individual and team matches under immediate direction of the Inspector General of Rifle Practice, and the work was carried on in a most businesslike way. The matches were close in every case and excellent scores were made. The Commander-in-Chief encourages this important part of a soldier's education by offering handsome cups and other objects as prizes.

## 32. Military Code, etc. :

Code is dated 1901.



## 33. Regulations ; Nature and date of :

Dated 1898. A valuable work for any military man to have containing concise instructions on all matters of ceremony, correspondence, customs of the service and the duties of soldiers of all ranks, branches and departments. A revision, say once every ten years, will serve to keep this what it is now—a most complete guide for the National Guardsman.

## 34. Maps ; Scales and Character :

Maine being an old and important coast state has been fully and accurately surveyed and mapped. Maps are kept at the State House and may be obtained from the various publishing houses.

Some practise has been had in road sketching by some of the officers and I have a most creditable map of the march of the Farmington Company from that place to the camp ground at Augusta, made by a Lieutenant of that company.

## 35. Armories ; Location and Description :

Each town provides an armory for its own troops, receiving from the State not more than \$100.00 per year for each organization. Portland owns the armory, the other towns rent them.

## 36. Arsenals ; Location and Description :

The State owns some old wooden buildings near Bangor, but all property not issued is stored in a large frame building erected for that purpose on the camp ground at Augusta.

## 37. Independent Commands :

None.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

## 1. That the Guard be equipped with Krag-Jorgensen rifles, cal. .30, without delay.

It is absurd to teach the use of a weapon that will be discarded at once in time of war. While the general principles of target practice, drill, and care of the piece are the same, still the knowledge that they are working with weapons that they will not use in action is but poor encouragement for proficiency. Furthermore the fact that they have been furnished with rifles that have been

discarded by the regular forces of our country and every other, is inclined to give the men a poor opinion of their own dignity and importance and without this proper pride there can be no perfection.

2. That an organization of the regular forces be sent to each encampment, notice being given as far ahead as possible so that the officers and non-commissioned officers of the same may prepare themselves for their duties as instructors.
3. That sufficient appropriations be made by the State to justify a yearly encampment of not less than two weeks for all troops.
4. That a system of theoretical instruction be established in the Guard that will carry out the law and bring officers and men to the encampment fitted to begin the practical work without loss of time.
5. That the regulations be rigidly enforced against officers and men who absent themselves from duty without authority, and in other ways show that they have not the proper spirit and pride in their work. Nothing is so "catching" as this carelessness, and the sooner such men be forced out of the service the better.
6. I noted a vast difference in officers of the same rank. A few, and I am glad to say a very few, did not seem to have a genuine interest in their work but were in the guard for other reasons that I could not fathom.

Such an organization as the National Guard of Maine should relentlessly purge itself of this dead wood. If poor officers and men remain on the same plane as good ones, there is no incentive to work. One of the duties of the Inspector General's Department is to report, impartially the good and the bad so that proper action may be taken, and with the present fearless and accomplished Inspector General, I have no doubt this will be done. Likewise commendation should be freely and publicly bestowed when deserved, and in this and in other ways a gulf created between the deserving and the undeserving that will either force the latter to change or get out of the service. Healthy rivalry is necessary here as in other matters of life.

## REMARKS.

During the encampment at Augusta I acted as Inspector and Instructor and proper notification was issued to the troops by the Commander-in-Chief. The ten days I was in camp I noted no flagrant breach of regulations or discipline. It was a quiet, orderly camp where all seemed to desire to learn as much as possible. However there were a number of small irregularities that were most noticeable, and while they were corrected on the spot I will mention them here in the hope that this report may be read by many of the guard and at future encampments there will be no necessity for criticism.

Firstly; irregularities in the uniform. Every man in the guard knows what the proper uniform is as well as I do, but men would appear with khaki blouse, blue trousers, civilian coats and khaki trousers, blue caps with khaki clothing, sometimes no leggins and various other combinations, and the climax was capped by an officer appearing with his khaki trousers stuffed in a pair of rubber boots. I noted nearly twenty cases of this, and wonderful to relate, about one-half were officers. For the latter I can propose no explanation except that they thought more latitude is allowed a man after he gets a commission, which is anything but true. One man in this nondescript garb of course ruined the appearance of a whole company. I also noted that four officers, who had been in the volunteer artillery during the Spanish-American War, still wore that insignia and facings without authority and with a general effect almost equal to the above. Furthermore I noted that some of these irregularities were by fine, hard-working officers, who did not seem to realize that they were thus by a little personal carelessness giving their commands the first black mark. I am happy to say that this was nearly all corrected before the end of the camp and the troops presented a very regular appearance when they marched away.

Officers and non-commissioned officers were very careless at first about the volume and inflection of the voice while giving commands. The method that produces the best results is given in Drill Regulations, and there was very great improvement in this respect after their attention had been called to it.

Many men and a few officers absented themselves from drill without authority, and there was no determined action taken to stop this practice and punish the offenders.

Holding the exciting competitions during drill hours sometimes drew so many competitors and spectators away from their commands that the drill was almost useless. These shoots should not be held during the two main drill hours of the day.

The rifles were not properly cleaned as a rule. The men need careful instruction in how to get their rifles clean and keep them so.

Many guides came to the camp very ignorant of their duties as such, and much time was spent in correcting and instructing them. A few evenings together going over the different movements with the aid of blocks or diagrams would change all this.

Some officers while giving their commands properly did not make corrections or explain the movements on the field at once. This led to some elements making the same errors time after time.

These small irregularities are mentioned here for one purpose—the good of the Maine Guard which is now very near my heart. And on the other hand there is so much to be said of the courtesy, intelligence, and hard work of the officers and men that the criticisms seem almost petty. Ceremonies were as a rule nearly faultless; the organization is compact and disciplined; and the spirit that animates it cannot be surpassed. The officers were not only soldiers but also gentlemen who practiced all the social amenities of life, and who by their courtesy and patience made service with them a pleasure. Among the men there was not one case of rowdyism reported nor were either people or property in the neighborhood disturbed in the slightest degree. It was only in the small matters noted above that any improvement could have been possible.

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In closing I wish to thank His Excellency Governor Hill, Adjutant-General Farnham and the officers and men of the Guard for their unfailing courtesy and kindness to me during my tour of duty with them.

### REPORT OF THE CRUISE OF THE NAVAL RESERVE.

---

PORTLAND, August 20, 1902.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith a report upon the annual cruise of the First Division Naval Reserve on the U. S. S. Montgomery from August 9th to 16th inclusive, together with some recommendations pertaining to this division.

