REPORT.

Adjutant General's Office, Augusta, December 31, 1904.

To His Excellency, John F. Hill, Governor and Commander-in-Chief.

SIR: I have the honor to submit herewith my report as Adjutant General, Quartermaster General, and Paymaster General for the year ending December 31, 1904.

ENROLLMENT.

It appears from the biennial enrollment made in April, 1903, by the assessors of the several cities, towns and plantations of the State, that the total number of male citizens of this State of the age of eighteen and under the age of forty-five years, subject to military duty, is one hundred and one thousand, eight hundred and sixty-nine, which is two thousand, four hundred and twenty-nine less than the enrollment of 1901.

NATIONAL GUARD.

Under the present law the active Militia is designated the National Guard of the State of Maine. As now constituted it consists of two Regiments of Infantry of twelve companies each, a Naval Reserve and Ambulance Corps.

The First Regiment under command of Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, headquarters at Biddeford, is composed of companies stationed as follows, viz: A, B, E, L, and Band, Portland; C, Auburn; D, Norway; F, Sanford; G, Biddeford; H, Rockland; I, Lewiston; K, Brunswick; M, Westbrook.

The Second Regiment under command of Colonel Everard E. Newcomb, headquarters at Eastport, is composed of companies stationed as follows, viz: A, Gardiner; B, D, and Band,

Lewiston; C, Bath; E, Skowhegan; F, Dover; G, Bangor; H, Waterville; I, Eastport; K, Farmington; L, Houlton; M, Augusta.

The Naval Reserve, under command of Lieutenant Harry M. Bigelow, is stationed at Portland. The Ambulance Corps, under command of Lieutenant Charles A. Jumper, is stationed at Lewiston.

The total strength of the National Guard is as follows, viz: First Infantry—Officers, 52; enlisted men, 566; total, 618. Second Infantry—Officers, 50; enlisted men, 587; total, 637. Naval Reserve—Officers, 5; enlisted men, 63; total, 68. Ambulance Corps—Officers, 1; enlisted men, 20; total, 21. Grand total, 1344.

INSPECTION.

Brigadier-General Frank L. Hoyt, Inspector General, made a thorough inspection of the National Guard and his report indicates that, while there is always room for improvement, the Guard is in good condition, thoroughly equipped and ready to take the field when called upon.

A careful inspection of the entire National Guard was also made by Captain James B. Mitchell, Artillery Corps, United States Army, Portland, Maine, as proposed under the provisions of an act to promote the efficiency of the Militia and for other purposes, approved January 21, 1903, which requires that an inspection of the Guard shall be made annually by an officer from the United States Army detailed for that purpose. The inspection made this year was conducted in such a manner as to prove advantageous to the Guard.

RIFLE PRACTICE.

The most important duty of the soldier is to know how to shoot. During the past year much attention has been given to this duty under the able direction of Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector General of Rifle Practice.

Under the provisions of the Militia Law towns and cities are required to provide suitable rifle ranges for the use of companies stationed in their several municipalities, but no penalty is attached if cities and towns fail to comply with the requirements of the law. The only remedy is that the State authorities have the power to expend, in the consruction and care of rifle ranges, the amount allowed cities and towns for armory rents. As the amount allowed is only one hundred dollars per annum for each company it would be impossible to construct and keep in repair suitable rifle ranges without the assistance of the several cities and towns. The city of Portland has appropriated quite an amount for a rifle range and has by far the best range in the State. A State rifle range should be provided for the use of the National Guard located in the city of Augusta.

I would suggest that a reasonable amount, in addition to our annual appropriation, be provided for that purpose. This should include the purchase of land and the construction of a rifle range with firing points at two hundred, three hundred, four hundred, five hundred, six hundred, eight hundred and one thousand yards.

ARMORIES.

The Militia Law of Maine, section 78, is as follows: "Municipal officers shall provide for each company of the National Guard located within the limits of their respective towns, subject to the approval of the commander-in-chief or such officer as he may designate, a suitabe drill room and armory or place of deposit for the arms, equipments and other property furnished by the State. They shall also provide suitable rooms for the headquarters of each separate battalion, regiment or brigade established within their limits, and a reasonable compensation for the rent thereof, not exceeding one hundred dollars per annum, may be allowed to the town so furnishing, and paid by the State."

The provisions of this law have not been observed in all cases and suitable accommodations have not always been provided. When the attention of the authorities of one of the cities of the State was called to the fact that suitable accommodations had not been provided for the military company there, the reply was that no penalty attached provided the requirements of the law were not complied with. Under the laws of the state of Massachusetts, a penalty of \$5,000 is attached in case towns or cities fail to comply with the law providing suitable armories.

I submit that it might be well to amend the Militia Laws of Maine in conformity with the laws of other states.

The Portland armory is the best in the State and the city authorities take a just pride in the several military organizations located there as shown by their armory. Portland has also provided at an expense of over \$1,500 the best rifle range in the State, this action is highly appreciated by the Guard. The city of Lewiston has also provided an armory for the use of the Guard. The city of Westbrook has provided a first-class armory for the use of Company M, First Infantry, with a drill room 50 x 100. Brunswick has a new armory provided by the town for the use of Company K, First Infantry. The armory at Farmington occupied by Company K, Second Infantry, is well adapted for the purpose for which it is used and is regarded as one of the best. Bangor has also provided a suitable armory for the use of Company G, Second Infantry. Company I, Second Infantry, located at Eastport, has a fine armory owned by the company. Generally speaking the cities and towns show a commendable interest in the local military organizations, but in one or two instances the lack of interest in this direction is very noticeable.

MANASSAS, VA.

The National Guard of the State, instead of holding their annual encampment at Augusta as has been the custom, participated in maneuvers at Manassas, Virginia, with troops of the regular army. Both Regiments of Infantry and the Ambulance Corps left their home stations on Friday, September 2, and returned on Monday, September 12. While the maneuvers only extended from September 5th to 10th, inclusive, our Maine troops rendered eleven days service. The commands were thoroughly equipped with everything necessary to enable them to take the field for actual service and I believe that the service rendered was satisfactory and reflected great credit upon the officers and men participating. Congratulations and the thanks of the United States officers commanding were extended to the commanding officers of both regiments.

I have no hesitation in saying that I feel proud of the service rendered. While the duty they were called upon to perform was somewhat strenuous and a severe tax upon the strength and endurance of the men, many of whom were not accustomed to out of door life, they acquitted themselves in such a manner as to convince me that when the necessity exists for actual service the men from Maine will not be found wanting in any qualification that goes to make a good soldier.

NAVAL RESERVE.

The Naval Reserve went into camp of construction at High Head, Harpswell, from July 9 to July 16, inclusive. This is one of the best drilled organizations in the State and has reached a high degree of efficiency under its present officers.

CLOTHING.

Owing to the fact that the uniforms now in use are much worn and that a new uniform has been adopted by the United States, in order to meet the necessary requirements, contracts are now being made for the purchase of new uniforms. Our unexpended balance for the year will not be large enough to pay outstanding bills already contracted and provide the number of uniforms needed. We have been husbanding our appropriation for the purchase of uniforms and hope to make a beginning this year and to complete the purchase of the necessary uniforms from next year's appropriation.

SCHOOLS OF INSTRUCTION.

A school of instruction was held in the city of Augusta, December 11 and 12, 1903, which was participated in by nearly all the commissioned officers of the National Guard. Colonel Lucius H. Kendall presided. Discussions were held and papers read by officers detailed from the United States Army and members of the National Guard. The papers were interesting and instructive and contained much valuable information on military affairs, the results attained are believed most satisfactory.

DICK BILL.

If we desire to avail ourselves of the provision of an act to promote the efficiency of the militia and for other purposes, approved January 21, 1903, known as the Dick Bill, it will be necessary that the legislature, in providing for the organization, equipment and discipline of the militia, should conform as nearly as practicable to the regulations for the government of armies

of the United States. In order to avail ourselves of the provisions of this bill these changes should be made within five years from the date of approval of this act. The necessary changes in the militia law will be made and presented to the committee on military affairs and if approved submitted to the legislature for such action as it deems best.

As at present constituted the minimum strength of a company is three officers and forty-six enlisted men, a total of forty-nine. Under the provisions of the Dick Bill the minimum strength of a company is three officers and fifty enlisted men, a total of fifty-three. This is an increase of four enlisted men to each company, a total of ninety-six enlisted men. The uniforming, arming, equipping and maintenance of ninety-six enlisted men would, of course, entail additional expense and draw upon our appropriations. There are other changes which will be provided at the proper time.

The report from this office for the year 1902 which has just been issued contains an historical sketch and roster of commissioned officers and enlisted men of the drafted militia of Maine, called into actual service for the protection of its northeastern frontier, from February to May, 1839, known as the Aroostook War.

In 1876 by order of Honorable Selden Connor, Governor of Maine, and his council, Mr. Z. K. Harmon of Portland, Maine, compiled the muster rolls of the officers, non-commissioned officers and privates called into the service of the State of Maine in the War of 1812-1814, embracing the militia, infantry, riflemen, artillery and cavalry, showing residences of the men, dates of entry and discharge from service and where the service was performed, carefully arranged by divisions, brigades, regiments and companies. It has been suggested that if printed it would be valuable as a book of reference and should be placed in the libraries of the State, I, therefore, respectfully call your attention to the matter for such action as you may deem best.

STATE OF MAINE.

Inspector General's Office, Lewiston, December 5th, 1904.

Major General Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant General:

SIR: I have the honor to submit my annual report of the condition of the Organized Militia of the State known as the National Guard of the State of Maine, for the year ending December 31st, 1904.

In accordance with the Militia Law and General Orders No. 3, A. G. O., c. s., I have made a careful inspection of each company and corps at its home station. The special reports made at the time of each inspection and forwarded to your office will form a part of my report.

I commenced my inspections on February 17th and concluded them on June 15th. I found the property of the State and of the United States well cared for in almost every instance. The exceptions were spoken of in my special reports to you at the time of the inspection.

The personnel of the Guard is about the same as for the year 1903. There is always room for improvement. We have many hard working and painstaking officers who are trying to improve their companies; we also have officers capable of much better work than they are doing.

I believe that changes might be made in the Militia Law that would result in good for the service, which is very desirable; this is an age of improvement and progression and it is necessary to conform to the needs of the hour.

The National Guard of the State of Maine at the present time consists of two regiments of infantry of twelve companies each, one ship's company of naval reserve composed of two divisions, and one ambulance corps.

The strength of the different organizations of the Guard at the time of my inspection was as follows:

Any company that falls below 85 per cent, in attendance at the annual inspection should be disbanded unless good and sufficient reasons can be given for the absentees.

It became necessary to disband the Signal Corps, it having fallen into a low state of efficiency after the brilliant record made in '98 at San Juan Hill under the command of Captain Butler. This instance is only another proof of the fault of the elective system, which should be done away with and all line officers selected by competitive examination and commissioned for their fitness for the place.

ARMORIES.

This very important feature of the organized militia does not seem to appeal to the average citizen, who appears indifferent to the comfort of the men who are giving their time and strength that Maine may have as good a National Guard as any State in the Union. I hope the next Legislature will take up the matter of State armories and see that every city

and town where companies are located is provided with a suitable armory for its military companies. Many of our companies have a poor place to keep military property and a small assembly room but no place in which to drill. These conditions keep many good men from enlisting, who, if in the service, would be of value to the State in many ways.

RIFLE RANGES.

Many of the companies do not have ranges that are safe to shoot the U. S. magazine rifle over. Portland, Brunswick, Lewiston and Norway have good safe ranges. The important work of rifle practice is in the hands of an officer who is much interested in the work and I have no doubt he will see that everything is done to make the equipment of each company safe and ensure good results in this very important branch of a soldier's duties.

MATTER OF INSTRUCTION.

Company officers as a rule do not have their recruits properly instructed. They are too apt to give a recruit a uniform, place a rifle in his hand and let him fall in with the company to drill before he has learned the manual of arms, the foot movements, the cadence and all of the details which are so essential.

I have repeatedly advised the captains to have their noncommissioned officers instruct new men and have it understood that they cannot fall in with the company until they have mastered the prelimiaries.

The set-up drill is of the utmost importance; the officers should require the men to practice it, and insist that when the men enter the armory they should have a soldierly bearing and carriage, conducting themselves as gentlemen.

Military courtesy is indispensable to a good company. Prompt and cheerful obedience to all officers elected or appointed over them seems to be forgotten by many of the men after being mustered into the service.

Guard duty is more faithfully performed than in former years; the last two years of service in connection with United States troops has had a marked effect on the men in this important duty of a soldier. The only thing to regret is the fact that each year we have to teach so many new men the same

duties over and over again. It will always be so in the State service as we have to depend on voluntary enlistments.

ENCAMPMENTS.

Under the provisions of the Militia Act of 1903, known as the "Dick Bill," the National Guard of this State has participated with the regular army in maneuvers at Portland in 1903, and at Manassas, Va., in 1904. While the benefit to be derived is much more than could be obtained at the annual encampment, yet I would recommend holding a State encampment at least every third year, to give the men a chance to learn camp duties which they do not get in a maneuver camp.

The work of the Maine troops at Manassas and Thoroughfare was very satisfactory to the United States Army officers. Every duty required of them was performed in a prompt and satisfactory manner. While the work was very fatiguing it was performed without complaint. The United States officers admitted to me that they were doing too much work in such a short space of time, yet the fact that they could not have the State troops for a longer period required them to crowd the work in order to complete the problems as arranged.

The information gained by the officers and men will be of much benefit to the Government whenever they are called into service. It is of importance for officers to learn to care for themselves and to look after their men. I noticed that it was necessary for a captain to look after his men much as a father would his children, supplying their wants and making them as comfortable as the conditions would warrant. Officers who did this always had a company ready for any duty which they were called upon to perform. It was surprising to see how well the State's troops stood up under the hard work required of them, and how promptly they answered all calls for duty.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

- 1st. That better armories be provided by the State for all of the companies, the expense of heating and lighting to be paid by the cities and towns where companies are located.
- 2d. That the State draw from the Government army shoes and issue one pair to each enlisted man before the annual encampment in order that the foot wear be uniform. I noticed

at the maneuvers that many men had sore feet, not because of the long marches but because of the fact that they had shoes that were too tight or had too thin soles.

3d. That the Militia Law be changed so that all the line officers shall be selected by the Governor from a list of candidates who have taken an examination for a commission, they to be commissioned in the regiment and assigned to the companies. This would be a long step in the right direction for better work and discipline. It would be an incentive for men to better prepare themselves for the duties of a soldier, knowing that it depends on themselves whether they advance or not, if all favoritism was eliminated from the service and men who were the best qualified would be recognized first.

The volunteer soldier of the United States, take him all in all, is physically sounder and morally straighter than the same class in any other country. The men who have Anglo-Saxon blood in their veins have their faults and limitations; they come higher than do the ranks of other lands; they fight harder; with fewer numbers accomplish more and greater results; pull the trigger quicker when they get the word and with better results; they are proud of their own people and their country, proud of their flag; stout hearted, law abiding, and as a rule are men to be depended on at all times; willing to give their time and strength to qualify themselves for these duties; only asking in return that their efforts be appreciated by their State, and for her citizens to feel that in the National Guard they have a body of men who can be relied upon whenever it becomes necessary to call upon them.

In conclusion I desire to thank the Adjutant General, the Colonels of the Regiments, and the Officers of the Medical Department for many courtesies received during the year.

REPORT OF INSPECTOR GENERAL OF RIFLE PRACTICE.

Office of Inspector-General of Rifle Practice,

Portland, December 15, 1904.

