SIR:—I have the honor to submit my annual report as Inspector General for the year ending December 31, 1903, in compliance with law and in accordance with General Orders No. 3, A. G. O., Augusta, January 22, 1903.

I made a careful inspection of each company and corps at its home station. I found the State and Government property well cared for and in most cases in good condition. Some of the uniforms are quite badly worn. I condemned such as in my judgment were of no further use for the soldier.

This has been an eventful year for the National Guard of Maine. The passage of the Dick bill necessitated quite a little extra work. When I had partly completed my inspections, the Secretary of War notified the Governor that he had detailed an officer to inspect the National Guard of Maine, and requested that such assistance be rendered him as it was the pleasure of the Adjutant-General to furnish. I was ordered to accompany Captain Dwight E. Aultman, the officer detailed to make the inspection for the information of the War Department. We found the companies had received a wrong impression of what Captain Aultman would require of them, and few of them made as good a showing as they were able to do, much to my disappointment.

Early in the year the Governor found it necessary for the good of the service, to disband Company M, Second Infantry, located at Machias; Company H, Second Infantry, located at Waterville, and Company F, First Infantry, located at Augusta. New companies were organized to replace them as follows: Company H, Second Infantry, Waterville; Company M, Second Infantry, Augusta, and Company F, First Infantry, Sanford. These new companies have a fine lot of officers and men and did good work at Portland during the joint manoeuvres.

The law pertaining to the Naval Reserve was amended so that the organization is now known as a ship's company, and at present consists of two divisions, the first in charge of a lieutenant-junior-grade and the second in charge of an ensign. Lieutenant Harry M. Bigelow is in command of all the Naval Militia in the State.

STRENGTH.

ARMORY INSTRUCTIONS.

The instructions given in the armory should be very thorough, and particular pains should be taken with recruits that they be given all the preliminaries before they are allowed to fall in with the company. Men should be required to become very familiar with the duties of a private of the Guard, and the care of his rifle and uniform. The time given to individual instruction in the armory by the officers and non-commissioned officers to the privates serves a double purpose, for the instructor is improving himself at the same time he is teaching the men. One of the secrets of a good company is to have your men go home feeling they have learned something, and they will be more anxious for the next meeting. The general government is doing more and more for the National Guard, and will demand better service, and will insist that officers and men render the best service possible.

THE MEDICAL CORPS.

The Guard is particularly fortunate in having for surgeons of the different organizations some of the brightest men in their profession in the State, who are very much interested in their work and are held in high esteem by every officer and man in the service.

ARMORIES.

This very important item is improved a little from 1902. The city of Bangor has provided Company G, Second Infantry, with a very good drill hall and Company property room; also a room for officers and non-commissioned officers. The city of Westbrook has repaired the armory of Company M, First Infantry, so that they have very good quarters. The Lewiston armory is now in very good condition. The other armories remain the same as in 1902.

I consider the question of armories an important one for the future of the Guard, and am still of the opinion that the State should provide the armories and the cities and towns the heating and lighting.

ATTENDANCE.

The following tables will show the attendance of each company and corps. At the annual inspection a detailed report was made as soon as each company was inspected, and I would respectfully call your attention to these reports for the particular condition of each organization.

ENLISTMENTS.

The State is to be congratulated on the class of men who are seeking admission to the National Guard.

The honest administration of the Adjutant-General's Office and the great interest which the Governor has taken in his troops coupled with what the General Government is doing for the citizen soldier, all have an influence to bring the best young men in the State to enlist, as the men who are loyal and interested are sure of promotion in the future.

ENCAMPMENTS.

This year was the first time that the Militia of Maine ever took part with troops from other states, and United States Regulars.

In compliance with a request from the Secretary of War and G. O. No. 20, A. G. O., Augusta, July 24, 1903, also G. O. No. 2, Headquarters, First Regiment, and G. O. No. 1, Headquarters, Second Regiment, the troops proceeded to Portland on Friday, August 21, 1903, and were assigned as follows:

THE WORK OF THE TROOPS DURING THE JOINT MANEUVERS AT
PORTLAND, AUGUST 21 TO 29, 1903, INCLUSIVE.

For the first time in its history the National Guard of Maine was ordered to report for duty in the Military District of Portland in connection with Regulars and Militiamen from Massachusetts and New York. It was an ideal day and officers and men were feeling well and were anxious to perform well every and all duties they were called upon to do. Friday P. M. was devoted to pitching camp at the several stations and getting everything in order for the week of actual war, but for the shedding of blood. Sunday, Monday and Tuesday the officers and men were busy laying out their preliminary work, such as throwing up earth works, and, in some instances, cutting bushes and small trees to indicate to the enemy where the line of rifle pits was, for one man in the trenches counted for ten in the open. Wednesday night at twelve o'clock, hostilities commenced. The first discovery of the enemy was soon after twelve, when a torpedo boat destroyer was sighted, dragging the main channel, while a battleship was slowly coming up the outer harbor, and firing on Forts Preble and Levett, which were returning her fire with their ten-inch mortars, and later, with their shore batteries. The first ship proved to be the Kearsarge, which was soon followed by the Texas and Illinois, which each fought its way past Forts Williams, Levett and Preble and did not strike its colors till well up the main channel. When the call to arms was sounded, it was quite surprising to see how quickly the National Guardsmen responded. Officers and men were cool and went about their work as though they had always been doing it. From that time on, until Saturday noon, when the hostilities were off, there was no rest night or day for anyone. The Navy kept at them in one place or another continually. Men got no sleep, and very little time to eat, but not a word of complaint from anyone. They all felt they were there for business, and wanted to be ready for anything that came along.

I visited each camp twice during my tour of duty, and found the camps in good condition, cook-houses clean, and grounds well policed. One pleasant thing was the fact that each com-

mand thought it had the best camping site in the whole district. There was no sickness to speak of.

I consider the benefit to the Guard of as much value as three annual encampments at Augusta. I could not discern but that the Maine men were doing guard duty as well as it was being done by other troops on the station. The assimilation of the National Guardsmen with the Regulars was pleasant and profitable, and every courtesy was extended by the officers of the Army to the National Guard officers, and, in fact, they put themselves out to help anyone who desired assistance from them.

Lientenant Harry M. Bigelow and his men served with the Navy, and did some very good work, I am told. Admiral Barker wrote Lieutenant Bigelow a personal letter, thanking him for the good work of his ship's company.

While there was no opportunity for any individual display of courage or tact, which sometimes makes heroes, I have no doubt there was plenty of that energy lying dormant, only waiting for a chance to display itself, but alas, the occasion did not arrive. I was particular, during the tour, to watch for anything that would be of benefit in the future. I was pleased to note in every case, that when any duty was required of officer or man, it was quickly and cheerfully performed. There was only one case where I heard of any growl, and that was where one company was required to guard the camp while the others were sent out for outpost duty. The men thought it menial duty they were ordered to do, while their brothers were out with a good prospect of having a scrap with the enemy, which did not occur, however. The volunteer is apt to think he is not doing his part unless he is on the firing line, while, in fact, the soldier who performs faithfully any duty which is assigned him, is entitled to the same credit as the man at the front. It has been well said that "He serves well who only stands and waits."

Some of the commanding officers were aware that they could not successfully guard all the territory which was assigned them, and made a request for more men, but were told by the District Commander that the disposition of his troops was such that he could not spare them any more men. The wisdom of the request was proven later.

The volunteers received a letter of thanks from the commanding officers of the different camps for the faithful manner in which they performed their duties.

The quartermasters and commissaries acquired valuable knowledge in regard to their duties and methods of obtaining supplies and rations.

On August 29th, the troops broke camp and returned to their several stations, officers and men very tired, but all feeling that they had done a good week's work and were much better soldiers for the experience, and hoping that they may be privileged to meet in the near future with a much larger command.

In closing, I wish to thank you, General, and your officers for the cheerful assistance always given me in my official work.

PRACTICE.**

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of small arms practice in the National Guard, State of Maine, for the season ending November 21, 1903:

Small arms practice in the National Guard of Maine has suffered much the past season through the exchange of the .45 caliber Springfield rifles for the .30 caliber U. S. Magazine Rifles under the provision of the national militia act approved by the President, January 21, 1903. Under G. O. No. 16, A. G. O. c. s., State of Maine, June 30, 1903, company commanders were directed to turn into the quartermaster-general's office all .45 caliber rifle and carbine ammunition and make requisition for .30 caliber ammunition to take its place. Under G. O. No. 18, A. G. O. c. s., State of Maine, July 24, 1903, company commanders were directed to turn into the quartermaster-general's office all Springfield rifles and carbines of the .45 caliber and to make requisition for the U. S. Magazine Rifles, caliber .30. The new rifles were received just in time for use during the combined army and navy maneuvers in the artillery district of Portland, August 22 to 29, 1903. The Guard was thus prevented from performing any practice from the middle of June to the first of September, a period during which there is usually the largest expenditure of ammunition. These conditions made it inexpedient to hold the usual individual, company and regi-

mental competitions which always serve to stimulate interest in shooting.

That any appreciable amount of work would be accomplished under such adverse circumstances seemed almost too much to expect, yet the returns which will be found in the appendix show that the year has been by no means lost. It would be unfair to criticize severely the companies which this year failed to come up to their usual average, but the warmest commendation is due the organizations which have successfully surmounted the many obstacles in the way of qualification. The work of the various organizations is touched upon in the following statement by companies:

THE YEAR'S WORK IN BRIEF.

FIRST INFANTRY.

Co. A, Portland—This organization expended but 1,380 rounds of ammunition and reports the qualification of two men as marksmen. The cards show that no practice was held after the exchange of rifles.

Co. B, Portland—The work of this company has been of smaller volume than usual, but there are many good riflemen in the organization who will see to it that the depression is only temporary. During the season the company suffered the loss of its former inspector of rifle practice, Sergt. Walter L. Hatch. Shortly after his retirement from the guard, Sergt. Hatch died, the news of his death being received with deep sorrow among the riflemen of both regiments. Sergt. Hatch was a member of the Sea Girt team in 1901 and won fourth prize in the inspector's match, in a field made up of the best riflemen of the country.

Co. C, Auburn—This company's expenditure of 2,510 rounds of ammunition was made almost wholly in the first part of the season with the Springfield. Capt. H. P. Carver very wisely decided to qualify at that time as many of his company as possible. As a result of this foresight he is able to report the qualification of twelve men as marksmen, two as first-class marksmen and one as a distinguished sharpshooter. This return, while not large, is so very much better than no return at all that Capt. Carver and Sergt. Delbert S. Woodward, his inspector of rifle practice, may feel that they have made a good beginning for another season.

Co. D, Norway—This company has without question done the best work the past season of any organization in the Guard. The company is fortunate in having a range which not only permits practice at 200, 300, 500 and 600, but also at 800, 900 and 1,000 yards. The company is still more fortunate in having as its company inspector of rifle practice Sergt. M. P. Stiles, formerly captain of the company and one of the most studious riflemen in the Guard. Sergt. Stiles has shown in his duties as company inspector the inestimable value of systematic work. The men have been carefully instructed and have been brought to expend their ammunition so that it has counted. The result is shown in the following qualification: Four distinguished sharpshooters; one sharpshooter; one first-class marksman; thirty-one marksmen, and only eight men failing to qualify. The company expended 4,790 rounds of ammunition, keeping up practice with the Springfield, till that arm was exchanged for the .30 caliber U. S. Magazine Rifle.

Co. E, Portland—This company reports no qualification practice, though in the latter part of the season 1,375 rounds of ammunition were expended. The scores made will average very high, as the company has a number of excellent marksmen. Corp. B. A. Flaherty has been appointed company inspector of rifle practice and will make an efficient official.

Co. F, Sanford—Especially pleasing is the work of this new company. It means much to a new organization to see that target practice is not neglected at the start. The company did not have a range till toward the close of the season, but has now one of the best in the State. The range is so extensive that it will permit practice at all distances up to 1,000 yards, with a field admirably adapted to skirmish practice. The company expended 1,918 rounds of ammunition, all with the new rifle. The returns show that one man qualified as a distinguished sharpshooter and sixteen men as marksmen. Private George A. Fields acted as company inspector, and in Sergt. Daniel W. Wentworth, the company has a rifleman who will prove of greatest assistance as the men reach the higher grades of qualification.

Co. G, Biddeford—The break in the season's work, caused by the exchange of rifles, resulted badly for this company. With

the Springfield, 4,140 rounds of ammunition were expended and the practice was of a high order. Had there been no disturbance of conditions, the company would undoubtedly have taken as high rank for qualification as it did in 1902.

Co. H, Rockland—This company makes no return of qualification practice. The score cards as returned to this office show an expenditure of 555 rounds in the early part of the season. The company is in imperative need of a new range. The present range is unsafe for high power projectiles and permits no practice beyond 300 yards.

Co. I, Lewiston—For lack of suitable range facilities, this company qualified none of its men the past season. According to the score cards but four men were on the range during the season, these four making an expenditure of 120 rounds of ammunition in the month of November.

Co. K, Brunswick—Next after Norway in the season's work on the range comes Co. K. The company expended 2,800 rounds of ammunition, nearly all with the new rifle. During the season the removal to another state of Sergt. L. M. Cotton left the company without a company inspector, but the appointment of Lieut. Thomas T. Rideout to fill the vacancy has been productive of good results. Lieut. Rideout is a good rifleman himself and with the assistance of Capt. Wm. C. Goodwin succeeded in doing a large amount of work in the latter part of the season when conditions were none of the best. Twenty-three men were qualified as marksmen; two as first-class marksmen and one as a distinguished sharpshooter. Two of the officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. L, Portland—This company expended a very small amount of ammunition, but did very good work in the preliminary practice, under Sergt. J. P. Burke. Reporting no qualification practice, Capt. John J. A. Mulhearn says: "It was our intention to have two days set apart for qualification during the latter part of the season, but owing to some difficulty the range was declared closed by the city authorities some weeks previous to the closing of the season."

Co. M, Westbrook—This company expended 3,990 rounds of ammunition, qualifying four distinguished sharpshooters; two first-class marksmen and twelve marksmen. A new 1,000-yard

range is next year's pleasing prospect and Capt. J. W. Graham's men will be sure to give a good account of themselves, when the new rifle is mastered.

SECOND INFANTRY.

Co. A, Gardiner—This company began the season well, and had there been no change of rifles would have had a high standing at the end of the season. Lieut. Horace S. Peacock, the company inspector, is a competent and hard-working officer, carrying into his work much enthusiasm. In this he is warmly assisted by Capt. Charles E. Tibbetts, who assumed command of the company during the season. The company's range permits no practice beyond 500 yards, and is not adapted for skirmish work, but is safe and convenient to the armory. The company expended 3,945 rounds of ammunition, the amount being nearly equally divided between the first and latter portions of the season. Four men qualified as sharpshooters; one as a first-class marksman and one as a marksman. The employment of a majority of the company is such that they can secure time for practice only during the middle portion of the season, which, this year, was the period when the Guard found itself unarmed.

Co. B, Lewiston—Though practically without range facilities, this company, through the combined efforts of Capt. C. J. Kelleher and Lieut. Wm. H. Matthews, the company inspector, succeeded in qualifying three men as distinguished sharpshooters and twelve men as marksmen. The range in Auburn, being totally unsafe for novices, Capt. Kelleher permitted only his experienced men—men, as he puts it, who would "stay on the target"—to attempt qualification. The company expended 2,070 rounds of ammunition, this amount being about equally divided between the Springfield and the .30 caliber rifle. Two officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. C, Bath—In April and May this company expended 735 rounds of ammunition but qualified no marksmen. No range work was done after the exchange of rifles. In accounting for the lack of work on the part of his company, Capt. W. R. Kimball says: "We started in to practice in good shape and had expended a number of hundred rounds before June first, but had not, of course, at that early date, tried to make any qualification

scores, expecting to later. I soon received orders to forward to the quartermaster-general all ammunition, reloading tools, etc., and make requisition for the new .30 caliber ammunition, targets, pasters, etc. This I did promptly. In due course of time I received the targets, pasters, etc., and 1,000 rounds of reserve ammunition, expecting every express to get my season's allowance for range work. Not receiving it, I supposed it was not to be issued this season. We were all anxious to try the new rifles but did not feel able to buy the ammunition, as we had taken a number of practice marches before going to camp, being gone several days at a time, and this was quite expensive."

Co. D, Lewiston—This company, in common with the other Lewiston organizations, has suffered from lack of range facilities. During the early part of the season 1,955 rounds of ammunition were expended, but no practice was held for qualification. The company's three officers qualified with the revolver. By his appointment as battalion adjutant, Co. D lost the services of Lieut. Frank H. Greenan, so long its inspector of rifle practice. Lieut. Greenan served his company very faithfully and did the best of work with his men on the range, and while no longer a company officer he will continue to be a valuable rifleman for his regiment.

Co. E, Skowhegan—According to the score cards returned to this office, this company's range work for the past season was confined to one day (November 14) when 22 members reported for practice. Ammunition to the amount of 225 rounds was expended. No qualification practice was held, but in his letter at the conclusion of the season Capt. Fred C. Dunlap says: "The men are getting used to the new rifle, and I feel safe in saying that another season they will be found well up to the standard in rifle practice."

Co. F, Dover—The change of rifles interrupted a season's work well begun in this company, and other matters prevented the completion of the practice as planned. An inspection of the range during the season showed that while it was sufficiently strong for .45 caliber ammunition, it needed strengthening to render it safe for practice with the metal-cased bullet of the .30 caliber rifle. The rebuilding of the range will render it safe, though its sharp upward slope at the short range will tend to

reduce scores at that distance. On the longer ranges the level is correct, and its nearby location to the armory will prove a great incentive to frequent practice. The company has for several years maintained the reputation of producing good riflemen and another year will be likely to add to its laurels, for it has exceedingly promising material among its new members. The company expended during the season 2,545 rounds of ammunition and qualified twelve men as marksmen, one with a score of 44 and another with a score of 43, out of the possible 50.

Co. G, Bangor—This company had the season splendidly started but the exchange of rifles caused a break which could not be easily repaired in the latter days of the season when practice was resumed. Prior to the exchange of rifles 3,150 rounds of ammunition were expended and many high scores were made. The season's total expenditure was 4,705 rounds but the practice at the conclusion of the season was participated in by comparatively few men. Two of the company qualified as distinguished sharpshooters, three as sharpshooters and one as a first-class marksman. The three officers qualified with the revolver.

Co. H, Waterville—The present company is made up of new men, as a result of the disbandment of the old Co. H, under G. O. No. 5, A. G. O., State of Maine, February 12, 1903. Capt. Edward H. Besse has instituted a very thorough system of aiming and firing drills for armory work the present winter, which, if faithfully carried out, will put the company in good trim for the coming season. Very little range work was done this season and no qualification practice was attempted. The company is made up of a most excellent class of young men and they should do well on the range another season.

Co. I, Eastport—In the early part of the season this company expended 715 rounds of ammunition, but failed to continue practice after the exchange of rifles, and makes no report of qualification practice.

Co. K, Farmington—This company expended 1,422 rounds of ammunition, qualifying sixteen men as marksmen. Through a misunderstanding of conditions, the company did not receive its ammunition till very late in the season, and then did the best it could in the time that there was left. The interest which the company takes in range work is perhaps best shown by an

excerpt from a letter which Capt. Presson wrote to this office during the month of October. In this letter he says: "You see the time is drawing very close, and we have a very short space in which to practice. I assure you, however, that our apparent lack of interest in shooting has not been due to lack of enthusiasm, but the lack of .30 caliber cartridges." In a later letter Capt. Presson adds: "I am going to try and get the men out on the range and see what they do, yet I am fearful that they will not be able to do much this season. Next year I am going to guarantee you the best twelve men in the two regiments. I have some fine shots; men of good, sober habits; willing to work and having the time to give to practice."

Co. L, Houlton—The cards show that this company expended 465 rounds of ammunition prior to the exchange of rifles. No qualification practice was held.

Co. M, Augusta—This company, organized to take the place of the disbanded Machias company, had no rifles till the .30 caliber arms were issued. Owing to lack of range facilities, very little work was done beyond the 200 yard range and this in a somewhat desultory manner; but in spite of many drawbacks the season's showing is very good. One man qualified as a distinguished sharpshooter; three as first-class marksmen, and seventeen as marksmen. The company takes a great interest in rifle practice and will go to work in earnest as soon as a suitable range is provided. Several possible range sites have been inspected and the city stands ready to do its part as soon as a site is selected.

SIGNAL CORPS.

This organization reports an expenditure of 240 rounds of ammunition in May and June, with no practice after that date and no returns of qualification practice. The corps will hereafter be armed with the Colt's Army Revolver, caliber 38, and with an issue of 200 rounds of original revolver ammunition per man, every member should be a qualified marksman by the conclusion of the next season.

NAVAL RESERVE.

First Division, Portland—Under Lieut. (J. G.) E. G. Scully, as his own inspector of rifle practice, this division did a good

amount of work during the early part of the season before the Springfields were exchanged. From no organization in the Guard have the score cards come with greater promptness or been more carefully made out. Lieut. Scully has instituted one plan which is worthy the attention of every inspector of rifle practice in the Guard. On each card he notes the total expenditure of ammunition to date, thus keeping a close check on the work that is being done.

Second Division, Portland—This division has also done quite an amount of work, reporting an expenditure of 1,930 rounds, of which all save 215 rounds was fired from the Springfield. Ensign Franklin Q. Twitchell, commanding the division, reports the qualification of one man as a first-class marksman and four as marksmen. His inspector of rifle practice, Harold S. Davis, Q. M. 3d C., is a rifleman and a good clerical officer, and returns to this office have been prompt.

AMMUNITION.

Before the season opens on the range, the amount of ammunition to be issued to each organization must be settled so that each company commander will know just what he has to expend and thus secure full qualification. Since reloading tools are not issued for the .30 caliber ammunition, all ammunition issued will be fixed. The .30 caliber rifle ball cartridges cost \$28.00 per thousand as against \$18.50 per thousand for the .45 caliber cartridges. This increased cost will make a heavier draft on the State's allotment from the national government, but if the Guard is to do creditable work it must have a reasonable amount of ammunition. In the Regular Army the season's issue is 400 rounds per man and the Guard should not be asked to attempt qualification with less than 100 rounds per man.

The past season's expenditure has naturally been very erratic, but in line with former reports I submit the following tabulation:

RANGES.

The question of ranges is one of much importance just at present. Many ranges which were suitable for the Springfield are not safe for the new rifle. Some companies are without any range facilities whatever. The most urgent case is that of Lewiston where Co. I, of the First and Cos. B and D of the Second Infantry are wholly unprovided for. It will be necessary to provide a range for holding the State shooting encampment. The old range at Augusta is gone beyond repair and there is to-day, no range in the State with a sufficient number of targets to accommodate more than a battalion competition. During the spring or early summer, a suitable site must be selected and fitted with

a sufficient number of short and mid range targets. No site should be accepted which will not allow the placing of at least six third-class and a like number of second-class targets for simultaneous use, together with one or two first-class targets. This is the smallest number with which satisfactory work can be done, and the range site should be such that additional targets may be placed from time to time. The State should own its range, but if the funds for purchasing cannot be secured the coming spring I would suggest that the land be taken under a lease containing a provision for purchase and that the next legislature be asked to provide the necessary appropriation for its purchase and equipment. To reduce transportation charges to the minimum, the range should be located at some point between Brunswick and Waterville on the line of the railroad. Augusta is the most desirable place inasmuch as the State camp ground and the quartermaster's depot are there located.

A SYSTEM OF QUALIFICATION.

In the National Guard of Maine to-day, the paramount question in small arms practice is that of qualification. The past season's work has been done under the rules of 1902 which modified in some essentials the system put forth in 1898. The system of 1898 was a radical departure from former rules. Owing to the Spanish war, the system received no test in that year nor in the year following when the Guard was returning to its normal peace conditions. In 1900 the system was fairly tested and the results were very disappointing. Col. E. C. Farrington, in his report for that year as Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, said of these rules: "Their experience in the past season has proved beyond a doubt that some modification will need to be made in the methods now in force." In 1901 the system was somewhat changed and marked improvement resulted. In 1902 with no material change from the rules of 1901 the Guard showed still further improvement and did an excellent season's work. Nevertheless, it was apparent at all times that the Guard was not getting full credit for its work. The plan of dividing the range work into preliminary and qualification practice which was the fundamental principle of the

1898 system robbed many men of qualification standing which would have been theirs under the old system, or even under the systems generally prevalent in the Guard of other states.

The time which the National Guardsman is able to devote to target practice is for the most part so limited that he should be allowed the full benefit of all his range firing. Under the 1898 system a man must make certain scores at various ranges according to the class in which he wishes to qualify. These scores, known as "preliminaries," are in general nearly if not quite as high as are required for full qualification in other states. Having made these scores a man is permitted to attempt qualification in the presence of a commissioned officer. If he makes a required aggregate in a limited number of shots he is qualified in the class for which his preliminary scores entitled him to make the attempt. Failing to make the required aggregate, he is qualified in the class below to which his aggregate entitles him. But one attempt at qualification is allowed. It will be seen by this that where, under the rules governing practice in most states, a man having made required scores at the different ranges would be entered as qualified, the Maine rules further require that he should secure an aggregate on a given day.

The experience of four years has shown that many men perform preliminary practice and then neglect or are prevented from following it up with qualification practice. In consequence the company's returns may show a large expenditure of ammunition with a very small percentage of qualification. Where the marksman is limited to one attempt at qualification in a season he hesitates to qualify in one of the lower grades, hoping ere the close of the season to be able to secure the necessary preliminaries entitling him to attempt qualification in the higher grades. Failing to find time for this practice or failing to secure all of the necessary preliminaries, he does not qualify at all and so the percentage of qualification goes down as the expenditure of ammunition goes up. The past season has furnished a striking illustration of the evils which follow a division of the season into preliminary and qualification practice. Many companies did excellent work during the first part of the season before exchanging their Springfields for the new magazine rifles. But few men attempted qualification with the Springfield, hoping to

be able to do better work with the new rifle. The late issue of the .30 caliber rifles and the participation of the Guard in the war manœuvres at Portland made it impossible for the companies to resume their practice till the season was drawing to a close. It was found difficult to complete the work begun in the early summer and so far as the qualification returns show, the work with the springfield was entirely thrown away. Had the men been classified according to their scores they would appear as qualified marksmen. As it is, their work being wholly "preliminary," they cannot be mentioned in the qualification returns.