The third annual cruise of this division was in my opinion the most beneficial and in many respects the most successful that has yet been made. A third of the men of the division have now made three of these cruises, and the progress that they have made is truly remarkable. Many of these men have been familiar with the sea a greater part of their lives, but do not come under the class designation of "sea faring" men. They are recruited from those who have a natural fondness for the water, for yachting and whose knowledge of small boats cannot be excelled. On this, their third cruise, these men plainly showed the effects of their previous training and instruction, and were as much at home on board the Montgomery as any of her crew. In fact, as the ship had but recently been put into commission and many of her men were landsmen recently enlisted, the naval reserves were found by the officers of the Montgomery to be reliable men, and they were called on for all kinds of duty and trusted in the performance of it. It frequently happened that the more experienced of our men were taken to be regulars, and were selected in preference to regulars to perform duty aloft and in other parts of the ship.

Until the Naval Reserve went on board the Montgomery, the ship's crew had never been drilled in any of the duties of the ship as a ship's crew. The officers had been so much occupied

in getting their vessel ready for sea, that they were not able to exercise the men at any of the drills, and for some of the drills the men had not even been given their stations.

Our men found themselves on a newly commissioned ship where the officers and men were not familiar with their vessel, and had not attained that proficiency that is to be found on a vessel after a few months at sea. In consequence of this the Maine men were under the same conditions as they would be were they called into actual service on the sudden outbreak of war. While their new stations were unfamiliar to them, so were those of the regulars and so there was no distinction made. Our men did not wait to follow the others when orders were given, but often led in the execution of orders. This was remarked upon by the officers of the ship and excited much favorable comment.

As for the officers of the division, they found themselves placed in exactly the same position as they would be in time of actual war and a sudden call into service. Lieutenant Stevens and myself, having had the advantage of three weeks of extremely hard work on the Dolphin the previous year, were in a position to be of real service to the officers of the Montgomery. Both were given regular ship's divisions and had charge of guns with which we were familiar. The drills were conducted by us as they were with the divisions in charge of regular officers, and in fact there was no duty the regular watch and division officers were called upon to perform that we did not perform.

Our watches were not stood under the supervision of regulars, as was the case on the first cruise and the first week of the second year's cruise. We stood our watches alone, at sea and in port and without interference from any of the ship's officers. The experience thus obtained was of inestimable value to us, and at the conclusion of the week's duty when the division was disembarked, the compliment was paid us by the commanding officer of the Montgomery, of asking that we seek permission from the adjutant general of Maine and of the navy department, to take part in the war maneuvers off the New England coast, as we were of great help to the executive officer just at this time.

Capt. Patch of the Montgomery, Lieut. Commander Salisbury, the executive officer, Lieut. Johnson, the navigator, and the other officers of the Montgomery did all that they possibly

could to make the cruise a success. They accomplished their purpose in this regard. Every suggestion that was made by me was carried out, and I had the advantage of calling upon any instructors I might require in the drills and exercises. The ship was at sea a greater part of the time but in Frenchman's bay our division was given an entire day in the boats under oars and sails and was exercised in signalling and in landing, etc. The duty was not only pleasant but most beneficial, and our people acquitted themselves well and enjoyed it thoroughly.

This year the experiment was tried of allowing the Maine men all night liberty on shore, and Gloucester was picked out as the time for this liberty. The men passed the night on shore and came off in the morning in excellent condition, and gained a very high opinion for themselves among the regular officers in consequence. In three years on these cruises I have not been called upon yet to even reprimand one of our men.

In conclusion I have these recommendations to make as to the future conduct of the division.

The present organization is unwieldy and places us in a false position. We are organized for duty on shore and not afloat. The divisional organization is modeled after the Massachusetts law and the Massachusetts naval militia do not pretend to be organized for duty on the sea. I would respectfully suggest that, instead of the present organization, the Maine Naval Reserve be organized as a ship's company and so designated. That there be allowed to each ship's company in time of peace not more than six divisions, with a minimum strength of thirty petty officers and men and a maximum strength in time of war of twice as many. That the senior officer of the ship's company hold the rank of lieutenant, but no higher rank. This is as high rank as any volunteer officer can ever hope to enter the regular service with, and few volunteer officers will ever be proficient enough to justify their holding even as high rank as this among men who are educated for the navy.

I would recommend that each division be commanded by an ensign with the exception of the senior divisional commander whose rank should be that of a lieutenant, junior grade. There should be at Portland two of these divisions of thirty men each, and the others might be located at any point that the adjutant general might deem wise.

I would recommend that there be allowed to the commander of the ship's company one lieutenant, junior grade, as an executive officer who might also act as adjutant on shore duty, and that there also be allowed an assistant surgeon with each ship's company.

I would further recommend that there be allowed to each ship's company a chief petty officer for each division, and if necessary an engineer division commanded by an engineer with the rank of an ensign.

I would recommend that the \$50 now paid by the State to each divisional commander be divided, and \$25 each be paid the divisional commanders for care of State property, and that \$25 a year be paid the executive officer for the services he might be called upon to perform in the way of keeping up the records and correspondence. I would suggest that this change be made this year as the present formation is an extremely difficult one to maintain.

Each year that the present division is called upon to go to sea it is necessary to change the men from one watch to another, place men in messes where they should not go, and generally disturb the arrangements on board the ship on which we are embarked, much to the dissatisfaction of the regular officers and the inconvenience of the men.

The changes suggested would in the case of the Portland division simply mean the addition of fourteen enlisted men and two chief petty officers and one officer. This would be of no more expense to the city or the State with the exception of the addition of these fourteen men.

**REPORT OF THE CRUISE OF THE NAVAL RESERVE,  
BY N. J. K. PATCH, COMMANDER U. S. NAVY,  
COMMANDING U. S. S. MONTGOMERY.**

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SIR:—In obedience to the department's order No. 326,119—B, dated July 24, 1902, "Proceed with Montgomery to Portland, Me., in time to arrive by the 7th proximo, and embark the Naval Militia of the State of Maine on the 9th proximo, for a cruise of one week, &c," I have the honor to make the following report:—

2. I arrived in Portland, Maine, on the 7th instant, embarked the Naval Militia, consisting of two officers and thirty men, at 2 P. M. on the 9th. Militia was stationed, berthed and messed. We got under way at 3.45 P. M. and steamed out of the harbor to the eastward as far as Monhegan then changed the course for Cape Cod during the night. The Naval Reserve officers were given a regular watch at sea and in port. The Militia took regular tricks at the wheel, acted as quartermasters, boatswain's mates, and leadsmen.

Sunday: Sighted Race light at 10.05 A. M., changed course for Thatchers Island. I swung ship for compass deviations during the afternoon, Lieutenants Bigelow and Stevens assisting. No drill, quarters for Sunday inspection only. At 6.45 P. M. came to anchor in Ipswich Bay off Annisquam, Mass.

Monday: General quarters and sub-calibre practice both forenoon and afternoon periods. Remained in Ipswich Bay all night.

Tuesday: General quarters and sub-calibre practice in the forenoon. At 2 P. M. got under way and anchored in Gloucester at 4.23 P. M. The Militia received instructions in signaling, lead, knotting and splicing while underway. At the request of Lieutenant Bigelow his men were given liberty.