Maj. Gen. Augustus B. Farnham, Adjutant-General, Augusta:

SIR:—I have the honor to submit the following report of small arms practice in the National Guard, State of Maine, for the season ending November 1, 1904:

Under General Orders No. 7, promulgated from your office May 9, 1904, Special Course "C" was adopted for the qualification of riflemen, revolver qualification remaining unchanged.

The work of the season has been very largely of an experimental nature, inasmuch as the new system differs very materially from any system under which the Maine troops have worked in the past. Considering the lack of range facilities in many organizations, I think the work performed highly commendable. There are several organizations which, as usual, have failed to make the most of their opportunities, but these instances are offset by brilliant work in other organizations.

The season's work convinces me that any company which will carefully study Special Course "C" and secure the attendance of all members at the range will find it comparatively easy to secure a high figure of merit—provided the range facilities will permit qualification in the sharpshooter class.

The individual figure of merit for the Guard is 20.3. The Second Infantry stands at 20, while the First Infantry is close behind with 19.5. The figure of merit would have been much higher had certain of the companies been provided with suitable ranges, for one thing, and had certain other companies borne in

mind that the qualification of a few men in the higher classes will not compensate for entire neglect on the part of the remainder. An examination of that part of my report dealing with ranges will show what companies have suffered from the first of these causes and an examination of the return of qualification will show the companies which have suffered from the second cause.

COMPANY INSPECTION.

In three preceding reports attention has been called repeatedly to the importance of having the best men detailed for company inspectors. In my visits to the various companies I have dwelt upon this point and have explained in detail what should be expected of a company inspector of rifle practice.

In this report I have decided to vary exhortation with example and to that end I have secured from two inspectors of the Guard statements as to their methods. One of these inspectors is Sergt. Moses P. Stiles of Co. D, 1st Inf., Norway, and when I say that he is one of the best riflemen that the Guard has ever produced, I think that every officer and man of experience will approve the commendation. The other inspector is Sergt. Harold L. Pepper, Co. H, 2d Inf., Waterville. He is a younger rifleman but one who has put so much well-directed energy into his work that he deserves recognition beside the elder rifle men—the more especially that he has worked the problem out with a new company entirely unacquainted with military rifle shooting.

It is my idea that a careful perusal of the statements which these men make will be of value to the rest of the Guard and particularly to company inspectors. Many inspectors are willing but lack initiative. They may get assistance from the story of how other inspectors have done their work.

THE NORWAY PLAN.

Sergt. Stiles, at my request, covers the whole plan of inspection briefly and tells how he has divided the time of the men in the different parts. He says:

"Instruction in rifle practice being divided into three parts, viz.: sighting, position, and aiming drills; gallery practice; and range practice, we try to give some instruction in all three in the order in which they are named.

"In the sighting, position, and aiming drills, we try to follow the text of our new Small Arms Firing Regulations, but we have to modify this the same as nearly everything strictly military has to be modified to apply to a company of the National Guard under the present regulations. Deducting the amount of time necessarily spent at drill from the time that a soldier of the National Guard is required by law to be present at the armory, leaves very little time for instruction in aiming drill and gallery practice.

"If the time ever comes when men are paid a small sum for attendance once a week and fined twice the amount (or more) if absent, we can come somewhere near the standard of the regular soldier, and not till then.

"Therefore, as I have shown, the time being limited, our aiming drill of the past has consisted in instructing the men how to take the positions and use the sights and to practice holding and snapping an empty rifle at home. Any rifle of about the same weight and pull can be used, but it is much better if each man can use the rifle he is to shoot with on the range. The best shots nearly all practice it, and those who neglect it seldom show any improvement in rifle shooting or become good shots. I regard holding and snapping the empty piece as the most important part in learning to shoot, and any man having fairly good eyesight will, by so doing, be able to qualify as a marksman. Men of good habits can, with a little coaching, easily qualify in the higher classes.

"We devote as much time to gallery practice as possible during the winter season. The men do not tire of this kind of work and it affords an excellent opportunity to see that every man thoroughly understands sighting and aiming his piece, and also to see that he pulls the trigger by applying a steady pressure. ounce by ounce, until it requires only an additional fraction of an ounce to send the gun off. We try to impress on their minds that holding and steady pulling is the most important part of shooting and until a man can call his shots accurately no coach can correct his errors. We use a .22-caliber rifle, owing to the fact that the round ball cartridges furnished by the government are not accurate and the powder and primers so poor as to spoil a rifle in a short time, even with good care. Much more benefit will be obtained by using the Krag when accurate ammunition can be obtained.

"In our range work we make it our rule to have everything in readiness before the season opens and our targets so arranged that we can commence shooting any day inside of five minutes after arriving at the range. This saves much time that is wasted by many companies where the members have to wait while a target is nailed on or in some other way made ready. We have a good marker, engaged for the season, and one of the best shots for a coach, at the range every Saturday afternoon from 12.30 P. M. till dark. Thus every member knows that if he goes to the range he will have a chance to shoot, and by so doing every Saturday afternoon some few members report for practice.

"Members who cannot attend any of the regular shoots during the season have only to report to me and arrangements are made to have the range open at some time convenient to them. In such cases we often go to the range at five o'clock in the morning.

"We have a house on our range for shelter from storms so that in case of rain one is not soaked through, and this helps out when the weather is threatening and otherwise the men would be tempted to stay at home. It also makes a good place for a company dinner on holidays when we have an all-day shoot. We have matches among ourselves, sometimes individual matches, but more often make up two teams from the members present and shoot for small prizes. By these methods we manage to keep up quite an interest and get nearly every member to the range sometime during the season."

THE WATERVILLE WAY.

Sergt. Pepper, being directed to confine himself to preliminary training, stops upon reaching field work. He says:

"In the first place I assume that the soldier's principal business is to be able to shoot and that, too, with deadly accuracy. My theory is that anyone who is a normal man may learn how to shoot and may become a proficient marksman. I realize that a man ordinarily can learn little or nothing from himself. Secondly, he will learn little from books, as mere print can do little to vitalize the knowledge that is essential to the rifleman. The only thing, then, that is left to the average man is the instructor.

"If I were to write on this subject I would be able to readily fill a good many pages. Too many hold the office of inspector of rifle practice who are far from being fit as instructors. A man who is qualified as a sharpshooter does not necessarily make a good teacher. On the other hand, while a man who has all knowledge of his subject may be able to instruct men, it is much better that he be able to practice what he preaches for the moral effect on the men.

"Thus far we have the assumption, and the theory, and the instruction. Now for the rifleman himself. For him to shoot. three things are necessary: First, he must know how to aim his rifle; second, he must be able to hold it there; third, he must be able to pull the trigger properly. I will consider these points in inverse order. First, the trigger pull. After considerable study and experiment I have come to the conclusion that the trigger pull is what gives finesse to a man's shooting. He must be able to discharge his piece without disturbing his aim, and he must be able to do it intelligently. This necessitates a training of the muscles and nerves affecting the trigger finger. Personally, I use the forefinger because of its superior sensitiveness and possibility of development. At the present time I am experimenting on an instrument to produce an educated forefinger. It aims at producing a finger that will move immediately at the slightest impulse of the brain, and especially will not move unless ordered to do so; a finger that will move always at a conscious rate; a finger that will always move in the same line; and finally one that will be able to appreciate the weight of the pull of a rifle and adapt itself to it.

"Any man may learn to hold his piece. The setting-up exercises will put him in excellent condition for this. I regret that the revised Drill Regulations have omitted the bayonet exercise. Drill with the rifle will have to supply the omission. What the soldier needs is to become familiar with the handling of his piece, to find out its balances, to make it almost a part of himself. This is gained by handling and is acquired unconsciously. When a man is familiar with the feeling of his rifle he will naturally assume in shooting the position that is best adapted to himself.

"The real essential is the aiming. This I have reserved for the last. No matter how well one holds his gun, no matter how carefully he pulls the trigger, unless the rifle is properly aimed the bullet does little damage. In the aiming of the rifle, the eye is the part of the body that is used especially. Therefore the eye must be trained. It has been said that things are seldom what they seem. To the uneducated eye they are decidedly not what they appear to be. Aiming and sighting drills do little, in my opinion, more than develop the rifle muscles. The eye must be trained by what is known as disk work.

"I recall my first experience with disk work. Its crudity amuses me now. The bag of sand resting on a tripod was the rest for the rifle. A rifle was laid on the bag, a movable bull's eve was used without any thought or regard to relative size. However, it suggested the possibilities of the work. I obtained a heavy wooden tripod table such as is used in a laboratory, removed the table top and placed there instead an adjustable clamp. The clamp was to hold the rifle. A large white cardboard was placed against the wall with the tripod some thirty feet away. By a geometrical formula I reduced the size of the bull's eye at the range to one proportionate to thirty feet. I made a little allowance for the eye by increasing the size because of the severe strain of the drill. I proceeded as usual, having the bull's eye moved so that I had a perfect sight; then showing it to the recruit and requiring him to reproduce it. Theoretically he would have the bull's eye placed in the same place, but practically he failed. Making three sightings, I connected the points recorded by the assistant at each sighting with lines and the triangle formed was my diagnosis and I could advise the man.

"I have come to the conclusion that a gun is not necessary at all for this work. A round stick with military front and rear sights will do just as well, and, I think, better.

"I found that where the company inspector of rifle practice is interested in his work the men become so. In fact, in Company H, they had to, for I required a certain amount of work at the disk before permitting them to go to the gallery and thence to the range. I think that the results have warranted the course. In one instance a man not used to the rifle made his first triangle with a leg of over two inches. Inside of a half hour he could readily place the three points within a circle of less than an eighth of an inch. He had no trouble in making his Marksman qualification. Had it not been for the fact that we were prevented from using our range for most of the summer he would have made Sharpshooter and probably Expert. I could mention many similar cases. Besides being able to align the sights properly, I have found from disk work that since men have different eves different sized apertures are required, i. e., the peep must be adapted to the eve of the man. I will say, incidentally, that the men have been required in every instance to use the peep sight. If the company has had any success, I attribute a large part of it to this fact.

"At the present I am considering a means for determining the sizes of apertures required by the different men. Then I shall ream out the peeps accordingly. I have arrived at another conclusion, namely, that the present method of disk work can be largely improved. I shall try to eliminate the assistant at the target. I shall shorten the distance by mirrors. The spot may be anywhere in focus with the mirrors. The instrument having the sights will move instead of the target. The recording arrangement will be exceedingly simple and may be operated by the man who is practicing. I have in mind a means of giving numerical value to the work with the disk, thereby producing friendly emulation and rivalry amongst the men. I hope to have it developed before the next season opens.

"The course of work which I laid out for the men, I followed even more strictly myself. I believe that I was one of the last men to fire a shot on the range. I claim no especial ability for myself but I will say—and do it only in support of my theories—that I had absolutely no trouble in making the Expert qualifica-

tion, with the exception of the 300-yard range, and this I overcame by adopting a new hold. I had a little trouble at 600 yards but after more practice at the disk made, in the presence of quite a number, twenty-four out of twenty-five. I profited by the disk work and in my first ten shots at 1,000 yards made forty out of fifty. I have mentioned this because it is not heresay but the actual experience of one who had no experience at all with the military rifle before last season."

THE STATE COMPETITION.

Interest in rifle practice was stimulated this season by holding a State rifle competition. The omission of such competition in 1903 was made imperative by the exchange of rifles during the season, and while it was understood that many companies were not provided with ranges which would enable them to practice for the matches this season, it was deemed best to open the events to all. But two companies of infantry failed to enter teams and for the first time a team from the Naval Reserve competed with the infantrymen.

The competition was held October 4th, on the range of Company K, 1st Inf., Brunswick, which had been enlarged for the occasion so as to accommodate six teams at the short range.

A camp was established close to the range and teams which could not leave home on the morning of the match so as to arrive at the range by 9 A. M., were ordered to report the night before. The troops messed at the camp and some remained over the night following the competition to shoot in special matches the next day.

The officers of the competition were detailed and their duties assigned by general orders as follows:

"The camp will be under the command of Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry. Colonel Elliott C. Dill, inspector-general of rifle practice, will be the executive officer of the competition.

"Lieut. John J. Dooley, inspector of rifle practice, First Infantry, is detailed as range officer with authority to appoint such assistant range officers as he may deem necessary.

"Captain William C. Goodwin, Co. K, First Infantry, is detailed as acting quartermaster and ordnance officer. He will see to the preparation of the camp, the targets, employ markers,

and issue ammunition to competitors. He will also furnish from his company a suitable guard to protect State property in use at the range.

- "Lieutenant G. M. Elliott, assistant surgeon, First Infantry, is detailed as medical officer and acting commissary, and will make arrangements for furnishing cooked rations for all competitors and officers of the competition while in camp.
- "Captain Frank E. Drake, adjutant, Second Infantry, is detailed as statistical officer. He will arrange for score sheets and supplies necessary for his duties. Score cards will be furnished by the inspector-general of rifle practice.
- "Sergeant Fred L. Edgecomb, sergeant-major, Second Infantry, is detailed for duty in the executive officer's department."

The above officers were supplemented by assistant range officers and each was faithful in the performance of his duty. Upon Captain Goodwin and Lieut. Elliott devolved the work of making ready range and camp and they deserve especial commendation for the conspicuous ability which they displayed.

THE GOVERNOR HILL TROPHY MATCH.

The first match of the day was the Governor Hill Trophy match at 200 yards, open to teams of five from any headquarters or company of infantry, or ship's company, Naval Reserve, of the National Guard of the State of Maine. The following prizes and trophies were offered:

First prize, the Governor Hill trophy, to be held until the next competition, and \$50.00; second prize, \$35.00; third prize, \$25.00; fourth prize, \$15.00; fifth prize, \$10.00; sixth prize, \$5.00.

To the First Regiment team making the highest aggregate score, the Colonel Kendall trophy, presented by Col. L. H. Kendall, commanding the First Infantry.

To the Second Regiment team making the highest aggregate score, the Colonel Newcomb trophy, presented by Col. E. E. Newcomb, commanding the Second Infantry.

To the Portland team making the highest aggregate score, the Colonel Boothby trophy, presented by Col. F. E. Boothby of Portland.

To the Kennebec county team making the highest aggregate score, the Captain Hill trophy, presented by Capt. J. F. Hill of Waterville, assistant surgeon, Second Infantry.

The Colonel Osgood trophy, presented by Colonel Charles H. Osgood of Lewiston, to the Lewiston or Auburn team making the highest aggregate score in the Governor Hill trophy match.

To the member of the team representing Co. M, Second Infantry, making the highest score, the Byron Boyd trophy, presented by the Hon. Byron Boyd of Augusta.

The prizes and trophies were won as follows:

First prize, the Governor Hill trophy, and the Colonel Kendall trophy, Co. D, 1st Inf., Norway.

Second prize and the Colonel Newcomb trophy, Co. L, 2d Inf., Houlton.

Third prize, Co. F, 2d Inf., Dover.

Fourth prize and the Colonel Boothby trophy, Co. E, 1st Inf., Portland.

Fifth prize, Co. G, 2d Inf., Bangor.

Six prize, Co. M., 1st Inf., Westbrook.

The Colonel Osgood trophy, Co. B, 2d Inf., Lewiston.

The Captain Hill trophy, Co. H, 2d Inf., Waterville.

The Byron Boyd trophy, Sergt. Martin E. Newburg, Co. M, 2d Inf., Augusta.

THE INTER-REGIMENTAL MATCH.

In the afternoon came the Inter-Regimental Match, open to teams of twelve from the First and Second Regiments of infantry of the National Guard of the State of Maine, such teams to be composed of the twelve competitors in each regiment making the highest scores in the Governor Hill Trophy Match. The distances were: 200, 300 and 500 yards; seven shots and two sighting shots per man at each distance. The following prizes and trophies were offered:

To each member of the winning team, a silver badge and 100 rounds of original rifle ammunition.