I think the foregoing will make it clear that the system of 1898 has failed to meet the requirements of the National Guard. It is apparent that the successful system of qualification for our State troops must be one which, to the largest possible extent, will permit the soldier to count for qualification his season's practice on the range. Qualification must also be progressive, so to speak. A man must not be limited to one attempt in a given grade. His qualification as a marksman early in the season, should not bar him from attempting later in the season, to qualify as a first-class marksman or sharpshooter.

This brings up the question of supervision or certification of scores made in practice. If a man's qualification is to be estimated on scores made at various times during the season, it is necessary that the scores should be properly vouched, since they become a matter of State record. The system of 1898 was founded upon the assumption that none save a commissioned officer's word was a sufficient guaranty. Previous to the adoption of that system, scores were accepted when signed by an officer, non-commissioned officer, or inspector of rifle practice, present at the time of firing. In Massachusetts the certification of an officer or non-commissioned officer is deemed sufficient and in a majority of the states similar systems obtain. In New Hampshire, where Major Fred O. Giddings has worked wonders in systematizing the state's practice, a non-commissioned officer's certification is accepted for scores made on the 200 and 300 yard ranges, but the presence of a commissioned officer is required at the mid and long ranges. In Pennsylvania the certification of the marksman and scorer is sufficient in the lower grades, but the score of a sharpshooter must be sworn to by the marksman

himself, the scorer and the marker before a field or staff officer or some person legally authorized to administer oaths.

My acquaintance with the National Guard of Maine leads me to believe that the word of a non-commissioned officer is to be relied upon. I feel that the officers of to-day can be trusted to the utmost and that when they were warrant officers they were still actuated by the same sense of honor. The men who wear the chevron to-day will wear the shoulder-strap tomorrow and it is not, to my mind, good logic that this change will make a man one whit more honest.

Therefore, I think we shall be taking no chances if we adopt a system of qualification which permits a marksman to count for qualification all scores made in the presence of an officer or non-commissioned officer. There is a homely expression to the effect that it doesn't strengthen the testimony of a liar to place him under oath. If an officer, a non-commissioned officer, or a private is bent upon making fraudulent returns, there is no way in which the State can prevent him under any ordinary system of qualification, but those who best know the Guard realize that the great majority will be honest in making their returns. Small arms practice, while a military duty in the Guard, is none the less sportsmanlike in its nature and when there is joined to the honor of a soldier, the honor of a true sportsman there results a combination in which dishonesty will play a very small part.

The matter of qualification has not been overlooked by the War Department in its work of reorganizing the militia. In February of the present year, there appeared from the office of Adjutant General of the Army, a memorandum outlining a course of small arms firing regulations for the use of the organized militia. This course, known as "Special Course C," followed shortly after the issuance of the revised firing regulations for the United States Army, which, in general form, it copies. This course prescribes the following qualification:

"The class in firing to which any officer or soldier belongs will be determined at the end of the practice season from the aggregate of the total of the best two full scores of five shots each (not necessarily consecutive) that he has made on the range, as follows:

"Fourth Class—All who have not fired.

"Third Class—All who report for practice and are unable to score 10 out of a possible 25 at 200 yards in any score, or who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made an aggregate of less than 67.

"Second Class—All who have fired two or more scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 67 out of a possible 150.

"First Class—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 83 out of possible 150.

"Marksmen—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 98 out of a possible 150.

"Sharpshooters—All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, 500, and 600 yards, and from the best two in each range have made a total of 160; and have fired two or more full scores, timed fire, at 200 yards (30 seconds firing interval in each score), and in the best two have made a total of 25; and have made one skirmish run of 20 shots, advancing from 600 to 200 yards; the total of all scores being not less than 235.

"Experts—All who have made the necessary total to qualify as sharpshooter and have fired two or more full scores at 800 and 1,000 yards and from the best two have made a total of 40 at 800, and 35 at 1,000 yards."

I have given "Special Course C" very careful consideration and think that in a modified form it may be adapted for the Guard of Maine. I fully recognize the importance of skirmish firing, but a great many of our ranges are ill-suited for skirmish runs under prescribed conditions. For this reason, I feel that we should be obliged to omit the skirmish firing, and owing to our limited issue of ammunition, it would also seem best to eliminate the timed fire scores. To offset this pruning of "Special Course C," I would suggest an increase in the scores required in the fixed distance firings. In a form modified somewhat as suggested, I think the Guard may with benefit adopt "Special Course C." It will be a step toward the unification of qualification which the War Department is endeavoring to secure under the new national militia law.

IN CONCLUSION.

The work of First Lieut. John J. Dooley, as inspector of rifle practice in the First Infantry, has been of great assistance to this department. Lieut. Dooley, who is the most efficient inspector of rifle practice in the history of the National Guard of Maine, has studied faithfully the new rifle. By his tireless energy he has done much to prepare not only the First Infantry, but all the State troops for a profitable season the coming year.

In the appendix will be found the qualification returns from the various organizations so far as they have been received at this office.

To the Riflemen of Maine, Greeting:

The second annual rifle meeting will be held on the city of Portland rifle range on Saturday, October 24, 1903, at which time the following competitions will take place:

THE GOVERNOR HILL TROPHY MATCH.

Open to teams of five from any headquarters, company, corps or division of the National Guard of the State of Maine, or any rifle club or shooting organization of the State; distances, 200 and 500 yards; rounds, seven at each distance, with one sighting shot at each distance; rifle, U. S. Magazine, cal. .30; ammunition, service; entrance fee, five dollars per team, post entry, ten dollars per team; targets, "A" elliptical at 200 yards and "B" elliptical at 500 yards. Prizes: Entrance money to be divided into three prizes for teams making highest aggregate score; to the National Guard team making the highest aggregate score the Governor Hill Trophy, presented by the Hon. John F. Hill of Augusta, to be shot for annually and to be held during the year by the team winning it; to the National Guard team making the second highest aggregate score, armory picture presented by Robert H. Knight, art dealer, Portland; to the competitor making the highest score at 200 yards, a lamp, presented by Oren Hooper's Sons, Portland; to the Portland member of the National Guard making the highest score at 200 yards, a silver cup, presented by J. A. Merrill & Co., jewelers, Portland; to the Portland or Westbrook member of the National Guard making the highest aggregate score at 500 yards, a gold clock, presented by Geo. T. Springer, jeweler, Portland; to the member of any rifle or shooting club not a member of the National Guard, making the highest aggregate score, a suit case presented by J. L. Brackett & Co., trunk dealers, Portland.

INDIVIDUAL MATCHES AT 600 YARDS.

Open to State; seven shots at 600 yards with one sighting shot; rifle and ammunition as prescribed in Governor Hill

Trophy Match; target, "B," elliptical; entry, 50 cents, post entry, \$1.00. Prizes: Money to be divided in three prizes. Additional first prize of 200 rounds of .30 caliber ammunition, presented by the Peters Cartridge Company of New York. Additional second prize of a fountain pen, presented by Anderson & Welch, stationers, Portland. Additional third prize of 100 rounds of .30 caliber ammunition, presented by the Peters Cartridge Company of New York. Fourth prize, case for Krag rifle, presented by Eastern Arms and Cycle Company, Portland.

INDIVIDUAL REVOLVER MATCH.

Open to any commissioned officer of the National Guard of Maine; distances, 30, 50, and 75 yards; one string of six shots at each distance, slow fire; revolver, as prescribed in State regulations and orders; ammunition, service, as issued; target "A," elliptical at all ranges; entry, 50 cents, post entry, \$1.00. Prizes: Money to be divided in three prizes for best aggregate scores. Additional first prize of an officer's uniform trunk presented by The M. C. Lilley & Co., Military Supply Co., Columbus, Ohio. To the officer making the highest score at 75 yards, a sweater, presented by Ira Clark & Co., clothiers, Portland. To the officer making the highest score at 50 yards, a pocket kodak camera, presented by H. E. Murdock, optician, Portland.

CONDITIONS.

The several competitions will be conducted under the rules and regulations recently adopted for the National Guard of this State, except as the same may be herein modified.

Entries, giving the names of members of teams competing for the Governor Hill Trophy Match, must be filed with Lieut. John J. Dooley, Inspector of Rifle Practice, First Infantry, Portland, Maine, not later than five days prior to the match, in order to enter under the five dollar fee clause. Post entries will be permitted, but the entrance fee in such cases will be ten dollars per team.

In the individual matches entries made not less than three days prior to the meeting will be accepted at the fee named in

the statement of matches, but post entries in each case will be one dollar.

Commanding officers of military companies and the president or secretary of any rifle club or shooting organization will certify that the members of the team representing them have been members of such company, club or organization for not less than thirty days prior to the day of meeting.

In matches calling for the use of the national military arm, ammunition will be supplied gratis by the State to teams representing National Guard organizations. •

**REPORT OF CAPT. DWIGHT E. AULTMAN,
ARTILLERY CORPS, U. S. A., INSPECTING OFFICER.**

WAR DEPARTMENT, ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE,

WASHINGTON, August 6, 1903.

The Adjutant General, State of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to communicate to you the following extract from the report of Capt. Dwight E. Aultman, Arty. Corps, of his inspection of the National Guard, State of Maine, from May 4 to June 10, 1903, inclusive:

“The companies were inspected at their home stations, commencing May 4, 1903, and ending June 16, 1903.

The National Guard of Maine was inspected in August, 1902, by Capt. S. A. Cloman, 23d Infantry, during the annual encampment, and an exhaustive report was made by him of the organization and state of the guard at that time.

The defects pointed out in his report have been to a certain extent corrected.

His report covered the organization, equipment and instruction of the guard, which are practically the same at the present time.

An inspection was also made during the year by Brigadier General Frank L. Hoyt, Inspector General, State of Maine.

PERSONNEL.—OFFICERS.

The officers were, with few exceptions, intelligent and capable men, earnest in the performance of their duties and eager to receive and adopt any new ideas which would improve their commands.

The company officers are selected by the ballots of the members of their companies, and the field officers are selected by the ballots of the company officers. These elections are usually confirmed after an examination of the candidates by a State board.

The system has many defects, some of which are fatal to efficiency.

1. The most capable men are not always elected. The man who can play the good fellow to the best advantage stands the best chance of being elected.

2. An officer who is desirous of re-election may be deterred from a strict performance of his duty by the fear of making enemies in the company.

3. Companies frequently divide into cliques over the election of their officers, which destroy the harmony and unity of the organization. Internal jealousies are not infrequent.

4. Officers are drawn into such personal relations with their men that true discipline is an impossibility.

5. The predominance of a rough element in a company and the election of officers by it, will often drive all others from the company. Due to this fact and the consequent reputation acquired, one company has been recently disbanded.

I have discussed this question with inspector general of the State and with a majority of the line officers. With a very few exceptions, they are opposed to the elective system and favor appointments after some system of competitive examination.

INSTRUCTION.

The officers of each regiment are required to assemble twice a year, under the State law, for instructions.

This usually means one meeting with two or three sessions. As far as it extends, these meetings seem to be productive of good results, but they do not go far enough.

I would suggest the adoption of a correspondence course of instruction, similar to many now existing in scientific and commercial lines, to remedy the defects of the present system and amplify the instruction.

The necessity of an officer of the regular service as a permanent instructor is apparent.

The knowledge of the text of the drill regulations is usually good, but the principles on which the regulations are based, especially the chapters on extended order and battle formation, seem not to be well understood, and, in many cases not understood at all. Most of the officers know what an advanced guard or an outpost is, but, as to the efficient handling of them, there is very little idea.

Guard duty and the authorized manual of guard, are I believe fairly well understood.

The state system of administration is simple and well adapted to its purpose and I am informed by the inspector general of the State that the records are generally very well kept.

ENLISTED MEN.

The standard of the enlisted men of the guard is comparatively high. The men are as a rule, good, sturdy, intelligent workmen who can easily be made into good soldiers.

Their enlistment is for three years, but the proportion who served out their full term is not large.

It appears that, after the annual encampment, interest lapses for a time and quite a large percentage of the men cease to attend drills regularly. In the case of continued non-attendance the captains usually procure the discharge of the absentees.

This is a mistake; the men should be required to fulfill their contract with the State.

It thus happens that, during the winter, men are continually being discharged but no new enlistments take place until the spring, when the companies are filled up with recruits, preparatory to going into the annual camp during the summer.

This was the case during my inspection, the companies ranging from ten to fifty per cent of recruits.

There is no law which can enforce the attendance of the men at drills, therefore the captain of the company is powerless in the matter, except that he can procure the discharge of the absentees.

It is recommended that the men be paid a small sum for attendance, that absence be made the subject of forfeiture or fine and that a discharge without honor or a dishonorable discharge should carry with it such social odium and forfeiture of civil rights that all men who enlist would be willing to serve their entire enlistments. Discharges before the expiration of the term of service should be given only for cogent reasons.

The standard of intelligence is, in many of the companies, high. Young men of good education and high social position are frequently found in the ranks.

UNIFORMS.

The uniforms are the property of the State and remain so until worn out and condemned. The guard is uniformed in blue undress and khaki similar to that now used in the regular army. The knives, forks, spoons, tin cups, ponchos and shelter tents are not issued to the companies but are stored ready for issue at the State capitol.

A different system of uniforming the guard is recommended.

At present, if a man is discharged, his uniforms are passed to his successor in ranks. This is undesirable and I have been informed by a number of company officers that there are many desirable men who would enlist in the National Guard if a new uniform were provided, but who do not care to wear clothing that has been worn by others.

The men were, however, very neat in appearance as a general rule.

ARMS.

The Springfield rifle, cal. 45, with the rod bayonet is still used. The arms were, with a few exceptions, in serviceable condition, but they were not clean in the best of the companies, while in many they were very dirty.

The men should be taught how to clean and care for their arms.

EQUIPMENT.

The equipment is practically the same as that of the regular army. The knives, forks, spoons, tin cups, ponchos and shelter tents are not issued to the companies but are stored ready for issue at the State capitol.

The same is true of the equipage, which was inspected at the store houses at Augusta.

A sufficient amount of equipment and camp equipage is on hand to provide for the present authorized strength of three officers and forty-six men per company.

ARMORIES.

With the exception of the armory at Portland, which is a very good one, no company in the State can be said to have an armory large enough to drill in either close or extended order.

Moreover, the halls used are not in any way adapted for use as drill halls. They are, in many cases less than fifty feet in their largest dimension.

The armories are provided by the municipalities, under the State law, a rental of \$100 per year per company being paid to the municipality by the State. The rental is far too small to secure adequate accommodations and the towns themselves are usually unwilling to supplement it by a sufficient amount to procure better.

The remedy for this is the construction of adequate armories by the State.

DRILL.

The drill was, in numerous cases, fair in close order. Extended order has been taught but little and then only the rudiments.

As a general rule, there is far too little attention paid to the school of the soldier and squad. Recruits are not sufficiently instructed before being taken into the companies. The first desire of a man after enlisting seems to be to get a rifle in his hands and get into the rank of the company.

The instruction is not systematic. The tendency is generally to plunge into the more complicated movements of the company before the simpler ones involved are perfectly learned.

In the extended order, only a few of the companies could form line of squads and skirmishers, and the majority had limited themselves to the movements of the squad.

The principles of the extended order did not seem to be understood.

The instruction and drill of the companies could be much improved if a schedule of the instruction to be given through the year were prepared for the whole guard.

The company officers are efficient but they need a guide to direct their efforts systematically.

TARGET PRACTICE.

The season extends throughout the year closing October 31st. The ammunition allowance is liberal.

No stated assemblies are had for target practice; the men are taken individually to the range, at convenient times, to fire.

A company inspector, who is a well instructed man in the firing regulations and who may be an officer or enlisted man, is detailed to conduct the practice of each company.

He instructs all the men under the supervision of the captain. From investigation I do not think the sighting, aiming and position drills are given enough attention, though the results of the practice are generally good.

There is no provision for gallery practice and none is had, except in a few cases, where a sub-caliber tube is fixed in a Springfield rifle or practice is held with a 22 caliber target rifle.

The inspector general of the State accompanied me and was of very great assistance in the inspection, due to his complete knowledge of the conditions prevailing in the guard.

The adjutant general of the State assisted me in every way possible.

Throughout the guard the courtesy of the officers was a noticeable feature. A spirit of progress pervades the whole organization and the officers seemed, almost without exception, to be desirous of learning all that might assist them in their work and bringing their commands to the highest state of efficiency."

REPORT TO THE SECRETARY OF WAR.

AUGUSTA, December 1, 1903.

To the Honorable Secretary of War, Washington, D. C.:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of operations of the organized militia of the State of Maine as required by act of Congress approved January 21, 1903, covering the period ending August 31, 1903.

On January 22d, in compliance with the provisions of the militia law of this State, a general inspection of the several companies and corps of the National Guard of the State of Maine, at their home stations, was ordered. March 23d an invitation was received from the honorable secretary of war, through the adjutant general of the United States army, for the infantry organizations of this State to participate in the combined maneuvers between the army and navy to be held in the artillery district of Portland, Maine, from August 22d to 29th inclusive, which invitation was accepted on behalf of the National Guard by His Excellency, John F. Hill, Governor of Maine.

In compliance with General Orders No. 15, Headquarters of the Department of the East, June 25, 1903, a copy of which is enclosed, the several companies and corps of the land forces of the National Guard of the State left their home stations on the morning of Friday, August 21st, for Portland, Maine, and upon their arrival reported to the commanding officer of the artillery district of Portland and proceeded to the stations assigned as per Special Orders No. 105, artillery district of Portland, Fort Preble, Maine, August 16, 1903, a copy of which is enclosed.

The land forces of the National Guard of the State of Maine consist of two regiments of infantry, one signal corps and one ambulance corps, which reported with a total strength of 101 commissioned officers and 1,131 enlisted men. The strength of the several organizations was as follows:

First Regiment Infantry, 49 commissioned officers, 540 enlisted men.

Second Regiment Infantry, 50 commissioned officers, 558 enlisted men.

Signal Corps, 1 commissioned officer, 17 enlisted men.

Ambulance Corps, 1 commissioned officer, 16 enlisted men.

At the close of the maneuvers, August 29th, the organizations of the National Guard of this State returned to their several home stations.

HEADQUARTERS FIRST REGIMENT INFANTRY,
NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE,
BIDDEFORD, October 30, 1903.

To the Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the part taken by the First Regiment Infantry, in the combined Army and Navy Maneuvers at Portland, August 22-29, inclusive, in compliance with General Orders Nos. 20 and 22, A. G. O., c. s.

The regiment was concentrated at Portland on Friday, August 21st, and was conveyed to the several stations as indicated by Special Orders No. 105, Headquarters Artillery District of Portland, as follows:

The colonel commanding, headquarters, staff, Maj. John Bird and Companies G, H, I and M at Fort Preble; Lieut. Col. Charles Collins, Maj. William O. Peterson and Companies C, D, F and K at Fort Williams; Maj. Frank B. W. Welch and Companies E and L at Two Lights, Companies A and B at Silver Spring.

All tentage and camp equipage having been forwarded in advance to the several stations, everything was in readiness and in a comparatively short time after the troops arrived tents were pitched and the regular routine of camp duty was established. The work of preparing the camp, considering the fact that the men were practically without experience, was remarkably well performed.

Regimental Hospital was established at Fort Williams and was located in a large stone building known as the Goddard House, which was admirably adapted for the purpose and made an ideal

field hospital. Maj. Bial F. Bradbury, surgeon, was in charge, assisted by Lieut. Gilbert M. Elliott. Capt. James B. O'Neill, assistant surgeon, was retained at the headquarters (Fort Preble) and Sergt. Daniel W. Wentworth of Company F, and Priv. Harry R. Farris of Co. D, both practicing physicians, were detailed as acting hospital stewards and assigned to duty at Silver Spring and Two Lights respectively. A detachment of the Ambulance Corps, having been assigned to this regiment for duty, it was disposed of as follows: Lieut. Jumper with seven men and the ambulance at Fort Williams and one man at each of the other stations. No serious case of sickness was reported during the entire tour of duty, which, considering the strenuous nature of the work performed and exposure to all kinds of weather, speaks well for the splendid physical condition of the regiment.

The grounds selected for the several camps, while not particularly desirable, were fairly well adapted for the purpose and as a whole were very satisfactory.

Rations were furnished by the Government and were found ample and of good quality. In addition to the above the State presented each company commander with a sum of money to be expended for extra rations which enabled the troops to enjoy many delicacies not usually included in the army ration. Some little inconvenience and hardship was experienced by the detachment at Two Lights in not receiving a sufficient quantity of rations for the first two or three days. The trouble I believe was largely due to inexperience in handling the army rations and also in properly preparing the necessary reports and returns upon which the allowance of rations is based.

By the provisions of General Orders No. 28, Headquarters Post Commander, being placed in command of the auxiliary defences of Fort Preble, I was obliged to devote my entire attention to that duty and while I kept in constant touch and communication with that part of my regiment stationed at Fort Williams, Two Lights and Silver Spring, the immediate command of those detachments was assumed by Lieut. Col. Collins at Fort Williams, and by Maj. Welch at Two Lights and Silver Spring. A detailed report by these officers is attached and forms a part of this report.

At Fort Preble the regular routine duties were established immediately upon arrival of troops, company drills were held each day until Tuesday, the 25th, from 8.00 to 10.00 A. M. and 1.30 to 3.30 P. M. Battalion drills were found impracticable on account of the large number of men detailed on special duty. Sunday at retreat a battalion parade was held in the large field opposite the camp ground. Commencing Tuesday, Company I was detailed for outpost duty at Meeting House Hill, and Company M at the cable station (Bachelder cottage) on Loveitt's Heights; these companies remained on duty at the above named stations until relieved on Saturday, August 29th. Company G furnished the camp guard, while Company H was available for picket, outpost, patrol and other special duties, so that the entire force was practically on continuous guard duty from Tuesday morning until Saturday at noon.

At 12.15 A. M. Wednesday, an alarm was given and the post called to arms, upon the appearance of the fleet off Cushing's Island, and from that time until daylight Saturday the men were practically without rest. Owing to the large amount of ground to be covered with the small force available, every man was obliged to be on duty all the time both day and night, and I am pleased to report that both officers and men conducted themselves in a soldierly manner and performed the many difficult duties called for in a thorough and painstaking manner, showing them to be not only interested in the work but anxious to make the most of the valuable experiences of their first tour of duty with the regulars.

Although kept constantly on the alert and frequently called to arms at all hours of the night and day, nothing of importance transpired until 8.30 A. M. Friday, the 28th, when information was received at post headquarters that a force consisting of fifty boat loads of bluejackets and marines, variously estimated as from 1,800 to 3,000 men, had landed on the lower Cape shore near Richmond's Island and were pushing forward overland to attack Fort Preble. I immediately ordered part of the movable armament from Fort Preble, consisting of one 12-pounder brass field piece and one gatling gun placed in position on Prospect Hill known as Redoubt A, and with Companies B and I of the First Mass. H. A. together with Company H and all of Company

G (camp guard) not actually on post, manned the entrenchments overlooking Willard Beach, the beach east of Cushing's Point and all the land approaches to Fort Preble. At night the position was further strengthened by the 55th, 75th, 95th and 107th Companies of the Coast Artillery under command of Capt. E. J. Wallace. Scouting parties were sent out and a strict watch was maintained during the night, the entire force remaining in the entrenchments until daylight Saturday, when it was learned that the attacking party had returned to the ships.

At 12.00 o'clock noon on Saturday, the 29th, by Special Orders No. 116, Headquarters Artillery District of Portland, the regiment was relieved from further duty in the district and at once proceeded to strike tents and prepare for the return to their home stations, thus closing a tour of duty, which, while the work performed was most arduous and difficult, has, I feel sure, been of great benefit to the regiment in the knowledge attained by practical experience under conditions as nearly approaching a state of actual warfare as could possibly be obtained.

I desire to express at this time my appreciation of the conduct of both officers and men of my command, who rendered cheerfully and willingly all duties called upon to perform. Nearly every man being on continuous duty both day and night with very little rest and practically no sleep for over ninety-six hours, there was not a murmur of complaint, in fact both officers and men were enthusiastic in their endeavors to perform the important work entrusted to them in a satisfactory manner, and anxious to derive the benefit and profit by the practical experience gained by contact with the trained forces of the regular army.

My relations with the officers of the army during the maneuvers were most cordial and pleasant and I found each and every one of them not only willing but anxious to impart instruction, and in every way endeavoring to make our tour of duty with them both pleasant and profitable.

To the Adjutant, 1st Reg't Inf'y, N. G. S. M., Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—In accordance with the request of the Adjutant General through you as per your letter to me of Nov. 4, 1903, I have the honor to transmit the following as the report of the duty, etc., of that part of the National Guard, State of Maine, stationed at Fort Williams during the army and navy maneuvers, August 22-29, 1903.

By Par. 4, Confidential Series, No. 1, H. Q. Artillery District of Portland, a copy of which is attached, there were assigned to Fort Williams, Lt. Col. Chas. Collins, Major W. O. Peterson, and four companies (C, D, K and L) 1st Reg't Inf'y, N. G. S. M. In addition thereto by G. O. No. 2, H. Q., 1st Inf'y, N. G. S. M., Major B. F. Bradbury, surgeon, Lieut. G. M. Elliott, assistant surgeon, Lieut. H. R. Eaton, battalion adjutant, Sergt. Major Porter, Hospital Steward Cragin, and Lieut. C. A. Jumper with one-half of Ambulance Corps and the ambulance were also assigned to duty at this post; all officers and organizations reporting for duty at this post early Friday afternoon, August 21, 1903. The command was assigned to the extreme northerly part of the reservation in front of the Goddard mansion for its camping ground, and immediately on arrival went to work to make camp. The site was admirable, although a few trees prevented the laying out of the camp with regular width of streets. On reporting to Major W. P. Duvall, commanding Fort Williams, we were assigned as a regular part of the garrison during the period of maneuvers.

Special instructions were given in letter addressed "The Commanding Officer, Battalion of Maine National Guard, Fort Williams," dated August 20, 1903, copy of which is attached to this report; general instructions, rules, and regulations with hours of service and roll call for the government of the post as per Special Orders No. 100, Circulars No. 19 and 20, and General Orders No. 17, and changed for period of maneuvers by General Orders Nos. 21, 22 and 23, with the Special Orders for Sentinels. Copies of each are herewith attached as part of this report and will show to what rules, regulations, and duties, we were sub-

ject. Guard was mounted shortly after our arrival in camp and then commenced one of the best and most instructive duties that the Guard was ever called upon to perform.

