#### MAINE STATE PRISON.

THOMASTON, Me., December 1, 1905.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

We have the honor to transmit herewith our annual report for the year ending November 30, 1905.

At the commencement of the Prison year, December 1, 1904, there were confined in the Prison one hundred and sixty-eight (168); sixty-two (62) have since been received; forty-nine (49) have been discharged by expiration of sentence; one (1) has been pardoned; two (2) have died. The largest number of prisoners at any one time was one hundred and eighty-seven (187); the smallest number, one hundred and sixty-seven (167); the daily average for the year, one hundred and seventyseven (177).

It is with a great deal of satisfaction that we are able to report the affairs in this institution in such a prosperous condition.

At the commencement of the Prison year the present efficient Warden, Bernes O. Norton, assumed the responsibility of his office, and the success that has attended the management of the Prison is due to his rare good judgment and prompt business methods, not only in handling the prisoners but also in conducting the financial affairs of the institution. We can safely state that every department has shown a substantial gain in the past year in the aggregate amount of the product, the prices received for the same, and the cost in maintaining the prisoners, and this, too, has not been accomplished at the expense of the physical condition of the prisoners, for at each of our monthly inspections we have found the prisoners in good condition, and

the best of discipline has been maintained at all times. For the physical and spiritual condition of the inmates we refer to the reports of the Prison Physician and Chaplain.

At the opening of the year we found the physical conditions of the Prison, the shops, the houses, the stable and the Prison wall in a state of poor repair. On the occasion of the visit of the Legislative Committee in January their attention was called to these conditions, and after going over the matter with them with great care, they recommended the appropriation of four thousand five hundred dollars (\$4,500) by the Legislature, and the money was promptly voted. Warden Norton expended the same under our supervision with rare good judgment, and to-day the buildings, as well as the wall, present a greatly improved appearance, and the value is very materially enhanced.

The twenty-five horse power engine purchased last year and the wiring done have proved all that was anticipated to the institution, and is of very material benefit. A night-watch has been added to the force and an electric watchman's clock, thus greatly decreasing the danger of fire and the escape of prisoners.

#### SUMMARY OF STOCK ACCOUNT, 1905.

#### WARDEN'S REPORT.

#### To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN:—In submitting to you this report at the close of my first year as Warden of the Maine State Prison, it becomes necessary, both in justice to my predecessor and to myself, to explain briefly the methods employed in the taking of stock at the end of the fiscal year, November 30, 1905.

Readers of the Prison report issued previous to this one will note that the net assets December I, 1904, were given at \$82,904.69, while as a basis for the results obtained during the past year, we have taken the net assets December I, 1904, .at \$50,814.75. In former years it has been the custom to take as assets all things pertaining to or connected with the Prison. Thus the bedding and furnishings of the cells, the furniture of the Warden's house, offices, guard-room, guard posts, etc., etc., the clothing in use, the tools in use in the shops and about the premises, these and many other things belonging, as I believe, to the expense account, were taken in the inventory of 1904 as assets.

With the approval and aid of the Prison Inspectors and a Committee from the Governor's Council, as soon after December 1, 1904, as was possible a revision of this inventory was made, in which all things not strictly of a material and full value were left out. Following out this idea in the taking of stock at the end of the fiscal year just past, nothing has been taken as an asset of the institution except stock of various kinds, manufactured, un-manufactured, or in the process of manufacture, and tools and fixtures taken along the line of the revised inventory of 1904. In addition to the very large decrease in assets which this method of stock taking brought about, numerous bills contracted prior to December 1, 1904, and a considerable amount of uncollectable accounts passed over as assets, both items amounting to several thousand dollars, have been deducted from the original assets of 1904.

Another thing, gentlemen, to which I would respectfully call your attention is the fact that in figuring the profit and loss of the institution for the past year, the result shows the loss to the State inclusive of all funds received from the State. Had the profit and loss been merely the difference in department gains and losses as in the report of 1904, the result would have shown the Prison to have been considerably more than selfsupporting for the past year.

In closing, allow me to earnestly solicit your careful attention to the Insane Department of the Prison. It is my firm belief that the insane inmates here should be transferred to one of the Insane Hospitals.

I also take this opportunity to extend my sincere thanks to the overseers of the institution for their ready co-operation in making their departments profitable, and to all officers for their cheerful willingness to enforce the discipline of the Prison.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN :—I present herewith my annual medical report of the Maine State Prison for the year ending November 30, 1905.