To the competitor making the highest aggregate score at the three ranges, a gold badge for the Marksman Championship of the National Guard of the State of Maine, and the medal of the National Rifle Association of America.

The Lowell trophy, presented by Mr. Harry P. Lowell of Augusta, to the individual making the highest score at 500 yards in the Inter-Regimental Match.

To the competitor making the highest score at 300 yards, the Lilley prize, offered by the M. C. Lilley Co. of Columbus, Ohio.

To the company inspector making the highest aggregate score, the Peters prize, offered by the Peters Cartridge Co. of New York.

The First Regiment team won the match.

Sergt. D. W. Wentworth, Co. F, 1st Inf., Sanford, won the State medal for the Marksman Championship, the National Rifle Association medal and the Lowell trophy.

Capt. J. W. Nash, Co. D, 1st Inf., Norway, won the Lilley prize.

Sergt. M. P. Stiles, Co. D, 1st Inf., Norway, won the Peters prize.

REVOLVER MATCH.

During the afternoon a revolver match was held in the rear of the rifle butt. The match was open to any officer of the National Guard of the State of Maine or to any enlisted man of the same who is armed with the service revolver. The distances were 30, 50, and 75 yards; six shots at each distance. The prizes were as follows: First prize, service revolver; second prize, revolver cartridge belt and holster; third prize, 200 rounds of service ammunition, cal. .38.

The prizes were won as follows: First, Lieut. H. W. Warren, Co. F, 2d Inf., Dover; second, Col. Elliott C. Dill, inspectorgeneral of rifle practice, Augusta; third, Maj. B. F. Bradbury, surgeon, 1st Inf., Norway.

RANGES.

Considerable progress was made during this season in the matter of range construction, and by the opening of the range season on May 1, 1905, there should be but few organizations unprovided with ranges which will permit qualification in the Sharpshooter class. Some ranges are of sufficient length to permit qualification in the Expert class, but this number will always be limited, as it is difficult to find suitable tracts of land 1,000 yards in length.

LEWISTON AND AUBURN.

The four companies of infantry in Lewiston and Auburn have been without suitable ranges throughout the season. Some practice was performed by Co. C of the 1st Infantry and by Co. B of the 2d Infantry on the old range in Auburn, but the unsafe condition of the marker's shelter necessarily confined such practice to the more experienced men who could be depended upon to "keep on the target." This range permitted practice at no greater distance than 500 yards, so that men could not be qualified beyond the grade of Marksman.

Year in and year out during my administration and during the latter years of my predecessor's administration attention has been called to the need of a suitable range for the Lewiston and Auburn companies, but such recommendations have not been productive of results.

Early in the spring of 1904 the necessity for a range was brought to the attention of the Lewiston municipal authorities and an appropriation was asked from the city. This request was renewed in June, and later through your office. In July you informed me that the Lewiston authorities would not assist in the matter and under your instructions I proceeded to select and begin work on a site, under the provision of the Militia Act.

I examined a site which was recommended by officers of the local company. It appeared to answer all purposes, but that we might be sure the distance, elevation, etc., were suitable I directed Lieut. W. H. Matthews of Co. B, 2d Inf., to have an engineer make the necessary measurements. Lieut. Matthews secured the services of John A. Jones, the city engineer, and on August 8 Mr. Jones reported that he had made a survey and found it practicable to lay out a 1,000-yard range by cutting through about 200 yards of woods and bushes. He said that the ground was level the entire distance and that the hill which would form the backstop would rise at a grade of some twenty degrees to a height of 120 feet.

Lieut. Matthews, in the meantime, had written informing me that he had seen the parties owning the land and had secured their consent to its use for a range. As the city was to ultimately take over the range the State could not secure leases, but Lieut. Matthews was assured that the rentals would be made at fair prices.

Work was begun shortly after and carried as far as the limited means available would permit. The work was under the general direction of Mr. Jones, the city engineer of Lewiston, and has been so thoroughly done that it will take but a short time to make the range ready for use in the spring.

The range has been thoroughly bushed, the rocks removed, and the pit dug and drained. In the spring it will be necessary to line the pit, build a target house, set the frames, and add a backstop of wood immediately back of the targets so that bullets may not find some hidden boulder and ricochet. The range will permit practice at all ranges up to and including 1,000 yards.

When completed the range should be one of the finest in New England and it should cost the city but little for its maintenance from year to year.

If the city of Auburn does not provide a range for Co. C, 1st Inf., Co. C should be permitted to use the Lewiston range and the city of Auburn should bear one-quarter of the expense of maintenance.

PORTLAND.

Early in the season inexperienced men disregarded the orders that no man shall be permitted to fire on the range till he has been properly instructed in sighting, position, and aiming drills, and complaints of wild shooting on the city of Portland range were received.

I at once wrote all company commanders, calling their attention to the importance of obeying the orders to the letter. There were no further complaints.

During the first part of the season the range was reconstructed to give greater safety to nearby residences. The targets and firing points on the 200 and 300-yard range were moved back thirty feet to bring the new target pit in front of the old mound, using the mound for a backstop. The new target pit is 25 feet by 7 feet by 7 feet 6 inches deep, these measurements being on the inside of the pit. The pit is framed with 3-inch dry spruce with 6-inch by 6-inch sills and corner posts and the intermediate posts are 4 inches by 6 inches. The seams were caulked and payed to make them water tight and a pump was placed in the pit to care for rainfall. The excavation was made in clay and carried twelve inches outside the timbering of the pit and this space filled with gravel to prevent heaving by frosts. The mate-

rial excavated was placed on top of the mound for backstop, raising the elevation of the mound about two feet eight inches. Four sets of sliding targets were installed in the pit.

Westbrook.

The city of Westbrook, late in the season, built for Co. M, 1st Inf., a new range which will permit firing at all ranges up to and including 1,000 yards. The range is so constructed that shooting may be simultaneously carried on at 200, 300, and 500 yards. I approved the site and gave general directions as to the method of placing the targets, and when the range was completed it was thoroughly inspected by Lieut. John J. Dooley, inspector of rifle practice, 1st Inf.

Brunswick.

In order to provide a range at some central point for holding the State competition, it was deemed advisable to enlarge the Brunswick range. This work was done under the personal direction of Capt. W. C. Goodwin, Co. K, 1st Inf., and every dollar which the State invested was well expended. The backstop and pit were lengthened so as to accommodate six sliding third-class targets, so placed that three second-class targets could be substituted for work at the mid ranges. The mounds at the 500 and 600-yard firing points were lengthened so as to give ample room for two men and a coach for each target. range was bushed out and a telephone wire was erected to connect the various firing points with the pit. Score blackboards, target numbers, and wind flags were provided. The sliding targets are well constructed and will last many years. things add to the State's equipment for holding matches, and being permanent in their nature will not have to be renewed each year. The frames in which the targets slide are built into the pit and strongly braced. The sliding sashes are easily detached and are securely housed in a shingled target house built this season by Co. K.

The probable extension of this range the coming season so as to permit firing at all ranges up to and including 1,000 yards will make it one of the best equipped as well as the most centrally located in the State.

Waterville.

I visited the range of Co. H, 2d Inf., at Waterville in July and suggested several changes to render it more safe and satisfactory. These changes were readily agreed to by the Hon. C. W. Davis, mayor of the city, and were promptly made under the direction of Sergt. H. L. Pepper, company inspector of rifle practice. Near the close of the season Sergt. Pepper found that he could secure a 1,000-yard range and succeeded in making it temporarily available for the last few days' practice. The long range pit should be rebuilt and strengthened before the beginning of another season.

Augusta.

Much time has been consumed in the attempt to provide a range at Augusta for Co. M, 2d Inf. A suitable site has been found which would permit practice up to and including 600 yards but it has thus far been impossible to secure title to the property. The old range was used at 200 and 300 yards for a part of the season.

INSUFFICIENT RANGES.

Co. H, 1st Inf., at Rockland, Co. C, 2d Inf., at Bath, and Co. I, 2d Inf., at Eastport, are ill-provided with ranges. Co. A, 2d Inf., at Gardiner, is limited to work at 200, 300, and 500 yards. Capt. Charles C. Tibbetts, commanding Co. H, 1st Inf., says the Rockland range is not suitable for the .30-caliber ammunition. Capt. Wm. R. Kimball, commanding Co. C, 2d Inf., says the Bath range is unavailable for use beyond 200 yards. The fact that Eastport is situated on a small island renders extremely difficult the task of securing more extended range facilities for Co. I, 2d Inf.

INDOOR RANGES.

Some start was made this season on gallery practice, the importance of which cannot be over-estimated in training men for accurate work with service ammunition.

The work is yet in its infancy but the beginning made last winter is sure to be followed by increased interest the present season. When rifle shooting reaches its highest development there will be no appreciable interruption of work. Men will practice from November 1st to May 1st on the indoor range and from May 1st to November 1st on the field range. When this

time comes the Guard of Maine will be made up of trained marksmen, for the man who cannot do satisfactory work with service ammunition, after being thoroughly trained with the reduced charge in the gallery, will not be allowed to long retain his membership in any organization.

The development of gallery work in the Guard of this State is very largely due to the efforts of Lieut. John J. Dooley, inspector of rifle practice, 1st Inf. Lieut. Dooley took up the work with his characteristic enthusiasm and thoroughness and has done much to make indoor shooting popular with the Guardsmen. While mainly devoted to the First Infantry, his work bore fruits in the Second Infantry and many indoor ranges were built and used last winter.

For gallery work the government gallery ammunition was issued but it proved far from satisfactory. It was arratic and even in the hands of careful riflemen failed to give proper accuracy. Experiments have been conducted by Lieut. Dooley and for the present winter's work a new and more accurate ammunition will be issued.

Some companies used .22-caliber rifles and others used subcalibers with .32-caliber ammunition in the Krag. The use of any rifle is better than none at all, but in gallery work it is best to use a rifle of the same weight with the same sights and trigger pull that is to be used later on the field range. Practice under the latter conditions accustoms a man to the "hang" of the rifle with which he is armed. For this reason the use of the U. S. magazine rifle is recommended, though not absolutely demanded.

Portland now has a four-target gallery range built in the basement of the head house at the armory, which gives perfect accommodations for the four companies of infantry and two divisions of Naval Reserve. The range has been constructed in accordance with the most approved plans and is without a superior in point of utility and equipment.

Auburn has an excellent gallery range built in the cellar of the armory.

Particular mention is made of these two gallery ranges for the reason that they are permanently constructed. Most of the other companies which have had indoor practice use a movable backstop which is set up in one end of the company's drill room.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

NEXT SEASON'S COMPETITIONS.

Until the State has a range which will give at least twelve targets for simultaneous use, I believe it will be better to hold regimental competitions.

For the next season I would recommend:

- I. That the twelve companies and headquarters of the First Regiment send teams of seven men and one substitute to such range as may be chosen and that the match be shot at 200 and 500 yards, the highest individual aggregate to win the regimental championship.
- II. That the Second Regiment be likewise required to send teams for a similar competition at such point as may be designated, the dates of the two competitions to be as close together as possible.
- III. That the twelve men in each regiment making the highest aggregate be constituted the regimental team and the three men in each regiment making the next highest aggregate be substitutes to their respective teams.
- IV. That the ten men in each regiment making the next highest aggregates be designated as the Next Ten.
- V. That the two divisions of the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, send teams of seven men and one substitute to a competition to be held at Portland, as near as possible to the dates of the regimental competitions, and that the three competitors making the highest aggregate at 200 and five hundred yards be designated as the First Three.
- VI. That these regimental competitions and the Naval Reserve competition be held in the latter part of July.
- VII. That in the latter part of August the two regimental teams, the Next Ten from each regiment and the First Three of the Naval Reserve be brought together at such range as may be designated and that they be furnished with quarters and subsistence.
- VIII. That the regimental teams shall shoot in the Inter-Regimental match at 200, 300, 500, and 600 yards and that the substitutes, the Next Ten from each regiment and the First Three of the Naval Reserve be squadded and shoot at the same distances at the same time.

- IX. That the competitor making the highest aggregate at the four ranges be awarded a gold medal for the State rifle championship.
- X. That the twelve competitors making the highest aggregate scores be designated in orders as the State rifle team and that the three competitors making the next highest scores be substitutes.
- XI. That each member of the State team be furnished with 100 rounds of original rifle ammunition.

EXTRA AMMUNITION.

I would recommend as an incentive to increased qualification that every company which qualifies every member as a second-class marksman or better be given 1,000 rounds of original rifle ammunition for its next season's use.

RANGES FOR NEW COMPANIES.

I would recommend that hereafter, in establishing a company in any town, such town be required to provide a site for a rifle range permitting practice up to and including 600 yards before said company is raised.

More Attention Required.

Careful observation extending over a period of four years, during which there have been several changes in the system of qualification, convinces me that insufficient attention has been paid to small arms practice in examinations for warrants and commissions.

If we are to accept the statement that eight and one-half of the ten points of a soldier's efficiency is proficiency in small arms practice, the Firing Regulations for Small Arms should at least form as important a part of a soldier's examination for advancement as the Drill Regulations. Yet it is an undeniable fact that soldiers have been advanced to the command of a squad or a section without the slightest question concerning their ability to explain the first principles of rifle practice. In the same way men have been commissioned as lieutenants and finally advanced to the command of a company without the slightest working knowledge of the system of small arms practice.

Fully endorsing the statement of a recent secretary of war that eight and one-half points out of the ten that go to make up a soldier's efficiency is proficiency in small arms practice, I would most respectfully urge that knowledge of the Firing Regulations for Small Arms be made essential to the promotion of an enlisted man or a commissioned officer.

In some states an enlisted man is required to attain a certain degree of skill in the use of the rifle before he is eligible to promotion, and while this system has its merits I would not go so far as to recommend its adoption in the Maine National Guard. Each company commander has one or more men who would never make more than indifferent marksmen, vet who are men that do much for the company's good. I would not bar these men from promotion but I would require them to exhibit their ability to train others to shoot. Some men are poor marksmen but excellent instructors, while some excellent marksmen do not possess in the slightest degree the power to impart their knowledge to others. No company commander would advance to the rank of corporal a man who is unable to explain to his men the meaning of "squads right" and "squads left," and it is just as essential that no company commander should advance to the rank of corporal a man unable to explain holding, position and aiming to the recruit and the difference between a marksman and sharpshooter to the more advanced riflemen.

But a company commander will rarely require his men to pass an examination in something with which he is himself unfamiliar, and so it becomes essential that in the future no person is commissioned till he has demonstrated to the satisfaction of the board of examination that he has a suitable working knowledge of the system of practice under which officers and men of the Guard are required to qualify. The adjutant-general's department has been liberal in the distribution of copies of Firing Regulations for Small Arms and there are enough so that each officer and non-commissioned officer will have no difficulty in securing one to study. The regulations are so thoroughly explained that they may be easily understood and in the issuance of orders regarding the qualifications in this State still further explanations have been made. But no regulation and no order will accomplish results unless it is read, and some returns made

to me at the close of the season indicate that no intelligent reading has been given to either regulations or supplementary orders.

I fully believe that if proficiency in the Firing Regulations for Small Arms is required in examinations for promotion, the figure of merit in the National Guard of Maine will be materially raised by the close of another season.

REPORT OF CAPTAIN JAMES B. MITCHELL, ARTILLERY CORPS, U. S. A., INSPECTOR.

War Department,
Office of the Adjutant General,
Washington, April 9, 1904.