For guard duty, two officers were detailed, a captain as officer of the day and a lieutenant, commander of the guard, and at first eighteen enlisted men, viz: two sergeants, three corporals, twelve privates, and one musician, were detailed, although the number varied from time to time as to the exigencies of the service. On Saturday, August 22d, in addition to the weekly inspection conducted by Major W. O. Peterson, drills were held. On Monday A. M., the battalion was marched to Pond Cove and the officers were shown the nature and extent of the work to be done by our companies at this point. In the afternoon, the officers and non-commissioned officers were taken over the ground at Fort Williams and shown the position of the simulated infantry intrenchments, eleven in number, points of advantage and defence. After this drills were held in extended order. Owing to heavy rain, no work was done on Tuesday. In addition to the above, details were made and the woods opposite the reservation and adjacent territory were explored and regular reports were made. For the purpose of a better defence of the post and the obtaining of the exact range from the various infantry intrenchments, Lieut. Wilson, Co. D, was detailed as acting engineer officer, and with details from the battalion, obtained and had posted at each intrenchment the various points from which an attack might be made with the distance in yards to such points. This brings us up to the period of the actual hostilities.

In this period, I will first outline the work from G. O. No. 1, Confidential Series, H. Q., A. D. of Portland: 1st. The lieutenant colonel is charged with the supervision of the scouting from Fort Williams to Two Lights. 2d. The manning of the intrenchments at Fort Williams. 3d. To furnish the guard for the searchlight at Delano Park. 4th. To establish a lookout at Maiden Cove and at Ship Cove. 5th. To patrol the roads from Pond Cove and toward Fort Preble connecting with their patrols. 6th. At night or during a fog, to send one company for duty at Pond Cove. We were in fact to be the auxiliary defence of the artillery at Fort Williams. Special instructions

for our work are given in G. O. No. 21, that is attached to this report. See Par. 2 of Art. 1. As the strength of our force would not furnish enough men for this work, to carry out the scheme of defence, the following plan was adopted: to detail for duty in the reservation of any special duty that might arise, two companies, the other two being detailed for the outside work as follows: one company to Pond Cove, the other company to furnish for Delano Park, one officer and eighteen men; at Maiden Cove, one non-commissioned officer and four privates; at Ship Cove, one non-commissioned officer and four privates, and three patrols of three men each, one to connect with Fort Preble patrol at what is known as the five-cent limit, one in front of reservation, and the other in front of Delano Park, besides furnishing the guard at the large gate to the north of the Thompson building. The company at Pond Cove besides acting as a support, had to maintain a line of sentinels along the cable furnishing power for the light, a distance of some 1,300 feet, guard the power house and furnish patrols from Pond Cove to Delano Park. For the purpose of instruction and in order that all should have duty in the different work and places, details were made as follows:

To Pond Cove:

Tuesday night, Co. K.
Wednesday night, Co. C.
Thursday night, Co. D.
Friday night, Co. F.

To Delano Park and patrol duty:

Tuesday, Co. D.
Wednesday, Co. F.
Thursday, Co. K.
Friday, Co. C.

The captain of the company detailed for this work acted as officer of the day, but was also in charge of the patrol and guard duty of his company. This gave for duty in the reservation and for sudden calls on Tuesday night, Cos. C and F; Wednesday night, Cos. D and K; Thursday night, Cos. C and F; Friday night, Cos. D and K; supplemented in the day time by the return of the company from duty at Pond Cove. Our camp guard was

reduced to the minimum to allow each company nearly its full strength.

For the work of the companies outside of the reservation, on receipt of the request on Nov. 5th, for this report, I immediately wrote the commanders of each infantry organization requesting a report and I have annexed them as part of my report.

As to the work that came under my personal supervision, beginning Tuesday at midnight, I will note the following as the most prominent. From shortly after the beginning of hostilities to 5.30 A. M. Wednesday it was one continual alarm and the assembly of the two companies, first for one duty, then another, and no sooner dismissed than called again. On the call for a company to support Battery Blair, C Company was detailed and acted as a support for nearly two hours and then relieved only to go to the relief of Jordan's Point. A message was received at 5.30 A. M. Wednesday, at the Five Commanders Station that a landing was being effected at Jordan's Point and calling for reinforcements. As only Cos. C and F were available, these two companies under the command of the lieutenant colonel (Major Peterson having met with quite a severe accident some two hours earlier that incapacitated him from duty during the entire forenoon), were formed and were under way inside of ten minutes. As the landing was not made, a mounted orderly was sent from Silver Spring to intercept our march. When intercepted, we had covered over two miles, so nothing remained but for us to return to our camp. For the companies in camp nothing particular occurred except formations for the various alarms and occasionally the manning of the intrenchments, until Friday morning when the landing at the Two Lights was made. For several hours the entire garrison, as infantry, reinforced by part of the field artillery from Silver Spring, occupied the road and grounds in front of the reservation awaiting an attack. Our battalion was deployed as follows: One platoon of Co. K at Delano Park as the regular guard, who were later relieved and ordered to patrol in the woods opposite; Co. D, having returned from Pond Cove, occupied the intrenchments on north side of the reservation; part of Co. F, under Capt. Bennett, as a support to the field artillery on the extreme southerly side of the post. With them were posted as infantry, part of the regular garrison,

all under command of Major Peterson. The lieutenant colonel with some forty odd men from the battalion, under Lieut. Wilson, K Company, went through the woods to the middle road to attack in case the landing party should proceed that way to Fort Preble. The other officers and men were all engaged, some in patrolling woods, manning intrenchments, and in the road in line of skirmishers. The enemy retiring to the ships, recall was sounded shortly after one o'clock and this ended the most exciting period of the whole duty, but no firing was done as the enemy did not come within three or four miles of our position.

All were held in readiness during most of the afternoon, and as reports from civilians gave an idea that part of the landing party was still on shore and to guard against any surprise during Friday night and early Saturday, we were ordered to detail a company for duty in front of the reservation, to maintain a chain of sentinels and patrol the edge of the woods. Co. D took the detail and left camp at nine o'clock, returning to camp after daylight. Saturday was a day of quietness from alarms and all went to work preparing to break camp.

Camp was broken shortly after noon, tents and baggage packed, everything ready to leave for home stations, the grounds thoroughly policed. By orders, Cos. C and K left camp at 4.30, Co. F at 5.30, and Co. D at 6.30 for their home stations, bringing to an end a successful tour of duty.

In considering the tour of duty as a whole, I wish to note on the following condition of camp, while I should prefer that all comment either in criticism or praise of the work done by that part of the National Guard stationed at Fort Williams, be by those officers of the regular army, under whose eye we were, still not knowing but what they might expect the ideal National Guardsman, and not realize our shortcomings, the many drawbacks that a captain has to encounter in maintaining his command, and the fact that more than a majority of those in camp were men of less than six months service, I desire to report the work of all exceeded my expectations. Guard duty in camp was better performed as a whole than what I have seen in the last two camps at Augusta, and a detail as the supervisor of guard duty in the camps of the 1st Regiment in 1901 and 1902, gives to me the opportunity of comparison, not alone in the general knowl-

edge of their duties, but in saluting, challenging, and general appearance of the men were of the best, and in that great essential to a soldier, military courtesy, a great improvement was shown over former years. Particular attention was given to police duty, not alone at fatigue call, but at all times, care was used to keep the camp clean and latrines well covered. Through our patrols, we were able to keep in touch with those of Fort Preble and with ours to Pond Cove. This part of this duty could not be better, but as patrolling was entirely new for the men, and they being under considerable responsibility, in some cases as in challenging, etc., small errors were made, but I believe this duty to have been exceedingly well performed when everything is considered.

By permission of the commanding officer at Fort Williams, we were allowed the parlor of the old Goddard mansion for a hospital ward and a smaller room for the dispensary, giving the medical department quarters that could not be surpassed. For the health of the command, I refer to the report of the surgeon that has been made to Col. Kendall commanding the regiment.

The attendance was exceedingly gratifying, there being but a few absentees in the battalion. As consolidated morning reports were rendered each day to regimental headquarters, I will not give herewith the total present and absent each day.

Visits were made to our camp by His Excellency, Gov. Hill and staff, Col. Kendall and staff, Gen. Chaffee, U. S. A., and Col. Garlington of the Inspector General's Department, U. S. A., but in no case were any honors paid. Col. Stickney of the Engineer Corps, a member of the Fortification Board, made an official inspection of the line of infantry intrenchments, noted both the points of attack and defence, besides asking for general information of our command.

In regard to rations, not the least complaint came to my notice from any of the captains, either as to supply or quality.

Associated with us as part of the garrison of the fort temporarily, although acting as artillery men, were the 1st Battalion of the 1st Mass. Heavy Artillery, M. V. M. Their camp was on the low point of land near the main entrance to the harbor and lay below our site. Standing on the outlook back of the Goddard mansion, one could not help contrasting the two volun-

teer camps. Massachusetts, to each of its tents had board floors and bed sacks for the men, and temporary kitchen; while Maine was without these, what some might call camp luxuries, it being the policy of the State to have the men "rough it," but during the rain on Tuesday, Capt. Nash of D Company was authorized by the Adjutant General to purchase lumber for shelter to the kitchens. This proved to be a great advantage for the cooks during the remainder of our tour of duty. While during our stay, no bad effects were noticed in the health of the men by sleeping on the ground, still I am of the opinion that while our stay in camp is short and for most of our men the out-door life is a complete change, the more liberal policy of floors and bed sacks is the best, and lessens the risk of liability to illness on the return to their home stations, besides being an object lesson to the soldier that his welfare is looked after and serving also as an encouragement for his continuing in the service. With our captains, it is not so much a question of getting men as it is in keeping them through at least one enlistment. In observing at this camp many cases of ill-fitting uniforms on a great many of the new men, I could not but believe that some scheme of an allowance to each company for the altering of uniforms so as to insure a good-fitting blouse and the replacing of many of the well-worn trousers, would certainly be an incentive and a great help in keeping the recruit, at least, it would certainly add to personal appearance.

The relations of our command with those of the United States and Massachusetts Artillery were most pleasant. To Major Duvall, the post commander, and the adjutant, Lieut. Smith, we are most indebted; always willing to assist, and make our duties plain; with every officer of the garrison and any of the enlisted men with whom we came in contact, it was the same courteous treatment and willingness to be of service, which certainly does much toward bringing together the regular army and National Guardsmen, each, through it, more clearly understanding the other.

In conclusion, I desire to extend my thanks to Major Peterson, commanding the battalion, for his efficient aid and help in making this a successful tour; to the surgeons, Major Bradbury and Lieut. Elliott, and the ambulance officer, Lieut. Jumper,

always ready and waiting for any duty that might arise; the battalion staff; to all the line officers for the eagerness and willingness for all duty of whatever nature; to the enlisted men, obeying every call in the quickest time possible, no shirking or complaining, only anxious to do their part. Never was more loyal support accorded to a commanding officer than to me at Fort Williams, and if our work meets the commendation of the United States officers, the honor of it belongs to the unity of action between the officers and enlisted men, each with only one idea and that to do the work assigned to the best of their ability so that it should reflect credit on the State they represented, and to the National Guard of which they were a part.

With the hope that again we shall be called upon to participate in maneuvers with the United States forces, I have the honor to remain,

SIR:—I have the honor to render a report of the tour of duty of Company C, First Infantry, N. G. S. M., from August 21st to August 29th, 1903, inclusive, in compliance with orders of Nov. 8, 1903.

In accordance with G. O. No. 20, A. G. O., c. s., Company C assembled at the home station Friday, August 21, 1903, composed as follows:

The officers and forty-four enlisted men for duty, one sick, one absent with leave, and one absent without leave. The company proceeded to Portland and reported to the adjutant at Railroad wharf and was assigned to duty with First Battalion under command of Major W. O. Peterson at Fort Williams.

August 21st, P. M. Assisted in establishing battalion camp and in the transportation of baggage, building kitchens and usual camp duties. Guard mount, 4.30 P. M.

August 22d. Usual camp routine consisting of guard mount, drills, etc.

August 23d. Sunday. All drills and ceremonies omitted.

August 24th. Usual camp routine, drills, guard mount, etc.

August 25th. Entire day spent in preparations for maneuvers which were to begin at twelve o'clock midnight. Furnished special detail of four men and corporal to erect signs on intrenchments showing the different ranges, etc. Officers and non-commissioned officers taken over the reservation to all the different intrenchments and batteries to familiarize themselves with their location and defences. Special detail of Sergt. Russell, Corp. Cummings and Corp. Sleeper to draw map of roads and country between Fort Williams and Pond Cove. Special detail for the week, Priv. Fred M. Hunt as orderly at Major Duvall's headquarters. Capt. H. P. Carver ordered to report at Fort Preble at 2 P. M. daily as judge advocate.

August 26th. 12.15 A. M. Company ordered to support Battery Blair against landing party. Company proceeded to southern part of reservation near Portland Headlight and was on duty at this point until six A. M. at which time we were ordered to proceed with Company F under command of Lieut. Col. Collins to Twin Lights to support Maj. Welch's battalion and Col. Anderson's battery against reported landing. Command proceeded to Silver Springs, Company C forming advance guard, at which point we were met by an orderly from Col. Anderson with instructions to return to Fort Williams as no landing had been effected. Reported at Fort Williams about ten A. M. Acted as camp guard until four P. M. when the company was ordered to Pond Cove to relieve Company K commanded by Capt. W. C. Goodwin. This tour of duty covered a period of sixteen hours. We were instructed to protect Pond Cove search light and power station situated about five hundred yards from the light and to send patrols from Pond Cove to Fort Williams every hour, connecting with patrols from Twin Light, Silver Spring, Fort Williams and Fort Preble to co-operate with a sergeant and ten men in command of rapid fire gun against any landing parties at Pond Cove or Zeb's Cove. Owing to number of points to be covered, officers and men were on duty for sixteen consecutive hours. During the night a special patrol

to Zeb's Cove captured three prisoners about 11.30 P. M. near the entrance to cove where they had built a large fire. Company reported at Fort Williams at eight A. M. Thursday morning.

August 27th. Formed camp guard for twenty-four hours, reporting to all calls and in readiness to man intrenchments within the reservation.

August 28th. 8 A. M. Sergt. Russell and seven men detailed to man entrenchments No. 7. Company ordered to do advance skirmish duty through the woods in the direction of Middle road and Pond Cove. Sergt. Russell and seven men taken from intrenchments No. 7 at ten A. M. and sent on special duty as skirmishers towards Silver Springs. Entire command recalled at three P. M. 4 P. M. first platoon under command of Lieut. Palmer detailed for duty at Delano Park search light and for patrol duty on main road and cross roads within a radius of three miles. Second platoon under command of Lieut. Carver detailed to cover Ship's Cove, Maiden Cove and patrol from Fort Williams in the direction of Fort Preble. Capt Carver detailed to command the camp guard in case of attack. The details under command of Lieuts. Palmer and Carver were compelled to cover so many points that the officers and men were on duty continually for seventeen hours. Company reported at camp at nine A. M.

August 29th. Entire company at work striking camp and policing quarters until twelve o'clock M. Broke camp at two P. M. and proceeded to home station arriving at Auburn at eight P. M.

This report cannot convey an idea of the duty performed. Officers and men were called upon to work almost continually from twelve o'clock Tuesday night until twelve M. Saturday, August 29th. The men cheerfully responded to all calls for duty. Non-commissioned officers and men tried hard to do their work in a satisfactory manner. During the tour of duty but one man was confined to the hospital and this was for only a short time on account of a severe sprain. Too much praise cannot be given Q. M. S. Delbert S. Woodward and Cook Perley Webber for their efficient services in their respective departments. The spirit and cheerfulness of the men was due in a great meas-

ure to their untiring efforts at all times of day and night. The non-commissioned officers worked as a unit and I desire in this report to express my gratitude for their close attention to duty.

SIR:—I have the honor to report the following as the special duty of my command and parts thereof.

Monday, August 24th. Lieut. George A. Wilson was detailed on special duty as engineer of intrenchments, from 12 M. to 6 P. M. August 25th. Sergt. C. A. Marston was also detailed with him. Pvt. H. R. Farris was detailed as acting hospital steward at Silver Spring for entire tour of duty, S. O. No. 18.

August 25th. 6 P. M. Company was detailed to patrol and re-enforce as follows: Detachment of two squads under command of Lieut. George A. Wilson at Delano Park to re-enforce search light and patrol park and road leading past Fort Williams to southerly limit of fort reservation. Detachment under Lieut. F. A. Hayden to guard gate leading to camp and patrol road past Fort Williams from southerly limit of fort reservation to five cent limit, so called, on road leading to Fort Preble. Detachment of one sergeant and six men to patrol Maiden Cove; detachment of one sergeant and three men to patrol Ship Cove.

Communication was established with Fort Preble and Pond Cove within one hour of establishing patrol and report received every half hour from both points. Everyone was challenged and examined by patrol after 9 P. M. Everything was quiet, except two or three false alarms, throughout the entire night. Lieut. Wilson with his detachment was relieved at 3.30 P. M. August 26th and returned to camp. Balance of company was relieved at 7 A. M. same date.

August 26th. At about 11 P. M. company was ordered into intrenchments in rear of Fort Williams by a general alarm, where they remained for about one hour until it was discovered to be a false alarm.

August 27th. At 5 P. M. company marched out to Pond Cove arriving there about 5.30 P. M. where the company was posted as follows: Lieut. Hayden with detachment of about eight men was stationed at the power house behind assimilated intrenchments. Lieut. Wilson with detachment of eight men did escort duty from Pond Cove to Fort Williams also having charge of patrol over same ground. Balance of company was used to patrol cable line from power house to search light and patrol road towards Zeb's Cove, to such point as would constantly command Zeb's Cove.

There were rumors of attempted landings by the enemy throughout the entire night but all of them proved to be false. At 5.30 A. M. August 28th a mounted patrol reported from Maj. Anderson to ascertain the truth of rumors that had reached him of a landing at Pond Cove. At 7.30 P. M. company was relieved and marched back to Fort Williams.

During this day the company was kept in the entrenchments back of Fort Williams, the mess being served to the men in the trenches.

At 9 P. M. August 28th the entire company was moved out onto road back of fort reservation and patrolled the entire length of reservation, the company being divided into three detachments and pitching shelter tents at suitable distance from each other to keep up constant communication the entire length of reservation. At 5 P. M. August 29th scouts were sent out through the woods to the Middle road, so called, to see if enemy had made a landing, not finding them the company was relieved at 9 P. M.

August 28th. A detachment of one sergeant and seven men were sent out on scouting duty through the woods toward the west and south.

SIR:—I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your letter dated November 8th. In reply will submit the following report of Co. K, 1st Infantry.

Tuesday, August 25th, left Fort Williams at 7 o'clock P. M. with my company for Pond Cove, with orders to report to Major Anderson, U. S. A.; arrived there at 8 o'clock P. M., found a lieutenant of artillery who was in command of a battery of light artillery. It was raining hard so I made use of a barn for headquarters, near the main road, after having permission from the owner. In the absence of orders or any ranking officer, I proceeded to distribute my company to the best advantage for the protection of the power station, its water supply, and the search light, which was situated on a point between Zeb and Pond Coves; viz.: Lieut Rideout and 8 men at power house; a corporal and two men on water pipe running about 500 feet out in a field; a corporal and two men on cable from power house to search light, about 1,300 feet; patrols to my base of supplies was established so that the return was made every half-hour. Relieved from duty at 10 o'clock A. M., August 26th and returned to the reservation. Held my command in readiness to man the trenches until Thursday, August 27th, at about 9 o'clock A. M. when I detailed the first platoon in command of Lieut. Wilson, to establish an outpost at Ship Cove, Maiden Cove, the main entrance, and to establish a patrol to Fort Preble. The second platoon in command of Lieut. Rideout, was detailed to Delano Park to protect the power house and search light there, also to patrol the roads and communicate with patrols on main road from Fort Williams and Pond Cove. About 10 o'clock A. M., August 27th, Lieut. Rideout was ordered to reinforce a firing line established in the woods opposite the reservation. Company relieved from duty and returned to camp about 2 o'clock P. M., August 28th. The balance of the time until noon August 28th, the company was held in readiness to man the trenches which was done several times.

Two sergeants, two corporals and nine men on patrol duty between Fort Williams and Fort Preble.

Two men at Maiden Cove on patrol duty.

August 28th. Lieut. Bryant, two sergeants, two corporals and twelve men stationed at Delano Park to guard the search light and gun.

Aug. 28th-29th. Capt. M. E. Bennett, Lieut. W. H. Bryant, Lieut. H. E. Perkins, four sergeants, five corporals and twenty-eight men stationed at Pond Cove to guard power house, search light and cable; patrol duty to Delano Park.

This is all of the detached duty that I can remember.

The Commanding Officer, Battalion of Maine National Guard, Fort Williams, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to inform you that, pursuant to instructions from the department commander, it is desired:

1. That you furnish the post commander a special field return of your command upon arrival, and another immediately before departure.
2. That you submit daily a morning report of your command.

3. That you conform as nearly as practicable to the routine of post guard duty by furnishing, in addition to the sentinels required for guarding property in your own camp, three reliefs for the two posts established at the gates leading from the reservation to the main road in the vicinity of the yellow frame building known as the Thompson house, one gate being immediately south and the other north of the building.

The special orders for both these sentry posts are: (1) to allow on the reservation no visitors except those desiring to visit members of the garrison or residents of the post, requiring the visitors in all cases to give the names of the person or persons whom they desire to visit, and in case of doubt calling the corporal of the guard; (2) between 6:00 P. M., Tuesday, August 25th, and 12:00 noon, Saturday, August 29th, to allow no enlisted man to leave the reservation; (3) during the period of the maneuvers, from midnight August 25th to noon August 29th, to keep a sharp lookout for members of the crews of the opposing fleet, and to allow no suspicious person to enter the reservation; (4) to allow no one not a resident to bring a camera on the reservation.

4. That you conform as nearly as practicable to the routine of post duty by requiring the members of your command; (1) to observe strictly all guard and police regulations; (2) to observe the prescribed hours for service and roll calls, except those for drill; (3) to attend each infantry drill, including patrol and out-post duty, as you may see fit to prescribe in order to prepare for the duty that will be required of your command during the maneuvers.

5. That you cause the enlisted members of your command to salute, according to army and drill regulations, officers of the regular army; and that you cause the officers of your command to require salutes from the enlisted men of the regular army, and to exchange with officers of the regular army the courtesies prescribed by the army regulations for observance amongst officers.

6. That you observe as far as practicable all orders and regulations prescribed for the conduct of the combined maneuvers.

7. That you prohibit leaves, furloughs, and passes in your command between 6:00 P. M., August 25th, and 12:00 noon, August 29th, 1903.

In conclusion and referring to paragraph 4 above, I am directed by the commanding officer to inform you that, if for purposes of instruction it be desirable to depart further from the routine service calls (as for example, by having two guard mountings daily) there will be no objection thereto, provided the commanding officer be informed.

SIR:—I have the honor to make the following report of the service of the medical department of the 1st Regt. N. G. S. M. during the recent tour of duty at Portland, August 21st to 29th inclusive.

Capt. J. B. O'Neill was detailed to Fort Preble, Lieut. G. M. Elliott, Sergt. Chas. E. Cragin and myself to Fort Williams, also ten men of the ambulance corps under command of Lieut. Jumper.

Through the courtesy of Major Duvall of Fort Williams, the regimental hospital was established at the Goddard mansion, a large, unused building within the Fort Williams' reservation and immediately in the rear of the battalion headquarters. Two rooms on the ground floor were thoroughly cleaned. The larger one used as a ward and supplied with six cots complete with mattress, bedding, etc. The smaller room was used as a dispensary and operating room. We were well supplied with drugs and instruments, and the whole hospital arrangement was all that could be desired.

Capt. O'Neill of Fort Preble not only attended the sick of the 2d battalion but also overlooked the sanitary condition of that camp.

Lieut. Elliott was placed in command of the regimental hospital with Hospital Steward Cragin and members of the ambulance corps.

Lieut. Jumper was kept busy with his ambulance and men.

Acting Hospital Stewards Farris and Wentworth, both physicians from active practice, were assigned to duty at Two Lights and Silver Spring respectively, where they cared for the sick of the 3d battalion.

Two men from each company reported daily to the surgeon for instruction in "first aid." These men were to act as company bearers in case of emergency and were supplied with "first aid" packages.

Careful inspection was made daily of all tents, cook-houses and sinks. Also of the food before and after cooking, and the amount of waste. The most trouble found was with the coffee. It was issued raw, and but few of the cooks knew how to properly roast it.

Cases of illness were nearly all due to indigestion with resulting bowel trouble. None were serious. Sprains of the ankle, by stepping on the wet rocks, were quite common.

I believe it would be wise in the future to supply the men with straw ticks or other bed. The time we are in camp is too short to accustom the men to sleeping on the ground. Poor rest at night and a cold, damp floor will unnecessarily expose men to bowel and lung trouble. Nor are they as well able to take up a hard day's work on the morrow.

The men throughout the regiment showed a lively interest in their duties and in no case did I find a disposition to shirk their work for trivial causes.

Special Orders, No. 100.

Officers serving at this post who desire to be absent will observe and conform to the following:

1. For any absence of twenty-four hours or more a regular leave will first be obtained (Art. X, Pars. 54 to 76 Incl. A. R., 1901), the application for which will be made in writing and through prescribed channels.

2. For any absence of less than twenty-four hours which will involve the omission of any specific duty prescribed or scheduled in post orders, or by the post commander otherwise, permission of the immediate commander and of the post commander must first be obtained, but habitually such permission will be refused—

that is, except in cases of distinct urgency; nor will any officer (except a medical officer) junior to the post commander excuse any officer from any duty in question in this section.

3. For any period of less than twenty-four hours not involving the omission of duty as described in section 2 (that is, habitually Sundays and after one o'clock week days,) officers may absent themselves provided:

(a) That no company be left without a commissioned officer.

(b) That the post be not left without competent medical attendance.

(c) That a subaltern first obtain the authority of his company or other immediate commander.

(d) That to be absent over night any officer must first obtain permission of the post commander.

4. Any officer leaving the post, except on duty, will record in the book for this purpose at the adjutant's office, the hour of his departure and of his return.

5. Officers will be in uniform when asking permission to be absent.

6. Any previous post order or regulation in conflict with this special order is hereby rescinded.

7. The purpose herein is to regulate, but by no means to curtail the customary privileges of officers. Indeed, the commanding officer desires to encourage recreation and diversion to the fullest extent consistent with thoroughness in the performance of duty.