Wednesday: General quarters, fire quarters and collision drill in the forenoon. Signals, lead and taking apart and studying the breach mechanisms of the different guns in the afternoon. Got under way at 2.30 P. M. for East Lamoine, Me., coaling station.

Thursday: Arrived at East Lamoine at 10.10 A. M., got out boats and made preparations for coaling, went along side of the dock and commenced coaling at 1.40 P. M., while coaling the Naval Militia were given boats and they exercised six hours under sail, oars and boat drill by signal.

Friday: Finished coaling at 8 o'clock. Hauled away from dock at 9.30 A. M., and anchored in the stream. Naval Militia carried out program same as yesterday with boats. At 2 P. M. landed fire brigade including a detail of Naval Militia and assisted in putting out a fire on shore. Got underway at 4.10 P. M. for Portland.

Saturday: Anchored in Portland at 8.40 A. M. and at 10.15 A. M. landed the Naval Militia.

3. The officers and men of the Maine Naval Militia did their work well, tried to learn everything the short time would allow and the men showed evidence of being well instructed in drills which could be performed in their armory. They were unusually well acquainted with the management of boats, both under sail and oars. The officers, Lieutenant H. M. Bigelow and Lieutenant (Jr. Gr.) G. R. Stevens, made good deck officers both at sea and in port, the former having a fair knowledge of navigation and both knowing the Rules of the Road, &c.

**GENERAL ORDERS.**

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STATE OF MAINE.

ADJUTANT-GENERAL'S OFFICE,

AUGUSTA, January 10, 1902.

General Orders, No. 1.

I. In accordance with the provisions of the Militia Law and the Regulations for the National Guard, the Inspector-General will proceed forthwith to inspect the several companies and corps of the National Guard, giving at least ten days' notice of such inspection to the commanding officer of each organization, which notice will be promptly acknowledged to the Inspector-General.

II. So far as practicable, the Inspector-General will so fix the dates of the inspections as to make them correspond with those of the regular drills of the several organizations. He will advise regimental commanders of the inspections in their respective regiments, by sending them notices in each case, which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.

III. The Surgeon-General will accompany the Inspector-General when the Ambulance Corps is inspected and will make a special report.

IV. All organizations will be paraded in fatigue uniform, armed and equipped. Each company or corps commander will have collected in the armory, and conveniently arranged for inspection, all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession, and all books and papers pertaining to his organization.

V. Each company and corps commander, for the use of the Inspector-General, will prepare duplicate returns of his company or corps, and will furnish Inspection Report (Form No. 1), on which will be entered a complete list of all State property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession.

VI. The attention of company and corps commanders will be called to the care and preservation of all property entrusted to his care and special instruction will be given to the proper method of making and forwarding the necessary returns.

VII. Officers accountable for military property, having any such property which they consider unserviceable, will prepare Inventories (Form



No. 4), and will present the same with the property to the Inspector-General for his action. Attention is called to Article XXXVI of the Regulations for the National Guard, the provisions of which govern all inspections.

VIII. While on the inspecting tour enjoined in this order, the Inspector-General will devote to each organization a reasonable time for instruction, both theoretical and practical, during which he will take up guard duty and the necessary administrative work of the company.

IX. A suitable prize will be awarded to the company of each regiment and the corps receiving the highest score at the annual inspection in armories.

The following circular is published for the information and guidance of the National Guard of Maine:

OFFICE OF INSPECTOR-GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

AUGUSTA, ME., January 10th, 1902.

Circular No. 1.

The following suggestions are those of First Lieutenant William deV. Foulke, Inspector of Rifle Practice, 2d Infantry, Pennsylvania National Guard. I have found in them so much that is good that I desire to have them placed in the hand of every student of rifle practice in the National Guard, State of Maine. Experienced riflemen may differ, here and there, with Lieutenant Foulke, but for the most part it will be found that he has put essential facts into such simple form that their import will be readily grasped by the soldier. The suggestions which follow merit careful reading and it would be well for the rifleman to take this order with him to the range.

### SUGGESTIONS.

The Springfield rifle shoots 16 inches high at 100 yds; at 200 yds. it shoots 10 inches high with the leaf down, and 28 inches high with the leaf raised, unless the leaf has been cut off at the bottom.

Non-commissioned officers in charge of squads at the 200 yards firing point will examine each man's piece, observing if the sight leaf has been shortened. If shortened the soldier will be directed to use 160 yds. elevation and aim at the bottom of the figure; if not shortened he will point out some object at the proper distance below the figure and aim will be taken at that.

The Zero or middle-line in the Wind gauge is not the true Zero, or point from which the rifle will shoot on a calm day to the verticle centre of target.

The true Zero is  $\frac{1}{2}$  point left at 200 yds.

Always use the notch full of front sight, just level with the horizontal line of the bar.

Change from a very fine sight to a full sight will raise the ball about 2 feet on the target at 500 yds.

Plumb the piece by comparing the sight bar with the horizontal lines of the target.

Canting your piece right or left means a low shot toward the side you cant to, often a 3 at 600 yds.

Press the trigger, keep pressing and aiming so you are surprised by the discharge of the piece.

You cannot jerk a trigger and be a good shot.

Do not expect to hold dead centre, nor to get your trigger off just right every time. No man can do this, so do not feel discouraged. Practice will improve you.

These elevations will find the target when a full sight is used, and the point of aim at 500 and 600 yds. is at 6 o'clock, bottom of figure.

Ten degrees of Temperature alters the striking point of ball 3 inches at 500 yds. A rise or fall of 3-10 inch in barometric pressure has the same effect.

The first shot fired from a clean greasy gun will go 15 yds, higher than the one following it.

One point wind—at 200 yds., 13 inches.

“ “ “ “ 500 “ 32 “

“ “ “ “ 600 “ 39 “

25 yds. in elevation—at 200 yds., 9 inches.

“ “ “ “ “ 500 “ 23 “

“ “ “ “ “ 600 “ 28 “

Try to estimate how many miles an hour the wind is blowing past; this practice will be of use to you later.

It is well enough for the marksman to go by the wind flags. A 9 or 3 o'clock wind lifting the flags  $\frac{1}{4}$  from the pole, calls for about 1 point at 500 yds. If at angle of forty-five degrees from the pole  $1\frac{1}{2}$  to 2 points; if horizontal, windage may be  $2\frac{1}{2}$  to 3 points, or more as the wind strength is in excess of enough to lift them level.

Head winds call for increased elevations.

Rear winds, reduce elevations.

Very heavy cross winds, where over three points windage are found necessary, indicate added elevation.

Hot day, low elevation. Cold day, high elevation.

Cloudy day calls for high elevations.

Bright day calls for low elevations.

If target is dark from clouds and you make a bullseye and the clouds blow off before you shoot again, leaving the target bright, take off elevation.

If conditions to the above be reversed, add elevation.

If, on a bright, moist day, the horizontal lines of the target look wavy and distorted there is mirage. Lower elevations, or you aim at the expected image and overshoot the target below.