To the Adjutant General of Maine, Augusta, Maine:

SIR:—I have the honor to communicate to you the following extracts from the report of Captain James B. Mitchell, Artillery Corps, of his recent inspection of the organized militia of Maine:

Each regimental band consists of one master, one deputy master, one drum major, and twenty-two musicians. It would seem a better arrangement if the bands were organized the same as infantry bands in the regular army.

All commissioned officers of the line are elected for a term of

six years, which in many ways is objectionable.

Forty-six (46) men to a company seems to the undersigned to be too small a number for efficient work when in the field, for after deducting for guard, cooks, police, sick, &c., too few men are left to form a company of sufficient size for drill or other duty. It is recommended that the organization for a company of infantry in the National Guard be changed to consist of the same enlisted force as a company of infantry in the regular army, i. e., one first sergeant, one quartermaster sergeant, four sergeants, six corporals, two cooks with the pay of sergeant, two musicians, one artificer, and forty-eight privates.

By the existing regulations all appointments are made by the regimental commander upon recommendation of the company commander. It is recommended that the company commanders be given power to appoint their own first and quartermaster sergeants, and cooks, by simply issuing a company order.

It would simplify matters if the entire organization of the two infantry regiments conformed to that of a regiment of infantry in the regular service, with the addition of the three medical officers and the inspector of rifle practice. If the organizations were thus organized it would be found to work to a great advantage when they participated in maneuvers with regular troops and were paid for their services by the federal government.

* * * * * * *

Seventy-nine (79) per cent of the entire Guard was the average number present at inspection, and fifty-six (56) per cent was the lowest attendance of any organization, while one company of the Second Infantry had one hundred (100) per cent present. It is believed that a number of men were not able to attend the inspection on account of the severe weather and the condition of the roads. This is especially true in the rural districts. Another cause of so many absentees was the large number of men on furlough due to their having to leave their home stations to seek employment. There was also a number of unexcused absences. The company commanders have not enough power under the State laws to compel attendance at drills.

* * * * * *

ARMS AND EQUIPMENT.

Throughout the Guard these new rifles were found in very good condition, and it was very seldom that a gun was seen that was not in first-class order. Greater care should be taken when drilling indoors in bringing the guns to order arms, and not drop them more than the distance laid down in the manual of arms. Some companies make it a practice when coming to the order to bring the guns down with too much force, which in time will injure them.

* * * * * * *

It was noted that no uniform manner of marking the haversacks and canteens exists, and in several companies the man's company number was not marked on the articles of his equipment.

There is in store at headquarters in Augusta a sufficient supply of shelter tents, ponchos, meat cans, tin cups, knives, forks and spoons (see enclosed list) which are only issued when the different commands take the field. It would seem to the undersigned that these articles of equipment should be kept in store at the station of the troops and not in Augusta.

* * * * * * *

The condition of the uniforms was the same in nearly all the organizations, having been issued to the different commands about the same time with the exception of three new companies.

The blue blouses and overcoats are in "good" condition, but the blue trousers are only in "fair" condition.

The khaki blouses and trousers are in "very good" condition, but only a few of them have been washed since the tour of duty of the Guard at the Portland maneuvers.

The campaign hats and leggings are in only "fair" condition. As long as no full dress uniform is prescribed, it is suggested that two suits of blue dress be furnished each man, as it is impossible to keep the one suit now in the possession of the men in good condition. The khaki uniform is not believed to be suitable for this climate and should be replaced by the olive drab clothing. A suitable flannel shirt should also be issued to the men.

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Some of the drill halls are only 30 x 60 feet and the only hall of suitable size for drilling in platoon movements is in the armory in Portland, where the city authorities retain the privilege of renting it for entertainments on regular drill nights, which has a discouraging effect and seriously interferes with the instruction of the companies occupying the armory.

* * * * * * *

The close order drill on an average was "good" thoroughout the Guard, some companies executing the movements better than others. In extended order the companies were not so well instructed as little attention is given to this drill until the weather permits outdoor instruction to be held. The manual of arms was generally "good" but the loading and firing were only "fair," several companies still using the drill for the Springfield rifles.

* * * * * * *

It seems very essential to the undersigned that all companies should have thorough instruction in sighting, and position and aiming drill, as well as gallery practice, before the outdoor range work is taken up.

There are a large number of good shots in the National Guard of this State, especially in the companies located near the forest section of the State, and a very gratifying interest is taken in target practice throughout the Guard.

AMBULANCE CORPS.

* * * * * * *

They are very well instructed in litter bearer drill but lack instruction in first aid duties. The lieutenant commanding not being a medical officer it is impossible for him to intelligently instruct the men in the duties that would be required of them in the field. A medical officer of the Guard should be detailed to instruct them.

SIGNAL CORPS.

* * * * * * *

It would seem advisable to the undersigned to add another commissioned officer to the organization as the character of the work they have to perform necessitates their being split up into detachments and one officer cannot supervise the work of the whole corps thus distributed.

* * * * * * *

It will be seen that at Lewiston and Auburn there are four companies of infantry, two of the First Regiment and two of the Second Regiment. If these companies were all of the same regiment they would make a major's command, and instruction in movements by battalion could be held in both close and extended order. The company at Rockland should be in the Second Regiment, while that at Bath should be in the First.

* * * * * * *

In many cases company commanders do not pay enough attention to the proper keeping of the Company Record and Property

Returns. This difficulty can only be overcome by a rigid inspection of these papers at frequent intervals.

It is to be regretted that the military appropriation will not admit of the keeping in commission a field battery and two troops of cavalry allowed by the Military Code.

The Adjutant General of the State afforded the undersigned every facility for making the inspections. He is making good progress towards having the Guard conform to the Regular Army standards, and to carrying out the Militia Act of 1903. He hopes at the next session of the legislature to have the Military Code revised to bring about these changes.

The undersigned wishes to call the attention of higher authority to the interest and enthusiasm shown by both officers and enlisted men of the Maine National Guard in their work.

REPORT OF COLONEL EVERARD E. NEWCOMB.

HEADQUARTERS SECOND INFANTRY, N. G. S. M., EASTPORT, MAINE, September 20, 1904.

Maj. Gen. A. B. Farnham, Adjutant General, Augusta, Maine:

Sir:—I have the honor to submit the following report of the operations of my regiment in the maneuvers near Manassas, Va., September 2nd to 10th inclusive, also of the First Brigade of the Second Division Maneuver Corps, while under my command on the 8th and 9th:

In compliance with G. O. No. 16, dated A. G. O., c. s., State of Maine, Augusta, August 13, 1904, herewith appended.

This regiment rendezvoused at Portland, Me., September 2nd, at 6.30 P. M., and was quartered as provided in Par. IV, G. O. No. 3, c. s., these headquarters, herewith appended. At 7.15 A. M., September 3rd, regiment marched to Preble Street station of the Boston & Maine Railroad, where the first section entrained and pulled out at 7.50 A. M., followed by the second section fifteen minutes later.

I desire to submit my earnest disapproval of the inadequate and miserable accommodations provided by the above-named railroad for the enlisted men of my command, many of whom had been on the road since 7.00 A. M. of the 2nd, had slept (?) on the floor of an armory through the night, and were obliged to travel to Thoroughfare, Va., in combination smoking-cars, many sleeping in the aisles for lack of room. No baggage cars were provided, rations were placed in ordinary freight cars, where cooks prepared coffee and rations as best they could, with no opportunity to issue except at infrequent stations, when details from the several companies were obliged to rush for-

ward to secure their rations before the train should start, thus causing confusion and loss. I regard it as a disgrace to any transportation company, in time of peace, and especially so when compared with what had been furnished troops from other states. It must be attributed to a manifest indifference of said company to the comfort of the citizen-soldiers of this State.

The regiment without incident arrived at Thoroughfare, Va., at 5.45 P. M., Sunday, September 4th,—just five hours late. Detraining at that point in three (3) minutes, was formed in columns of companies in a field near by, where officers of the "regulars" inspected the command. Immediately upon completion of the inspection, I marched the regiment direct to its camp. Guard was established without ceremony, tents pitched, and supper served to as tired and hungry a lot of men as ever wore uniforms. Long before "taps" nothing was heard about camp except the measured tread of the faithful sentinels or the occasional growl of some officer whose luggage had gone astray.

Reveille on the 5th found the regiment up and eager for the duties of the day. By order of General Lee, all brigade and regimental exercises were suspended for that day. This enabled the regiment to complete the details of camp and prepare for the more active work of the morrow.

In General Orders No. 4, Second Division, Maneuver Corps, of August 27, 1904, the following commands were announced as the First Brigade of that Division:

1st U. S. Infantry (three companies),

2nd Maine Infantry,

1st North Carolina Infantry,

2nd Texas Infantry.

General commanding, Brig. Gen. Jesse M. Lee, U. S. Army. Aid, 1st Lieut. Garrison McCaskey, 25th Infantry.

Aid, 1st Lieut. George Van H. Mosely, 1st Cavalry.

Adjutant General, Captain LaRoy S. Upton, 1st Infantry.

Chief Quartermaster and Commissary, 1st Lieut. Ralph B. Lister, 1st Inf.

Chief Surgeon, Major William E. Purviance, Surgeon U. S. Army.

In compliance with G. O. No. 4, Brigade Headquarters, dated September 4, 1904, directing this regiment to outpost the left, Company E, Captain Dunlap, relieved a detachment of the 1st U. S. Infantry at 7.00 A. M., remaining on post until 12.00 M. same day, when they were relieved by Company B, Captain Kelleher. The latter company was withdrawn and returned to camp at 6.30 P. M. This line of outposts was located about one-half mile beyond Haymarket, and extended from the railroad past the Blight House to Thoroughfare Pike, with the line of observation facing southeast.

Receiving a request from the brigade commander to recommend a lieutenant of my regiment to report to him in person for duty as acting aid during the maneuvers, I detailed for that duty Lieut. Joseph H. Norton, of Co. K, and am pleased to state that he performed the duties of that position in a manner highly satisfactory to both General Lee and myself.

The regiment formed column of fours by the light of its campfires, and moved out at 3.42 A. M., September 6th, and marched to Haymarket, arriving at 5.00 A. M., and there formed line in field on west side of Carolina road, facing east, having on its right the 1st U. S. Infantry and on its left the 1st North Carolina and 2nd Texas, all of Lee's brigade, which had been designated the general reserve.

Being ordered by General Lee to reconnoitre the immediate front, I directed that a few scouts be thrown out by Company B, skirting the woods across the road in an easterly direction for a distance of about 800 yards; nothing being discovered to warrant further delay, at 8.25 A. M. these scouts were called in and the regiment, breaking from the right, marched to the left, moving up the Carolina road northeast, across Little Bull Run, to Spink House, arriving at that point about 9.13 A. M. I ordered the 3rd Battalion (Maj. Thompson) to take position in line on west side of Carolina road, opposite the lane leading toward the Scroggin House, looking east and down that lane.

At 9.50 A. M., regiment, with remainder of brigade, retraced its steps, picking up the 3rd Battalion, which resumed its place in column following the other two. At 10.30 A. M., entered the woods southeast of Utterback's house, and by direction of General Lee in person was posted in the following positions: The 1st Battalion (Maj. Cummings) formed for attack in woods, facing east, with right resting in woods south of road; 2nd Battalion (Maj. W. S. Hume) with three (3) companies of the

2nd Vermont, formed line of battle facing east in cornfield along the board fence south of road and leading toward the Belcher house; three (3) companies of the 3rd Battalion were held in reserve in woods, between the 1st Battalion and one (1) company of the 2nd Vermont stationed at wire fence in woods facing east, with one (1) company along rail fence on north side of woods, while two (2) companies of the 2nd Vermont were stationed behind fence facing north in cornfield south of road by Lieut Greenlaw of my staff so as to enflade the Blue should they succeed in forcing my first line to fall back.

12.00 M., met and assisted to repulse attack of Blue force from east; these attacks, though spirited at times, continued in only a desultory way, Blue attempting to force the line in the woods and cornfield to south, but were driven back each time.

Thus the situation remained at 3.00 P. M., when recall sounded and all action ceased. Estimated loss of the regiment for the day, forty (40) men.

Soon after 3.00 P. M., the regiment, with the others of the brigade, marched back to Haymarket and bivouacked on the ground occupied at five o'clock in the morning.

SEPTEMBER 7th.

The regiment left bivouac at 3.00 A. M. and marched to its camp at Thoroughfare, arriving at 4.00 A. M.

- 5.45 A. M., the 3rd Battalion was ordered to Thoroughfare Gap to support Foote's Battery, which had been sent there to meet a threatened move of the Blue.
- 8.30 A. M., the other two battalions of the regiment moved rapidly from camp, up the Antioch road, arriving at forks near Bell house at 8.55 A. M., the last mile and three-quarters being covered in double time, in less than seventeen minutes.
- Three (3) companies of the 1st Battalion formed line facing east as a reserve to two lines of Brown infantry in front, extending from the Bell house about 300 yards, and facing north by east, thence southeast to woods beyond Fletcher house.

The 2nd Battalion (Maj. W. S. Hume), together with the 4th Company of the 1st Battalion, all under Lieut. Col. F. M. Hume, moved southeast on Antioch road toward Keyser house, and

became engaged at that point, filling a gap between the 2nd Texas on the right and two battalions of the 1st North Carolina on the left, and immediately in front (as it afterwards proved) of the 1st Maine Infantry of the "Blues."

II.30 A. M., the 1st Battalion was ordered southeast on Antioch road about a mile, facing northeast, right connecting with left of one battalion of the 1st North Carolina, where they remained until about noon, when all action ceased.

The regiment assembled in Antioch road, and with the rest of the brigade returned to camp.

The regiment left camp at 9.08 A. M., September 8th, taking its place in column as provided in Brigade Field Orders No. 4, dated September 7, and one (I) company (H) as rear guard, with Major F. B. Cummings, 2nd Maine, as brigade officer-of-the-day.

At 9.55 A. M., by order of Brig. Gen. Lee, I directed Lieut. Col. F. M. Hume to take command of the regiment, and accompanied by Capt. L. S. Upton, Adjutant General, Lieutenants G. V. H. Mosely and Garrison McCaskey, all of General Lee's staff, I assumed command of the brigade.

At 10.10 A. M., the brigade reached Haymarket, and proceeded thence across Little Bull Run, near Rust house, via Belcher, Simpson, Smith, and Robinson, to Mason house, the 2nd Maine preceded by the 1st U. S. Infantry, 2nd Texas, and 1st North Carolina Regiments, each regiment having been ordered to throw out one (1) company about 600 yards to the left to protect that flank, and the brigade pushed forward cautiously, endeavoring to develop the Blue.

At 12.05 P. M., near Mason's, the Texas and North Carolina Regiments formed for attack, facing toward the W. H. Brown house on Warrenton Pike, and moved southeast through the woods.

The 2nd Maine marched further to the northeast and at 12.30 P. M. the 3rd Battalion formed line of companies in columns of fours, and moved toward the W. H. Brown house en echelon and to the left rear of the North Carolina Regiment.

The 1st and 2nd Battalion continued to the northeast in the woods until 12.55 P. M., when the 2nd Battalion formed for attack, and moved southeast in edge of woods towards Gossom house.

The 1st Battalion at 1.00 P. M. came within the zone of artillery fire from Douglas Heights, sustaining a loss of ten (10) men. The battalion then took shelter and divided, two companies moving toward the old railway embankment and two (2) companies remaining not far from the Piercy house.