The general health of the convicts during the year has been good. No epidemics have occurred, and there has been but few accidents. The good and well cooked food, the warm clothing, and the equitable temperature of the buildings have all helped to bring about this good result.

There is one matter which I feel should be brought before your notice, and that is the ventilation of the corridors. To me the system is poor, inadequate, and far behind the times. Now that there is an electric plant operated at the institution and motive power could be furnished by it, I would advise that a new system of ventilation be established, that electric fans be used, so that the air could be changing constantly. As now ventilated, by opening or closing windows, the men are constantly subjected to sudden changes which produce more or less continual trouble.

During the year there has been two deaths in the Prison proper. Lemuel Estes died June 19 of general tuberculosis. Jeremiah Dionne died October 19 of inflammation of the bowels.

In the Insane Department one death has occurred. George F. Treves died September 11 of tuberculosis.

Permit me to thank the Warden, Deputy Warden, and all the subordinate officers for the many courtesies extended me during my official duties.

# CHAPLAIN'S REPORT.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN :--- I herewith submit my annual report of the work committed to me as Chaplain of the Maine State Prison.

Within the year ending November 30, 1905, sixty-two persons have been sentenced to the Prison for terms ranging from one year to twenty years. Nine of them could neither read nor write; two could read a little but could not write; twenty-eight had attended the common schools a few terms or years; three had been instructed in private institutions; ten are graduates from grammar schools, academies or commercial colleges. Thirty-four of them were occasional, moderate or inveterate drinkers of all kinds of intoxicating drinks. The other twentyeight professed to be total abstainers.

*Periodicals.*—No change has been made in the regulations respecting the admission of the weekly papers, which are carefully read by all who can read. Some who came, within the year, not knowing the alphabet, are subscribers now to some paper and understandingly read it. A copy of the Outlook, or Zion's Herald, or Zion's Advocate, or Christian Advocate, or Christian Herald, or Union Signal, or some other similar paper, given for the purpose by friends of reform, is furnished weekly to each man who can read. They are also given the reading of two magazines each week. These are passed by the Chaplain from cell to cell so that they are read by fifty or more men.

Library.—A number of volumes have been added by purchase and others by gift. There are more than twenty-two hundred books and bound magazines in the library. The men are allowed the use of two volumes each week. A carefully studied variety affords each reader with such reading as he enjoys or finds most profitable. Many who had no fondness for books when they came to the institution have become lovers of books and read with much profit to themselves.

*Instruction.*—This part of my work has received thoughtful attention. The alphabet is taught and the student led forward as rapidly as his ability and the circumstances will permit. The advancement of most has been commendable.

Letters.—The privilege of receiving letters from relatives and the friends of earlier years and of writing one letter a week in reply is of inestimable value in retaining a love for home and the helpful associations of earlier years. The cultivation of such love, with other helpful influences, has led up to the purpose to live a manly life in many instances. This privilege is appreciated and improved by a large percentage of the men.

*Religious Instruction.*—This work has not been neglected. It has been our endeavor to so present the truth of the Gospel of Jesus the Christ, in our personal association with the men and in the Sabbath services, that those almost wholly ignorant of all moral obligations and others having more or less knowledge of these obligations may come to understand and be governed by the knowledge of his relation to his Creator and fellow men. We have reason to believe that the teaching has been not in vain.

With sincere thanks to your honorable body, to the Board of Prison Inspectors, and each of the Prison officials for the encouragement given me, this report is respectfully submitted.

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# REPORT OF THE COMMISSION RELATING TO THE CRIMINAL INSANE.

# To His Excellency, the Governor, and the Executive Council of the State of Maine:

The usual obligations of your committee appointed to administer to the physical and mental necessities of the inmates of the insane department of the prison have been met and the requirements of the statutes relating to the conduct of affairs of this department have been carried into effect. Monthly visitations have been made by the entire committee or a majority of the board and all of the details of its management have been carefully investigated. The prison physician who is identified with the committee visits this department frequently and attends to the medical requirements of the occupants. The dietary has at all times met the physical necessities and the materials are of good quality and well served. Nearly one half of the inmates have been furnished employment regularly and all have had the privilege of going into the open air in the prison yard where they receive the salutary influences of fresh air and sunlight. These opportunities have been marked by a large share of health which has been observed throughout the entire year. But very little sickness has prevailed, only one death having occurred, this being due largely to the disintegrating influences of a diseased nervous system.