FORT WILLIAMS, MAINE, May 27, 1903.

Circular, No. 19.

The following instructions are published for the information of the troops temporarily assigned to this command, and for the guidance of all concerned.

I. LAVATORIES AND LATRINES.

The 81st Company will use the lavatory in the 49th Company's barracks.

The 87th Company will use the lavatory in the 74th Company's barracks.

The 81st and 87th Companies will turn in their toilet paper to the first sergeants of the companies whose lavatories they use; they will also furnish their proportional share of the labor necessary to keep those lavatories clean.

The company officers will see that their men go to the lavatories to which assigned, and will see also that no nuisances are committed in the vicinity of the camps, or elsewhere on the reservation. The latrines provided near the camps are for use as urinals only.

These latrines will be kept in a thoroughly sanitary condition by the companies using them. To this end the company commanders will let the quartermaster know how often and when the sanitary cart, or other means of transportation, is needed; the quartermaster will provide the driver.

2. ROADS AND WALKS.

In marching their companies from the camp to ceremonies, the company commanders will follow the roads.

The company commanders will see that their men follow the walks and roads in going about the post.

The board walk leading from the north camp to the vicinity of the brick barracks will be used by men going from the camp to the brick barracks; the men will not trample the grass along the route of the walk, but will keep on the walk itself.

3. SMOKING.

Post orders prohibit smoking on the reservation out of quarters.

For the men in camp "quarters" will be interpreted as including the ground between the cook shack of the north camp and twenty feet to the south of the south camp.

For the officers of encamped companies who themselves live in quarters, the order prohibiting smoking will apply exactly as for officers of the regular garrison.

4. DRESS.

Post orders require men going on pass to wear white collars.

White collars are worn with blouses at ceremonies under arms, including guard mount. They are worn by members of the guard between reveille and retreat.

Mixed uniforms are allowed at no time.

Campaign hats are worn strictly in accord with G. O. No. 98, 1901, H. Q. A. Their use during rain is permitted; but at no other time will they be worn with blue clothing unless leggins also be worn.

While engaged on fatigue duty about the post men will wear the full brown canvas fatigue uniform.

When walking about the post at leisure or on errands, the men will wear neat blue uniforms, buttoned throughout.

When engaged in athletics members of the command may wear appropriate dress; but under no circumstances will they appear out of doors in undershirts.

At the formation for retreat roll call, white gloves are worn.

As far as they are applicable the foregoing regulations about uniforms will be observed by officers. The following additional regulations will be observed by them.

At artillery drills and artillery inspections officers will wear blue clothing, forage caps, sabres, and leather gauntlets.

When off duty officers will wear blue clothing and forage caps.

On the reservation the wearing of civilian clothing by officers of the command will be restricted to the necessary time required in leaving the post or in returning to it.

Any article not included in the prescribed uniform is considered civilian clothing.

After June 30th, 1903, the requirements of G. O. No. 132, series of 1902, from the headquarters of the army, will be strictly complied with.

5. GUARD DUTY.

There will be but one guard for the post including the camp.

A detachment of the guard will be stationed at the camp site; this detachment will, of course, be under the supervision of the officer of the day and of the commander of the whole guard.

6. LEAVING THE RESERVATION.

The attention of the officers is directed to S. O. No. 100, post series of 1902.

7. OFFICERS AT ROLL CALLS.

Of the companies in camp one officer of each will be present at reveille and retreat roll calls.

Of the companies in barracks one officer of the two will be present at reveille and retreat roll calls.

The officer of the day will be one of the three officers thus required to attend; and the responsibility of insuring the presence of officers as prescribed will rest upon the company commanders, each of whom, when the duty of attending the formation of his company does not devolve upon the officer of the day, will see that an officer is designated.

8. EXTRA AND SPECIAL DUTY—MEN AT DRILLS.

Extra and special duty men and members of the old guard fatigue attend the first hour and a quarter of artillery drill daily.

Extra and special duty men attend at least one parade and infantry drill each week.

9. PASSES.

Current post orders require all requests for passes to be submitted to the adjutant with the morning reports. Only in emergencies that could not be foreseen does the adjutant consider requests submitted at other times.

The ordinary old guard pass is from guard mount to reveille the following morning. The orderly pass is from guard mount to reveille the second following morning.

Special passes are granted in such numbers as not to cause the total number on the pass list of an organization to exceed one-third of its present strength.

Special passes that cause absence from drills will be granted occasionally only.

The longest pass granted is for three days.

Men going on pass wear blue uniform, black shoes, forage caps, and white collars.

10. THE CALL "TO ARMS."

When the call "To Arms" is sounded the detachments and the details are immediately formed on the manning parade by the several chiefs of detachment and detail, and marched at double time to their posts.

Circular, No. 20.

I. Throughout the ceremony of raising the flag at reveille and of lowering it at retreat,

(a) The companies, if out of doors and formed, will be at attention;

(b) All sentinels on post will stand at *attention* facing the flag, arms at *right shoulder*;

(c) All men in charge of reliefs, of detachments, or of prisoners, will have them stand at *attention* facing the flag and themselves will take the position herein prescribed for posted sentinels except that no man in charge of prisoners will be in any position or assume any attitude inconsistent with his constant and efficient watch over said prisoners;

(d) All members of the command who are out of doors, in sight of the flag, and not in ranks, will uncover and stand at *attention* facing the flag (those in vehicles or mounted first descending to the ground), and all civilians employed at the post, and all other persons belonging to the garrison, are expected to do likewise.

II. It is hereby made a special duty of all members of the guard, whether on post or not,

(a) To enforce this circular in all cases of individual enlisted men who fail to obey any of its provisions, and

(b) To report (giving name, time, place, etc.,) to the officer of the day through the sergeant of the guard all observed cases of like failure on the part of others than enlisted men.

PORTLAND, MAINE, November 28th, 1903.

Col. Lucius H. Kendall, 1st Infantry, N. G. S. M.:

SIR:—In compliance with General Orders No. 22, Adjutant General's Office, I have the honor to submit my report of the tour of duty of the 3d Battalion, 1st Regiment, stationed at the Two Lights and Silver Spring, during the war maneuvers from August 22d to August 29th inclusive.

Acting under General Orders No. 22, Adjutant General's Office, and Regimental Orders No. 2, the several companies assembled for duty at the armory at 8.30 A. M., Friday, August 22d, as follows: Company A, Captain B. E. Kennard, 3 officers and 33 men; Company B, Captain Rupert C. Parker, 3 officers and 36 men; Company E, Captain Thomas J. Hogan, 3 officers and 42 men; Company L, Captain John J. A. Mulhearn, 2 officers and 46 men; Adjutant Ralph C. Purinton and Sergeant Major Osborne L. Hamilton. At 9 o'clock the battalion took the electric cars and was conveyed to Fort Williams, the terminus, where the line of march was taken up, and at a point about half way between Fort Williams and the Two Lights Companies A and B left the battalion and proceeded to Silver Spring, arriving there about 11 A. M., and Companies E and L continued their march to the Two Lights, arriving there at about 12.30 P. M. On reaching their respective stations the several organizations promptly proceeded to establish their camps but on account of the delay in the arrival of the baggage it was well into the afternoon before the camps were in good working order. As soon as practicable the guard was mounted and the routine work taken up.

By General Orders No. 1, Confidential Series, of Colonel Mills, commanding district of Portland, Lieutenant Colonel Harry R. Anderson, commanding Field Artillery Battalion, headquarters at Silver Spring, was charged with the defence of the Two Lights district. Companies A and B were under orders of Colonel Anderson.

The headquarters of the battalion, with Companies E and L, was at the Two Lights and was charged with the defence of the Two Lights and immediate territory and to support the field artillery in case of attack, as far as possible.

During Saturday the commissioned officers of the several companies made a tour of the territory to be covered by their organizations, and Sunday morning Companies A and B left camp and made a reconnaissance of the surrounding country and before returning to camp built a bridge over a small stream which materially shortened the distance between their camp and Bowery Beach.

On Sunday, by verbal order from Colonel Anderson, I caused the naval wireless telegraph station at the Two Lights to be seized and the electricians in charge placed on parole until after the maneuvers were over.

By Special Orders Nos. 11, 50 and 109, District Commander, 25 non-commissioned officers and men were ordered rationed with the National Guard companies at the Two Lights.

Tuesday morning about 10 o'clock Captains Parker, Kennard and Mulhearn left their respective camps and took positions of defence in the vicinity of Bowery Beach. Captain Mulhearn sent a squad of ten men, under Sergeant Hayes, to Pond Cove to assist in the defence of the search light stationed at that point.

Early Wednesday morning, the 26th, the training ship "Hartford," battleship "Texas" and cruiser "Baltimore" appeared at the entrance of Bowery Beach, shelled the shore and made a feint at landing.

Wednesday noon Captain Hogan relieved Captain Mulhearn at Bowery Beach. Captain Mulhearn returned to the Two Lights. Captain Hogan sent a platoon to Pond Cove, under command of Lieutenant McDonald, to relieve Sergeant Hayes, who immediately reported to Captain Mulhearn at the Two Lights.

Thursday afternoon the entire fleet sailed past the Two Lights and anchored just off the Richmond Island breakwater. Early Friday morning, the 28th, there were evident preparations for a large landing party at Bowery Beach and in a short time the fleet landed about 2,000 sailors and marines and made an assault upon the entrenchment, when, after a fierce engagement, they swept on to the Two Lights and attacked and captured the several stations there. They then retraced their steps and attacked and captured Silver Spring. According to the rulings of the umpires the assault was repulsed at the Beach, hence the attacks on Two Lights and Silver Spring were ruled out.

This ended the actual engagements of the companies of my battalion. The battalion broke camp at 1 o'clock Saturday afternoon and arrived at Fort Williams at 4 o'clock (the scheduled time), where they boarded the electrics and were transported to the armory at Portland, arriving there at 4.30 P. M., when they were dismissed.

The work of the companies was far superior to that of any State camp as regards guard and outpost duty and the routine of camp life. The men entered into the spirit of the work and performed their duties in a manner highly creditable both to themselves and their officers.

Company commanders and lieutenants displayed marked ability and are entitled to the highest commendation for their zealous and efficient work and for the interest manifested and assistance rendered in making the duties both pleasant and profitable to all.

Lieutenant Colonel Anderson of the Field Artillery spoke in highly complimentary terms of the officers and men of the several companies and said he was much pleased with their work, which was quite up to the standard of the regulars.

Maj. Gen. A. B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Me.:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the part taken by this regiment in the combined army and navy maneuvers at Portland, Me., August 22-29, 1903.

As enjoined in General Orders No. 20, dated Adjutant General's Office, Augusta, July 24, 1903, pursuant to Sec. 1, G. O. No. 1, Confidential Series, Headquarters Artillery District of Portland, dated Aug. 6, 1903, I proceeded to take station at Camp Smith, Long Island, about 5 P. M. Friday, August 21, 1903, with headquarters and staff, Major Cummings, Companies B, C, D, H, K, M, and band.

Several of the details ordered to proceed to camp in advance having failed to arrive, the quartermaster was unable to have all the tents pitched before the arrival of the troops, with the result that it was quite late before camp routine was fully established in accordance with Regimental Orders No. 1, herewith appended.

The site selected for camp while not perfect was much better than that occupied by the regulars, and on the whole quite satisfactory. Sinks were located in a fringe of woods northeast of the camp under the direction of Surgeons Major Fuller and Lieut. Chandler, who maintained strict supervision over them throughout the camp.

The water was obtained for a few days through a pipe line laid from the artillery camp, the supply however soon became

exhausted owing to the large amount required for the steam boilers connected with the "search light plant," and thereafter water for camp purposes was obtained at a spring near by.

By noon, Saturday, stray baggage and rations had been recovered and good nature restored.

Sunday the only duty performed, other than guard mounting, was a battalion parade under Major Cummings, followed by the usual Sunday services by the chaplain, which are always interesting and instructive.

On this day, believing the position we held to be a very important one in connection with the maneuvers, I proceeded in company with Lieut. Col. Hume and Major Slaker of the Artillery Corps to familiarize myself with the topographical features of the whole island.

Becoming satisfied that I had not troops enough to defend the several important points against a large force of marines and sailors, I immediately addressed a request to the district commander for at least two more companies of my regiment. A copy of that communication is herewith appended and made a part of this report. I was sorry that my request was not granted, as subsequent events proved my fears well grounded.

On Monday, August 24, in accordance with General Orders No. 2, Confidential Series, dated Fort McKinley, Me., Aug. 24, 1903, herewith appended, the stations of the several units were established as follows:

At cove about half mile to the northeast of position finder, one company of infantry and two six-pounder R. F. guns. In front of station, one company of infantry. At cable landing, one company and two six-pounder R. F. guns. At cove between Marsh and Averset Island, one company of infantry. Reference may be had to blue print map accompanying this report.

The two companies remaining in camp to constitute the reserve under the immediate command of the officer next in rank to the commanding officer of the infantry troops.

Agreeable to Par. 3 of above orders, I placed under the command of Major Cummings the reserve companies during the entire tour of duty, with instructions to move them immediately to the threatened points in case of land attack or attempted landing. Said reserve to be disposed by the senior officer present as

deemed most suitable or required by the emergency, and in accordance with instructions that might be received from proper authority.

Under this order we were obliged to furnish a guard for the artillery camp consisting of five posts.

From the hour of landing to that of departure every officer and man was kept busy, swamping roads, constructing screens, field works, etc.

From noon of the 25th until noon of the 29th practically the entire command was on guard.

All officers were enjoined to see that vigilance in observing any suspicious movements and promptitude in reporting the same were impressed upon observers and outposts.

Taps and all calls were omitted except "To Arms."

Guard mounting was held without music and the hour changed to as near noon as possible.

Captain Swinburne of the battleship Texas afterwards informed me that every effort was made to locate our camp, but they were unable to do so by reason of the artificial screen which we had erected. They therefore were unable to estimate the number of our troops.

The reserve companies slept on their arms because of the frequent alarms requiring their presence to reinforce some threatened point anywhere from a half to a mile or more away.

Many of these alarms were telephoned in from the signal station by Major Slaker at the artillery camp, where they were constantly on the alert to observe the enemy's movements.

This duty was exhausting upon both officers and men to a marked degree, though endured without a murmur, and in fact all seemed anxious to perform their full measure of duty.

For a detailed report of the final assault and alleged capture of the station, I refer you to the appended report of Lieut. Col. Hume, who was charged with security and information. This officer displayed the greatest energy and zeal, coupled with ability and judgment of a high order. During the engagement he was thrown from his horse and rendered unconscious for a long time. I am pleased to endorse his remarks and recommendations.

The weakest point in this regiment is its lack of instruction in fire discipline and control of the men by officers and squad

leaders. I have endeavored to impress them with the importance of this part of their military training in my lectures on extended order and battle exercises.

In conclusion I desire to add that I was not altogether satisfied with the results of the tour of duty. Under the orders of Majors Harris and Slaker, I was obliged to remain at or near my headquarters during the hostilities in order that they might communicate with me at any time and insure their instructions being fully carried out. I should have preferred to be with my command on the line.

Our men should have been supplied with plenty of ammunition by the government, as were the marines and sailors, not only were their cartridge belts full but each man carried one hundred rounds in his haversack; while I was only able to issue thirty-five rounds per man.

I take this opportunity to thank both officers and men for their cheerful and willing obedience during this their first experience with the regulars. There was abundant opportunity to learn and profit by the mistakes naturally made by all.

I desire through you to express my deep appreciation for the kindly consideration with which myself and command were treated by Majors Harris and Slaker, Captain Johnson, Lieutenants Bennett and Scott of the artillery. No matter how busy (and their time was fully occupied both day and night), they were always ready to listen and advise any who asked assistance.

GENERAL ORDERS

No. 1.

I. In compliance with General Orders No. 20, A. G. O., c. s., this regiment will proceed to Portland, Friday, August 21st, 1903, to participate in the combined army and navy maneuvers, August 22d-29th inclusive.

II. General Orders governing the train service for conveyance of the several companies to Portland and return, also for transportation of baggage, etc., will be issued from the A. G. O., and will be strictly complied with by company commanders without further orders from these headquarters.

III. Officers and men will wear the service (khaki) uniform, campaign hat, leggins, haversack and canteen. Blanket, poncho and shelter half will be worn in roll. Dress uniforms and overcoats will be packed and taken as baggage.

On the journey to and from Portland the senior officer will command all troops present and will be held responsible for the maintenance of order and discipline.

IV. Company commanders will report to the adjutant at Union Depot, immediately upon arrival in Portland.

Officers of the field and staff and the non-commissioned staff, except otherwise ordered, band, Lieut. Colonel Frank M. Hume, Major Frank B. Cummings, Batl. Adjt. Greenan, Batl. Sergt. Major Dexter, Companies C, D, K, B, M and H will be stationed at Long Island.

Major Thompson, Batl. Adjt. Randall, Batl. Sergt. Major Colby, Companies E and A will be stationed at Fort McKinley.

Major Hume, Batl. Adjt. Smith, Batl. Sergt. Major Buck, Companies I, G, L, and F will be stationed at Fort Levett.

VI. The regimental quartermaster, commissary and quartermaster and commissary sergeants will assume their duties on Wednesday, Aug. 19th. Company quartermaster sergeants and company cooks will report at their respective stations on the morning of Thursday, Aug. 20th.

Second Lieutenants John J. McKenna, Jr., Company A, and William E. Sweeney of Co. G will in addition to their regular duties, act as assistant quartermasters for their respective stations, they will receipt to the regimental quartermaster and be held responsible for the care and preservation of all State and United States property issued at their several stations, they will report for duty on the morning of August 20th and will remain on duty until all property is turned in and properly packed for shipment to Augusta.

Baggage is restricted to 150 pounds for officers and 100 pounds for enlisted men; only such articles as are absolutely necessary will be transported and company commanders will see that all baggage is plainly marked with letter of company, of regiment and destination.

The regular routine will be established as soon as troops arrive in camp.

The immediate commander will see that suitable guard is posted immediately upon arrival at their respective stations and maintained during the encampment.

VII. The following hours of service duty and roll call are hereby established and will be strictly complied with:

VIII. Morning reports must be in the office of battalion adjutants within one hour after arriving in camp, and each day not later than 7.00 A. M. Battalion adjutants will see that reports reach office of adjutant each day not later than 9.00 A. M.

IX. Passes which cover the time of a prescribed drill or duty the soldier is subject to or which extend beyond "tattoo" of the day of issue must be approved by the Colonel commanding; passes of this kind not so approved will not be recognized by the guard.

X. The fatigue party or general police shall consist of prisoners if enough are available, if not, a detail of one man from each company will be furnished upon request of the officer of the day. The sergeant of the guard is in charge of the fatigue party under the direction of the officer of the day.

The policing of company quarters is under the charge of the sergeants and corporals, who will set the entire company at work. The policing must be finished and tents ready for inspection at

8.00 A. M. Companies police their own quarters, which include the space as far back as the rear of the company officers' tents. The general police covers the remainder of the camp. When two companies join, both are responsible for the space between the back of the tents.

A medical officer will make an inspection each day and report the result to the commanding officer.

Col. E. E. Newcomb, 2d Inf., N. G. S. M., Comdg. Infantry, Camp Smith, Long Island, Portland Harbor, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of operations under my supervision during the tour of duty at Camp Smith, Long Island, Maine.

Pursuant to Sec. XVI, G. O. No. 1, Confidential Series, Headquarters Artillery District of Portland, dated Aug. 6th, 1903, I assumed the duties of chief of scouting on above island at 6 o'clock P. M., Aug. 25th, 1903.

After consultation with Major Adam Slaker, U. S. Artillery Corps, commanding artillery detachment and station, and at his suggestion, four points which we deemed most important for defence and observation were chosen as outpost stations, namely, one at southwestern end of island which was designated as the "Cable Station," one at southeastern end designated as "Overset Station," one on eastern side near Grace Harbor, so called, designated "Grace Harbor Station," and the remaining one covering the signal station and search light on eastern side was called the "Artillery Station." These stations were all connected by telephone with the infantry headquarters and an observation station in the woods, near Horr's house about midway of the island, was also connected.

It was decided to use a company at each station, changing stations every 24 or 48 hours and using the two reserve companies in camp as reliefs. Through the force of circumstances this method of exchange of stations was somewhat modified.

Tuesday, Aug. 25, 1903, at 5 o'clock P. M., the companies designated marched to their several posts in heavy marching order, immediately pitching their shelter tents and preparing their lines of defence. The companies were assigned as follows: D, Capt. Garcelon, Cable Station; K, Capt. Presson, Overset; B, Capt. Kelleher, Grace Harbor; M, Capt. Drake, Artillery Station; Cos. C, Capt. Kimball, and H, Capt. Besse, were held in camp as reserve.

Nothing of importance developed until nearly daylight of the 26th, when the different vessels of the attacking fleet as they passed through Hussey's Sound opened with their secondary batteries on the Cable Station. Our men being fully protected by intrenchments, and no landing attempted, no attention was given to the firing.

At 7 A. M. the cruiser Panther, which had been cruising off and on the eastern side of the island since early morning, dropped five boatloads of marines, estimated at 300 men, opposite Overset Station. These made a dash for the beach opposite Marsh Island but were met with such a withering fire from Co. K and Co. C, which had reinforced the line, that they altered their course and attempted to land on the point to the left of the line.

Co. K immediately went forward in skirmish formation, Co. C occupied the intrenchments, thus getting an enfilading fire, and Co. M a direct fire from their intrenchments at the Artillery Station. The Panther opened with her guns at the same time. The boats were repulsed with nearly a total loss as the ranges were as follows: Co. K, 50 to 100 yards, Co. C, 200 to 400 yards, Co. M, 400 to 800 yards. The Panther in picking up the boats came within 300 yards of the shore and some of the best marksmen of Co. K fired named shots at the officers on bridge and men at guns. During the rest of the 26th no attack developed but there were continued feints at Overset and Cable Stations by the Panther.

Thursday, the 27th, at about 7.30 A. M. the gunboats Vixen and Scorpion were discovered off the northeast side of the island with a great many boats filled with marines in tow. Number of men estimated at 1,820. The boats were dropped off Grace Harbor and were rowed and towed by launches around north end of island where a landing was made unmolested, as we had no men stationed in that section of the island. This force, 1,800 strong, then marched southerly over a turnpike road to within about a mile of Grace Harbor, where they took a wood road or trail leading directly to the Artillery Station.

As soon as appraised of their approach, by message from Major Slaker, I made the following disposition of the force at my command: Co. H, Capt. Besse, was ordered to station in woods near Horr's house, to make a delaying fight; Co. D, Capt. Garcelon, on western flank of infantry camp with outposts towards Ponce's Landing and northerly along above mentioned turnpike; Co. K, Capt. Presson, to infantry camp, in reserve, later this company was sent to support Co. H; Co. C, Capt. Kimball, at Cable Station; Co. B, Capt. Kelleher, Grace Harbor; Co. M, Capt. Drake, Artillery Station.

The advance guard of the attacking naval force came in contact with Co. H at about 10 o'clock and after a spirited skirmish of about ten minutes the entire advance guard of about 125 officers and men were captured and marched to our rear.

At about this time Co. K reinforced H Co. on the right, also one squad from Co. D, under the command of Lieut. Pulsifer. Lieut. Pulsifer showed fine judgment in choosing a commanding

position in an old barn in the center of our line with an unlimited arc of fire.

At this point (after the capture above mentioned) there was some little confusion as some of the officers, apparently thinking the entire attacking force was either captured or repulsed, began to assemble their commands. This was speedily remedied and a new line formed as before with the above mentioned barn in center. This position was on the top of a rise of ground with a natural formation for defence and I am quite sure that if it had been in actual warfare nearly impregnable for a frontal attack.

Our ammunition was nearly expended, the majority of the men not having more than five rounds each, and as a result our line was quickly rushed by the immense force that immediately attacked us.

The troops were ordered to fall back, which they did in a very much disorganized condition.

I, myself, just after this was put out of action and took no further part in the movements that day, and as the island was declared captured, the entire command with the exception of Co. C at Cable Station was put out of the game for twelve hours. Co. C with the assistance of the rapid fire guns of the artillery detachment and from Fort McKinley held its station and later was transferred to Cow Island for twelve hours' tour duty.

The 28th and 29th were comparatively quiet except that there were continual alarms from Overset Station. During the night of the 28th nothing developed. The 29th, troops struck tents and embarked for their home stations at about noon.

Under the head of recommendations, I would respectfully call attention to the evident lack of drill in extended order. The men did not seem to have been instructed in the least as to taking cover, and on the firing line both officers and men remained standing. The non-commissioned officers showed entire lack of knowledge as to their duties and therefore the officers, looking after duties that should have been under the supervision of the former, lost contact with the commanding officer, thereby breaking up the uniformity of action necessary to a successful termination of an attack or defence. Particular attention should be given to this most important part of infantry drill.

In conclusion I wish to bring to your attention the enthusiasm and energy with which both officers and men entered into the maneuvers, suffering great hardship and inconvenience with hardly a word of discontent. I would expressly commend the work of the men of Cos. H, K and M in clearing roads and constructing actual rifle pits. Capts. Besse, Drake and Presson deserve a great deal of credit for the indefatigable energy displayed by them. Quartermaster Sergeant Drake deserves especial praise for the difficult work of erecting the numerous telephone lines, as the work was carried on under the greatest difficulties of weather and situation.

ARMORY C Co., SECOND REGIMENT INFANTRY,

NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE.

Col. E. E. Newcomb, Com'd'g 2d Infantry, N. G. S. M.:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the tour of duty performed by Company C, Second Infantry, at Cow Island.

Soon after reporting Thursday evening, August 27th, to Colonel Newcomb at regimental headquarters from our duties at the Cable Station (on the west end of Long Island) which Company C so ably defended that morning, assisted by about eight regulars and two six-pounder guns and the big guns at Fort McKinley about two miles distant, from a combined attack of the marines and sailors who greatly outnumbered us, we were ordered to Cow Island as we were the only troops on Long Island available for duty. It had been decided that we had not been captured or defeated by the naval forces. It was about 9 o'clock when we arrived at Cow Island, a small island of a few acres in extent near Diamond Island, where some fortifications were being erected. The company was divided into three sections; one section under Lieutenant Buker was sent to the west end of the island to protect the power house, another section

under Lieutenant Pratt was sent to the east end of the island to protect a large search light and to support a few men of the Engineer Corps who had charge of the light, the remaining section under my command was assigned to a position at the center of the island where fortifications are being erected and the highest point on the island, giving me a commanding view of the whole island. Hasty instructions were given to both lieutenants and it was agreed that if the positions they were defending had to be given up that they were to report to me at the nearly completed fortification at the center of the island, where we were to make the final stand. At the light and power stations the men worked late into the night making camp and erecting hasty entrenchments and screens to hide the tents. We got very little rest that night. During the early hours of the morning a number of small boat parties from the ships tried to make landings which kept us under fire most of the time.