1.30 P. M., the 2nd Battalion, having on its left two (2) companies of the 1st Battalion, 2nd Maine, and on its right Company K, U. S. Engineers and the North Carolina Regiment, emerged from the woods on a line parallel with the line marked by the Gossom and Marsteller houses and drove a force of Blues, about one battalion, from a position they had held along the railroad embankment. This Blue battalion retreated under a heavy infantry fire up the slope to Pageland lane, where they found shelter in the ditch behind the fence on west side of said The 2nd Battalion, 2nd Maine, stopped on line of Gossom-Marsteller houses, well sheltered by crest in front. At 1.45 P. M., two (2) companies 2nd Maine on right, with 2nd Battalion and Engineer company, left the little ridge that sheltered them and rushed forward about 150 yards toward Pageland lane, attacking the Blues at that point. enfiladed by artillery and forced to fall back to their original line with a loss of forty (40) men of the 2nd Maine and ten (10) of the Engineers. I was unable to learn who ordered the advance to be made.

One (1) company of the 1st U. S. Infantry occupied position on prolongation of line from Gossom to W. H. Brown house, their right resting at fence on Warrenton Pike. One (1) company of same regiment reporting to me about 2.00 P. M., I placed in reserve in rear of first company and near the Pike. One (1) battalion of the 1st North Carolina arriving at the same time, I directed two companies to take position on south side of Pike in front of W. H. Brown house, facing east by south, with the other two (2) companies held in reserve in column of fours on the Pike. In this position, at 3.00 P. M., the action terminated. Loss this day of 2nd Maine Regiment, fifty (50) men.

The regiment bivouacked with the brigade near the Piercy house.

I caused a line of outposts to be established extending from the Little Bull Run around to the old railway embankment. Company H, 2nd Maine, was posted at the latter point, and performed the duty in a most thorough manner. (See report of Captain Besse, herewith attached.)

September 9th, the brigade left its bivouac at 4.00 A. M. and marched in column via Marsteller and R. H. Robinson to J. W. Caton house. Owing to sudden illness of General Lee, who was to command the 1st and 4th Brigades on this day, I again assumed command of the brigade.

At 5.00 A. M., the 2nd Maine deployed between the Caton house and Stony Ridge, facing east by south in two (2) lines, two (2) battalions in the fighting line and one (1) battalion in reserve on left rear. The 1st North Carolina was on the right in same formation, while the 2nd Texas was to have acted as brigade reserve in line of companies in columns of fours, near the left. From some unexplained cause they failed to occupy and maintain that position, with the result that our left flank came wellnigh being turned by two (2) regiments of Blue. This was only averted by the alertness of Lieut. Col. Hume, commanding the 2nd Maine who, by a rapid change of front, with the assistance of Lieut. McCaskey, 25th U. S. Infantry who brought up one company of the 1st U.S. Infantry, was able to refuse his flank, and by a well-directed fire drove back the Blue flanking force. The whole line then moved forward, arriving at 6.45 A. M. on the Henry Robinson house plateau. Continuing, at 7.15 A. M. the brigade encountered the right of the Blue line near the B. Robinson house, and heavy fighting ensued, the Blue line being forced back over Bull Run, closely followed by the 2nd Maine and 1st North Carolina to position near T. Robinson house on east side of Bull Run, with the 2nd Texas formed in edge of cornfield facing southwest, enfilading the Blue at this point. Later, one regiment of Blue secured a strong position in the heavy woods at Ball's Ford, facing northeast, and forced the 2nd Texas to fall back. Immediately following this success one battalion of this Blue force emerged from the woods in a ragged formation of fours. Captain Bibber, Co. I, 2nd Maine, with his command rapidly changed direction by the right flank, entered a ravine near by, took shelter, and poured thirteen (13) volleys into this Blue force without receiving a return shot, with the result that the Blue battalion was ruled out by their own umpire, who remarked that they would have been annihilated. Captain Bibber deserves credit for his quick comprehension of the situation, rapidity of movement, and neatness of execution.

At 8.30 A. M., the action which seemed to be fast approaching the old-time battle of tradition, ceased and the troops remained in their relative positions awaiting further developments, with every indication that the problem had been solved and our work completed. Estimated loss this day ninety (90) men.

Our short but active campaign against the Blue (now over), comprised only five days, as almanacs measure time, yet for us of the National Guard, they were days full of excitement and so full of incident that memory recalls but a whirl of occurrences and events, succeeding so rapidly one to another that it is with difficulty one distinguishes them,—moving pictures, changing with more than kaleidoscopic rapidity.

And thus the last engagement of the maneuvers at Manassas closed bathed in sunshine; scarcely a cloud appeared to throw a fleeting shadow across the fair autumnal landscape, the background of which was made up of dark tracts of woodland, diversified by patches of rough pasture, winding streams, long vistas of green sward, and teeming with the waving fields of corn ready for the harvest, with just enough of distant spire and nearer farmstead to add the trace of human comfort and contentment necessary to complement the natural beauty of the scene. Although the foreground and middle distance of the picture were occupied by the various combatants of Blue and Brown in mimic killing and maiming,—of the grim reality of wounded and dying there was none, no blemish of the horror of human suffering assailed our eyes, no groans nor sighs nor oaths of deadly struggle were heard, yet to the straining senses of our imagination there seemed to be wafted on the breeze the fierce Confederate yells and sturdy Union cheers of the mighty hosts whose blood hallowed this ground forty years ago. And now the descendants of these men, thirty thousand of them, had marched and fought, in mimic warfare, over the same ground, without the shedding of a drop of blood, with only the spirit of soldierly rivalry and emulation to spur them on.

While the general officers, with staff and observers, wait for the umpires to report and decide whether victory should perch on the banners of Blue or Brown, the hardy "regular" with his comrade "guardsman" munches hardtack, washed down with hearty swigs from well-filled canteens, and the time passes in friendly chat, with laugh and story, as they stand, or sit, with little thought, perhaps, of the sad and gruesome tragedy enacted upon this historic field in the years long gone by.

About 9.00 A. M., the welcome notes of "recall" ring out sharp and clear on the morning air, companies assemble, regiments reform, and swing into long, sinuous columns of brigades, and we of the Browns march through wood and field to the Warrenton Pike, across the Stone bridge (the strategical point of the problem) splash through the ford at Young's branch, up the hill by the Stone house, whose walls had echoed the dying gasp of many a wounded hero of Blue and Gray in the "brave days of old,"—but now thronged with fair ladies and dashing officers who wave gloves and handkerchiefs at the "dust-brown ranks" as they swing cheerily along unmindful of the fatigues and hardships of the last four days and the many weary miles yet to march ere they reach camp, where much-needed rest must be obtained in order to fit them for the grand review to take place next day.

Saturday, September 10th, the regiment appeared to have fully recovered from the fatigues of the day before, and at 8.00 A. M. formed promptly, swung into column with the Brigade, and marched via Thoroughfare, Haymarket and Gainesville to Wellington, where it took part in the grand review. This ceremony took place in a large field about one-half mile east of the railroad station at Wellington, and on what is known as the Wheeler farm. The divisions formed in five lines north of the railroad, facing the Wheeler house, with the brigades in line of masses. The First Division constituted the right wing, and the Second Division the left wing. The review was certainly an imposing spectacle, and one seldom witnessed in this country in time of peace. Having passed the reviewing-stand, I marched the regiment direct to Wellington station, where we were obliged to wait until 5 P. M. before we could entrain and begin our long journey home to Maine, where we finally arrived without accident.

In the foregoing it has been impossible to furnish more than a general outline of the operations of the brigade which came immediately under my personal observation, and only while under my command, as I have no reports from the commanders of the other regiments, either written or verbal, and I am, therefore, unable to give any particular or discriminating information concerning those organizations which contributed so fully to whatever success the brigade may have attained.

That this tour of duty has proved instructive and of inestimable value to the regiment is beyond question, and it has in my opinion added fifty per cent to its value as a military force. The health of the men was most excellent, when we consider all the conditions and circumstances, no illness occurring beyond slight indispositions or sore feet (due to ill-fitting shoes) which readily yielded to simple remedies.

I have only praise and hearty appreciation for the officers and men of my command, who proved patient, willing, vigilant and untiring in every duty, accepting severe and unwonted hardships without complaint, thus naturally eliciting my warmest commendation. From my observation, I am inclined to believe that the marching feats of the Second Maine might claim in a campaign quite as much place, from an historical standpoint, as the battles in which it would take part. In military operations, as in civil life, patience and endurance will win in the long run as against mere courage and elan. The former are the stubborn qualities of highest value in marches, the latter are those conspicuous in the shock of battle, and in the light of history it may be asserted. that the prosaic, deep-seated traits which make for endurance of the long, fatiguing march are rarer than those fiercer, more volatile qualities which develop under the stimulus of the cannon's roar, the rifle's crack, and the bayonet thrust.

I desire to express the highest appreciation of the loyal support so cheerfully given me by the officers of my field and staff. Especial mention should be made of the skillful manner in which Captain Drake and Lieut. Spaulding, Regimental Quartermaster and Commissary, conducted the affairs of their department; they certainly have no superiors among National Guardsmen. They were always up with the regiment when it went into bivouac, and the wagons were kept full with a supply of rations and everything needful for the comfort of the men, while other regiments did not see theirs until the next day. Major Fuller and his assistant surgeons, Drs. Hill and Chandler, were con-

stantly on the alert, safeguarding the health of the men. Major Fuller's report accompanies this, and is worthy of perusal.

Lieut. Col. F. M. Hume, as usual, proved worthy of every confidence while in command of the regiment, handling it with a skill second to no officer upon the field. His report of duty performed during that time is herewith appended.

I cannot close this report without tendering to Brigadier Generals Bell and Lee, Division and Brigade Commanders, my most grateful acknowledgment and appreciation for the unfailing courtesy and kindly consideration shown me during our participation in the maneuvers; such treatment can but challenge one's best thought and loyalty. It was indeed a pleasure to be assigned to duty under such enthusiastic, generous and capable officers. My thanks are due, and cordially extended to them and all the officers of the regular establishment with whom we were brought in contact. Among the many, I recall with pleasure Major Hunter Liggett, M. S. Department, umpire assigned to my regiment; Captain L. S. Upton, Adjutant-General of the brigade; Lieuts. G. V. H. Mosely, 1st Cav., and Garrison McCaskey of General Lee's Staff; also Captain Jordan, Lieuts, Brandle, Browning, Lister, Fales and Packer, of the 1st Infantry, and Paymasters Major Pickett and Captain Brown, all gentlemen whom it was a delight to know. Notwithstanding each had a multiplicity of duties to claim his attention, undergoing the same hardships and privations, far greater responsibilities, yet each would manage in some way to spare a little of his valuable time to assist us,—no matter when or where, day or night, ever patient and helpful when mistakes were made, observant and pleased when improvement was shown, always cheerful and courteous—what wonder that a Guardsman's heart warms to them.

Especially do I wish to extend to Adjutant General A. B. Farnham, in behalf of myself and the regiment, our deep gratitude and appreciation for his thoughtful, earnest and unremitting efforts to provide every thing that might tend to give comfort and enjoyment to the men, and conduce to the dignity and honor of the regiment and State.

To the Officers and Men of the Second Division, Maneuver Corps:

The maneuvers are concluded. It will now be apparent to all that (as the division commander reminded the officers before these maneuvers began) success in warfare is mainly attained by marching.

The commanding general very greatly regrets that the maneuvers have imposed such hardships and fatigue upon those unaccustomed thereto, but he has proceeded upon the theory that nothing is worth doing that is not worth doing well and that the members of this command would rather make any kind of effort and achieve success than reap failure through feeble measures. Nothing can be done well without hard work.

It has been many times asserted in my hearing that the National Guard, unaccustomed to night marching, cannot be safely marched in the dark. If these maneuvers have accomplished nothing more, they have at least demonstrated to this division the unreliability of this dictum. But, though this division has done wonders in the way of marching, it is probably apparent to all National Guardsmen that physical training is necessary to make a reliable and thoroughly efficient soldier. It is not only necessary to train the physique, but also to train the will and cultivate fortitude. He who has a determined will can endure an immense amount of fatigue. That men can be so trained as to stand the fatigue of long and exhaustive marches, has been demonstrated by the fact that, so far as it has come to

the knowledge of the commanding general, no regular soldier has fallen out because of exhaustion.

As success in warfare is mainly achieved by marching, the National Guard could do nothing which would contribute more to its efficiency than to individually practice physical training and acquire ability to march long distances.

The National Guard of this division has greatly distinguished itself by marching, but with a short term of training it could do still better. It may be a source of some gratification for the Guard to know that there was much less falling out than had been expected by the division commander, who saw no case which did not appear to have been caused by exhaustion or sore feet. When any one has done his best he can do no more, and should not be stigmatized as a straggler. The Guard of this division has done some work that any professional soldier might be proud of, and, as for the regular contingent, it has done its full duty, as usual, in a zealous, steady way that challenges the admiration of any one really acquainted with it.

The division commander regrets that time has been entirely insufficient to admit of a detailed explanation, for the satisfaction of the division, of the tactical and strategical considerations which led to the plans adopted, but he hopes to find time to do his duty in this respect, by preparing a pamphlet on this subject later on, to send to the organizations of the division. His thanks are due, and gladly extended, for the cordial, enthusiastic and zealous loyalty with which the division has responded to all his desires and instructions. Service under such circumstances, no matter how hard, is a genuine pleasure.

This letter will be read to every company, troop and battery in the command.

REPORT OF THE NAVAL RESERVE, LIEUTENANT HARRY M. BIGELOW, COMMANDING.

Headquarters Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M., July 5, 1904.

General Orders, No. 1. Series 1904.

- I. In accordance with orders from the A. G. O., N. G. S. M., the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, N. G. S. M. will perform their annual tour of duty both afloat and ashore. The command will go into camp at High Head, North Harpswell, at noon July 9 and will break camp at noon, July 17. The duty afloat will be performed on the U. S. S. Nezinscot.
- II. Gunner's Mate Heseltine of the First Division will make up a boat's crew to take the cutter to High Head, leaving Portland so as to arrive in Camp not later than 5 P. M., July 9. The men comprising the cutter's crew will carry with them their personal equipment including rifles, belts and bayonets, canteens, bags and blankets. Before leaving Portland the petty officer in charge will furnish the commanding officer with a list of the Cutter's crew and on arriving at High Head he will report with his party to the senior officer in charge.
- III. Lieut. Harry M. Nickerson, assistant surgeon, will until further orders, assume control of the paymasters department and will with such assistants as he may designate leave Portland for High Head so as to arrive at camp not later than Saturday morning at 8 P. M. Before his departure he will report to the commanding officer a list of those whom he may select to accompany him and will see to it that each man is provided with his complete equipment.

- IV. Quartermaster S. C. Morgan will make up a detail to take the launch to High Head so as to arrive there not later than Saturday noon. Before his departure he will report a list of his party to the commanding officer and will see to it that each man takes with him his personal equipment. On his arrival at camp he will report with his party to the senior officer in charge.
- V. The remainder of the command together with the necessary baggage will be prepared to leave for High Head at 10.40 A. M., July 9, via the boat of the Harpswell Steamboat Company. The men will report at the armory at 8.30 A. M. No excuses for not reporting for this tour of duty will be accepted.
- VI. The uniform for Saturday, July 9 will be blue with leggins and landyards. Each man will pack in his clothes bag the following articles: Two white working suits, two white hats, one watch cap, one overcoat, one extra pair of shoes, extra suits of underclothing, socks, soap, clothes brush, tooth brush, scrub brush, wash basin, towels. No objection will be offered to men carrying rubber boots or gum shoes. Blankets will be rolled and slung over the left shoulder. The equipment will be complete for infantry.
- VII. The officer commanding the First Division will assume charge of the one pounder and see that it is shipped together with its field carriage, boat mount, spare parts and accessories together with sufficient blank ammunition, common shell and sub calibre ammunition.
- VIII. The officer commanding the Second Division will assume charge of the gatling gun and its mounts together with its accessories, spare parts and ammunition and see that it is properly shipped.
- IX. The chief quartermaster and his assistants will see that sufficient action and signal flags are shipped, together with all signal hoists, halliards, a sufficient number of lanterns, one axe, one hatchet, one pick axe, one spade, large sized nails and spikes, one saw, guy lines and stays sufficient to equip four signal stations.