If you wish to win honors as a rifleman, keep a careful record of all your shooting. Include in this the Date, Time, Sort of Ammunition Used, Elevation, Direction of Wind, Windage used, Temperature and a diagram of the Flag-Lift as you shoot each shot. Keep your records honestly for that wild shot and the notes of its cause may prove valuable to you some day when conditions are puzzling and you need one more center to win.

The accused was present and pleaded not guilty to the charge and specifications.

Finding:—The Board of Inquiry finds that Second Lieutenant William H. Jenks, Company B, First Infantry, is guilty of the specifications and charge made by the officer of the day at Camp Hill, Augusta, Maine, August 22, 1901.

Recommendation:—The Board of Inquiry recommends that Second Lieutenant William H. Jenks, Company B, First Infantry, be dishonorably discharged from the service of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

II. The Judge Advocate General, having declared the proceedings in the case of Second Lieutenant William H. Jenks, Company B, First Infantry, to be regular, and in accordance with the Statutes of Maine, and the same having been submitted to the Commander-in-Chief, his orders are as follows:

RULES GOVERNING QUALIFICATIONS FOR SMALL ARMS PRACTICE  
FOR SEASON OF 1902.

The commanding officer of any company may qualify his men at any time during the season and in such numbers as he may find convenient. Each man shall have one attempt to qualify in the class to which his preliminary scores entitle him. Such attempts at qualification will be made in the presence of a commissioned officer who will observe the scoring carefully and certify that the scores were made as returned. This officer may be of the company whose men are attempting qualification, or from another organization. He will see that the rules in regard to qualification practice are strictly observed and his ruling in regard to any controversy will be obeyed. At the conclusion of the day's practice the officer will make the required certification on the blank provided for the purpose. This blank will be made in duplicate and one sent at once to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, the other to the Regimental Inspector of Rifle Practice through military channels.

All preliminary and qualification practice will be conducted on the elliptical target in accordance with the provisions of the Regulations for the National Guard. The classes for the rifle will be as follows:

**SHARPSHOOTERS**—Preliminary practice scores must be two scores of 22 at 200 yards, two scores of 23 at 300 or 500 yards and two scores of 22 at 300 or 600 yards.

**FIRST-CLASS MARKSMEN**—Preliminary practice scores must be two scores of 21 each at 200 and 500 yards or 200 and 300 yards.

**MARKSMEN**—Members of the Guard who have had any preliminary practice upon the range during the season may practice for qualification in that class.

Qualification scores will be made as follows:

Those who have sharpshooters' scores in preliminary practice will have ten shots over each range and if they make 105 points in the aggregate they are sharpshooters; making 120, they are distinguished sharpshooters.

Those who have first-class marksmen's scores in preliminary practice, will have ten shots over the two ranges and if they make 60 points in the aggregate they are first-class marksmen.

Members of the Guard whose preliminary scores will not permit them to practice in either of the foregoing classes, but who have had preliminary practice on the range during the season, will have ten shots at 200 yards and if they make 26 points they will be classed as marksmen.

Those practicing for sharpshooters or first-class marksmen and failing to qualify as such will be entered in that class to which their scores entitle them.

Carbine and revolver practice will be governed by the same general rules as rifle shooting, with such necessary preliminary and qualification scores as are prescribed by the Regulations.

The commissioned officer in command of the qualification practice will see that all due precautions against danger are taken.

No sighting shots will be allowed at any of the ranges.

The markers in deciding doubtful hits will give careful attention as to whether the edge of the bull's eye or lines are touched by the bullet, and if so the shot shall be counted as having hit the bull's eye or lines and give it the larger score accordingly. The marker will be careful to give the proper signal showing the value of the shot, being particular that the center of the marking disk is placed as near as it can conveniently be over the bullet hole in the target.

After a shot has been scored there can be no change made in the score, unless the officer in attendance has good reason to know that an error has been made in marking.

Ricochet shots will be scored as "misses."

No two competitors shall shoot with the same rifle, nor shall a rifle be changed after a score has been commenced, unless the rifle has been disabled by accident.

If the practice is over more than one range, the shortest will be used first and the longest last.

No coaching will be permitted nor shall the officer in charge allow any person other than himself, the scorer and the competitors, nearer than ten yards of the firing point, nor shall anyone be permitted to interfere in any way with the competitors, give advice as to anything pertaining to the shooting, or disturb the competitors by loud talk while the men are at the firing point.

If for any cause the target is removed just as a competitor fires, he shall be given another shot, but no other claim will be considered for giving another shot when one has been made.

Only one attempt at qualification for each member of a company will be allowed during the season.

The officer in charge may test the pull of any rifle and it shall be his duty so to do if asked or if he has reason to think that it is below six pounds, and he shall not allow any soldier to use any rifle the pull of which is less than six pounds.

The regulations of the National Guard, or Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations, will govern in any case not herein specified.

The Signal Corps and Naval Reserve will be governed by the same rules as herein laid down for company organizations.

I. Section 248, Art. XX of the regulations for the National Guard is hereby amended to read as follows:

'248. The annual allowance of ammunition for target practice will be as follows: To each company of infantry and division of naval reserve, 2,000 rounds of original rifle ammunition, 3,000 primers and rifle bullets, reimbursement for powder used with them in reloading shells, at the rate of \$2.50 per 1,000 as shown by score cards returned to the Inspector-General of rifle practice.

To the signal corps, 2,000 rounds of original carbine ammunition.



To each field, staff, or retired officer who shall apply for permission to practice, 100 rounds of original rifle ammunition.

To every officer who may have the use of a regulation revolver for target practice, 200 rounds of original revolver ammunition. The revolvers considered regulation are Colt's new pattern, calibre 38, and Smith and Wesson's new military, calibre 38.'

II. So much of sections 261 and 262, Art. XX of the regulations for the National Guard, as amended by G. O. No. 9, A. G. O. series of 1901, as relates to revolver qualifications, are hereby amended as follows:

Section 261, by striking out the last two paragraphs and inserting the following.

'Distinguished Revolver Marksman,—Two scores of 29 (six shots each) at 30 yards; two scores of 28 each at 50 yards; two scores of 27 each at 75 yards.

Expert Revolver Marksman,—Two scores of 24 each at 30 yards; two scores of 23 each at 50 yards; two scores of 22 each at 75 yards.

REVOLVER MARKSMAN,—Two scores of 24 each at 30 yards; two scores of 23 each at 50 yards.'

Section 262, by inserting the following.

'Distinguished Revolver Marksman,—A silver badge, consisting of a pin and pendent of lozenge shape, of the pattern in the Quartermaster-General's office, to be worn upon the uniform coat only, when the coat is authorized to be used. After three years of qualification, not necessarily consecutive, a silver bar, specifying the years of qualification, will be attached to the badge between the pin and pendent. Each additional three years of qualification will entitle the wearer to an additional bar. A distinguished revolver marksman who requalifies will be entitled to wear a red ribbon, as prescribed for a distinguished sharpshooter.'