Friday, August 28th, during the day we got a chance to get a little much needed rest and to prepare our rations, each man cooking his own mess. We were up all night on the alert for landing parties, several attempts being made to land but none of them successful. Saturday morning we were ordered to return to Long Island and make ready to break camp that afternoon. We were a tired company of men but happy in the knowledge that we had done our duty to the best of our ability. There was no complaining and no sickness among the men, each one did his full duty gladly.

SPECIAL REPORT, SIGNAL CORPS.

PORTLAND, October 23, 1903.

General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to report that in compliance with General Order No. 22, Adjutant General's Office, Augusta, Me., August 15, 1903; the signal corps under my command consisting of one officer and seventeen enlisted men left the armory on Friday, August 21st at 9 A. M., for the purpose of taking part in the joint Army and Navy Maneuvers, held off Portland, Me.

They proceeded to Fort Preble and on their arrival at the fort, I endeavored to report to colonel commanding the 1st Maine Infantry, but as the government tug boat, Robert Palmer, was waiting at that station, drew signal equipments from Capt. B. O. Lenoir, U. S. A., the signal officer in charge of visual signaling to equip six signal stations. If I had not drawn equipments at this time it would have been impossible as the equipments were limited.

The tug started as soon as equipment was put on board for the following stations:

Four men were landed in small boats at Station A., Fletcher's Neck, this station was provided with heliographs, bicycles, telescopes, field glasses, flags, Colts field signal lights, colored glasses together with carbide, rockets, coston lights, bombs with mortar, map and descriptions of all war ships expected, also field telephones and accessories.

The tug then attempted to land Station B at Old Orchard, but it was considered unsafe as the surf was running very high.

The tug then proceeded to Station C, at Prout's Neck, where stations B and C, consisting of four men each, with the same equipment, were landed. The sergeant in command of Station B was given authority to procure a team and transport equipment over land to Station B.

On account of approaching darkness no further effort was made to land Stations D and E, the tug put back to Fort Preble, where the remaining two stations and equipment were landed.

Early Saturday morning a team was procured and started over land with the two remaining stations and their equipment. Before leaving Fort Preble, Station E was augmented by three signal men of the U. S. A.

Station D consisting of four men with same signal equipment as above stations arrived at Point Jordan at 3 P. M.

The remaining party at once started for the Two Lights arriving at six P. M. where Station E was established. Station E, being a relay station was provided with the following equipment in addition to that of other stations. Ardois light system, set of international code flags with halyards and blocks, electric motor, international and army code books. Not much work was done as it was near midnight when the camp was pitched, but I was called to the telephone and requested by Capt. Lenoir to have the system of Ardois lights in working order by the evening of the 25th.

On the 23rd at noon was again called and asked what kind of progress I was making. Capt. Lenoir was informed that the system was already in working order, much to his surprise as there was 2,000 feet of cable to be laid from the power house to a pole 90 feet high used by the life saving station to which the system was suspended. It requiring every man to raise the lights .

At about 4 o'clock on this date a detachment of eight men of the New York Signal Corps reported for duty. Practical work was at once commenced. The acetylene flash lanterns were unpacked and ready for use that evening and communications were opened with all stations in the line of vision, which it would have been impossible to do without the lanterns.

On the 24th the flags and heliographs were worked for instruction during the day. As soon as it was dark the lanterns

and Ardois lights were put in operation. Also rockets and lights were sent up to thoroughly instruct the several stations.

I was instructed before leaving Fort Preble to see that the wireless telegraphy station in operation by the navy was not in use after midnight of the 25th, the time the hostilities were to commence. But as the wireless station was discontinued by the order of the commander of that district on the 23d A. M., I was relieved from that duty.

On the morning of the 25th the several stations opened communications for instruction and continued through the day.

At 12.30 A. M. of the 26th, Station A notified E, through B and C, of the approach of a torpedo boat. Information was at once sent to Capt. Lenoir at Fort Levett and Forts Williams and Preble notified. During the day practice work was resumed.

On the 27th work was continued until 4 P. M. when the fleet left its anchorage off Seguin light and moved seaward. Nothing of importance happened this night.

Early the next morning, the 28th, the fleet was sighted by Station D, off Richmond's Island, through the fog. The station at once communicated to the signal officer and notified the colonel commanding of the approach of the fleet, who at once ordered batteries ambushed to command the coast. At 7 A. M. 54 boat loads of marines and sailors (about 1,800 men) landed at Bowery beach, but were repulsed according to information. Three men captured the signal property at this station, which it would have been impossible for them to do, had the men of the corps been armed.

About 10 A. M. the landing party of the navy (prisoners) moved upon the Two Lights and took possession of Station E, where no signal equipments could be found as they had been hid on the approach of the landing party. But during the time the landing party was in possession, 1st Sergt. Fred W. Antonson was ordered to communicate the information to Capt. Lenoir and several forts by telephone and was not discovered until the message had been sent.

On the 29th the several stations returned to Fort Preble where they were mustered for pay by Capt. Lenoir and received his congratulations for the valuable services rendered.

The discipline and work of the three signal men of the U. S. A. were excellent. Much credit is due to the sergeant of the New York Corps for the neatness and general appearance of their quarters.

The work and discipline of the Maine Corps was a credit to the State and showed the benefit of the hard work that had been done previous to the maneuvers.

SPECIAL REPORT, AMBULANCE CORPS.

LEWISTON, October 21, 1903.

Augustus B. Farnham, Adj. Gen. N. G. S. M., Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report in regard to the part taken by the Ambulance Corps, N. G. S. M., during the War Maneuvers at the artillery district of Portland, Me., from August 22d to August 29th inclusive.

In compliance with General Order No. 20 A. G. O. State of Maine, I left my home station (Lewiston, Me.) August 21, 1903, at 10.15 A. M. with a command of seventeen (17) men, arriving at Railroad wharf in the artillery district of Portland, Me., at 12.45 P. M. on the same date.

The corps was divided into two (2) detachments. With the ambulance and the first detachment of eight (8) men, I reported to the surgeon in charge of the hospital headquarters 1st Infantry, N. G. S. M., at Fort Williams.

Sergt. J. M. Libby with the second detachment of eight (8) men reported to the surgeon in charge of the hospital headquarters 2nd Infantry, N. G. S. M., at Long Island.

The men were immediately arranged into details for orderly duty at the hospitals.

Up to the time war was declared the men not on duty attended daily lectures given by the major surgeon.

August 22d two (2) men were detailed from Fort Williams for orderly duty at the hospital at Fort Preble, and two (2) men from Long Island for orderly duty at the hospital at Fort Leavitt.

At Long Island the number of ambulance corps men not being sufficient to do the work required by the surgeons, one (1) man

was detailed from each of the six (6) companies stationed at that post and ordered to report to Sergt. Libby for hospital duty.

During the maneuvers and at the time when the land forces were attacked, dressing stations were established and litter squads stationed at a reasonable distance from the firing lines.

As there were no casualties, the men had very little actual practice, but on the whole the work was very instructive and beneficial.

At Fort Williams the ambulance was the only wheel transportation furnished, consequently this had to be used to convey all hospital equipment, tents, medical supplies, etc., to the several outlying posts.

I arrived at my home station August 29th at 7.45 P. M.

In closing this report I wish to thank the surgeons of National Guard for the courtesies and favors extended to myself and men of the ambulance corps during the entire tour of duty.

**REPORT OF LIEUT. H. M. BIGELOW, COMMANDING
SHIP'S COMPANY NAVAL RESERVE.**

HEADQUARTERS SHIP'S COMPANY,
NAVAL RESERVE, N. G. S. M.,

PORTLAND, ME., August 31, 1903.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith a report of tour of duty of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., from August 24th to August 29th, 1903.

As early as the first of March this year I was informed by an officer connected with the naval board at Washington, that it was contemplated to hold joint Army and Navy Maneuvers off the coast of Maine sometime during the season, in which the Naval Reserve, together with the National Guard of this State, would be asked to participate. He informed me that the problem to be worked out would be the attack upon the city of Portland by a large fleet, in order to test the efficiency of the fortifications of this port.

Realizing that should my command be ordered to participate in these maneuvers, and if the problem to be solved was the attack upon Portland, that all knowledge we might gain for the navy, which in this case was to act as the enemy, would be of inestimable value to them, we immediately proceeded to organize an intelligence department, and from that time until we were ordered to join the fleet at Rockland, the men and officers of this command were diligently gathering all available information regarding the fortifications, garrison, torpedo plans, cables, signal stations, search light stations and all that entered into the scheme of defense.

On May 19th the North Atlantic Squadron, under the command of Rear Admiral Barker, who was to command the joint fleets in the proposed maneuvers, sailed from New York for the Azores not to return until just prior to the beginning of the maneuvers off this coast; and when he sailed from New York we were able to place in his hands a carefully prepared chart of this port and adjacent coast, showing location of all batteries, number of guns, number of men, proposed camps for infantry supports, search light stations and cables laid and to be laid, torpedo plan, and much more information which we believed would be of service. This information was secured by means perfectly legitimate and available in time of imminent war to any active enemy operating in this city through well paid agents or spies. The information was volunteered and not requested by Admiral Barker or any of the officers of the navy, but results showed that they had made good use of the material furnished, and much of the success which the navy attained in the recent maneuvers, was due to this information.

On Monday, August 22d, my command following out instructions received from your office, was entrained with its baggage for Rockland, where we reported according to assignment, to Captain Geo. A. Converse on the U. S. Battleship Illinois, at one P. M. The men of my command were at once billeted with the regular ship's company, the officers assigned to gun division and the men drilled and instructed with the regular crew. Monday afternoon the joint fleets numbering in all about thirty-five ships of all types, and classes got under way and stood out to sea. The training squadron under the command of Rear Admiral Coglan, upon one of whose ships were the Massachusetts Naval Militia, led the fleet out of the harbor, and disappeared below the horizon sailing due south. The battleship squadron with the other two squadrons and the torpedo boats continued along the coast until about midnight. On Monday, August 22d, they came to anchor with Seguin Island light abeam, and about two miles away.

Tuesday was rainy and the fleet remained at anchor at this point during the entire day and until eleven-thirty o'clock, P. M. During the day the battleships were cleared for action as they

would be in case of actual hostilities, with the exception that the boats and much of the woodwork and the furnishings which ordinarily would be thrown overboard, were simply tagged to be "thrown overboard."

At eleven-thirty P. M., Tuesday, August 23d, the entire fleet now joined by the squadron of Rear Admiral Coglan got under way and steamed slowly toward Portland, where the tremendous search lights of the fortifications could be seen sweeping the horizon in every direction.

I shall confine myself in this report of these most instructive, spectacular and interesting maneuvers to the part played by my command in them, and without endeavoring to enter into any explanation or description of the features of the navy's attack upon this strongly fortified port. Having proceeded to a point which seemed to be well within the range of the batteries at Fort Leavitt and Fort McKinley without being picked up by the search lights, the battleship's squadron which led the attacking force came to a full stop and remained in this position drifting with the tides for over two hours, while the officers and men were kept up to the enthusiastic state by the magnificent search light displayed from the forts and stations about the city.

Just as day was breaking, Rear Admiral Barker on the *Kearsarge*, his flagship, signalled to the ships of his fleet: "Full speed ahead. Commence firing when within range," and in a long column the most powerful fleet that our country has assembled since the Civil War, commenced its dash toward the harbor. The spectacle was sublime from our position and the rapidity and presumably accurate fire of the forts impressed all those on the fleet as to the strength of the fortifications of Portland. Nevertheless, the battleships continued under full speed firing at the forts with precision and regularity, as though in actual engagement, running in through the ships' channel, and finally coming to anchor in the upper harbor. As to whether the navy which had already countermined the channel to remove the torpedoes prior to the attack, would have been able to have run the batteries in actual war and have brought through in safety a large enough proportion of its fleet to have been a menace to the forts on their vulnerable side and to threaten the city, is a question which might be argued from either standpoint,

but this attack demonstrated the fact beyond all question, that in order to successfully defend this city or any other, it is absolutely necessary that the army have some co-operation on the part of the navy.

In this attack my command was stationed at the batteries and went through all of the action as though it was regularly attached to the ship's company, while the officers were all in charge of batteries in the various divisions commanding not only their own men but regular gun's crew as well and acquitted themselves with credit.

After the attack upon the city Wednesday morning the fleet returned to Middle Bay where it remained at anchor until Thursday afternoon. Wednesday noon I was ordered to report to Admiral Barker on the Kearsarge, where his squadron commanders were assembled and where some plans for the working out of the other attacks were discussed. Several expeditions were successfully carried out on Wednesday afternoon by the marines, and Wednesday evening I was ordered to report to Captain Swyneburne of the training ship Alliance, who was placed in command of an expedition whose purpose was an attack upon the forts within the harbor. This was to be a night boat expedition and the program for it had been thoroughly discussed by me with the flag lieutenant of the fleet, but greatly to my disappointment, Captain Converse, to whose ship I was attached, refused to grant me permission to participate in this expedition, as it was thought that sometime during the night our landing party might be ordered out for an attack. I detailed, however, at Captain Swyneburne's request, some of my men to accompany his expedition which passed within the circle of the forts without detection under their guidance and through channels unknown to any of the army officers, and succeeded in getting in the rear of Fort Gorges where, "constructively" speaking, all of the ammunition for the defense of the port was stored, and captured it in a most brilliant manner and afterwards effected their escape, having constructively destroyed the fort without loss, and almost without detection. For my command, I think we are entitled in claiming the entire credit for this sensational success, planned and guided as it was by our men.

Thursday morning a landing expedition of about twelve hundred men was ordered, in which my command participated, as one company of the Illinois battalion. In cutters and launches this expedition was towed by two gunboats to within a mile of the easterly end of Long Island, on which island the army had an important search light and signal station defended by six companies of the 2nd Maine Infantry and some regulars. At this point the officers of my command were ordered on the gunboat, where the commanding officer of the expedition was stationed, and by our advice the landing was effected on the easterly end of Long Island on a beach previously explored by my command. The Maine men were ordered to take the right of the attacking column and act as skirmishers and guides. We proceeded for about a mile in double time and plunged into a thick woods where we first encountered the enemy's outposts capturing them in detail, and effecting the destruction of this important station, and with surprising ease. It is but justice to Colonel Newcomb of the Second Infantry, to state that had he been left to dispose of his command as he thought fit, that the expedition would have been repulsed. After a most valuable experience in this land attack during which, at times the officers of my command displayed remarkable ability in the handling of not only their own men but of other companies and even battalions of regulars, we returned on board ship and witnessed the daylight attack upon the forts in which our men once more had important stations at the batteries, and the fleet came to anchor behind Richmond's Island.

On Friday, August 28th, with the Illinois battalion, my command once more participated in the strongest landing expedition that the navy has ever put ashore, numbering in all some two thousand men, and after a march of three miles across country, during which my command was once more selected by Rear Admiral Cogan, who commanded the expedition, to serve as skirmishers, the navy captured another important outpost.

This expedition practically concluded our active participations in the maneuvers, and Saturday the 29th we were ordered to embark on the gunboat and return to Portland.

Captain George A. Converse of the Illinois, under whose command we served, expressed his appreciation of our services;

complimented the men and officers upon their knowledge and conduct, and said the highest compliment he could pay the command, was to state that when they joined his ship at Rockland, had he not known otherwise, he would have thought that it was a fine draft of men from some other ship, which had been sent him.

On leaving the fleet Rear Admiral Barker signalled the following message to me:

“U. S. KEARSARGE FLAGSHIP, NORTH ATLANTIC SQUADRON,
August 29, 1903.

Com'd'g Officer Maine Naval Militia:

Accept my congratulations for the behavior and conduct of your command, and my thanks for your services.

ALBERT S. BARKER,
Rear Admiral, U. S. Navy.”

In conclusion I have the honor to report that the experience and knowledge gained by my command in these maneuvers cannot be over estimated, and in my opinion should necessity arise it would be of inestimable value to the State under whose colors they serve.

I. In accordance with the provisions of the Militia Law and the Regulations for the National Guard, the Inspector-General will proceed forthwith to inspect the several companies and corps of the National Guard, giving at least ten days' notice of such inspection to the commanding officer of each organization, which notice will be promptly acknowledged to the Inspector-General.

II. So far as practicable, the Inspector-General will so fix the dates of the inspections as to make them correspond with those of the regular drills of the several organizations. He will advise regimental commanders of the inspections in their respective regiments, by sending them notices in each case, which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.

III. The Surgeon-General will accompany the Inspector-General when the Ambulance Corps is inspected and will make a special report.

IV. All organizations will be paraded in fatigue uniform, armed and equipped. Each company or corps commander will have collected in the armory, and conveniently arranged for inspection, all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession, and all books and papers pertaining to his organization.

V. Each company and corps commander, for the use of the Inspector-General, will prepare duplicate returns of his company or corps, and will furnish Inspection Report (Form No. 1), on which will be entered a complete list of all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession.

VI. The attention of company and corps commanders will be called to the care and preservation of all property entrusted to his care and special instruction will be given to the proper method of making and forwarding the necessary returns.

VII. Officers accountable for military property, having any such property which they consider unserviceable, will prepare Inventories (Form No. 4), and will present the same with the property to the Inspector-General for his action. Attention is called to Article XXXVI of the Regulations for the National Guard, the provisions of which govern all inspections.

VIII. While on the inspecting tour enjoined in this order, the Inspector-General will devote to each organization a reasonable time for instruction, both theoretical and practical, during which he will take up guard duty and the necessary administrative work of the company.

IX. For each inspection a detail will be made by Special Orders, of one commissioned officer who will report to the Inspector-General and act as his assistant in the inspection and verification of all military property and to perform such other duties as he may be required.

X. All officers accountable for military property will see that each article in their possession is plainly marked in such a manner that it can be easily identified in case of loss, and all articles, wherever found, will be counted to the credit of and returned to the company whose mark it bears. Company commanders are hereby authorized to make the necessary expenditure for stamps, stencils, etc., to enable them to comply with the above requirements.

The following acts of the Legislature are hereby published for the information and government of all concerned:

- I. AN ACT to amend section sixteen of chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three relating to the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section sixteen of said act is hereby amended by striking out the words "in case of war, insurrection or invasion," so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 16. The staff of the commander-in-chief shall consist of the adjutant-general, who shall be, ex-officio, chief of staff, quartermaster-general and paymaster-general with the rank of major-general; an inspector-general, with the rank of brigadier-general; a commissary-general, a surgeon-general, a judge advocate-general, and an inspector-general of rifle practice, each with the rank of colonel; two aides-de-camp with the rank of lieutenant colonel, and a military secretary with the rank of major. Provided, however, that the commander-in-chief may appoint such additional staff officers as the public service shall require, and with such rank as he may designate. The staff of the commander-in-chief shall be appointed and commissioned by him and shall hold office during his pleasure and until their successors are appointed and qualified.'

Approved March 28.

- II. AN ACT to amend chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, as amended by chapters one hundred and twenty-eight of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine and one hundred and sixty-seven of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and one, relating to the Militia.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Section thirty of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "of" following the word "day" in the thirteenth and twentieth lines, and substituting therefor the word 'following,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 30. All enlistments in the National Guard shall be for three years, and shall be made by signing such enlistment book as may be prescribed by the commander-in-chief. An attested copy of the enlistment book shall at the organization of each company, be made by the clerk and forwarded, together with duplicates of all enlistment papers,

forthwith to the adjutant-general. When a soldier re-enlists and is mustered into the service within thirty days from the expiration of his previous term, his service shall be considered as unbroken and continuous, and re-enlistments and musters shall be dated as of the day following such expiration. When the term of service of any enlisted man terminates during a period of furlough and while he is serving in the United States army, should he re-enlist in the National Guard within thirty days of his muster out of the United States army, his service shall be considered as continuous, and shall in like manner commence on the day following such expiration, and re-enlistments and musters shall be so dated. When new enlistments or re-enlistments are made in any organization, the commanding officer shall forward duplicate enlistment papers to the adjutant-general.'

Sect. 2. Section forty-one of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "discharged" in the seventh line, and substituting therefor the words 'recommended for discharge,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 41. Each colonel of a regiment may enlist and muster a band of musicians, not exceeding twenty-five, including one master, one deputy master and one drum major, to be attached to his regiment; provided that the members of such band shall furnish their own uniforms and instruments. They may be recommended for discharge by the colonel at his pleasure.'

Sect. 3. Section forty-six of said act is hereby amended by striking out all the section following the word "time" in the second line, and inserting the following: 'Enlisted men may also be discharged by the commander-in-chief, upon personal application in writing, approved by intermediate commanding officers, or upon the recommendation of the commanding officer of any company, battery, troop or corps, approved by intermediate commanding officers,' so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 46. The commander-in-chief may, in his discretion, discharge enlisted men at any time. Enlisted men may also be discharged by the commander-in-chief, upon personal application in writing, approved by intermediate commanding officers, or upon the recommendation of the commanding officer of any company, battery, troop or corps, approved by intermediate commanding officers.'

Approved March 11.

III. AN ACT to amend chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the Public Laws of nineteen hundred and one, providing for the retirement of commissioned officers of the Militia of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section one of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "nine" in the third line, and substituting therefor the word 'six,' and by inserting after the word "years" in the fourth line, the words 'or for

the period of nine years not necessarily continuous.' By striking out the words "rank held by him at the time of his discharge from said service or at the time such application is made" in the fifth, sixth and seventh lines and substituting therefor the words 'highest rank held by him during said service.' By striking out the words "at the time of such discharge or of making such application, has" in the eighth and ninth lines and substituting therefor the words 'shall have.' So that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 1. Any person who shall have served as a commissioned officer in the Militia or the National Guard of this State, for the continuous period of six years or for the period of nine years not necessarily continuous, may, upon his own application, be placed upon the retired list, with the highest rank held by him during said service, provided, however, that an officer so retired who shall have remained in the same grade for the continuous period of nine years shall be retired with increased rank. Retired officers on occasions of ceremony may and when acting under orders as hereinafter provided, shall wear the uniform of their retired rank. Retired officers shall be eligible to perform military duty, and the commander-in-chief may, in his discretion, by order require them to serve upon military boards, courts of inquiry and courts martial, or to perform any other special or temporary military duty, and for such service they shall receive the same pay and allowances as are provided in law for like service by the officers of the National Guard. All retired officers shall be amenable to courts martial for military offenses as if upon the active list of the National Guard. The names of all officers of retired rank shall be borne upon a separate roster, kept under the supervision of the adjutant-general. Retired officers shall report to the adjutant-general any change in their residence whenever such change occurs.'

Approved March 11.

IV. AN ACT to amend chapter forty-six of the Public Laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-nine, establishing a Naval Reserve as a part of the National Guard of the State of Maine.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives in Legislature assembled, as follows:

Section 1. Section one of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "battalion" in the fifth line thereof and the words which follow, and inserting in place thereof the words 'ship's company'; so that said section, as amended, shall read as follows:

'Sect. 1. There may be allowed, in addition to the National Guard of the State of Maine as provided in section twenty-six, chapter two hundred and sixty-six of the laws of eighteen hundred and ninety-three, a naval reserve, to consist in time of peace of not more than one ship's company.'

Sect. 2. Section three of said act is hereby amended by striking out the words "battalion may" in the first line thereof, and inserting in place thereof the words 'ship's company shall,' by striking out the words "four"

and "an engineer division" in the second line thereof, and inserting in place of the former the word 'eight,' and by adding to said section the words 'in time of war, insurrection, invasion, or imminent danger thereof of not more than sixteen divisions'; so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 3. In time of peace the authorized ship's company shall consist of not more than eight divisions and in time of war, insurrection, invasion, or imminent danger thereof, of not more than sixteen divisions.'

Sect. 3. Section four of said act is hereby stricken out, and in place thereof the following section is substituted:

'Sect. 4. The ship's company shall be commanded by a lieutenant. There shall be allowed on the staff of the commanding officer of the ship's company, one lieutenant, junior grade, who shall act as executive officer and adjutant, and one assistant surgeon of the rank of lieutenant, junior grade. In addition there shall be on the staff of the commanding officer two chief petty officers of such class as he may designate. Each division shall be commanded by an ensign, excepting that the senior division officer may be commissioned with the rank of lieutenant, junior grade. To each division there shall be allowed, in time of peace, one chief petty officer of such class as the commanding officer of the ship's company may designate and not more than six petty officers and twenty-four enlisted men.'

Sect. 4. Section five is hereby stricken out and the following section substituted in place thereof:

'Sect. 5. Two divisions shall be considered the equivalent of one company of infantry excepting as is herein provided. To the commanding officer of the ship's company there shall be allowed the sum of twenty-five dollars per annum for the care and custody of such government property as he may be responsible for; to each division commander there shall be allowed the sum of twenty-five dollars per annum for the care of State property and equipment for which he is accountable; to the executive officer or adjutant of the ship's company there shall be allowed the sum of ten dollars per annum. To each division there shall be allowed one clerk who shall receive the sum of ten dollars per annum for his services.'

Sect. 5. Section six of said act is hereby amended by striking out the word "the" in the seventh line, and inserting in place thereof the word 'two,' and by striking out the words "of companies" in the eighth line, and inserting in place thereof the words 'a company'; so that said section as amended shall read as follows:

'Sect. 6. The system of administration and instruction of the Naval Reserve shall conform, as nearly as possible, to that of the navy of the United States. Duty shall be performed afloat when possible. When not otherwise provided for, the government of the Naval Reserve shall be according to the laws and regulations now or hereafter governing the National Guard of the State. Two divisions of the Naval Reserve shall be considered the equivalent of a company of infantry.'

Sect. 6. Said act is hereby further amended by adding the following section thereto:

'Sect. 9. When the commissions now issued are vacated the lieutenant commanding the ship's company shall be elected by the division commanders. The election of the division commanders shall be as prescribed for the election of company officers.'

