MAINE STATE PRISON.

THOMASTON, ME., December 1, 1904.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

We have the honor to transmit herewith our annual report for the year ending November 30, 1904.

In commencing this report we are sensibly reminded of our loss and the loss of the whole State in the death of Hon. Whitman Sawyer late of Portland, who, with marked ability and efficiency served the State for nine years as chairman of the board of prison and jail inspectors. And we here record this expression of our esteem of his manly qualities, his unflinching charity, his loyalty to principle and faithful discharge of the duties of his office.

At the commencement of the Prison year, December 1, 1903, There were confined in the Prison one hundred seventy-two (172), fifty-seven (57) have since been received, fifty-seven (57) have been discharged by expiration of sentence, two (2) have been pardoned and two (2) have died. Largest number of prisoners at any one time, one hundred eighty-seven (187), smallest number one hundred sixty-eight (168), daily average for the year, one hundred seventy-seven (177).

Our monthly inspections have found the Prison in good condition and the usual discipline has been maintained with very little sickness. For physical and spiritual condition of the inmates we refer you to the reports of the physician and chaplain.

We found the old twenty-five horse power engine inadequate to run the new electric plant successfully, and by special appropriation have bought a new 55 horse power engine costing \$1,242.66 to run said plant, and under these conditions abundance of light is furnished.

The contract for wiring the Prison with the Knox Gas & Electric Company pursuant to an act of the legislature of Maine

approved February 16, 1893, provides that the wiring in said Prison and buildings shall be and remain the property of the company, and at the expiration of the contract, if not renewed, the State shall pay to said company the cost of such wiring less the depreciation thereof. The adjudication of this claim remains to be settled.

We recommend that arrangements be made to employ all prisoners in the jails in some productive labor. We have already called the attention of the county commissioners of the several counties as to the propriety of such a change and as soon as is practicable we shall expect them to provide suitable employment.

We wish to extend our especial thanks to Hon. Wm. T. Haines, the visiting member from the executive council, for his very valuable counsel and advice for the last four years. Our thanks are extended to the warden and subordinate officers for their courteous treatment during the year.

I trust the same loyalty which I have received will be shown my successor. I leave the eighteen buildings owned by the State in thorough repair. I could have neglected them and made a better showing of cash on hand but I have done by the State property as I would have done with my own.

PHYSICIAN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Board of Prison Inspectors:

GENTLEMEN: I submit to you my eighth annual report. The condition of the prisoners for the past year has been exceptionally good. The sanitary condition has been improved so much in the past eight years that there is little left to be recommended for further improvement with the present existing conditions. If the cells were double their present size I would advocate the introduction of water closets in each cell with running water and doing away with the morning march and the unsightly, odorous bucket.

But two deaths have occurred during the year. C. M. Wallace December 6, 1903, from morphine poisoning, and Geo. Thompson, February 10, 1904, of consumption. A number of serious surgical operations have been performed during the year without a death and good recoveries in every case. The food has been up to the standard, no serious accidents have occurred during the year. CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Governor and Council of the State of Maine:

GENTLEMEN: I herewith submit my annual report of the interests and work committed to my charge by your Honorable Body.

The courts have sentenced fifty-seven persons to the Maine State Prison during the year with sentences ranging from one year to twenty years. Five of them could neither read nor write; two could read a few simple sentences but could not write; twenty-five had improved the privileges of the common schools; eleven had completed the studies of the grammar schools; ten were graduates from high schools; and four had been favored with seminary, or college and professional school training.

Twenty-eight of these fifty-seven were accustomed to use intoxicating drinks; some drinking a little occasionally, others regularly and others a larger quantity and more frequently so as to be known as hard drinkers. The other twenty-nine profess to be total abstainers, some of them having never tasted any kind of intoxicating drink. But six of the number are free from the tobacco habit, the others using it in one or both of the common forms of its use.

The weekly papers are admitted to the prison as in years past. We continue to supply the men with the magazines, Harpers, The Century, The New England, The Cosmopolitan, The Strand, McClures, Frank Leslie and Munsey are gladly received and read by all who can read. The privilege of exchanging papers through the hands of the guards, affords an extensive variety of reading for each.

Two hundred and three books have been added to the library, and an equal number which were worn beyond repair and further use have been sold as waste paper. The library continues to be eagerly used.

The work of instruction is continued. Each illiterate is encouraged to improve the opportunity afforded to acquire some knowledge, and others are persuaded to review their studies, or to take advanced studies as we think will be most useful to the student.

The privilege of writing and receiving letters weekly is highly appreciated by the inmates, and is a source of culture as well as of contentment and happiness.

The work of religious instruction receives our continual and prayerful attention. It consists of distributing religious reading, personal talks, Bible expositions with numbers who are systematically studying the Bible, and the regular chapel services on the Sabbath. We are not without evidence that these services are a blessing to some.

With sincere thanks to your Honorable Body and to each of the prison officials for the assistance and encouragement given me, I respectfully submit this report of my work.

REPORT OF THE COMMISSION RELATING TO
THE CRIMINAL INSANE.