III. Commanding officers of companies and corps and the regimental adjutants, will at once make requisition for khaki coats and trousers, also shoulder straps and chevrons for same, to equip the non-commissioned staff, 46 enlisted men to each company of infantry and 20 enlisted men each to the ambulance and signal corps.

Owing to the recent change in the U. S. A. Regulations providing that chevrons of the same color (white for infantry) shall be worn upon both the overcoat and blouse, commanding officers will make requisition for new overcoat chevrons, forwarding to this office all overcoat chevrons now in their possession, securely packed and marked with letter of company, No. of regiment or name of corps, making duplicate invoices and receipts for same. An expense account made at the rate of \$1.00 per set (overcoat, blouse and trousers) will be allowed for putting on chevrons and trousers stripes.

IV. On and after this date, score cards and stationery will be classed as "blank forms" and will be issued upon requisition as formerly but will not be accounted for upon property returns. All score cards and stationery on hand will be accounted for as "expended" and dropped from the semi-annual return of military property on May 31, 1902.

V. Company commanders and company clerks will render in June an expense account for "care of military property and expenditure for postage" and "services as company clerk" respectively, from date of last payment to July 1, 1902. Thereafter these accounts will be rendered in June and December of each year, they will not be received at any other time except for final settlement in case of an officer leaving the service or the discharge or removal of a company clerk.

All accounts for service or expenditure, other than those specified above will be made as soon as possible after the service is performed or expenditure made. All expense accounts must be made in duplicate, receipted and forwarded through military channels, in case of a company clerk the account must bear the certificate of the company commander that said clerk was duly sworn as provided in Art. 119 of the Militia Law, and has performed the duties of company clerk in a satisfactory manner.

VI. Section 81, Militia Law of Maine, provides, "There shall be in addition to the inspections required by Section 80, at least one annual inspection by the inspector-general or other officer detailed therefor, of each organization and of its armory, books, records, military property in its possession and of its financial condition, at such time as the commander-in-chief shall designate. The inspector-general is thoroughly acquainted with the duties pertaining to his position and his inspections are most carefully made, but they will prove of little benefit to the "Guard" unless the attention of company commanders is called to any existing irregularities. Hereafter copies of inspection reports made by the inspector-general will be forwarded to company commanders, through military channels for the information of regimental commanders. Attention will be called to such irregularities as may be found to exist and company commanders will be enjoined to correct them so far as it is possible to do so.

Inspections are made for the purpose of unearthing and bringing to light all existing irregularities in order that the necessary steps may be taken by regimental and company commanders for their correction.

THURSDAY, August 14, 1.00 p. m.—Open to any member of the Signal Corps who has this season made first-class marksman's preliminary scores which have been returned to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice not later than the first day of August; distances, 200 and 300 yards; rounds, seven at each distance, with two sighting shots allowed at each distance; no coaching; two prizes will be offered.

## INTER-REGIMENTAL RIFLE MATCH.

SATURDAY, August 16th, 7.30 a. m.—Open to a team of ten men, with two substitutes, from each regiment of infantry; personnel of teams and substitutes to be reported to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice not later than Monday, August 11th; distance, 200 yards; rounds, ten, two sighting shots allowed; coaching by team captain or such member of the regiment as he may designate; one prize will be offered.

## GENERAL CONDITIONS.

In all rifle and carbine matches the position at 200 yards will be standing, off-hand; at longer ranges, prone, with head toward the target.

At all distances up to 500 yards the A target will be used; at 500 yards, the B target.

In all rifle matches the U. S. Springfield rifle, calibre .45, will be used; in carbine matches, the U. S. Springfield carbine, calibre .45; in revolver matches, the Colt's Army or Smith & Wesson New Military revolvers.

In all matches the ammunition will be service ammunition for the respective arms, to be issued by the State.

Changes may be made in the matches or the day and hour of holding same, in which case due notice will be given to competitors.

The Colonel commanding may make such arrangements with the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice as will permit qualification practice when the range is not otherwise in use.

Blunt's Small Arms Firing Regulations will govern in all matters not herein provided.

General Orders, No. 13.

I. The camp of the National Guard of Maine during the annual encampment at Augusta, August 12 to 22, inclusive, will be designated "Camp Hill."

II. Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry, will be in command of the camp from August 12 to 16, inclusive, and Colonel Everard E. New-



comb, Second Infantry, will be in command from August 18 to 22, inclusive. Each camp commander will prepare and present to this office for approval, orders embracing the routine of each day during his tour of duty, the hours of calls, duties and ceremonies, and such rules and regulations as he may deem necessary for maintaining order and discipline and promoting the efficiency of his command.

III. The Colonels of the First and Second Regiments, with their Adjutants and Commissary Sergeants, will assume their duties in camp on the mornings of Tuesday, August 12 and Monday, August 18, respectively. The Quartermasters and Quartermaster Sergeants of each regiment will assume their duties on the mornings of Monday, August 11 and Saturday, August 16, respectively.

IV. Lieutenant Atwood W. Spaulding, Commissary, Second Infantry, will report to the Commissary-General on Monday, August 11, for duty, reporting back to his regiment on Saturday, August 16.

V. Lieutenant George M. Kavanaugh, Commissary, First Infantry, will report to the Commissary-General, on Saturday, August 16, after his regiment has broken camp on that day. He will return to his home station on Friday, August 22.

VI. Company cooks will be ordered to Augusta in advance of their companies so that those of the First Infantry may arrive in camp on Monday, August 11, and those of the Second Infantry on Saturday, August 16.

VII. The Inspector-General, Commissary-General, Surgeon-General and Inspector-General of Rifle Practice will attend the encampment and discharge the duties devolving upon them under the militia law.

VIII. Muster and pay-rolls in triplicate of the field and staff, non-commissioned staff, and band, companies and corps, will be prepared before going to camp by entering on them the name of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with date of rank of officers and date of muster-in of the enlisted men. Any stoppage, under provisions of Section 73, Militia Law, to be deducted from the pay of any commissioned officer or enlisted man will be entered against his name in the column for remarks. The columns for the pay account will be left blank to be filled in by the Paymaster-General. Un-uniformed enlisted men will not be brought to camp and no substitutes will be permitted or paid. Attention is called to the assignment of pay upon the pay-rolls. Each officer or enlisted man must indicate upon the pay-rolls to whom his pay is to be assigned, by writing in the proper columns upon the pay-roll the name of his assignee. But one assignee will be named for each organization.

IX. The commanding officer of Camp Hill will cause the several organizations of his command to be mustered for pay during the encampment, August 13 to 16 and 19 to 22 inclusive, on the proper forms, which at the close of the encampment will be forwarded to the Adjutant-General. Mustering officers will report no officer or enlisted man present who does not answer to his name at the muster, and they will muster no substitute.