I. The following amendment to the Regulations for the National Guard pertaining to uniform is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

II. On or before August 1st, 1903, all commissioned officers will be expected to be uniformed and equipped with the dress uniform complete, including dress cap, regulation sabre, sabre knots, spurs, gloves and belt, as herein provided. Officers will not be obliged to provide themselves with the other articles called for in these regulations until the same comparative articles shall be issued to the enlisted men; provided, however, that by August 1st, 1904, all officers shall be completely uniformed and equipped as herein provided. New uniforms and equipments will be issued to the enlisted men as soon as same can be drawn from the United States government, until such time those now in use will be worn.

Until further orders the use of saddles, saddle cloths, bridles and other articles of horse equipment now in the possession of officers will be permitted; but officers purchasing new articles of equipment must conform strictly to the within regulations.

All previous orders or regulations conflicting with this are hereby revoked.

III. Samples of the articles of equipment specified in the within regulations will be on exhibition in the office of the Quartermaster-General and officers so desiring may purchase through this office at the cost price to the State.

UNIFORM OF THE NATIONAL GUARD OF THE STATE OF MAINE.

ARTICLE XLVI. Regulations for the National Guard is hereby amended by striking out paragraphs 554 to 587 inclusive, and substituting the following, so that said article as amended shall read as follows:

ARTICLE XLVI.

UNIFORM.

Militia Law, 41, 69, 70, 71, 72, 75.

GENERAL REGULATIONS.

554. 1.—The garments, head gear, foot gear, ornaments, insignia, buttons, decorations, and other articles herein specified, grouped in the manner prescribed, will constitute the uniforms of the Staff of the Commander-in-Chief and the National Guard of the State of Maine, except the Naval Reserve, and will be worn on the occasions prescribed (see Table of Occasions) unless otherwise directed by proper authority.

2. The proper dress will be determined by the commanding officer with due regard to prescribed regulations, the season of the year, and the state of the weather.

3. The Authorized Service Medal, Medal for Perfect Attendance and the various distinctive marks given for excellence in rifle practice may be worn on the breast by officers and enlisted men entitled to them, on all occasions of ceremony, in the manner prescribed in the next paragraph; they will precede all badges of military societies (from the wearer's right to left).

4. Officers and enlisted men who, in their own right or by right of inheritance, are members of military societies of men who served in the armies and navies of the United States in the war of the Revolution, the war of 1812, the Mexican war, the war of rebellion, or the Indian wars of the United States, or the Spanish-American war and the incidental insurrection in the Philippines, or the China Relief Expedition, or are members of the Regular Army and Navy Union of the United States, may wear on all occasions of ceremony, the distinctive badges adopted by such societies, or such other medals as may be authorized by proper authority; badges to be worn on the left breast of the coat with tops of the badges forming a horizontal line, the outer ends of which will be from three to four inches below the top of the shoulder, according to the height of the wearer.

5. Shoulder knots and shoulder straps will be worn by commissioned officers only. Shoulder straps will always be placed on the dress coat, as herein prescribed; their use on the full-dress coat is forbidden.

6. The saber shall be habitually worn hooked up, when dismounted, guard to the rear; it will be worn outside of the overcoat. The proper saber knot will always be worn with the saber.

7. With the full-dress, dress, and service uniforms when worn in the garrison, officers will wear a plain white standing collar and plain white cuffs; the collar to show $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the collar of the coat.

8. Officers and enlisted men are permitted to wear waterproof capes or overcoats, as nearly as practicable the color of the service uniform, when on duty involving exposure to rainy or other inclement weather.

9. In cases of inclement weather when capes, waterproofs, or overcoats are worn, shoulder knots will take the place of epaulets for general officers.

10. When a particular coat or vestment is required by the church to which a chaplain belongs he may wear such coat or vestment while conducting services.

11. The badge of military mourning is a knot of black crape upon the saber hilt for a period not to exceed thirty days.

12. Commanding officers may, in their discretion, in prescribing the uniform for the day in tropical countries or in the warm season, authorize the wearing of white duck trousers with the full-dress or the dress uniform at parades and ceremonies under arms, and on official occasions not of the most formal character. When white trousers are worn with the full-dress or dress uniform the shoes shall invariably be black.

13. The uniform of an officer on the retired list is that prescribed for his actual rank in his regiment or corps when retired, except that the

number of the regiment or insignia of corps or department will not be worn.

14. The full-dress uniform is not authorized for the National Guard but officers may, if they so desire, provide themselves with the full-dress uniform to be worn on occasions of ceremony where full dress is authorized, when not on duty with troops.

DESCRIPTION OF GARMENTS AND OTHER ARTICLES OF UNIFORM FOR OFFICERS.

FULL-DRESS COAT.

555. FOR ALL OFFICERS, EXCEPT CHAPLAINS.—A double-breasted frock coat of dark-blue cloth, with standing collar; the skirt to extend from one-half to three-quarters the distance from the point of the hip to the bend of the knee; the lining to be black, with pockets on the inside of skirt.

For general officers the collar will be made of blue-black velvet; the sleeve will have a cuff of blue-black velvet 4 inches wide. For other officers the collar will be made of the same material as the coat, and the cuffs will simply be a continuation of the material of the sleeves.

This coat will be ornamented as follows:

Shoulder Knots.—Of gold-wire cord, as hereafter described under "shoulder knots." (Par. 569.) To be securely fastened to the coat, and to be made detachable for all officers.

For general officers' epaulets. (Par. 568.)

Collar Ornament.—For *general officers*, the collar will be ornamented with a band of oak leaves embroidered in gold, and extending all the way around.

For *all other officers* the ornament will consist of two bands of $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch gold-wire lace, two vellums, passing all around the collar and parallel with its edge, the upper edge of the upper band being $\frac{1}{4}$ inch from the edge of the collar, the lower edge of the lower band resting on the collar seam. The upper band to be brought down parallel to the front edge of the collar and distant $\frac{1}{4}$ inch therefrom, and to be joined to the lower band. The two bands of gold-wire lace to be on a ground of silk or cloth of the color of the corps, department, or arm of the service, with an interval of not less than $\frac{1}{4}$ inch nor more than $\frac{3}{4}$ inch between the bands.

Sleeve Ornament.—For *general officers* the velvet cuff of the sleeve will be ornamented with a band of oak leaves embroidered in gold, passing around the cuff; the top of the band of oak leaves to be 1 inch below the upper edge of the velvet cuff; to be surmounted by two stars for a major general and one star for a brigadier general, embroidered in silver, each star to have one point up, and placed above the velvet cuff. For general officers of the staff departments the proper insignia will be placed 1 inch above the velvet cuff, and the stars, as before, 1 inch above the insignia.

For *all other officers* the sleeve will be ornamented with a band of $\frac{1}{2}$ -inch gold-wire lace, two vellums, passing around the cuff $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches

from the end of the sleeve; to be surmounted by the insignia of rank, indicated by flat gold-wire braid $\frac{1}{8}$ inch in width (see Insignia, par. 586). The insignia of the corps, department, or arm of service, in gold or silver metal or embroidery (see Insignia, par. 586), will be placed in the center of the open space under the braid insignia.

Buttons.—Two regulation gilt buttons will be placed at the back of the waist, and one regulation gilt button near the end of each skirt, making four buttons on the back of the coat, for all officers.

Three small regulation gilt buttons will be placed on the cuff at sleeve, for general officers only.

For officers of the various grades regulation gilt buttons will be placed on the breast of the coat as follows:

Major General.—Two rows, nine in each row, placed by threes, the distance between rows being from 8 to 10 inches at the top and from 4 to 5 inches at the bottom; rows and groups to be symmetrically disposed.

Brigadier General.—The same as for the major general, except that there will be eight buttons in each row, placed in pairs.

Colonel, Lieutenant Colonel, and Major.—The same as for the general officers, except that there will be nine buttons in each row, buttons at equal intervals.

Captain, First Lieutenant, and Second Lieutenant.—The same as for a colonel, except that there will be seven buttons in each row.

FOR CHAPLAINS.—A black frock coat with standing collar, one row of nine black silk buttons on the breast. Of same length as for other officers.

DRESS COAT.

556. FOR GENERAL OFFICERS.—A sack coat of dark-blue cloth or serge; three small regulation gilt buttons will be placed on the cuff at sleeve; high rolling collar; double-breasted, with two rows of regulation gilt buttons grouped according to rank, as on the full-dress coat; the skirt to extend one-third the distance from the point of the hip to the bend of the knee. A slit extending from 2 inches above to 2 inches below the hip, so as to permit of hooking up of saber. A shoulder strap, as hereafter described (par. 570), will be placed on each shoulder, adjacent to the seam, and collar ornaments (see Insignia, par. 586) on the collar. Inside pockets.

FOR ALL OTHER OFFICERS.—A single-breasted sack coat of dark-blue cloth or serge, with standing collar fastened with two hooks and eyes; coat to close with flap containing suitable concealed fastenings; slit not exceeding 3 inches for hooking up saber; the skirt to extend from one-third to two-thirds the distance from the point of the hip to the bend of the knee, according to the height of the wearer; cut to fit the figure easily; a vertical opening at each side of the hip, according to pattern. The coat to be trimmed with lustrous flat black mohair braid $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide, as follows: Edged all around the bottom, the front edges, the collar, and for six inches upward from the bottom along both side openings of the skirt.

Shoulder straps as hereafter described (par. 570), and collar ornaments (see Insignia, par. 586) will be worn with this garment.

For *Chaplains* the material will be blue-black cloth or serge, the pattern of the coat being the same as above.

SERVICE COAT.

557. FOR ALL OFFICERS.—A single-breasted sack coat of olive-drab woolen material for winter wear, and of khaki-colored cotton material for summer wear or in the tropics, made with two outside breast patch pockets and two outside patch pockets below the waist; pockets covered by flaps, rounded at edges, buttoned by a small regulation button. The coat to have falling collar, from 1 to 1¾ inches in width, depending on the wearer. On each shoulder a loop of the same material as the coat let in at shoulder seam and reaching from the sleeve seam to the edge of the collar, and buttoning at the upper end with a small regulation bronze button; loops to be 2 inches wide at the shoulder end and 1 inch wide at the collar end. The coat to fit closely at the waist and loosely at the chest, at least 5 inches in excess of chest measurement; buttoned down the front with five regulation buttons. The skirt to extend one-third the distance from the point of the hip to the bend of the knee. All buttons for this coat to be of dull-finish bronze metal.

Insignia.—The coat of arms of the State of Maine will be worn on each side of the collar, about 1 inch from the ends. The insignia of corps, department, or arm of service will be placed on each side of the collar, about ⅝ inch from the coat of arms. The insignia or rank, in gold or silver metal, will be placed on the shoulder loop, near the sleeve seam.

The insignia of corps, department, or arm of service, and the coat of arms, will be of dull-finished bronze.

OVERCOAT.

558. FOR ALL OFFICERS.—A double-breasted ulster of olive-drab woolen material, suitably lined and closing by means of five large buttons; a standing rolling collar of the same material, the "stand" to be not less than ¾ nor more than 1¼ inches, and the turn down (falling) part not less than 4 nor more than 5 inches in width. Collar in front to be closed by two hooks and eyes; a flap of same material 5 inches in length and 2 inches in width, provided with one buttonhole at each end, made detachable, so as to close the falling part of the collar when worn closed.

A pocket on each side placed vertically, lower end of pocket 2 inches below the hip bone extending from 8 to 10 inches upward. Over the pockets a flap of same length, rounded at edges and closed by a small button at middle of flaps. Slits of pockets to be cut through linings, thus permitting the slings to come through left pocket hole for hooking up of saber. The back to be slit up from the bottom 20 to 25 inches and closed by small buttons under concealed flap, the latter buttoning from right to left.

Coat to extend down the legs from 8 to 10 inches below the knee, according to the height of the wearer. Sleeves loose, without cover or slit. Back straps placed at waist line, to extend from seam to seam and made detachable.

A hood of same material as coat, lined with suitable material of same color; made to button around the neck under the collar by means of five small buttons and loops. Hood to be large enough to cover the head and cap when worn at night or in inclement weather.

All buttons to be of horn or ivory conforming in color to the material of the coat.

The front corners of the skirt to be provided with buttons or hooks so that said corners may be turned back when it is necessary to facilitate marching.

Insignia on Sleeve.—Braid insignia of rank as prescribed (see *Insignia*, par. 586); in addition thereto the insignia of corps, department, or arm of service, of dull-finished bronze metal, will be placed in the middle of the lower loop $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches above the end of the sleeve.

For general officers the insignia will consist of a band of lustrous black mohair braid $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches wide placed with its lower edge $2\frac{1}{2}$ inches above end of sleeve; surmounted by the proper number of stars, 1 inch in diameter, of dull-finished bronze metal, placed $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the braid; the stars to be surmounted by a band of lustrous black mohair braid $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the stars.

Overcoats for chaplains to be the same as for other officers except the material shall be black.

CAPES.

559. *For all Officers.*—To be of dark-blue cloth without braid binding, reaching at least to the tips of the fingers with the arm dropped at the side and not below the knee; with a rolling collar of black velvet 3 inches broad, and closing at the throat with a long loop. It may be worn by all officers when not on duty with troops under arms. To be lined as follows:

For General Officers and Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments.—Dark blue.

For Officers of Infantry.—Light blue.

For Officers of Artillery.—Scarlet.

For Officers of Cavalry.—Yellow.

FULL-DRESS TROUSERS.

560. *For General Officers.*—Of dark-blue cloth, with two stripes of gold-wire braid $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide with $\frac{1}{4}$ -inch interval between them, mounted upon light-weight velvet of color of cuffs and collar of coat and placed along the outside seam of the trousers.

For Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments.—Of dark-blue cloth, with one stripe of gold-wire braid $\frac{3}{8}$ inch wide along each outside seam.

For Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, and Infantry.—Of sky-blue cloth, with stripes $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches wide, welted at the edges; the color of the stripes to be that of the facings of the respective corps or arms.

For Chaplains.—Of plain black or blue-black cloth, with stripe of lustrous black mohair braid $\frac{7}{8}$ inch wide along the outside seams.

A trouser strap of black leather 1 inch wide will be worn with the full-dress trousers.

DRESS TROUSERS.

561. *For General Officers and Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments.*—Of dark-blue cloth, without stripe, welt, or cord.

For Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, and Infantry.—The same as for full dress.

For Chaplains.—Of plain black or blue-black cloth, without stripe, welt, or cord.

A trouser strap of black leather 1 inch wide will be worn with the dress trousers.

SERVICE TROUSERS.

562. *For all Officers.*—Of olive-drab woolen or cotton material, to match the coat, without stripe, welt, or cord.

BREECHES.

563. *Full-dress and Dress Breeches for General Officers and all Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments.*—Of dark-blue material, cut in the prescribed pattern and fastened from the knee down with dark bone buttons of appropriate size or with laces. These will be worn with the full-dress and dress uniform mounted. Black boots and spurs will invariably be worn with these uniforms. For full-dress and dress breeches of *officers of cavalry, artillery, and infantry*, when mounted, breeches cut and fastened as above and of the same material and with the same colored stripe as their full-dress trousers.

SERVICE BREECHES.

564. *For all Officers.*—Of olive-drab woolen or cotton material, to match the service coat, without stripe, welt, or cord. To be made loose about the seat and above the knees; to fit closely below the knee, extending to the tops of the shoes, and to be fastened with tapes or laces or buttons. To have a re-enforce or saddle piece of the same material on the seat and legs for officers required to be mounted.

CHAPEAU AND FULL-DRESS CAP.

565. *For General Officers, Full-dress.*—A full-dress cap, to be of the same size and make as the full-dress cap for other officers, except that it will have a blue-black velvet band between the two lower welts $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide and midway thereon an embroidered design of oak leaves

in gold 1 inch wide surrounding the cap; and on the visor an ornament of oak leaves embroidered in gold on the upper surface, as described below.

All General Officers (dismounted) shall wear the chapeau.

For Officers of Cavalry, Artillery, Infantry, and other officers of the Staff Corps and Departments when in full dress.—To be a dark-blue cloth, with three cloth welts; total depth, $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches; diameter across the top, $8\frac{3}{4}$ inches for a cap of size 7, the top to be $\frac{1}{8}$ inch larger or smaller for every size above or below the above head size. The sides to be made in four pieces; to be $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches between upper welts and stiffened with hair cloth and wire around crown. Between the two lower welts a band $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches in width to be arranged as follows: Gold lace, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide; background $\frac{3}{4}$ inch wide; gold lace, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide. The background between the bands of gold lace will be as follows: Of silk, the color being that of the facings of the corps, department, or arm of service (par. 587). Visor to be of black patent leather, $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches deep at the center and of green color underneath; to droop at an angle of 45 degrees; to be ornamented with oak leaves embroidered in gold on the upper surface, for all officers above the rank of captain. Cap to be provided with flat gold cap strap, $\frac{3}{8}$ inch wide, to be held at the sides by two small regulation gilt buttons. The cap badge shall be the coat of arms of the United States embroidered in gold, as per pattern, and so placed that the tip of the eagle wings shall be $\frac{3}{4}$ inch below the top welt of the cap.

DRESS CAP.

566. To be the same as for "full-dress cap," except that instead of the gold lace and colored background, the space between the lower welts shall be covered as follows: For general officers, by a band of blue-black velvet; for all other officers, by a band of lustrous black mohair braid. The visor ornament of gold oak leaves is also excepted. All the details to be in accordance with pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. No departure therefrom will be permitted.

HAT.

567. Of felt, of color of the service uniform, as nearly as practicable, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. To be ornamented with a double cord $\frac{1}{8}$ inch in diameter, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General, as follows: For *general officers* to be of gold; for *all other officers*, of gold bullion and black silk intermixed.

For Chaplains.—A black hat, similar in shape to the hat for other officers; to be ornamented with a cord of gold bullion and black silk intermixed, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General.

This hat is intended for full-dress and dress. In the field chaplains will wear the same hat as other officers.

EPAULETS.

568. *For General Officers.*—Of gold, with solid crescent. The only device will be the coat of arms of the State of Maine embroidered in gold, placed in position now occupied by star in epaulet of brigadier general.

SHOULDER KNOTS.

569. Of gold-wire cord $\frac{1}{4}$ inch in diameter, formed of three cords in four plaits and rounded top, finished with small gilt regulation button; about $5\frac{1}{2}$ inches long, extending from the seam of the sleeve to the seam of the collar; slightly stiffened with a flexible backing, which is to be covered with cloth of the color of the coat; to be made detachable.

For all officers above the rank of captain the shoulder knot to have attached to its upper surface, in the middle of its length, the coat of arms of the State of Maine embroidered in gold, according to the sample in the office of the Quartermaster General.

SHOULDER STRAPS.

570. *Major General.*—Dark-blue cloth, $1\frac{1}{8}$ inches wide and 4 inches long, bordered with an embroidery of gold $\frac{1}{4}$ inch wide; two silver embroidered stars of five rays each, the center of each star to be 1 inch from the outer edge of the gold embroidery on the ends of the strap; both stars of the same size.

Brigadier General.—The same as for a major general, except that there will be one star instead of two at the center of the strap.

Colonel.—The same as for a brigadier general, omitting the star, with a silver embroidered spread eagle on the center of the strap, 2 inches between the tips of the wings, having in the right talon an olive branch and in the left a bundle of arrows; an escutcheon on the breast as represented in the "Arms of the United States." Color of the cloth of the straps to be as stated under "Colors of Facings" (par. 584).

Lieutenant Colonel.—The same as for a colonel, according to corps, department, or arm of service, omitting the eagle, with a silver-embroidered leaf at each end, each leaf extending $\frac{7}{8}$ inch from the end of the strap.

Major.—The same as for lieutenant colonel, with a gold-embroidered leaf at each end instead of the silver leaf; each leaf extending $\frac{7}{8}$ inch from the end of the strap.

Captain.—The same as for a major, omitting the leaves; at each end two silver-embroidered bars of the same width as the border, placed parallel to the ends of the strap; the distance between them and the border equal to the width of the border.

First Lieutenant.—The same as for a captain; at each end one silver-embroidered bar of the same width as the border, placed parallel to the ends of the strap, at a distance from the border equal to the width of the border.

Second Lieutenant.—The same as for a first lieutenant, omitting the bars.

Chaplain.—Of dark-blue cloth of the usual size and pattern, with a plain Latin cross of silver in the center.

AIGUILLETES.

571. *For Officers of the Adjutant General's Department, Officers of the Inspector General's Department, Aids-de-Camp to General Officers, and Regimental Adjutants.*—Of gold-wire cord, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General.

SASHES.

572. *For General Officers.*—Buff silk ribbon 3 to 4 inches wide, or buff silk net, or buff silk and gold thread or webbing with silk bullion fringe edges; general officers above the grade of brigadier general will wear the sash across the body from the right shoulder to the left side, and not extended around the waist.

For Brigadier Generals.—The sash to be as prescribed. It shall be made up and fastened with a flat catch, knot arranged ready for adjustment. Sash to be worn only in one thickness around the waist so as to fit snugly over the belt, fastened with a metal clasp, and to be tied in a double bow; tassels pendant midway between the hip and knee.

CRAVATS.

573. *For all Officers, except Chaplains.*—Of black silk, the tie not to be worn outside the opening of the collar. *For Chaplains.*—A white or black tie.

GLOVES.

574. Of drab-colored leather according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. To be worn with the service uniform. They may also be prescribed by the commanding officer for the full-dress or dress uniform of officers when mounted. Dismounted officers on duty with troops under arms in full dress or dress will wear white gloves.

SABERS.

575. *For all Officers, except Chaplains.*—According to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General; the guard and scabbard to be of German silver.

With the service uniform the scabbard shall be of steel in dull-finished nickel.

SABER KNOTS.

576. *For General Officers.*—Heavy gold cord with acorn ends, according to pattern.

For all other Officers, except Chaplains.—Strap and acorn to be of gold bullion and black silk interwoven.

The gold-lace saber knots will be worn on full dress and dress occasions. On other occasions officers will wear a saber knot of plaited russet leather, according to pattern.

FULL-DRESS SABER BELTS.

577. *For all Officers, except Chaplains.*—A waist belt not less than 1½ inches nor more than 2 inches wide, with detachable slings, to be worn outside of the full-dress coat. To be made of the following materials and facings:

For Major Generals.—Of red Russia leather, with three stripes of gold embroidery, having detachable embroidered Russia leather slings.

For Brigadier Generals.—A black webbing belt, with detachable Russia leather slings, same as the slings for major generals. The belt to be fastened with a flat, smooth brass buckle, and to be worn on the outside of the coat under the sash.

For all Field Officers.—One broad stripe of gold lace on black-enameled leather.

For all Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments below the Rank of Field Officer.—Four stripes of gold lace interwoven with black silk on black-enameled leather.

For Officers of Cavalry, Artillery and Infantry below the Rank of Field Officer.—Four stripes of gold-wire lace interwoven with silk of the color of arm of service, on black-enameled leather.

FULL-DRESS BELT PLATE.

578. *For all Officers, except Chaplains.*—Gilt, rectangular, 2 inches wide, with bright raised rim; a silver wreath of laurel encircling the "Arms of the United States;" eagle, shield, scroll, edge of cloud and rays bright. The motto "E pluribus unum," upon the scroll, stars also of silver.

LEATHER OR WEBBING BELTS.

579. *For all Officers, except Chaplains.*—Of stuffed russet leather, with detachable slings of the same material, provided with a buckle of dull-finished bronze, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. To be worn under the dress coat and overcoat, and outside the service coat.

In the field the use of a belt made with cross belts over the shoulders, and adapted to carry saber and pistol, is authorized.

A belt of black webbing, arranged for detachable slings, may be worn under the dress coat. Full-dress slings will be worn with the full-dress uniform and the russet-leather slings with all other uniforms.

BOOTS.

580. *For all Mounted Officers.*—To be of stuffed russet leather, for service uniform; polished black, black enamel or patent leather for dress and full dress mounted, and always to be so worn. The spur rest to be worn 1¾ inches above bottom of heel.

SHOES.

581. *For all Officers.*—Russet leather shoes will be worn with the cotton and woolen service uniforms. For full-dress and dress uniform the shoes to be of polished black, black enamel or patent leather.

SPURS.

582. *For all Mounted Officers.*—According to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. The projecting stud to be of only sufficient length to prevent the strap slipping; to have a half concealed rowel, showing on the upper side only; buckle to be plain, to be worn with black straps with full-dress and dress uniform, and russet-leather straps with the legging and russet-leather boots, all without chains.

The use of white-metal box spurs with full-dress and dress uniform, dismounted for occasions of ceremony, is required.

LEGGINGS.

583. *For all Officers.*—Stuffed russet-leather leggings of the pattern known as the "strap puttee," to be worn with the service uniform. Mounted officers may substitute stuffed russet-leather boots. In the field a canvas legging, as furnished by the Quartermaster's Department, may be worn.

COLORS OF FACINGS.

584. *For General Officers and Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments.*—Dark blue.

For Officers of the Signal Corps.—Orange, piped with white.

For Officers of the Medical Department.—Maroon.

For Officers of Cavalry.—Yellow.

For Officers of Artillery.—Scarlet.

For Officers of Infantry.—Light blue.

BUTTONS.

585. *For all Officers.*—Circular, slightly convex; device, coat of arms of the State of Maine. To be of two sizes, (1) the "regulation button," exterior diameter, $\frac{7}{8}$ inch; (2) the "small regulation button," exterior diameter, 9-16 inch.

INSIGNIA.

586. (a) A coat of arms of the State of Maine, made of gold or gilt metal, or dull-finish bronze, as may be prescribed, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. To be worn on the collar of the dress and service coat, placed at a distance of 1 inch from each end of the collar. When worn upon the dress uniform the coat of arms will be of gold or gilt metal. When worn upon the service coat it will be of dull bronze metal.

(b) *Insignia of corps, department or arm of service:*

Adjutant General's Department.—A shield of gold or gilt metal.

Inspector General's Department.—Gold or gilt sword and fasces, crossed and wreathed.

Inspector General of Rifle Practice and Assistant Inspectors-General of Rifle Practice.—Same as for Inspector General's department, except a small target of silver metal in center of wreath.

Judge-Advocate General's Department.—Sword and pen in gold or gilt metal, crossed and wreathed.

Quartermaster's Department.—Sword and key crossed on a wheel, surmounted by a spread eagle; of gold or gilt metal, platinum, and enamel.