The chief gunners mate will see that rifle ammunition and targets in sufficient quantities are packed and shipped.

X. One mess chest will be turned over to the headquarters and staff, one to the chief petty officers, and one each to the two divisions. Division officers will see to it that a sufficient amount

of spare clothing is carried, together with such spare articles as they may deem wise.

To each officer there will be allowed one trunk.

XI. No liquors of any kind or description will be allowed in or about the camp. Officers will be diligent in their inspection of all baggage to see that this regulation is not violated. Any attempt to evade this regulation will result in summary punishment.

XII. The camp will be known as Camp John F. Hill, in honor of His Excellency John F. Hill, governor of the State. All mail should be addressed to Camp Hill, North Harpswell, Me., until July 18.

Headquarters Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, State of Maine, Portland, Me., August 1, 1904.

SIR:—I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the annual tour of duty of the Ship's Company Naval Reserve at Camp John F. Hill, High Head, North Harpswell, from July 9th to the 17th inclusive.

Following the army and navy maneuvers of 1903, a suggestion was received by me from the navy department relating to the work of the Naval Reserve of this State in case of emergency. It being the idea of the navy department that it would be profitable to us and to the State to have my command familiarize themselves as far as possible with the coast contiguous to Portland Harbor, and in succeeding years to extend the scope of this work along the entire coast until the officers and men of this organization would have a fair idea of the strategetical points from Eastport to Boon Island. Carrying out the idea suggested by the navy department application was made to the

commander-in-chief of this State for permission to perform the annual tour of duty in lower Casco Bay. To assist us the navy department sent to me a navy yard tug the U. S. S. "Sioux," in charge of Gunner Whitehead, United States Navy with a coast pilot attached to the naval service.

High Head, North Harpswell, a point too far inland, as it turned out, to be absolutely satisfactory for our purpose, was selected as a site for this camp, and on the 9th of July my command proceeded to this point and went under canvass for a tour of duty of nine days.

The instruction that we received at this camp, which was named John F. Hill in honor of the commander-in-chief was varied and in many ways unique. Signal stations were established by squads of men from my command at various points on Harpswell Sound and islands adjacent thereto. At each station a signal staff of sixty or seventy-five feet in height was erected. The men used therefore such timber and materials as were at hand. The facility with which these signal staffs were erected under most unfavorable conditions, and the rapidity in which they were prepared for use was of great benefit to the command.

In addition to the "wigwag" system the navy and international flag hoists were used and also the heliograph.

Foggy weather and series of unfortunate accidents prevented any night signal work, but the knowledge acquired of the method of establishing a series of stations to maintain communication with a patrol fleet, and with shore stations and batteries, would in time of emergency be of incalculable benefit. Boat expeditions by night and day throughout this territory familiarized the men and officers with channels, strong points of defense for the erection of temporary batteries, available landing places for large and small bodies of men, water supples, roads, telegraph and telephone lines and other topographical features which might be of service in case of need.

In addition to this work infantry and artillery drills were held daily together with the ceremonies incidental to camp duty. The "Sioux" which was to assist us in this work, by an unfortunate accident was not of any material advantage to us.

On Monday the eleventh the "Sioux" with the commanding officer of the ship's company and two seamen from that organization on board, started for Portland in a thick fog. The coast

pilot who acted as navigator on the "Sioux" lost his bearings when near the entrance of Harpswell Sound, and the vessel struck upon a reef, clearing, however, and floating off in deep water. She was apparently uninjured, so that I directed that she continue to Portland. When outside of Mark Island Monument it was reported that she had made seventeen inches of water in the last ten minutes.

At my suggestion we then put about and ran in shore where she might be beached if we were unable to check the leak. the meantime, assisted by Mr. Whitehead, a gunner of the "Sioux" and my own men we succeeded in getting over the side two large pieces of canvass to serve as a collision mat and temporarily checked the leak. Mr. Whitehead and myself by the use of cement succeeded in stopping the leak so that the "Sioux" was enabled the following day to return to High Head; there my whole command was put at work discharging coal from her starboard bunkers and supplying the vessel with fresh water for her tanks, these having been emptied when we were endeavoring to lighten her. My men also built a bilge cradle on the beach, and by working forty-eight hours on a stretch we were enabled to beach the "Sioux" at high water on the 13th. At low water on the same day the leak was permanently repaired and the "Sioux" floated without injury.

The work that the officers and men of my command were asked to do at this time was of the hardest character. Men and officers were constantly in the water up to their waists, and while discharging coal from the bunkers of the "Sioux" two men were severely burned, but volunteers to take their places were immediately forthcoming, although the work was of the most disagreeable kind.

In my opinion the enthusiastic labor of the men of my command saved the Government many thousands of dollars. The experience gained in this emergency was more practical than often falls to the lot of a volunteer organization.

During the tour of duty the health of the command was excellent and the discipline maintained was of the highest character. Personally I was called upon by many of the residents in this section, and the behaviour of the men when outside of the camp was highly complimented.

In conclusion I would, sir, respectfully recommend that additional divisions of Naval Reserve be organized along the coast

of Maine in order that the suggestions of the navy department relating to the defense and patrol of the Maine coast in time of war may be carried out to the full extent.

General Orders, No. 1.

- I. In accordance with the provisions of the Militia Law and the Regulations for the National Guard, the Inspector-General will proceed forthwith to inspect the several companies and corps of the National Guard, giving at least ten days' notice of such inspection to the commanding officer of each organization, which notice will be promptly acknowledged to the Inspector-General.
- II. So far as practicable, the Inspector-General will so fix the dates of the inspections as to make them correspond with those of the regular drills of the several organizations. He will advise regimental commanders of the inspections in their respective regiments, by sending them notices in each case, which may be duplicates of those sent to the company commanders.
- III. The Surgeon-General will accompany the Inspector-General when the Ambulance Corps is inspected and will make a special report.
- IV. All organizations will parade in blue fatigue uniform, without leggins; armed; and equipped. Each company or corps commander will have collected in the armory, and conveniently arranged for inspection, all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession, and all books and papers pertaining to his organization.
- V. Each company and corps commander, will prepare duplicate returns of his company or corps, for the use of the Inspector-General, and will furnish Inspection Report (Form No. 1), on which will be entered a complete list of all military property for which he is accountable or which is in his possession.
- VI. The attention of company and corps commanders will be called to the care and preservation of all property entrusted to their care and special instruction will be given to the proper method of making and forwarding the necessary returns.

VII. Officers accountable for military property, having unserviceable property, will prepare Inventories (Form No. 4), and will present the same with the property to the Inspector-General for his action. Attention is called to Article XXXVI. of the Regulations for the National Guard, the provisions of which govern all inspections.

VIII. While on the inspecting tour enjoined in this order, the Inspector-General will devote to each organization a reasonable time for instruction, both theoretical and practical, during which he will take up guard duty and the necessary administrative work of the company, and ascertain if theoretical instruction has been given to any part of the command in the duties of outpost and in advance and rear guard formation. He will call attention to the necessity for holding schools of instruction for non-commissioned officers.

IX. The U. S. magazine rifle, cal. 30, now in use, differs in many respects from that which has just been discarded and officers and men must be especially instructed in regard to its care. The Inspector-General will report the condition of each rifle by number, calling attention to all imperfections or lack of care. All unserviceable pieces will be reported. It will also be ascertained whether the required supply of ammunition is constantly kept on hand and if each company is properly prepared for an emergency call for active service.

X. The Quartermaster-Sergeant of each command is hereby detailed to act as assistant to the Inspector-General in the inspection and verification of all military property and will perform such other duty as may be required.

XI. The Honorable Secretary of the Navy will be requested to detail a naval officer to inspect the naval force of Maine.

XII. All officers accountable for military property will see that each article in their possession is plainly marked in such a manner that it can be easily identified in case of loss, and all articles, wherever found, will be counted to the credit of and returned to the company whose mark it bears. Company commanders are hereby authorized to make the necessary expenditure for stamps, stencils, etc., to enable them to comply with the above requirements.

For a lieutenant colonel and major: The leaf will be worn point towards the collar, about one-half inch from shoulder seam.

For a captain and first lieutenant: The bars will be worn at right angles with the loop, about one-half inch from shoulder seam.

Sec. 560. Full dress trousers—third paragraph, add "except for officers of infantry, which shall be white," strike out the last paragraph which reads: "A trouser strap of black leather, one inch wide, will be worn with the full dress trousers."

Sec. 561. Dress trousers—strike out the last paragraph which reads: "A trouser strap of black leather, one inch wide, will be worn with the dress trousers."

Sec. 582. Spurs—Strike out the last paragraph which reads: "The use of white metal box spurs with full dress and dress uniform, dismounted for occasions of ceremony, is required."

Sec. 584. Colors of facings—last line, add "trouser stripes; white."

Sec. 587. Dress Coat—last paragraph, add after "Chevrons of color of arm of service" the words "except for infantry which shall be white."

Sec. 588. Service Coat—last paragraph, add after "Chevrons of color of arm of service" the words "except for infantry which shall be white."

Sec. 589. Overcoats—last paragraph, add after "Chevrons of color of arm of service," the words "except for infantry which shall be white."

Sec. 590. Dress trousers—substitute "white" for "light blue" after "infantry."

Page 28, General Orders No. 10, A. G. O., Series of 1903: Strike out whenever they occur the words "box spurs." The provisions of this order requiring the white trouser stripe for infantry officers will take effect August 1, 1904, at which time all infantry officers will be expected to be provided therewith. They may at their convenience, however, wear the white stripe before that date.

- I. The attention of commissioned officers and enlisted men of the National Guard is hereby called to existing regulations, viz: That when participating in maneuvers or when admitted to permanent works of defense or fortifications, the same obligations of secrecy apply as are imposed on officers and men of the regular army.
- II. Paragraphs 405 and 406, U. S. Army Regulations, 1901, which prohibit the taking of photographic or other views of permanent works of defense and the publications of written or pictorial description of such works and the appliances used in connection with them, are hereby published for the information of all concerned:
- "405. The taking of photographic or other views of permanent works of defense will not be permitted. Neither written nor pictorial descriptions of these works will be made for publication without the authority of the Secretary of War, nor will any information be given concerning them which is not contained in the printed reports and documents of the War Department.
- "406. Commanding generals of departments will see that these regulations are carried into effect, and that the permission to visit the defenses referred to is only given for proper military reasons. They will also see that any dereliction of the duty herein enjoined

is immediately observed and promptly met by appropriate discipline."

III. A strict compliance with the regulations is hereby enjoined upon all members of the National Guard.

The following rules to govern practice for qualification in the several classes of marksmanship in the National Guard of Maine for the season of 1904 having been approved by the Commander-in-Chief, are hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

IN GENERAL.

- I. Article XX. of the Regulations for the National Guard, as amended, is hereby revoked.
- II. Pending receipt of the new edition of the "Firing Regulations for the United States Army," G. O. No. 20, A. G. O., War Department, Washington, D. C., February 26, 1903, as modified herein or by subsequent orders, will govern qualification practice in the National Guard of this State.

ARMORY INSTRUCTION.

III. No officer or enlisted man will be permitted to fire on the range unless he has been properly instructed in the manipulation and use of the arm with which he is to attempt qualification. The rudiments of rifle shooting must be taught in the armory and not on the range. To commence the training of a soldier with service cartridges means needless waste of ammunition and is attended with a certain element of danger. Armory instruction will include aiming and position drills and gallery practice, when possible.

RANGE FIRING.

IV. The season for record firing will begin May 1st and end October 31st each year. No score will be accepted for qualification unless made between these dates.

Recruits will begin firing at 200 yards and will never be permitted to commence firing unless an experienced rifleman is present to instruct them.

No officer or man will be permitted to fire at the longer ranges till he has made two scores of 20 each out of possible 25's at 200 yards, unless specially authorized by the company commander, and then only under the direct supervision of the company inspector of rifle practice.

When an officer or man has made two scores averaging fours or better at 200 yards he will begin work at 300 yards; when he attains similar proficiency at 300 yards he will advance to 500 yards, and so continue till he has completed his fixed distance firings.

Skirmish and timed fire practice will not be attempted till the officer or man has completed the necessary slow fire scores at 200, 300, 500, and 600 yards, and then only under most careful supervision. Company commanders will exercise the utmost care in conducting skirmish and timed fire practice, taking every precaution to guard against accident. Men unaccustomed to this class of practice will be given preliminary work with empty rifle (or with blank ammunition) prior to attempting qualification with service ammunition. The same care will be exercised in firing at 800 and 1000 yards, and no officer or man will fire at these ranges till he has completed the sharpshooter's course.

A group of five consecutive shots, exclusive of sighting shots, constitutes a score with the rifle, and a group of six consecutive shots, a score with the revolver.

Two sighting shots will be taken before beginning record firing at 600, 800, and 1000 yards.

The use of the gun-sling is permitted at all ranges.

SUPERVISION AND RECORDS.

V. Scores certified by an officer or non-commissioned officer witnessing the firing will be accepted for record by company commanders.

Scores will be recorded on the blanks provided and will be signed by the officer or non-commissioned officer supervising the firing, before leaving the range. These cards will be turned over to the company commander who will see that proper entry is made on the target record books. Individual cards will be retained for examination by inspecting officers.

Score cards will not be returned to the inspectors and inspectorgeneral of rifle practice, as in the past, but company commanders will forward to such officers on the first day of each month during the record-firing season, on a blank form prepared for that purpose, a statement showing the number of men firing and expenditure of ammunition at the different ranges. The inspector-general of rifle practice is authorized to require such returns to be made by company commanders oftener than once each month if he deems it advisable.

TARGETS.

VI. The elliptical bull's-eye or Blunt targets are superseded by the new circular bull's-eye targets described as follows:

Target "A." The short-range target, used for 200 and 300 yards, and for dismounted pistol practice, is a rectangle 6 feet high by 4 feet wide; black circular bull's-eye, 8 inches diameter, value of hit, 5; center ring, 26 inches diameter, value of hit, 4; inner ring, 46 inches diameter, value of hit, 3; outer remainder of target, value of hit, 2. A ricochet has the same value as a direct hit.

Target "B." The mid-range target, used for 500 and 600 yards, is a square 6 feet on a side; black circular bull's-eye, 20 inches diameter; center ring, 37 inches diameter; inner ring, 53 inches diameter; outer, remainder of target. Value of hits same as on Target "A."

Target "C." The long-range target, used for 800 and 1000 yards, is a rectangle 6 feet high and 12 feet wide; circular bull's-eye, 36 inches diameter; center ring, 54 inches diameter; inner, space outside of center ring bounded by vertical lines 3 feet from each end of target; outer, remainder of target. Value of hits same as on Target "A."

Target "G." Group skirmish target. Composed of the two figure targets "D" and "E" placed in line, forming a group, the kneeling figure on the military right, the distance between the centers of figures being I yard. Value of hits, direct or ricochet, on lying figure, 5; on kneeling figure, 4. Hits on or within the steel frame, only, count.

Requisition will be made for these targets, but if there is any delay in receipt, they may be easily improvised on the reverse sides of old targets, care being taken to make the several circles of the right diameter.

RANGES.