X. The Adjutants of the First and Second Infantry will arrange for the employment of one civilian cook for each band. Accounts for pay-

ment of such cooks, whose names must be entered in the account, will be rendered. They will be paid \$1.50 a day for each day's services.

XI. The Ambulance Corps will occupy the west half of their mess house, the Signal Corps will occupy the east half of the same. A tent will be pitched near the cook house, for the use of the cook of the Signal Corps.

XII. A separate sink having been assigned to each company, camp commanders will require the commanding officer of companies and corps to see that the sinks provided for their respective organizations are properly used and cared for.

XIII. The commanding officer of Camp Hill will render to this office a consolidated morning report on the morning of each day of the encampment. He is authorized to grant leaves of absence and furloughs in cases of necessity, upon application approved by intermediate authority. In cases of sickness, certificate of the regimental surgeon must accompany the application. Officers and men absenting themselves without such leave of absence or furlough will be reported by name.

XIV. By virtue of the power conferred by Section 87 of the Militia Law, the authority of the officer in command of the camp is hereby extended to a distance of one-half mile around the State Camp Ground, and upon the external space within such distance from the camp, with the exception of any road or roads within said distance, no person or persons save those specially authorized by law shall be allowed to enter except under such rules as may be established by the officer commanding the camp and approved by the Commander-in-Chief.

XV. Regimental commanders will detail twelve experienced men to act as markers and scorers, who will report to the Inspector-General of Rifle Practice for duty at the range at 6.45 A. M., on each day designated in General Orders, No. 12, for holding Rifle Competitions.

XVI. The commanding officer of the Second Infantry will make such arrangement as will enable the members of the regimental rifle team to arrive in Augusta in season to compete in the Inter-Regimental Match on Saturday, August 16, as provided in General Orders, No. 12. Transportation and subsistence will be furnished but no per diem will be allowed.

XVII. Organizations of the National Guard will be inspected under the supervision of the Inspector-General during the annual encampment, August 12 to 22 inclusive, as follows:

The First Regiment Infantry, Signal Corps, and detail from Ambulance Corps will be paraded for inspection on Friday, August 15, at such time as may be designated by the Camp Commander.

The Second Regiment Infantry and detail from Ambulance Corps will be paraded for inspection on Wednesday, August 20, at such time as may be designated by the Camp Commander. All organizations will parade in Khaki uniform and campaign hat. Heavy marching order, canteen and haversack, will be worn; overcoat and blanket will be worn in roll, blanket outside.

XVIII. The Inspector-General will make a careful inspection each day at such times as he may designate to see that the provisions of Par. XIV., this order, are strictly complied with. No person or persons not members of the National Guard will be allowed to remain in camp after taps unless given express authority in writing by the commanding officer of the camp.

The Inspector-General is authorized to make requisition on the commanding officer of the camp for such force as is necessary to enforce compliance with this order.

XIX. The Commanding officers of the First and Second Infantry upon breaking camp on August 16 and 22, respectively, will arrange to leave the camp ground in season to proceed to the State House with their commands.

On arrival at the State House the troops will be massed in the rotunda. Arms will be presented. The chaplain will read the poem entitled "The Returned Maine Battle Flags," the band will play "The Star Spangled Banner" and taps will be sounded, that thus fitting homage may be rendered by the young soldiers of today to the old and worn but sacred flags carried by their fathers in the war for the preservation of the Union.

XX. The commanding officers of Camp Hill will provide in orders for a review by the Commander-in-Chief on the afternoons of Thursday, August 14 and 21 respectively. A suitable escort will be ordered to report at the State House at 1.15 o'clock P. M. to escort the Commander-in-Chief to the camp. A detail of one sergeant, mounted, will be ordered to report to the Adjutant-General at the State House at 1 o'clock P. M. to act as orderly to the Commander-in-Chief. The Camp Commander will also provide for firing the Governor's salute and hoisting the flag.

XXI. The following section of the Militia Law of the State is published for the information of all concerned.

"Section 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract or presume to authorize the contracting of any indebtedness on behalf of the State, without the express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State."

AROOSTOOK WAR

1839.



HISTORICAL SKETCH AND ROSTER OF COMMISSIONED OFFICERS AND ENLISTED MEN OF THE DRAFTED MILITIA OF MAINE, CALLED INTO ACTUAL SERVICE FOR THE PROTECTION OF ITS NORTHEASTERN FRONTIER, FROM FEBRUARY TO MAY, 1839.

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THE AROOSTOOK WAR, 1839.

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Among the many important events in the early history of the State of Maine one of much interest is that known as the Aroostook War, a brief sketch of which is given below.

By the treaty of 1783, at the close of the Revolutionary struggle, one-half of the St. John's river belonged to Maine. \* \* \* After the war of 1812, the British claimed the whole of the upper part of the vast valley of the St. John. They demanded all the land above the forty-sixth degree of north latitude, which included about one-third of what was supposed to be the territory of Maine. There was at this time, on the north or eastern side of the river, an American settlement \* \* \* extending for a distance of nearly twenty miles. The inhabitants were principally of French descent, and had emigrated to that American region when the English took possession of Arcadia. This plantation had been incorporated as the town of Madawaska, and a representative was sent to the legislature of Maine. In June, 1837, Congress sent an officer to Madawaska to take a census of the people, and at the same time to distribute the surplus money which had accumulated in the United States treasury. A British constable arrested this agent and carried his prisoner to the nearest English shire town. But the sheriff there, alarmed, refused to receive the prisoner, and he returned to Madawaska, and continued to prosecute his mission.

Governor Harvey of New Brunswick, hearing of the distribution of money to the people, assumed that it was a bribe to induce the inhabitants to continue their allegiance to the United States. He therefore ordered the agent to be re-arrested and he was lodged in Frederickton jail. Governor Dunlap, at that time governor of Maine, issued a general order announcing that the soil of our State had been invaded by a foreign power. The militia were therefore called upon to hold themselves in readiness for active service. A few weeks after, the British authorities set the imprisoned agent at liberty. Both parties wisely decided to refer the question to arbitration.

By the convention between the United States and Great Britain, at London, September 29, 1827, it was agreed through the plenipotentiaries of the two powers, that points of difference between the commissioners appointed according to the fifth article of the treaty of Ghent, should be referred to some friendly sovereign or state. They finally made a choice of William, King of Netherlands, as arbiter of questions submitted under that treaty.

The question in regard to the northeastern boundary being referred to him, he decided that the line should run about half-way between the boundaries claimed by the two powers.

The question submitted was "Which of the two boundaries is the one authorized by the treaty?" and he decided in favor of a line which the treaty did not indicate, and of which neither of the parties had thought. The people of Maine were indignant at this decision. The national government, anxious to avoid war, generously offered Maine a million acres of land in Michigan, in exchange for the territory she would thus lose. This offer was declined, and prolonged negotiations ensued. During the years from 1832, when the decision was waived by both the interested parties, until 1842, when Maine assented to a compromise, there had been frequent collisions on the frontier. In 1838, Governor Kent took measures to increase the efficiency of the militia, and General Wool was sent to inspect the fortifications on the Penobscot, the St. Croix and the Kennebec. The line which Maine claimed by the treaty of 1783 was again surveyed. The territory thus in dispute became the prey of plunderers. Soon there was a conflict between the British lumbermen and American officers.