Subsistence Department.—A silver crescent, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch between cusps, cusps to the rear.

Medical Department.—A caduceus, of gold or gilt metal.

Signal Corps.—Two crossed signal flags and a burning torch, in gold and silver.

Aids-de-Camp.—A device, $1\frac{1}{3}$ inches high, consisting of a shield of the United States, of properly colored enamel, $\frac{3}{4}$ inch high and $\frac{3}{4}$ inch wide at top, surmounted by a gold or gilt eagle, with wings displayed according to pattern in the Quartermaster General's office. On the blue field of the shield a star or stars, according to rank of the general on whose staff the officer is serving. Aids to the Commander-in-Chief will display two stars on the blue field.

This device is to be worn on the collar of the dress coat and on the sleeves of the full-dress coat and overcoat in lieu of corps or line device.

Cavalry.—Two crossed sabers, 1 inch high, with number of regiment above intersection; of gold or gilt metal.

Artillery.—Two crossed cannons, design to be 1 inch high, of gold or gilt metal, with oval at intersection having a scarlet center according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General.

The red oval in the insignia for officers of field artillery to exhibit a gilt wheel in outline, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General.

Infantry.—Two crossed rifles, designed to be 1 inch high, with number of regiment above intersection; of gold or gilt metal.

Regimental Staff Officers.—Regimental adjutants, quartermasters, commissaries, and squadron and battalion adjutants will wear in the lower angles of their insignia the devices (of gold or gilt metal) of the respective departments to which their duties correspond.

Chaplains.—The same as for regimental staff officers, except that the pendant design shall be a Latin cross of the same material and size.

The insignia of corps, department, or arm of service to be placed upon the sleeves of the full-dress coat will be of gold or silver metal.

The insignia for the sleeves of the overcoats will be of dull-finished bronze.

The insignia of corps, department, or arm of service will be placed upon the collar of the dress and service coat at a distance of $\frac{5}{8}$ inch from the coat of arms, and will be of gold or gilt metal with the dress and of dull bronze metal with the service uniform.

(c) *Insignia of Rank.*—To be placed on the shoulder loops of the service coat near the shoulder seam as follows:

Major General.—Two silver stars.

Brigadier General.—One silver star.

Colonel.—One silver spread eagle.

Lieutenant Colonel.—One silver leaf.

Major.—One gold leaf.

Captain.—Two silver bars.

First Lieutenant.—One silver bar.

BRAID INSIGNIA OF RANK.

Colonel.—A single knot composed of five strands of gold-wire braid not exceeding $\frac{1}{8}$ inch in width. To be applied to the sleeve of the full-dress coat below the elbow, the base resting on the gold band of the sleeve.

Lieutenant Colonel.—Four braids, single knot.

Major.—Three braids, single knot.

Captain.—Two braids, single knot.

First Lieutenant.—One braid, single knot.

Second Lieutenant.—Without braid.

Chaplain.—Without braid.

The outside dimensions of the braid insignia will be the same for all officers, the diminution being made by taking strands from the interior.

Braid insignia for overcoats, made of flat black mohair soutache braid $\frac{1}{8}$ inch in width, will follow the form of the braid insignia for full-dress coats, but be applied with the base resting at the lower end of the sleeve.

DESCRIPTION OF GARMENTS AND OTHER ARTICLES OF UNIFORM FOR ENLISTED MEN.

DRESS COAT.

587. A single-breasted sack coat of dark-blue cloth; fastened with six regulation buttons down the front; standing collar; shoulder loops, of the same material and color, let in at the shoulder seam and to button to the collar with a small regulation button; the sleeves to have a cuff ornamented with three small regulation buttons. The collar, shoulder loops, and cuffs to be piped with "cord edge braid" of the color of corps, department, or arm of service. The color of the braid for Hospital Corps and Signal Corps to be mixed in alternate stripes.

Collar ornaments for enlisted men, of yellow metal similar to those for officers and according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General, will be placed on this coat in the same manner as on the dress coat for officers, substituting the block letters "ME." of brass for the coat of arms.

Field musicians will wear the insignia of regiment or corps on their coat collars.

Chevrons of color of arm of service, placed upon a groundwork of dark-blue cloth will be worn with this coat as prescribed in paragraph 600.

BREAST CORD.

Cords and tassels of mohair, of the color of the corps, department, or arm of the service, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General. To be attached to the dress coat, beginning at the button of the left shoulder loop, one cord passing in rear of the neck and the other in front, under the first button of the coat, crossing under the right shoulder loop and brought together under the right arm with a slide, then passing across the breast between the third and fourth buttons and attached to the left shoulder button.

SERVICE COAT.

588. A sack coat of olive-drab woolen material for winter wear and of khaki-colored cotton material for summer wear or in the tropics, to be cut so as to fit loosely in the chest (at least 5 inches in excess of chest measurement) and to fit closely at the waist; collar seam to come well up in front; to close with five regulation buttons down the front, and to be provided with shoulder loops of the same material. The same collar ornaments and chevrons will be placed on this coat as on the dress coat, except that all buttons and metal ornaments will be of dull-finish bronze.

Chevrons of color of arm of service, placed upon a ground-work of olive-drab material, will be worn with this coat.

OVERCOATS.

589. *For all Enlisted Men.*—Of olive-drab woolen material, general design and cut to be that of the officers' overcoat.

Chevrons of color of arm of service, placed upon a ground-work of olive-drab material, will be worn with this coat.

DRESS TROUSERS.

590. *For all Enlisted Men.*—Of sky-blue kersey.

STRIPES FOR TROUSERS.

Stripes to be of cloth of the following colors:

Cavalry.—Yellow.

Artillery.—Scarlet.

Infantry.—Light-blue.

Hospital Corps.—Maroon, piped with white.

Signal Corps.—Orange, piped with white.

All non-commissioned officers above the rank of corporal will wear stripes $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches in width, including pipings. All corporals will wear stripes $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, including pipings.

Musicians, field musicians and trumpeters will wear two stripes each $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide.

SERVICE BREECHES.

591. Of woolen or cotton material, to match the service coat; to be worn without stripes; to be made loose about the knee, fitting closely below the knee, extending to the tops of the shoes, and fastened with tapes or laces; to be worn with shoes and leggings.

For mounted use, to have a re-enforce or saddle piece of the same material on seat and legs. The general design of the breeches will conform to the pattern prescribed for officers.

FULL-DRESS CAP.

592. Of dark-blue cloth, of the same pattern and shape as that prescribed for officers; between the two lower welts a band $1\frac{3}{4}$ inches wide, to be arranged as follows: A strip of cloth of the color of the corps, department, or arm of service, at top and bottom, the intervening space of $\frac{3}{4}$ inch to be of the color of the cap, the whole forming a detachable band; a black-enameled leather chin strap fitted with a stout fire-gilt slide and a leather keeper, secured at both ends by small gilt regulation buttons, one on each side immediately back of the ends of the visor.

Insignia of yellow metal, except where otherwise specified and made according to patterns in the office of the Quartermaster General will be attached to the front of the cap so that the top of the insignia will be slightly below the top of the cap. Designs as follows:

Cavalry.—Crossed sabers, number of regiments in the upper angle and letter of troop in lower angle.

Artillery.—Crossed cannons, with number of battery or company in the lower angle.

Infantry.—Crossed rifles, number of regiment in the upper angle and letter of company in lower angle.

Hospital Stewards.—A caduceus of white metal, inclosed in a wreath of gilt metal. For acting hospital stewards, and privates of the Hospital Corps, a caduceus of gilt metal, without the wreath.

Non-commissioned Officers of the Signal Corps.—Two crossed signal flags and a burning torch of white metal, inclosed in a wreath of gilt metal. For all other enlisted men of the Signal Corps, two crossed signal flags and a burning torch of gilt metal.

Field Musicians of Infantry and Trumpeters of Cavalry.—A bugle with letter of company or troop in center, and number of regiment above the bugle.

Field Musicians of Artillery.—A bugle with the number of the company or battery in the center.

DRESS CAP.

593. The same as the full-dress cap, with the detachable band showing color of corps, department, or arm of service, removed.

HAT.

594. Of felt, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General; with double hat cord $\frac{1}{8}$ inch in diameter, of firm material, con-

forming in color to that of the corps, department, or arm of service; to be sewed fast to the hat. Letter of the company, troop, or battery, and number of the regiment, made of dull-finished bronze, to be placed on the front part of the crown. To have eyelets on each side for fastening a strap or cord, the use of which is authorized. The hat to be worn creased in the middle as issued.

SHOES.

595. Black shoes will be worn with full dress and dress uniform dismounted. Russet leather shoes will be worn with the service uniform.

LEGGINGS.

596. Of cotton duck or canvas, color of the service uniform, made in accordance with pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General.

COLLARS.

597. *For all Enlisted Men.*—White linen collars; to be worn with the full-dress and dress coat on all occasions and to show $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the collar of the coat.

CRAVATS.

598. *For all Enlisted Men.*—Black, the tie not to be worn outside of the opening of the collar of the coat.

BUTTONS.

599. For all arms, of yellow metal, fire gilt and burnished, or of dull-finished bronze. Same as prescribed for officers (par. 585).

CHEVRONS.

600. The rank of non-commissioned officers will be marked on the dress coat, overcoat, and service coat by chevrons of cloth, according to patterns in the office of the Quartermaster General, corresponding in colors and pipings to those in paragraph 590, relating to stripes for trousers.

The chevrons will be worn points up; midway between the elbow and shoulder on all coats.

Rank will be indicated as follows:

Regimental Sergeant Major.—Three bars and an arc of three bars.

Regimental Quartermaster Sergeant.—Three bars and a tie of three bars.

Regimental Commissary Sergeant.—Three bars and a tie of three bars, having a crescent (points front); top of crescent $\frac{1}{4}$ inch below the inner angle, and lower point of crescent $\frac{1}{4}$ inch above the first of the tiebars.

Squadron or Battalion Sergeant Major.—Three bars and an arc of two bars.

Chief Musician.—Three bars and an arc of two bars, with a bugle of pattern worn on caps in the center.

Chief Trumpeter.—Three bars and an arc of one bar, with a bugle of pattern worn on caps in the center.

Principal Musician.—Three bars and a bugle.

Drum Major.—Three bars and two embroidered crossed batons.

Hospital Steward.—Three bars and an arc of one bar, of maroon cloth, inclosing a caduceus $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches high, embroidered in maroon silk; the bars, arc, and caduceus to have a narrow white border.

Acting Hospital Steward.—The same as for hospital steward, omitting the arc.

Private of the Hospital Corps.—A device consisting of a caduceus $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches high embroidered in maroon silk and having a white border; to be worn on both sleeves of all coats midway between the elbow and the shoulder.

Sergeant of the First Class of the Signal Corps.—Three bars and an arc of one bar, color orange, piped with white, inclosing a device consisting of crossed signal flags, red and white, and a burning torch in yellow.

Sergeant of the Signal Corps.—Same as for sergeant of the first class, omitting the arc.

Corporal of the Signal Corps.—Two bars, inclosing same device as for sergeant of the first class.

Private of the Signal Corps.—Device consisting of crossed signal flags, red and white, and a burning torch in yellow.

CHEVRONS FOR NON-COMMISSIONED OFFICERS OF THE LINE.

First Sergeant.—Three bars and a lozenge.

Troop, Battery, or Company Quartermaster Sergeant.—Three bars and a tie of one bar.

Sergeant.—Three bars.

Color Sergeant.—Three bars and a star.

Stable Sergeant, Field Artillery.—Three bars and a horse's head.

Corporal.—Two bars.

Cook.—A cook's cap of cloth conforming in color to corps, department, or arm of service.

Farrier.—A horse's shoe of cloth $1\frac{3}{8}$ inches long and $1\frac{1}{8}$ inches wide, worn toe uppermost.

Saddler.—A saddler's round knife of cloth.

Mechanic and Artificer.—Two crossed hammers of cloth.

SERVICE CHEVRONS.

601. All enlisted men who have served faithfully for one term of enlistment, for three years, will wear as a mark of distinction upon both sleeves of the dress coat, below the elbow, a diagonal half chevron of cloth of the color of the corps, department, or arm of service in which they served, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, stitched upon a piece of dark-blue cloth of the color of the dress coat, extending from seam to seam, the front end nearest the cuff and $\frac{1}{2}$ inch above the point.

To indicate service in war: a diagonal half chevron of white cloth, $\frac{1}{2}$ inch wide, with piping on each side $\frac{1}{8}$ of an inch wide of cloth of the same color as the facings of the corps, department, or arm of service in which the soldier earned the right to wear it. To be worn on both sleeves of the dress coat.

The following classes of enlisted men are entitled to wear the service-in-war chevron:

1. All enlisted men who served during the war of the rebellion and who were honorably discharged.

2. All enlisted men who served or may serve in the Army of the United States in war, or in such Indian campaigns approaching the magnitude of war, as may from time to time be so designated by the Secretary of War or in orders from the Headquarters of the Army.

3. All enlisted men who served in the Regular or Volunteer Army of the United States between April 21, 1898, and April 11, 1899, and all who have served since the latter date in the Philippine Islands, or with the China Relief Expedition.

The service-in-war chevron will be worn in place of the service chevron for each enlistment in which the right to wear it was earned.

GLOVES.

602. (a) Of drab-colored leather, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General; to be worn with the service uniform and on other occasions when prescribed by the commanding officer.

(b) Of white Berlin, or white wool, to be worn at dismounted ceremonies, and on other occasions when prescribed by the commanding officer.

SPURS.

603. Of yellow metal, plain surface, with stuffed russet-leather straps, according to pattern in the office of the Quartermaster General.

LEATHER BELT.

604. Of stuffed russet leather about 1½ inches in width. To be worn with McKeever cartridge box of same color and material, on duty under arms in garrison, in full-dress and dress uniform.

For troops armed with the saber, a similar belt with suitable slings will be provided for duty in garrison.

Belts and cartridge-carrying devices will be worn by the enlisted men outside the overcoat.

MISCELLANEOUS ARTICLES OF UNIFORM FOR OFFICERS, ENLISTED MEN, AND OTHERS, WITH REGULATIONS PERTAINING THERETO.

SADDLE.

605. To be complete, including cinch, quarter straps, coat straps, hooded stirrups, etc. Saddle and cinch straps to be of stuffed russet leather.

Trimmings to be of dull-finished brass.

General officers, aid-de-camp, officers of the Staff Corps and Departments, and Field Officers may use a flat type of saddle similar to the Whitman or English saddle, covered with russet leather, open stirrups of white metal or steel finish. On campaigns and practice marches the regulation saddle may be used at the option of the officer.

All other officers may use the saddle furnished by the Ordnance Department.

SADDLECLOTHS.

606. *For General Officers.*—Of dark-blue cloth, to be worn over the saddle blanket or pad and under the saddle; trimmed with two bands of gold lace 1 inch wide and $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches apart, the outer band following the edge of the cloth; in each flank corner the coat of arms of the State of Maine surmounted by stars indicating the rank of the general officer. General officers of the staff will have the insignia of the corps or department instead of the coat of arms in the flank corners.

For Officers of the Staff Corps and Departments.—Of dark-blue cloth, worn over the saddle blanket or pad and under the saddle, with an edging of gold lace 1 inch wide; in each flank corner the insignia of the staff corps or department, $2\frac{1}{4}$ inches high.

Aid-de-Camp.—Same as other officers of his arm of service, except that the device shall be of the same design as the collar device prescribed herein—of bright metal for full dress and of dull-bronze metal for service. Dimensions same as for other officers.

For all other Officers, except Chaplains.—Of dark-blue cloth, lined with canvas, worn under the saddle, number of regiment (except for officers of artillery, who will wear the metal insignia prescribed for undress coats, 2 inches high) in enamel leather figures 2 inches in length on each flank corner; edges trimmed with enamel leather 1 inch wide; edges and figures of the same color as the trimmings of their respective arms.

For Chaplains.—Same as for line officers, with edging conforming to color of arm of service with which they are serving. A cross, 2 inches high, of white metal, placed diagonally in each flank corner.

For *field service* a saddlecloth of the above pattern, color of the service uniform, bound with russet leather, may be used if all mounted officers of a command so equip themselves.

For general officers the rank will be indicated by stars of bronze.

For staff officers and aids-de-camp the device will be of dull-finish metal.

For regimental officers the number will be as for the blue saddlecloth, and the artillery device in bronze.

All officers will provide themselves with arms and the articles of personal equipment or of horse equipments pertaining to their rank and duty, and maintain them in efficient order and condition.

SHIRTS.

607. Olive-drab flannel shirts, of light or heavy material, may be worn.

Whenever the coat is not worn no overshirts except the olive-drab flannel or chambray shirts furnished by the Quartermaster's Department will be worn with the service uniform.

SUSPENDERS AND WAIST BELTS.

608. Suspenders or russet leather waist belt may be worn; suspenders when worn must not be visible.

I. In compliance with General Orders No. 15, Headquarters Department of the East, U. S. A., June 25, 1903, and under the provisions of Section XV of the Act approved January 21, 1903 (General Orders No. 7, Headquarters of the Army, A. G. O., January 24, 1903).

The First and Second Regiments Infantry, Ambulance Corps and Signal Corps, of the National Guard of the State of Maine, will participate in the combined Army and Navy Maneuvers at Portland, August 22-29, 1903.

II. Arrangements will be made to concentrate the several organizations at Portland on August 21, for a nine days' tour of duty, with pay for eight days.

Headquarters, Band and eight companies of the First Infantry, and the Ambulance Corps, will be stationed near the Nonesuch river in Scarborough, two companies on Cushing's Island, and two companies on Long Island.

Headquarters, Band and four companies of the Second Infantry, and the Signal Corps, will be stationed near Silver Spring, Cape Elizabeth, three companies near the Two Lights, Cape Elizabeth, four companies on Long Island and one company on Diamond Island.

Hospitals will be established at Nonesuch river, Silver Spring, and Long Island. Regimental commanders will cause the senior medical officers to report to Major Charles B. Ewing, Surgeon, U. S. A., at Fort Preble, for instructions.

Second Lieutenant Charles A. Jumper, commanding Ambulance Corps, will report to the commanding officer of the First Infantry, at Nonesuch river, on Friday, August 21, with his command; he will be assigned to duty at the camp hospital and ordered to report to the surgeon in charge.

Second Lieutenant Wylie D. Floyd, commanding Signal Corps, will report to the commanding officer of the Second Infantry, at Silver Spring, on Friday, August 21, with his command.

III. Officers and men will report, in the service (khaki) uniform, heavy marching order, canteen and haversack will be worn, woolen blanket, poncho and shelter half will be worn in roll, the blue uniforms and overcoats will be packed and taken as baggage.

Regimental, company and corps commanders will see that baggage is restricted to necessary articles; officers will be provided with transportation not to exceed 150 pounds, and enlisted men, not to exceed 100 pounds each; only such articles as are actually necessary for the service required, will be transported.

IV. Regimental commanders will, at once, prepare and forward to this office for approval, general orders covering all details and detachments for the several stations to be occupied, also rules and regulations governing the daily duty, hours of service, roll calls and the general discipline and government of the encampment.

Commanding officers of each organization will report to Colonel Frank G. Smith, Artillery Corps, U. S. A., at Fort Preble, immediately upon arrival at their several stations, for instructions.

V. Transportation will be furnished by the Quartermaster's Department, U. S. A., and details relative to hours of departure and return to home stations will be announced in general orders, later.

Officers and men will be allowed by the United States the same pay, transportation and subsistence as is allowed to officers and men of the same grade in the regular army, they will also be paid by the State an amount equal to the difference between the amount allowed by the United States and that provided by Sections 97 and 99 of the Militia Laws of Maine.

Muster and pay rolls, in triplicate, both United States and State, will be prepared before leaving home stations, by entering thereon the names in full of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with the rank

of officers and date of muster-in of enlisted men, any stoppage under Section 73, Militia Law, to be deducted from the pay of any officer or enlisted man, will be noted against his name in the column for remarks. *The columns for pay accounts must be left blank to be filled in by the Paymaster-General.* Substitutes will not be permitted or paid. No man will be paid whose enlistment papers are not on file in the office of the Adjutant-General, and no non-commissioned officer shall be paid as such, unless notice of his appointment has been received at this office.

VI. No new enlistments will be allowed in any organization of the National Guard, between August 10th and September 1st.

No more than one medical examination will be ordered for each organization between August 10th and September 1st, but men who re-enlist subsequent to said examination, may be examined and mustered on the first day of the encampment.

VII. Regimental quartermasters and commissaries will assume their duties on Wednesday, August 19th. I. Train service for transportation of the several organizations of the National Guard to and from Portland, to attend the combined Army and Navy Maneuvers, August 22 to 29, inclusive, will be provided as follows:

II. A special train will leave Bangor August 21st, at 7.05 A. M., taking Company G, Second Infantry. Co. F will take regular train leaving Dover at 6.50 A. M., connecting with special at Newport. Company E will take regular train leaving Skowhegan at 8.05 A. M. connecting with special at Waterville. Company H will take special at Waterville

at 9.00 A. M. Company M at Augusta at 9.50 A. M. Company A at Gardiner at 10.00 A. M. Company K, First Infantry, at Brunswick at 11.15 A. M. Companies C and I, First Infantry, Companies B and D, Second Infantry, Second Regt. Band and Ambulance Corps, will leave Lewiston, Main St. Station, on regular 10.15 A. M. train, connecting with special at Brunswick. Company H, First Infantry, will leave Rockland on regular 10.10 A. M. train. Company C, Second Infantry, will take this train at Bath at 12.15 P. M.

Company K, Second Infantry, will take regular train from Farmington at 8.20 A. M.

Company G, First Infantry, will take 12.16 P. M. train, western division, Boston and Maine.

Company F, First Infantry, will take regular 11.47 A. M. train from Springvale.

Company D, First Infantry, will take regular 9.20 A. M. train from Norway.

Companies A, B, E, L and M, First Infantry, and the First Regiment Band will assemble at the armory in season to take electric cars at 9 A. M. for their several stations; all company baggage must be at armory ready for transportation at 8.00 A. M.

The Signal Corps will embark on Quartermaster's boat at Merchant's Wharf at 9.00 A. M. Signal Corps baggage must be at armory ready for transportation at 8.00 A. M.

Companies arriving by special train will be conveyed to Railroad Wharf, foot of State street, and companies arriving by regular trains will proceed to that point immediately upon arrival at Portland, where boats and electric cars will be provided to convey them to their several stations. Officers of the Field, Staff and Non-Commissioned Staff will arrange to travel on same trains with companies. Company commanders will see that all baggage is plainly marked with letter of company, number of regiment and destination.

III. Returning August 29th.

Company L, Second Infantry, will take regular train leaving Portland at 11.05 A. M.

Company K, Second Infantry, at 12.55 P. M.

Company F, Second Infantry, at 1.05 P. M.

Company I, Second Infantry, at 10.30 P. M.

Company G, First Infantry, at 6.50 P. M., on western division, Boston and Maine.

Company F, First Infantry, will take 5.32 P. M. train, Preble Street station.

Company D, First Infantry, will take 7.00 P. M. train by Grand Trunk Railway.

All other companies on line of Maine Central will be conveyed by special train leaving Portland at 4.30 P. M.

IV. It is expected that U. S. Paymasters will be in Portland in time to pay the troops on the last day of encampment. To accomplish this,

however, it will be necessary to have rolls made out signed by the men and ready for mustering officers a few days before payment is made. To this end company and corps commanders will have rolls completed and signed by all the men as far as possible before leaving home stations. It is important that this should be attended to. *It must be done* in order to secure payment.

Read instructions for preparation of rolls carefully.

V. Regimental and corps commanders will make a detailed report of the tour of duty, to this office.

General Orders, No. 23.

The following modifications of the Small Arms Firing Regulations of the United States Army, which have been agreed upon by the board of twenty-one members appointed by the Secretary of War under authority of an act of Congress are hereby adopted for the conduct of all competitions in the National Guard of the State of Maine so far as the same are applicable.

1. OFFICERS OF THE COMPETITIONS.—The executive officer will have control of the range for the conduct of the matches, and his decision shall be final.

2. The post adjutant, post quartermaster, and range officers will report to the executive officer, at his headquarters, each morning of the meeting at 8 o'clock, when the range officers will be assigned to their several stations and given their badge of office. A range officer desiring to be relieved from his post of duty will report to the executive officer, so that a substitute may be detailed. The post adjutant and post quartermaster, or their deputies, will be on duty continuously at headquarters.

3. The range officers will supervise the marking and scoring; they will see that the competitors do not evade any of the regulations; they will test the trigger pull of the rifles used by the competitors and inspect the ammunition before the beginning of all matches, and will certify on the score cards to the scores made, after verifying same with the blackboard.

4. In individual matches the range officers will certify to the date, hour, and style of arm on the entry tickets of competitors about to begin.

their score, and when the score is finished he will certify to same on both original ticket and coupon; the latter he will tear off and deposit in scorer's box, returning the original to the competitor.

5. In team matches the range officer will, at the completion of the score at each range, verify the scores on the score card with the black-board, and see that they agree; when the match is finished he will add up the totals, certify to the correctness of same and return the card or cards to the statistical office.

6. The statistical officers will assign the competitors to targets and to order of firing, their determinations being generally made by lot. They will verify the additions of the scores as reported by the score keepers, grade them in order of excellence and prepare the results for official announcement.

7. During the shooting of all team competitions, a range officer shall be detailed to the pit at each distance who shall remain in the pit until the firing at that distance is finished. One representative from each team shall be selected by the team captain at each distance (before the drawing of the targets at that distance) who shall receive from the executive officer a card directing him to remain in the target pit during the firing at the distance about to be begun. The representatives from the various teams in the target pit will call to the attention of the range officer in the pit any irregularity of marking or other matter deemed by them to be necessary, and the decision of the range officer on the spot as to the matter complained of will be final and binding.

8. During the progress of a match or competition, no one except the officers on duty at the range, the competitors and score keepers, will be permitted within the ropes without special permission of the officer in charge.

9. The squads of competitors will be stationed five yards in rear of firing point, where each competitor must remain until called by the score keeper or range officer to take his position at the firing point and until he has completed his score.

10. All expression on the part of the competitor of approbation or disappointment, with reference to any scores made by himself or others, must not be uttered loud enough to be heard at the firing point.