*To His Excellency, the Governor, and the Executive Council of
the State of Maine:*

It again becomes the duty of your committee who has, under your appointment, the charge of the criminal insane, domiciled at the insane department of the State Prison, to present its annual report. In conformity to the requirements of the statutes the committee has made monthly visitations, on which occasions the department has been thoroughly inspected by at least two members of the commission. The condition of its inmates has been noted and their physical and mental status has been made a subject of special investigation. Supplemental to these stated monthly visitations the prison physician makes frequent visits for the purpose of administering to the physical necessities of the inmates. Taking into consideration the peculiar mental obliquities which characterize this class, the strong tendency to exhibit homicidal impulses, and the likelihood of maniacal exhibitions accompanied by loss of the power of self-control, it is quite remarkable that violent outbreaks are so infrequent. It is however largely due most probably to the judicious supervision of an experienced and trained keeper whose qualities of mental make-up are particularly adapted to the duties incumbent upon him. Another method of this department which is ameliorating in its tendencies, influencing favorably self-control and soothing in its essential features, is the fact that the greater portion of the inmates, indeed everyone who is not actually dangerously refractory, have the opportunity of remaining out of doors in the prison yard throughout nearly the entire day. Here they have the advantage of sunlight and fresh air. They are also judiciously exercised in various employments, in prepar-

ing wood and other occupations which are carried on in the Institution's grounds outside of the various workshops. The inmates of this department furnish nearly the entire labor in maintaining a large and well cultivated garden. The dietary is found to be very satisfactory to the patients, is well prepared and of good quality. Opportunities are offered the inmates to make known their wants or to speak of any irregularities that have been observed by them and it is the pleasure of this commission to state that these extended privileges have elicited nothing whatever of a serious character. Indeed the inmates as a rule seem to be very well contented with their lot and some of them are uniformly restful and happy. Several weekly papers are taken by individual inmates and this opportunity supplemented by books from the prison library offers ample privilege for reading. The moral and spiritual necessities are kindly administered by the chaplain and quite a few attend the religious services in the chapel. The inmates of the department missed the services of the supervisor, Mr. Moody, who was obliged to be absent from his duties several weeks in consequence of serious illness. All were glad to greet him on his return to duty which occurred the middle of October. There were remaining in this department at the commencement of the present fiscal year twenty-three inmates, two has been admitted since, three have been discharged and two have died. One death was occasioned by the natural results of old age and the disintegrating effects of chronic mania, the other died after suffering a year or more from pulmonary consumption. The rest of the inmates have enjoyed a large share of physical health and have been able to maintain daily exercise in the prison yard or some manual labor. A peculiar and temporarily painful accident occurred to one of the inmates early in the summer, and which, because of its happy outcome, is worthy of mention. It is an incident which may well stagger the most careful investigations of the psychologist and pathologist. While walking on the edge of the precipice in the prison yard the inmate slipped and fell over the perpendicular wall striking twenty feet below upon the sharp edge of a projecting ledge, then falling to the bottom of the excavation a distance of forty feet. He was taken up unconscious but after a short time consciousness returned. Upon physical examination it was found that no limbs were broken, and after a few days observation there

proved to be no internal injuries. *Pari pasu* along with the recovery from the physical injuries received there was observed a gradual amelioration of the vagaries of the mind which had afflicted him for several years and which had been regarded as a hopeless condition of insanity. The delusions subsided and the hallucinations of the special senses particularly of sight, hearing and feeling so far as careful investigation could disclose entirely disappeared and he was discharged as cured in August last. It has been the experience of one of the commission in observing the insane through many years to be able to note a very few similar cases resulting in restoration of mind, but such instances are nevertheless mysterious and unfathomable. "*Similia similibus curantur*" may not inappropriately be applied here. That which was intended to produce dissolution and if extended a little further would have accomplished it, resulted happily in the individual's entire restoration. May it not be that the severe shock produced molecular changes in cell atoms which resulted in the re-co-ordination and proper physiological functioning of cellular action. After all we can simply guess at the causes which were instantly brought into operation in re-establishing the normal operation of the mind.

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON
STATE PRISON.

To the Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN: The condition of affairs at the State Prison is in a more satisfactory condition than I have known it during the four years I have been going there as inspector from the council. In addition to the improvements which have been made during this time on the sewage system, quite an amount of repairs have been done, during the past year, on the shop buildings, so that they now seem to be in a very satisfactory condition for the purpose for which they are intended. The electric lighting plant, authorized by the last session of the legislature, has been installed, and is doing good work, and the State seems to be saving something in the lighting expense over the plan hitherto practised. Whether this will prove a net saving in the end, depends on the management of the machines used for this purpose. With the right kind of management, there ought to be some saving, although, in my judgment, not as large a one as has been contemplated by some. The work which has been carried on in the various manufacturing departments will be shown in detail by the reports of the warden and inspectors. A new warden has been installed during the past year, Mr. B. O. Norton, and everything promises for a successful business under his administration. The health of the prisoners during the past year has kept up to the high standard that has characterized the prison for many years. The discipline, as heretofore, has been good, and the moral sentiment about the prison is, in every way, correct and wholesome; and in all things, so far as I can judge, the prison is in a good condition, as the citizens of the State have a right to expect it to be. All of which is respectfully submitted.