Governor Harvey of New Brunswick issued a proclamation declaring that British territory had been invaded and ordering out a thousand of the militia. Affairs now began to look serious. Immediately fifty volunteers set out from Augusta for the scene of action. At the same time Governor Harvey sent a communication to the governor of Maine, at Augusta, demanding the recall of the American troops from the Aroostook, announcing that he was instructed by the British government to hold exclusive charge over the disputed territory and that he should do so by military force. This aroused the indignation of the people of Maine. The legislature passed a resolve for the protection of the public lands, and appropriated eight hundred thousand dollars to that purpose. A draft was also ordered for ten thousand three hundred and forty-three men from the militia to be ready for immediate action. General Bachelder was commander of the western division of militia. Within a week ten thousand American troops were either in Aroostook county, or on the march there. The national government was roused. Congress passed a bill authorizing the President of the United States to raise fifty thousand troops for the support of Maine, and appropriating ten million dollars to meet the expense, should the governor of New Brunswick fulfil his threat of maintaining exclusive jurisdiction over the territory in dispute. On the fifth of March, General Scott with his staff, reached Augusta. He informed the governor that he was "specially charged with maintaining the peace and safety of the entire northern and eastern frontiers." He took quarters at the Augusta House and entered into correspondence with both Governor Harvey of New Brunswick and Governor Fairfield of Maine, endeavoring to act the part of peacemaker.

Governor Harvey pledged himself that, in prospect of the peaceful settlement of the question between the two nations, he would not take military possession of the territory, or endeavor to expel from it the civil posse or the troops of Maine. Governor Fairfield pledged himself that he would not, without renewed instructions, disturb any of the New Brunswick settlements in the Madawaska region. He agreed to withdraw his troops and leave uninterrupted communication between New Brunswick and Canada.

This settlement brought peace. The prisoners on both sides were set at liberty. In March, the Aroostook region, which

had previously formed a portion of Penobscot and Washington counties, was formed into a new county bearing its original name. It was generally supposed that the prompt military preparations we had made, which gave us the command of the situation, had great influence with the British authorities in securing a peaceful settlement. Although the Aroostook war called for troops which were sent to the scene of disturbance, the outbreak was a bloodless one; nevertheless it was the occasion of great annoyance and the expenditure of large sums of money.

In the year 1842 Lord Ashburton came to Washington, the British ambassador authorized to form a new treaty for the settlement of the boundary. An extra session of the legislature of Maine was called. Commissioners were appointed to confer with Lord Ashburton and Secretary Webster upon this subject. The troublesome question was soon settled. England greatly needed a portion of this territory that there might be free communication between New Brunswick and Canada. Maine surrendered a considerable tract which was of but little value. In compensation the United States received a territory of much greater value, on the borders of Lakes Champlain and Superior. The national government paid Maine one hundred and fifty thousand dollars for the surrender. The State also received two hundred thousand dollars as re-imbusement for the expense she had incurred in defending the integrity of American territory. The Senate of the United States ratified the Ashburton treaty August 20, 1842. By this treaty, which is sometimes called from the negotiations the Webster-Ashburton treaty, arrangements were made for the final settlement of boundaries between the different states and the British possessions in North America.

Much interesting matter in regard to this subject is found in "Abbott's History of Maine." The printed volumes of "Resolves of the State of Maine" contain valuable material connected with those years of open controversy. Other works are by Albert Gallatin, "The Right of the United States to the Northeastern Boundary Claimed by Them," (New York, 1840); Chas. S. Daveis "Report of the Committee on the North Eastern Boundary, Legislative Documents, 1841;" William P. Preble "The Decision of the King of Netherlands" published anonymously, (Portland, 1841).

Following are general orders issued in 1839, which relate to the Aroostook War, also a list of officers in active service at that time and the muster rolls of forty-six companies of infantry and artillery which were called into active service.

This force will rendezvous at Bangor and proceed at the earliest possible moment, to the place occupied by a civil force under the Land Agent on or near the Aroostook river, and render such aid to the Land Agent as may enable him to carry into effect a Resolve of 24th of January, relating to trespassers upon the public lands.

Major General Hodsdon of the third Division, having been directed by General Orders of the 16th instant, to make a draft of one thousand men from his Division, the detailment will consist of eight hundred and fifty Infantry, Light Infantry and Riflemen, and one hundred and fifty Artillery. The companies will be organized with sixty-four privates, four sergeants, and two musicians. The draft will be required to report themselves to the Major General at Bangor, on Thursday the 21st instant. The Major General will command the detachment in person, and he will detail, in addition to the proper number of Company officers, one Colonel, one Lieutenant Colonel, and one Major of Infantry, and one Major of Artillery, together with the appropriate Staff. General Hodsdon will make immediate requisition by express on the acting Quartermaster General, for such supplies, including military stores, as in his opinion, the nature of the service contemplated may require.

The detachment will be required to appear with the arms and equipments of their respective corps, and with three days' provisions. They will be drafted to serve three months unless sooner discharged.

When the detachment shall have been completed, Major General Hodsdon will forward to the Adjutant General a complete roll of the officers, non-commissioned officers and privates, describing the Brigade, Regiment and Companies from which they were severally taken.

General Hodsdon will procure at Bangor, or at such other place as he may find convenient, the necessary camp equipage for the detachment.

The Commander-in-Chief directs a detachment of ten thousand three hundred and forty-three officers, non-commissioned officers and privates, including field and staff officers, to be made by draft from the several Divisions, in the proportions, and from the several corps mentioned in the schedule of detail prepared by the Adjutant General. The officers and soldiers when detached will severally hold themselves in readiness for an immediate call into the service of the State, armed and equipped as required by law.

The Major Generals and officers commanding Divisions are directed to cause the draft aforesaid, to be made with all possible expedition, and complete rolls of both officers and men, designating the Companies, Regiments and Brigades from which they are taken, to be immediately forwarded to the office of the Adjutant General.

In making this call upon a portion of the military force, to hold itself in readiness for active service, the Commander-in-Chief would remind the whole body of the militia, of the important position they occupy as citizen soldiers; and should the contingency unfortunately occur, when their services should be required to render protection to our citizens, or preserve the honor of our State, he will rely with entire confidence on their patriotism for such aid as the exigency may require.

Upon the arrival of the several Companies at Augusta, each commanding officer thereof will report himself to Brigadier General Bachelder, together with the state of his Company.

The field and staff officers of the detachment will also report themselves to Brigadier General Bachelder at the time appointed.

The detachment aforesaid will serve for the term of three months, unless sooner discharged by the Commander-in-Chief.