VII. Inasmuch as the U. S. Magazine Rifle, caliber .30, has a greater penetration and range than the Springfield, caliber .45, great care will be exercised to see that ranges are safe, both to those firing and to those on neighboring lands. No marker's shelter should be less than six feet in thickness at the top, if composed of sand and loam. To avoid the danger of ricochets, all rocks should be removed immediately behind the targets, or covered with dirt or planking sufficient to hold the bullet. Old railroad ties make excellent cover for a rocky backing and are usually easy to obtain.

Company commanders will thoroughly inspect ranges before permitting the season's firing to begin, making certain that the range is safe and in durable condition.

RIFLE QUALIFICATIONS. (See Tables.)

VIII. The class in firing to which any officer or soldier belongs will be determined at the end of the practice season from the aggregate of the total of the best two full scores of five shots each (not necessarily consecutive) that he has made on the range, as follows:

Fourth Class. All who have not fired.

Third Class. All who report for practice and are unable to score 10 out of a possible 25 at 200 yards in any score, or who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made an aggregate of less than 67.

Second Class. All who have fired two or more scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 67 out of a possible 150.

First Class. All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 83 out of a possible 150.

Marksmen. All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, and 500 yards, and from the best two have made a total of 98 out of a possible 150.

Sharpshooters. All who have fired two or more full scores at 200, 300, 500, and 600 yards, and from the best two in each range have made a total of 160; and have fired two or more full scores, timed fire, at 200 yards (30 seconds firing interval in each score), and in the best two have made a total of 25; and have made one skirmish run of 20 shots, advancing from 600 to 200 yards; the total of all scores being not less than 235.

Experts. All who have made the necessary total to qualify as sharpshooter and have fired two or more full scores at 800 and 1000 yards and from the best two have made a total of 40 at 800, and 35 at 1000 yards.

REVOLVER QUALIFICATION.

IX. Revolver qualifications are established as follows:

Revolver Marksman. Two scores of 24 each at 30 yards; two scores of 23 each at 50 yards.

Expert Revolver Marksman. Two scores of 24 each at 30 yards; two scores of 23 each at 50 yards; two scores of 22 each at 75 yards.

Distinguished Revolver Marksman. Two scores of 29 each at 30 yards; two scores of 28 each at 50 yards; two scores of 27 each at 75 yards.

Insignia.

X. Requisition will be made at the conclusion of the season for insignia for those qualifying as Marksmen, Sharpshooters, or Experts with the rifle, or as Revolver Marksmen, Expert Revolver Marksmen, or Distinguished Revolver Marksmen, with the revolver.

AMMUNITION.

XI. The annual allowance of ammunition for target practice will be as follows: To each company of Infantry, five thousand rounds of original rifle ammunition; to each division of Naval Reserve, three thousand rounds of original rifle ammunition; to the Signal Corps, four thousand rounds of original revolver ammunition; to each officer not attached to any company, corps or division, one hundred rounds of original rifle ammunition; to each officer, two hundred rounds of original revolver ammunition; to each of the non-commissioned staff, one hundred rounds of rifle ammunition on requisition. Each company commander will see that every member of his command has an opportunity to expend his share of the ammunition allowed.

Requisition will also be made at once for the following military stores:—Meat cans, tin cups, knives, forks, spoons, shelter tent halves, shelter tent poles, shelter tent pins, ponchos, haversacks, canteens, canteen-haversack straps, and woolen blankets; sufficient to equip fifty men to each company of infantry and twenty-one to each corps.
- III. Company and corps commanders and regimental adjutants will at once forward to the Quartermaster General, securely packed and plainly marked with letter of company and number of regiment, all blouse and overcoat chevrons now in their possession, not khaki, making duplicate invoices for the same; and will make requisition for the new pattern chevrons; sufficient to equip their respective commands. Expense accounts at the rate of 33 1-3 cents per pair will be allowed for putting on the new chevrons.

- II. The several organizations will be concentrated at Portland, September 3d, from which point they will be transported to Manassas, Virginia.
- III. The Ambulance Corps, under command of Second Lieutenant Charles A. Jumper, will be divided as follows: Lieutenant Jumper with ten men will be attached to the Second Infantry, and Sergeant Libby with ten men will be attached to the First Infantry, as Hospital detachments. The above detachments will report to the respective regimental commanders immediately upon arrival at Portland.
- IV. Officers and men will report in blue uniform, heavy marching order, campaign hat, leggings, canteen and haversack will be worn. Overcoat, blanket, poncho, shelter half, and service uniform (khaki) will be carried in roll. Extra underclothing, socks, towels, and toilet articles, with mess kit, will be carried in haversack. Tin cups will be attached to rear strap of canteen, opening of cup next to the body. Fatigue cap will be attached to rear strap of haversack.
- V. Under par. 1807, Army Regulations 1901, no china, glassware, bunks, mattresses, pillows, benches, chairs, tables or other articles of furniture, no box lockers or trunks, mattress covers, pillow cases, bedsheets or barrack bags will be taken into the field for the use of enlisted men.

Under par. 316, Army Regulations 1901, the mess outfit of a soldier will be limited to 1 meat can, 1 tin cup, 1 knife, 1 fork and 1 spoon.

Under par. 1242, Army Regulations, as amended by General Orders No. 10, War Department, September 4th, 1903, the field allowance of baggage will not exceed the following: Brigadier General, 700 pounds; Field Officer, 500 pounds; Captain, 200 pounds; First Lieutenant, 150 pounds; Second Lieutenant, 100 pounds. In addition to the above, each Company will be allowed one field desk, and one chest for subsistence stores.

Regimental, Company and Corps Commanders will see that baggage is restricted to above allowance.

VI. Regimental Commanders will at once prepare and forward to this office for approval, General Orders covering all details, detachments, and also rules and regulations for the general discipline and government of their respective commands during the tour of duty.

VII. Regimental Commanders will cause the following details to be made: one commissioned officer to act as Ordnance Officer, whose duty it shall be to receive, issue, and take full charge of all ammunition, and such other ordnance stores as may be issued by the War Department for use of the troops; one commissioned officer to take charge of entraining, and detraining troops. This officer should be designated as an assistant to the Quartermaster, and should report to him for instructions, in order that the details

of this work may all harmonize. A detail of two men from each company will be made, to assist in loading and unloading baggage. They will report to the officer in charge of entraining and detraining, at Portland, and will remain with the baggage until unloaded. The same detail will be available for like duty on the return journey. Company Quartermaster Sergeants will personally superintend the loading and unloading of the baggage of their respective companies. The officer in charge of entraining and detraining will have general supervision of the work of the details engaged in loading and unloading the equipage and supplies.

All wagon transportation for use at camp and for maneuvers will be furnished on the grounds by the Quartermaster Department, U. S. A.

VIII. Horses will be assigned to mounted officers upon arrival at Manassas by the regimental quartermasters under the direction of the colonels commanding. Mounted officers will furnish their own horse equipment, which should be securely packed, marked with officer's name, rank, and number of regiment, and forwarded with baggage.

IX. Transportation will be furnished by the Quartermaster's Department, U. S. A., and details relative to hours of departure and return to home stations will be announced in general orders, later.

Officers and men will be allowed by the United States, the same pay, transportation and subsistence as is allowed to officers and men of the same grade, in the regular army; they will also be paid by the State, an amount equal to the difference between the amount allowed by the United States and that provided by Sections 97 and 99 of the Militia Laws of Maine.

Muster and pay rolls, in triplicate, will be prepared before leaving home stations, by entering thereon the names in full, of each officer and enlisted man of the organization, with the rank of officers and date of muster-in of enlisted men, any stoppage under Section 73, Militia Law, to be deducted from the pay of any officer or enlisted man, will be noted against his name in the column for remarks, the columns for pay accounts must be left blank to be filled in by the Paymaster-General. Substitutes will not be permitted or paid. No man will be paid whose enlistment papers are not on file in the office of the Adjutant-General, and no non-commissioned officer shall be paid as such, unless notice of his appointment has been received at this office. United States pay rolls will be distributed upon arrival at Manassas.

X. No new enlistments will be allowed in any organization of the National Guard except the Naval Reserve, between August 15th and September 15th.

No more than one medical examination will be ordered for each organization between August 15th and September 15th, but men

who re-enlist subsequent to said examination, may be examined and mustered on the first day of the encampment.

XI. Hospital detachments will mess with N. C. Staff and Band of the regiment to which assigned, and the commanding officer of the Ambulance Corps is hereby authorized to enlist and muster in, one extra man as cook. Regimental Bands will also enlist, and muster one cook in addition to the number of men now allowed by Sec. 41, Militia Law.

XII. The following section of the Militia Law of the State is published for the information of all concerned:

"Section 108. No officer or enlisted man shall contract or presume to authorize the contracting of any indebtedness on behalf of the State, without the express authority therefor from the Commander-in-Chief, and any officer or enlisted man who shall violate the provisions of this section shall be dishonorably discharged from the service of the State."

- II. Transportation, subsistence in camp and quarters, will be furnished to a team of five men and one substitute from each Headquarters, each Company of Infantry and from the Ship's Company, Naval Reserve, but no per diem will be allowed.
- III. Dress uniform will be worn en route, though the service uniform may be taken and worn at the range.
- IV. Teams which cannot leave their stations on the morning of the 4th so as to reach Brunswick by 8 A. M., will report to the executive officer at the range on the afternoon of the 3d and will be assigned to quarters. Such teams will bring their blankets.
- V. The camp will be under the command of Colonel Lucius H. Kendall, First Infantry. Colonel Elliott C. Dill, Inspector-General of Rifle Practice, will be the executive officer of the competition.

Ammunition-Service, as issued.

Prizes—First prize, Service Revolver. Second prize, Revolver Cartridge Belt and Holster. Third prize, 200 rounds of service ammunition, Cal. .38.

Special Conditions—Having once commenced a score, a competitor will complete the same at the three ranges before another competitor begins shooting. The time allowance is the same as for the rifle. No competitor will change revolvers after he has begun his score unless in the opinion of the range officer in charge, the revolver is disabled.

X. The Firing Regulations for Small Arms for the United States Army and Organized Militia of the United States will govern.

General Orders, No. 16.

- I. It is especially desired that the conduct of the troops while en route from their home stations to Manassas, Va., as well as when in camp and during the return to their home stations, should be such as to merit the approval of all good citizens. It is believed that officers and men will take a personal pride in so conducting themselves as to reflect credit upon themselves and the State they represent.
- II. The general commanding desires to impress upon the troops who are to participate in Manassas maneuvers that not the least important feature will be the proper entraining and detraining of troops and the good conduct of the troops going to, and returning from the camps.
- III. On the good conduct of the troops collectively and individually will depend largely the future of such undertakings as these maneuvers. Officers and enlisted men are reminded that they are among people, who, in a very large sense, make them their guests, and all should by good conduct, gentlemanly and soldierly bearing, demonstrate their hospitality not misplaced.
- IV. The following rules concerning private property are hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned, and a strict compliance with the provisions contained therein, is enjoined upon officers and enlisted men.
- "There must be no firing in the immediate vicinity of houses, barns, haystacks, ricks of fodder, etc. No camps or bivouacs will be established in orchards, parks or fields under cultivation.

Neither troops engaged in tactical exercises nor individual members of the command will be permitted to enter houses or other buildings, yards, gardens, lawns, tobacco fields, vineyards, nurseries, fields with specially valuable crops, orchards, or cemeteries. Marching troops not engaged in tactical exercises will confine themselves to the public roads.

Troops will be provided with wire nippers to be used when necessary, a man or two will be left to mark the place and prevent straying of cattle until a detachment with suitable tools, repairs the damage, which should be done as soon as practicable after a column has passed. Infantry not in column should be able to pass through or over board or rail fences, and in many cases through wire fences without disturbing them.

The greatest care must be taken by officers and men to avoid unnecessary damage to private property. Officers and non-commissioned officers will be held responsible for wanton damage committed in their presence. Offenders will be immediately placed under guard and will be brought to trial by court martial without delay. In all cases of depredations or wanton damage of a minor character, a board of officers will be appointed by the commanding officer to assess the damage, and upon satisfactory evidence the amount will be advanced out of the funds of the organization to which the offenders belong, and will be paid to the claimants with the least practicable delay. Subsequent action against the offenders, and stoppages of pay will serve to replace the funds paid out."

- V. The following extract from general orders No. 7, Headquarters Atlantic Division, Governors Island, New York City, July 29, 1904, is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.
- 2. The troops participating will constitute a provisional corps commanded by the undersigned, and will be organized into two divisions, with corps headquarters at Gainesville, Va. The 1st Division will occupy Maneuver camp No. 1, near Manassas, Va., and will be under the command of Brigadier General Frederick D. Grant, U. S. Army. The 2d Division will occupy Maneuver camp No. 2, near Thoroughfare, Va., and will be under the command of Brigadier General J. Franklin Bell, U. S. Army. The corps headquarters will occupy Maneuver camp No. 3, near Gainesville, Va. The designations of the camps are also their postoffice addresses. They are all in Prince William County, Va.

Ambulance, medical and signal corps of the militia will accompany the troops of their respective states, and on arrival at maneuver camps will, if not attached to regiments, report to the division chief staff officer of their respective departments.

Commanding officers of brigades of militia, not assigned to command of provisional maneuver brigades, will report on arrival as follows:

VI. No ammunition of any kind will be taken to camp by either officers or enlisted men. All ammunition used during the maneuvers will be obtained at the camps upon requisition.

Regimental, Corps and Company commanders, will see that there is no unauthorized firing of blank cartridges by the men of their commands, in the camps or vicinity of the same. At the close of the maneuvers all blank cartridges in the possession of officers and enlisted men will be turned in without delay, to the ordnance officer, and any man violating these instructions relative to unauthorized firing will be at once placed under arrest.

VII. So much of General Orders No. 13, c. s., as related to the Ambulance Corps is hereby revoked.

VIII. In accordance with recent instructions, the Ambulance Corps, under command of Second Lieutenant Charles A. Jumper, having been attached to the Second Maneuver Division, Camp No. 2, near Thoroughfare, Va., will accompany the 2d Infantry to that place. Lieutenant Jumper will report to the Adjutant, 2d Infantry, with his command, immediately upon arrival at Portland.

IX. Owing to the absence of the Regimental Commissaries who are ordered to their camps in advance of the troops, Regimental commanders will detail an officer to act as Commissary who will, together with the Regimental Commissary Sergeants, proceed to Portland in season to arrive not later than the morning of Friday, September 2d, to receive and arrange for the issue of travel rations provided for use of troops during the journey, they will also superintend all issues of rations during the trip, reporting upon arrival at their respective camps to the Regimental Commissaries, when they will be relieved from further duty.

X. Brigadier General Frank L. Hoyt, Inspector General, will leave his home station on Wednesday, August 31, and proceed to Washington,

D. C., where he will make a thorough inspection of horses provided for the use of Maine troops, and will issue such instructions as may be necessary to insure their delivery to the officers designated to receive them.

XI. Captain Frank B. Harris, Biddeford, Quartermaster First Infantry, Captain Fred W. Drake, Madison, Quartermaster Second Infantry, First Lieutenant George M. Kavanaugh, Lewiston, Commissary First Infantry, First Lieutenant Atwood W. Spaulding, Caribou, Commissary Second Infantry, will leave their home stations on Wednesday, August 31, and proceed to their respective camps, (those of the First Infantry to Maneuver camp No. 1, near Manassas, and those of the Second Infantry to Maneuver camp No. 2, near Thoroughfare, Va.), in advance of the troops.

They will receive, receipt, and care for all tentage, camp equipage, and all other military property shipped to them.

XII. Transportation certificates will be provided for all officers detailed above.

XIII. The following train service for transportation of the several commands from their home stations to Portland, is hereby published and will be strictly complied with.