11. **PROTESTS.**—Protests and objections must not be directly submitted to the officer in charge, but to one of the range officers. In case a competitor considers the decision of the latter unwarranted by the facts as presented, he may appeal to the executive officer. Final appeals from decisions of the executive officer must be made in writing and forwarded through that officer to the executive committee of the National Rifle Association or the association under whose auspices the meeting is being held. In national contests an appeal may be taken from the executive committee of the National Rifle Association to the board of twenty-one authorized by act of Congress, etc., whose decision shall be final.

12. **SCORING AND MARKING.**—Hits in the different divisions of the targets and ricochets will be signaled and recorded as prescribed in the Small Arms Firing Regulations. Ricochets count as hits.

13. The exact location of all bullet holes will be marked by a spotter, which will be shown on the target after the next shot.

14. All shots fired by the soldier after he has taken his place at the firing point, and it is his turn to fire—the target being ready—will be considered in his score, even if his piece is not directed toward the target, or is accidentally discharged.

15. Shots fired upon the wrong target will be entered upon the score of the man firing as a miss, no matter what the value of the hit upon the wrong target.

16. In slow fire, if two shots strike a target at the same, or nearly the same time, both will be signaled, and if a shot was just fired from the firing point assigned to that target, the hit having the higher of the two values signaled will be entered in the soldier's score, and no record made of the other hit.

17. The score keepers will be seated close to and in the rear of the firing point stakes, and will, as each shot is signaled, announce in an audible tone the name of the competitor, the value of the shot, and number on score card, marking same on the blackboard and competitor's card. At the conclusion of the score of each competitor the score keeper will repeat his name and total score, and request the range officer on duty at that target to verify the blackboard and score card (no scores will be allowed unless recorded on a blackboard by the scorer as shot).

18. Competitors must pay attention to the score as announced and recorded, so that any error may be promptly investigated. The recorded value of any shot will not be changed after the following shot has been fired, unless some special message with reference to it is received from one of the range officers in the target pit.

19. Any alteration of a scoring card must be witnessed by the officer in charge of the firing point and indorsed with his initials.

20. At all meetings where a number of men engage in the same matches or competitive firing, the labor of the statistical officers will be greatly lightened, and the prompt announcement of the score facilitated by giving to each competitor a number by which he is known throughout the firing, if practicable.

21. Each competitor should be given a score card stating his target and order of firing, and containing a blank space for the record of shots fired, and for the signature of the scorer and a range officer. These score cards should be printed on cardboard, using different colors for different ranges if practicable; but for all kinds of firing employing the same color for the same distance, as, for instance: All score cards for 200 yards, yellow; for 300 yards, red; for 500 yards, blue; for 600 yards, white, etc. This rule will prevent such a mistake as a competitor shooting on a 300-yard score card, with its particular assignment of target, at 200 yards, as the score keeper quickly becomes familiar with the color corresponding to each distance. As scores are completed, a range officer detailed for that purpose should, without waiting for all the firing to cease, collect the records of the scores and transmit them to the statistical officers, who

will enter them into the permanent record and their totals upon the bulletin sheets prepared for that purpose.

22. In skirmish fire, after the run is completed and the signal "Cease firing" has been sounded and repeated twice, the markers will examine the targets, the range officer will record the total hits on each, and the results will be communicated by means of prepared score cards to the statistical officers. In this fire the precautions with regard to the use of a red pencil in marking shot holes will be observed. (See paragraph 32. Scoring.)

23. ARMS.—*Team matches.*—In all military team matches the following arms only will be used, unless otherwise provided for in special conditions:

- (a) The United States Army magazine rifle and carbine, .30 caliber.
- (b) The Springfield rifle and carbine .45 caliber, 3-groove.
- (c) Any rifle adopted by and generally issued to the organized militia of any State, certificate of which must be furnished by the adjutant general of the State. No alteration of any kind to the above-described arms will be allowed, with the exception of that provided for in paragraph 25.

24. *Individual matches.*—The rifles and carbines allowed in competitions are as follows:

- (a) Any military rifle.
- (b) Sporting rifle.
- (c) Any rifle.

They must comply with the following conditions:

Any military: Any military rifle which has been adopted by any State or Government for the armament of its troops, chambered for and using the standard ammunition.

Sporting rifle: Any rifle weighing not more than 10 pounds; minimum pull of trigger, 3 pounds; sights of any description, except telescopic and magnifying.

Any rifle: No restriction as to weight, caliber, sights, or trigger pull, except that rifles with less than 2 pounds trigger pull must be provided with safety lock.

25. SIGHTS (MILITARY RIFLES).—The aiming notch, or the aperture of the slide, may be slightly widened or opened to accommodate individual peculiarities of eyesight, but no other alteration or filing of the regular service sights, or the use of spirit levels, will be permitted. The front or rear sights may, however, be blackened according to the judgment of the competitor. The use of orthoptic eyepieces, telescope sights, spirit levels, or temporary shades will not be allowed, unless specially provided for in the conditions of the match.

26. TRIGGER PULL.—The trigger pull must always be at least 3 pounds, and will be tested (holding the barrel vertically) by each competitor, under the supervision of a range officer, before firing, each day and at each range.

27. Competitors will submit their arms for further inspection whenever required.

28. **AMMUNITION.**—Unless the use of other ammunition is distinctly authorized, the ammunition used will be the service cartridge for the arm, as manufactured and issued by the Ordnance Department.

29. **FIRING, ORDER OF, ETC.**—Military competitors will wear the service uniform and belt. Sheds or shelters for the firer will not be permitted at the firing point at any range. Competitors must be present at the firing points punctually at the time, or in order stated on their score cards; no application on the part of a competitor for any alteration in his assignment will be entertained, except that team captains may change the order of firing of the members of their teams if desired.

30. In competitions or matches embracing more than one distance, the firing will be commenced at the shortest distance, and be followed in order by each of the longer distances, the firing at the longest range being held last.

31. In competitions, slow fire in any one day will be completed for all ranges before being followed by rapid fire.

32. In individual matches that are squadded, the squadding of the competitors will be done at the executive officer's tent on the morning of the day the competition is to be shot.

33. In slow fire, the competitors will place themselves at the firing point by twos and will fire alternately, the odd number of each pair being on the right and firing first.

34. In slow fire, if, just as the shot is fired, the target is withdrawn from the firing position, the scorer at that firing point will at once report the fact to one of the range officers, who, if upon investigation is satisfied that the case is as represented, will direct that the shot fired be not considered and that the soldier fire another shot.

35. In slow fire, competitors will not be hurried in their firing, but such slight delay permitted after each shot as they may desire; provided the time of firing the score with rifle and carbine does not exceed an average of one minute per shot. If an accident to a target, or any other cause over which the soldier has no control, prevent him from completing his score within a reasonable interval, he will be permitted such additional time as a range officer may decide.

36. Targets in fixed-distance team firing will be drawn at each range by team captains at the executive officer's headquarters.

37. Targets for skirmish firing, where teams run together, will be drawn by competitors immediately preceding the commencement of the runs. In skirmish competitions by teams, targets will be assigned by a range officer.

38. No two competitors shall shoot in any competition with the same rifle; nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition, unless his first rifle has become unserviceable through an accident, which must be verified by a range officer. Wilful and intentional violation of this regulation will warrant the officer in charge, in his discretion, excluding the offender from further competition.

39. **CLEANING.**—Pieces can only be cleaned upon the completion of a score. In competitions at more than one distance cleaning will be permitted between distances. While, with these restrictions, cleaning will be permitted, it will not be required. Cleaning will be allowed between shots when it is so specified in the conditions of the match.

40. *Revolver and pistol.*—In match shooting, competitors may clean their arms between scores or between series of shots, providing such cleaning does not delay the firing beyond the limit provided for in the conditions of the match.

41. **COACHING.**—Except in team matches, no coaching or communication of any kind with those firing will be permitted.

42. In team matches, at each firing point there will be permitted one team captain, one coach, and one spotter, who may give to the members of their teams such advice or directions as they may think proper, except that in competitive skirmish firing where teams run together no coaching will be permitted.

43. In skirmish competitions by teams, the teams will run under the command of the team captain, who may coach his men on the run. A range officer will accompany each team to see that the conditions of the match are not violated.

44. **SIGHT SHOTS.**—No sighting or warming shots will be allowed in any match or competition, except on a pool target.

45. **TIES.**—Ties will be decided as follows:

(a) In individual shooting, at known distances:

(1) When the firing takes place at more than one distance, by the total score made at the longest distance, and if still a tie, and there be three or more distances in the competition, by the total score at the second distance, and so on for each of the successive distances.

(2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.

(3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.

(4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.

(5) If still a tie, by inverse order of shots, counting singly from the last to the first.

(6) By firing single shots at the longest distance.

(b) In team shooting at known distances:

(1) By the aggregate of the total scores made at the different distances in inverse order.

(2) By the fewest misses in the entire score.

(3) By the fewest outers in the entire score.

(4) By the fewest inners in the entire score.

(5) By the totals, for the team, of the final shot of each competitor.

(6) By the totals, for the team, of these successive closing shots in inverse order.

When ties are to be divided, it must be so stated in the conditions of the match.

46. Ties, when rapid fire is included in the match, will be decided as follows:

(a) In slow and rapid fire:

- (1) By the highest total score made in rapid fire; if still a tie, by the highest score made in rapid fire at 500 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 300 yards; if still a tie, by the highest score in rapid fire at 200 yards. In the same manner the decision will be regulated by the highest total scores in succession made at 600, 500, 300, and 200 yards, slow fire.
- (2) By the fewest misses in rapid fire.
- (3) By the greatest number of hits on figure in rapid fire.
- (4) By the fewest misses in slow fire.
- (5) By the fewest outers in slow fire.
- (6) By the fewest inners in slow fire.
- (7) If still a tie, by firing single shots at the longest range, slow fire.

47. In skirmish fire:

- (1) By the greatest number of penalties imposed.
- (2) By the greatest number of hits.
- (3) By the fewest hits in kneeling figures.
- (4) If still a tie, a special run in skirmish fire.

48. Ties, when rapid and skirmish fire are included in the aggregate score, will be decided by giving precedence to the competitor having the best total score in the skirmish fire. If the scores in the skirmish fire are also of the same total, the order of merit for that fire (and therefore the final order of merit) will be determined in accordance with paragraph No. 46.

49. PENALTIES.—No two competitors shall in any match or competition use the same rifle, unless it is a special condition of the match, nor shall a competitor change his rifle during any competition, unless it has become unserviceable, which fact must be verified by a range officer. Wilful violation of this regulation will warrant the executive officer (in his discretion) in excluding the competitor from further competition.

50. Any person, whether a competitor or not, interfering with any of the firing squads, or annoying them in any way, will be warned to desist, and if he repeats the offense he will be at once ordered off the range grounds.

51. Any competitor—

(a) Who shall fire in a name other than that under which he entered, or who shall fire twice for the same prize, unless permitted by the conditions of the competition to do so;

(b) Who shall be guilty of any conduct considered by the executive committee to be discreditable;

(c) Who shall be guilty of falsifying his score or being accessory thereto;

(d) Who shall offer a bribe of any kind to any employee or other person;

(e) Who shall be detected in an evasion of the conditions prescribed for the conducting of any match;

(f) Who shall refuse to obey any instructions of the executive officer or a range officer;

(g) Who shall be guilty of disorderly conduct or being intoxicated, shall, upon the offence being proved to the satisfaction of the executive committee, forfeit all his entrance fees, be forever disqualified from competing at any time in the meetings of the Association, and shall not be entitled to have any prize won by him at the time of meeting awarded to him.

52. POSITIONS.—*Rifle and Carbine*.—The following positions only will be permitted in competitive firing: At 200 yards, the standing position, the body and arm being free from any artificial support; at 300 yards, sitting or kneeling; at 500, 600, 800, 900, and 1,000 yards, prone, with head toward target. The use of the strap as a sling permitted at all ranges.

53. ENTRIES.—Competitors who make entries for any match will be ruled out and will forfeit their entrance fees if not on the range at the hour designated for the match.

54. Entry tickets must be marked with purchaser's name at the time of the purchase; they may be transferred to another name with the consent of the executive officer; any erasure or substitution of a purchaser's name on a ticket, not made by the statistical officer, will forfeit the ticket.

55. All entries made in individual matches after the opening of the meeting will be post entries. No exception will be made to the post entry penalty.

56. No entry fee will be refunded unless the competitor is prevented by sickness from appearing on the range, and then only on order of the executive officer.

57. Team captains can expedite matters by securing from the statistical officer blank forms of entry in advance, and having them filled out with the names of the team, which should be written plainly and in full, with military rank, if any.

58. Entry tickets for individual matches will not be exchanged under any circumstances.

59. All entries not otherwise provided for in the program must be made not later than thirty minutes before the hour for calling the match.

60. All civilians, as well as members of the organized Militia, Army, Navy, and Marine Corps, are eligible to compete in all individual matches that are open to everybody, provided they shoot with the arm called for in the conditions of the match.

61. HANDICAP.—In all team and individual matches the carbine will be allowed a handicap of:

1 point in strings of 10 at 600 yards.

2 points in strings of 10 at 800, 900, and 1,000 yards.

62. No handicap will be allowed unless noted on the score card by a range officer. Competitors must see that this is done.

63. CHALLENGES.—If a competitor desires to challenge his shot just fired either for alleged incorrect marking or from failure of any record from the pit of such shot, he must pay 50 cents. If competitor's challenge is sustained, the money will be returned to him.

64. HOURS OF FIRING. Assembly will be sounded and firing begun at 8 o'clock a. m. and "cease firing" will be sounded at 6 p. m., unless otherwise ordered by the executive officer.

65. The range will be closed for an hour in the middle of the day for lunch.

66. SKIRMISH FIRING.—In skirmish fire, twenty cartridges will be issued before each run to each competitor and the latter will not be permitted to have any other cartridges about his person. If any cartridge fails to explode it will be replaced by the scorer with a new one. If a gun becomes disabled, the incomplete score will not be considered, but the competitor will repeat the run. Hits direct or ricochet will be scored.

67. No two competitors from the same team shall be allowed to skirmish on adjoining targets in skirmish competitions where teams run together.

68. SKIRMISH FIRING.—In skirmish competitions the group target "G" will be used, one group for each skirmisher. Targets in line, with intervals of not less than 5 yards between centers of groups. The value of shots; hit, direct or ricochet, on lying figure, 5; kneeling, 4; miss, 0. Hits on or within the steel frame only count.

69. In skirmish competitions, each competitor will fire twenty shots, 700 to 200 yards and back. Six halts at the following distances: 600, 500, 400, 350, 300 and 200 yards. At all distances, with the exception of the 200 yards, the time limit will be thirty seconds, and at the 200 yards twenty seconds. Any position for firing will be permitted.

70. *Method of Skirmishings.*—The squad will be formed in line at 700 yards from targets, magazines are filled and cut off, and the line advances at quick time to the 600-yard firing line. Here, two shots will be fired at will. Commands, as defined in Infantry Drill Regulations. The number of shots fired at each halt will be as follows: 600 yards, 2; 500 yards, 2; 400 yards, 3; 350 yards, 3; 300 and 200 yards, 10. Except at 200 and 300 yards, the loading will be from the belt alone, and after the halt. The advance between 600 and 200 yards will be between any two successive halts, the first half at quick and the second at double time. The firing is completed at 200 yards. At the halt at 300 yards the soldier has ten cartridges, five in belt and five in magazine, and he may distribute the firing of these ten rounds as he desires at the two halts at 300 and 200 yards, provided he fire them all between the two ranges. The command at these two ranges will be for magazine fire but the soldier may load at will from the belt, as well as from the magazine, at either range, after the halt. The time limit extends from the last note of "commence firing" to the last note of "cease firing." For each shot fired by the soldier before the commencement, or after the close of the time limit, or for each shot fired in excess of the number ordered for the halt, five

points will be deducted from his score. Five points will also be deducted for a failure to fire the number prescribed for a halt. A defective cartridge may be replaced, but must be turned in before the advance is resumed. A piece disabled through no fault of the firer entitles the latter to another practice. Every cartridge lost after the advance is commenced will be considered a miss.

71. In skirmish competitions, where teams run as teams, the team captain will direct the firing of the team under the supervision of a range officer. The aggregate value of all shots in all the figures of the groups will be the team's total for the run.

72. In skirmish competitions, where teams run together, the firing will be directed by a range officer detailed for that purpose.

73. Each competitor will be assigned to a group. No two competitors from the same team will be allowed to skirmish on adjoining groups.

74. GENERAL.—In case any member of a team becomes ill during the shooting, the executive officer may, in his discretion, upon certificate of the post surgeon, permit a substitution of a reserve member of the same team in place of the one taken ill.

75. Prizes not claimed within thirty days after having been won shall be forfeited to the Association.

76. No arms shall be loaded except at the firing point, the muzzle of the rifle, pistol, or revolver being kept in the direction of the target till the arm is either discharged or unloaded.

77. These regulations and such special rules or directions as the executive officer may give must be rigidly complied with by competitors and all other persons upon the range grounds.

78. Competitors and all others connected with the competitions must make themselves acquainted with the foregoing regulations as well as with the conditions of competitive firing in which they may be participating, as the plea of ignorance of either of them will not be entertained.

General Orders, No. 24.

I. The following remarks accompanying the report made by Captain Dwight E. Aultman, Artillery Corps, U. S. A. of his inspection of the National Guard, State of Maine, are hereby published for the information of all concerned.

FIRST INFANTRY.

"Company "A." The company appeared to be instructed in but few drill movements, but those were fairly well executed. The officers' knowledge of drill regulations seemed to be confined to few movements. Sufficient interest is shown, but company needs instruction to make it effec-

tive. Officers are elected by the men. The men are not well set up.

Company "B." Officers and men take commendable interest in their work and the efficiency of the company is comparatively high. The company is recruited from a good class of young men. Their drill in both close and extended order was fairly good.

Company "C." The company was fairly well instructed in close order and partly in extended order. The men of the company are all very young, and it is doubtful if they could stand hard service. The spirit of the officers and men is good and a very intelligent class of men is drawn upon for recruits.

Company "D." No report made by inspecting officer.

Company "E." This company is in very bad condition. The captain has been relieved from duty and a major of the regiment has taken the property responsibility and is settling up the affairs of the company. The 1st lieutenant has resigned and there remained only one officer for duty. The drill and instruction were poor.

Company "F." This company was organized June 1, 1903; has not as yet received arms or equipments, and has received no military instruction. It was organized to replace a company disbanded at Augusta, Maine, in February, 1903. No company has heretofore been stationed at Sanford, Maine, hence the company contains very few men who have ever had military training.

The men appeared at inspection without arms or equipments and in civilian clothing.

Company "G." The drill of this company was poor; the movements practiced few and indifferently executed. The members of the company seem to be without interest in their work and the efficiency is correspondingly low. Most of the duties of the captain seem to have been delegated to his subordinates without supervision on his part.

Company "H." The company was very poorly instructed in drill regulations, both close and extended order, and could execute very few movements and those badly. Property was well cared for. Interest in the work seems to be small and no progress appears to have been made. The armory is very small and not suitable as a drill hall.

Company "I." Men appear fairly well set up. Officers and men display plenty of interest in the work. Officers are considered very capable and the drill of the company in close order was excellent. Extended order has not been taught to any extent. Officers are elected by the men. The company appears to be fairly efficient, as far as could be determined by inspection in a small armory, with no space to effectively maneuver.

Company "K." The company did not appear to be well instructed in drill regulations, and there was a lack of interest apparent in their work. The officers are not well instructed and the company in general is low in efficiency.

Company "L." Sufficient interest seems to be shown by both officers and men and a good esprit de corps exists in the company. The men in general seem to be intelligent. The company elects its own officers,

which is considered undesirable and a bar to strict discipline and the maximum of efficiency. The desirability of an instructor detailed to the National Guard of the State or to each regiment thereof, is apparent. The officers and men desire to progress but have no one to direct their efforts.

Company "M." Interest in the work is good and the company receives strong support from the people of the town. Infantry drill was very good, both in close and extended order. A great deal has been done in this company to attract a good class of young men to the service and it appears to be in the nature of a club where the members can congregate at any time for social pleasure.

SECOND INFANTRY.

Company "A." The company drilled fairly well in close order, but knew very little about extended order. A lack of interest in the work seems to prevail.

Company "B." Company is fairly well instructed in close order. Instruction has been given in extended order but to a very limited extent. Interest in the work is good and the company averages well in efficiency.

Company "C." Interest in work is high and men attend drills fairly regularly. Drill in close and extended order was fair and showed that a reasonable amount of instruction had been given. Armory is too small for satisfactory work. The company receives support from the municipal authorities and seems to be a popular institution.

Company "D." Officers and men show interest in their work. Drill in close order was fair; in extended order was very poor. The captain states that many of the men work on night shifts in the mills and that it is difficult to get his command together for drills. The armory is very poorly arranged and small, so that efficient drill is impracticable.

Company "E." Officers did not know their drill. Men were fairly well instructed as far as instruction was carried. Not much interest was taken and company is not up to standard of efficiency. The captain stated that he did not have time to attend properly to his duties as such.

Company "F." Character of the men is excellent. Officers appear efficient and both officers and men are very much interested. Their drill was good, both in close and extended order. The captain is very capable and efficient; takes great interest in his company, and has enlisted a class of men which makes the organization very efficient.

Company "G." Drill in close and extended order only fair. The company has a very poor armory, too small for drill purposes, and, due to the lack of accommodation, it is difficult to assemble and drill in it, or to secure good attendance. Captain is intelligent and efficient.

Company "H." This company was organized May 2, 1903, to replace a company disbanded by State order in February, 1903. The officers appear to be intelligent men and the enlisted men are very well selected. They have had but one drill since organization and are still without equipment.

Company "I." Company was poorly instructed in drill, both close and extended order. Non-commissioned officers did not appear to know their duties at all.

Company "K." Officers appear to be intelligent and efficient. The men are well selected and make a good appearance. The drill was fair.

Company "L." The captain of this company has been but recently elected. His predecessor left the records of the company in bad condition so that very little reliable information was attainable. The company is poorly drilled and the efficiency is low.

Company "M." Company has been organized since May 1, 1903. Not armed and equipped. Officers and men appear to be above the average for intelligence. It is well selected and should be an efficient company.

AMBULANCE CORPS.

The men did not appear to be very well instructed in first aid to the injured, though it was apparent that they had been partially instructed. The handling of the litter and removal of the patient was well done. No ambulances are provided at the home station of the corps and the first aid packets are stored in the State capitol, so that the scope of the inspection could only include a few questions in first aid. The second lieutenant commanding is not a physician.

SIGNAL CORPS.

The corps are fairly well instructed in the use of the flag and with the heliograph. They were able to send on an average 15 letters per minute with the flag. Heliograph work was impracticable, as the inspection took place at night. They are not thoroughly instructed in drill regulations and the marching maneuvers were only fair."

Circular, No. 2.

I. The present season for small arms qualification practice will be extended from October 31st to November 21st, at which time all com-

pany, corps and division commanders will make their required return of qualification practice to this office. Requisition will at once be made to the Adjutant-General's Office for the requisite blanks, so that there may be no delay in forwarding returns.

II. After November 20th no qualification scores made under existing rules and regulations will be accepted.

III. The .30 caliber U. S. Magazine Rifle requires scrupulous care if it is to be kept in its best shooting condition. The following formula for a cleaning compound and suggestions for care of the rifle, taken from "Modern Rifle Shooting from the American Standpoint," (Dr. W. G. Hudson—published by the Laflin and Rand Powder Company, New York), will be found of value to the careful rifleman:

"Astral oil (tested and found free from acid), two fluid ounces; sperm oil, one fluid ounce; turpentine, one fluid ounce; acetone, one fluid ounce. Mix."

This formula was originally worked up especially for W. A. powder, but unexpectedly has also turned out to be a good rust preventive as well. The best way to use it, which should be done immediately after shooting, is to dip the brass cleaning brush in the solution and scrub it back and forth in the gun a few times, always cleaning from the breech if possible, and allowing the brush to turn and follow the rifling—not pushing it straight through, as I have seen some men do. The gun can then be allowed to stand for a time, when a dry rag should be used on the knob end of the cleaning rod. It is surprising how much black dirt will come out on the rag when the gun appears to be almost clean. The dry rag should be followed with a second one wet in the solution. It is best to repeat the process next day, for the gases seem to be driven into the pores of the metal, and to sweat out during the twenty-four hours following the firing, hence the necessity of the second cleaning.

The W. A. powder residue itself would probably never have to be cleaned out from the gun were it not for the material used in the primer. W. A. residue is practically harmless, but the products of the primer mixtures are extremely corrosive especially on certain kinds of steel. Therefore, if you want your barrel to last even through one season you must take care of it.

Where rifles are to be put away for some time or exposed to salt air, a heavier grease is generally preferable. Cosmoline, gas engine cylinder oil, and mercurial ointment are all excellent preservatives, but should be removed from the barrel perfectly before beginning to shoot.

Arrangements will be made to issue the above mentioned compound for use of the National Guard of this State.

In order to facilitate the removal of the gun grease with which the working parts of the United States Magazine Rifle, caliber .30, are coated upon their receipt from the armory, the use of gasoline is recommended. Careful wiping of the different parts with a rag saturated with gasoline will readily remove the heavy coating of grease. It should be borne in mind that the gasoline treatment will leave the parts absolutely dry and that to prevent rusting each part should then be thoroughly wiped with a rag slightly moistened with good lubricating oil.

If all traces of the gun grease are not removed they will catch particles of dust and grit and so injure the mechanism of the rifle, hence company commanders will appreciate the value of thoroughly cleaning the new rifles before permitting their use out-doors.

Circular No. 5.

The attention of all company, corps and division commanders is called to the importance of sighting, position and aiming drill. Close attention to this branch of armory work during the winter months will result in greatly increased qualifications when work is resumed on the range. It is of especial interest the present winter, inasmuch as the troops are now armed with the U. S. Magazine Rifle, caliber .30. This rifle differs in many essentials from the rifle which has just been discarded and every officer and man should become familiar with its care and use. Men should be taught in the armory to assume the proper positions for the several ranges—the standing position for 200-yard firing, the sitting and kneeling position for 300-yard firing, and the prone position for mid and long-range firing. They should also be taught the proper use of the sights and the necessity for clean, steady trigger pulling. This latter instruction in regard to sighting and trigger pulling is best taught by means of a rifle placed on a tripod or sand bag as described in the Small Arms Firing Regulations.

If this work be faithfully performed during the winter, men will go to the range in the spring and summer capable of expending their share of the ammunition to good advantage, thereby greatly raising the company standard in qualification.