Major General White will detail one Brigade Major, one Aid de Camp to Brigadier General and one Brigade Quartermaster, for the staff of Brigadier General Bachelder, and the officers detailed will be required to report themselves to him at Augusta, at the time appointed for the rendezvous of the detachment.

General Foster will make immediate requisition on the acting Quartermaster General, for such supplies, including military stores, as he may deem necessary—which requisition will be presented to Captain Randall Whidden of Calais, and Captain of the Calais Artillery, who will take immediate measures to answer the call. He will also forward complete rolls of both officers and men, designating the Companies, Regiments and Brigades from which they were taken, to the office of the Adjutant General.

Major Generals will cause this draft to be immediately organized into Companies of four Sergeants, one Drummer, one Fifer, and sixty-four privates, and will cause them to rendezvous as follows:

Those from the Fifth Division, at the Court House in Portland, on Monday the fourth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and they will report themselves to Major General Jewett, who will place them under command of the senior Captain of the draft, with orders to proceed forthwith to Augusta and report his command at Headquarters, to the Adjutant General.

Those from the Sixth Division at the Court House in Augusta, on Wednesday the sixth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and report themselves by commanding officers of Companies to the Adjutant General at Headquarters.

Those from the Eighth Division, at the Inn of Dudley Heywood in Skowhegan, on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and report themselves to Major General Bodfish, who will place them under command of Colonel Nathan Goodridge, with orders to proceed on the road to Bangor, subject to the further orders of the Commander-in-Chief.

The Quartermaster and Paymaster from the Fourth Division, will report themselves to the Adjutant General at Headquarters, on Wednesday the sixth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon.

All the troops aforesaid will appear at their several places of rendezvous, with the arms and equipments of their respective corps, including knapsacks and blankets, required by law for actual service. Each man will furnish himself with three days' provisions; and officers commanding Regiments and Battalions will forthwith notify the selectmen of towns, to cause the detachment from their respective towns to be attended on their march with suitable carriages, provisions, camp equipage and camp utensils, until notice shall be given them by the commanding officer to desist.

Major Generals will forward complete rolls of both officers and men, designating the Companies, Regiments and Brigades from which they were taken, to the office of the Adjutant General, with all possible dispatch.

The several field and staff officers of the draft, from the Sixth Division, will report themselves with the other troops from their Division to

the Adjutant General at Headquarters; and those from the Eighth Division, will report themselves with the troops from that Division to Major General Bodfish, who will organize his draft into a Regiment.

The detachment hereby called into service, will serve for the term of three months, unless sooner discharged by the Commander-in-Chief.

Colonel Orison Ripley of the First Regiment, First Brigade and Sixth Division, is ordered into service, and he will report himself to the Adjutant General at Headquarters, on Monday the fourth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, and await orders.

Colonel Nathan Goodridge of the First Regiment, Second Brigade, and Eighth Division, is ordered into service, and he will report himself to his Major General, at Skowhegan, on Tuesday the twelfth day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon and await orders.

In all cases of making a draft, each Major General will cause returns thereof, both officers and men to be made to him, stating the companies, regiments and brigades from which they were severally taken. And in case any draft is made of troops and called into active service, Major Generals will in all cases cause the company officers, non-commissioned officers and privates to be immediately organized into companies, and forthwith returned as such to the office of the Adjutant General, and also to the commanding officer of the detachment at the time and place of rendezvous.

The Commander-in-Chief directs the following as the component parts of the ration to be issued to the Militia of this State, when in actual service, viz. :—three-quarters of a pound of pork or bacon, or one and a quarter pounds of fresh or salt beef, eighteen ounces of bread or flour, or twelve ounces of hard bread, or one and a quarter pounds of corn meal, and at the rate of four pounds of soap, one and a half pounds of candles, two quarts of salt, four quarts of vinegar, eight quarts of peas or beans, and when practicable, two pounds of tea, and twelve pounds of sugar or the equivalent in molasses, to every one hundred rations.

No allowance will be made to troops who do not receive all the parts mentioned for the rations, but commissaries are directed to cause such parts thereof as can be furnished without great inconvenience and increased expense, to be delivered to the troops at every post when so required.

Officers commanding detachments in service will cause this order to be immediately promulgated that there may be no misapprehensions by any one in relation to the rations.

In directing the discharge of the troops under command of Colonel Ripley, the Commander-in-Chief avails himself of the occasion, to express to the detachment his warm thanks for the prompt manner in which they have responded to the call made for their services, as well as for their good conduct while quartered at the Capital. The rapid progress made in discipline, during the short time they have been on duty, is highly creditable to both officers and men, and it is another evidence that our patriotic citizen soldiery, while they are at all times ready to march in defence of our country's rights, also possess those qualities indispensable to the establishment of an efficient army "good order and subordination."

But in deciding that the condition of our border difficulties has so changed since the order directing the draft of militia from the Fifth and Sixth Divisions, as to render the services of this detachment not at present necessary, the Commander-in-Chief would remind them, that while he flatters himself with the hope that such justice will be done the State in regard to our boundary, as will render it unnecessary again to call in the aid of military power to preserve the integrity of our soil, yet that it is the duty of every community to be prepared to protect by physical force, those rights ever dear to a free people; and although the members of the detachment will forthwith return to their respective homes and firesides, they will recollect that their services may again be necessary; and should that emergency unfortunately occur, the Commander-in-Chief doubts not that they will respond to any further call, with that alacrity which has ever characterized the Militia of Maine.

General Hodsdon will forthwith return with the remaining portion of the detachment from the third Division, to the city of Bangor and he will report his command by Companies or larger divisions, as they arrive, to the Adjutant General at that place.

The detachment from the second Division, will without delay return to Bangor under Brigadier General Bachelder, who will report his command as the several Companies thereof shall arrive, to the Adjutant General at that city.

The officer left in command at Fort Fairfield and at the Presque Isle, on being notified by the Land Agent that a sufficient civil force has been procured to enable him to protect the public property, will immediately retire to Bangor with his command, and report to the Adjutant General.

Brigadier General Bachelder will leave a guard at township number ten on the Aroostook road, sufficient to protect such public stores as may from necessity be left at that post. This guard will be subject to the orders of the acting Quartermaster General.

Deeming it unnecessary longer to continue a military force on the northeastern frontier, the Commander-in-Chief directs that the Militia be discharged without delay; and he takes this occasion to express to the detachments from the second and third Divisions, his entire satisfaction with the manner in which they obeyed the call into the service of the State for the protection of the rights and honor of Maine; and their general conduct while in the public service, as reported by their respective commanding-officers, merits, as it receives, his warm approbation.

Called into active service at a season unusual for military operations, without preparation and without experience, much inconvenience if not suffering must have been felt by the detachments on duty. It has been the intention of the Commander-in-Chief to render their condition one of as much comfort as the nature of the service would permit; and the zeal and alacrity with which they have obeyed the call for their aid, is sure evidence that Maine can rely with perfect confidence on the patriotism of her citizen soldiery, for the protection of her honor, and the vindication of her rights.