A special train will leave Bangor at 1.45 P. M., Friday, September 2d, taking companies G, I and L, 2d Infantry. Co. I will take regular train leaving Eastport at 7.20 A. M.; Co. L will take regular train leaving Houlton at 8.30 A. M., both companies connecting with special at Bangor.

Company F, 2d Infantry, will take regular train leaving Dover at 1.05 P. M., connecting with special at Newport. Co. E, 2d Infantry, will take regular train leaving Skowhegan at 12.50 P. M., connecting with special at Waterville. Co. H, 2d Infantry, will take special at Waterville about 3.30 P. M. Co. M, 2d Infantry, will take special at Augusta about 4.00 P. M. Co. A, 2d Infantry, will take special at Gardiner about 4.15 P. M. Co. K, 1st Infantry, will take special at Brunswick about 5.00 P. M. Companies C and I, 1st Infantry, Companies B, D, and Band, 2d Infantry, and the Ambulance Corps will take regular train leaving Lewiston, upper station, at 4.20 P. M. Company K, 2d Infantry, will take regular train leaving Rockland at 1.40 P. M. Co. H, 1st Infantry, will take regular train leaving Bath at 4.00 P. M. Company D, 1st Infantry, will take regular train leaving Bath at 4.00 P. M. Company D, 1st Infantry, will take regular train on Grand Trunk Railway leaving Norway at 3.50 P. M.

The several companies of the 2d Infantry, and the Ambulance Corps, will be quartered at Portland in the Auditorium, and companies C, D, H, I and K, of the 1st Infantry will be quartered in City Hall.

XIV. Special trains for the transportation of troops from Portland to their respective maneuver camps at Manassas and Thoroughfare, Va., will leave Boston and Maine Railroad, Preble Street Station, at 7.45 A. M., Saturday, September 3d. Company M, 1st Infantry, will take special at Westbrook about 8.00 A. M., and Company F, 1st Infantry, at Springvale, about 8.45 A. M. Company G, 1st Infantry will take

regular train leaving Biddeford at 6.55 A. M. and car will be taken round to the Preble Street Station at Portland, by the B. & M. R. R.

Companies A, B, E, L and Band, 1st Infantry will assemble at their respective armories on Saturday, September 3d and proceed to the Preble Street Station in season to take special train leaving at 7.45 A. M.

XV. If the command is carried in different trains or sections. Regimental commanders will detail an assistant quartermaster for each train or section as provided in Section VII, General Orders, No. 13, A. G. O., c. s.

XVI. At home stations, company commanders are authorized to hire such wagon transportation as is absolutely necessary to move the company baggage from the armory to the railroad station.

Such service should be covered at once and on the spot by a regular bill for the service and such bill should be certified on its face as correct, approved by the commanding officer of the regiment and forwarded to this office for settlement.

XVII. Commanding officers of each train, will telegraph at least ten hours before the arrival of their trains at Manassas, to the Chief Quartermaster of their Division, at Manassas, or Thoroughfare, Va., the hour and day they will reach camp, the number of passenger coaches, sleepers, baggage cars, and the strength of their command. This, in order that wagon transportation may meet their trains and promptly detrain their commands.

Officers will be present at the railroad stations to show the arriving troops to their camps.

XVIII. No baggage, or impedimenta of any kind will be taken on the passenger coaches with the men, and officers will take nothing but small pieces with them on the coach or sleeper such as they can hold or carry in their hands when they detrain at destination.

The men will have nothing with them in the passenger coach except their personal equipment and arms.

When the men step from the train they will leave nothing behind them in the passenger coaches, but will have all their belongings on their persons and be ready to bivouac if necessary alongside the train.

XIX. On approaching their destination, the commanding officers will make a careful personal inspection of each passenger coach, and of the personnel of their commands, to see that every man has his equipment on and in place, so that when the train stops, the men can step off immediately, fall in, and march to their designated camp sites or bivouac as may be necessary.

XX. The 64th Article of War is hereby published for the information and guidance of all concerned.

"All officers and soldiers of any troops, whether militia or others, mustered and in pay of the United States, shall, at all times and in all places, be governed by the articles of war, and shall be subject to be tried by courtsmartial."

- I. The Commander-in-Chief is pained to announce that Sergeant George S. Whiting of Company G, Second Infantry, N. G. S. M., was accidently killed while engaged in rifle practice on the range at Bangor, Maine, August 26, 1904. Sergeant Whiting was a man of exemplary habits, a splendid soldier, and a most worthy citizen. He leaves behind him to mourn his loss, a wife, an aged mother and a totally blind father. To these loved ones the Commander-in-Chief desires to convey an expression of his warmest sympathy.
- II. Colonel Elliott C. The following instructions for making returns of military property are published for the information of all concerned and should be carefully read before making up the semi-annual return.

By order of the Commander-in-Chief.

- 1. Requisitions for ordinance stores, clothing and camp equipage are made upon form 46, addressed to the Q. M. General, Augusta, Maine, and signed by the Adjutant of the Regiment, Company or Corps Commanders. These requisitions should be made long enough in advance of the actual needs so as to allow for the unavoidable delays in transportation.
- 2. The annual return of all military property required by law should be forwarded to the Q. M. General within 30 days after May 31 and November 30.
- 3. In making out the first return due, the line "On hand from last return" is of course left blank; but on this line is stated, under proper heads, in all subsequent returns, the "Balance on hand to be accounted for" at the date of the last return, as indicated by its bottom line.
- 4. The invoices of stores for which receipts have been given are next entered. They are endorsed and numbered in order of the dates of reception, which are noted on the backs of the invoices when the stores are received. The dates and numbers are noted in the proper columns of the return, and after the words "Received from" the names and rank of the officers making the invoices are written, and the stores, enumerated under the proper heads, are entered.
- 5. The sum of all the stores thus entered on the quarterly return gives the "Total to be accounted for," and it is entered plainly in figures on the proper lines.
- 6. Ammunition and material for manufacture or repairs are the only ordnance stores which are "expended." When ammunition or material for repairs or manufacture has been expended, an abstract of such expenditures, according to Form 45, is prepared; the total of such expenditures, as shown by this abstract, is entered after the words "Expended as per abstract;" the date is that of the last day of May and November, and the number the next to that of the last voucher entered.
- 7. Where stores are lost or destroyed, and can not be presented for the action of a board of survey, they are accounted for by the affidavit of one or more persons cognizant of the facts, and by the certificate of the officer responsible for the property, setting forth clearly the facts in the case, and such testimony of other officers as may be attainable. The certified statement of the officer responsible for them sets forth the date when, the place where, and all the circumstances under which the loss took place. In cases where the circumstances did not come under the cognizance of the officer, the affidavit of a non-commissioned officer, or, if not procurable, that of one or more privates, covering the facts of the case, is obtained in duplicate, and filed as a voucher.
- 8. Every entry made on the return is duly authenticated by proper vouchers, which are the legal proofs of the transaction as stated in the return.
- 9. Supplies of blanks as are needed from time to time can always be obtained by applying to the Q. M. General.
- 10. In presenting a claim for the action of a board of survey, in case of property lost or destroyed, the officer responsible should proceed

exactly as indicated in paragraph 7, making a sworn statement setting forth clearly the facts in the case.

11. All affidavits should be subscribed and sworn to before some officer authorized to administer oaths.

The secretary of war having approved the recommendation of the chief of ordnance of the army, to the effect that the organized militia of the various states and territories be permitted to turn in the empty shells of small arms ammunition, receiving therefor ball cartridges in the proportion provided for troops of the regular army, attention is called to the following schedule:

"Each company or troop will be given in addition to the allowance in the table 110 rounds of caliber .30 rifle or carbine ball cartridges or 170 rounds of caliber .30 blank cartridges for each 1,000 empty ball or blank shells, caliber 30, and 115 rounds of caliber .38 revolver ball cartridges or 130 rounds of caliber .38 blank cartridges for each 1,000 empty ball or blank shells, caliber .38, turned in."

All empty shells will be turned in to the quartermaster-general at the close of the practice season, each box being plainly marked with name of the company forwarding the same.

The following instructions in regard to the treatment of shells will be observed:

"As soon as practicable after firing, decap the shells and throw them into water. The cleaning will be much facilitated if the shells can be thrown into water immediately after firing. Then clean the inside thoroughly with a brush wiper or piece of rag on the end of a wiping stick; dry and place loosely in ammunition boxes."

The Commanding General, Atlantic Division, desires to invite the attention of commanding officers of all troops expecting to take part in the maneuvers near Manassas, Va., September 4th to 10th, to the great importance of a thorough knowledge of the duties of advance and rear guards, out-posts, reconnaissance work, and to the formations for attack and defense.

These formations, and discussions thereon, may be found in the authorized Security and Information, Wagner, and in the Infantry Drill Regulations, U. S. Army.

It is of the greatest importance that all officers and non-commissioned officers should be instructed in the ground-work, formations and principles in order that they may, when the occasion arises, know how to take or vary from the normal order of things.

It is well to bear in mind that out-posts, advance and rear guards, for the formations, etc., can not be made the subject of hard and fast drill rules; that in almost every instance the regular normal formations will in part have to be changed and varied to accomplish the results. No one is so well qualified to make proper modifications as the officer or non-commissioned officer who is a thorough master of the normal order of formations, and the rules governing each.

Circular, No. 2.

The following notes on the Management, Dismounting, Assembling and Cleaning of the U. S. Magazine Rifle, Cal. .30, which have been prepared

by Lieut. John J. Dooley, Inspector of Rifle Practice, 1st Inf., are recommended for careful perusal by every rifleman in the National Guard of this State:

- I. To open bolt, raise the handle until it stops, then pull straight to the rear until the locking lug strikes the locking shoulder of the receiver. Raising the handle cocks the piece. To close the bolt, push the handle forward until it strikes the cocking shoulder, then turn it down until it comes in contact with its seat in the receiver. The piece may be cocked by either throwing the handle up and down, or by pulling the cocking piece directly to the rear. The opening or closing the bolt should be one continued motion.
- 2. To charge magazine, open the gate, insert the cartridges, then close the gate. The magazine can be charged with the bolt closed or open, with the cut-off turned for magazine or single loaded fire, or if one or more cartridges have been fired.
- 3. When the thumb piece of the cut-off is turned down, the magazine is off and the piece can be used as a single loader. When the thumb piece is up the magazine is on and the piece ready for magazine fire.
- 4. In firing the piece care must be taken that the handle of the bolt is not raised by the hand, as it will cause a mis-fire.
- 5. Protect the front sight as much as possible. The piece must not be dropped under any circumstances, as any slight jar will damage the barrel.
- 6. The rear sight is only to be removed or replaced by a well instructed man, and by direction of the commanding officer.
- 7. The extractor pin holds the bolt open for convenience in loading as a single loader.
- 8. The safety lock, turned to the right, locks the bolt. Turned to the right, when the piece is cocked, it locks the firing pin to the rear so it can not be released by pressure on the trigger. If the piece is not cocked, the firing pin is locked in the home position.
- 9. To open the butt plate cap, insert the rim of an ampty cartridge case in the notch in the cap and draw it open. The joints of the cleaning rod should be removed before the oiler is taken out. In replacing the oiler and rods, insert the former so its bottom will be next the butt plate, and with one joint of the rod push the oiler into its seat, then insert the rods in their respective holes.

PRECAUTIONS.

10. If it be desired to carry the piece cocked, with a cartridge in the chamber, the bolt mechanism should be secured by turning the safety lock to the right.

To obtain positive ejections and to insure the bolt catching the top cartridge in the magazine, when using magazine fire, the bolt must be fully drawn to the rear in opening it.

If a cartridge is pushed from the magazine partly into the chamber, and then the bolt fully drawn to the rear, that cartridge will remain in the well and chamber, and a second will rise from the magazine in front

of the bolt. If the bolt be again pushed forward the second cartridge will strike the first and produce a jam. To avoid this, always close the bolt on a cartridge in front of it to insure the action of the extractor and ejector on that cartridge when the bolt is opened. If a jam occurs, draw the bolt fully to the rear, and with the right hand remove the first cartridge and close the bolt; if the first cartridge has been pushed into the chamber, draw the bolt to the rear, and with the thumb of the right hand push the second cartridge back into the magazine and cut it off. Then close the bolt on the first cartridge. Unless the bolt handle is fully turned down in contact with its seat in the receiver, when the trigger is pulled the nose of the cocking piece will strike against the cocking cam of the bolt, and the energy of the main spring will be expended in closing the bolt instead of igniting the primer, thus causing a mis-fire. Care should be taken not to raise the bolt handle with the forefinger if the trigger be pulled with the middle one.

It is essential for the proper working and preservation of all cams that they be kept lubricated.

11. The bolt and magazine mechanism can be dismounted without removing the stork. The latter should never be done except for making repairs, and then only by some selected and instructed man.

CARE OF PARTS.

- 12. Do not rub the blued parts with any scouring material.
- 13. To remove exterior rust take a small plain stick of fairly hard wood, moisten the end with oil and rub it back and forth. Do not lattempt to use emery cloth or emery paper.
- 14. In putting oil on any bearing surface use the pin of the oiler in the butt, a match or small brush, applying small quantity.

Before using piece remove all oil, except on bearing surfaces, to prevent collection of dust.

15. Keep the locking lug recess just in front of the chamber free from dust and particles of powder.

CLEANING.

- 16. No. 1 oil is recommended for use after firing to remove the residue left by smokeless powder.
- 17. To clean rifle after firing 1 emove the bolt, dip brush or rag in the No. 1 oil and pass it back and forth through the barrel from the breach, allowing the brush or rag to follow the rifling, and being careful to allow the brush or rag to pass out of the muzzle end of the barrel before withdrawing it. Then take a small circular flannel rag, about 1½ inches in diameter and putting it over the knob end of the cleaning rod pass it through the barrel. It may be necessary to use several rags. After this if the piece is to be put away pass an oiled rag through the bore, using No. 2 oil. A wad cutter 1½ inches in diameter can be used to cut cleaning rags. Always clean from the breach.
- 18. To remove No. 1 or No. 2 oil from the bore use a rag moistened, not wet, with gasoline, or a dry, clean rag.

- 19. Do not insert a metal rod of any kind in the barrel from the muzzle.
 - 20. In using a string cleaner the brush should be of .32 calibre.

POINTERS.

A dirty rifle will not do good shooting. Learn the working parts and keep them clean.

Protect your sights.

Don't lay aside your rifle without cleaning.

Don't leave your rear sight up after shooting.

Always bring your front sight half way up into the notch or peep.

Always hold just under the bull at six o'clock.

Take the same sight every time.

Hold your breath when you fire.

Squeeze the trigger.

Don't take a fine sight one time and a coarse sight at another.

Don't cant your rifle.

Don't breathe when about to fire.

Don't pull the trigger.

Learn your sight.

Study the different positions carefully. Try them all and select the most comfortable.

In the prone position, always lie at an angle with your rifle; it saves the shoulder.

Use the gun sling.

In scoring remember that a shot on the line is credited to the higher value.

Remember that eyes and rifles are not all the same for producing results, therefore study the setting of your sights and find the normal of yourself and the rifle.

Zero your rifle.

Raise your sights in cold weather; when the wind is blowing in your face from the targets; when the light gets less; when your front sight has a bright light on it; when there is much vapor or mirage.

Lower your rear sight when it is hot and clear; when the wind blows from you towards the target; when your target is bright and your sights dark; when the vapor or mirage is clearing.

Study the flags.

Become skilled in estimating distances.

Be courteous to others in answering questions.

Keep your body in good health. A clear eye, calm nerves and rested muscles are indispensable to good shooting.