We are pained to chronicle the death of Mr. C. M. Moody, which occurred in April last. He had been connected with this department as its supervisor from its initiation in 1893. He was a person possessed of natural aptitude for this peculiar duty and his long experience at the Maine Insane Hospital in this special line of labor coupled with innate qualifications stamped him as a most valuable and efficient person to supervise the department. He was a man of kindly feelings, even disposition and gained the confidence and esteem of the inmates. The occupants of the department recognize the loss of one interested in their welfare and your committee deeply regret this removal from earthly existence of a person so useful in his vocation.

Mr. J. E. Mears was appointed immediately to fill the position made vacant. His long experience in the prison department coupled with his physical and mental makeup we believe well fitted him for the position. Thus far he has met our expectations and gives every promise of a suitable person to supervise the immediate wants of the inmates of the department.

Notwithstanding the fact of the prevailing confidence reposed in the administration of the affairs of this department, yet there is a widespread belief throughout the State that the criminal insane should be cared for in connection with one of the hospitals whose prerogative it is to treat mental disease. This opinion is not only maintained by the general public but by those in authority who are delegated to determine what course shall be pursued in caring for its citizens bereft of their reason. Occasional efforts have been made among the relatives of the inmates to have them removed to the Maine Insane Hospital, but under the circumstances it has been thought best not to accede to such requests notably because of the fact that we should be obliged to treat them in connection with what may be termed the innocent or citizen insane. One of the reasons which induced the legislature to create this department arose from the fact that complaints had been made by relatives objecting to the treatment of these two classes in the same wards. We have in former reports advocated the propriety and desirability of the State's erecting a segregate building in connection with one of the hospitals of the State for the purpose of not only offering its criminal insane hospital treatment but to provide for the increasing numbers sent to the hospitals by the courts for observation. If we are rightly informed the management of the prison is desirous that such changes in caring for this dependent class shall take place as will effect an opportunity to devote the wing, now occupied by the criminal insane, to the legitimate purposes of prison administration.

There have been periods since its occupation by this class when the prison has been seriously handicapped for the want of proper room for the convicts which has thereby seriously interfered with necessary discipline. Your committee are of the opinion that the interests of the prison would be greatly enhanced by the removal of the criminal insane and that a proposition to care for and treat this class in a segregate building in connection with one of the hospitals for the insane would further conduce to their comfort and wellbeing and effect a humanitarian purpose which would meet the approval not only of the citizens but the relatives as well of this unfortunate and dependent class.

# REPORT OF THE COUNCIL COMMITTEE ON STATE PRISON.

#### To the Governor and Council:

In behalf of the Council Committee I am pleased to report a very satisfactory state of affairs at the State Prison.

I have been offered every opportunity to observe and investigate the condition of the prison and of the inmates by the Warden and the subordinate officers and regret that I have not been able to time my visits with those of the Inspectors.

Their report and that of the Warden will show what progress has been made during the past year.

The marked improvement in the appearance of the buildings both inside and outside, also of the wall is apparent to the casual observer. The \$4,500.00 appropriated by the last Legislature for repairs has been well expended, and the changes in the harness room have made it a much brighter and healthier place to work. The increased productions in the carriage, harness and broom departments and their good financial showing speak well for the business-like management of the institution.

I consider the discipline excellent, the sanitary conditions satisfactory and the health record is above the usual average.

To the Honorable Governor and Council:

GENTLEMEN:—The jails of the respective counties have been inspected quarterly as prescribed by law by one, and when possible, by two of the Board of Inspectors, and we are glad to be able to report that marked improvement has been made in several of them, and are sorry to say that in a few instances suggestions of the Inspectors have not been acted upon more promptly.

We heartily recommend that workshops be added to our county jails. In Aroostook county, Houlton jail has long been a place of favorite resort for tramps and hoboes. A year ago the county commissioners at our suggestion introduced a wood-yard, and several hundred cords of wood were worked up and sold to the local market at a good profit. Behold the result. The tramps have practically deserted the jail, and to-day there are hardly prisoners enough there to perform the necessary work about the buildings, thus making a saving of several thousand dollars to the county. We believe what has been done in Aroostook county can and should be done in many if not all the jails.
